End of the Basketball Backboards Funding Project

In 2019 our four indoor courts in the UTS gymnasium were refurbished with state-of-theart glass backboards and shot clocks. The project cost >\$73k. UTS contributed \$30k +GST. The Basketball Committee contributed a \$20k deposit from accumulated funds and undertook to repay the school an additional \$23,195, being the balance of the invoice on completion, in annual instalments of not less than \$2,500. Donations to the Sydney Boys High School Building Fund were solicited. I am

very pleased to announce that the final payment was made to the Building Fund this week as a



result of an appeal this year. The project delivered a competition-class facility, demonstrating what can be achieved when the three interested parties collaborated effectively to drive the project to completion. My thanks again go to Bruce Gordon who managed the project on behalf of the school and UTS.

Interpreting Year 10 Reports – Semester 2

As for the semester 1 report, ranks in Year 10 are varied by several factors. Students who have not performed well in PE will have a slightly reduced ATAR prediction because the calculation is made on 12.3 units (using a pro rata for PE based on time spent). Students who do the online elective receive the average of the other units so as to neither advantage nor disadvantage them, whereas they may have taken another elective and earned an above average score or a below average score. Students accelerating have a harder task than nonaccelerants as they are assessed at stage 6 standard and are scaled to HSC standards. Consequently, their scaled marks may be lower. Students may also lose interest in electives they are not continuing and record weaker results. Electives done for enjoyment are in contrast to the serious efforts that will need to be made in their stage 6 courses. I do not make a judgement on these outcomes. What matters is what happens next, in stage 6. Therefore, students should choose their suite of courses for Year 11 carefully, with insight after research and acting in their own self-interest. Parents should also disaggregate the results to ascertain how their son is going in core and continuing subjects.

NSW Health is offering school vaccination again as school-based learning returns

- Information for parents/guardians

NSW Health has been working with education authorities so that school vaccination can be offered as school-based learning returns.

Program background

In 2021 NSW Health is offering the following vaccines:

YEAR	VACCINE	NUMBER OF DOSES
Year 7	Human papillomavirus (HPV)	2 doses at least 6 months apart
rear /	Diphtheria, Tetanus and Pertussis (dTpa)	1 dose
Year 10	Meningococcal ACWY (MenACWY)	1 dose

While the school vaccination program has been disrupted due to remote learning in some areas, vaccination clinics are being rescheduled as students return to school.

COVID-19 safety measures

NSW Health has implemented additional measures based on expert clinical advice to reduce the likelihood of COVID-19 transmission in school clinics, including:

- nurses vaccinated against COVID-19
- health screening of nurses before clinics
- pre-vaccination screening of students
- physical distancing restrictions at the clinic entrance & observation area
- ensuring the number of students and nurses at the clinic does not exceed the maximum space allowed
- enhanced hand hygiene & environmental cleaning of all surfaces

What parents/guardians should do

There is no need for parents/guardians who have given consent for their child to receive vaccinations at school to take any action, except to:

- contact the school to withdraw consent for HPV, dTpa or MenACWY vaccination if any of these vaccines have been given at the GP
- ensure that students with influenza-like symptoms do not attend school and are tested as soon as possible (<u>www.nsw.gov.au/covid-19/symptoms-and-testing</u>)
- note that there is a minimum dosing interval of 7 days between any routine school vaccinations (HPV, dTpa and Meningococcal ACWY) and any dose of a COVID-19 vaccine

When students will be vaccinated

The second visit for the Year 7 vaccinations and Year 10 Meningococcal catch-up will be offered to consented students at Sydney Boys High School on the <u>7th of December 2021</u>, Tuesday.
