



## From the Principal

### High Talent



Congratulations to Max Koslowski, Ganeshmoorthy Chandrasekaran and Thomas Shortridge for their win in the Hume Barbour Regional Final against SGHS at Parliament House last week. Well done to our mock trial team – Hugh Bartley, Arthur Chao, James Goh, Max Koslowski, Thomas Nguyen and Thomas Shortridge who won their case this week. Our Year 10 debating team (Louis Saunders, Louis Shapiro, Akheed Ahamed Razmi) were victorious against the SGHS Year 11 team at the UNSW Debating Competition. Good job, boys!

### Individual Learning and Support Plans (ILSPs)

A recent survey of 600 teachers and principals found that 50% of them didn't have time to focus on the mental health of their students and 20% were not confident in handling the mental health issues of their students. At High we take the psychological health of our students seriously. We know that teachers are experts at solving pedagogical problems but when it comes to depression, diagnosed syndromes, gaming/social media addiction, or relationship issues, professional advice and expertise are needed.

With our Wellbeing team, we are identifying students whose learning is affected by a disability, learning problem or psychological issue blocking their progress. Recently, students whose

outcomes were not up to the school standard were identified and their progress discussed with their Year Adviser, HT Wellbeing and the Principal. The next step is for students to be interviewed by Year Advisers and appropriate strategies implemented. Where it is deemed necessary, our staff will negotiate an Individual Learning and Support Plan that must include the student's parents as partners in the support of their son's learning.

Our School Plan has a target of at least six Individual Learning and Support Plans for each Year group. We also have a legislative obligation to make reasonable adjustments on behalf of any student with an identified disability – using a very broad definition of 'disability'.

### Light Rail Update



Thanks to the efforts of the School Councils of SBHS and SGHS, the design of the planned footbridge over Anzac Parade has been modified in an important feature to improve the safety of students using it. Stairs from the overbridge now will run directly down to the platform, obviating the necessity for students to cross the light rail tracks first, as the original design made them do. The location of the new bridge is adjacent to the SGHS Bear Pit, just south of the existing pedestrian crossing. I would like to thank Ron Trent, Nea Saunders and Ian Sweeting in particular for the time and effort they have invested in achieving better design and functionality outcomes for the proposed light rail.

## Road Safety

Parents are urged to remind their sons about road safety and obeying the lights at marked pedestrian crossing on Cleveland Street and Anzac Parade. On Friday evening one of our Year 8 boys was thrown up onto the chassis and against the windscreen of a taxi while misusing Cleveland Street. He was extremely lucky not to have been more seriously injured.

Please ask your sons to conform to the traffic management systems at all times. "Don't rush" is the safety slogan our own students composed for a previous road safety campaign. All boys should be more aware of the dangers of traffic on our busy streets.



## Sports Policy

The Sports Council brought two recommendations to the School Council. The sports scheduling recommendation was acceptable to the Council. In order to make training schedules more accessible to senior students who are timetabled off on Thursday afternoons, the official training schedule will move to Monday afternoon for seniors for the start of next summer season. The three training sessions will then become: Monday afternoon, Wednesday afternoon and Friday morning or weights sessions/Runners Club. Our expectations of ABC teams remain as a minimum of three sessions per week. Greater commitments are negotiated on a team by team and sport by sport basis. The Sports Council's second recommendation relates to Sports Development and is still under review by staff.

## Financial contributions – 2016

The School Council ratified the financial contributions to be levied for 2016. Established levies and charges were increased in line with CPI changes in 2014-15. The Technology Levy was increased this year to accommodate the increased costs of a school-funded Technical Support Officer and to manage our BYOD program.

- This email will be sent to the address currently held by the school. If you have not received this email by the following day (10, 12 or 17 June) or, if your email address has changed from what had been previously advised to the school, you should notify the school at [ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au](mailto:ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au) advising of this. Please indicate your son's name and roll class or date of birth so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview. (If you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown.) At the same time you can indicate your availability between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from two days before the interviews.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all Years will be dismissed from class at 2:40pm each day. School Special buses will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these buses.
- *Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration.* If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date, or contact by telephone arranged.

## ASX SHARE MARKET GAME Semester 1. 2015

Another highly successful and lucrative game for Sydney High students with Roger Wu and Ellison Zhou, both of Year 10, finishing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the nation and 1<sup>st</sup> in NSW. As their reward the students receive a cheque for \$1,100 and the School receives a cheque for \$2,500! Over 400 SBHS students participated in the Semester 1 Game, with a total participation of some 18,000 students nationwide. Over this Game period, the market has been quite volatile, moving both up and down quite a bit and then falling significantly at the end of April. Our students have found it quite challenging, however, they were not alone as only 36% of syndicates finished in profit with the average portfolio value being \$49,847.63.

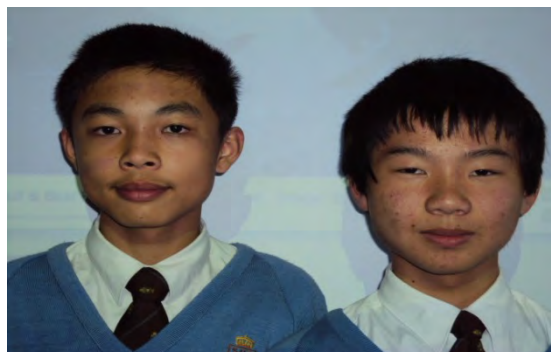
The following figures show how difficult it has been:

- The All Ordinaries (XAO) was down 3.47%
- The best performing sector was materials up 3.31% followed by information technology up 1.74%
- The worst performing sector was financials down 8.34% followed by healthcare and industrials both down 4%+
- The top stock was PanAust (PNA) up 61% due to a possible takeover offer followed closely by UGL up 52%, iiNet (IIN) and Oceanagold (OGC) both up over 40%
- The worst performing stocks were Sirtex Medical (SRX) down 29% and MMA Offshore (MRM) down 27% and BlueScope Steel (BSL) down 25%.

**Nirvana Rocks ~ Roger and Ellison in Year 10 at Sydney Boys High:** Portfolio Value: \$64,461  
Roger and Ellison bought and sold in the Game multiple times, selling some stocks and then buying them again – one stock he did this with a lot was with SRX. Stocks he invested in included BHP, BSL, NST, ASX, CCL, BLD, BCI, TPI, PNA, PMU, CDD, SFR, JBH, DSH, QUB, UGL, SRX, BCI, AGL, BK, ILU, ERA, GEM, GXL, RMD, SEA and CPU.

**Strategy:** "Initially, the stocks we invested in dropped slightly and we became disillusioned. Then we started to do more research and started to watch 'The Business' on ABC which provided some great insights into the Share Market. Furthermore, we watched the US market closely for any possible impacts on the ASX. Overall there was a great deal of luck involved in our success; two shares proved to be highly profitable for us, Sirtex Medical (buying and selling at the right time) and Resmed and in the latter stages a risky trade on Blue Scope Steel almost proved fatal but we survived

## Expedition to Southern India and Sri Lanka

This World Challenge program will be an exciting opportunity for a team of students to research, fund and lead their own 28 day expedition to the fascinating countries of India and Sri Lanka.

The expedition will be preceded by 19 months of training and preparation. During this time, team members will learn a great deal about their destinations and research the itinerary options with the support of their Program Facilitator and Customer Support Adviser from World Challenge.

This team involvement will continue during the expedition itself when they will take on responsibility for leading the team, managing the budget, liaising with local guides and successfully achieving their objectives with the guidance of a World Challenge Leader. The whole program will teach and develop essential transferable life skills including financial management, leadership, teamwork, communication, organisation and decision making.

The expedition in India takes place in the states of Kerala and Tamil Nadu. The environment is hugely diverse: the Western Ghats are mountains up to 2890m, covered in tea and spice plantations, forests and limestone and granite cliffs. On the coast, Kerala is much hotter with coconut and banana palms everywhere, peaceful backwaters and incredible birdlife. The main trekking area is through the Cardamom Hills in the area around Munnar. There is amazing biodiversity in this area and the team can trek through tea plantations and wonderful green scenery down to a beautiful lake on the valley floor. The students can experience a fantastic adventure and immerse themselves in the diverse culture of vibrant Southern India.

While in Sri Lanka the community engagement phase is the main focus of the expedition. Teams will work with local villages and schools and help them with a wide variety of project work which may include tasks such as helping to renovate community buildings. The students will live and work alongside locals during their project and get to learn about the areas they are visiting.

You are spoilt for choice when it comes to the 'Rest and Relaxation' phase of the expedition. There's the option to visit a local elephant sanctuary, relax on one of the beautiful beaches on the south coast, climb the 5500 stairs of Adam's Peak in time for the sunrise or even go on a jeep safari in a national park! For those seeking out a bit of an adrenaline kick the white water rafting available in Sri Lanka will provide the taste of adventure they're searching for.



# RIFLE SHOOTING

The Sydney High Rifle Club headed north towards Wingham for the annual Wingham Rifle Club Open Prize Meet. This year, the group of boys consisted of John Huang (11), James Jiang (10), Tom Nguyen (10), Wentao Ruan (10), Nathan Wong (10), Dallas Yan (10), Kai Mai (9) and Henry Deng (9). They were all eager for the prize shoot. Arriving at Wingham in darkness, the team pitched their tents and prepared our rifles and ourselves for the shoot the next day.

Early next morning, the team was woken by a flock of laughing kookaburras. Reluctantly, the team raised from the warmth of their sleeping bags and had breakfast. Soon, the shoot will begin. On the first day, the prize meet included 3 shoots, one at 600 yards, then at 500 yards and finally, at 400 metres. The shooters did brilliantly. John Huang scored a 49.5 for the first range, 49.6 for the second range and another 49.6 for the last range which had placed in the top half of A grade. Kai, at his first prize meet scored a daily aggregate of 136 with 6 centres, an outstanding performance! Wentao won the daily aggregate for C grade with 143 and 10 centres. James Jiang scored a 49.4 for the 500 yard range and Nathan Wong scored a 49.5 for that same range. Later that night, the prizes were awarded and the students were paired with their A grade partner. The purpose of an A grade partner was for them to teach the students their experience. After a talk with their A grade partners, the students felt more confident.

The next day, the shoot contained a 500 yard range and two 600 yard ranges with the last one being a 15 shot match. The shooters again, were exceptional. For the 500 range, Wentao scored an impressive 49.5. On the first 600 yard range John Huang scored a possible, a 50.5! In the 15 shot match, Nathan Wong scored a 74.9 out of a possible 75, which was at an A grade standard for the difficult match.

Tom Nguyen shot an aggregate of 165 with 8 centres which won the C grade aggregate for the second day. Wentao Ruan, followed closely with an aggregate of 164 with 13 centres. Overall, Wentao was placed first in C grade with 307.23 , Tom placed 4<sup>th</sup> and Kai was placed 5<sup>th</sup>. James Jiang was placed 5<sup>th</sup> in B grade with 308.26 and John Huang was placed 17<sup>th</sup> in A grade with a score of 317.28. Also, Sydney Boys High School was awarded the schools trophy and John Huang was awarded the best student shooter. The team has learnt valuable experience from their A grade partners and from individual shooting. All in all, all the shooters have excelled in the Wingham Open Prize Meet and are looking forwards to future camps.

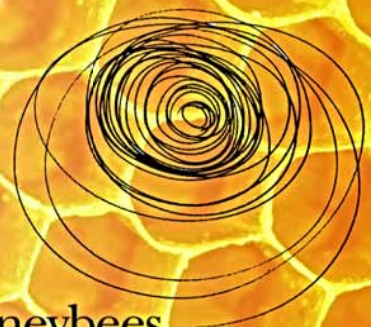
