120th ANNUAL PRIZE GIVING

Occasional address by Mr Peter Crittle

Principal's Address

Special guests, Mr Peter Crittle, our occasional speaker, staff, parents, students of the class of 2003 and prize winners – welcome to our 120th Speech Night. On these occasions I am very pleased to be able to highlight some of the school's activities and honour the accomplishments of its students.

2003 was a year of exploration and experimentation in several areas. We spent quite some time researching issues for our Strategic Plan 2004-6. A staff/student survey revealed what was preoccupying the school – a new or extended library and more access to computers. The school family will really have to focus and pull together to make the vision of a new library by 2008 a reality. We investigated a move towards seven lines in the timetable to accommodate out of hours classes, sports training clashes, music rehearsals and extra electives. Compacted senior curriculum and structured study periods in the senior school would have been necessary. The staff rejected the concept of supervised study periods. On the other hand, the move towards two sports afternoons, Wednesdays for Years 9-12 and Thursdays for Years 7 & 8, was discussed and accepted in principle for implementation this year. I am pleased to be able to report that not only was this initiative introduced into an already complicated timetable by Bob Dowdell, but also it appears as though most sports are witnessing some benefits from the change. The experiment with structured subject acceleration, pioneered by industrial arts in 2002, was taken up by modern history in 2003. Geography students will be accelerating this year and we hope that students in English, visual arts and music might also be inspired to follow the successful lead of their peers. Cohort progression as a norm for all students is fracturing. I hope that a learning culture of personal planning and acceptance of responsibility for individual progress replaces it.

Late in the year I was to discover that when confronted by “many tasks severe” “sincere efforts” and “courage, bold and strong” do not necessarily overcome them. Perhaps our school song needs some amendment to alert boys to the power of political persuasion. Most regrettably, I was forced to “reconsider my position” [I think that is the correct euphemism] on the Ascham proposal. Eighteen months of effort by quite a number of people did not bear fruit in the end. It was a great pity that we could not agree on a way to move forward. The future of the Outterside Centre is now in the hands of the school community that claimed such a stake in the future of its operations. If medium to long term commercial relationships with other natural users – private rowing schools - are not to be brokered, then financial support from the School Family must be forthcoming in their stead. If our facility is to be perceived as a *privately funded public asset* even though it is plainly owned by an incorporated entity, it is up to us all to support it financially.

Academic Results

Our 2003 HSC results were of good quality. Band 6 numbers increased by 7.3% 15% of reported UAls were at 99 or above - the best result for six years. Premier's Awards winners increased by 73% on 2002 to 26. UAls above 90 were on the six-year average of 114. The cohort result for 90 UAls was slightly below average at 66.7%. Reported UAls below 80 were less than 2%. Over 95% of the cohort gained entry to the five major metropolitan universities. This result was slightly above the nine-year average of 94%. There was a big increase in students entering science related courses at 16%. Combined law was higher at 11%. There were fewer students in the commercial area at 26%, engineering attracted 13% and Arts degrees, 7%.

Sports Results

Tennis

The big result for 2003 was the GPS premiership win by first grade tennis. They were also runners up at CHS level to Lismore. They came a strong fifth at the National Tennis Teams Challenge in Wagga Wagga. Ably led by Ruo Li, the team was: Michael Hayes, Ryan Biancardi, Tim Neville, Tom Lung, Evan Solomons and reserve Kim Dickson. Michael Hayes, Ruo Li and Ryan Biancardi were selected in the Combined GPS team.

Rifle Shooting

The first grade rifle team (Andrew Jacques, Daniel Comben, Wilson Chong, Mark Boere, Christopher Budd, Michael Li, Jeffrey Tsang, and Joshua Scharfegger) won the GPS premiership. They won the Rawson Cup and the NRA Shield. Wilson Chong, Andrew Jacques and Michael Li were selected in the Combined GPS Rifle Team.

Soccer

High first grade were undefeated runners up in the GPS competition. One draw too many cost us the title. Matthew Mulroney, Hugh James and Ali Alsamail made Combined GPS first grade. Michael Walder and Pat Bazin were selected in second grade, with Sen Mitsuji in the 3rd XI.

Volleyball

High won the Sydney East Area Knockout and the inaugural open competition in volleyball as a trial GPS sport. Nigel Panagopka won a full scholarship to the AIS. Yaegan Doran and Keith Wong were selected to represent NSW in the U16 Australian Championships.

Athletics

At the GPS Athletics carnival Paul Watzlaff won the open 3000 metres championship and was third in the 800 and 1500 metres. Jacob Stretton was first in the U16 years high jump. Frank Jin won the U14 years long jump and was third in the 100 metres. Jih Tan won the 13 years 100 metres. Sydney High won the Eastern Suburbs Zone athletics carnival for the 12th consecutive year.

Rowing

At the Head of the River the second Year 10 VIII rowed to a strong 2nd place. The 3rd Year 10 VIII finished 3rd. At the NSW Championships (CHS) :

High rowers were 1st and 2nd in the championship Vllls, 1st in the U16 double scull, 1st & 3rd in the U17 quad scull, 1st and 2nd in the championship IVs and 1st in the U16 single scull.

Cricket

Glenn Carroll and Peter Levido were selected in the Combined GPS cricket team. High won the Cec Rubie trophy from Melbourne High. In the Davidson Shield Knockout the team made it to the last 16.

Swimming

At the school swimming carnival in 2003, Andrew Leis broke the under 14 50m breaststroke record; and Tom Miller bettered the open 100m & 200m freestyle times set by Olympic Medallist Graham Brewer in 1976. Kenny La, Andrew Reis, Ellis Louie, Barry Dubovsky and Tom Miller were selected in the Combined GPS Swimming Team. Tom Miller and Andrew Reis made it to the Australian Age Championships in Brisbane. Andrew Reis' success at the All Schools Carnival at Homebush qualified him to represent NSW at the national titles in Hobart.

Cross Country

Nadeeka Jayarathna ran a close second in the GPS open Cross Country Championships.

Basketball

High were runners up in the Raschke Cup. Three GPS representatives were selected in combined teams.

Rugby

Jakheb Matthews played a record 25 first grade games of rugby for High. Daniel Thomas was selected to play in the NSW Under 16 Team. Rhys Gencur was selected in Combined GPS 3rd grade. Lachlan Mitchell and Tom Andrews were reserves for the 3rd XV.

Sailing

Oliver Pickles and Eddy Blaxell won the CHS Pacer class championship at Lake Macquarie.

Table Tennis

Secondary Schools Championship finalists: Yeou Kang Shaw, Edward Pham, Rou Li, Austin Hong.

Fencing

David Grenet, Kit Axelrod and Sean Chen won bronze at the Australian Fencing Association Championships at Newington.

Co-curricular

Debating

Angus Ng, Hamish Nairn, Evan Solomons, and David Grenet won the Hume Barbour Trophy for High for the 22nd time. The GPS Seconds Debating team, Daniel Wodak, Liam Bennett and Tanvir Ahmed were undefeated champions.

Michael Coutts, Moussa Farhat, Anthony Morris, Raymond Rocca, and Kelvin Yu won the state Year 7/8 debating competition. William Clegg, Thomas Kaldor, Mitchell Seow, and Gabriel McManus were defeated in the state final of the Commonwealth Bank Junior debating competition. Hamish Nairn, Evan Solomon and Daniel Wodak were selected in CHS debating teams. Hamish Nairn was selected in the NSW debating team which went on to take the National Championships in Brisbane. Hamish also made it to the final of the Plain English Speaking Award Competition.

Music

Daniel O'Keefe and Robert Chen were selected in the NSW State Schools Symphonic Wind Orchestra. Thomas Norrie, Raj Kumar, Adam McKenzie, Harry Walker and Robert Chen were selected in the NSW Public Schools Instrumental Ensembles. Adam McKenzie, James Gerofi, Thomas Norrie and Raj Kumar, were selected to attend the State Senior Music Camp.

Chess

Ronald Yu was the youngest ever City of Sydney chess champion. In the Young Masters tournament Ronald was the only undefeated player. He went on to represent Australia in Greece in the World Junior Chess Championships. The senior chess team (Thien Vuong, Ilia Zvedeniouk, Alex Feldman, Mark Liang and Opal Wu) won the NSW All Schools Championship.

John Shin (Year12) won the McDonald's Performing Arts Challenge – verse speaking section. Stas Madorski (11) and Henry Zou (11) were selected in the NSW Public Schools Senior Drama Ensemble. The Year 11 Ancient History class won the regional final of the Macquarie University Ancient History Drama Festival.

Hugh James won the Eastern Suburbs section of the SMH Young Writer of the Year Competition.

Sriram Srikumar was chosen to represent Bondi District at the State SRC Conference.

Academic Competitions

George Zhong won a gold medal in the Chemistry Olympiad in Athens. Ivan Guo represented Australia at the 44th International Mathematical Olympiad in Tokyo. He also won a medal and a BH Neumann Certificate for attaining a perfect score in the Australian Mathematics Competition. Charles Qin earned a medal for the second year in a row. Tony Chen (12) and Anthony Wan (8) earned medals in the Australasian Schools Science Competition. Matheepan Sivagnanasundaram was 1st in Australasia in the Australian and New Zealand Economics Competition: Tony Chen, Max Kletski and Han Xu also won prizes. The highest mark in their year level **in the state** for the *Australasian Schools Computer Skills* Competition: Matthew Cousins (Year 9), Gabriel McManus (Year 10) in computer science; Jiang Huang (Year 10) and Rupert Shuttleworth (Year 12) in computer literacy. In the **UNSW School Mathematics Competition Awards** Vinh Pham was 2nd and Vinoth Nandakumar 3rd in the junior division. In the senior division, Ivan Guo was first, while Charles Qin and George Zhong won prizes and Certificates. In the **Business Studies** Competition, seven students were awarded High Distinctions. Matheepan Sivagnanasundaram, Tony Chen and Han Xu received cash prizes. In the **Economics Competition**, 10 year 12 students received High Distinctions. Matheepan Sivagnanasundaram achieved the highest score in the competition. Opal Wu and Max Kletski also earned prizes.

Zhongxiao Sun of 7R was a finalist in Ozspell – Australian Spelling Championship 2003.

Kaivan Vaidya topped the school in the **Australian Geography Competition**. He was placed in the top 0.3% of the state. Other top performers (top 2% of the state) included: Tom Zhang, Richard Liu, Gabriel McManus, (all equal top 0.5% of the state) Tim Mazid, Vinh Pham, Daniel Guo, (all equal) Weir Qian, Peter Gordon, Daniel Ong, Paul Wong, Yuk Lun Yeung, Sririam Srikumar, Joel Kamerman, Fredrick Lee, Lixang Li, (all equal) Anthony Huynh, Peter Lieu, Phillip Roser, Jacob Stretton, Edward Wang, Paul Watzlaff, Matthew Wong, Andrew Wu (all equal).

On a personal note, I was strongly supported by John Beringer as Acting Principal, Bob Dowdell and Con Barris (Acting Deputy) in my prolonged absence mid-year as a crew member on KAZ chasing the record for a non-stop, unassisted circumnavigation of Australia. Despite a false start, a

broken finger, many days of modifications and maintenance and several postponed departures, the campaign was very successful and safely completed in 37 days, well inside the record. My year concluded by achieving a yachting milestone of 25 Sydney to Hobart races. I would like to thank everybody who helped me to accomplish my sporting goals, particularly Mr David Pescud, owner / skipper of KAZ and Kerry and Sophie, my family who carried on stoically in my absence

This year's concluding remarks depart from my usual practice of quoting poetry. Tonight, the words of Thich Nhat Hanh, Vietnamese monk, activist and Nobel Peace Prize nominee, resonate with my perception of our times. He writes:

To be passionate about what we are doing or saying is one thing, to be blinkered and intransigent is quite another. As we honour your achievements here tonight and wish you all the best for your various tertiary endeavours, I hope that as the graduating cohort of 2003, you will make the transitions from school to university to working life guided by a balanced set of viewpoints to which you are not so excessively attached that your ability to really listen to others who hold different interpretations of the important questions of living to your own, is impaired. Anzac Day Assembly

Distinguished guests, staff and students. Welcome to our traditional Anzac Day Assembly. The purpose of this gathering is to make sure that in every state school a ceremony is held to honour those who have died in this country's wars or in international conflicts affecting our citizens. Today, we make time available for reflection on the nature of war itself. Despite the necessity to hold the ceremony well in advance of the actual national holiday, this assembly is nevertheless one of the most important on the calendar, because of its personal, cultural and national significance. The state education system needs to make a strong statement about its support for this special day. As custodian of cultural continuity, our public education system has the obligation to emphasise the importance of national days. The Anzac Day tradition is inextricably linked to our sense of what it means to be an Australian. It is part of our mythology that we came of age as a nation as a result of the Gallipoli campaign. Anzac Day has evolved as a quintessentially Australian celebration. Dawn services and marches are followed by two-up games, egalitarian yarn spinning and carousing by the remnants of military units reunited for the one day of the year. At our ceremony, it is important that the human qualities of self sacrifice, courage, mateship, humour and stoicism, so abundantly displayed in a bitter and unsuccessful contest of arms, should be invoked by stories about Anzac Day and the months of heavy fighting that followed. We should respect those who did their duty and those serving in East Timor and Iraq. We all should reflect upon what defines aspects of our heritage and identity.

At this assembly last year I was concerned that the recently concluded war in Iraq was about to embroil Australia in a messy occupation, essentially unjustified unless weapons of mass destruction were to be discovered in Iraq. The invasion was also justified on the grounds that the cause of international war against terror would be advanced. I alluded to the cynical possibilities luring us to be involved in a war for 'regime change'- however desirable that may have been. Did we finally go to war for a free trade deal with the United States, a revival of wheat and live sheep sales to Iraq and a stabilisation of the oil price? Or was it all really a revenge invasion by Bush the Younger to finish off his father's war aims which we were seduced into



joining because of our sycophantic support for the ANZUS Alliance? Much of what I feared then would happen, has happened since. The occupation has been messy and deadly. Law and order have not been restored. Military and civilian casualties continue to mount. The coalition forces are viewed by the people they sought to make free, as invaders, not liberators. Recent very serious terrorist attacks in Spain sparked a new crisis. This week the USA has had its worst casualties since the invasion. Flash points like Falluja undermine any perception that the US and its allies are in control. Major military operations are being undertaken today. As the date for a transfer of political authority draws nearer, power groups in Iraq are flexing their muscles, trying to demonstrate to the people who should lead them. Afghanistan, the front line in the war on terror, has not been reconstructed by its 'liberators'. Iraq is not stable enough for serious reconstruction to begin. Without reconstruction, invaded societies become a breeding ground for terrorists. The world is irrefutably not freer of terrorism than before the invasion of Iraq. The players have changed but the game goes on – personal martyrdom through suicide bombing and larger scale attacks on soft targets in transport and public places. The tactics of Palestinian terror have been internationalised.



Political fall out in Australia has followed the startling turn of events in Spain. Only last week we were witness to an unseemly dispute about accounts of intelligence briefings made by experts who formulate Australia's Iraq policy and the likelihood of Saddam Hussein really having stockpiles of weapons of mass destruction. Clearly, the quality of the intelligence upon which our government relied to support its decision to join the 'coalition of the willing' was questionable. Now, the political dispute is about when to bring our service personnel home. We need to honour our commitments to our allies but also to act ethically and admit to our mistakes. As soon as possible, Iraqis need to be masters of their own destiny. As soon as is practicable, our personnel should return home. The complexities of getting involved in the affairs of another country are now only too apparent. Crises develop lives of their own and run their courses unpredictably. Such is the nature of warfare.

During today's assembly we turn our attention to our honour board with the names of those Old Boys of High who gave their lives in the service of their country. Beneath this long list of the lost we lay our

wreaths of remembrance. Our thoughts turn to the millions who have died in wars. We hope that war will not touch us, our families, our neighbours, our friends. Sadly, for many of us, this is not the case. Young men in the assembly might well consider how it would feel if they were the ones being asked to answer their country's call. It is the tragic waste of war that leaves the most lasting impression, as we imagine this afternoon the possible productive futures of those who never came home to grow old.

During the school vacation I exhort all of you here to do something on Anzac Day to commemorate the occasion. We will be represented again by our marching band and cadets. Our cadets are forming an honour guard in Hyde Park today for the Department of Education's Anzac Day service, with one of our students as master of ceremonies. I hope that a tradition of High involvement in Anzac Day has begun. Do not while away the day as a public holiday. Get involved and demonstrate a 21st century version of that spirit of collegial endeavour so wonderfully exhibited on 25 April 1915.

Remembrance Day 11 November 2004



Between 1899 and 1973, over 100 000 Australians have died in conflicts starting with the Boer war, in which 606 Australians died, through to the Vietnam conflict, which claimed 520 Australian lives. The first and second world wars took 61 000 and 39 000 Australian lives respectively, huge numbers in our small population, especially when you think that they were mostly young men. But our losses are a drop in a vast ocean when looked at on a global scale.

The destruction that war has left over the years is dramatic and widespread. War has damaged all nations. Among all the countries of the world, deaths during the period of the first World War amounted to roughly 15 million, while those during the second World War reached an astonishing 55 million.

Australia has in fact been relatively fortunate in that conflict has rarely been brought to our own territory, and therefore our loss of life has been comparatively small. During World War II, for example, Germany lost well over 5 million people. More surprising and shocking still, 10 million Chinese died during this same period, of which a large majority were civilians.

The eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month marks the signing of the Armistice, in 1918, which signalled the end of the Great War. At this time, the guns of the Western Front fell silent after more than four years of continuous warfare.

War is the great divider of the world's people, but also the great uniter – in that no-one on this planet has not been affected by war in some way or another. Whether it is through our grandfathers who fought in the Second World War, for any side, or through people living in the middle of any one of the dozens of smouldering or exploding conflicts in the developing world today: war concerns us all. That is what makes this day so important. It is this great common link between us that compels us to remember and reflect on war.

Today is in no way a day to glorify war. It is a day to think about the meaning of war and its realities, and to realise that there is no prestige and there are no victories in war. It is a day to commemorate those who have been lost as we yet again fail to learn the lesson that has been taught countless times throughout history.



More recently our experience with war has been with peace-keeping efforts, such as in East Timor, and more notably our contribution to the US-led 'War On Terror' and the consequent invasion of Iraq. This experience of war has been very much an impersonal one for most Australians. Despite the

fact that since the Vietnam war we have been able to watch world conflicts on TV, most of us are very ignorant of the realities of the Iraqi conflict. Few Australians have had a direct experience of the nation which was left after the USA declared the second Gulf War officially over last year. None of us deal with the sporadic acts of aggression that kids in Iraq do. And none of us live in a country with a shattered political order, a devastated economy and a society whose way of life has been uprooted.

If we are not directly involved in war, it is hard to realise its impact and its human costs. It is easy enough to go along with the decisions of our leaders and accept that they are right when we are not confronted each day with the ramifications of war as you would be if you lived in the Middle East, for example. But what we all need to do on this day of remembrance is attempt to reflect on war, and consider its costs, its losses and, ultimately, its futility. If we are unable to understand this basic lesson, history will continue to repeat itself and wars will rage on into the future.

Finally, in remembrance, we must reflect on those who have been forced to personally experience war's costs and futility before us. It is these 100 000 Australians who have died, and many more who have served, and those billions who have been involved in war globally whose memory obliges us to consider the consequences of war. If we forget about these people we will never learn war's lesson. Most of all, we do not do them honour and justice if we do not consider the harsh realities of war for ourselves, and use this reflection to prevent war.

Don't let these millions of global deaths go in vain. They may have died in wars for one reason or another, as fighters or as civilians, but what unites them all is their common experience of the horror of conflict. This common experience ensures that every last one of these people would hope that no-one dies in the same way ever again, and that war is prevented.

We will remember them.

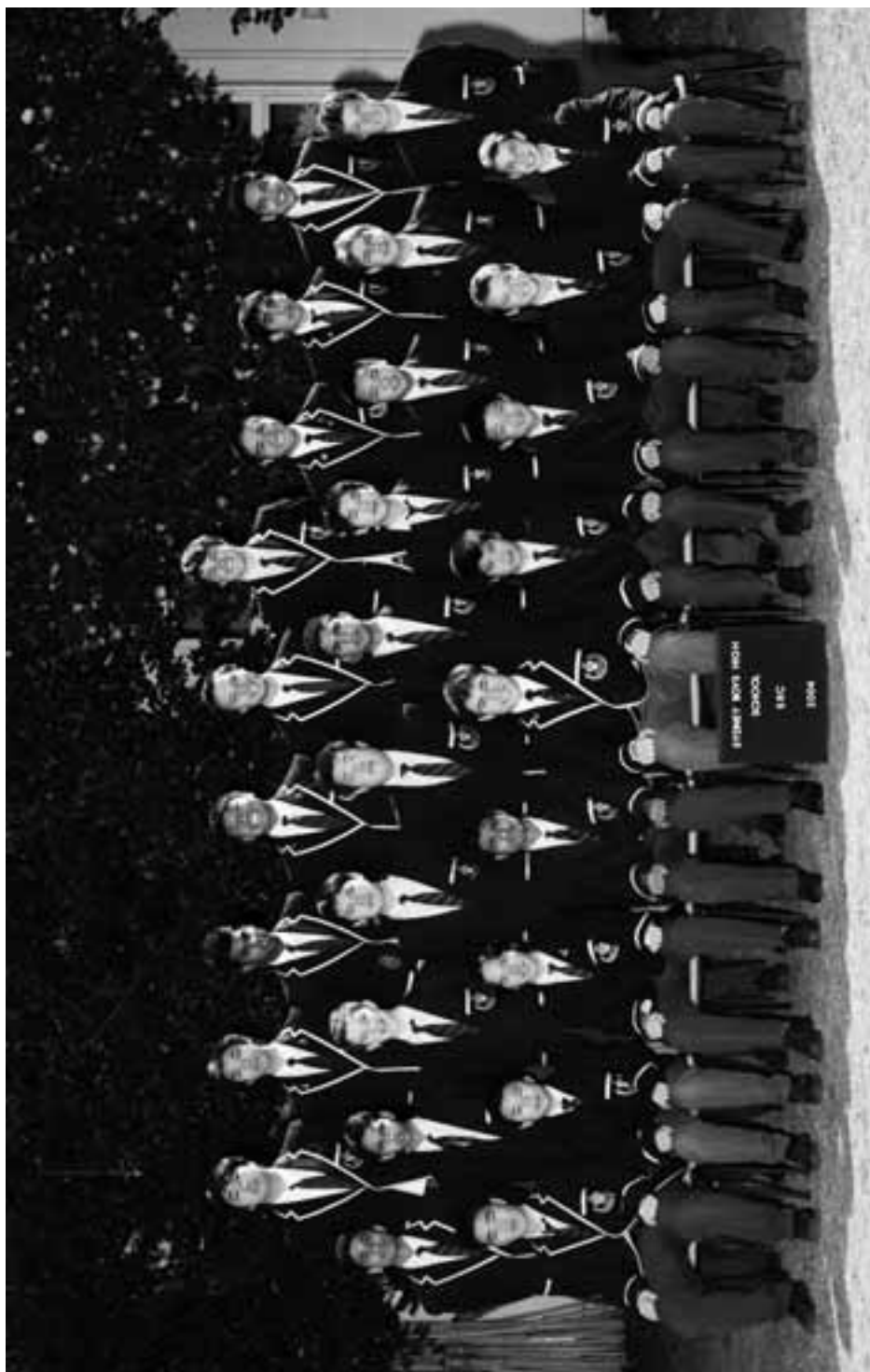

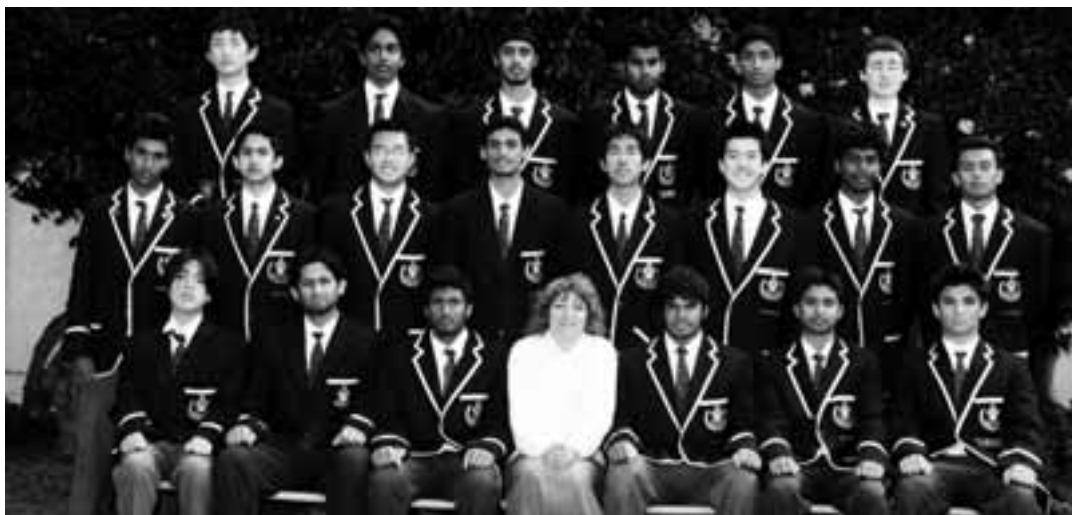

Foundation Day Assembly 2004

Distinguished guests, parents of our Prefects elect, staff and students. Good morning and welcome to the 121st Founders' Day Assembly. We are pleased to have with us as our special guest, Old Boy Bishop Brian King, a frequent visitor to our school over the years, who will deliver the occasional address. We are gathered today to commemorate October 1, 1883 when the first 46 students began their schooling at High. Our Prefects Elect are also here to become part of the official history of the school by accepting the call to a prestigious office. They have lived through a searching process of qualification and election to reach the point of induction here today. By investing School Prefects and honouring academic, sporting, spiritual and social values that unite us, this ceremony connects us to our traditions and founding principles in a very demonstrable way. Early next year the Prefects will be asked to sign the School Prefects Book, linking them to over 50 years of leadership history.

If you were time warped back 25 years to 1979, what would you recognise about the place? Certainly you would know the buildings, except for the Study Centre and UTS Gymnasium. There would be many familiar faces: Messrs Boros, Gainford and Kourtesis might be teaching you mathematics; Mr Hannon might be helping you with history or rugby; Messrs Bennett or Smith could well be teaching you science; Mr Moody in social science, Mr Farrington in PE, Mr Fittler in Industrial Arts or Ms McGuinness in the office, might interact with you in the course of the day. As you might imagine, there is a lot of corporate history hived like honey in those people. Stability of personnel is one feature of High that supports its traditions and values.

The place of selective schools in Sydney was on the agenda twenty five years ago as it is in 2004 with the expansion of the number of selective classes and the first year of the extended writing task. Back then, the issue was survival. The OBU and the Headmaster, Mr Outterside, made a deputation to the then Premier, Neville Wran, to secure a change of policy in respect of selective schools. The Record of 1979 published the text of a 1978 petition to the NSW Parliament, signed by 1500 people protesting the proposed elimination of selective schools. The petition said inter alia "We are further opposed to any action being taken to destroy the special nature of Sydney High School and its place in the

community. The School through its membership of the Great Public Schools during the past seventy years- and previously through its close association with the private schools in existence at its establishment in 1883 – has always formed a link between a great, highly developed State system of education and a number of great private secondary schools.

Your petitioners therefore humbly pray upon your Honourable House to recognise the special function of Sydney High School in the community and the need for the restoration of its former enrolment area, viz. the State of New South Wales (current between 1883 and 1928), which gave every child in this state the right to seek enrolment at Sydney High School. And further your petitioners pray that the criteria for enrolment be that of motivation to attend a special type of school which demands from its students a strong desire to participate in a rigorous scholastic, sporting and cultural programme involving the pursuit of excellence in studies, moral conduct, and behaviour in a "six-day" school week (as opposed to the normal "five-day" week of ordinary secondary schools), together with an assurance of parental participation well above the ordinary, in the various activities of the School needed to maintain its association with the Great Public Schools" (pp23-4).

As you all can appreciate from this example, our preoccupations have not altered much over the last quarter century, apart from the ironic push for re-zoning of selective schools espoused by some Old Boys. We still want boys who are attuned to our all-round excellence ethos; we still urge boys to commit themselves to Saturday team competition; we still need extraordinary parental participation to hold our own in the GPS scene; we still claim a special status in respect of the NSW Parliament; we are still fighting for selective education; and we still pursue academic rigour.

In summer sport, a snapshot of teams shows that in 2004 we have more senior cricket teams than in 1979 (5 to 4), and one less in 16s, two in 15s, one in 14s and 3 in 13s. In rowing there were two Vllls, a junior VIII, 4 IVs, and six quads. Our current rowing program exceeds these 1979 figures. In basketball there were two open teams and not always four teams per age group. In tennis there were three

open teams and age teams. Today we have more tennis, rowing and basketball, but significantly less cricket. In terms of results in 1979 the 1st VIII came eighth at the Head of the River and first grade basketball won one GPS game. As well as the stability of staff, we have enjoyed stability in our approach to sport over the course of our history, in lean years and joyous ones.

My point here is that despite a quarter of a century of demonstrated quality teaching and learning, and in the face of an often hard-nosed perception by some concerning the school's so-called decline, High has remained at least as good as it ever was – arguably better in many ways.

People who support High ought to want to see it stay true to itself as an institution – one that tried hard always to reach a high standard but at the

same time understood that sport is character building and must be played in the right spirit.

Turning to our emblems of High spirit and leadership, I trust that every Prefect inducted today perceives himself in terms of the quality of leadership at High and endeavours during his tenure of office to uphold and enhance the traditions of this fine school. Be proud to serve in an institution that has produced with such marvellous consistency, high achieving all-rounders in large numbers for 121 years. One could hardly ask more of an institution. I commend to the gathering today this most worthy group of young men who embody the ideals that this school has maintained since its first October day so long ago.

Open Day 2004

Why choose Sydney Boys High for my son's secondary education? The building blocks of school achievement are not bricks but brains, not facilities but opportunities, not resources but individual talents. I believe our school offers a unique educational experience. At High we have the best of both worlds – through our membership of the AAGPS we have access to wonderful private school facilities and organisation - as a public school we have entitlements to the programs and support provided by state education. We offer single sex education, yet share a site and various programs and social activities with the girls at SGHS. We have gifted boys. It is our responsibility to nurture and motivate them to transform their gifts into talents. We provide opportunities for boys to test their potential. We try to motivate individuals to perform to their personal bests in a wide variety of endeavours.

High offers a rigorous curriculum

All our students study Classics in Year 7. In Year 8, students are offered two languages. In Year 9, as well as the usual electives, we offer Wars and Empires in History. Latin and Classical Greek are taught along with Chinese, French, German and Hebrew. In Years 8 & 9, talented mathematics students are targeted for extension studies with university personnel guiding their development. All

our students do Advanced English in the senior school. 90% of our students study English and mathematics extension courses in Year 11.

No standard courses are offered. We have the highest candidature for 4 unit mathematics in the state.

High encourages individual challenge

Structured acceleration is a feature of our talent development policy. Individuals have opportunities to accelerate in various courses. Groups of students are currently accelerating in Information Processes and Technology, Languages and Modern History. Our students undertake Distinction courses. *Mind and Morality* a university developed, Board endorsed dual accredited course is being delivered by a university lecturer on our site as a joint program with Sydney Girls High. We automatically enter boys in a wide range of academic competitions as part of our talent development program. We allocate a high number of teaching periods even to very small classes, to allow for diversity. We sponsor individual or teams to enter competitions in: writing, public speaking, the environment, business, computing or visual arts.

High applies purposeful grouping practices to put able learners with special learning needs together

Information on our students is gathered from an analysis of test scores, from information supplied by applicants, from primary school principals and counsellors and from internal testing. In Year 7, some special classes are formed. We have a class of students who performed very well in the SSET. We have a special needs English class, where an ESL teacher is assigned to assist the classroom teacher. We have classes selected to encourage students with high General Ability Test scores or with high English scores. In other classes, students are grouped as a result of assessed musical talent or sporting ability. In Years 8 through 12, classes in mathematics are streamed. In other courses with multiple classes, an advanced learner class or two is formed where possible.

High is serious about student welfare

Based around the *Living Skills* program for years 7-10, student welfare is a major part of our curriculum. The Student Welfare Committee has over 20 members. It meets twice a term to plan strategies, review programs and discuss student issues. We have a Head Teacher - Welfare who is responsible for a suite of programs designed to enhance student self-esteem and promote a sense of belonging to the school. Each incoming Year 7 boy is tested for literacy competence and surveyed for learning style orientation. Peer Support and Peer Mediation training is offered to a large number of boys. We provide all boys with diaries which contain our major operating policies and procedures as well as a comprehensive calendar of school events. We have applied technology to student attendance and progress monitoring. We have targeted weeks when welfare matters are reviewed. Every student is interviewed by the Principal twice each year to discuss his progress. At the end of each reporting period, 'students of concern' are targeted, interviewed and referred to the School Counsellor, the Careers Adviser or to their Year Adviser. Year Advisers mentor individual students in their learning. Students with special needs are supported. Our School Counsellors are actively engaged in our student welfare programming and offer referrals to specialist people and agencies.

High trains a large number of musicians in various ensembles

Our music program is highly regarded for its quality. Each year it attracts one third of the school to be involved in performance ensembles. We are

supported by a co-ordinator, several experienced tutors and a strong fundraising program through the Music Committee. We have an annual Music camp that is very well patronised. The Performing Arts Unit targets several of our boys each year for its orchestras. We have a marching band. Our boys have significant performance opportunities each year. Many of our students are also trained by the DET Performing Arts Unit and are offered opportunities to perform at major events.

High has established an enviable debating program

We have won the Hume Barbour trophy, the state school symbol of debating supremacy, twenty times, significantly more than any other school. We have a highly structured program of GPS debates and also enter all state school contests for years 7-12. Our teams regularly represent the school in state finals or semi finals. Boys debate on Friday nights for GPS and during the week for state competitions. Each year has its own debating coach. Multiple teams are trained. Social debates with Sydney Girls are organised. High enters the Les Gordon history debating competition each year. The Debating Committee raises funds to support the debating program.

High recognises and rewards its students for their achievements

We are justly proud of our Student Awards scheme. We feel it represents best practice in recognising and rewarding students for achievement. Up to 50 boys in each year fulfil the demanding requirements of successful participation in six of the ten categories outlined in our booklet. Students are honoured at Year assemblies, Wednesday assemblies and at sports dinners, special assemblies and ultimately at Speech Night. They receive handsome medallions for the first four stages of achievement followed by a School Plaque and School Trophy for the senior years. There is a 'high talent' section of our weekly newsletter that is devoted to praising students for their achievements. Honour Boards around the school, bear the names of prize winners in many areas of endeavour. Photographs of successful students adorn our foyer. Our archives room preserves our history. Recognition of student achievement builds tradition.

High has an exceptional sports program

High boys were responsible for organising the first athletics competition for school boys in NSW held in August 1886 at the SCG. Self help is our tradition in sports organisation. We are justly proud of our association since 1906 with eight independent schools, comprising the Great Public Schools. The AAGPS committee conducts a peerless schoolboy competition in eight major sports. High competes in them all and offers opportunities in state schools knockout competitions and Combined High Schools carnivals as well we have the Five Highs cricket tournament, played each year in a different capital city. We have sports tours to The Armidale School, Melbourne High and to CHS rowing. We send teams to the national volleyball tournament in Melbourne each year. With seventeen organised sports and some social games, High has boundless sporting opportunities.

High involves its parents in school governance and program implementation

High parents have specified positions in the governance of this school. In the School Council, the Sydney High Foundation, the Parents and Citizens Association, parent representative positions are established. In the Student Welfare, Canteen, Outterside Centre Management, McKay Management and Library Committees, parents are important members of decision-making groups. In addition, parents chair and make up the bulk of a number of standing committees for the administration of: debating, music, rowing, rugby, rifle shooting, tennis, sailing, cricket and basketball. You can have a say in how resources are raised and spent and in how school activities are managed.

High communicates well with its community

Apart from our weekly *High Notes*, our web site is accessed regularly by parents and students, particularly to find maps of venues, to confirm events and dates, to use our hot links to various agencies or to find out more about our policies or programs. Our internal website has daily updates of our calendar and variations to school routine. Regular meetings, social events and correspondence through *High Notes* keep our community informed about what is going on.

High promotes itself as the leadership school

High Old Boys are well represented among leaders in sport, law, the professions, business, the arts, universities, religion, politics and civil service. The Prefect System works very well at High under the experienced guidance of our Prefects Master. Up to 40 Prefects may be appointed. There are stringent qualifications for candidates. Above average academic achievement, good attendance and behaviour records and demonstrated participation in the Student Awards Scheme, set the standard for our student leaders. The Prefects have a range of liaison and representational duties and serve in the School Canteen. The student Representative Council has four elected representatives for each year. It functions as a sounding board for student opinion. It undertakes research and makes representations to the Principal for improvements to facilities for students. It alerts the Principal to occupational health and safety issues that arise from time to time. The SRC offers leadership opportunities outside the school at District and state level.

High has a social conscience

The school has an active Charities Committee. Each year adopts a charity and raises funds for its benefit. Mufti Days and Talent Quests are organised to raise funds for charities. Representatives of charities are invited to speak at student-run cohort assemblies, to inform students of the work of volunteer organisations. Year 12 has established a tradition of substituting charity collections for muck up day. Their initiative has raised substantial sums of money for worthwhile causes.

High has an extensive co-curricular program

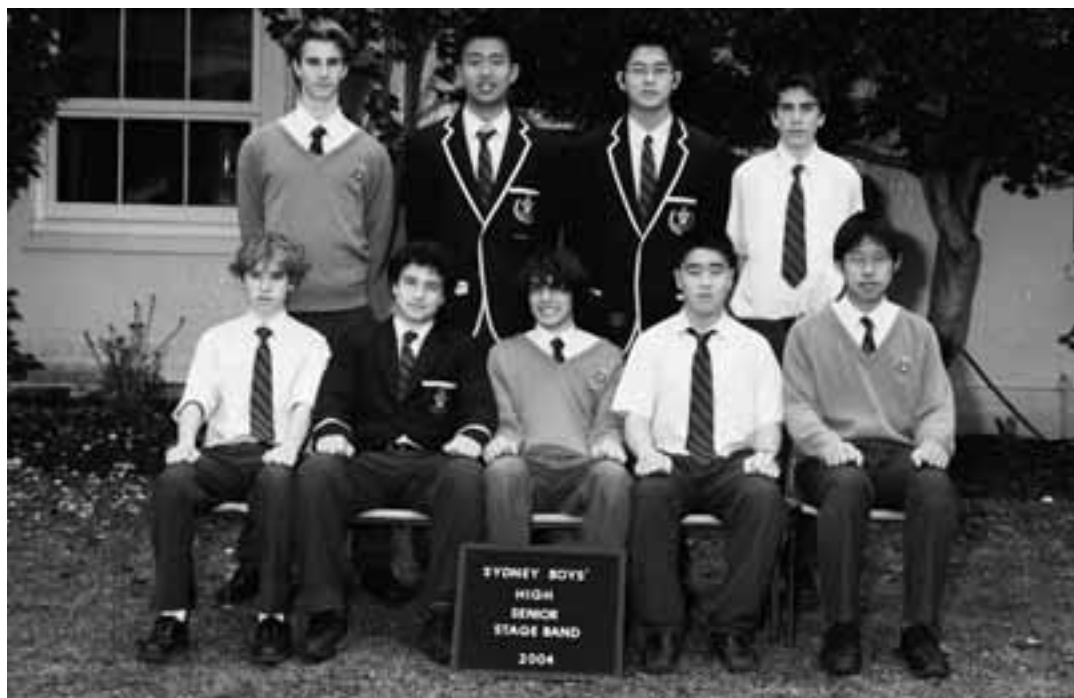

Nevertheless, the GPS season set the stage for a highly competitive first grade in 2005 – all three boys would aim to join Gab at the peak of High Debating.

The CHS season was highly successful. Tom, Gab. Will and Dawei combined to create a solid four-person team for the CHS style of debating – consisting of three speakers and a team advisor. All

four of us rotated through both speaking and advising positions during the competition - known as the Karl Kramp. We defeated Gosford High in the State Final held in the Coles Theatre at the Powerhouse Museum. All of the boys performed at their highest right throughout the competition. Many thanks to Ms Berger who drove us to all of our away fixtures.

Overall the season was very successful. We easily won the majority of our debates across both competitions. Gab stepped up well for Firsts, and Tom was selected for the CHS representative side along with Tanvir Ahmed and Daniel Wodak from First Grade. Today we acknowledge and honour the teams in all summer sports. Historically, the GPS teams take pride of place as our first priority in meeting our obligations to the AAGPS. GPS summer sports are: rowing, cricket, tennis, basketball, water polo and swimming. Sailing is now an established summer sport with competition against GPS and CAS schools. Rowing has its own assembly before the Head of the River. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Laurie Heil, for the initiatives he has taken this year and in Term 4 last year, to build our skill base in cricket. I ask all coaches to support Laurie as he carries out his role as both Cricket Co-ordinator and MIC cricket. He will work closely with coaches in selection committees to identify and nurture all our talented cricketers. Thank you to Mr Ben Hayman for taking on the Basketball Coordinator's role as well as coaching first grade. His Coaching Manual and 'train the trainer' courses will make a difference.

What we are seeking through our Sports Coordinators is to inculcate a style in our teams – the High way to play. As a student progresses through the years in his teams, the coaching message should be standardised so that learned behaviours do not have to be unlearned and new ones substituted. Skills, drills and plays can be rehearsed each year and be familiar to everyone.

Well done again to Mrs Helen Tuthill and our tennis committee for preparing the tennis team over summer and raising funds to assist our premiership team. Let us hope we can repeat that performance in 2004. Thank you to Ms Amanda Kaye for taking up the position of MIC sailing. Our program will strengthen with her enthusiasm and persistence. Congratulations to Mr Ockert for taking on the role as MIC swimming. The school carnival went well and there is a better vibe all round about our swim team after its great result in the GPS relay.

At previous Summer Sports Assemblies I have discussed the psychosocial value of having competitive sport as a lifelong goal; the purposes of competitive sport; the personal development and educational values such engagement instils in

people; and a brief look at the psychology of team sports. Today, I would like to emphasise the value of training yourself to have a sports mind and a sports heart.

The body, the mind and the emotions are interconnected. Imagined experience affects the body in a physiologically measurable way.

(Boys waiting to sit for examinations know this phenomenon well). To make your body perform you need physical and mental training. Top performers have: tough mindedness, intense concentration, self-confidence, intrinsic motivation, positive attitude and a capacity for anxiety management. Athletes have to train themselves relentlessly to acquire these traits. Adversity must be dealt with quickly. Come to terms with it and move on. High performers have highly tuned sports minds. Unless you take charge of your brain, you run the big risk that it will run itself and detract from your performance.

Top performers conquer emotional and mental distractions and obstacles that impede the performances of others. They have strategies to combat poor concentration, ill temper, self-doubt, lack of motivation, nervousness, self-recrimination or lack of enthusiasm. They have highly trained sports hearts. Unless you take control of your heart, it might control you.

When mind and heart are in tune, very satisfying and expert performances are achievable by non-elite sportspeople. In sailing we call it "in the groove". This describes an intense state of concentration in which a sense of oneness with the yacht, the wind's oscillating angle and velocity, the motion of the waves and swell, the course, the trim of the sails and the speed made good, consumes the helmsman. Sustained periods of maximum boat speed result. Runners reach a trance-like state where time and physical pain have no effect on them as they concentrate on the mechanics of maintaining their form.

Sports success is as much about attitude as aptitude. Sportspeople get nervous. "I've got butterflies in my stomach" is a common expression describing the physical manifestation of this nervousness. Accept that the butterflies will always be there. Train them to fly in the same direction.

They will distract you less.

Athletes use imaging, deep breathing, meditation techniques, visualisations and stress management techniques to make all the butterflies fly in formation. Set yourself performance goals for this weekend. Visualise sinking that three-pointer on the baseline. See yourself playing the bowling for 5 overs in the V between mid-on and mid-off. Imagine yourself returning second serves accurately into particular areas of the court. Project into your swim. Decide when you will go flat out for the finish and be spent as you hit the wall.

Be steadfastly optimistic and positive. Do not contemplate defeat. Be mentally tough until the job is done, the time is up, stumps are pulled, the

finishing line crossed or the last point is won. Win with grace. Accept defeat with dignity. Above all, enjoy what you do.

I wish all our teams well for the summer season. The GPS teams are being honoured. They are the symbols of a journey that the rest of you share too. All of you boys who compete on Friday nights or Saturdays deserve our praise. Without you, the school cannot produce high standard GPS teams. Keep it up! One day many of you will stand where these who come before you will stand today. Train your minds and hearts to be ready.

Rowing Assembly – 26 March 2004

Distinguished guests, special guest Mr John Croll, staff, parents and students. On the occasion of our annual special assembly to honour the efforts of our rowing crews and to thank all the people who have supported them in their preparations. The rowing program is the biggest sporting undertaking we attempt. It is fitting that such a large team of people are honoured by a special occasion. This assembly is also a traditional prelude to the Head of the River to be held tomorrow at the Sydney International Regatta Centre. I urge more of you to make the trip to Penrith and enjoy the spectacle of one of the greatest events in the world of school sports.

Why do we have a celebration before an event, rather than after it? The reason is that the purpose of team sport at school is educative and not totally connected to winning. Nevertheless, to be competitive and to do your best is important for self esteem. I ask the rowers being honoured here today to steel themselves for pain. To work through the experience of burning muscles and lift personal performance for this big occasion. Jon Sieben, one of our famous Olympic gold medallists, lifted his personal best performance by 3.4% on one swim to beat the world champion, Grosse. I frequently talk about the margin of excellence as being what happens in the last 5% of performance. Imagine if your crew believed it could sustain 3% more effort during its race at the Head of the River. Then let us imagine you were disciplined enough to go ahead and do it. On a 7-minute row for 2000 metres, the

race time would be reduced by up to 13 seconds, potentially enough to make the difference of several places. On big occasions special people can lift themselves to surprising levels of performance. This was demonstrated by Shore's 1st VIII stroke last year at the Head of the River. A rower of small stature, he lifted his crew in the last 100 metres to seal their victory – and collapsed at the pontoon before the presentation. Be prepared to give your all boys. My benchmark is to judge how the school performed overall compared to its own recent performances at the Head of the River. Incremental goals in the zone of proximal development have the potential to inspire increased performance. Best of luck to all crews in the racing.

The administration of a rowing program is a complex and time consuming task. I would like to thank Con Barris for his prosecution of the 'train the trainer' model at High as MIC. We are moving in the direction of a mixed mode of delivery of rowing training, with a professional approach to coaching allied to teacher management of the crews. This model will have an impact in the medium term. I would like to thank on behalf of the school, Michael Doyle, our Rowing Coordinator, employed by me on the MIC's recommendation, to have oversight of coaching operations. His first year has been devoted to assisting senior crews. Our plan is to deepen his influence in the shed over the next couple of years. The 1st VIII was coached by Mark Prater and the 2nd VIII by David Luscombe. I congratulate these men on

the working relationship they developed which assisted the cohesion evident in the senior crews this season. Ken Ambler had carriage of the IVs program. Ross Bowey and Oliver Wilson guided the 1st IV, Ben Privett the 2nd IV, Kelvin Leung the 3rd IV and Simon and Peter Wilson, the 4th IV. Mr Barris coached the 1st Year 10 VIII, with the help of Bronwyn Opferkuch on the 2nd Year 10 VIII and Rowan Burrell prepared the 3rd VIII. Mr Gainford took his customary role of Year 9 quads master, this season assisted enthusiastically by Tim Glass Nick Goozeff and Everett Coan. Doug Hespe was guardian to the Year 8 quads, assisted by Gary McIvor and Mark Livingston as coaches. Thank you all for your commitment to our boys. For 2004-5 we will be seeking to expand the number of our junior coaches so as to include Year 7 rowers in our term 1 program and to achieve more hands on guidance of the Year 8 quads.

Mr David Daish and Mr Chris Watson have habitually made great contributions to High rowing, keeping the shed, the shells and the machinery running and transporting equipment to regattas and interstate on school visits or to the Nationals. Thank you both for your wonderful support. Thank you to Mr. Sean Creer for his management of boating and commitment to the shed. Our Rowing Committee, led for the last time by Mr Jeremy Glass, has been particularly active over the last year. As usual its members raised funds, organised events, provided parental support for camps and working bees for the shed and devoted large amounts of time to our

students. Our thanks go to Steve Mitchell, Selim Stamati, Nerida Newbigin, John Gerofti, John and Marilyn Mittelheuser, Anna Cunningham, Vikki Angell, Sue Doran, Sue Udall, Steve Tiedgen, Marie Girdler, Paul Girdler, Mary Cameron, Saul Kammerman, Srian Abeysuriya and Francis Kim. 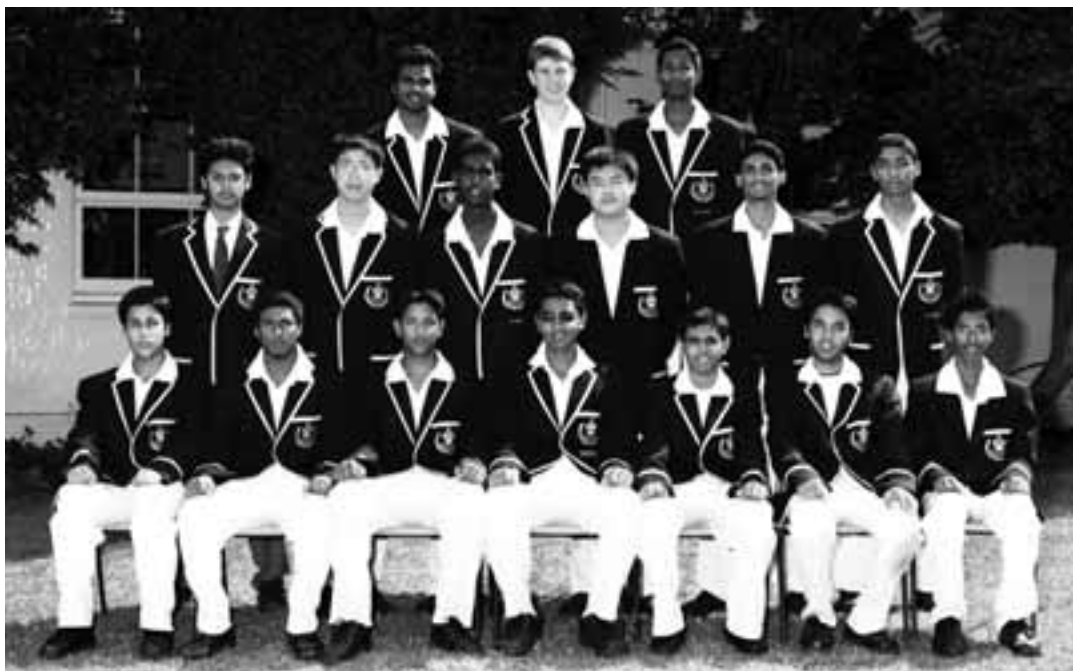

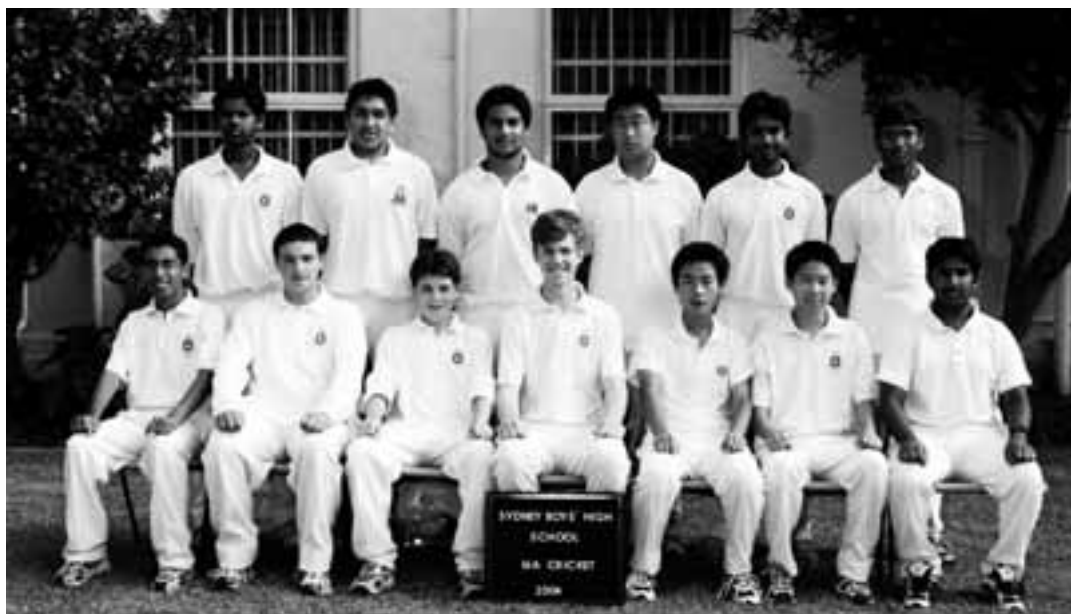

Basketball 2004 Report

This season has been successful.

The biggest sign of success for me is the enjoyment that the boys are gaining from basketball at SBHS. Part of this enjoyment is the improved competitiveness that we have achieved this year. I started working on this program at the beginning of last season. Prior to that there was no record of results.

- Last season we had 97 losses by over 15 pts. This season 82.
- We had 4% more wins as a school than last season.
- The 13's last season won 3.5% of their games. This season the 14's (the same team) won 42%.
- The 14's last season won 11% of their games. This season the 15's won 22%.

- The 15's last season won 34%. This season the 16's were the most successful age group winning 47%.

Winter Sports Assembly 2004

Welcome to the 2004 winter sports assembly. We are here in the presence of parents, staff, coaches and students to honour those boys who have been selected to play in GPS teams for winter competition. On behalf of the school I extend a special welcome to our guest speaker this morning, Todd Olivier. He is an Old Boy with a great commitment to the school. This morning I would like to take the opportunity to talk briefly about evolution of games governed by the Athletic Association of the Great Public Schools.

The GPS competition has adapted slowly to historical changes in Australian sport. Rugby and cricket competitions commenced for senior school boys in 1892, joined the next year by rowing. This year the target rifle shooting competition will be 100 years old. Comparative newcomers are tennis (1972) and basketball (1975). More recently, cross-country and soccer were added (1988). Unofficial contests in water polo and volleyball are now conducted under the guidance and management of the AAGPS. These sports will always be unofficial while schools from CAS or ISA play in them, due to the fact that the AAGPS is unable to exercise control over members of those associations in respect of rules for the administration of the sports and codes of conduct for players and spectators. Nevertheless, we support the importance of school representation equally, no matter what your chosen sport may be. Although a very conservative institution, the AAGPS is capable of measured adaptation. Some of our traditions at High also need to adapt to changed circumstances.

This year an historic experiment is to be attempted for winter sports competition. McKay No.1 will host first grade competition for both rugby and soccer. This gesture is more than symbolic. It is a genuine attempt to demonstrate parity of esteem among major sports in the school. We have three times as many soccer players as rugby players – an imbalance that I hope our recent GPS Heads arrangements for High teams will redress over the next five seasons. We hope that rugby players will support our soccer teams and vice versa. We are all trying our best to succeed in a very tough competition and we need to support each other. I urge all supporters of sports to embrace this fixtures experiment and to cooperate to make it work successfully.

Our teams face three formidable forces beginning with S – size, strength and speed. These forces are the building blocks of successful sports performances. At High we have our own advantages – high combined intelligence, high spirit and high self-discipline. If we build upon these advantages in our approach to competitive sport, we will lessen or negate the physical superiorities of our opponents. Team ball sports are about possession. The team that infringes least maximises its share of possession. Unforced errors are often due to nervousness or over excited reactions to big occasions. The team that has the self-discipline to reduce unforced errors maximises its share of possession. Patterns of play in attack or defence rely upon individuals playing their parts. Teams made up of individuals who have the commitment, self-control and perseverance to resolutely play their roles in attack or defence, utilise possession or minimise the effects of its absence. Your individual job is to get fit and stay fit, no matter what sport you play. You can improve your strength by signing up for a 10-week professionally designed and supervised weights program at our gym. As a reward for sticking it out, we refund half of the cost. You cannot improve your speed very much but you can increase your stamina so that you can run for an hour non stop.

I have composed a contrived little acrostic (High School) to sum up my expectations of all sportsmen in our school: H- heed the coach's instructions, I – inspire others by your example, G – give 100% of your concentration for the whole game, H – help your team mates. S – start with a positive outlook, C – convince yourself that together you can do it, H – have one or two personal goals for the game, O – offer encouragement to others, O – opt for the highest percentage play, L – last the distance.

High school can win premierships. Last winter season we won rifle shooting and volleyball. Technique and team work are vital in those sports. We had advantages in both. Combined with a fierce determination to win, these advantages were decisive. I exhort you all to try to build self-belief. It has to be founded on a base of high physical fitness and a willingness to leave your ego on the sideline and devote yourself to the common cause – a higher standard of team performance.

My warm congratulations are extended to all boys who made GPS teams. I know that for some boys the training has lasted for months. The trial games gave us a chance to fit our personnel to positions and to try out our combinations and plays. We face a stern test this year first up against King's. We will have something to prove against King's for quite a while,

given our recent history. Let's go out and show them what High can do. Try to abide by Horace's aphorism: When things are steep, remember to stay level-headed. I have been proud of the efforts I have seen so far. Good luck to all teams for the winter season!

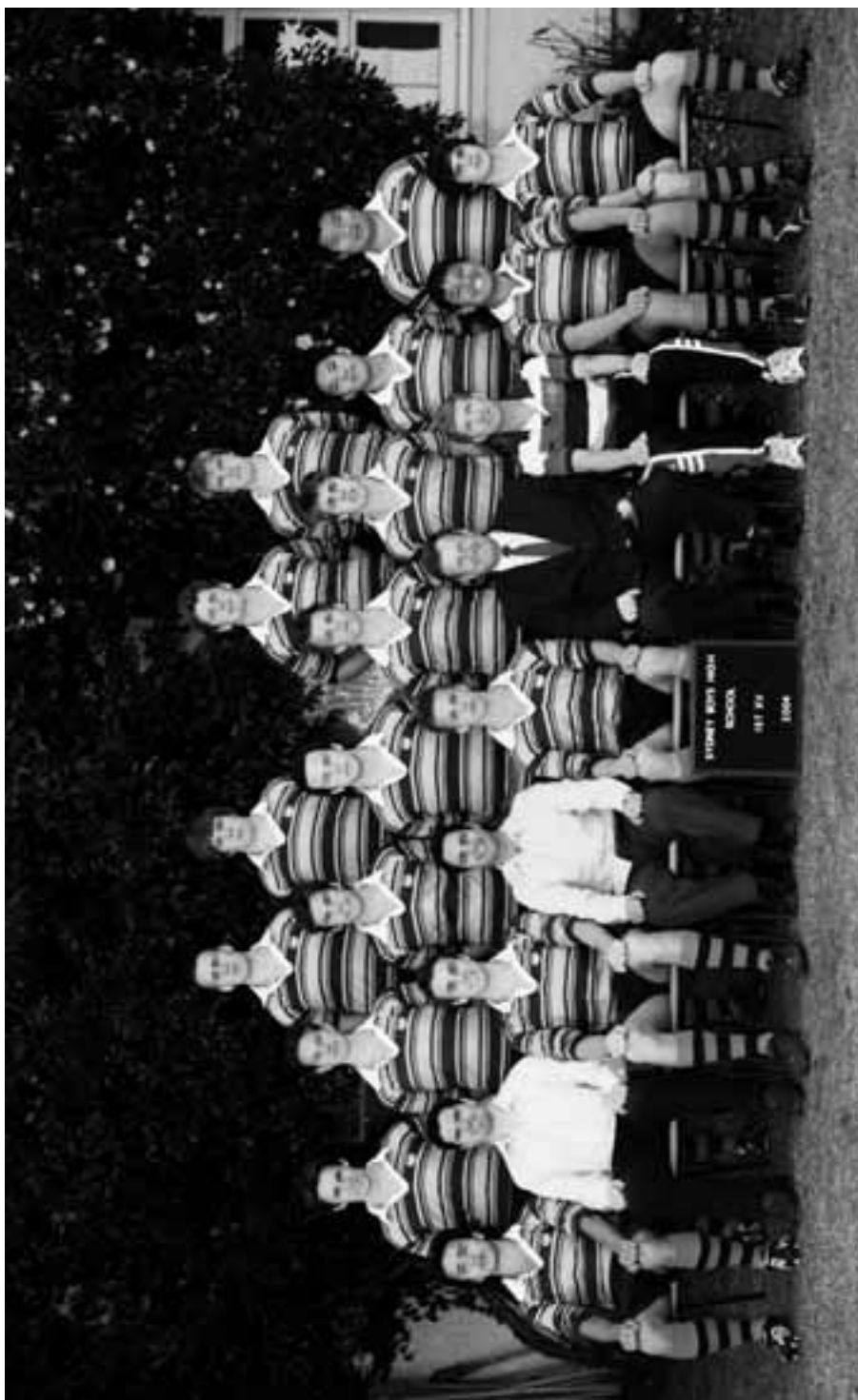

Master-in-Charge Report

Having said goodbye to a number of key players last year it was always going to be a year of rebuilding and a year of development. The First Grade side contained just four regulars from the runners up of the previous three seasons, and Second Grade, just three. Their results possibly did not reflect the style of play both sides played and there were important lessons the young players learnt through the season. Some of the players being as young as 15 will have another three years to make this experience count. There is definitely a change in the attitude to the sport, where at this level, the possession of a mental toughness developed through a number of seasons is of great benefit.

Again we fielded a record number of teams starting the season with five in the 13s, 14s, and 15s. There were four teams in the 16s and 7 Opens, involving some 380-400 boys, overseen by six staff members and sixteen coaches including old boys, current students and a parent, who went on to produce the school's most successful side, the 14Cs.

Key structures were put in place to add a basis for the ongoing development of our players throughout the Junior School including the appointment of a Director of Coaching, Mr Nick Apofis. Coaches this year were trained in coaching techniques and assigned sides to develop these skills with the view of making the whole coaching programme uniform throughout the school and to build upon the foundations year after year.

We maintained the use of Clinics running in the holidays and all of our Junior teams trained at least twice a week with their coaches. The Clinics were organised using the best coaches available from the State league and the NSL who were given the brief to concentrate on our players ball skills and fitness. The Clinic was a great success and it is very satisfying after four days of intensive coaching to see the change in ability of the players.

2004 also proved to be a season of firsts around the GPS competition. The season was moved forwards to include GPS rounds in Term 2 to accommodate a switch in the Athletics season to Term 3. Sydney Grammar won the Premiership being crowned Champions, the first time St. Ignatius have been beaten in five years, having been Premiers since 1999. St. Ignatius were beaten by High on their home field at Lane Cove, which is the first time they have ever been beaten on that field in the GPS; also

the first game they had lost in the competition since 2002. Scots played High in First Grade on the Scots main Oval for the first time and the 9 o'clock kick off is possibly a GPS first.

For High, it was a season which was all about restructuring, coaching development and building for the future by putting in place practices aimed at upholding the fine tradition and competitiveness of the sport at High.

Second Grade Coach's Report

The philosophical change in the role of Second Grade as the training ground for our future players meant that a very young side was assembled which only included four Year 12 students with past experience and five Year 10s. A Year 9 student was also to gain valuable experience before the season was over.

In Term 1 the Seconds started their preparation with a game against Trinity Grammar and despite losing, there were some very positive signs that the style of football they were to play would at least be very entertaining. They followed this with a fixture against Waverley College at the home of the NSW Soccer Federation, on the last day of Term 1, where they played a full eighty minutes against two Waverley sides made up from both First and Second Grade. Although they lost 2-1 they managed to hold a fresh Waverley scoreless in the entire Second half and the game was memorable for Mihnea Popescu's thirty yard drive into the top corner giving High the lead in the first half.

The trial games began with a close defeat against a physically stronger Cranbrook side and that was followed with victories over SCEGGS Redlands and the morale boosting victory over St Andrews first Grade thanks to a sublime Jongha Lee finish in the first half.

In first game against Kings at home the inexperience and nerves were evident, as what was going to prove the nemesis of the season – the lack of good luck. High struck the bar twice and thanks to an equaliser by Gantheepan came away with a well fought draw. At times the football was very good and, had the ball behaved and gone in when it should, then High would have started with a very satisfying victory. The players were very nervous
