Recent Events

I have been extremely impressed by the rationality, maturity, self-discipline, forbearance and compassion exhibited by students, staff, parents and the wider High community in responding to recent events. It demonstrates to others our remarkable cooperative strength to stand together when tested. It also shows that the democratic principles of natural justice and procedural fairness in a free and civil society are being modelled by us. Thank you all.



Summer Sport Co-payments

It is an expectation that all boys who participated in summer sport should now pay the co-payment set by the school as standard \$140 or a higher amount as

decide by the Supporters Group for that activity. For example, sailing is a sport with a low ratio of staff to students; it requires the use of a safety boat at all times and uses expensive equipment. The cost to participate is \$286 for term 1 as determined by the Sailing Committee. I encourage all parents to pay promptly the amount levied for their son's sport. To help provide teacher supervision, WH&S and duty of care compliance, parents are also asked for an annual *Co-curricular Supervision Levy*. This one-off charge covers as many sports as your son might compete in – for elite athletes that can be as many as four.

Trusts under SHSF Management

The *Sydney High School Foundation* is Trustee for funds held on the school's behalf to be used for specific purposes. Movement in the Trust accounts for 2014 were: Ethel Killip Memorial Art Collection (\$122,026 to \$124,525); Mitchell Seow Memorial Trust (\$7348 to \$7506); The Prizes Trust (\$85,816 to \$90,137); the SBHS Scholarship Trust (\$77,717 to \$79,240); and the Anzac Fund Trust (\$17,104 to \$32,005). A proportion of the interest from the investment of these funds (reset at 50%) is paid to the school to help fund the purposes of the Trusts, the remainder is reinvested to grow the Trusts. The Sydney High Foundation manages the *Sydney High School Building Fund*. Movements for 2014 were \$544,066 to \$947,391. The Foundation provides an ongoing financial service to the school *at no cost* and I want to acknowledge how beneficial the relationship is, with over \$1.28m under management on behalf of the school.

Libraries Management Committee

Elaine Sadler (P & C representative), Madeleine Rigby (HT Supervisor of Librarians) and I met recently for our annual review of the libraries. The Library

Management Committee, advises on the operation of the two school libraries. The libraries accommodate up to 230 boys between them. Resources and research services are provided. Parents contribute significantly to the operation of the libraries by making tax deductible donations to the *Student Research and Resources Fund*. Movements in the fund for the year were: opening balance \$62,467; income \$131,674, expenditure \$169,477; carried forward \$24,664. Each library has a budget of \$17,500 for books, subscriptions, e-books and resources. Supervision for the early Junior Library opening times is paid for by the Fund. A part time School Assistant in the senior library is paid for from the fund and a large proportion of the salary of the second Librarian comes from the Fund because DEC pays for only one Teacher Librarian. I ask for your continued support for this Fund which directly benefits the learning environment of every boy.

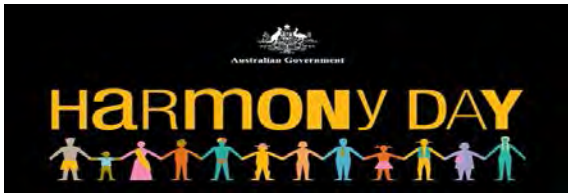

EXCITING WEEK FOR OUR 2 LIBRARIES THIS WEEK – “OLIVER” IS INSTALLED WEDNESDAY

Our library staff has a new library system to learn with up to date online features. We will now be able to create an e-book collection for SBHS readers. We are sure that Sydney Boys High reading statistics of 8000 loans a year will improve with the new offer of paper based mixed with online reading resources. We have held off our purchases this year until we had this new system as the Junior Library will be spending the **bulk of Library Fund donations on e-book purchases**. We look forward to our new look system which will do *automatic reservations* and instant returns with *automatic email and SMS linked overdue messages*. Searching is self-explanatory. We would love everyone to have a go at using our new system. See how clever you are at figuring it out for yourselves. Teach you later!

EXPLORING OVERDRIVE (FOR E-BOOK PURCHASES)

I have spent several days this week exploring *Overdrive* for e-books to purchase – one e-book system which we will be using to purchase our e-collection. Boys if you feel like making some recommendations for purchase please google *Overdrive* yourselves and download the covers and e-mail them to me to buy for you. Our Library email address is library@sbhs.nsw.edu.au. E-books just like library books will only be available for loan one at a time. If the book is out to another boy you will have to reserve it or renew it just as you reserve or renew a paper based book. The good bit for everyone is that *e-returns will be automatic*.

THE RUDD AND ISAACS BASED ALTERNATIVE RESERVATIONS AND RENEWALS SYSTEM FOR OASIS AND OUR ONLINE CATALOGUE – huge thanks to David and James!

The system we have had for the last 5/6 years which enabled our students to renew books and see if reservations had come in was actually created by our own systems managers - James Rudd and David Isaacs. Both our libraries have benefitted from this system which allowed our librarians and our whole school to feel that we were operating a much less outmoded library system. In fact our systems managers had also put our Library Catalogue online for our students to search well before the DEC caught up and put this online for the whole State. So not just for the SBHS Portal system and SBHS Webpage but also our SBHS Library systems we owe our thanks.

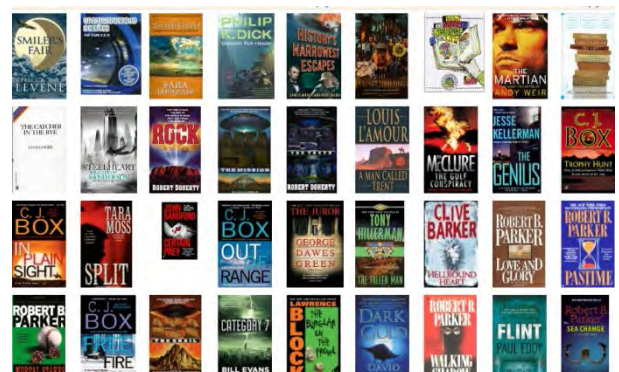
E-BOOKS AND BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE –what a plus for improved literacy for DEC schools!

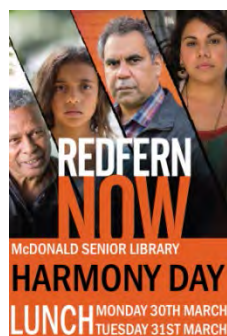
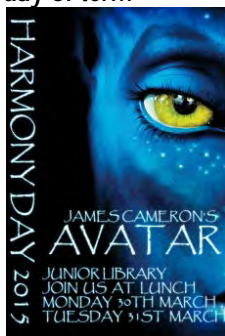

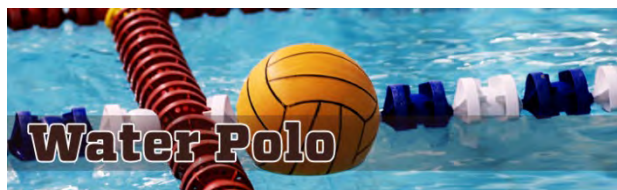
Summer Sport 2014-2015 Observations



Over the course of the 2014-2015 summer season a number of promising observations and improved results were made. Since we have implemented the sports policy, attendance across all sports has increased and it appears our boys are also enjoying the extra training sessions. Subsequently this has started to pay dividends for the school as the increased number of skill and fitness sessions has made us more competitive across the board in the AAGPS competition. Heading into the last few weeks of the summer season our 1st and 2nd grade basketball and 1st and 2nd grade tennis teams were all in with a fighting chance of wrapping up the premierships.

CONGRATULATIONS

Our 1st and 2nd grade basketball teams prevailed under pressure to take out the championship. A massive congratulations to both the players and coaches as this is the first time we have secured both premierships in the one season. Congratulations also to our 1st and 2nd grade tennis teams who finished a commendable 3rd overall. To the pool and our 16s and open swimmers are performing well and we look forward to what they can produce over the next few Friday nights heading into the GPS championship carnival.



The SBHS water polo program continues to grow now entering 5 teams into the competition. Our 14A team has improved out of sight after gaining a wealth of experience playing against 'A' teams from other schools. The schools 1st grade team has performed well this season finishing 5th overall in the GPS/CAS 2nd Grade competition, our best performance to date.

A particular highlight for our cricket fraternity was the winning start to the season for our new 13A team. We hope they can build on this in upcoming seasons. Furthermore, our reverse outright win for our 1st XI

cricket team was a memorable one for the staff and players involved. Our boys need to build on this for upcoming seasons and produce consistent performances in all of our AAGPS matches.



From a sports administration point of view, the majority of parents have welcomed the transition to emailing rather than writing notes for sports absences on Saturdays

and for training sessions. This has sped up the process of monitoring



absences, checking for accuracy and legitimacy of information from our boys. The key here is communication. Not only are boys expected to communicate their absences via the students portal and with their parents emailing through, but also by following up with verbal communication with their coach/MIC of their specific sport.

Sports policy

The summer season of 2014-2015 marks the 3 year review of our current sports policy. Whilst we have more accuracy with our teams and data, it is somewhat disappointing to see a lot of our Years 10, 11 and 12 boys opt to not be involved in sport. Each season a staggering 18.5% of our boys are choosing not to be involved in Saturday AAGPS sport. Further to this, we are also seeing 9.5% of our boys electing to not be involved in AAGPS sport all year round. This is extremely disappointing considering the opportunities our boys have at this prestigious school. Part of our policy is the expectation of boys to be involved in two AAGPS sports each year. Despite the academic pressures heading into the senior years, boys who participate in our sports program benefit greatly. This includes managing their own time better, extra fitness, a healthier lifestyle and best of all – playing sport with friends in a team environment. I challenge the current senior years to lift the standard of participation and set an example by contributing to the school's sporting future.

Rowing Dinner

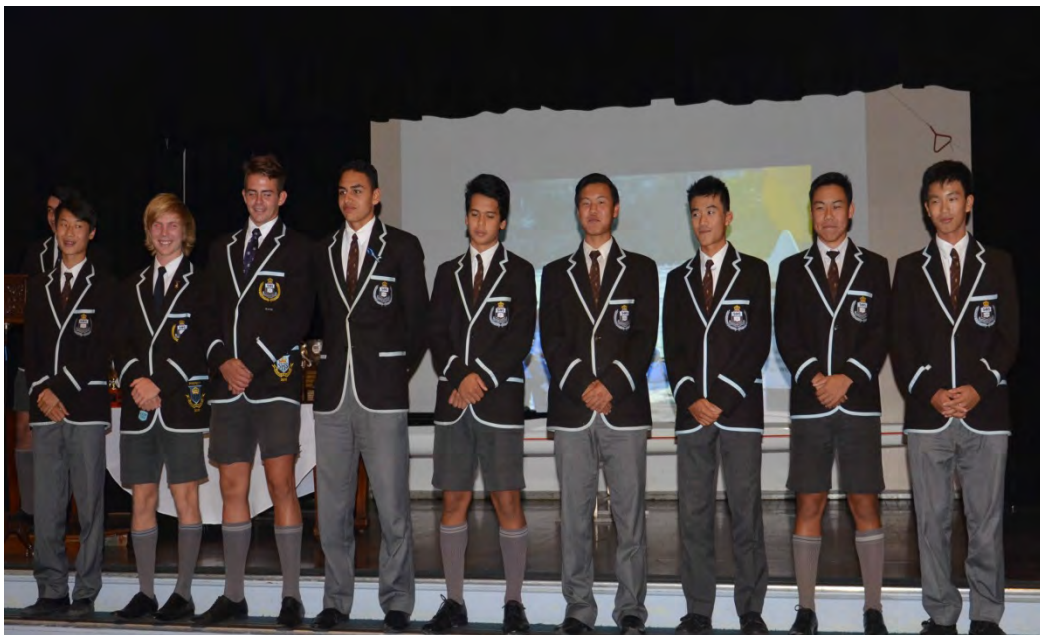
