Interpreting Year 8 Reports

All boys should now have their reports. Parents need to know that a few marks up or down near



cut-off scores for Distinctions or High Distinctions can make a big difference in their sons' points' totals. When moving from Year 7 into Year 8 students get their

first choice process - one language or two? As

a consequence, some boys do ten subjects as in Year 7 and others, nine. To calculate the boys' scores, their best 9 subject outcomes are counted. So, boys doing more subjects may have an advantage. Language choice can affect ranking outcomes. For example, some boys chose to do Classical Greek for the first time in Year 8. Others chose Chinese Advanced. Both of these are demanding subjects. Getting Distinctions in these subjects is harder – fewer students do them, too. Boys not doing two languages have to have their PE results counted. Sometimes boys in Year 8 start to think about what electives they might do in Year 9 and what the compulsory subjects there are. These future choices might affect their motivation to succeed in some of the compulsory subjects that they are doing currently. Quite a few boys who have done well in their Yearly Report take their foot of the accelerator and coast through semester one, with effects on their ranking. Often, they get back on track by the time of the Yearly Report again. In short, there are many reasons for big swings in rank. I think that +/-35 positions means something has altered. Usually, big positive or negative fluctuations are due to learning dispositions: boys listening in class, taking notes, doing homework and revising before assessment periods.

School Uniform

During cold days in winter a few boys begin to wear unapproved items of clothing to school. We see too many random 'hoodies' scarves and caps. Parents are reminded that the High Store sells a range of warm clothing that is approved.

Parking on School Grounds

All parents and visitors to the school are asked



to park their vehicles in approved spaces only and to respect 'no parking' signage on the roadway and the 'restricted parking' signs on the walls of the

gymnasium. Vehicles blocking emergency exits or access ways may impede emergency exits from buildings or the site. Also, the bus bay needs to be kept clear for the movement of our two school buses. Thank you for your cooperation.

Student Leave Requests -

Too many parents are ignoring or pleading ignorance about the school policy on **Student Leave of Absence – Extended Leave Travel** requests. This applies to leave that is five school days or more in duration. Parents are reminded that as a matter of policy leave will not be processed or approved unless **four weeks**' notice has been given. Also, cogent reasons for travelling during school term need to be supplied. The effect of this decision is that all leave requests that involve that last four weeks of term must be lodged with me for approval by the end of **week 6**, each term. If you are planning to travel during the school term you need to download, complete and submit the form for my approval by the closing date. As it is now **week 8**, I am going to apply the rule quite strictly.

Booking interviews with your son's teachers

This year we will again use a web based electronic scheduling system for arranging interviews. This produces better results for all participants, especially more compact time schedules for both parents and teachers. The system works as follows –

- On Wednesday 14 June all parents of boys in Year 7 and 11 were sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at <u>www.edval.com.au/book</u>.
- On Tuesday 20 June all parents of boys in Years 8 and 10 will be sent by email details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered at www.edval.com.au/book.
- This email was/will be sent to the address currently held by the school. If you have not received this email by the
 following day or, if your email address has changed from what had been previously advised to the school, you should
 notify the school at ptnight@sbhs.nsw.edu.au advising of this. Please indicate your son's name and roll class or date
 of birth so that the information can be forwarded to you.
- On the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview. (If you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown.) At the same time you can indicate your availability between 3:00 pm and 7:00 pm.
- Once the majority of parents have requested interviews, the overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to download and print from two days before the interviews.
- Periods will be shortened on the days of the interviews. Boys from all Years will be dismissed from class at 2:35pm each day. School Special buses will run to normal schedules and there will be supervision available in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for these buses.
- Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration. If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be made for a later date, or contact by telephone arranged.

RIFLE SH⊕⊕TING

On 9 June 2017, 8 shooters consisting of Dallas Yan (12E), Jason Feng (12S), Nathan Wong (12F), Ricky Li (11F), Royce Xiao (11F), Andrew Lui (10R), Alex Tan (10F), and Dinan Pingamage (10T) went to Wingham Rifle Club to compete in the 66th Wingham Open Prize Meet. Upon an earlier than usual arrival time of 4pm the team pitched their tents, when it started to rain midway. After moving all the luggage from the trailer to the tents, the team went out to buy dinner.

With 2 days of shooting ahead, Saturday's wake up was an early 6am, with the sun barely up. The forecast for the day was up to 120mm of rain, which no-one was looking forward to shoot in. With an 8:00am start to the match, the team quickly had breakfast and handed in the competition paperwork. There was a quick setup for the first range, thanks to preparations made the night before. A distinct lack of shooting scopes quickly became apparent, so old boys had to help some shooters spot their shots. In the first range at 600y, Ricky Li came 2nd in C grade with an impressive score of 48.1, followed by Dallas Yan in 3rd with a 47.4. Nathan Wong shot well with



a 49.2 in B grade. The second range was a 500yd range, with Nathan Wong taking out 1st in B grade with an excellent 50.6. Dinan Pingamage came 2nd in C grade with a score of 48.5, followed by Ricky Li in 3rd, 2 centres behind with 48.3. The final range of the day was 400m, with Ricky Li taking out 2nd place in C grade with a 48.3. Alex Tan shot a commendable 46.4 in C grade at this range. By the end of the day, Ricky Li was coming 2nd in C grade, only 3 centres behind first. Thankfully the forecast amount of rain did not arrive, just showers every now and then during the day. Following the shoot, the team cleaned their rifles before making it to the awards presentation. 1st to 3rd for each range and the daily aggregate received patches, while first also received a prize. Nathan Wong won a heavy duty torch, which was actually surprisingly helpful at night. Dinner was a roast chicken dinner, followed with dessert. The traditional trivia night followed, with Sydney High actually doing relatively

well compared to previous years, scoring double digit scores in one section.

The second day of the shoot started out much like the first, but with a small amount of rain falling. Ricky Li came 2nd in C grade in the first 500y range with an impressive score of 49.5, on count back. Alex Tan shot well with a 48.3, followed by Andrew Lui and Dinan Pingamage with



48.2. In the second range of the day, at 600y, Ricky Li again came 2nd in C grade with a 48.2, with Andrew Lui at 3rd with a 47.4, and Alex Tan at 4th with 47.3. The final shoot of the competition was again at 600y, but out of 75 instead of 50. Nathan Wong shot an incredible 74.9 in B grade, coming 3rd in the range. Dallas Yan came 1st in C grade with a 73.7, followed by Jason Feng in 2nd trailing by 4 centres, shooting 73.3. Ricky Li came first in the second day aggregate, by 1 point, shooting 166.9/175. Dinan Pingamage was 3 points (163.10) behind Ricky, and Alex Tan was 1 point (162.9) behind Dinan. Ricky went on to win C grade overall, scoring 310.16/325. Other noteworthy scores include 314.25 from Nathan Wong, 300.18 from Dinan Pingamage, and 300.15 from Jason Feng.



The second night's presentation included the overall competition aggregate. Ricky Li won a George Foreman grill for winning the second day aggregate, and Dallas Yan won a keyboard and mouse for winning the last 600yd range. Ricky Li also won a multi-purpose tool for winning C grade overall. Afterwards, the night was ours to enjoy and relax, and with no need for an early wakeup, the team stayed up much later than usual. There was the

traditional campfire, which preceded dinner. Dinner was followed up with card games, an almost mah-jong, and karaoke in the clubhouse.

The Wingham shoot this year was a testament to the effort put into training by the shooters, with all shooter's improving on their previous year's score. The largest score increase came from Alex Tan, who improved on last

year by 28 points, and more than doubled his centre count. A special mention also to Dinan Pingamage, who also made a large improvement of 22 points, and 10 extra centres. As vice-captain, it was great to see such close friendships get closer over the 4 days, and will surely bode well as we near the GPS competition in July. Special thanks must go to the Team of Old Boys who made this trip possible.
