Following this Marcus Borscz, Derek Nguyen, Vinushan Kuganathan and Vasco Santos-Dwyer read poems and speeches they had written. These were moving and demonstrated a genuine apology to the Indigenous people. We don't know what they were thinking, When they first saw white men, But the mistake that we made, We will never make again.


What we are trying to say, Is that we apologise. For what we did to you, Caused cultural compromise.

## Water Music? No, Wagnermusik!

Last Saturday evening (May 30) I went to the Verbrugghen Hall at the Conservatorium of Music. One of my former students was going to play with the SYO (Sydney Youth Orchestra) so I fought my way from Wynyard through the pram-pushing crowds of Vivid! Sagar (HSC 2014) met me at the entrance and he looked very elegant and grown up. Another member of the orchestra joined us when she heard us speaking German – she had learned German through the Open High School – and her teacher was the mother of one of my current students.

The triangle clanged, the members of the audience went into the auditorium, the large orchestra was on stage tuning instruments and there was a general hum of anticipation. Minutes ticked away – no Concert Master, no Conductor. After some more time had passed someone came out with a microphone in his hand and informed us that one of the sprinklers in the instruments room had come on, was damaging the pianos and sheet music and had to be dealt with. Half the orchestra jumped up to rescue what could be rescued. The audience speculated on how this might have happened. Then the evacuation siren came on – Whoop! Whoop! –

but nobody took it seriously and a few of the musician tried to accompany the single note! The next message was that the firies had to check the building to ensure that the water had not caused any electrical damage and they appeared to great applause from the spectators.

An hour after the advertised starting time everyone was back on the stage and the concert commenced. The second piece "Der Ring ohne Worte" (a chocolate bar for the junior student who can translate this!) had all the drama one expects of Richard Wagner and the youthful enthusiasm of the musicians was palpable – they were brilliant. #### Chinese Eisteddfod: My Experience

On May the 30th, the dreaded yet anticipated day finally dawned upon me. It was the Annual National Chinese Eisteddfod Competition, a Chinese poetry recital. For the past few weeks I had been going to rehearsals on a routine basis to prepare myself for this highly prestigious event. I couldn't wait for my performance and I was also curious to see how the other Chinese background speakers would perform. Hopefully I can learn from the others how to improve my Chinese ability. To be frank, I wasn't confident at all about my poem: '父母 心' but after much reassurance from my parents, I finally decided to give it my best shot, and regardless of the result, I will still go away having learnt priceless lessons from the judges' advice.



Honestly, I felt really disadvantaged going into the competition. This is because I am of Shanghainese background, thus my Mandarin is not fluent compared to native Beijing speakers. This proved to be a difficult obstacle to get around as I would often mispronounce a word, and then feel the shame burning on my face. It wasn't a pleasant feeling seeing everyone chuckling at my pronunciation. However being enriched with the philosophy of Confucius, "Our greatest glory is not in never

falling but in rising every time we fall", I didn't give up and mentally made a note to myself- I may not be gifted with talent or brains, but that doesn't mean I can't strive for success.



In preparation, I tried to understand and relate to the poem I was reciting. My poem, in brief, talks about the greatness of our parents and their undying love for us. I felt I could really relate to this poem. For the past few years I had been watching Chinese TV programs and one of them was called 'China Dream Show'. One of the contestants on this variety show was a 60 year old father who carries his disabled son to high school every day. His son weighs more than 100 kg and the walk to school takes at least two hours. They live in a rural village in China, in which they have to cross valleys and mountains battling icy weather to get to a run-down school with only two classrooms.



It is this unselfishness and determination of this father to make sure his son gets the best education he can that really had an extensive impact on me. Even though I haven't personally experienced these shocking events, I started to dwell upon the love my own parents give me,

realising how ungrateful I was. I intertwined all these feelings together when I read my poem in front of the judges. Happiness, guilt and regret inundated me, and I tried to give my very own interpretation of the poem to the judges. It paid off, and indeed I achieved first place in my individual competition.



Overall, I am truly thankful and honoured to be part of this competition. It not only taught me basic moral values, yet it also brought me together with some special friends. It was a great social event, where I met many new faces and together we linked our hands with our love for this rich language passed on by the ancestors. The eisteddfod not only gave me the opportunity to improve my public speaking ability, but it also gave me deep insight into the beauty of Chinese history. China's history spans over thousands and thousands of years, in which one integral part of its illustrious heritage was the poetry written by the famous poets (i.e. Li Bai). Last but not least a special mention must go to Ms Zhang and my fellow group members as without their guidance and support, I would not have achieved the results I did. Thank you! On a final note, I hope everyone can think about participating in this competition. I'll leave you with this quote:

- On Thursday 11 June all parents of boys in Year 7 and 11 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at <a href="https://www.edval.com.au/book">www.edval.com.au/book</a>.
- On Tuesday 16 June all parents of boys in Years 8 and 10 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at <a href="https://www.edval.com.au/book">www.edval.com.au/book</a>.
- This email will be sent to the address currently held by the school. If you have not received this email by the following day (10, 12 or 17 June) or, if your email address has changed from what had been previously advised to the school, you should notify the school at <a href="mailto:ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au">ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au</a> advising of this. Please indicate your son's name and roll class or date of birth so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview. (If you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown.) At the same time you can indicate your availability between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from two days before the interviews.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all Years will be dismissed from class at 2:40pm each day. School Special buses will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these buses.
- Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration. If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date, or contact by telephone arranged.

#### **Expedition to Southern India and Sri Lanka**

This World Challenge program will be an exciting opportunity for a team of students to research, fund and lead their own 28 day expedition to the fascinating countries of India and Sri Lanka.

The expedition will be preceded by 19 months of training and preparation. During this time, team members will learn a great deal about their destinations and research the itinerary options with the support of their Program Facilitator and Customer Support Adviser from World Challenge.

This team involvement will continue during the expedition itself when they will take on responsibility for leading the team, managing the budget, liaising with local guides and successfully achieving their objectives with the guidance of a World Challenge Leader. The whole program will teach and develop essential transferable life skills including financial management, leadership, teamwork, communication, organisation and decision making.

The expedition in India takes place in the states of Kerala and Tamil Nadu. The environment is hugely diverse: the Western Ghats are mountains up to 2890m, covered in tea and spice plantations, forests and limestone and granite cliffs. On the coast, Kerala is much hotter with coconut and banana palms everywhere, peaceful backwaters and incredible birdlife. The main trekking area is through the Cardamom Hills in the area around Munnar. There is amazing biodiversity in this area and the team can trek through tea plantations and wonderful green scenery down to a beautiful lake on the valley floor. The students can experience a fantastic adventure and immerse themselves in the diverse culture of vibrant Southern India.

While in Sri Lanka the community engagement phase is the main focus of the expedition. Teams will work with local villages and schools and help them with a wide variety of project work which may include tasks such as helping to renovate community buildings. The students will live and work alongside locals during their project and get to learn about the areas they are visiting.

You are spoilt for choice when it comes to the 'Rest and Relaxation' phase of the expedition. There's the option to visit a local elephant sanctuary, relax on one of the beautiful beaches on the south coast, climb the 5500 stairs of Adam's Peak in time for the sunrise or even go on a jeep safari in a national park! For those seeking out a bit of an adrenaline kick the white water rafting available in Sri Lanka will provide the taste of adventure they're searching for.



Professor David Weisbrot is the recently appointed Chair of the Australian Press Council. He is also Emeritus Professor of Law and Honorary Professor of Medicine at the University of Sydney. He is a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Law. Prof Weisbrot was President of the Australian Law Reform Commission (ALRC) from 1999-2009 and so is the longest serving President in the ALRC's history.
