From the Principal Mouse Trap Power



Last Friday I was privileged to witness the creative designs thought out by 10Sc1 as they grappled with the problem of powering

a vehicle by harnessing the energy of a mouse trap spring. A variety of light weight contraptions rolled across the floor of the Great Hall within the boundaries of a track bordered by white tape. Various gearing devices were employed to propel the The winner employed vehicles. а counterweight on an axle with oversize wheels to conserve energy. It travelled over 10.6m to the great joy of its creators. Six Advanced Engineering students from the University of Sydney mentored the teams of young engineers on the project. There were some impressive designs on display. Mr Kay and the Science Department are to be congratulated on the success of the innovation.

Debating v Newington

Last week my family and I enjoyed a Year 8 debate against Newington. High negated the proposition that Australia should close down immigration centres. Newington's model argued that detention centres imposed gaollike conditions on largely innocent families, especially children, and that within 10 years 50% of them should be closed down and replaced incrementally with villages of immigrants, housed and offered work in neighbouring factories. Asserting frequently that "we have boundless plains to share" the affirmative championed the cause of refugees to live with dignity and purpose until their fates were decided. Max Phillis, for the negative, argued that closing down centres would not stop refugees from coming; that the exorbitant cost and impracticality of the affirmative's 'controlled communities' model doomed it to failure; that jobs and skills could not just be created; that the purpose of detention centres was to sort out the genuine refugees and that they acted as a deterrent to illegal immigration. He assured us that we

needed to stick to the status quo for the efficient 'one place processing' of detainees and that the system was equitable and more likely to detect terrorists. The affirmative went on to claim that the existing system has not stopped refugees coming; is costly to run; and is immoral in its impact on the innocent. Immigrants awaiting processing who are allowed to live in communities could boost our economy by working and paying taxes. Antony Paul asked the negative how their model decided which detention centres would close; and by what criteria it would choose which families to be sent to the communities or to the centres. He questioned by what standard is the existing system judged to be immoral? People who are legitimate and who have done no wrong he declared should hold no fears about detention centres. Puneet Baweja completed the contrary argument with a distinction between refugees and asylum and between refugees seekers and immigrants. He ramped up the attack on the inequity of choosing some to go to detention centres and some to closed communities. He demonstrated this unpalatable consequence would fatally flaw the affirmative's 50% closure compromise. Ultimately, the adjudicator agreed that the affirmative had not persuaded him of the case for partial closures. It was an enjoyable experience.

GPS Winter Finale

Newington has been a traditional hard round for High, particularly in football. We seem to come unstuck against the Newington style of play. History repeated as the first and second grade were out muscled and outpaced by two strong sides. Our season could have been more productive and I hope all Year 10 and 11 players learn that a higher standard of fitness will enable them to acquire and employ consistently the higher level of skills needed for GPS competition. I saw some hard fought and spirited rugby games in the 13s. The highlight for me was the celebrations of the 2nd XV and their long suffering supporters, after a courageous 7-5 win on the bell. It was an evenly matched, engaging contest. I would like to congratulate all the 1st XV squad who stuck together in trying

circumstances and played right to the whistle each week, irrespective of the score. Your dedication to team goals will provide a strong foundation for your future lives, particularly when faced with adversity. You showed great strength of character and abundant High spirit.

Athletics Season

Students are reminded that we expect greater participation and higher levels of commitment to training this season. I have set goals for Mr Devlin – we have to beat TAS in 2006 and TAS and Scots or Newington in 2007. Participation, fitness and technique will help you to reach these goals.



Recount of the Year 8, Semester 2 History Excursion to La Perouse



The day started off miserable and cold as we arrived at school and did not look like it was going to improve in the near future. All of the Semester 2 History classes assembled in the Great Hall for a Roll

Call and an overview of the revised schedule for the day (the official one being called off due to the weather.)

After learning that we would not be going on a bushwalk to Henry Head and that there would be no sandcastle competition we were treated to a fantastic recount from Mr. Hannon of the events that happened to La Perouse and his men in Samoa. After this we watched a video called Benny and the Dreamers which was about the discovery of a remote Aboriginal community in North Western Australia and how they were sent to a mission where their standard of living fell drastically and they eventually returned to their home land.

The video ended and everyone went outside to board the buses. We eventually arrived at La Perouse where the rain was falling intermittently. We climbed a muddy hill to see a grave in which lies the Ship's Doctor of La Perouse's ship who was severely wounded in a battle with natives in Samoa. We then proceeded to a monument to La Perouse that we attempted to sketch but the rain thwarted our artistic attempts. Conceding defeat to the encroaching storm we retreated to the warmth of the Cafes in which we had lunch. Due to the abysmal weather lunch was extended in the hope that it would blow away but, needless to say, it didn't. We regretfully left the warmth of the cafes for the freezing wind and rain outside. To protect ourselves we formed huddles of umbrellas that kept out the worst of the weather until it was time to visit Bare Island.

By this time the wind had intensified and the rain was driving into you at the horizontal. LETTERS RE ABSENCE/LATENESS/ EARLY LEAVE

When your son returns to school from being absent he is required to provide a letter of explanation signed by a parent or guardian. If your son is going to be late for school a note is also required.



If your son has an early leave note he is required to have his note signed by either Mr Beringer, Mr Dowdell or Mr Prorellis **before 8:55 am** and handed in to the Main Office immediately after. Each letter should be signed by a parent or guardian with the <u>name date</u> and <u>roll class</u> of your son <u>printed clearly</u>. Your son needs to pick up a leave pass from the Main Office before he leaves the school.

LEAVE

If you require leave for your son please, apply in writing and address your application to the Principal, Dr Jaggar, stating the reason and length of time of the leave. Your son must then present this application to Dr Jaggar for permission for the leave. **Please remember to apply before the leave and not after.**

The Principal must approve all leave applications.

The 2006 / 2007 Season is rapidly approaching and an exciting programme has been established to cater for all of our cricketers as we embark on a course to establish High's credentials as a force in the AAGPS Competitions.

We have had an encouraging response for coaches and we welcome back some ex students who met recently and are aware of our goal to see High teams perform at their potential best in competition.

TEAM NOMINATIONS

This season we anticipate fielding the following teams for competition depending on the final numbers electing cricket as their summer sport

1st 2nd 3rd and 4th XIs 16A and B 15A and B 14A, B and C 13A and B

The players in the four senior XIs will be all be eligible for selection in the 1st and 2nd XIs with consideration to their personal performances during competitions. The "XTreme XI" concept has now gone to that great resting place in the sky!!

PLAYER INCENTIVES – In past seasons due to the lack of a full compliment of team coaches many of our cricketers have remained static in teams when they deservedly could have been promoted to a higher grade in their age group. This season with coaching support, players will have that opportunity to be rewarded for consistent performances. In teams where we have junior cricketers (Years 7 - 9) who are experiencing GPS cricket for the first time, or who have had limited opportunities through lack of previous regular coaching, will see teams nominated in age groups of a comparative standard. The result of this move will enable our less experienced players to enjoy their cricket as well as learning from their experiences in competition with other boys of similar abilities.

NEW CRICKET NETS - The great news is that our new nets are on the way with a proposed commencement in the first week in September (subject to weather conditions) and in full service for Term 4. There will be 4 synthetic practice wickets with 7 metre runups, an overhead net cover and safety nets to contain the balls when players are driving during sessions. We now have access to an additional bowling machine and will make use of both machines to improve techniques under the guidance of batting coaches.

SPORT AFTERNOONS - This season teams will practise as a group on sports days and coaches will attend on Saturdays to conduct the team's match plans and assess strategies for future practices. There will also be post school practice sessions on a rotation basis for Years 7, 8 and 9 teams which will be advised in advance.


