
Many thanks to those who have contributed. Special recognition to Mark Gainford: his help, experience and commitment has made the task much easier for me. Jenny May has been a

Year Twelve Farewell Assembly

Good afternoon and welcome to parents, staff, students and the special cohort of Year 12 young men we are honouring today as the class of 2008. The Year 12 Farewell Assembly is one of those anticipated 'rites of passage' signifying an end of formal schooling and a beginning of a more self-directed phase of intellectual, academic and social growth in the tertiary sector. I trust that in the future Old Boys and staff will remember the class of 2008 for their academic achievements, for their extensive participation in school life and for how they brought credit to the school through community service. I believe in the years to come I will remember the class of 2008 as being the foundation year in the building of a stronger High culture in sports, leadership and assemblies, just as I remember the class of 2001 for radically altering the culture of the final week of school at High and beginning a community service culture which has grown stronger ever since. I believe David Vien has been an outstanding School Captain and he, along with Josh Hui and Matthew Coutts, will leave a lasting legacy in our student initiated event and community service management arrangements. The bar has been raised for future years.

High has a tradition of producing scholar-sportsmen. I want to congratulate the ninety-six boys who competed in two seasons of GPS sports at whatever level. You exemplify the High spirit of the all rounder who shows he values a life balance between academic goals, varied co-curricular experiences, sport and team skills. I urge you to keep participating in your sports through university and into your adult life. In your special edition 125th anniversary program, I have acknowledged the outstanding performances of those who have made the extra time sacrifices, summoned the self-discipline and focussed on their personal standards of performance, to train, travel and play at the GPS level in first and second grade competition. I will not read out all the names here but I must pay tribute to our triple first representatives – Ronan Casey, Michael Denny-Smith, Daniel O'Keefe, Warren Trac and Dinghua Xiao. Mitch Kelly represented in tennis, rowing and cross country running in 2007-08 as a successful pathways student. These boys



performed great deeds in the name of the school. They were backed up by eleven 'Double Firsts' and four in the 'One-Two' Club. I believe this year the first grade basketball team and the cross country team joined the first grade volleyball side as real forces in CHS at state level. The debaters were co-premiers in GPS competition. The senior chess side is at state semi final stage and in contention. Our seniors are contributing strongly to our performance music program. They raised a lot of money for community causes during 2007-08. Thank you for your collective efforts.

My message this afternoon to the graduating class of 2008 is about hope, persistence and character. One towering figure of twentieth century world history, Nelson Mandela, achieved a great deal late in his life. He had endured nearly

three decades of harsh and heartless imprisonment on the notorious Robben Island before he was released. During his confinement he never gave up hope. His infectious optimism helped sustain the men in Section B with him. In his memoir *Long Walk to Freedom*, he wrote: "I always knew that someday I would once again feel the grass under my feet and walk in the sunshine a free man." How did he sustain his dream? How did he bear his punishment? How did he retain his dignity? In a letter to his wife, Winnie, he wrote: "In judging our progress as individuals, we tend to concentrate on external factors such as one's social position, influence and popularity, wealth and standard of education...but internal factors may be more crucial in assessing one's development as a human being: honesty, sincerity, simplicity, humility, purity, generosity, absence of vanity, readiness to serve your fellow men – qualities within the reach of every soul..." The agglomeration of these internal factors continues to define Mandela. His strength of character nurtured his vision, gave him his fortitude and preserved his calm demeanour in the face of his gaolers. During his term as the first President of a free South Africa and now as a revered elder statesman, he is an inspirational model for aspiring leaders.

As you embark on your intense couple of months of study and examinations, remember that in the end what matters is what kind of person you become, what style of man you will be and what manner of citizen you will make. Perhaps in our little school bureaucracy and in the wider world we emphasise the 'external factors' Mandela describes too much. Our defence is that we are a microcosm of society and behave and measure each other according to socially determined benchmarks of success. However, in various ways we do try to acknowledge and value those intrinsic qualities that define a good person. Education is fundamentally about learning how to think and demonstrating how to feel. I hope that your experience at High has helped you grow as people and that whatever your academic, financial, social or political positions in the future you will always appreciate those qualities "within the reach of every soul". I wish you all success, but more enduringly, contentment, because, as one who saw too little of either, the tragic former prisoner Oscar Wilde, acutely observed, "nothing ages like happiness". It has been an honour and a pleasure to have served you as your Principal.

Franklin D. Roosevelt, the iconic US President, gave plenty of advice in his public life. Thank you for what you have done for each other, for yourselves and for the continuing reputation of High as a leading school in all round education. I wish you all the best of health, happiness and success.

Speech Night Address

Special guest Antony Whitlam QC (SHS1956-1960), Relieving School Education Director, Doreen Wilson, distinguished Old Boys and guests, colleagues, prize winners and their families – good evening and welcome to our 124th Speech Night.

Two thousand and seven was a very eventful year. There were many great achievements and a few disappointments – one, regrettably, was the inconsistency of our HSC results at the top end. Nevertheless, the quality, variety and depth of our non-intellective outcomes throughout the year were outstanding. Our delivery of the total curriculum was pleasing. Our choice-based approach to languages for Year 7 and our second round of elective choices at the end of Year 9 altered the focus of the Junior School non-core delivery. Our roll out of digital projectors, sound systems and security cupboards proceeded strongly with an additional twelve rooms being equipped. Our electronic attendance swipe card system was gradually phased in during the year so that for 2008 all boys will swipe on their attendance each day. Our Student Monitoring and Support Plan was implemented with many more interactions between staff and students. The new Mathematics Enrichment Club established as a joint initiative with SGHS and UNSW, proved a rewarding extension exercise for gifted mathematicians.

I was proud of our school publishing efforts in 2007 with a very comprehensive edition of *The Record*, supported by two editions of *High Flyer*, on top of the weekly editions of *High Notes*. I want to thank Paul Bigelow, Mark Gainford, Jenny May and the SASS staff for all their hard work in producing these high quality publications. Thanks to the P&C two new upright pianos were purchased for the Music rooms and a suite of computers and keyboards installed to run Sibelius composition software. The leadlight windows at the top of each staircase in the Main Building were purchased and installed as the Year 12 2006 gift to the school. They nicely complement the landing display window which was constructed as a Year 12 DT project.

I want to thank the members of the Sydney High Development Committee and the Parent Year Groups for their fundraising efforts and

organisation of social activities. Our parents are our strength in co-curricular affairs. They provide money or time or both. There were many parents of the Class of 2007 who served tirelessly. I thank them sincerely. In particular, I feel Liz and Graeme Hurrell and Gabrielle Klocker were outstanding in their commitment to school life. Thank you.

The most significant change to our operations in 2007 was the implementation of the 'School Within A School' strategy. The Junior School, Years 7-9, has a separate structure for sport, assemblies and pedagogy. They are identified by a different uniform. The educational focus is on the discourse of personal development. The implementation phase suffered from the usual difficulties of uncertainty and variability, but progress was made. Reconceptualising Year 9 students as the seniors of the Junior School will take some time to convert into behaviour changes and measurable outcomes but the future directions are set.

My long held desire to have an 'ethos enhancement class' selected using our tested template scoring system and interview process was finally made possible in June, and the additional twenty boys started this year in Year 9. This evening I want to thank Dr Phil Lambert (Director – Sydney Region) for his courage and vision in approving the establishment of this class. It will mean a lot to High in the years ahead, particularly in meeting our commitments to mass participation in GPS sports. In summer 2008 alone, 932 students are involved in competitive sport, with over 900 engaged on Saturdays. In order to accommodate the additional classes in core subjects a new demountable was purchased and two new teaching spaces created in McDonald Wing.

The Senior School concept was aimed at developing the discourse of academic achievement in the boys in Years 10-12. HSC preparation was the focus. Students re-selected electives at the end of Year 9, were given extra elective time in fewer subjects, dressed in white shirts and 47 of them engaged in Preliminary Courses through the acceleration program while in Year 10. Some headway was made in their development as autonomous, independent learners

but a negative side effect appeared in their dismissal of the importance of the School Certificate Tests. Teachers and students will adapt better to these structural changes in the years ahead as the intake of Year 11 students is phased out by 2010, allowing a three year development program aimed at academic achievement, instead of two.

The biggest occasion of the year was the memorable dedication by the Governor-General of the Sir Roden Cutler Memorial Gates on 24 May. This project took five years of persistence to complete and everyone's efforts were most suitably honoured on the occasion. The Governor-General and Lady Jeffery extended their visit and spoke individually with many of the guests present.

The Higher School Certificate

For the first time since the new HSC began we had negative band 6 growth at 512 or 8 fewer than 2006. Despite this top end weakness the average UAI for 208 students was 92.27, above our long term average but below the 92.46 of last year. Still, 150 students scored a UAI over 90, just one fewer than 2006. On the all rounders list we had a reduced representation of 24, despite 29 students earning UAIs of 99 or higher. Outstanding individual HSC performances included: Anthony Morris – first in Mathematics Extension 1, with Trong Nguyen Third; in Mathematics Extension 2, Trong was second and Anthony fourth; Blaise Prentice-Davidson came first in Distinction-Philosophy with Louis Yang third; John Luu was third in Chemistry, Jeffrey Xie third in Chinese Continuers and fourth in Chinese extension, James Mackay fifth in Music 2 Extension and Aditya Keswani eighth in engineering studies.

Academic Competitions

Anthony Morris earned a bronze medallion in the Mathematics Olympiad in Vietnam, made a perfect score for state and national level first place in the Australian Geography Competition and scored a prize in the Australian Mathematics Competition for the sixth year! John Wormell was first in Australia in the Australian Geography Competition – junior division, helping High to the rank of first school in Australia in the competition. Yujin Wu achieved the highest score in NSW for his year level in the ICAS Science competition. Albert Ng was selected as a scholar in the Australian Science Olympiad – Chemistry. Justin

Zuo attended the Australian Science Olympiad training program in January.

Chess

The senior chess team retained the GPS chess trophy. The Junior Chess Team retained the Junior Chess League State Championship shield.

Debating

Dominic Bowes, Lucian Tan, Zid Mancenido and Edwin Montoya Zorrilla won the NSW Karl Cramp debating competition for Year 11. Blaise Prentice-Davidson, Michael Coutts, Kelvin Yu and Anthony Morris were runners-up to Smiths-Hill in the NSW Hume Barbour competition for Year 12.

Creative Arts

James Hurrell and Alex Shapilsky had their major artworks displayed in ARTEXPRESS. James Mackay and Mohammed Mehmedbasic were chosen to perform at ENCORE. Jason Kok was selected in the NSW Public Schools Symphonic Wind Ensemble.

Volleyball

High open volleyball won the CHS Knockout and GPS Competitions for the third consecutive year. At the Australian Championship High reached its highest ranking so far - seventh. Victor Nguyen and Oliver Konakoff were selected in the Trans Tasman NSW team. Oliver was selected in the Australian team.

Basketball

The open first grade team finished third in the CHS Knockout Competition. The 15A team were runners up to Westfields Sports High in the CHS Knockout. These are our best ever basketball results.

Athletics

At the All Schools NSW carnival, Michael Denny-Smith won the 17 years 400m hurdles and Dinghua Xiao was third in the shot put. At the CHS carnival Dinghua broke the 16 years school record to earn a silver medal in the discus, and earned silver in the shot put, too. Michael Denny-Smith took out the 400m hurdles. Harrison Lane ran strongly for silver in the 15 years 3000m. Dakishika Gunaratne scored a bronze medal for the 17+ 110m hurdles.

Cricket

Matthew Fetherston and Dakishika Gunaratne were selected in the combined GPS cricket team.

Sailing

Phillip Kurts won the state 4.7 Laser championship.

Football

Joshua Weight and Lachlan Street were selected in the combined GPS first grade team. Daniel Campion, Aaron Shuttleworth and Gehan Karunaratne made the Combined GPS seconds.

Tennis

Matthew King was selected in the combined GPS seconds team. The Stan Jones Cup team qualified through the Metropolitan round and represented at the NSW Titles in Albury.

Rowing

At the CHS rowing championship High won five finals, including the championship men's VIII. Ty Linegar won the Reg Galvin Award for best male competitor.

As is my custom on this occasion each year, I will conclude by sharing with you some ideas that the class of 2007 might take with them and other prize winners consider. Epictetus wrote *The Discourses* at the end of the first century AD. He proposed a stoic view of life. "Do not seek to have everything that happens, happen as you wish, but wish for everything to happen, as it actually does happen, and your life will be serene. Disease is an impediment to the body, but not to the moral purpose, unless that consents...In the case of everything that befalls you, remember to turn to

yourself and see what faculty you have to deal with it." Epictetus gave good advice on how to access those qualities within ourselves that can be marshalled to combat the vicissitudes of the life ahead of us. When faced with events beyond our control that impact on us, such as our experiences of failures, conflicts, accidents, tragedies, or loss, we can call upon endurance, patience, courage, integrity, abstinence, forbearance, compassion or other moral strengths to confront issues that face us. What happens is outside yourself, but how you react to and cope with what happens, lies within your power. Keep your moral purpose firm and you will find the strength. For Epictetus, this is the position and character of the philosopher – one who looks for all help or harm from within. At university, in the work place, in relationships, Epictetus would have you avoid seeking solutions external to yourself but would ask you to place yourself at the centre of the response and to look for the solution in your hearts and minds.

At High we hope that in our total curriculum over six years you have learnt how to reason and reflect, to analyse and judge, to interact with people and teams, to push yourself, to rationalise your mistakes, to accept your successes and to have the self-confidence to face the future as autonomous individuals.

Congratulations to all prize winners and good luck to those now leaving High for the last time.

ANZAC Day

Distinguished guests, Old Boys, members of staff, students, welcome to our Anzac Day ceremony for 2008. I want to acknowledge and thank our special guests today. Col. Ian Cumming (Victoria Barracks) representing Major-General Mark Kelly; Capt. Donoghue (UNSW Regiment) representing Lt Col. Fomiatti; RSL Sub-Branch Presidents Bill Harrigan (Bondi-Waverley), Barry Collins (Coogee-Randwick), Merv Woods (Kensington War Memorial) and RSL representatives Chris Salakis (Malabar) and Old Boy Vic Thatcher (Clovelly). A special welcome to serving and retired Old Boys - Air Vice Marshall Russ Law, Brigadier Bob Slater, Lt. Col. Anthony Tripley, Commander Viv Littlewood and Major Ross Cable. Our commemoration takes place rather early this year but the educational opportunity to raise the concept of Anzac Day in our school community consciousness is an annual commitment of the Department of Education and more importantly for us, a traditional ritual of this school. Anzac Day recognises service and sacrifice, mateship and memorials. I want to acknowledge the efforts of our school cadets this year. For several years seven cadets from our Unit have served as a banner party for the 2/1st Field

Regiment Association at the Anzac Day March. This year 20 cadets are to form a Flag Party to carry national flags at the opening ceremony before the Anzac Day Test. Also, our High Marching Band has become a feature of the March. I am hoping for a big turnout again this year. Thank you to all boys who care enough to be involved.

This morning I want to offer a snapshot of Australians at war after Gallipoli when our forces were deployed to France. By the end of 1915, the war in Europe was at a stalemate. After the 1914 war of movement when Germany's Schlieffen Plan encircling thrusts on Paris were stopped at the Marne and the 'race to the sea' ended in a draw, German defensive lines were established from the French Alps to the English Channel, keeping the Allies at bay. Counter attacks by French and British forces in 1915 were disastrous. The 'cavalry and bayonet' Generals squandered the 'offensive spirit' of a generation of young men, sustaining 2.4 million Allied casualties. Machine guns, trenches, concrete bunkers and barbed wire were effective against anything less than highly concentrated and sustained artillery fire, adequate offensive weaponry and a No-Man's Land to traverse of no more than 200 metres. Haig and the





generals ran battles they could not see, using plans and tactics they could not control, wasting troops they did not know, on open, muddy battlefields they had not reconnoitred.

Fromelles in Flanders was the scene for the Australian troops first battle in Europe. On July 17, 1916, the three brigades of the Australian 5th Division (17,800 men) were sent in to the attack, with orders to capture the German front line trenches and break into and hold their support lines. The operation was planned as a feint to stop the Germans sending reinforcements to Haig's real objective – at the Somme. The Australian Commanders thought the attack would fail and said so. It went ahead anyway. The Germans were not deceived. The Somme was reinforced. Fromelles was a hastily planned assault, on too wide a front with too little artillery support, in open country, across twice the feasible distance of No Man's Land, commencing immediately after rain. Despite these overwhelming disadvantages, two of the three attacks succeeded but the enemy support trenches were not where they were supposed to be and the Australian troops were forced to defend against counter attacks using the German frontline trenches they had recently occupied. They were cut off in defensive islands and surrounded when the Germans counterattacked. After a confused 14 hour battle, the Australians staged a desperate fighting retreat, pointlessly suffering 5,533 casualties, many disappearing into the mud. Les Carlyon, the vivid military historian writes in *The Great War*: "VC Corner Cemetery outside Fromelles is the only

solely Australian war cemetery in France...There are no headstones. Underfoot are the remains of 410 Australians. The bodies were picked up after the war. None could be identified"(98). Fromelles was a tragic and futile catastrophe. There were to be many more before the 1917 Generals learned how to wage modern war effectively. The final cost of their on the job training by 1918 was 46000 Australian lives in France. As a consequence of the impact of our casualties, Australian society was changed forever. The scale of the slaughter and mass anonymity of the dead are hard for 21st century minds to comprehend. We owe it to them to remember and retell their stories.

Deficiencies in reading maps, planning campaigns, communicating and interpreting intelligence, still plague people conceiving and directing wars. Ordinary people, increasingly civilian, pay the price for these errors. Facilities designed for the production of weapons of mass destruction can be clearly seen on aerial photographs if you want to find them. In its power struggle with the CIA the Pentagon could find evidence of a rogue state harbouring terrorists, even where nothing credible existed. The Taliban and Bin Laden were always the reason for the 'coalition of the willing' agreeing to invade Afghanistan after 9/11. How naïve we were to be hoodwinked and hijacked into an additional invasion to remove a tyrant. Perhaps for us the end game in Iraq is coming and Australia can extricate itself from the conflict with some dignity – leaving a humanitarian legacy. Maybe we will learn something this time from our decision to support

neo conservative adventurism.

The geopolitics of warfare does not concern us at this ceremony. Here in Australia on Anzac Day we choose to fix our focus firmly on the human condition in war – the suffering, the heroism, the mateship, the grief at home. We have to try to put ourselves in the position of the soldier and empathise with his feelings as he stoically manages living in trenches, leaves letters home in his kit or with mates, chokes in his gas mask, faces death, takes another's life, lies wounded or exhilarates in his lucky survival. Each man had to play his part, to do his duty, to suppress self for the group, to serve the bigger picture.

I trust that on April 25, whether as participants or witnesses, High boys will play their part in honouring the citizens in our history who heard their country's call, volunteered to be put in harm's way, and who died, were wounded or suffered, in their nation's name.

We must never forget everything that the ANZAC soldiers endured. And we must remember the ties that unite them. But we should also never shy away from the reality of the cost of the invasion of Gallipoli in 1915.

That the bonds of friendship could be forged in such a hellish environment as that faced by the ANZACS is a truly wonderful thing, and something that should always be remembered and celebrated. However, the elevation of this celebration of the mateship of the soldiers on this day above all else may be to many a comforting action, but it is a dishonest one. Many have capitalised on the image so strong in the national consciousness, of Australian diggers, always united by eternal friendship and loyalty, to generate nationalist, pro-war sentiment, often for unnecessary wars. To do so is to fail to look at the full picture of what took place for the ANZACs, Doing this means we risk failing to learn its lessons.

The ANZAC day landings failed in their original aims, and were arguably an unnecessary military action, yet they had an enormous human cost. May this be remembered. Let us never forget the thousands of soldiers who stood no chance, slaughtered one-by-one by machine gun and mortar fire as they made their way up the beaches, or as they charged off the gangways of landing ships, ready to fight for their country.

Let us never forget the suffering of soldiers losing the friends to whom they had become so close, on distant foreign soil, thousands of kilometres from their homes and families.

Let us never forget the terrible aftermath of the events; the pain of those left behind at home having to come to terms with the loss of loved ones, nor the mental scars that so many of our soldiers had to silently endure after returning home.

It is our duty to remember this, and to ensure that future generations do also. If we forget the tragic cost of these events, we are doomed to repeat the mistakes that led to these events. Never again should so much life be lost so unnecessarily as it was at Gallipoli in 1915. In this way, remembering these men, their spirit and their sacrifice, is our collective duty to the past. This is the meaning of ANZAC day: lest we forget.

In 1914 the modern world went to war for the first time, the Great War, the War to End All Wars. It was a long, bloody, costly conflict for all involved. But what we need to do is not to look at the ruined empires, but at the lives of those actually serving.

Just how bad were the conditions? Just how strong was the will of these brave soldiers? These are questions often thought about, but not often answered. I shall explore these questions.

Life in the trenches was on the whole an ordeal. However, we must go beyond this simplistic notion. Think of an area, small and cramped, with rats and disease everywhere. Major Walter Vignoles was noted as saying about the rats

"There are millions!! Some are huge fellows, nearly as big as cats. Several of our men were awakened to find a rat snuggling down under the blanket next to them"

And trench foot was a dreadfully debilitating condition, more horrific due to it being so wide spread, and almost unnervingly commonplace.

"Your feet swell to two or three times their normal size and go completely dead. You could stick a bayonet into them and not feel a thing. If you are fortunate enough to lose your feet and the swelling begins to go down, it is then that the intolerable, indescribable agony begins. I have heard men cry or even scream with the pain..."

Cadet Unit

The Cadet movement in New South Wales originated in 1872 and on the opening of the Sydney High School in 1883, a request was made to the Headmaster Mr Waterhouse for permission to form a Cadet Corps within the School. Two companies were formed with the first Commanding Officer being Lieutenant HW Strong.

One hundred and twenty-five years later, Sydney High School Cadet Unit posted strength stands at fifty two cadets, eighteen of whom are Non-Commissioned Officers (NCO), commanded by one Senior Under Officer (SUO).

Within the first six months of 2008, SHSCU participated in a range of cadet activities and events. A Brigade conference was attended to by WO2 A Ho in early February where matters regarding joint cadet activities and upcoming initiatives like ceremonial parades and International Cadet Exchanges were discussed.

In April, two separate contingents of SHSCU's finest cadets participated in the ANZAC City march followed by the mounting of a flag party for the ANZAC rugby league game.

Commanded by SGT D Stojanovic, the 2/1 Royal Artillery Regiment banner was marched down the streets of Sydney with SGT P Nguyen, SGT J Wachsmann, CPL S Binns, CDT W Dang, CDT M Do and CDT B Lu as banner guards.

On the other side of the city, Sydney High School was represented by a marching band under the leadership of Drum Major WO2 A Ho with CPL J Santoso as his second-in-command. For the first time, the marching band was accompanied by a guard of eighteen cadets commanded by CPL A Hatle.

Immediately after the city march, SHSCU's ANZAC guard element was ferried off to ANZ Stadium in the Sydney Olympic Park precinct of Homebush Bay to mount a flag party for the opening of the match between the St. George Dragons and the Sydney Roosters. For this event, the Royal Australian Navy delivered the cup in an Agusta Westland AW109 Helicopter and supplied a marching band, a singer and a bugler while the Royal Australian Air Force provided an F/A 18 Fighter for a fly by before the match began. High cadets were able to conclude their arduous day

with tickets to the game sponsored by the organisers.

Two promotion courses were run by Brigade in 2008 resulting in the promotion of eleven cadets to JNCO rank; six JNCOs to SNCO rank and one SNCO to officer rank. The increase in ranked personnel was to accommodate the increasing unit strength and the eventual 125th anniversary parade later in the year. A parade was conducted later in the year to congratulate the candidates. The Unit also welcomed back Old Boy William Clegg (2005) as the Unit Training Officer holding the rank of Second Lieutenant.

The annual Battalion bivouac took place in May and exposed the unit's new platoon of recruits to field training. Their knowledge in fieldcraft was developed with camouflage and concealment being the highlight of the training program. While the recruits participated in field exercises with conjoining units in the area, the unit's more senior cadets familiarised themselves with the F88 Austeyr – the standard issue assault rifle for the Australian Infantry. High cadets gained invaluable skills from this weekend bivouac which prepared them well for the Annual Field Exercise later in the year. WO2 A Ho also received his new badges of rank from Major Page, Officer Commanding, 23 Army Cadet Battalion in front of a mass parade of all the cadets of the Battalion at Holsworthy.

In the October holidays, SHSCU was deployed to Singleton Army Training Range as part of 'Charlie Company' in the Annual Field Exercise 08 (AFX08). Although the days were hot and the nights were cold, High cadets thoroughly enjoyed the experience. For most, it was the baptism of fire.

The Annual Field Exercise 2008 – from a cadet's perspective:

The annual cadet camp of 2008, more commonly known by the cadets as AFX 08, was quite promising as a wide range of activities were organised for both the experienced cadets and the newcomers. With a platoon of thirty-seven cadets, we began our journey to Singleton Army Training Area, the host site for the annual event. We were introduced to a large number of activities that were never before implemented into the annual camp

agenda. Activities included live shooting, WTSS (Weapons Training Simulation System), night vision walkthrough and more.

AFX 08 was a complete success with not only the enjoyment and involvement of cadets state-wide, but also the time donated by the senior staff and St Johns Ambulance. Although several Sydney High cadets were admitted to the RAP (Regimental Aid Post) due to minor injuries, we were able to make our way home with everyone well and truly alive. I thank all the officers that put the camp together and the cadets for attending. The increase in unit strength on AFX compared to last year's enabled us to participate in exercises that didn't exist before due to low attendance. I hope I'll see all of you next year!

Cadets in 2008 – from a NCO's perspective:

Over 2008, cadets has been a mixture of highs and lows. For many, the highlight of the year was live firing with F88 AUSTEYRs or using the WTSS system on annual camp. For others, it was being put under the spotlight and being seen everywhere on television screens across the nation.

On Anzac day, we marched ahead of the school marching band as a banner party, representing the school and the army cadets. Right after the Anzac day march, our unit moved to ANZ stadium to be part of the opening ceremony of the Roosters vs Dragons Anzac day rugby league match. It was a huge honour, and almost certainly a once in a lifetime event. Over the course of the year, every cadet whether three year veterans or brand new recruits, has gained an arsenal of knowledge, experience and skills in areas such as first aid and navigation.

For me, the highlight of the year was the junior leaders' promotion course in January. There, countless lessons were somehow made enjoyable and I learnt about the responsibilities of being a junior non-commissioned officer and essentially, a leader. It was an excellent opportunity to meet cadets with a similar level of experience to mine, and I gained a lot from it. I will also end the year having taken away as diverse a list of skills as my cadets have and look forward to my next year at SHSCU.

Little has changed since the introduction of the Cadet Unit to the school one hundred and twenty five years ago. SHSCU still parades once a week and attends at least three bivouacs/camps a year. Cadets are trained in navigation, first aid, fieldcraft and signals, which are then put into practice on the camps in activities, like 24 hour rogaines. Ceremonial drill remains a large teaching point and is conducted regularly to prepare the cadets for events such as the school's ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day services.

In contrast to the peaked caps and the brightly coloured uniform the first cadets wore, the current cadets are uniformed in Disruptive Pattern Camouflage Uniform (DPCU) with black boots and headdress consisting of a Navy Blue beret. The unit hat badge is backed by sky blue and chocolate brown felt. The unit's cadets are easily distinguished from others by the blue and brown of their unique shoulder patches and blue berets.

SHSCU has come a long way since 1883 and with the continual support of our Commanding Officer, Major R Knowles and Training Officer, Second Lieutenant W Clegg, Sydney High School Cadet Unit continues to spearhead the leadership roles presented within the school. Parents & Citizens Association

While 2008 may be remembered as the year of credit crunch and global financial crisis, Sydney Boys and Sydney Girls High School celebrated our 125th Anniversary. Sydney Boys High School P&C had another exciting and successful year in providing support to the School and its various co-curricular activities. We are thankful to have a wonderful team of dedicated members of the P&C Executive and Year Group Representatives, as well as a network of very active subcommittees.

During the year, P&C Association generated income of \$118,643, mostly from Canteen surpluses (\$60,000), Parents' Contribution for P&C Membership Fees (\$19,825) and funds generated from Parking (\$31,825 including \$25,825 from the Parking Levy). Grace Reid, Christina Chow and all the Canteen Committee, Canteen staff and volunteer parents should be congratulated for their outstanding effort.

P&C Association contributed \$93,058 to the School to implement various improvement to school facilities nominated by our Principal including computer hardware and furniture in the new classrooms (\$15,000); the third stage of the classroom data projector rollout (\$15,000); the third repayment of the tennis court loan (\$10,000); video cameras and editing software for the Visual Arts course in film-making (\$10,000); installation of a new electronic notice board on the Cleveland Street frontage (\$15,000); and the New Library building project (\$28,058).

P&C continued to contribute to prizes and awards on Speech Night including the new P&C Writing Competition Prizes. A total of \$50,000 over the last two years was also contributed by P&C to the term deposit to replace the School's Coaster bus when it reaches the end of its useful life. Geoff Andrews deserves special mention for his hard work and enormous support as our Treasurer in keeping control of our budget and maximising our contribution to the School. We are also grateful to Geoff Taylor for continuing to provide his services as our Auditor.

P&C subcommittees also raised over \$200,000 from parking, barbecues, dinners, trivia nights and other fundraising functions for the benefit of their co-curricular activities. The 15 P&C sub-committees are Athletics, Basketball,

Canteen, Cricket, Debating, Fencing, Football, Music, Rifle Shooting, Rowing, Rugby, Sailing, Skiing, Tennis and Volleyball and they all made vital contribution to the School. They provided much needed parental support in organising, transporting, officiating, managing and catering for the teams and their activities.

Sydney Boys High Development Committee, with representatives from the School Council, Foundation, OBU and P&C, is starting new initiatives to promote the School and to develop the next phase of our fundraising program. We wish to thank Steve Saunders and all volunteer parents for their time and effort in the ongoing telephone fundraising campaign for our Library and Multipurpose Auditorium. The immense contribution of Tailoi Chan-Ling in chairing the Development Committee to harness the talent of all the committee members is also gratefully acknowledged.

P&C also continued to contribute to various decision making processes in the School with representatives in the School Council and Foundation. Shane Brown leads by example as Chairperson of the Sydney Boys High Foundation, an incorporated body, jointly managed by the P&C, the Old Boys' Union (OBU) and the Principal. Management principles are being applied and opportunities explored in developing the potential of facilities at the Great Hall, Outterside Centre, High Store and Fairland Pavilion.

Charles Ovidia and the Chinese New Year Dinner Committee organised an extremely successful Chinese New Year function at the Great Hall. The Parents Mentor Program, initiated by Charles, continues to assist new parents to adapt to the new school life at Sydney Boys High.

One of the P&C initiatives that we wish to carry out progressively is to prepare a handbook documenting all the procedures in organising various P&C activities, including all subcommittee activities. Barbara Taylor's significant contribution and wealth of knowledge in organising the Open Day and Orientation Day activities on behalf of P&C will not be lost on that basis.

P&C continued to organise our guest speakers program this year at our monthly P&C General Meeting on topics that are of interest to all parents. Topics covered this year include Environmental

Sustainability for our school, GPS sport at Sydney Boys High, Analysis of SBHS HSC results, Cultural exchange with Bogabilla Central School, Moodle and use of computer technology for studies.

On behalf of the P&C Association, I would

like to thank Dr Jaggar and all the staff at Sydney Boys High for their dedication and effort in providing a wonderful learning environment at the school and developing an outstanding all round education for our children.

Old Boys Union

This year has been one of consolidation for the Sydney High School Old Boys' Union.

The OBU has two broad areas of activity (with some overlap):

It keeps old boys in touch; in touch with each other, their old school and the other GPS old boys.

It provides input into school governance.

Keeping In Touch

Throughout the past year, the OBU has been communicating with its members by way of *e-Bulletins* (on at least a monthly basis) and the *High Bulletin*. The *e-Bulletins* advise old boys of school news as well as social functions and reunions being conducted by groups of High old boys and the GPS OBU. The *High Bulletin* documents the activities and achievements of High's old boys from all walks of life.

The OBU website has now also been revamped thanks to **Neerav Bhatt** (1999) our webmaster. We will continue to develop this site as a communication forum for Old Boys.

We have had some success with geographically based reunions. I want to recognise especially **Barry Jakeman's** (1969) successful Brisbane dinner in September 2007 and **Chris Fong's** (1997) successful quarterly meetings of the New York group. With the assistance of **Viv Littlewood** (1953) we have also revived the reunion for old boys from the Defence forces in conjunction with the School's Anzac Commemoration. At next year's Anzac Commemoration, the School will be dedicating a suitable memorial for old boys who have seen active service since 1945.

We have also been happy to assist with contacting Old Boys for both leaving-year and sport-based reunions. In this regard, we are looking to develop our network through each leaving year. Thanks to **Mark Fischer** (1969), **Bill Avery** (1955) and **Sam Kremer** (1992) who have, so far, volunteered to be year secretaries for their

respective years.

The connection with our fellow GPS schools is maintained by membership of the GPS OBU. **Mark Livingston** (1969) is now our delegate to the GPS OBU Council, since the retirement of **John Goddard** (1953) in June. They and I have represented the OBU at the dinners and lunches of the other GPS OBUs.

The GPS Gold Challenge, a sporting contest for GPS Old Boys who have turned fifty, has also been reactivated this year. The High teams acquitted themselves admirably this year – a full report will appear in the *High Bulletin*. I would like to recognise the efforts of fellow Council members **Mark Livingston** (1969) and **Bill Russo** (1969) as well as the year organisers **Paul Veltman** (1975) and **Richard Luxford** (1976) for making this year such a success.

School Governance

Old Boys continue to play an important role in supporting the operations of the School in both a formal and informal capacity.

Around 100 old boys assist in various tasks around the School in both a paid and unpaid capacity. I wish to draw particular attention to those members of the OBU who have offered assistance in response to requests in the *e-Bulletin* and *High Bulletin*, in particular **Mark Livingston** (1969) and **James Solomons** (1998) for joining the joint committee to plan the School's 125th anniversary celebrations with the Sydney Girls' High School; **Yaron Finklestein** (1988) for volunteering to produce a draft Public Affairs Plan for the Development Committee; **Alec Tzannes** (1969) for providing advice on the School's relationship with the Centennial Parklands and the three old boys who responded to the call for expertise in project management and DA applications with the Department of Education for the School's new library, **Peter Edwards** (1961), **John Taylor** (1967) and **Finn Murray** (1994).

Formal participation in School governance has been through the return of delegates to the Foundation, School Council and related bodies.

There has been a change this year in the representation on the School Foundation. **Terry Pullinger** and **Lee Ruth** (1951) have retired after many years of sterling service. **Karl Kruszelnicki** (2005) and **Graeme Anderson** (1979) have taken their places on the Foundation. **Ken Clemens** (1955) has continued his excellent work as treasurer of the Foundation and **John Pointing** (1962) and **Mark Livingston** (1969) are continuing as alternate delegates together with **Lee Ruth** (1951). **Graeme Anderson** (1979) has also continued providing excellent input into the Foundation's Outterside Centre Management Committee.

The School's policy and advisory forum, the School Council, has continued its work this year thanks to our delegate **Dennis Briggs** (1967) and alternate delegates, **John Pointing** and **Mark**

Livingston. **Dennis** has continued as President of that body. **Lee Ruth** (1951), **Terry Pullinger** and **John Goddard** (1953) did not seek re-election to the OBU's Executive Council this year. Their valuable contributions over many years to both the school and the OBU have been enormous. I wish them well in their retirement from Sydney High affairs.

The Future

In closing I would like to make two observations. First, in order to continue our work, we must improve our cash flows through membership subscriptions and other activities. Secondly, we must establish an adequate succession plan to make sure that the gains we have achieved in the past year are not lost by the departure of key personnel. I would encourage all members to consider what role they can play in ensuring a strong and relevant Old Boys' Union into the future.

Foundation Day Address

Distinguished guests, Old Boy OAMs, former school captains, Prefect Internees, School Family representatives, parents, staff and students – welcome to our 125th Founders Day Assembly. A special welcome to our occasional speaker today, Professor David Griffiths (1962). I am pleased to include some additional acknowledgements into this year's assembly to commemorate our 125th year as a school. In today's assembly we are connecting with our founding traditions, reaffirming our school culture, honouring our elected student leaders for 2009, and recognising the leadership and service of Old Boys in the Order of Australia honours system. In addition, the High Club directors are making a special presentation to two of our students who will be members of the Australian Delegation to The Hague International Model United Nations to be held later this year.

In the year our guest speaker joined the school a major celebration was held for the 75th anniversary of the founding of Sydney High. Various assemblies, dinners and dances were organised to mark the occasion. An historical supplement was published – not unlike the series of interesting historical pieces written this year in 'High Notes' by the current OBU President, Joseph Waugh. My thanks go to him for adding a sense of history to this year's publications. We have not matched the 75th year organisers in the quantity or variety of our activities, but we are having a joint cabaret night with the girls school which I trust will be well supported by the wider school community.

Over the last nine years we have been conscious of trying to display symbols of our traditions and achievements in the form of pictures of Old Boys, Honour Boards and displays of school blazers and memorabilia. In keeping with the 'living museum' concept the school has commenced an honour board series, acknowledging Old Boys recognised by the Federal Government for their contributions to society. In the Australian Honours System appointments to the Order of Australia confer recognition for outstanding achievement and service. The Order of Australia has four levels: Companion, Officer, Member and Medal. Many of those honoured at various levels have kindly

joined us here for the unveiling of the first board in the library stairwell. We are honouring Old Boy Medallists and plan to add higher level boards over the next few years. The Medal of the Order of Australia is awarded for service worthy of particular recognition. There are 52 names on the first Honour Board to be unveiled today.

Nineteen fifty-eight was a special year at High. 'The Record' celebrated the 75th anniversary of the School. The Student Editor of The Record, ER Sowe, identified three of the distinguishing features of High. First, it is the oldest school of its kind in the state and is truly public – affording equal opportunity to all in true democratic spirit. Second, it has the honour of being the only state high school among the Great Public Schools, all renowned for their high standards. Third, it is one of the few schools in the state where admission is by merit and impartial selection based on scientific assessment of ability. This system of selection has helped to educate students in an atmosphere of culture and co-operation.

I feel certain that students from 1958 who might be time warped to 2008 would feel right at home in the culture of the school. The pillars of our school's ethos are the same now as they were then. We have more diversity in sports but not in co-curricular activities. The High of 1958 had cadets, debating, trained a substantial choir and organised a school band. The students even performed an opera as a joint production with SGHS. They ran camera and chess clubs and oddly a railway club. High boys have always been involved, created opportunities, and have always demonstrated good teamwork. High boys show initiative and have always been self-reliant. In many aspects, the student culture has not changed much in the intervening fifty years. Involvement in school life has always been heavily promoted. In 1958 the school had four open rugby sides and six open cricket teams and were undefeated in basketball in first and second grade. A high level of sports participation at a competitive level is expected at High.

At the foundation day assembly on 1 October 1958, the Governor-General, His Excellency Field Marshall Sir William Slim, was the official guest speaker. In his address, he reminded High boys

how lucky they were to live in Australia and attend high school and enjoy the advantages of life. He explained to the assembly that these advantages had not yet been earned. He warned that 'when you come out from this school, you owe a lot, and, if you will look around, you will see how to pay it back: and you can pay it back in the spirit of service and adventure.' Sir William opined that each boy's debt could be paid through work and leisure. He extolled the feelings of pride in a job well done and exhorted the boys never to think they were too good to do a job. Finally, he asked them to devote some of their free time to the service of their fellows.

I believe that the culture of service is now embedded at High. I am sure Sir William would approve if he could see what High boys are doing these days to 'serve their fellows'. I encourage all boys to become involved in some way with school or community service. Those in privileged positions as you are, have a duty to help others.

In 1958 the School Prefects were inducted in first term. We intend to hold a similar ceremony in first term 2009 to conclude the Prefect Internship

period. As I explained recently in High Notes, we have moved towards the idea of School Prefects earning their badges by continuing to participate in their final year to the same degree that they did in previous years, thereby being great role models to their peers and to the High Junior School in particular. We are discussing particular accountabilities for roles and the possibility of having more staff members involved in monitoring School Prefect performance. Genuine leaders earn their positions through consistent service.

Today's assembly conjoins reflection and celebration. As the Prefect Internees are introduced, we celebrate their achievements in qualifying and being elected, and remember the places they will now occupy in the tradition of leadership at High. I congratulate all the boys who have been elected and wish them well in their roles. I hope you will unite your peers around the common cause of enhancing High's traditions and that you will connect with them as people to inspire them to do so.

Duke of Edinburgh Award

Over the period between late 2007 and 2008, two hikes were completed by students of Sydney Boys High to satisfy the requirements of the Silver level of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. The Hikes took place in the Heathcote/Royal National Parks and along the Great North Walk, respectively.

Silver Practice Hike

The first hike, in the Heathcote and Royal National Parks, took place between 17 and 19 December 2007. The route planned was:

- **Day One:** Train from Central to Heathcote.
- Walk south along the Bullawarring Track of Heathcote National Park.
- Camp overnight at Kingfisher Pool (great swimming spot).
- **Day Two:** Walk south-east to Waterfall Station, refill water.
- Enter the Royal National Park, and follow the Uloola Track until Uloola Falls, the overnight campsite.
- Bushwalk up to Karloo Pool for a swim.
- **Day Three:** Continue north along the Uloola Track until Audley.

- Hike west to Kangaroo Creek, have a swim and eat lunch.

- Hike west back to Heathcote Station, and take a train back to Central.

In total, the hike was around 30km in length over fairly difficult terrain.

As usual, many members over-packed for the trip. A notable exception was Ms Peace, who somehow managed to fit all of her food, water, clothing, general items, and a tent into her tiny pack. The main items taken included:

- Toiletries, gas stove, pocket knife, cutlery, torch, sun-screen, insect repellent, sleeping bag, tent (usually between groups), First Aid Kit (between groups), plastic bags, mobile phone, money, and camera.

- Clothing, including T-shirts, shorts, underwear & socks, hiking boots, a raincoat, and swimwear.

- Food: baked beans, spaghetti, bread, soups, and noodles for lunches and dinners; pikelets, jam, and muesli cereal for breakfasts; and various bars and confectionaries for snacks.

- Camelbacks and many bottles of water, generally approximately 4-5 Litres.

In a 75L pack, the overall weight generally came down to between 15 and 20kgs per person.

Members from Sydney High included: Shreyas Iyer, Si Wei Tang, Kevin Le, Arthur Wang, and Gary Truong from Year 11; and Tadeusz Davenport from Year 9. The accompanying staff were Ms Peace (Art Dept.) and Mr Fuller (Maths Department).

Day One: On a cloudy December morning, the small but sprightly group from Sydney High set off on the first leg of the Silver practice hike. Indeed, the first couple of hours of the hike were relatively uneventful...until, that is, our first "beautiful rest spot" at Eckersley Point vanished into thin air. After our first unsuccessful attempts at "bush-bashing", we realised that we were off course, and ended up having lunch on a concrete slab in the middle of nowhere. Swei, thankfully, was prepared for the situation with a Big Mac that he had bought from McDonald's the previous day. Somehow, the rest of us couldn't quite share his enthusiasm for this meal. After lunch, we rejoined the trail and headed south, following Heathcote Creek. The remainder of the first day's hiking was punctuated by pleasant views and some steep climbs. Reaching the first campsite, the group then spent the rest of the evening swimming in Kingfisher Pool. A unique experience was bathing in a small waterfall. Later that evening, Ms Peace and Mr Fuller taught the group the amazing properties of dirt (yes, dirt) as a cleaner of dishes. Apparently the dirt, which must be extracted near a water source to ensure cleanliness, acts as an abrasive agent for removing oil and grease on dishes.

Day Two: The group set off the following day with Mr Fuller allowing Gary to find the way. Needless to say, we were soon lost, and ended up "bush bashing" again for a large part of the way to Waterfall Station. The group encountered numerous close calls with the local wildlife; scarily, two or three members walked right past a brown snake, one of the most poisonous snakes in the world, without noticing its presence. Thankfully, the normally aggressive snake did no harm. Re-filling our water bottles at a park in Waterfall, we proceeded to enter the Royal National Park, and amused ourselves by listening to the conversations of truckies on the nearby highway on Kevin's walkie talkie. After a long trek along a fire trail on Uloola Track, we reached

our campsite at Uloola Falls, and trekked up to Karloo Pool for a swim. In a rock pool at the top of Uloola Falls, Ms Peace and I sighted Yabbies, small beautifully coloured crustaceans. The next hour was taken up by various members of the group trying to catch them for Gary's dinner.

Day Three: The final day's hiking was enjoyable, albeit a few difficult periods. After sighting an eagle a few kilometres out from the campsite, we headed to Audley and swam and lunched at Kangaroo Creek. As usual, the final kilometres were the most difficult, but after the best part of three days, we finally reached Heathcote station and headed home.

Silver Test Hike

The second hike, along part of the Great North Walk, took place between 30 May and 1 June 2008. The planned route was to join the trail at Thornleigh on the first day, following it all the way up to Hawkesbury River Station on day three. The total distance was a mammoth 48km, with 20km being covered on the first day alone. The preparation for the trek was the same as that of the practice hike.

Members of Sydney High included: Shreyas Iyer, Si Wei Tang, Gary Truong, Kevin Le, and Peter Nguyen from Year 12; and Tadeusz Davenport from Year 10. Accompanying members of staff were Ms Jassy (English Department) and Mr Fuller (Maths Department).

Day One: The group got to the worst possible start on the first day when Peter decided, cleverly enough, to drive to Central, arriving half an hour late. A consolation for the punctual group members was watching him face the wrath of peak hour Cleveland Street traffic. By the time we reached the steep hill at the beginning of the course we were very late, and the difficult hour that followed reiterated Mr Webb's age-old adage that "the first and last hours of any hike are always the toughest". I personally took my mind off the pain by discussing King Lear with Ms Jassy, whose English degree proved far more valuable to us on the day than most of the other stuff that she had brought along. Unfortunately, Ms Jassy was forced to pull out soon after lunch despite her best wishes to continue, and I would like to offer her thanks at this point for battling her illness and accompanying us, allowing the hike to go ahead. Eventually, due to delays for various reasons, it became clear that we were going to have to slug

out the final stretch of the first day in darkness, despite our efforts to cover as much ground as possible whilst light remained. The group displayed a lot of spirit as I led them through the bush for around two hours in the pitch black night. Finally, at 7pm that night, we reached the campsite, both relieved and enriched by an amazing experience, new even to Mr Fuller himself.

Day Two: Day two began with a loud siren sounding at two o'clock in the morning. Loud explosions from nearby camps and the smell of Mr Fuller's pancakes followed as we made a relaxed start to what was supposedly the "easy" day. Somehow, however, Mr Fuller forgot to warn us that there were two enormous hills (or small mountains) along the way. As we proceeded, a tough day's hiking was made easier by wide ranging debates among the group, ranging from GPS sport to the merits of the lead actresses in Iron Man. After finally ascending the second huge hill, we paused to view a spectacular sunset from our vantage over the entire valley before heading back to camp.

Day Three: The final day was a demanding one, with the group having to cover 16 kilometres (including a hill higher than both the day two

giants) in around six and a half hours in order to catch our train on time. Luckily, the group had Swei, and his seemingly endless energy which sprung forth from the need to get to maths tuition on time. On a difficult day, it was this energy that drove the group forth, as Swei strove towards the common benefit of beating Anosh in the HSC. Ultimately, after a third, very tiring day's hiking, we finally reached our end point on the Great North Walk (which continued for another 100 or so kilometres), and reached Hawkesbury River Station with around half-an-hour to spare.

Congratulations go to Shreyas Iyer and Si Wei Tang for achieving their Silver Awards at the completion of this journey, which marked the end of the Year 12 boys' Duke of Edinburgh experiences with the school. It has been a time full of interesting experiences that will last in the memory. Many thanks are due to Mr Fuller, the SBHS Duke of Edinburgh Coordinator, for organising both trips and doing a terrific job in kick-starting the program in the wake of Mr Fidler's tragic death a few years back. I personally can attest to his enthusiasm and goodwill in running the program, and hope that he retains these qualities in expanding it in the future.

Mathematics Summer School

The interesting trip to Canberra began on a Sunday morning near Central station. Our feelings of unfamiliarity and nervousness were quickly drowned out by some weird lanky Asian bloke who turned up in a suit on a day that was about 35 degrees Celsius. My first question for him was “Are you from James Ruse?” *I really couldn't find any other explanation.*

My first impression of the group of people boarding the coach from Sydney was that at least no one there looked like a typical nerd. The 300km journey was rather interesting as the group of people on the bus resorted to playing all kinds of strange games. They were usually the ones who decided to bring along a 4unit maths text book or some other form of homework to camp with them. I guess it's the type of thing you'd expect from attending a maths camp, nerds... The free time after the private study always came like rain after a long period of drought.

Saturday night games involved Maths Relay- a team competition which involved mathematics crosswords and time challenge. "You did what??" "We did maths RELAY" It just sounds slightly better to say that it was maths relay instead of pure maths. It was a competition, but all we did was try

to have as much fun as possible.

On occasional nights, talks were given from previous NMSS (pronounced NeMeSiS - National Maths Summer School) students who have now reached into fields beyond just mathematics. The two weeks went by in the "schnapp" of a finger. The element of maths and fun was never taken out even on the formal dinner on the final night. The night concluded with a talent quest consisting of performances from students and tutors. It was a memorable night that sank deeply into our memory.

It was hard to depart in the end - everyone enjoyed it more than they had expected. Personally, I recommend all year 11s to actively apply to go to this truly once-in-a-life time experience. Take a look at the areas of Mathematics which still remain clouded, meet interesting people from all around the country, and enjoy yourself as much as you can in a worthy two week's time.

Competitions

As usual a large number of our students entered the National Geography Competition, the ASX game and the UNSW Economics and Business Studies competition.

ASX: Students from Year 9-12 were entered into the ASX (stock market game). Each student was given hypothetically \$50,000 for trading. Many learned the ups and downs of trading very quickly. The first game heated up during the stock market crash back in April where the sub prime crisis took its toll. The second game started in September. The collapse of many financial institutions and thus facing financial collapse in the USA took its toll on most investors. Most ended up with less than \$50,000. Those that made money considered the time of trade, time of the week, the PE ratio, dividend payments of that company and economic outlook. It was great to see so many boys get involved. Geography Competition: All students Year 7-10 participated in the 2008 Australian Geography Competition. Participation for Year 11-12 was voluntary for those who do not study Geography. Of the 764 participants, 215 students received a high distinction, 189 received a distinction and 158 received a credit. Well done to all the boys and Dr Ganderton for organising the event.

Economics Competitions: Students from Year 10 Commerce and all Year 11-12 Economics students were entered into the competition. Of the 169 participants 3 received prizes, (Justin Zuo, Alan Yang and Simon Chen.), 9 boys received a high distinction, 32 received a distinction and 53 received a credit.

Business Studies Competition: All students studying Business Studies in the senior school entered the competition. The results were rather impressive. Of the total 82 boys who participated 19 received Prizes, (Ryan Sutton, Caly Yang, Victor Lim, An-Ton Tran, Jeffrey Wong, Matthew Dinh, Victor Ung, Jarrod Chan, Stephen Dong, Simon Cheng, Sammep Sandu, Luke Tran, Wilson Szet, Oliver Fio, Sam Burnham, Avish Sharma, Mishu Osinski, Matthew Lau, Navin Spoljaric), 26 received a high distinction, 28 got a distinction and 21 received a credit. Well done boys.

Other Extra Curricula Activities: Students from the Social Sciences participated in the usual array of other activities. Year 8 visited Bicentennial Park Wetlands as part of their study unit "Investigating Global Environments and Communities". Year 9 Geographers visited Pymont as part of their studies investigating "Sustainable Sydney" and "Urban Dynamics". Year 10 attended Long Reef as part of their study unit "Issues in Australian Environments". Stage 6 Geographers visited the Hunter Valley investigating the topic, Productive Activity (Viticulture) and an "Urban Dynamics" fieldtrip. Year 11 Business Studies participated in the University of Newcastle Business Plan competition.

ASX Schools Share Market Game

Game 1 of the Australian Schools Share Market Game was highly successful and enjoyable for High students this year. Sydney High had 134 syndicates, of between 1 and 4 students competing in this national competition. Happily 65% of our syndicates finished the Game with their portfolios in profit. Over the eight week period in which the game was conducted, there had been a lot of volatility and uncertainty in the markets with the All Ordinaries gaining only 7.52%. In comparison the National winning syndicate grew their portfolio by 33.5% finishing with a total of \$66,766. The top syndicate in NSW achieved a total of \$65,295.

The ASX Share Market Game has become an integral part of our Commerce Program and it is keenly contested by Senior Economics and Business Studies students, although the Yr 9 and Yr 10 students outperformed their senior colleagues.


Strategies

Angud Chawla and Daniel Morgan: “Our strategies were simple yet proved to be incredibly effective. We focused on buying stocks that were either performing below the ASX 200, or well below their all time price high. We also put ten thousand dollars in each stock, so that we could maximise any increases. We didn’t focus on the price of the stock as we understood that it was the percentage rise of the stock that was important.”

Ling Xiong: “The strategy I entered the game with was to invest in sectors/companies that have been oversold due to the global credit crisis and the weakness in the US economy. The sharemarket sell-off spelled opportunities to invest in companies...which were trading at a much discounted price.”

Daniel Chen, David Li Wang, Jeffrey Tang: “Throughout the game...when we were buying shares, we would try to make sure we bought at least \$10,000 worth to avoid the higher brokerage fee...A technique we used in part of the game was to check the ‘Market Watch’ page regularly to see the upcoming dividends, so we could invest in some of these companies and increase our portfolio value, but sell the shares off again if it looked like the business could take a downturn.”

Welfare Report

The main focus for Welfare in 2008 has been the amalgamation and strengthening of our leadership programs to enable more students to access opportunities for skills development. Mr Coan has been appointed to the position of Leadership Coordinator and has begun a review of existing programs with the other coordinators (SRC, Prefects, High Resolves, Big Brother, Community Service, Peer Mediation and Peer Support) working towards an integrated whole school approach which will allow students to consolidate a more substantial leadership portfolio by the time they leave Year 12. This will involve the introduction of new units of work on leadership study into the Values Education course in years 7 and 8 and a more formal and structured approach to recognition of service and contribution through the school award scheme. Although this process will take some time to finalise, work undertaken this year has already resulted in a commitment among all groups to extend leadership opportunities and provide clearer guidelines for participation.

Throughout 2008, students from each year (7 to 10), attended a theatre in education performance presented by *Brainstorm Productions*. Each play had an age specific focus in terms of it concerns and students found the selection of material relevant and engaging. Year 10 saw *Wired*, which tells a story about two students preparing for the HSC exam and the pressures associated with the growing anxiety and expectations which accompany this monumental event in their lives. Year 9 watched *Cheap Thrills*, a thoroughly entertaining solo performance by an actor who adopts a number of characters who highlight the issues associated with risk taking behaviour and substance abuse. *Verbal Combat* was the production seen by Year 8 and it was mainly concerned with conflict resolution and peer pressure. Year 7 saw *Sticks and Stones*, a play about bullying and this topic forms an integral part of their Values Education study. Tony Li (7S) wrote the following review about this production:

“The play was about a bully named Toby who, in the end, reformed his ways and learnt to control his anger. This change in attitude and behaviour resulted from the help of a peer support teacher who was only staying for a few weeks at the school. The reason that Toby was a bully was

because when he was small, he was bullied by a boy named Kell. When he told his dad what was happening, he told Toby to be tough and fight back. Toby did as his father suggested and in doing so, became a bully.

The audience, all Year 7 students, were very interested in the play. What I liked about the play was how two actors played about five characters. It was interesting to see how they transformed themselves through costumes, a variety of different voices and props. I also liked how they juggled balls and clubs.

I would recommend this play to all high school students and even to students in years 5 and 6 of primary school, because it is very interesting and teaches us a very important lesson. I would even recommend the play to adults because the play highlights how the father’s decision to teach Toby to fight with his fists and not words was not the most effective solution. The play also showed us that war begins with two people. It begins with a person using a stick to whack someone, the other person retaliating with throwing a stone and then someone uses a gun, a rocket launcher, a bomb, a bigger bomb then comes war.

Overall I enjoyed the play and I learnt many things that I hope will help influence my behaviour in the future.”

The discussions which have resulted from these productions provide students and teachers the opportunity to exchange views and address a range of important and sometimes sensitive issues.

On Friday 16 May six of our Year 9 students attended the second Youth Wellbeing Network Forum at Australian Technology Park Conference Centre. The day was made up of a number of presentations given by local health professionals on topics such as hygiene, sexually transmitted diseases, nutrition, substance addiction and depression. These presentations were followed by discussions and question time and students were surveyed about the topics they had dealt with during the day.

Vineet Singh reported:

“Overall the experience of this forum was interesting and did provide a better insight into some of the health problems facing Australian youth. I would recommend this forum to future Sydney Boys so they can spend a day outside of

school doing something worthwhile and engaging.”

Another presentation which is fast becoming a feature of the calendar each year is the visit from Motivational Media. On Monday 23 June, the whole school was able to watch the multimedia presentation of *The Power of Every One*. The fifty minute audio visual presentation focused on how great steps forward in history have frequently started with the inspiration of one person who looked at a situation, wished for change and then made that change happen. It looked at the influence of people such as Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King Jnr and Nelson Mandela combined with current inspirational stories. The significant element which gives the program such impact for the audience is the combination of the three large panoramic projection screens with the three state of the art synchronised video projectors creating an image thirteen metres wide. As promised, the powerful images and music selection provided a stimulating, thought provoking message about the influence that we as individuals have on those around us.

The Big Brother Project was extended this year to include a special project with Paddington Public School. Timothy Chan (Yr 9) reported:

“On Tuesday 20th May, a group of year nine students had the opportunity to visit Paddington Primary School and work with the children on activities relating to water conservation and responsible water use. We had heaps of fun through assisting the children paint a mural, collecting data for a water audit and completing various challenges with them. They were very polite and welcomed us greatly. At the end of the day, we had a learning session where the organiser talked to us about water usage. We learnt many valuable skills about starting up new groups, the challenges we would face, and how to navigate around those challenges. A very well organised and balanced day which I enjoyed greatly and highly recommend. A very worthwhile experience.”

Two other Year 9 students (Ian Ho and Maaz Rahman) also had the opportunity to visit Carlton Public School as part of the program. They made contact with the new students who will be attending Sydney Boys High and Sydney Girls High in 2009 and delivered a power point presentation about attending a selective high school for the first time. They also participated in some organised activities with the younger

students such as helping create Kahootz multimedia expressions, reading stories with kindergarten and participating in an interschool video link up (connected classrooms) to be involved in a discussion and presentation about the new production by Andy Griffiths called *Just Macbeth*. Their visit was highly successful and is the precursor to a more involved Big Brother project beginning in 2009. The High Resolves Program continues to make sound progress and this year we congratulated our first group of Year 10 leaders who received their Leadership Certificates. This group have now completed all their training and have assisted with the delivery of the High Resolves program to Years 8 and 9. A new group of leaders has been chosen from Year 9 and they will now undertake their skill development training to prepare for 2009.

The current Year 10 High Resolves Leaders attended their second summit and were pleasantly surprised to find some celebrity guests as keynote speakers.

“On Tuesday 19th August, 2008 approximately 400 students from Sydney schools met at Sydney University’s Great Hall for the 2008 Summit. It was a memorable day for the 23 students who represented Sydney Boys High. At the beginning of the day we were welcomed by the program director, John Bush. There were several speeches at the start including an analysis of Dr Jeffrey D Sach’s book A Common Wealth : Economics for a Crowded Planet by Mehrdad Baghai, the Founder and Chairman of High Resolves.

We were then extremely surprised to see the arrival of the next guest speaker, The Hon Julia Gillard MP, Deputy Prime Minister of Australia. She spoke about her rise from being a keen English student and debater to her current position. At the conclusion of her speech we broke for morning tea and Ms Gillard was surrounded by eager students wanting to speak to her.

At the end of morning tea we were sent to our discussion groups which focused on the future for Human Rights, Design and the Arts, Education, Gender Relations, Media and Communities, Cities, Democracy, Energy, Oceans, Food & Water. A key theme of the day was how ordinary people can do extraordinary things with few material objects but with passion and the will to succeed they can make a difference in the world.

“The Future of Design & Art group discussed how design and art affects our lives today and the

impact of environmentally healthy designs to a sustainable world in the future . If we have a passion we should never let it get out of our grasp until we finally obtain it. At the end of the day we left exhausted yet our brains were buzzing with the new information that we learnt.” – Jeremy Rajendram.

“After the welcome and speeches, we proceeded to our discussion groups. My group’s issue was the Future of Oceans. We discussed the five readings provided to us, focussing on the importance of the oceans, how humans are laying waste to marine life and the continuing struggle between less developed and developed countries over rights to fish and mine the ocean. After lunch we listened to three experts in the field who included two CSIRO scientists and a university student who expanded on the readings we were provided before the conference. “ – Joshua Nair

“This discussion wrapped up a very enjoyable and helpful day that taught the importance of joint action as well as finding your passion in life and pursuing it.” – Kieran Taylor

“Through this day we met a lot of students from a range of other high schools. Despite the long hours of discussion, it was an enjoyable experience, not only because of the people I met, the friends I made and the discussions we had but also the memories I developed and will hold for the rest of my life.” – Andrew Wu

We were sad to say good-bye to Mr Howey this year. He was a very committed participant in so many aspects of Welfare and had accepted the role of Community Service Coordinator before his departure. He spent a lot of his spare time ensuring everything was running efficiently with barbecues and fundraising events and was keen to see this area of leadership develop further.

Fortunately for us there was someone who was enthusiastic to take his place and we are very happy to welcome Ms Kaye into the Coordinator’s role. Ms Kaye is a passionate advocate for the Amnesty International cause and sees opportunities for the two groups to work cooperatively in the future. She has already planned a restructure of the Committee and ways to improve the role of the Executive members. She is a tireless worker and has already successfully

organised several fundraising events including the Oasis fun run which involved some of our young men seeking sponsorship to aid disadvantaged and homeless youth in the community. Each year the school raises much needed funds for several nominated charities and we are constantly seeking new avenues for our students to participate in community service activities. One of our proudest moments this year was the nomination and acceptance of Nathan McDonnell for the 2008 Minister’s Award for Excellence in Student Achievement. He is a fine example of selfless devotion to those in need and his citation for the award reads as follows:

“Nathan has set a wonderful leadership example in his work for charity and community service and has a passion for social justice. This was demonstrated most clearly when he proactively sought opportunities for Sydney Boys High students to serve the community and in particular the homeless, through the Matthew Talbot Hostel, by involving them in the preparation and serving of meals. He is a committed advocate for Amnesty International and Christian Fellowship within his school. He works tirelessly to initiate and organise a wide variety of school fund raising events and to encourage the involvement of the SRC in the activities being held. His overall aims are not only to help others who may be less fortunate but also to find opportunities for fellow students to offer assistance to people in need which in turn helps those students develop a sense of social justice, mutual respect and community service as important aspects of global citizenship. His maturity, selflessness, good humour and enthusiasm make him a highly valued member of the school community and first in the hearts of the staff and student.”

Mr Kesting organised for his new group of prefects to complete a leadership preparation course in October as part of their induction and Ms Collignon and ten students from the SRC attended the National Young Leaders Day at the Sydney Convention Centre (Darling Harbour) in early November. This has been a big year for leadership in our school and the Welfare team is committed to further expanding opportunities for our young men to prove themselves as confident and capable leaders of the future.

The Community Service Committee

The year 2008 started with the Sydney High Community Service Committee (formerly known as the Charities Committee) in complete disarray. Mrs Plummer, who had done a fantastic job as coordinator in previous years, was forced to leave due to different working hours, leaving the committee teacherless. Further, the departure of Richard Yang to university meant that now there were serious threats to the committee's sustainability, with only a few members of Year 12 having the knowledge required to organise events. Credit is due to Nathan McDonnell and Shreyas Iyer, who worked with the Head Teacher of Welfare, Mr Walker, to ensure that the Bogabilla and Youth Off the Streets fundraising events were successful.

Soon after this, Mr Howey (Social Sciences Dept.) joined the Community Services Committee

(CSC), and things started to get back on track. The executive committee was formally voted in, with Kevin Lam and Alex Shapilsky taking up the roles of Treasurer; Ajay Balachandran and Bernard Fang becoming Secretaries; and David Nam and Panduka Manamperi taking up key positions for the committee's future as year 11 representatives. Restructuring various community service policies, notably including the Awards Scheme Policy, the newly formed committee was ready to tackle the next fundraising event, for Sir Roden Cutler Charities. Guided by the Year 12s, Panduka and David took on the challenge of organising their first barbeque, and were very successful, managing to raise a profit of \$464.80 despite wet conditions and not selling out. The new policy of reporting those who don't donate despite wearing mufti continued to pay dividends, and the day was

a huge success, with a net profit of \$2016 contributed to the cause.

More success followed, with our profit for the Stewart House fundraiser reaching a record \$2125.50. Finally, it appeared, we were ready to move on to new heights. However, at this stage we reached our first setback. Mr Howey, who had been a tremendous influence in terms of formalising the Committee and allowing us to move forward, left in July to teach at a school in Tanzania. Many thanks go to him for taking much of his time out for our cause; even in departure, he embodied the community service spirit. Hence, the CSC was teacherless for the second time in a year; however we were fortunate enough that Ms Kaye (English Dept.) immediately took us up.

On Friday 1 August, students from Sydney Boys High School participated in the community fundraiser Jeans for Genes Day, selling merchandise at Central and Bondi Junction Stations from as early as 7am. Sydney High sent

80 students from Years 10-12, and the event was a great success. This event was the catalyst for pushing the CSC to what I consider to be the “next level”, expanding the range of operations beyond mere mufti days and barbeques. The first signal of this was the creation of a new role within the committee: that of Publicity Officer. This role was ably taken up by Johnny Lieu of Year 11, with improvements being made on our advertising campaigns and the creation of a Community Service Committee Facebook page and email. A major operation of the CSC was that of the East Timor Educational Relief Campaign.

The idea was sparked when an old boy from the school stationed with the Australian Defence Force in East Timor informed the CSC of the depressing conditions he had witnessed there. Eduoard Cousins, who graduated in 2002, further informed us that the practical things like stationery were far more significant than monetary contributions. Varan Peranathan did a terrific job

leading the East Timor project, establishing contact with someone in East Timor and organising for collection boxes to be placed around the school. With the school ultimately sending off 14kg worth of stationery to East Timor, the project was a great success, and looks to continue on in years to come.

Another significant development for the CSC was its adoption of the Salvation Army OASIS Youth Support Network. Awareness was first raised of this throughout the school in a presentation by former TV News Presenter Jessica Rowe of the story of one particular homeless youth being supported by the program. On Sunday 21 September, a somewhat small group of students ran for OASIS in various levels of difficulty of the Sydney Marathon. Whilst participation in this event was less than ideal, those who were involved did a great job in raising funds for the cause. Ms

Kaye in particular was exceptional, solely contributing over 80% of the school's donation to the cause. With OASIS set to become the new Year 12 charity next year, and ideas such as a tutoring program (with students from SBHS tutoring OASIS kids) being floated, this is another long term project for the committee to pursue.

Overall, it has been a very successful year for the Community Service Committee, with a new order having been established and much more efficient procedures and structures set in place. Many thanks go to Ms Kaye for her tireless commitment to the cause; she has endless respect from all of the students involved. A special mention must also go to Panduka Manamperi, who ably led the CSC at times when I was away and looks set to formally take on leadership next year.

The next morning we were busy packing up our tents and cleaning up after ourselves, putting out fires and picking up all the rubbish. We then visited a hand-made paper factory where many of the local Aborigines work at and create their own designs. We tried our hand at making our own uniquely styled papers but discovered it was much easier said than done. That afternoon was spent relaxing and socialising with the Boga kids playing our traditional game of touch footy and basketball. While the High boys just managed to grasp victory in the basketball, the Boga boys were too quick and agile for us in the touch and grabbed an easy victory. We also got to see the finished product of our rap song, turning out far better than we imagined. It was then time for our final farewells before turning in to the recently cleaned Boggabilla motel where we got a good night's rest before the long journey back to Sydney.

Public Speaking

My topic was “A blast from the past” and I talked about how the past is critical to present and future development. With sixteen speakers all together, there was a lot of competition for the top three positions which would decide who advanced to the next stage. I am sure that I can speak for both of us when I say that we had a great time and learnt a lot about how we can improve.

[The following is a transcript of Christopher Chiam’s speech.]

“To be ignorant of what occurred before you were born is to remain always a child.” Marcus Tullius, a Roman statesman. When Marcus Tullius said these words he was spot on about what he said. If we do not know what has happened in the

past, we can never develop. Many people do not know this, and even today we try to forget the past. Some people say the past holds us back from development. But this is not the case.

On our earth there are many, many objects which are straight from the past. From massive structures like Stonehenge and the Pyramids of Giza to the smaller items like a Roman coin and a shield, each of these were used in some way in ancient societies. Trade, war, worship or as a burial site, they all had their uses in society. By examining them carefully, we can learn even more about how societies functioned and worked in those times. We can also admire the ingenuity of these objects, especially since pre-modern cultures are considered primitive in comparison to today's societies.

But did you know that many of our modern day inventions that we take for granted are actually based on an ancient concept? For example, the idea of the modern clock stretches back to the invention of the sun dial, which were invented around 3500BC in Egypt. That's over 5,000 years ago! Although the mechanism is not similar, the principle, to measure time, is still the same and it can be said that the Ancient Egyptians made the first plans and machines for clocks, which were built on later in time by other scientists and inventors.

As you can see, by simply using certain objects which incorporate modern technology, we are living the past by using inventions which are testimony to the work of older generations, even if the design is not exactly the same.

And what about culture? Whether it is the customs and traditions of Australia, a small village in Asia or a country in Europe, each of these cultures were invented and developed by the people who inhabited that particular country, region or town. This is why different cultures and customs are so unique, because they were developed and created by different people in different points in history.

Even countries which were occupied, colonized or claimed by another country in the past and which are no longer under the rule have developed a culture separate from that of their origins. A prime example of this is Australia. When Australia was colonized, language, tradition and society were almost exactly like that of

Britain. Even the Aboriginal people, who had their own culture, were forced to live like the British.

But over time, Australian society slowly changed from that of Britain by the development and advancement of traditions, language, society and iconic symbols. As you can see, culture is not only the practice of certain traditions by modern generations, but also the developments of it by the ancestors of the modern society.

Another aspect of the past which we still have is knowledge of a civilization and how they lived, fought and so on. In some cases, we know even more than a citizen of that civilization as we have access to a variety of records which were hidden due to being deemed as inappropriate, lost physically or hidden due to government rule. We also have access to archaeological artefacts which can be used to piece together the history of a society.

Sometimes however, we need the present to judge the past. For example, in World War 1 and 2, it must be admitted that there was a needless amount of deaths to soldiers and civilians. But the fact that there was public support in some form or another means that we can compare the attitudes of people today and the past, and gauge human development and progression against this scale. Or on the other hand, sometimes we need history to be the judge of the present. For example, the treatment of people in third world countries is terrible.

The standards in which they live are in some cases worse than what life was like in the past. The world has praised itself for its advancement in the last few years, but how can we do this when some people are living in conditions worse than the past? By looking at history, we can be judged on how far we have come, or not come. But in our modern world, we have to think with every move we make, "How will history judge us?" By learning about the past, we not only learn about other generations, but we can also learn much about ourselves.

In conclusion, the quest for time travel has been one which mankind has longed to journey on. However, if we take a step back from our modern lives, look at society and our surroundings and think about the origin of these things, then we have begun to realise how essential the past is to the present.

Reconciliation: *Closing the Gap*

It was an honour to be selected by Mr Devlin to be one of four students (Nema Adel, Michael Ambrose, Enoch Hui and Brian Kelly) to attend an Aboriginal reconciliation convention at State Parliament House. Despite the limited amount of preparation time due to the Armidale trip, we were excited to be chosen to represent Sydney Boys High at such a ceremonial event. A short bus trip led us to the prestigious parliament house. After a brief body-scan to ensure that none of us possessed any weapons or dangerous material, Mr Barris led us into the various rooms leading to the upper house itself. We were rather surprised at the number of schools which were involved, including St Mary's Newtown, SCEGGS and St Ursula's, to name but a few. In fact, several schools had come from Bathurst and beyond, showing the commitment the kids were eager to show in reconciling both indigenous and non-indigenous people.

Few people had heard of the name Larissa Behrendt, but only a fool would not marvel at the achievements this woman has been able to achieve. Born in 1969, Madam Behrendt is currently a Professor of Law and Indigenous Studies at UTS. She completed her Bachelor of Laws at UNSW in 1992, and in the same year was admitted by the Supreme Court of NSW to practise as a solicitor. She then travelled to the United States where she completed a Master of Laws at Harvard law School in 1994. Six years

later the Supreme Court admitted her to practise as a barrister. Having written books on indigenous social justice issues, she has a hefty collection of writer's awards as well as university awards, including the "Lionel Murphy Foundation Scholarship".

Apart from listening to Professor Behrendt, each school was to showcase the presentations prepared by each respective school. Despite improvising a fair amount of what we said, I can confidently say (with no bias whatsoever) that Sydney High showcased the best presentation, basing a majority of our talk on the Boggabilla trip which our school undertakes every year. We took immense pride in our school's contribution to the *Closing the Gap* program.

The convention concluded with an indigenous gentleman teaching us his native language. It was a decent ending to such an event, as we were able to laugh at a boy from Newtown High, as well as Brian and Nema, who were randomly selected to perform an Aboriginal dance. This was followed by a disastrous attempt at imitating a cockerel's call, which ended with all of us sharing a laugh together.

It was a special experience for us all as we hope to mend the gap which segregates the Aborigines and the indigenous. Gratitudes go to Mr Barris who had made this experience possible, and also to Mr Devlin who was so kind to provide for me this opportunity to attend such a prestigious event.


Year 12 Visual Arts



First term saw the two Year 9 classes complete their first project in which they were given a script and were required to work in a group to produce a three-minute short film. Each student then used the Windows basic editing program Movie Maker to produce a finished film for assessment.

A group of Year 9 Film Making students were lucky enough to see some of their films screened on a big screen at the Palace Cinema, Leichardt. The forty film students selected five of their favourite films to be entered into the annual DET

Movie Making Festival. This is the second year Sydney Boys High School have entered the competition and this year four of our five films have been selected to be screened at the festival.



At the Junior Assembly on Wednesday 6 August, the Lord Mayor Clover Moore presented the School with the corflute pedestrian safety posters that were designed by the Pedestrian Safety competition winner Andrew Chan [Year 9]. SBHS was a part of a pilot program run by the DET and Sydney Council Road Safety to raise road safety awareness.

The Selection criteria for judging was: message effectiveness – relevant and clear pedestrian safety message; Visual hierarchy; Quality of art – effort/artwork; ‘X’ Factor – what makes the work stand out, and Content.

Four variations of Andrew’s design were hung on the fences around the school in an effort to remind students to take care when negotiating the major roads bordering the school.

The quality of entries from our students was highly professional and surprised the judges. Ten other students were awarded cinema tickets in recognition of their efforts. Anthony Ho and Andrew Chee [Year 12] were very impressive in

Year 9 Debating



Summer Sports Assembly A

October 2007

Good Morning to our special guest today, Mr Russell Grimson, staff, coaches, parent committee members, players and students. Welcome to our 4th annual term four summer sports assembly to introduce basketball and cricket teams that will represent High in GPS competition commencing this Saturday. Our basketball program has matured during the 2007-08 season. The Basketball Committee has become the benchmark for large scale cooperative sports management at High. Yesterday, I discussed with George Chow, the Committee Treasurer, the 3-Year Plan for the sport. The plan is carefully thought out and comprehensively budgeted. I approved its strategic directions. The Committee has eleven discrete positions of responsibility and runs quite a complex operation. Thank you to all the parent volunteers who made it possible for us to field thirty teams in competition. I want to acknowledge the continuing good work of Ben Hayman as MIC and Coaching Coordinator. Thank you also to Alex Hayman, Vince Salomon and all the coaches and staff who are putting in a great deal of time and effort to make High basketball prosper. Thank you to Hank Foster for his junior skills development sessions. I look forward to another strong season in an increasingly competitive GPS context. High is aiming for greater than 50% wins this season to establish our depth as a basketball school. We are planning to give the CHS knockout competition a 'red hot go' as our latest Premier might say.

During the September vacation I was heartened to witness the growing professionalism of our cricket teams in their preseason preparation. Under the guidance of new coach, Barry Davison, the first XI is showing early signs of the commitment, cohesion and discipline necessary for a team to stick to the coach's game plan. Laurie Heil has again done a great job as MIC and Coaching Coordinator. I want to acknowledge his five years of effort to strengthen High cricket. His dedication, patience and persistence are starting to pay off. On behalf of the boys I want to thank the parent Cricket Committee volunteers who work as team managers, caterers and fund raisers. The time

demands associated with cricket are heavy and we could not support sixteen teams without you. Mr Heil has set a goal of a top three finish in GPS competition. I hope that the 2008-09 season will see High cricket achieve closer to its potential across all grades.

In 2008, a 'sports levy' was introduced. Parents have responded well to this initiative. I am pleased to be able to announce that for the 2008-09 season the summer sports of basketball, cricket and rowing will have a cash injection of \$10,000 each from the proceeds of that levy, for the purpose of improving coaching. Our intention is not to use the levy to just maintain sports but rather to add value to the respective programs through more widespread and more professional coaching programs.

In this first week of the term I was inspired by the enthusiasm that I witnessed among the encouragingly large number of cricketers and rowers who worked so well at our first Monday afternoon speed and endurance session. As observers Mr Ayre and I could see the great benefits of mass participation in structured, supervised, intensive exercise. Boys in groups were pushing each other to do the work and supporting each other's efforts. I really hope that this level of participation is maintained and enhanced during the whole summer season. High teams and crews will become more competitive and individuals in those teams will enjoy their competitive sport more when this culture of extensive preparation becomes the norm. Commitment to a goal is about finishing it, not starting it. Let us keep this training momentum going.

It is my firm intent to regulate training at the first grade / second grade A/B level throughout the sporting program. Logbooks and other appropriate monitoring devices will be used to ensure that boys being considered for selection to represent our school are adequately prepared in terms of physical fitness and skills development. High Junior School sportsmen need to embrace this culture of personal preparation for competitive satisfaction.

Doing things together makes us stronger. This morning I want to share with you some insights offered by Old Boy Paul Smith in his book 'How

to Have an Outstanding Life'. Phil Jackson, head coach of the Chicago Bulls, taught his team to win by instilling in them the principles of awareness, compassion and selfless team play. In his book, Sacred Hoops, he revealed that before NBA finals games he would read to his players from Rudyard Kipling's Jungle Book... 'the strength of the Pack is the Wolf, and the strength of the Wolf is the Pack'. An awareness of this interconnectedness between individual and group motivation in the pursuit of collective goals is fundamental to improved team performances. Once such an awareness is developed it needs to be supported by trust. Team members need to trust themselves, each other and the coaching staff. Stick to the game plan. Focus on the job you have to do. Be positive in your support of your team mates to maintain their self confidence.

The Hockeyroos were dual Olympic gold winners in Atlanta and Sydney and one of the most successful Australian teams ever. Their Mission Statement is informative. "We will win in Atlanta by being the best we can be because Olympic gold is the ultimate challenge in our sport. We will achieve this by playing beyond our previous performances and by never, never giving up. I will be the best I can be by: continually challenging myself to go beyond my comfort zone; making the necessary sacrifices; believing in my ability and the strength of my purpose; valuing excellence, determination and dedication in both training and match play; having faith and confidence in, and being supportive of, my team mates; not making excuses but taking responsibility for my development, performance and my lifestyle; seeking feedback and making contributions to the program; being tolerant of differences in others and respecting them for who they are and what they have to offer; accepting disappointments and frustrations and overcoming them by working together; and by having faith in the course of action chosen for the team and being committed to it knowing that it may not always be my preference"

I am not advocating such intense commitment from all of our teams playing sports but I do expect that teams and individuals try to see themselves in this way. Boys in the top teams should embrace the culture of interconnectedness between individual and team which underpins winning performance.

I congratulate all those boys being honoured this morning and wish them good fortune in the contests ahead.





seconds. The average winner's time is 355 seconds – 5 minutes 55 seconds. The crews propel the racing shells at 5.63 metres per second with an average speed from a stationary start of more than 20 kilometres per hour. The first performance target for our crews is to row within 10% more than the winner's time – 6 minutes 30 for the first VIII. Our mean time since 1999 has been 6 minutes 28 seconds, so the rowing program has achieved that benchmark in the medium term. The margin of excellence can be considered as less than 5% in timed sports with a distance element. A good row for our school is therefore 372 seconds - 6 minutes 12 seconds. That is our second performance target. Our third goal, achieved in 1999, is to row within 2% above the winner's time – 362 seconds - 6 minutes 2. Similar benchmark calculations can guide other crews in goal setting. On your behalf I want to wish all crews the best of luck in their races and urge them not to settle for less than second target performances. Let us focus on what we can do and forget about what we can't do.

Sports with overnight camps and extended travel components take a great deal of management. Thank you to Mr Con Barris for his administration of the rowing program yet again. Oliver Wilson has done a great job with the First VIII this year, getting them to peak late and bring down their times. George Barris has guided the Second VIII well with the assistance of David Luscombe. Thank you to coaches James Gerofi, James Mackay and Tom Hurrell for their work with the IVs. Con Barris worked with the first Year 10 VIII with the assistance of Robbie Girdler and Liam Bennett on the second Year 10 VIII. Mark Gainford managed the Year 9 quads training with the assistance of Yaegan Doran and Dominic Grimm. Everett Coan and Doug Hespel looked after the Year 8 quads with Joe Banh, Chong Shao, Blake Angell, Andrew Leung and Adam Farrow-Palmer in support.

Keeping boats and crews on the water and gear maintained were: Chris Watson as Manager, David Daish our evergreen Boatman, Viv Littlewood and Sean Creer as assistants to the program at the Outterside Centre, Serdar Bolen as fitness trainer and bus driver, Jason Tassell as weights trainer and Tim Wilson as our long time trailer tower. With Julie Blomberg and the Rowing Committee taking care of fundraising, catering, overnight camp management and regatta administration, this group of over thirty people

sustains and supports our students. I want to thank you all sincerely for all your efforts this season.

My message to rowers and any team competitor in the school is a simple one – carry out your assigned task to the utmost of your ability. Albert Einstein, the great physicist, observed that: setting an example is not the main means of influencing another, it is the only means." Perhaps Albert overstated the case but in team sports someone leading the way by focussing on doing his designated job right to the end, can be inspiring, even heroic. Distractions caused by mistakes and big occasion stressors can really affect performances negatively. Stanley Allyn, a former CEO of the National Cash Register Co, concluded: "there is no use worrying about things over which you have no control, and if you have control, you can do something about them instead of worrying." As athletes, you have to clear your minds and focus on the mechanics of your assigned role. Don't look around during the race. Don't think about consequences or analyse performance – just get stuck in and do your job. Focus on the next ten or twenty strokes. When you hear the coxswain count down the last ten give it your all and have nothing left at the finish.

Our special guest today is Fin Murray (1994). Fin rowed in the Head of The River for Sydney High in 1994. Initially he didn't want to be in a senior crew so he could spend more time at the beach - but thankfully Mr Barris twisted his arm and started his rowing career, which has continued ever since. Fin feels lucky enough to have rowed in crews with many great athletes at Sydney and UTS rowing clubs as well as in England, Ireland, Germany and America. Although he never raced in the Olympics, he did go out with an Olympian for a few years which he says is maybe even more of a challenge. He was twice a winner of the interstate Youth VIII race and winner of the quad sculls at the Henley Royal Regatta in England. Fin wanted to design planes when he left school but somehow he graduated with a degree in architecture from The University of Sydney. Fin enjoys travelling, drawing, sailing, surfing, riding his single speed bike and trying to fit less into his days. He is now racing surf boats at Bronte surf club and running his own architectural business. Fin acted as Consultant to our VIII in the 2006-07 season. Please join with me in welcoming back to High this morning, Mr Fin Murray.

CHS Regatta

One of the most prestigious events on the rowing calendar is the annual NSW Combined High Schools rowing championships. It was on 31 March and 1 April that Sydney Boys High came head to head against some of the biggest powerhouses of rowing in the state school system, including names such as Grafton High, and Maclean High. This year Sydney High was adamant that regardless of the strength of the opposition we would retain the overall men's point score trophy, and challenge for the highly-sought after overall competition point score trophy.

The first day of racing started intensely enough with heats, to establish who would row the next day in the finals, and who would not. Strong wins in the junior racing saw every entrant from our school bar an unlucky few, (who had conditions and boat malfunctions go against them), proceed to the next day of racing. Some highlights were a convincing top two finish in the under 15s single scull, to Timothy Gollan, and Koren Fang, and an extremely contested win in the under 16s single sculls heat, to Dale Chen, edging his opposition by a mere tenth of a second. In the only senior event of the day, Daniel O'Keefe and Harrison Reid stunned the opposing single scullers, blasting out a comfortable top two finish in their heat. In the other heat Matt Ling rowed a comfortable race for an easy qualification into the final. Overall Sydney High had qualifiers in every possible event, setting up for a nail-biting second day of finals.

The Sydney High rowers approached the second day of racing with enthusiasm and panache. The first event of the day was the men's championship eight. The Sydney High eights raced in unfamiliar grounds, using different boats and changed seating positions, but this would not falter the crews, as they rowed out a top two finish, to the delight of the crowd. The rowing contingent did not dwell on this win however – immediately they focused on the next task, in this case the under 16s quad where Sydney High once again crossed the line first, But unfortunately could not keep the other schools off the podium with the other two quads entered. In the following under 15s single sculls, High rowers Timothy Gollan and Koren Fang once again rowed next to each other, this time coming second and third to a talented

Merewether High sculler. The next event however was won with aggression and style, the championship pair, with Mitch Kelly and Nelson Ridges crossing first, only to be followed by David Vien and Brynley Pfull, completing another riveting top two finish for High.

Undoubtedly the biggest spectacle of the day was the championship single scull race. Sydney High had three competitors, Matt Ling, Harrison Reid and the school's top sculler and member of the unofficial GPS eight, Daniel O'Keefe. The race was very well contested, but Daniel O'Keefe was unlucky with a technical problem at the start line, holding him back behind the other crews for a few moments. However, in his usual aggressive, just row hard style, he rowed his way back into contention, just a short distance away from the race leader from Maclean High school. In a thrilling finish, the malfunction on the start line proved to take its toll and Daniel was edged out on the finish line, still rowing an impressive time, and coming a very respectable second in the most prestigious event of the championships. Harrison Reid rowed a strong race, to beat several competitors, whilst an unlucky Matt Ling didn't have his best day, but still hung on to the field.

In the next event High came back to winning form, taking out the gold and silver in the under 15s quad scull. Next up the under 17s got their first taste of racing in the championships, entering three double sculls. However, one of the doubles collided with a pontoon on the row to the start line, taking the boat out for the rest of the day unfortunately. The other two crews rowed fiercely to claim second and third places, perhaps gold could have been won with the other crew, but we will never know. This incident was quickly put behind us, as later in the day the under 17s quad rowers came first and second in their event for yet another top two finish for Sydney High. In the championship quad event, High rowed for one spot on the podium, the first spot, holding off the other determined crews. By the championship doubles race, the open rowers were quite fatigued, and were pushing the limits of physical exertions in one day. However Mitch Kelly and Daniel O'Keefe did the school proud, pushing for a bronze medal, against highly rated opposition.

The day was fast coming to a close with few events remaining. In the under 15s double scull High raced out to the now familiar feeling of a top two finish.

Unfortunately though High scullers James Whiting and Andrew Blomberg could not place in the under 17s singles, with James managing to bag fourth place just ahead of Andrew in a very quick final, leaving only two events in the day. High completed a clean sweep of sweep oar events in an entertaining fashion, with the two crews taking out the top places in the championship fours event, the winners, first four, stroked by the ever aggressive Koeun Na. Thus High took out every possible sweep oar medal available for us.

The last event of the day was the under 16s scull, the last chance to add points to any schools tally, obviously adding to the adrenalin of the competitors. Our only qualifier Dale Chen rowed a spirited race, and saw himself in the middle of a tough field, coming fifth out of nine in what was a good contest.

And so with the racing finished, all that was left was to await the tally. Sydney High managed to win the men's point score yet again in spectacular fashion, however were edged out of the overall score, due to the disadvantage of having no women to enter in half the events. It was a successful campaign, with High maintaining its position of 'champion of champions' in the world of CHS male rowing.

Although the Head of the River Regatta (which was held mid-week for the first time in over a century) fell on the same day as the Sydney East Regional Swimming Championships, SBHS still managed to give an excellent account of itself at this meet with four of our swimmers gaining selection to the Regional Team to compete in the CHS Swimming Championships.

Seven swimmers in all, which as a proportion of the total represented, over 25% of the team. Individual highlights of Swimming season 2008 included:

Dominic Mah: 12 Years Age Division

Dominic came first in all six individual 12 Years swimming events at the Sydney Boys High School Swimming Carnival held on Friday 8 February 2008. Dominic represented Sydney Boys High School in all five GPS Swimming Carnivals.

The highlight of the season for him came when he set a 12 Years 50 metre Breaststroke record on 22 February 2008 with a time of 41.55 secs

Dominic represented Sydney Boys High School in the Eastern Suburbs Zone Swimming Carnival on Tuesday 4 March 2008. He came second in all individual events except for the 100 metre Breaststroke, where he broke the record set in 1992 by eight seconds in a time of 1:32. He was also part of the All Age relay team that came first by nearly a lap over its closest rival.

Dominic competed in the Sydney East Regional Swimming Carnival on Thursday 19th March 2008 with the following results:

Second in the 100m Breaststroke (1:31.36); Sixth in the 100m Freestyle (1:22.92); Fifth in the 50m Freestyle (34.58); Sixth in the 100m Backstroke (1:39.82); First 100m Butterfly (1:33.68).

The Butterfly result was a surprise as Dominic initially was not going to contest the event. He swam seven seconds faster than his old personal best.

Dominic represented Sydney East in the CHS Swimming Championships on Thursday 3 and Friday 4 April 2008. He swam in both the 100m Butterfly and the 100m Breaststroke and made both finals and came away with a CHS bronze medal in the 100m Breaststroke with a time of 1:29.62

Dominic represented the GPS at the CIS Swimming Carnival in the 50m Breaststroke and finally capped his outstanding season 08 by representing the CHS at the All Schools Swimming Carnival in both the 50m and the 100m Breaststroke on Friday 23 May 2008.

Patrick Zhou: 13 Years Age Division

Patrick contested all swimming events in his age group at the Sydney Boys High School swimming carnival and gained first place in all of his races. He followed up this excellent performance with a first place in all events he competed in at the Eastern Suburbs Zone Swimming Carnival.

At the Sydney East Regional Swimming Carnival Patrick gained a second in the 100m Butterfly and was selected for the CHS swimming team. At the CHS carnival Patrick came sixth in his event with a personal best time of 1:10.50.

In 2008 Patrick was selected to represent the GPS at the CIS carnival where he competed in the 50m Breaststroke, the 100m Breaststroke, the 50m Butterfly and the 100m Butterfly. At the carnival he swam 31.83 for the 50m Butterfly which was a personal best time gaining him seventh place. In the 50m Breaststroke he swam 41.21 and gained eleventh place, in his 100m Butterfly event he came seventh in a time of 1:12.15 and in the 100m Breaststroke event he came seventh in a time of 1:34.75.

Max Chien: 14 Years Age Division

Max contested all swimming events in his age group at the Sydney Boys High School swimming carnival and gained first place in all of his races.

At the Eastern Suburbs Zone Swimming Carnival Max once again achieved first place in all the events he competed in.

At the Sydney East Regional Swimming Carnival Max gained the following places: First in the 100m Breaststroke, third in the 100m Butterfly, sixth in the 100m Freestyle, fourth in the 100m Backstroke and fourth in the 100m Butterfly.

Max then went on to compete at the CHS swimming championship where he came second in the 100m Breaststroke and third in the 100m Freestyle.

In 2008 Max was also selected to represent the GPS at the CIS carnival where he competed in

both the 50m Breaststroke and the 200m Breaststroke.

The highlight of the season for Max was the Third GPS carnival where he broke the 200m Breaststroke record with a time of 2:50.97.

Water Polo

The 2007-2008 season of Water Polo was a come-back year for High. After three years absence from the competition, soon-to-be captain James Menzies and hard worker Mitch Hammer, combined efforts to make the sport an option at High once more.

Much lobbying by the two and commitment from Mr Richard Ayre resulted in the fielding of a Sydney Boys combined opens team in the second grade competition. The announcement was met with joy from Menzies, the only survivor from High's last venture into the sport. The hard part was over.

Now all that was needed was a team. James spent weeks appealing to Year 12 boys in an attempt to field the strongest team possible. Scouring the ranks of the GPS swimmers, he was able to produce some solid recruits and, along with them, some fiercely impassioned boys. Although lacking in Water Polo experience the boys put in an astounding amount of effort which, combined with the speed and stamina of the swimmers, produced a surprisingly optimistic crowd.

The boys started the season with no doubts about the expectations of the school. The last season saw only one goal from High in the entire season. The boys made a pact; to better that total in just the first game, and that was exactly what they did.

The first trial game of the season and indeed thirteen of the boys' debuts saw High take on the far more experienced boys from Waverly College. After only one training session High had an inevitably dismal start, trailing at half time by 0-13. The third quarter saw a vast improvement with only a 1-2 deficit, and 2-7 second half, with both goals going to the captain. However, the true stand out was the Keeper Benjamin Palau. Although conceding twenty goals, his performance under pressure saved the boys from further embarrassment. With the fulfilment of their pact, the 2-20 defeat produced only pride in the boys, and fuelled them to train harder and longer, producing one of the most committed first grade teams the school has to offer.

Athletics Assembly

Special guest Werner Botha, athletes, coaches, parents, staff and students, welcome to our annual Athletics Assembly. This morning, like the late Big Kev 'I'm excited'. What has made me excited is that High boys may be starting to realise more of their potential in athletics. The positive atmosphere is no accident. I want to acknowledge and recognise the work of Robert Devlin as MIC who has enthusiastically, persistently and methodically developed the athletics program over the last few years. His work was boosted by the passion and energy of Richard Ayre as HT Sport. Jason Tassell has brought a strong structure to our quest for speed and endurance. Thank you to staff members Steve Codey, Mark Gainford and Wayne Baldock for their efforts. Our coaches Davina Strauss, Rebecca Elliott and Edward Ovadia have helped deepen our fitness and lift our skills bases. Thank you to David and Katrina Morrow for their expertise and dedication to High Jump. Thank you to the carnival volunteers, Sean Creer and the parents, who helped out at our invitational carnival and who are assisting us on Saturday.

Improving sports performance is a complex and variable process. When we stop looking and learning and asking questions about performance, we start to become victims of our own conditioning. Paul Smith, an Old Boy sports psychologist, tells the story of world record holder Ian Thorpe's defeat by Pieter van den Hoogenband at the 2000 Sydney Olympics in the 200m freestyle. The Dutch swimming team arrived in Australia and instead of going to the athletes' village, trained at Newcastle and one of their coaches studied videos of all of Thorpe's great swims. The coaches devised a plan for each stage of the race for van den Hoogenband to counter Thorpe's strengths. When Australian coaches some years later were asked by Smith what they did to prepare him for a challenge from the Dutchman, the answer was – nothing! Thorpe was known to be the fastest swimmer in the world and considered unbeatable – he just had to dive in and swim to win. He may well have been defeated by a failure to learn because he had been conditioned to expect to win.

Conditioning affects us all. Smith talks about the Baby Elephant Syndrome. Elephants in circuses were trained by attaching one end of a long chain to one of their ankles and the other to a spike driven into the ground. The elephant could

not escape and tended to walk in circles defined by the radius of the chain. The trainer taught the elephant within the boundaries of the circle. By the time the elephant was fully grown, the trainer could remove the chain but leave the manacle with a couple of links dangling from it, to indicate to the elephant that the chain was still there. The circus elephant would parade around the ring without attempting to escape or vary his routine.

Like fully grown circus elephants, we are all potential prisoners of what poet William Blake famously described as 'mind forged manacles', constrained in our performance by the effects of imagination, fear or conditioning. Sports performance at High has traditionally suffered from negative conditioning and lowered expectation, thinking not about winning but concentrating on parading around the circus ring.

Paul Smith recommends a method to break the baby Elephant Syndrome. His simple formula for success is to focus on passion plus vision plus action. Our team members need to ask themselves: "What do I love about athletics?" You have to have fun, get excited and build enthusiasm about your training and competing. I have seen more evidence of passion in our program this year. We have more people involved in the program, trying to inspire you and give you the skills for success. I see more enjoyment around. Our team needs to know where it is going – what its vision is. Collective and individual goal setting builds vision. Mr Devlin has set goals for performance in terms of more places closer to first in more events at the GPS carnival. I am confident that our vision is defined. Positive action is the third ingredient. Challenging yourself with the parachute or sled or step ladders or hurdles or hills and making each element of the training a challenge, increases personal productivity at training. Such focus brings strength and speed results. I have seen more boys training more often – taking positive action. To raise our team performance we have questions to ask each other about our passion, vision and actions. Congratulations to all those boys who have done the training and have been selected to represent us in championship or division. Focus on each place and each point – it takes the full team to earn the points we need. At the GPS Athletics carnival this Saturday, let's believe in each other, support one another and build success.

113th AAGPS Athletics Championships

An earlier start to the day, and an earlier time of year, was only the beginning of the changes that the 113th AAGPS Athletics Championships heralded for Sydney High Athletics on 10 May 2008. With clear blue skies, and only the mildest of breezes, our disciplined athletes turned out in force. As the programme had undergone a complete shakeup in the prior weeks, athletes from High were arriving with a new determination – a determination not in any way dampened by the 8000 strong crowd of supporters there expecting little from High, a satisfaction they would not receive.

In the under 13 years competition, Edward Zhang fronted for the sprinters achieving a respectable fifth in both the 100 and 200 metre races (12.82, 27.12). Our hurdlers also stood up to the challenge proving that with some dedicated training we can be a competitive force with Patrick Krakovsky (15.00) and James Chotiyana (15.33) coming third and fourth in their respective 90 metre hurdles races. The 13's 4 x 100m relay team was unfortunate not to place in 4th having worked hard to run an impressive 51.01 on the day.

The 14s age division saw some tight tussles, which High will grow from. Full credit must go to Pasan Pannila for his 4:47.1 1500m race which he had worked hard for all season, as well as Prashan Prabaharan for 58.5 in his 400m race, both of whom achieved fourth placings in their respective

events. Slava Reiyder (12.59) managed a very respectable 3rd place in the division 100m, and the 4 x 100 relay also pulled a fourth placing running a quick 48.92. The 14s flourished off the track as well with Tian Ling jumping 5.53m to place 3rd in long jump, David Nguyen putting 11.13m to place in 4th in the shotput, and Scott Renzenbrink coming in 5th in his high jump event at 1.58m.

High's most distinguished age group on the day, the 15s, boasted both of our wins. Having run a disappointing 4th place in his 200 (24.66), Shadman Ali put in his all and in exactly 12 seconds became the GPS' fastest 15 year old. Chris Morrow in emphatic style achieved a win over favoured competition in his high jump event reaching 1.76m. Samuel Lane was unfortunate not to win his 1500m event having led the entire race but falling behind in the last 200m, but nonetheless running a solid 4:24.2 for second place. Brian Kelly in the 100m division race reached 3rd place in 12.23 concluding a most successful day for the age group.

The 16s, boosted by an injury free Josh Tassell, lead the junior team. Josh was incredibly unfortunate to have come 2nd in his 100m race by 0.01 of a second (11.51) and in his 200, by just 0.1 of a second at 22.99. Jeremy Ireland ran a strong 1500m race to finish in 3rd (4:21.2) – a good result for the hard working athlete. In the field shotputters Max Kite and George Denny-Smith reached 3rd and 2nd places in Championship and Division competitions respectively, a well deserved reward for their season's efforts.

The senior team, while not enjoying the same success as the junior competitors, fought admirably in the face of incredible talent where High was not out of place. The 17s age group had no places better than Edwin Montoya Zorrilla's 5th in the Championship 1500m (4:30.5), however, considering the field, (the 100m race was decided by less than 0.7 seconds between first and last place) this was nothing to scoff at.

For the vast majority of the Open's team, this was their last opportunity to compete at this elite level in front of such an excitable crowd. With many preparations having been hampered by academic focus, the likes of Sydney High's fastest man Kogulan Sriranjana went out to prove he could still put up a fight pulling 4th and 5th places in his 100m (11.48) and 200m (23.29) individual events, as well as anchoring the 4 x 100m team to also gain 5th in 44.69. Harrison Lane ran with suitable finesse reaching 5th place in his 3000m race in an age group two above his own. The great anticipation built around Ronan Casey's 1500m race was not poorly judged as he ran a competitive race only to be edged out on the home straight.

In what was the best overall performance of many years, the junior team surpassed Grammar; a feat not enjoyed in over thirty seasons, and accompanied by our first two wins at this prestigious carnival in four years. The day was, like all sporting moments at High, truly

This year a strong Sydney High athletics team went out to the Homebush Athletics Centre on 11 and 12 August to compete at the Sydney East Area Athletics Carnival. Expectations were high as there were many athletes in this team who had competed successfully at the GPS carnival in May, and the results achieved reflect the hard work put in by the athletes at training and the dedication Mr Devlin has shown to the athletics program at High.

In the 12s Dominic Mah had some very strong performances, coming second in the 100m, second in the 200m and first in the 80m hurdles. Anton Brokman placed second in both of his events

(800m and long jump) while Amarbir Singh capped it off for the 12s by winning the high jump with a jump of 1.4m. The 12s 4x100m relay team also came first, beating Kingsgrove North High by almost a second.

In the 13s Patrick Krakovsky finished third overall in the 90m hurdles and the 4x100m relay team also scraped into first place after edging out the very competitive James Cook Tech.

These were fantastic results, with all our 4x100m relay teams going through to state with the exception of our 15s who were edged out of contention. These results reflect the effort put into the training from both the athletes and coaches, and special thanks go to all the coaches who have helped make 2008 such a great year for athletics, especially Mr Devlin, who is the driving force behind the recent success of the athletics team and who works tirelessly to make sure everything runs smoothly. First Fifteen

The season started well with 45 players to select from. However, the team performances in the trial games indicated we were in for another difficult year. Our best trial game was against TAS (Armidale) where High was able to score some tries from worked patterns practised at training.

A poor performance against St Josephs in the first game of the GPS, along with a thorough investigation of training records revealed that most of the 1st and 2nd XV players had not been completing the necessary strength, sprint and rugby training to compete safely at this level. It was decided, that High would not compete at this level until 18 players had registered a solid training regime. The Rugby Logbook was introduced as a means of tracking player training requirements.

As each week progressed the number of players eligible to play increased. Even though the games played were at a much lower level, it was agreed that individual and team performance had improved. Results included a narrow win against Kings and a narrow loss against Newington.

Each day, the First and Second grade team members would spend up to nine hours (8:00 am to 5:00 pm) on the range in preparation for the All School's Rifle Competition and the GPS shoot during the following week. The training camp concluded with over five thousand .308 inch casings, twitching left arms and a sense of excitement and confidence.

The effectiveness of such training programs was reflected in the team's success in the All School's Rifle Competition coming out second to TAS (The Armidale School) in the Prorak trophy with a grand aggregate score of 688 points and 30 centres (with SHS coming short of First place by 10 points). Silver medals were awarded to shooters of "Sydney High One", Chris Lam, Matthew Tong, Ishan Nadkarni, Phil Wu and Captain Anthony Ho.

This triumph led on to the GPS competition held at the Hornsby Rifle Range where an exceptional standard of shooting by the First grade team was demonstrated against opponents from Sydney Grammar, Kings, Shore, Armidale and Scots. First Grade shooters were Anthony Ho, Chris Lam, Brendan Leo, Ishan Nadkarni, Nevin Spoljaric, Denis Stojanovic, Matthew Tong and Phil Wu. Notably, Ishan Nadkarni shot a perfect score in the Buchannan Shield on the last day in the Snap Shoot. At the end of the two days High was able to finish with a strong third overall between the seven schools, a great change to mark the anniversary. And after a dry spell of over two years, senior shooters Ishan Nadkarni and Matthew Tong were able to qualify into the GPS combined team. At the end of the day Rifle Shooting at High is now bigger, better and stronger.

High's Second grade team also triumphed as a direct result of their dedication and commitment to the year's training sessions. Comprised of John Aclis, Adam Ceh, Abraham Chan, Michael Do, Johan Santoso, Peter Tran, Ryan Woo and Yujin Wu, the Second grade team took a very convincing lead over their competitors coming out second overall, only three points behind the winners from TAS.

Sydney High's participation in the Wingham Open Championships in 2008 was a mixture of highs and lows. Leaving straight after school on a Friday, eight High shooters and three Old Boy coaches embarked on a six hour bus trip up to Wingham. Arriving precisely six hours later, the shooters (all of whom had served or were currently serving in the school's Cadet Unit) pitched an 11x11 tent in the mud, the rain and the darkness while the coaches (all of whom had served as Cadet Under Officers at High) watched joyously from their 4WD rooftop canopies.

For many, the 2008 Wingham Trip was a first in terms of shooting in a prize competition. Ranges of 400 metres through to 600 yards were shot and although High's result from Day 1 were far from desirable, High shooters Anthony Ho and Chris Lam were able to secure no less than five silver and one gold medals and one silver medal and one gold in Days 2 and 3 respectively. In addition to the prizes won from individual competitions, High returned home with six

drinking flasks, a sandwich maker, a clock, a shooting game, a blanket, \$50 in cash and coins and the school competitions trophy competed for by The Armidale School (TAS), Wingham High School (WHS) and High (SHS). Won by Nevin Spoljaric, Denis Stojanovic, Phil Wu and Anthony Ho as Team Captain, the Mo Burdett trophy now sits in the display cabinet of the school's foyer.

With a Grand Aggregate of 376 with 21 centre bulls and only 9 points short from securing first place, Anthony Ho came fourth in C grade and first within High's shooting team. Anthony's perfect score of 50 with 3 centre bulls at 500 yards earned him a position in B grade at the conclusion of the trip. Nevin Spoljaric placed thirteenth in C grade and second within High's shooting team with a Grand Aggregate score of 351 with 9 centre bulls, followed closely by Denis Stojanovic with 346 points and thirteen centres and Phil Wu with 336 and 12 centres.

In B grade, Chris Lam scored 381 points with 25 centres (10 points short of first place), placing him eleventh in the B grade Grand Aggregate and first within High's shooting team. Chris was also able to outshoot his B grade competitors on Day 3 with a score of 99 and 8 centres. Matthew Tong

placed fifteenth in B grade with a Grand Aggregate score of 370 and 18 centre bulls.

A sincere thanks needs to be given to MIC Ms Cathy Meaney for her tireless commitment to not only accomplish the collection, correction and submitting of mountains of regulatory paperwork but also her negotiation of various other pivotal issues such as how to effectively manage a telescope and prepare hot chocolate. Equal regards must go to our coaches Kevin Chan and Justin Hill for their organization of the various excursions and camps, their continuous dedication to the club's growth, and their invaluable experience in firearms management and competitive shooting techniques. Finally, thanks also to Daniel Comben, Tom Vogelgesang, Sam Kremer, Nathan Scudder and Sam Mason for their regular support during the shooting season. Special thanks must be given to Dr Jaggar for his continual support for shooting as Headmaster.

Overall, 2008 has been a very eventful year for Rifle Shooting. The sport will hold its annual dinner later this year in December to celebrate its 125th year.


