## Memorial Service for Robert Outterside AO, former Headmaster of High 1977-1991

On Wednesday a memorial service was held in the Great Hall for Bob Outterside. More than 150 people gathered to celebrate Bob's remarkable life. John Tuxworth, President of Randwick Rugby Club paid tribute to Bob's career in sport. Family members, Cameron, Robyn and Lisa spoke fondly of him as a father. Sons-in-law played and sang songs admired by Bob and there was a video presentation of his life. It was a moving and high quality service.

#### My eulogy is reprinted below:

'Good afternoon and welcome to you all, particularly to Cameron, Robyn, Lisa and their children on this occasion when we come together to remember and celebrate the life of Robert Outterside, AO. He was indeed a force of nature. I held him in high esteem even before I met him. He was a legendary Principal in the 1980's. I heard about him when I was a Deputy

Principal in Fairfield – this maverick who seemed to be able to be an independent leader in a very big system. How did he manage to do it? How did he sustain it over many years as leader at Manly and at High? He was an innovator in introducing new courses, sharing classes with Sydney Girls and in forging university links. I was inspired by his example from afar. I wanted to be a leader like he was. When I met him in 2000, he impressed me with his charm, his ability to put people at ease, his gift as a raconteur, his incredible memory of people connected with Sydney High, his playful sense of humour and his passion for the School and its standing in the community. He seemed to know everyone. He was very generous with his time. He was a great source of information and wise advice for me in my early years as High's new Principal.

Bob was invaluable in his support for my attempt to get an ethos enhancement class in Year 7 as one of the six incoming classes each year. In June and July of 2002 we lobbied hard to make this change to allow more local residents to gain access to the school. This effort was in response to the Selective Schools Unit Discussion paper of May that year. Bob was the chair of the SBHS Placement Committee. We introduced the idea of 'complementary criteria' as a tool in the selection process and the notion of a 'commitment statement' to be signed by families supporting the ethos of the selective school to which they had applied. We suggested reducing applicant options to one or two (after a recent review the options have been reduced from 4 to 3). We wanted a serious English writing component in the test (a scaled version of which was adopted by the Review). We asked for regulation of Coaching Colleges in respect of their access to test questions (some of which were being repeated in subsequent tests). These test questions were supplied by clients of the colleges. (Later these tests were made public to level the playing field). We proposed the idea of a template to score complementary criteria. We have used these templates at High since we finally were able to bring a class for ethos enhancement into Year 9 in 2007.

We proposed four placement options developed for consideration by the Minister. One of the models suggested an immediate placement of 75% of students in a school by means of the test score alone, with 25% reserved for a consideration of a combination of test score and complementary criteria supplied by the applicants. We had agreement from three selective school principals for this model as members of the Secondary Principals Council Interest groups for Selective Schools. It is ironic that twenty years later, selective school entry rules have been modified along similar lines. The Placement Committee was way ahead of its time. Bob's reputation, stature with the Department and broad network of Old Boys, secured the Action Committee of Old Boys a meeting with Minister for Education Watkins. We did not achieve our objective, primarily because of the media campaign run by the Sydney Morning Herald alleging our Old Boys were racist and were aiming to reduce the number of Asians enrolling at High. The headline 'Old Boys Tell Top School: Let our Sons In' was damaging and completely misleading. Nevertheless, due to Bob's persistence and influence, Minister Watkins granted the school at least a groundsman position for McKay and Fairland caretaking, which has been very helpful to the school over the years. Bob behaved with integrity, forbearance and good cheer throughout the turbulent months of the campaign. He was great to work with. The Old Boys and the School had the same goal - to bring in more ethos-supporting students. We were wedged by the media and a few individual comments by disgruntled Old Bovs.

I was fortunate to work with Bob for nearly a decade as he chaired the *Outterside Management Committee* of the Sydney High School Foundation. He was able to gather people around him who believed in the cause of public education offering a unique opportunity to boys to experience a selective and GPS educational experience. He helped steer the management of the property through several challenges until he retired from the role. He had a school mobile for many years to keep in touch with the school community.

I knew him as a devoted family man. He spent much of his retirement time caring for Dawn, until her passing. He focussed more energy on his extended family as they matured. His devotion to Sydney High had taken him away from them often. I know he really enjoyed the Rugby Reunion we held at the AJC in 2018. Bob loved rugby, mathematics, teaching, socialising and having a punt - not necessarily in that order. His wealth lay in his relationships and friendships. He was a champion of the working class – a rusted on Labor man. He enjoyed mentoring people to help them rise and achieve their goals. He was a scholar, international sportsman, educational leader, coach, family man and friend. He used to comment frequently that in life we can disagree without being disagreeable. He had an expansive, warm and compassionate demeanour towards people and they found it easy to like him. His life was impactful, full, loving and long. His legacy is assured. He will not be forgotten. Valé, Bob'.

## **Enrichment Activities July - August**

It was wonderful to welcome Dr Julie Arlis back to Australia after two years absence. Over recent years, our philosophers have looked forward to the annual pilgrimage to Ascham where Julie's Academy Conference program has provided food for thought and an opportunity to further explore the BIG questions of life, meaning and culture that we confront in our weekly communities of inquiry.



On the 26 July, the *More Able and Ambitious Programme* included valuable advice about interviews at prestigious educational institutions. Questions are designed to gauge lateral thinking, demonstrating the ability to apply thinking to new ideas and contexts. The session was designed to provide students with essential tools for developing high level lateral thinking skills using sample interview questions.

The lecture 'The Philosophy and Politics of the Embryo' was a master class in common law and contemporary issues and of particular value to legal studies and mock trial attendees! Then, we were intrigued by Dr Andrew Pinsent's "I count therefore I am 'Is Mathematics Discovery of Invention?"

Dr Pinsent is a physicist and theologian and philosopher Faculty of Theology and Religion at Oxford University, who delivered his lecture via Zoom at 3am London time due to Covid preventing his travel to Australia.

The Great Debate which rounded off the day was 'This House believes that Science has replaced God.' As usual, SBHS volunteers made an admirable and enthusiastic contribution to the discussion.

## ASX Game and Australian Geography Competition National Winners

This year, it was amazing to see two of our boys win national titles. Oscar Li, winning the National ASX Sharemarket Game and Adit Mahidadia gaining a finals place in the Australian Geography Competition and receiving an invitation to represent Australia in the Global Geography Challenge to be held in Indonesia next year.

## Adit's Report

Representing the state of NSW at the Geography Big Week Out was both a personal achievement and an opportunity for further progression to the international stage. For five days and four nights, I travelled to Darwin in the school holidays, with little information aside from the fact that I would be completing geography-related tasks and fieldwork for the duration of my stay.

The GBWO was an eye-opening and unique trip filled with many fun and interesting experiences along the way. The other 15 like-minded individuals were a pleasure to interact and conduct fieldwork with, and I formed several, strong friendships during my time in the Top End. In addition, the staff were immensely helpful when answering questions and provided valuable insight into geographical processes at the two studied sites, Darwin and Litchfield National Park. These were interesting places that were appropriately covered by the fieldwork, and while the accommodation wasn't the best, the beach volleyball court at Batchelor was certainly an enjoyable experience! One notable observation was the emphasis placed on Indigenous issues and land rights in the Northern Territory, a result of its high Indigenous population and disproportionately poor outcomes for this group.

## **ASX Game Competition**

As per usual our Commerce, Business and Economics students again competed in the ASX Game Competitions. Students received a hypothetical \$50,000 to trade. The boys experienced real live trades and the ups and downs of the ASX. They learned the skill of timing, graphing, P/E ratios, company announcements, dividend timing, speculative behaviours and the impact of business cycles. Oscar Li of Year 9 was announced as the National Winner after three months of trading turning his \$50000 to \$59,032.26 and earning himself a cool \$1000 as prize money. Congratulations Oscar!

## Oscar's Report

"To achieve first in the ASX share market competition I implemented two strategies. The first was dollar-cost averaging. This is where instead of selling on the way down, you buy. Doing this helped me drag my average cost per share lower and lower which helped maximize returns with low risk. To fund this strategy, I would keep at least 35% of my portfolio in cash so I could buy on the dips. Sometimes I had well over the majority of my portfolio in cash and this was due to me believing the market was too volatile or bearish.

The second strategy I applied was to try to predict the market. I did this by keeping up with international affairs, looking at other markets and also doing technical analysis using several indicators.

## SBHS Resistance Band Program

The Sydney Boys High PDHPE program will be rolling out a resistance band program, commencing Week 9 of this term (Term 3). The school has purchased resistant bands for Year 7 students; however, the program is open to all students. Dr Jaggar (Principal) has enthusiastically pushed for this program and he along with the PDHPE faculty believe that boys of this school need to invest time in their physical preparation for sport & PE classes as well as develop skills, attributes, and behaviours for long term positive health.

The bands will be used to provide resistance to strength & stretching movements to enhance students' strength &/or flexibility. The goal is to have all students developing

particularly in times of adverse weather. Other year groups can participate in the program (with the purchase of their own band) and will have access to all online resources. Online resources such as videos and programs will be available on CANVAS – Sport – Module – Resistance Band Training.

If a Year 7 student feels that the band does not provide enough resistance, after they demonstrate their competency to complete the fundamental movements with their PE Teacher they can trade in their red band for a thicker band (the school has purchased higher levels of resistance bands). In the event the band is lost/broken, students can purchase a new one by paying \$10 at the office and showing the Head Teacher of PDHPE the receipt who will issue a new one.

Prior to the commencement of the program, Year 7 students have been provided a link on their PDHPE CANVAS page (Announcements) to complete a survey due Friday 9 September.
