At the National Individual Boys Fencing Championships John Tian (Year 10) won gold in the Senior Epée and James Siu (Year 9) won gold in the senior sabre, with Garry Huang (Year 11) third. Changes to the Australian Sports Foundation grants



The ASF was formed in 1986 to provide a tax deduction for donations to sport to incentivise community, corporate and philanthropic investment. The Foundation is registered under the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 as a

type 1 Designated Gift Recipient. It has always given 100% of the money donated to it back to the registered organisations, less a credit card fee where it applied. In recent times public funds are coming under increasing pressure and budgetary cuts have been applied to the ASF. As from July 1, 2015, ASF operating costs (c\$2m pa) will no longer be publicly funded. Grant donated monies in future will be 95% of online donations and 94% of offline donations. In addition, credit card donations will attract a 1% fee or 2% for American Express. These charges will apply from July 1.



High is in the last year of its third ASF project. Sport at High has benefited very significantly from the c.\$750,000 donated by parents and Old Boys since 2001. Next month a new grant agreement will be issued by ASF to all registered organisations. Parents considering giving to ASF for a particular sport are urged to take advantage of the existing arrangements to get the maximum benefit from their philanthropy. It is so much simpler to donate now. Beneath the box there are pictures and donate buttons for each of our sports. From now on this will be the only method available to parents to make donations to the school sports programs.

Sorry Day Assembly

Three of our boys gave moving speeches in poetry and prose to highlight the plight of the 'stolen generation' and to reinforce the message of our society saying 'sorry' for its treatment of Aboriginal people under previous government policies. My speech to the assembly is reprinted below:



Good afternoon and welcome to our Sorry Day Assembly. I acknowledge the Gadigal people of the Eora nation as the custodians of the land on which we meet and pay my respects to elders past and present and extend that respect to any Aboriginal people here today. This week we are hosting our Kamilaroi friends from Boggabilla.

Our Sorry Day Assembly is held during National Reconciliation Week which commences officially today, commemorating the May 27 referendum in 1967 which recognised Aboriginal people as Australian citizens. This week provides us with a period of time each year during which we can take time out to assess or reflect upon our relationships with indigenous Australians.

One perennial issue we must confront is the incidence of Aboriginal incarceration and rate of deaths in custody for aboriginal detainees. One in every thirteen adult Aboriginal males is in prison. Aboriginal people make up merely 2.5% of Australia's population yet comprise 26% of the prison population.

Since the 1991 Royal Commission there have been more than 340 deaths in custody of Aboriginal people. Noel Nannup, a Noongar elder, drove a familiar route to Perth's Casuarina maximum security prison where his 31 year old nephew took his own life with just three months of his sentence left to serve. Noel says: "In some ways, I guess I'm used to it...it's just awful. So, there's another side of me that just aches to the core; you now, about how frustrating it can be to have this happen time and time again."

Nothing much has changed since 1991. One of the Royal Commission's recommendations from that year was that Aboriginal people should be incarcerated as a last resort. Many Aborigines are in gaol because of unpaid fines. Julieka Dhu, aged 22, died in custody after being twice transferred to

the local hospital only to be cleared to return to gaol. She owed \$1000 in unpaid fines. Ironically, the cost to the government of keeping people in gaol is at least \$80,000 per annum. The economics around locking up people for modest amounts owed in fines don't seem at all reasonable. A deeper question is whether imposing fines as a punishment is appropriate in some Aboriginal communities.

My sense of this issue is that racist attitudes towards aboriginal people have not changed significantly in the last twenty five years. In the USA black Americans are frequently being shot 'on suspicion'. In Australia, Aborigines are more often arrested 'on suspicion'. If we are to have a genuine 'national reconciliation' as a society, we will have to become more proactive and stop turning a blind eye to the problem of police and magistrates who have racist predispositions, acknowledged or not.

Sadly, even within our own school, boys are making racist jokes or posting racist utterances online. 'It is time to change it up.' Our behaviour needs to change for the better. We need to become more tolerant of difference and more inclusive of others. We can resolve to be more aware of and become more sensitive towards racist attitudes and expressions. We need to change what we say and do to others, bearing in mind what we have allowed to happen to our fellow citizens in the past; what continues to happen now, but what we need so much as a nation not to let happen in our future. Let's change it up together!

THE SRC

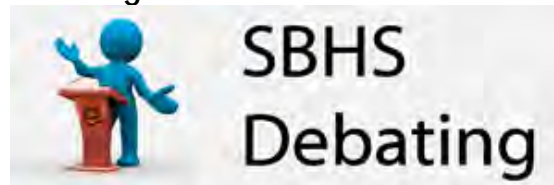

Booking interviews with your son's teachers

This year we will again use a web based electronic scheduling system for arranging interviews. This produces better results for all participants, especially more compact time schedules for both parents and teachers. The system works as follows –

- On Tuesday 9 June all parents of boys in Years 9 and 12 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book.
- On Thursday 11 June all parents of boys in Year 7 and 11 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book.
- On Tuesday 16 June all parents of boys in Years 8 and 10 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book.
- This email will be sent to the address currently held by the school. If you have not received this email by the following day (10, 12 or 17 June) or, if your email address has changed from what had been previously advised to the school, you should notify the school at ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au advising of this. Please indicate your son's name and roll class or date of birth so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview. (If you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown.) At the same time you can indicate your availability between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from two days before the interviews.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all Years will be dismissed from class at 2:40pm each day. School Special buses will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these buses.
- *Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration.* If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date, or contact by telephone arranged.

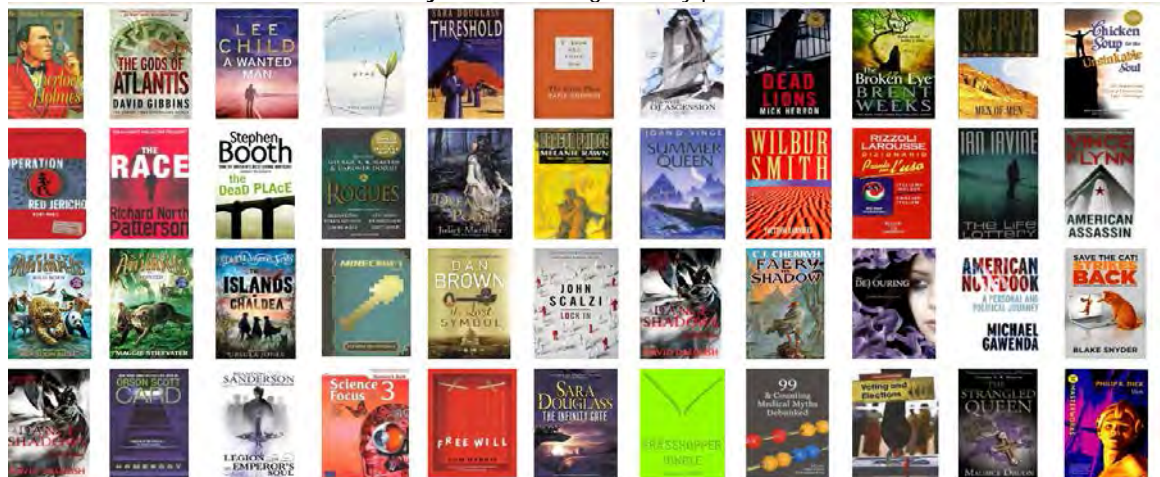

Thanks also to our school Executive for giving us time to in-service ourselves on this system.

Thirdly I would like to thank our extraordinary **Library Monitors** – particularly **Darren Huang (Yr 9)** – but also **Roy Wu (Yr 9), Albert Yang (Yr11) and Lashan Da Silva (Yr9)** who continually take on heroic tasks and put in huge hours of assistance to our Library. At present these boys are going through our entire collection to ensure that all books have covers uploaded so that boys can be more interested in the resources we have right here on hand. Our new library system provides us with greater opportunities to display resources in a visually interesting way particularly if the covers are uploaded. These monitors have also refreshed our Library signs and put them up on the new shelf sides – Thank you **Jim our GA** for erecting these for us. The monitors also display new resources on the Library corridor windows. They also work on the Front Page of Oliver which continually changes and advertises our coming school events.

Fourthly I would like to thank regular donor **Meredith Thomas** (Library Staff) for refilling the Sara Douglas Series. I would also like to thank **James Rudd** Old Boy and IT who donated 31 resources. Jenni May (Art) also donated 4 History books. At \$15 a pop for paperbacks and more for Science texts these donations were valuable ones – rough approximation – these donations are worth over \$1000 taken all together.

Expedition to Southern India and Sri Lanka

This World Challenge program will be an exciting opportunity for a team of students to research, fund and lead their own 28 day expedition to the fascinating countries of India and Sri Lanka.

The expedition will be preceded by 19 months of training and preparation. During this time, team members will learn a great deal about their destinations and research the itinerary options with the support of their Program Facilitator and Customer Support Advisor from World Challenge.

This team involvement will continue during the expedition itself when they will take on responsibility for leading the team, managing the budget, liaising with local guides and successfully achieving their objectives with the guidance of a World Challenge Leader. The whole program will teach and develop essential transferable life skills including financial management, leadership, teamwork, communication, organisation and decision making.

The expedition in India takes place in the states of Kerala and Tamil Nadu. The environment is hugely diverse: the Western Ghats are mountains up to 2890m, covered in tea and spice plantations, forests and limestone and granite cliffs. On the coast, Kerala is much hotter with coconut and banana palms everywhere, peaceful backwaters and incredible birdlife. The main trekking area is through the Cardamom Hills in the area around Munnar. There is amazing biodiversity in this area and the team can trek through tea plantations and wonderful green scenery down to a beautiful lake on the valley floor. The students can experience a fantastic adventure and immerse themselves in the diverse culture of vibrant Southern India.

While in Sri Lanka the community engagement phase is the main focus of the expedition. Teams will work with local villages and schools and help them with a wide variety of project work which may include tasks such as helping to renovate community buildings. The students will live and work alongside locals during their project and get to learn about the areas they are visiting.

You are spoilt for choice when it comes to the 'Rest and Relaxation' phase of the expedition. There's the option to visit a local elephant sanctuary, relax on one of the beautiful beaches on the south coast, climb the 5500 stairs of Adam's Peak in time for the sunrise or even go on a jeep safari in a national park! For those seeking out a bit of an adrenaline kick the white water rafting available in Sri Lanka will provide the taste of adventure they're searching for.



RIFLE SHOOTING

On the 23rd of May, the Sydney High School Rifle Club headed up to Cessnock for the annual Cessnock Prize Shoot. Timothy Tran (12), Jack Zhou (12), Keller Huang (12), Gordon Huang (12), Desmond Chiang (12), Johnson Tran (12), Angelo Yan (12), Evan Han (12), Ciaran Farrel (11), Julian Tu (11), John Huang (11), Nathan Wong (10), Dallas Yan (10), Kieryn Mascarenhas (11), James Jiang (10), Tom Nguyen (10), Jason Hidijat (9) and Henry Deng (9) are the members of the team who took part in this open individual prize shoot. Arriving at the range we set up our tents and prepared ourselves for the day ahead by pushing the bus out of the mud, a great team bonding exercise! We ended the day preparing our rifles for the day ahead, ensuring that we would have the correct settings.

The next morning, the team was up early, ready for the day's shoot ahead of them. Everyone was a bit cold and numb but we warmed up by the time they got down to shoot. The prize shoot contained 3 shoots at 500 and 600 yards. It was a great day for the shoot with no wind and clear skies, this was clearly reflected in the results the shooters received. At the first 500 yard shoot, Tom Nguyen shot an exceptional score of 49 and 4 out of a possible 50 and 10, a tremendous effort for his first prize shoot. This score was followed by Desmond Chiang with a score of 49 and 3. In B Grade, James Jiang took third place with 49 and 6 and John Huang taking fourth with 49 and 5. Ending the first shoot at 11am, the shooters were looking forward to the second stage as the sun continued to shine in the clear skies above them. The second range was at 500 yards again. The scores started to drop off a little but the shooters still pulled through with excellent scores. In C grade, Desmond Chiang took second place with a score of 48 and 3. In B Grade Nathan Wong took third with a score of 48 and 4. Taking a break for lunch allowed time for the team to relax and prepare for the 600 yard range. At 600 yards, the skies started to cloud up making sighting challenging and the shooters were hoping that we would be able to wrap up before the rain came. In C grade Timothy Tran came first with a score of 50 and 2 followed by Jack Zhou in third with a score of 48 and 3. In B Grade there were excellent shoots with James Jiang taking first place with 50 and 8 (an A Grade score, and a SHSRC Inc record) with John Huang taking second with a score of 50 and 6.

Overall, in C grade Desmond Chiang came second with a score of 143 and 7 out of 150 and 30, with Timothy Tran coming in third with a score of 143 and 5. Ciaran Farrell came in 4th with a score of 143 with 5, on a count back. In B Grade James Jiang took second place with 147 and 18 and John Huang taking first place with 148 and 14 moving him up to A grade. A great effort for John! Other commendable scores came from Ciaran Farrell with 49 and 1, Angelo Yan 45, Johnson Tran 47, and Jason Hidijat 48 and 1, a great effort for their first prize shoot. Overall this trip was great training for all the shooters as we head towards the GPS Shoot.

The score lines may not look favourable, but watching the boys battle out for the whole match was a credit to the players and coaches. With three of our top 1st XI players unavailable we were quite impressed with the boys' attitude and performance. In the 2nd XI they played well, but lacked composure and speed at the back
