### **Capital Punishment**

The executions of Andrew Chan and Mvuran Sukumaran this week have focussed the nation's attention on human rights issues surrounding crime and punishment. Irrespective of the moral question of state sanctioned killing, two immediate consequences follow. The men concerned have no opportunity to continue to try and live purposeful and redemptive lives, even if one's constrained by prison walls. Their extended families have had to endure years of suspenseful suffering and now grief at their violent passing. Their choices to maintain contact with incarcerated relatives have also been denied them. Ripple effects on many others result from capital punishment as a state policy. Sadly, they extend to us here in the High community.

## Anzac Day Commemorative Assembly



Ciaran Farrell, Vishal Karnamadakala, and Chanum Torres (Year 11) delivered their interesting and varied

perspectives on the significance of Anzac Day. The boys related values and dispositions lauded during these painful historical events to their experiences and those of others in a contemporary context. The idea of the Anzac spirit informing personal and national behaviour demonstrated the social and personal relevance of this day of commemoration and reflection. My address is reprinted below:

Distinguished guests, Old Boys, staff and students, welcome to High's Anzac Day Assembly. I acknowledge this morning the Gadigal people of the Eora nation as the custodians of the land on which we meet and pay my respects to elders past and present and extend that respect to any Aboriginal people here today. We welcome again representatives from our local RSL sub-branches Ross Whittle (SHS 1967) from Maroubra RSL, and Old Boys Alf Tremain (SHS 1957) and Commander Andrew Dale RAN (SHS 1965).



It is appropriate on this centenary of Anzac Day to reflect on the service of Australia's men and women in air combat missions in Iraq at the invitation of the Iraqi government. We wish our recent deployment of training personnel to Iraq a safe return. Our thoughts are also with those who serve still in Operation Highroad in Afghanistan to train, advise and assist. We honour those who served in Operation Slipper in Afghanistan which has been completed. The campaign extended from October, 2001 until December 31, 2014 at a cost of 41 Australians dead and 256 wounded. We commemorate also the seventieth anniversary of the end of World War II in the hope that world peace can last 100 years and longer.

On the centenary of Anzac Day, the symbol of Gallipoli as Australia's crucible of nationhood and test of manhood on an international stage, retains its importance in Australian culture. "Gallipoli is a country of the mind" for historian Les Carlyon and possibly for most Australians, but increasingly for young Australians, it is also a place of pilgrimage, where they try to connect physically to the context and the ideals of our Australia in 1915. It's as though we are in search of what unites us when our nation is under strain. In daunting terrain, pursuing a hopeless cause for the interests of another country, and fighting an enemy they knew nothing about, young men far from home, distinguished themselves with courage, mateship, sacrifice, loyalty and patriotism. We are right to focus on the human side of what was a military mess.

Strangest of all is the war aim given by Kitchener to Hamilton for which Australia suffered 28,000 casualties during eight months of bitter fighting. Essentially, Hamilton was sent to the Dardanelles with a force of 75,000 to support the British Fleet in its attempt to force a passage through to Constantinople. If the heights on the peninsula were taken artillery could be established to bombard the

forts protecting the straits, allowing a safer passage for a renewed naval attack. Ironically, the mines laid by the Turks in the waters of the straits were much more of a problem to the navy than were the forts.

The same heights and ridges – Achi Baba, Mal Tepe, Chunuk Bair and Hill 971 - gave the Turkish forces great opportunities for defence. At Cape Helles a direct assault could be assisted by a naval bombardment from three sides but the very limiting factor was there was also no room to manoeuvre. The element of surprise was lost due to the extended naval engagement; the enemy was dug in; there was not enough artillery, mortars, hand grenades or ammunition supplied for the attackers. Hamilton had been given less than six weeks to prepare.

During the extended naval attack on the Dardanelles, one month before the landings at Gallipoli, German military expert Von Sanders had been called in by the Turks to organise the defence of the peninsula. He realised early that a landing somewhere on the peninsula was going to be successful. His strategy was to counter attack in force. He protected the coastline in the areas most likely to be attacked with units of men in platoon or company strength only, holding nearly three divisions in reserve to counter the strongest attack, wherever it might be mounted.

On April 25, initial successes by the Anzacs in achieving objectives, such as the promontory at Gaba Tepe, were short lived as Turkish reserves were mobilised for a counter attack. Failing a rapid concentration of forces in the areas where the Allied attack had succeeded on the first day, the campaign was, from a strategic perspective, doomed.

What followed in the agonising next 8 months has been documented vividly, particularly this year in great diaries, books, motion pictures and made for television dramas. One hundred years later, the values and attitudes that continue to define us as Australians are celebrated on Anzac Day as an unequivocal national day of remembrance and reflection about what we were, what we have retained and what we've become as a nation.

### Youth Parliament

What is Youth Parliament?

The YMCA NSW Youth Parliament is a program that gives young people a voice in the running of NSW. It is a place where the opinions and concerns of young people in NSW are heard by those who have the power to make laws. Run by young people, for young people, the program aims to promote youth-led advocacy, active community leadership and legal and parliamentary education.

### When is Youth Parliament?



Youth Parliament consists of two camps, one in the Easter Holidays, which is the Training Camp, and the second one in the winter holidays, which is Residential Camp, when Youth Parliament sits in Parliament at NSW Parliament House.

### How can I get involved?

Youth Parliament 2015 has already started so the next chance to join is in 2016. To join for next year, applicants can either get themselves nominated by a Member of NSW Parliament, Legislative Assembly or Legislative Council, (which gives priority), or send in an application. Youth Parliament does have an age restriction of generally Senior School, so there is a program called Junior

Parliament available to the Junior School for those interested. Junior Parliament 2015 Registrations have yet to open, so I urge all interested to keep an eye out on the YMCA NSW Youth and Government website, as well as those interested in joining Youth Parliament next year.

What has happened so far in Youth Parliament 2015?

So far it has been Training Camp, where, we sat in our Committees and drafted our Bills or Reports. Training Camp is where all the preparation work is done, such as deciding on topics for our Bills/Reports, then writing them up to present and debate at Parliament during Residential Camp. Training Camp is also where everyone gets to meet new friends which is really great fun, especially as everyone around are young people who are interested in and highly engaged with politics and the world around us. It is also where you get taught about the intricacies of the Australian political system.

Everyday there are also Mock Parliamentary Debates, where people are divided up into Government and Opposition and debate Bills, Reports or Matters of Public Importance. For me, these were some of the most memorable experiences from Training Camp, especially for a Report Debate where I was called on to be the Leader of the Government in the Legislative Council. This type of debating is like no other: speaking times are short, from 20 seconds to 2 minutes. It's fast and furious; insults from both sides of the House are thrown around regularly. Another unique feature of these are the interiections. Interiections are when Members who do not have the Call (aka are not speaking) are allowed to call out sharp, short and witty comments at their own discretion to attack the opposition, or defend their own speaker in the case of a "Hear, Hear". It was absolutely thrilling for me to debate across a heated chamber to persuade people to vote for what I am proposing. Voting is done on conscience, not on party lines, so it is always critical to have the best points presented in polished speeches.

This year, six boys including myself, represented High at Youth Parliament.

### RIFLE SH®®TING

On April the 25<sup>th</sup> the Sydney High School Rifle club attended the inaugural ANZAC Day Open Prize Meet at the ANZAC Rifle Range. The shoot was attended by Timothy Tran (12), Jack Zhou (12), Evan Han (12), Keller Huang (12), Angelo Yan (12), Johnson Tran (12), John Huang (11), Ciaran Farrell (11), James Jiang (10), Wen Tao Ruan (10) and Nathan Wong (10). This was the first prize meeting of the year, after having returned to the fullbore program after 5 weeks of training. Each shooter coached themselves for the 10 shot match at 500m and the 11 shot match at 600m.

For some, this was their very first prize shoot and they did well despite their nerves of self-coaching. Starting at 500m each shooter took 2 sighters and 10 shots at the target. Timothy Tran took 1st place in C grade with a score of 48 and 5, followed by Ciaran Farrell in 2nd with 48 and 3 and 3rd place being shared by Wen Tao Ruan and Nathan Wong with a score of 48 and 2. In B grade James Jiang took 3rd place with a score of 49 and 6, an admirable effort falling behind first and second place by 1 point. After a successful 500m shoot, each of the shooters were confident in doing well as they moved back to the 600m range marks.

Sitting at the 600m mark the shooters looked towards the sky and saw a huge storm front approaching and hoped that the shoot would finish before it arrived. At 600m Nathan Wong took 4th place in C grade with a score of 51 and 2 out of a possible 55 and 11, a fantastic effort considering it is his first prize shoot. This is followed by Wentao Ruan with a score of 50 and 4 and Ciaran Farrell with a score of 50 and 3. Finishing up the shoot, the storm clouds had just come in and we were relieved that we had managed to finish shooting before it started to rain.

After the storm eased off we headed off to presentation with Timothy Tran awarded a gold medal for 1st place at 500m, James Jiang awarded \$10 for coming in 3rd overall in B grade with a score of 101 and 9 out a possible score of 105 and 21. Within C grade Nathan Wong took 1st place overall with a score of 99 and 4 receiving \$20 and a medal that held some sand from the beach of Gallipoli. Followed by Ciaran Farrell and Wentao Ruan with a score of 98 and 6, Timothy Tran in 4th with 97 and 7 and Jack Zhou in 5th with a score of 97 and 6. Each of these shooters received \$10. A fantastic result from Nathan Wong as this was his first prize shoot. For the newer shooters this was a valuable experience for them as we continue to train in preparation of the GPS shoot.
