Plain English Speaking Awards State Final



It was a privilege once again to be able to attend the final of PESA to support a High contestant, Kelvin Yu. He started the program with a nearly word perfect rendition of his prepared speech on the topic "Out of sight, out of mind". His exposé of the 21st century slavery of 27 million people worldwide was framed ironically at its introduction and conclusion by anecdotes about the great emancipator, Abraham Lincoln. His speech was informative, well constructed and articulate. David, from Blue Mountains Grammar, spoke wittily in the aphoristic mode of his idol, Oscar Wilde, about "the importance of being facetious". He differentiated sarcasm from irony in an appropriately clever speech, averring that 'sarcasm sells'. Acerbic satire was a weapon of social change, even though it is perceived as the lowest form of wit. Rosie, from SCEGGS Darlinghurst, cautioned "Just don't assume" through the rather amazing story of the Hubble telescope's initial failure to focus after deployment. Its difficulties were

caused during design by American and European measurement systems being different and each side assuming that their system was standard. She investigated the effects on our lives of assumptions which she characterised as 'opinions that feel like facts'. Daniel, from Smiths Hill, claimed "My GI Joe is broken". He used the extended metaphor of the unreality of the appearance of toy soldiers and their use in games to critique the falsely clean, indestructible and heroic image of the ADF and of US imperialism. He argued that we need to redefine our paradigm of war and stop romanticising things military. Mihajla, from Cecil Hills, used the "Not Happy, John" slogan to lampoon the AWB wheat scandal, government misconduct and the apparent lack of ministerial accountability. Vickram Joshi from Grammar humorously satirised his Indian culture to extrapolate from the personal to the universal in his portrayal of the multicultural experience in Sydney. He used the Cronulla riots slogan "We grew here, you flew here" to pinpoint the shock of separateness suddenly felt by many Asian Australians in the aftermath of the crisis. He linked his dream of playing cricket for Australia to his desire for interracial harmony built upon the foundation of individual action, inclusiveness and tolerance.

The impromptu speeches were on the topic "the good life". After just three minutes of preparation, the standard of the speeches was impressive, with most contestants able to produce a sustained coherent speech on demand. Kelvin linked experience of the good life to the isolation of the nuclear family and the social problems associated with the consumerist society. Others talked about those who could and could not share the benefits of the good life – children in poverty, baby boomers getting it all at the expense of their children, third world economies as Nike slaves for western consumption or politicians endangering the future for today's youth. I enjoyed the experience and thought the Grammar boy deserved his win. Kelvin represented us with style, flair and intelligence.

Centennial Parklands Meeting

A productive meeting at Centennial Parklands last week sorted out some deed of Licence issues and established several areas for discussion about improvements to facilities and access. Our suggestions about parking provisions on Moore Park West have been included in the new Master Plan. We are negotiating on a range of issues. Thanks to Laurie Heil, our Liaison Officer, the relationship between the school and the Trust is progressing more amicably than it did in the past.

The Future for our Electricity



After a meeting this week with the School Education Director and the Properties Team Leader, it was agreed that the refurbishment of the electricity supply to the SBHS-SGHS site should be made priority 1 for 'minor capital works' for 2007. Unfortunately, if the project is approved, tenders won't be called until July next year. We will have to be patient and try to reduce peak hour power consumption in the hottest and coldest periods next year until the problem is fixed.

Investing in our Schools

A tender has been chosen to lay the concrete slabs for the basketball courts and the cricket nets. Starting in a couple of weeks, the Flat will have major areas fenced off for construction work. I trust everyone will cooperate during this period of major upgrade.

During the end of term holidays, members of the Sydney High School Cadet Unit (Sgt Anthony Ho, Cpl Chris Lam, Cpl Denis Stojanovic, Cdt Ishan Nadkarni and Cdt Phil Wu), Knox Grammar Cadet Unit and 323 Air Cadet Squadron formed the 2006 Australian Defence Force Rifle Team and participated in an international shooting competition against cadet units from all over the United Kingdom. Members of the

Royal Canadian Army Cadet Rifle Team also made an appearance in the Inter Services Cadet Rifle Meeting, School's Meeting matches as well as various sightseeing tours.

The team stayed two nights at Randwick Barracks where everything from final preparations to new friends were made. A farewell reception was held at Sydney High followed by a flight lasting 20 undesirable hours.

Activities in England involved a full day of sightseeing London, a visit to the Fleet Air Arm museum, tour of the Royal Marines Commando Training Facility where we were given a demonstration of the strenuous obstacle course Royal Marine recruits are put through and an introduction to the weapons of the Royal Marines followed by the weapons handling of the British Standard Infantry rifle (SA-80). Last but not least, an educational trip to the historical dockyard, Portsmouth.

In terms of shooting, Australia performed exceptionally well against the foreign cadets. A total of seven gold medals and one silver were won, raising Australia's reputation as excellent marksmen to a new level. Sgt Ho and Cpl Lam each won a gold medal while Cdt Wu won a silver.

Competitive shooting may have been the major event, but there were also optional shoots like shotgunning, gallery shooting and air pistol shoot outs.

The 2006 Bisley trip was an overall success and wouldn't have happened without the effort and time of Major Knowles (Commanding Officer, Sydney High), Captain Billingsby (Commanding Officer, Wollongong) and our coach Justin Hill (former High student).

The initial exchanges were tough to say the least. Several further chances to seal the game went begging, resulting in a tense last few minutes. Pleasingly, High hung on to clinch a thoroughly deserved and moral boosting victory.

Second grade put in one of their most polished displays of the season, with a convincing 3-0 victory. Coach Apoifis shuffled the line up around looking to find the strongest combination, with a view to next year.
