Instructions for accessing *Tell Them From Me Survey*.



We are again asking as many boys as possible to access and complete the anonymous research instrument *Tell Them From*

Me. We hope that students will take advantage of an opportunity to express their views about different aspects of school life. Please take the questions seriously. An Award Scheme point will be awarded to participants. The staff has analysed the 2014 data and found many useful insights into what students think and how they feel about many aspects of school life. The more you share your views and feelings with us, the better we can try to meet the needs of more boys at High.

The school is likely to respond with to the accumulated data that it receives from this instrument, so long as it represents a significant sample of student voice.

The site will be open from Monday 9 March until Friday 12 April.

Speed limit on school grounds is 10 km/hour



Students move around inside the school grounds very frequently, presuming they are safe. They frequently do not attend well to their surroundings, being

distracted by their friends or technology. They may run out from behind a parked car or across a driveway. In the area in front of the UTS gymnasium there is a great deal of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Several cars driven by parents have been observed travelling towards the school building at speeds well in excess of 10km/hr. There have been several tragedies involving SUVs and small children in recent years. In the interests of providing the maximum possible safety for our students, staff and visitors, please be careful and drive slowly in school grounds.

New agreement for awarding grades

In order to reflect more accurately the improved overall standard of the school's outcomes in the last decade, the protocols for awarding grades to students for their reports has been modified by the Executive.

The school standard of 90 ATAR is maintained but the expected rate of achievement has been adjusted upward from 75% to 80%. Consequently, the grade breakdown now becomes: HD 20%, D 30%, CR 30%, PM 15-20%, P 0-5%.

I have asked again that all faculties investigate the prospective P awards to ascertain whether they are only assigned to: those who failed to meet deadlines and then didn't complete the class tasks or homework set, or those who exhibited very few if any of the understandings or skills expected. I would expect that some communication with parents had taken place during the reporting period expressing the teacher's concerns about lack of student progress, prior to a P award being determined.

Our School Plan 2015-17. 2 – Sophistication and skill in reading and writing



At the HSC level our boys lose valuable examination marks due to imprecise reading, poor inferences and simplistic or

overwritten answers. Our boys need to develop more confident and sophisticated 'voices' as writers. They need to appreciate the opportunities that the NAPLAN testing presents to them to measure their growth in Years 5-7 and 7-9. In stage 4, boys need to master the core subjects so they can learn to think broadly and deeply about the valued areas of knowledge and skill.

Teachers need the skills to set stimulating and challenging writing tasks. Parents can work with staff to help their boys build grit in tackling their reading and writing growth. School culture will show how literacy is valued and growth is measured and reported. Teachers will engage in more collaborative tasks across KLAs to build expertise and confidence in creating literacy tasks. The DEC 'Literacy continuum' will form the basis of our assessment and reporting of the components of literacy growth.

We intend to improve NAPLAN results for reading and writing in the highest bands. We will use the literacy continuum to audit our progress in the Junior School. We will compare HSC means across courses with major literacy tasks being assessed to monitor our progress in reaching our targets for performance in bands 5 and 6. Our focus will be on professional collaboration to raise the standard of targeted aspects of literacy.

Now for the Debating tip of the week. One of the simplest but hardest things in debating is improvisation. As a debater you would be required to improvise often, whether as part of your speech or as rebuttal. The prospect of improvisation can often be daunting to those who've never attempted it before. However you have probably done improvisation without realising. Whether it was just a conversation with friends, or a classic heated argument where you refuse to admit you were wrong, when you clearly were, you probably exhibited fine examples of improvisation. Simply put the key to improvisation is confidence. If you appear confident, and seem to believe in your model, the chances are it is easier to convince the audience and the adjudicator. Not only will your manner improve but you will also find it easier to express your argument better. It often helps to take a deep breath first and most importantly to imagine yourself as the world's best debater. Beyond confidence it also helps to have a firm understanding of your topic and your arguments. A good way to have that understanding is to take time out of prep to discuss the topic and what arguments you are going to run and what you can expect from the opposition. Because the first speaker's arguments are the most important it is often useful to help write the first speaker's points.

Hopefully the tip was useful to you. I hope you all look forward to a great year of debating ahead, and maintain your current level of enthusiasm and interest.

FROM THE JUNIOR LIBRARY

NEW E BOOK CAPACITY LIBRARY SYSTEM - WELCOME OLIVER /GOODBYE OASIS

The staff of both Senior and Junior Libraries have been very busy for the last 2 terms and particularly for the last 2 weeks cleaning up our OASIS database so that all our data will migrate successfully to the new library system. Mapping of the 2 systems took place on last Thursday and Friday. The actual migration of the data will happen on the 25th of March. Library staff have already been training but there is more to do over the next few weeks and a full day's training for all library staff on 18th March. By 26th March the new system will be operational.

When we begin to operate our new system the staff of our 2 libraries will still have a lot to learn. We will need you to be very patient with us. A new system will also mean that we have to change many of our current processing and communication practices including lessons on how to use the system. So we are all in for a very interesting time.

AN E BOOK COLLECTION AND BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE

E books for our very carefully selected boys' fiction collection will still have to be purchased and individually chosen by our 2 librarians. The cost will roughly be the same as purchasing paper based resources. Our parents who donate to the Library Fund currently pay for all of these. At present we are loaning out approx 8000 resources annually to our students. Both our Librarians hope that the convenience of E books, especially as all of our boys this year own a device to read them on, will mean boys read even more than they have done. Borrowing our e-book collection will also register as a loan so we will see this quite soon in our statistics on our system. The Librarians will make sure everyone is informed regarding the successful reading of e books. The Junior Library will concentrate on purchasing ebooks this year in order to build a viable collection quickly.

World Challenge: an unexpected journey

Our following week in Africa was spent along the Okavango Delta, an impressive delta system full of wildlife

and vegetation. Our first night was spent at the 'Audi Camp', a small campground for passing tourists which also offered a 'mokoro' (traditional African canoe) guided trip along the Okavango, staying one night in the African wilderness. After our first attempt at something resembling fried rice, we packed up camp to set off for our boat station via a huge multi-terrain bus. Each mokoro fit two people with small bags, just enough for absolute basics and food for the night.



The mokoro canoes were paddled along using long wooden poles to push off the shallow river bottom, the

trip to our campsite taking an hour. After setting up camp, we were offered the chance to try paddling the canoes ourselves: This turned out to be highly difficult, despite how easy it looked! There were many crashes and bumps that day with both mokoros and river banks, and we all returned after an hour tired and hot.

In the afternoon, we took a 2 hour bushwalk around the savannah around our campsite, observing hippos, elephants, zebras, baboons and giraffes in a completely untouched and wild area of bushland. Being isolated by rivers, there were no people or cars in the area, meaning the wildlife was plentiful and unaffected by poaching, a major issue in Botswana.

Just 100m from our campsite, we encountered a huge herd of around 30 wild elephants, lit by the fantastic afternoon sun. After our tuna mayo pasta dinner, we were treated to a traditional song and dance by our mokoro polers, which was very enjoyable in the dim light of

the campfire.

Our breakfast of traditional African 'papata' was somewhat basic, but it fuelled us for another 4 hour bushwalk looking for more herds of animals. Our adventure complete, tired and hungry, we set off back to Audi camp with some fantastic photos and the experience of a lifetime. We spent a third night back at Audi camp, making the most of the shower and toilet facilities at the site (despite the infestation of giant moths!).


Directions:

- Students are to attend regular classes for periods 1 & 2 (recess). Students leave for Centennial Park at the start of Period 3 for the Cross Country carnival.
- On the day of the carnival, Year 7 students are to wear either PE gear or sportswear for the day.
- Students are to cross the road at lights only.
- Runners should eat their lunch at the recess break, so not to get sick while competing in the race.
- New students will have a pre-race course walk to familiarise themselves with the course.
- Stay in supervised viewing area and watch the other years until your race is called.
- When your race is called go to the starting area.
- At the finish you will be given a place ticket.
- If you are in the first 15 places you go to the first 15 table to have your position recorded, and then proceed to your House Roll Table.
- All runners to proceed with finish ticket to your House Roll Table to have your attendance marked.
- Tell the teacher your name, roll class and finishing position.
- After the race you will be dismissed by a teacher.

Rules: You must run in shoes. • Stay on the course and follow directions from course marshals. • Spectators must stay within the viewing area and are not permitted on the course. • Winning house determined by the lowest total of the first ten runners to finish. • To qualify for the Award scheme you must compete & finish. • Top ten runners will comprise the provisional school team to compete at the zone. • Only the first 15 places will be timed. • Cross Country Champions will be selected from this event. Any MIC ruling is final. Additional The School Cross Country is the first qualifying event within the CHS Competition. The first 10 runners for each age division will make up the school team for the Eastern Suburbs Zone Info: Carnival. The first 10 runners at the Zone Carnival will compete at the Sydney East Regional Carnival and the first 10 runners from Regional Carnival go on to the NSW All Schools Carnival.


