Message to the Sydney Boys High School Community

'Many may be aware that representatives of the School have spent the past several years seeking to secure a long term commitment for our near 100-year historical access arrangements to the Fairland Pavilion at McKay Sports fields. The SBHS licence to occupy the Fairland Pavilion expired on 31 December 2019 and has continued on a month to month basis since then.

We have now been advised by the Trust that controls Centennial Park that the licence will not be renewed and the Trust (a government body) intends to control and charge a fee for accessing the pavilion (funded and built by SHS Old Boys). This is a similar arrangement to how we have accessed the sporting fields since

2001. The arrangement, however, denies us certainty that the fields and pavilion will be available when GPS games are scheduled and is an added financial burden on our limited funds.

We continue discussions with the Trust to try and alleviate the uncertainty and financial burden that these arrangements have on the school and intend making representation at Minister level. We will keep the school parents and supporters abreast of these discussions. At this stage we do not want the disagreement we have with the Trust to be aired in the media, however if you wish to express your support for the school to continue without restriction in accordance with our historical access arrangements the pavilion and sporting fields, you might do so in an email to the Chair of the Sydney High School Foundation alex.feldman@shsfoundation.org.au '

NB - Your responses or comments should be directed only to the Chair of the Foundation at this stage while the Foundation negotiates with the Greater Sydney Parklands Trust on our behalf. Our future strategy will depend upon the outcome of these negotiations. Any publicity at this time might harm our case as we work within Government agencies to find a resolution to our problem.

Properties Update

The asphaltting of the Cutler Drive car park areas has been completed, apart from some drainage works and parking bay area marking. Our new perimeter fence is nearing completion. More than \$31k was spent on concreting works to achieve – a wheelchair access ramp into McDonald Wing; a wider access for cars to park behind McDonald Wing; a broad pad to be covered with artificial grass to allow rugby boys to practise with the scrum machine on the compound and a drain and apron to control water flows from the basketball courts on The Flat. Thank you to John Prorellis and Jim Crampton for all their work to make these improvements to our grounds happen.





NESA Releases Timeline for Curriculum Reform

If you have a son in the Junior school, he will be affected directly by the curriculum reform that was promised after the Curriculum Review Final Report, written by Professor Geoff Masters, released in June, 2020. The intention was to reduce content in syllabuses by up to 20% so that learning could be 'deep and slow' rather than 'shallow and fast'. A more detailed curriculum reform timeline has been released and is available on the NESA website: <https://educationstandards.nsw.edu.au/wps/portal/nesa/about/initiatives/curriculum-reform/curriculum-reform-timeline>. The information provides what new syllabuses are coming, and in what year our school will need to plan and prepare or implement them. We have started preliminary planning in scheduling time for the various Faculties to be provided with time.

Traffic Movement on School Grounds

Staff members complain quite often that car spaces in the Cleveland Street car parking area are unavailable in the mornings due to parents occupying the spaces waiting in their cars or parents blocking access to parking spaces. School policy is that parents are asked to enter from Cleveland St. via gate one and drop off boys at the end of the tennis courts and then proceed out through gate two. Cars driving through the car park and doing three-point turns near the bus bay and driving out again cause congestion and can prove hazardous to pedestrian traffic through the area. The safety of our students is paramount. Parents are asked to try to stay out of the car park area around the gym and to observe school policy concerning dropping off students.

From the Senior Library

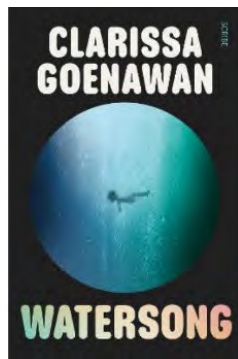

The Senior Library has several new and exciting titles which will become available in the next few weeks.

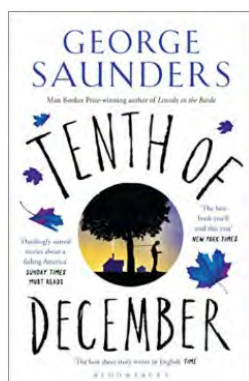
A mesmerising novel set in Japan, by the author of Rainbirds and The Perfect World of Miwako Sumida, about a young man trying to escape his past.

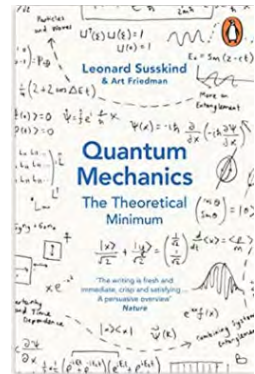


A family member recollects a backyard pole dressed for all occasions; Jeff faces horrifying ultimatums and the prospect of Darkenfloxx(TM) in some unusual

Sydney High School Cadet Unit Cadet Reflections on AFX and CyberTaipan Competition

AFX – Annual Field Exchange

It might have been the first day of the Sept/Oct school holidays, but at 06:30, SHSCU was formed up on the parade ground in front of the High Store, ready to leave for AFX. Getting on the bus, bleary eyed, we started the long, 3-hour drive to Singleton Army Barracks. After a quick lunch, we formed up as Charlie Company, alongside 213 Sutherland, ready for a fun and exciting AFX.



Heavy rain was a constant throughout AFX, and the first day was no exception, with many cadets sinking into the muddy ground. Lashing up the 11 x 11 tent during the rain was no easy task, and, when the rain really started pouring, we all piled in to seek cover from the rain. After the rain finally cleared, we started to set up our hootchie



lines and began to meet our sections. Finally, once our lessons had ended, we all received our ration packs, and, once our night activity had ended, got ready to sleep. Over the course of the week, we were constantly having fun, whether it was creating an arena for arm wrestles, playing cards, conducting a vehicle checkpoint or creating a stretcher from field materials. After nightfall came night activities, fun ways to test our learning, before personal admin and then lights out, with some of us being assigned to 1 hour of picquet at night to hone our radio skills.



Come Tuesday, and we were all packed yet again into a bus, this time off to the Lone Pine Barracks for a day of fun activities, like a WTSS (Weapons Training Simulation System) shoot, abseiling off a 25m tower or visiting the School of Infantry Museum. First up, we clipped ourselves into our harnesses, and had a quick crash course on how to abseil, before ascending the tower. At the summit, we got attached to our ropes, before beginning the descent down the tower. After everyone in our section had finished abseiling, we proceeded to the WTSS, where we all lined up, and loaded our magazines, before taking shots at targets and getting our scores, which were graded by how tight our shot groupings were. We then headed to the School of Infantry Museum, where we bought souvenirs, saw our first real toilets in 4 days and got our hands on some of the old Australian Army service rifles, before going off to take our only shower for AFX.



Other fun activities included company sports day, where we were absolutely demolished by Alpha Company in

tug-of-war, skits, which made us all laugh until we were gasping for breath, or company activities, where we all tried our best to create a ghillie suit out of leaves, sticks and cut up grass.



AFX 2022 was an experience, from the fun activities to sleepless nights in hootchies, constant rain and mud, and the bus ride home, I think everyone that went can agree that AFX 2022 was an unforgettable experience. Some non-activity highlights were, the arm wrestling arena we set up (complete with a commentator), the constant chanting, my personal favourite of which was us just repeating "Charlie!", playing cards at night with my hootchie mates, karaoke on the bus home, and of course, the McDonalds stopover, the first real food we had in 8 days.

For many of us, AFX 2022 was our first AFX, and, it was an experience that I will never forget. From all the practical skills we learnt, to the fun we had and the friendships we made, and the new people we met, AFX is definitely one of the defining cadet experiences.

AFX – from SHSCU RSM Viewpoint

As the first AFX in three years, the Annual Field Exercise of 2022 received a much-welcomed return to the cadet experience. Although the training had changed much throughout the years and the weather complicated our



plans, there was a sense of nostalgia in returning to the Singleton Military Area for my final AFX.

AFX offered a much needed reprise from the familiar training grounds of Sydney Boys High School and Holsworthy Barracks. Although the cadets had gathered at the basketball courts at 0700, the bus ride was anything but spiritless. Singing songs and reciting plays, the cadets were all excited for their first or final eight days of living in the bush.

When we landed, not even the chill of the rains could abate the brimming excitement of meeting with the other unit that we would spend the next eight days with: 213 Australian Cadet Unit. Carrying the responsibility of having the higher ranks NCOs, Sydney High School Cadet Unit led the training of Charlie Company. In spite of the sudden rain showers, the first day kicked off with our cadets getting to know each other up and close, all huddled in tents. The next two days centred on field training, skills that they would use later in the week.



To say that this AFX offered exciting experiences would be to diminish the worth of the activities offered. Heading to the School of Infantry on Tuesday, cadets had the opportunity to abseil from a 35m tower, have a taste of the gruelling military combat training that soldiers go through, simulated weapons training that included the kick of the gun recoil and a moment of relief at the Australian Army Infantry Museum. The most looked-



forward activity were the showers to wash off the mud and grim accumulated over the course of the past four days, traditionally cold and refreshing.

The rest of the week would include navigating to Vehicle Checkpoints, checking vehicles for contraband items or threats to our base, setting up and running observation posts which spied on our neighbouring bases and running a patrol base to protect those at the posts from counter competitive forces. A dip into the demands of military combat training to abseiling off a 35m tower, though spending the week trenching through Shrek's home front, the cadets made the most of every moment. Exhausted each day, cadets engaged in night activities ranging from navigation courses to a well camouflaged observation post with an NVG as a means to counter competitive forces.



The final days were spent having fun, the Friday filled with sport-based activities to bring up the energy lost from the past days and allow time to pack up for the next day. With their final night ending with a rowdy game of capture the flag, the tired cadets crawled into their sleeping bags, resting for the return home.

Saturday was a sad goodbye to our newly made friends at 213ACU and our ration packs, the food that had fed us for the most of AFX, however the compensation (McDonalds) on the way back managed to lift these disheartened spirits. Contrary to the drive to Singleton, the drive home was quiet, napping cadets filled most of



the bus seats, those awake reflecting on the past week and the experiences that would last for a lifetime. Although not everything on AFX was sunshine, there were certainly a lot of rainbows, through the thick and thin of our shared trials and tribulations. AFX 2022 will be something of a defining experience for all cadets that dedicated their week in the bush.

CyberTaipan CSIRO Competition 2022



CyberTaipan is a high-school group competition where students are put through several rounds of tournaments and are required to search for vulnerabilities within different operating systems. We went into the competition hopeful that we could live up to last year and achieve another extremely good ranking.

In the first round, we managed to get into the top 20 with a ranking of 13th out of a total of 139 teams. It was extremely close in the first round, with all the teams near the top having almost no difference in the scores that separated their ranks. We managed to get into the second round without too much difficulty, though the last few minutes of the competition were extremely stressful as we tried to get as many last-minute points as possible to secure our position into the next round. We showed a great improvement in the second round, placing into the top 10 with a ranking of 7th out of 138 teams.

With a combined score from the first round, our final ranking was 11th out of 145 teams, meaning we missed out on the Canberra finals by a single point! Even worse, we didn't get the points for one of the tasks we had supposedly completed, meaning we could have quite easily cleared the top 10.

Overall, this journey has been a very enjoyable and knowledgeable experience and introduced me to cybersecurity in general. The best part has to be persevering and finally figuring out how to identify an issue with your teammates. I really enjoyed participating in the CyberTaipan, as it was very fun and showed me many different aspects to cyber security and how different operating systems function. In conclusion, Cyber Taipan is a competition that I recommend everyone attempt, as it can act as stepping stones to a hobby, or even future career.

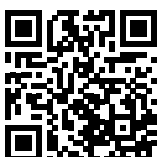
