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EDITORIAL COMMITTEE

It was almost as late as Easter before that select band of Year 11 volunteers henceforth known as the Record Committee held its inaugural meeting. At first the committee was overawed by the seemingly insurmountable task ahead; but a rigorous and well-organised name-recording session at the summer sport photo call soon boosted confidence, and once the members were proficient in the spelling — and pronunciation — of names like Razzaghipour, Bronfentrinker, Oprzedek and Sivanesarajah the rest was relatively easy.

A number of other staffmembers have contributed in no small way to the publication of this volume: once again Mrs Brewster oversaw the inclusion of the all-important artistic and photographic material; the advice and guidance of past editors, Messrs Gainford, Day and Miller, were invaluable and are much appreciated, as are the efforts of Mr Jones in collating the Original Contributions section, and of the ancillary staff, especially Mesd Bond and Meakin, for helping make all the scribble legible.

So we leave you with our **Record** — read it, enjoy it, keep it as a memento of the year that was.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

THE SHS YEAR OF THE TEACHER

My purpose in declaring 1989 the Year of the Teacher at SHS was to draw attention to the work of our teachers and in particular to their dedication, involvement and achievements. Though not carrying the same weight as an International Year designated by the United Nations General Assembly, the High Year of the Teacher was, I believe, a significant step towards the wider recognition of the importance of the role of teachers in the community. My shock announcement on the last day of the 1988 academic year gained early popularity in 1989 and was applauded by teachers and parents from other schools.

In order to translate the concept of HYT into action a wide-ranging number of initiatives was taken. A Staff Welfare Committee was established. This Committee addressed problems such as improvements to the working environment, increasing support by parents and old boys for extra-curricular and sporting activities and the organisation of regular morning teas and out-of-hours social functions. Teachers were invited to be Guest Speakers at major assemblies such as the Installation of Prefects, the Rowers' Assembly and the Presentations of the Summer and Winter Sports Teams. This departure from the practice of inviting distinguished Old Boys was greatly appreciated by the teacher guests as well as the boys. Special efforts have been made to highlight the dedication, industry and skill of the teachers responsible for the many educational, cultural and sporting programs conducted beyond normal hours and over a six-day

Major changes were made in the hierarchical system of the school through the appointment of many classroom teachers to leadership roles in important areas of responsibility. Key areas such as Student Welfare, Peer Support, Computer Education, Fair Discipline Code and Professional Development Activities were included. Through their involvement, a wider recognition developed within the staff of the value of the ideas of their colleagues, as well as the power of their intellect, their organisational talents and their professional integrity. Through its unique brand of community involvement Sydney High parents are generally more aware of the contribution made by the teachers. I look forward to the time when the whole community attributes to teachers the same recognition that it extends to other professions, especially when teachers are entrusted with the responsibility of the development of our country's most valuable resource its children.

We also need to address the matter of the partnership between teachers and parents - a relationship that is crucial to the education process. Unless there is wider recognition of the quality of the contribution made by teachers to our youth, that partnership will never be complete. It is important for the community to appreciate, with the declining influence of the family and the church, that the school has not lost its influence to the same extent. Instead, the school and its teachers have shouldered the reponsibilities of a broader curriculum determined by circumstance.

In retrospect the Year of the Teacher has reinforced my belief that the essential quality of the staff of this school is Goodwill. Without it our century-long commitment to excellence in education could not have been maintained and the number of educational opportunities would have been substantially reduced. It is also the essential ingredient of a good school. While many use HSC results, sporting premierships and other awards as measures of this quality I am convinced that it is goodwill that makes a good school.

1989 has been a particularly busy one for the Foundation and my thanks go to the Directors for their dedication to the tasks set. Matters dealt with during the year were:

- Upgrading of the Abbotsford facility to include separate dormitories, a kitchen annexe to the Conference Room, repairs to the roof membrane and landscaping, total works amounting to \$60,000.
- Minor improvements to the food service area of the Fairland Pavilion at a cost of \$3,000.
- Re-surfacing of the School Tennis Courts costing \$18,580.
- The completion of the amalgamation of all School accounts, excluding Government Grants, to take advantage of the offsetting principle of repayment of interest on the overdraft against the balances held in those accounts. These are now held in the Commonwealth Bank.
- The establishment of the High Store which is now fully operational.
- The provision, through the assistance of the Regional Director, of the Foundation Room for meetings of the School Executive and the executives of the many ancillary organisations of the School.
- The production of the School's first Prospectus.
- The commencement of a review of the Rules.

This year saw the retirement of one of the School's stalwarts, Mr Bruce Pyke. His contributions over many years to the School, OBU, Council and Foundation showed him to be a man of insight, energy, dependability and goodwill together with an unshakable faith in SHS. We acknowledge with thanks the integrity and service of Bruce Pyke.



- Fulfilling an advisory role on many curriculum matters such as Computer Education, Student Welfare, Peer Support Programmes, Computers in Education...
- The oversight of Buildings and Grounds at the School, Abbotsford and McKay and the preparation of submissions to the Foundation on maintenance and improvements to these facilities.
- Addressing numerous aspects of staff welfare in this the Year of the Teacher at SHS. Some progress has been made in improving the working environment, support systems and social interaction.

At a time when schools throughout NSW are struggling with the merits or otherwise of forming a Council it is appropriate to acknowledge the contribution of the Sydney High model.

SCHOOL CAPTAIN'S REPORT

MrH.S.Dettman, a former headmaster of Sydney Grammar School, once described Sydney High as "a link between a great highly developed State system of education and a number of great private secondary schools". But this observation fails to convey what it really means to be an old boy of Sydney High.

This school is unique in the variety of opportunities it offers its students. Here lie both its strength and weakness. Students are offered an education not only pursuing academic excellence, but an education pursuing excellence in all forms - be it on the sporting field or musical stage, in the debating hall or examination room: there are opportunities for everyone at High. The complete education High offers is to the benefit of all its students, yet only forty percent of the school take up the challenge. By the end of Year Twelve it is too late: the challenge has passed on for others to accept or decline.

Those who contribute gain the most benefit from their time at High. My most rewarding memories of school will come from outside the hallowed halls: Greg Scott's missed conversion against Joeys; the starter's gun at the Head of the River; Nick Testoni's catch at McKay; these are memories I will cherish forever.

The problem exists for the remaining sixty percent who will never fully appreciate the experience of life at High. Unfortunately it is these same people who not only fail to take up the challenge, but criticise those who do. I can only implore dormant students to consider the new friendships and experiences awaiting them, the enjoyment they will feel within. Tim Walker (Captain 1987) was right

when he remarked that the motivation to participate must come from within. For the uninitiated this is the concept of "Ticka", a love for your school that compels you to further its cause, in the process furthering your own.

We have had some memorable successes at High this year. The First Four rowed its way into the hall of fame; First and Second Grade Debating were both runners-up in their GPS competitions. But all the people mentioned in the pages of **The Record** have been successful in their chosen fields. Ticka is not necessarily about winning; it is about giving something a go.

Two people deserve special mention. First our Headmaster Mr Robert Outterside. He is the heart of Sydney High School. His tireless efforts benefit everyone, yet he rarely receives thanks. Mr Tony Hannon is another to whom we are indebted for his care and dedication. Our Year Adviser for five years he has overseen our development through junior school and on to our final destiny the Higher School Certificate and its rewards. As we prepare to take our places in the Real World I would like to thank both these people for their guidance and support on behalf of Year Twelve 1989. Special thanks to the President of the P & C Mr Terry Meakin and all the other people who make up the Sydney High School family.

Sydney High offers endless opportunities to those who choose to see them. The power of hindsight is great, but it cannot replace opportunities missed. Take the complete education you are being offered - you will not be disappointed.

OBITUARY G.J. BRADFORD Headmaster 1973-76



Gregory John Bradford was twice appointed to Sydney Boys' High first as Deputy in 1967 and later as Headmaster, in 1973. His previous teaching experience had been gained at Yanco Agricultural and Muswellbrook High Schools followed by an appointment as Science Master to Monaro High and later Fort Street. He transferred to Sydney High after two years as Deputy Headmaster at Westmead Junior High.

At High he was Deputy to Murray Callaghan and the two became firm friends. Their harmonious relationship permeated the whole school environment.

Among Greg's many talents was his wonderful sense of humour which he often employed to defuse a tense situation. On one occasion when Murray Callaghan was struggling to stretch school finances to cover the basics, Greg had me type him a formal letter on a Travel Agent's letterhead. In essence, it stated that the plans for the Sydney High First XI's overseas tour were well in hand, and it was now time to forward a deposit of \$2,000. Greg and I stood outside the office listening to the expletives as Murray read the letter and then, as he reached the signature, 'L.B. Wicket', the penny dropped and Murray bellowed forth "BRADFORD, GET YOURSELF IN HERE!"

As well as being a teacher of Science, Greg was well versed in Literature and the Classics. When he took promotion as Principal of Penrith High, he also headed a committee on School Libraries for the Western Region. I well remember his first Assembly on returning to High as Headmaster. He was introduced as the first Sydney High Headmaster to be a scientist, rather than a classicist, and Greg opened his remarks with, "A famous Greek philosopher once said..."

Greg approached the students with warmth and understanding. While many young people in the late 60s and 70s "frequently disagreed violently with those in authority" and "were not prepared to listen to other points of view different from their own" he attributed much of this to the effects of the Vietnam conflict. At the same time he saw

the need for adults to bridge the generation gap and he encouraged the boys to express and reconcile their views with society's expectations.

Towards his colleagues Greg gave tremendous support, both at the professional and the personal level. Generous of his own time, he was greatly concerned at the demands made upon Sydney High teachers and did all in his power to lighten their load and maintain a relaxed harmonious environment. A passing quip on his daily rounds would often elicit a smile from colleagues.

Gregory Bradford was also appreciative of our School's extended family and he acknowledged the "tremendous support and participation by dedicated High School parents" and Old Boys who made it financially possible for our students to participate in the GPS sporting program at a fraction of the cost paid by boys in the other schools.

Ably supporting Greg were his loving wife June and his children, twin daughters Jennifer and Margaret, and son John. His own children were encouraged to express themselves and I remember him laughing about their response to his preparations on the first morning of his re-appointment to Sydney High, this time as Headmaster. Apparently they thought he needed 'pulling down a peg' and so Margaret confronted him with: "You might be the Headmaster of Sydney Boys' High School, but you're only Daddy in this house".

To me, Greg was a man of integrity and a warm caring friend who reached out to others. Even after he retired from the position of Headmaster at Killara High he devoted much of his time to caring for the children of Stewart House.

Gregory John Bradford's death on the morning of Sunday 26th November 1989 is a grievous loss to all who knew him. To June, Jennifer, Margaret and John we at Sydney High extend our deepest sympathy.



REGINALD HARDEN Science Master 1976-89

This year Reg Harden retired after fourteen years as Science Master at SHS. Reg is essentially a compassionate and gentle man: he enjoyed the shared experience with others.

A subtle educator, he was always willing to help both pupils and staff at any time. He was a patient man with an inherent understanding and appreciation of humanity.

Adedicated academic with a thorough understanding of the major disciplines of Science, Reg was greatly respected by his students for his knowledge and genuine regard for them.

Reg embodied all the characteristics of a Teacher in the true vocational sense of the word. He is one of nature's gentlemen and will be missed in the classroom and staffroom. We wish him a long and fulfilling retirement.

JUSTIN PARKER Art Master 1980-8

Justin Parker was Art Master at Sydney Boys High School from 1980 until his retirement during 1988. His position as Art Master was a very significant one for the school and for Art. Justin was the first Art Master ever appointed to SHS. For the art teachers and his staff and for art students this meant that for the first time they would be fully represented on the school executive.

When Justin came to the school in 1980 he was not new to High. He had already been appointed here as another "first" — he had been the first full time art teacher from 1964-1968. During this time the numbers of boys taking Art increased greatly as a result of the Wyndham Scheme which made art available to any student as an elective subject.

In 1969 Justin transferred to Beacon Hill High School where he could be promoted to Art Master.

Justin was always a perfect gentleman who displayed a quiet tolerance and was always ready to acknowledge a significant contribution made by a member of staff. What most endeared Justin to his friends at school was his great sense of humour and his gregarious nature. It is for these qualities that he is missed — especially in the Art Department.

We wish Justin well in his new ventures and trust that he will now have time to exercise and enjoy his artistic talent.

ASHLEY CROSSLAND UWC SCHOLAR

The Association of United World Colleges was established in 1964 for the purpose of promoting internationalism in an atmosphere of academic excellence as well as extra-curricular and community commitment. The Association has schools in Canada, the United States, Italy, Singapore, Swaziland and Venezuela and offers a number of valuable and prestigious scholarships awarded for a period of two years to enable successful candidates not only to obtain the International Baccalaureate, a qualification equivalent to the Higher School Certificate but with far wider international university acceptance, but also to avail themselves of a unique opportunity to broaden their experience in a foreign country.

Applicants for these coveted scholarships must undergo a rigorous selection process. The selection panel seeks candidates with a sense of personal motivation, dedication and success in academic studies, ability to communicate effectively, and the enthusiasm to relate to people and concepts on an international scale. In Ashley Crossland the panel found such a person.

The award is thoroughly deserved and we heartily congratulate Ashley as he spends the next two years at the Armand Hammer United World College in New Mexico, USA. In a letter dated 25 August 89 Ashley tells us that seventy nations are represented in its 200-strong student body and a pupil-teacher ration of 8:1 ensures that classes are intimate and discussion-based. He goes on to assert that the fullness of life at Sydney High helped to develop those qualities which secured the scholarship for him, especially in its range of extra-curricular activities.

It is with a measure of sadness and pride that we farewell Ashley from our school and indeed from our shores. In the four and a half years that Ashley was at High he participated in a wide variety of activities. He was the winner of a number of academic prizes and an active participant in a variety of GPS Sports: Basketball and Rugby 85-6; Tennis 87; Cricket 88-89. He was the Drama

THE HIGH CLUB LIMITED

During the year 1987 the High Club's lease of premises at 146 Darlinghurst Road, Darlinghurst, was terminated and a search for suitable premises which had begun eighteen months before was intensified. Some sixty different premises were examined until finally a two-storey building at 58A Flinders Street, Darlinghurst was found and purchased for the sum of three hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars.

Up to this point the Club had traded profitably at its old address and a sum in excess of two hundred thousand dollars was held in reserve at the time of our enforced move. It was therefore necessary to make substantial borrowings to enable the purchase of the building and its refurbishment to the standard required by the Licensing Court for the transfer of the Club Licence.

Business commenced at the new premises late in December 1987, and when early trading figures were examined the servicing of the bank loan appeared to be well within the Club's capability. Unfortunately this was not to continue. Although a good number of old boys continued their membership, it is an unhappy fact that visits to the premises were few and staff of the school who had taken up membership drifted away.

The regular Luncheon of the Month was continued and interesting speakers drew the attendance of a faithful group of followers, but this was not enough to enable the Club to service its bank loan. Thus the position was reached in early 1989 when the Club, although trading profitably in its operation, was unable to carry on.

An extraordinary General Meeting of Members approved the recommendation of the Directors that the Club premises be sold after the President, Mr Ken Baret, informed them that it was the Board's intention that the Club would not cease to exist and that membership would be continued. Regular functions would be continued using the kind offers made of the use of premises at the Moore Park Bowling Club and the NSW Sports Club in Hunter Street. We publicly thank the Boards of these Clubs for their kind and timely assistance which has already been put to use by our members.

The President informed the members that the residue of funds raised by the sale of the Club premises would be invested, the capital maintained and the return from the investment used to continue Club activities and to assist the school.

The sale was conducted by auction when a sale price of \$1,510,000 was obtained. This very handsome sum was then used to repay the substantial loan which was raised to fund the purchase of the building and its refurbishment and the residue was then invested in the following manner:-

\$600,000 180 days 17.55% \$230,000 90 days 17.85% \$20,000 Working account on call at \$14.5%

Although the Club has not yet received assessment of any taxation due, it will be obvious that the Directors intention of maintaining capital investment, of continuing membership and functions of the Club and of undertaking to continue to assist the school, is totally viable.

The Directors believe that the level of assistance available to the school yearly may be far in excess of any previously possible, and may well continue on a yearly basis for all time.

This aim however can only be maintained by the continued support of members in renewing their membership when subscription notices are received and by strong support of Club functions when they are publicised.

The unanimous endorsement of the Club's Annual General Meeting which was held at the Moore Park Bowling Club on 26th July was given to the Board's plans and actions as detailed above.

He was Headmaster from 1955-63 during which time he was Worshipful Master (1960), being installed by the late Alan Callaway, one of the school's most successful rowing coaches.

Worshipful Brother Andrews accepted office this year to enable Laurie McKay to become Secretary replacing Ken Matthews, now Treasurer. Senior Warden is ex-Olympian Ray Smee; Director of Ceremonies is Harry Coss who represented the Grand Master at the installation ceremony.

We are pleased to report that a group of young and enthusiastic members has joined our ranks, including old boys Stephen Jones, Michael Croker and Greg Blake, former members of SHOBS Rugby Club.

Of particular interest was the initiation of David Kenneth Oliver, son of old boy Cedric Oliver (Prefect 1935). The whole family of Olivers was prominent in school affairs in the early 1930s. Cedric, the younger of two brothers, rose to executive rank with Qantas but died as a result of war disability some fifteen years ago. His brother, Harold, had a distinguished academic career, was first recipient of the Lodge Sydney High School Prize (1931), was a prefect and Dux of the School in 1932. He was a well-known figure at Sydney University, being Professor of English.

The father of these two distinguished old boys and grandfather of our new initiate was Ernest Oliver, then Accountant at Anthony Hordern and Sons Ltd. He was a driving force in the P & C Association, Treasurer (1933-36), and President (1938).

Our new member, David Oliver, is a graduate in Aeronautical Engineering and a pilot and flying instructor operating mainly on the international routes for Qantas.

Les Fyvie Watt - our oldest member, was Foundation Member of the Lodge, Worshipful Master (1937), a prefect at Mary Anne Street in 1910, President of the OBU (1921-22), a pioneer of the Accountancy profession in Australia, and brother of the late Sir Alan Watt, old boy, Rhodes Scholar, barrister and diplomat.

ARCHIVES

The aim of our School Archives is to preserve material relating to the school's history with a view to present and future research. The new Archives Room has facilitated this aim in that the extra space has allowed resources to be stored and displayed more adequately.

As knowledge of our enlarged Archives premises has spread to old boys, more and more of them and their families are entrusting their personal Sydney High treasures to our care. Recent examples include the Honour Cap of the late E.A.W. Newton and the Prefect's badge of the late Brian Allsop. During the year the Friends of Brian Allsop held a dinner in his memory and provided funds for the purchase of a glass case to house his blazer and Honour Cap. We are especially grateful to Mrs Kerry Paton for her assistance in acquiring this glass case.

A continuing source of support to the Archives has been the Ladies Auxiliary of the OBU. Their financial generosity has permitted the purchase of some materials for storing and preserving archives, and this year they donated one thousand dollars towards the purchase of a computer.

One particular problem has been the paucity of records for the period 1890 - 1910 and it is one of our ongoing tasks to gather information from all the contemporary sources available to us (e.g. newspapers, University matriculation results and other schools' magazines). Should any reader have information about the school at this time, we would appreciate hearing from you.

Reunions this year have been held by the class of 1939 and 1959. It has become our practice to provide Archival displays for these reunions and we inevitably benefit from subsequent donations of personal memorabilia. We take this opportunity to thank all those who have contributed in this way, in particular the unnamed benefactor from the class of 1939 who provided such a variety of programs and tickets.

At the beginning of 1989, Year 7 classes were shown the Archives and instructed in the history of our school, and the occasional History class has used the Archives as an example of primary sources. Most frequent use has come from the numerous enquiries received from old boys and others undertaking research on the school and its pupils. Such researchers are often amazed at the quantity of information we are able to provide.

There have been many prominent visitors to our school and Archives this year, notably the Rt. Hon. Kenneth Baker, M.P., British Secretary of State for Education and Science who visited us on 11th May with a large entourage.

I take this opportunity to thank Joseph Waugh, School Archivist, Peter Cumines and my student archivists Angus Edwards and Peter Barakate for all the time they give to maintaining the Archives and researching its contents as required.

K.J. ANDREWS LIBRARY


It has been a year of consolidation for the library as we have experimented with ways of using our more open environment.

EIGHTH INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR GIFTED AND TALENTED CHILDREN

Composition Seminar

Early in July an international Gifted and Talented Forum was held at Sydney Girls High School, bringing together many participants from a variety of innovative schemes aimed at stimulating the creativity of students who displayed skill in particular fields.

SCHOOL NOTES

FLAG OF STATE — The impending visit of a British Secretary of State (see below) galvanised the powers that be into frenzied activity. In one afternoon the small flagpole in the junior quadrangle and the large one attached to the Killip Wing were brought into working order, without the use of a cherry-picker. The school is now able to obey the Minister's directive to show the Flag.

PROFESSION OF ARMS — Two of the three boys to be awarded Defence Academy scholarships in 1988 have taken up their places at the academy. John Drake and Robert Gunn have begun their military and academic studies, leading to commissioning as lieutenants in the Regular Army.



EYE IN THE SKY — Early in the year a team of workmen installed intruder detectors in every room and corridor of the School. It is hoped that this system will finally end the annoying series of forced entries that have plagued staff and boys over the last two years.

BOARDERS — During the Royal Easter Show this year several boys and a teacher from Guyra Central School resided in the Fairland Pavilion, while caring for a steer which they were exhibiting at the show.

IN PROPORTION — This year the Department provided 63.9 teachers (in 65 bodies) to instruct the 960 boys. For the mathematically (or politically) minded this comes to a pupil/teacher ratio of 15.02347418 - just over a rugby team! To accommodate the increase a demountable building has been erected to the East of the rifle range, and is devoted to the industrially arty.

BILLYGOAT SWAMP — The extraordinary weather in the early part of the year meant that the old duck pond, seen occasionally after heavy rain, remained a feature of the Flat for many weeks. By early June several ducks were in residence, and reeds were growing. Some even claim fish were seen!

A QUIET ACHIEVER — News reached the School in May that last year's Dux (and top of the HSC) Mark Gorbatov had been awarded the BHP Medal, for achieving the highest marks in four unit maths and any four units of science. The medal is accompanied by a cash prize of three hundred dollars. Since its inception in 1959 the medal has been won by only one other High boy, John Challen, in 1962.

GOINGS OUT — In order to comply with fire regulations Public Works recently (during second and third terms) spent large sums renovating the Great Hall. Year 7 boys are now evacuated from the gallery even faster that they were by Greg Scott, due to an additional wide fire-proof staircase. Passage to the East is facilitated by two of the largest double fire-doors ever seen, while exit to the West is strangely more difficult due to the addition of peculiar plinths outside three randomly selected doors.

SCAFFOLD — In a break with tradition the punishing task of erecting the scaffold at McKay was dispensed with this year. Video recording of senior matches was executed from the balcony of the Pavilion instead.



REMAINS — The prefects this year assumed the new task of collecting and returning to the bereft remains, leavings, and other lost property found at or about school. Consistent with this increased responsibility the Prefects' Study has been enlarged to include the former Clothing Pool, and provided with its own door to the outside world. The Careers Room and adjoining study have also been renovated.

HAPPY EVENT — The improvements to the Great Hall were completed just in time to receive the wedding guests of the Headmaster and Mrs Outterside after the marriage on 30th September of their daughter Lisa to Mr Dallas Watts of the English Department.

WORK IN PROGRESS — Sadly, there is no further news of the condition of "Tambourine Girl", who is still believed to lie ignominiously, not to say patiently, in the wood store.

LAUDABLE GOALS — Due to a generous bequest, new goal posts were erected at McKay Oval in late May. They are forty feet high (four inches higher than Cranbrook's, we are assured) and made of durable aluminium, and are topped by large pennants generously provided by a diligent "McKay lady". These erections bring to an end a long-running saga, involving at various stages a local controlling body, and the Swans Rules team. The senior players are not the only ones to benefit, as the old posts have been erected on field #5, giving a touch of class to the 14—years matches. The first matches played in the presence of the new posts were against the Scots School Bathurst.

EXTERNAL AFFAIRS — During the renovation of the Great Hall many boys and staff crossed the border to take or supervise examinations in the Girls' multipurpose hall. In a similar vein, many girls have been crossing almost daily to attend German and Latin classes, while one boy has attempted to redress this imbalance of trade by attending Home Science classes.

SAILING OVER THE LINE — Last year's Honour Cap winner (and School Captain) Adam Magro was one often inaugural Ben Lexcen Scholarship winners at the University of New South Wales this year. Adam's award was in the field of Rugby Football, and he has played for the University throughout the season, while studying Commerce/Law.

EUREKA — On 11th May the school was honoured by a visit from the Rt Hon Kenneth Baker, MP, Secretary of State for Education and Science for the United Kingdom, together with a party of other dignitaries, including Sir George Porter, President of the Royal Society. After the party had toured the school and visited the Archives Room, Mr Baker gave a short lesson on History in literature to Mr Miller's Year 12 History class. Before departing Mr Baker presented the school with an Acorn Archimedes 440 computer. This is an astounding machine, and its graphics and musical capabilities created an immediate flurry of excitement within the School.



A new facility has been contrived by reducing the size of the washroom near Room 1. At the same time the kitchen of the Hall has been divided in twain, the one half being now used for preparation, the other for washing up, and so on.

TRANSMISSIONS — Subscribers to the GPS fixture card may rest assured that not only Armidale but also High are now in facsimile communication with their sister schools. (Fax 361 6206).

CAPITALISM — The Union Store of fond memory has amalgamated with the Elizabeth Phipps Clothing Pool to form the High Store, now located in what was formerly the bookroom next to the Science staffroom. A complete range of school necessaries is now available, ranging from long grey socks to short brown hatbands. The former Union Store is now occupied by the Industrial Arts staff.

STAGE STRUCK — The stage area in the Great Hall has been utterly gutted. The sound box has been splendidly rebuilt, and the band room above has been demolished all that remains are the joists from the floor, and a narrow catwalk.

CHOPPERS—The brown and blue crowd at the bank on Head of the River day were amused to see John Singleton, father of First Four rower Jack, arrive by light helicopter to view the contest for the Yaralla Cup. After the race (when High had come second) he saluted the crew with a few low passes before heading off to the Golden Slipper.



BOUNDS — At an historic meeting of interested parties (excluding boys and girls) from both the Boys' and Girls' Schools held in the Foundation Room, it was decided to lay to rest the vexed question of bounds in the grounds of the two schools. The Flat and Lower Grounds have now been declared common ground, and are now patrolled in common by staff and prefects. This is a pleasing reminder of the old Sydney Common, dedicated 5th October 1866, of which our grounds once formed a part. (see Waugh, J.W., The Zoological Gardens, Moore Park, Sydney, 1985.)

REBOUNDS — Indiscriminate bounding, and rebounding, at the School, a feature of Home Tennis and Basketball fixtures, have been circumscribed by the resurfacing and remarking of both the tennis courts and the gymnasium floor.

FREE, COMPULSORY, AND SECULAR — The archivists report a surprising statistic - out of the more than eighteen thousand boys to have enjoyed the secular delights of the school, some sixty-six have embraced the holy mysteries of the churches (this is one in every 303). They include one archbishop, four bishops, two moderators, and a commissioner.

MUG OF CHOCOLATE — Recent old boys will be saddened to hear of the passing of one of the school's most popular contests in recent years — the inter-class competition among Year 7 lads for the prestigious Caramello Cup. Its secret purpose was of course to enable the coaches of 13s Rugby to have an early look at the talent, but heightened awareness of the need to coach teams in safe practices made its continuance unacceptable. The principal part of the "Auld Mug" has ben returned to its former use as a sink plunger.

SYNOPSIS OF SPECIAL PRIZES

The John Waterhouse Prize — awarded since 1916 to the Prefect who has done most in the interests of the School, particularly in the way of keeping esprit de corps and maintaining a high moral tone.

The James Brunton-Gibb Prize for Public Speaking — awarded to a Year 12 boy who excels in the Art of Public Speaking.

The Old Boys Prize — awarded since 1902 to the boy who was "not necessarily first in sport, not necessarily first in scholarship but certainly first in the hearts of his fellows". These criteria were originally used by the Hon J. Inglis, Minister for Education in 1887, when he visited Sydney High and presented a book.

The Tom Rushall Prize — awarded to a boy, in any year, for participation and service to sport.

The John Skyring Cross Memorial Cup — awarded to the boy who has displayed outstanding sportsmanship throughout the year.

The Oswald Chapman Memorial Prize — awarded to the best all-rounder in Year 12. He is selected on the basis of character, scholarship, (should be in the first ten in the form) sport and participation in school activities.

The John Francis Bush Memorial Prize — awarded to a Year 11 boy for popularity, general characer, proficiency in sport and school.

The Lodge Sydney High Prize — awarded to a Year 11 boy for moral character, personality, participation in School activities and due attention to and proficiency in academic studies.

The J.M. & W.G. Forsythe Memorial Prize — given to a Year 10 boy who is deemed to be outstanding throughout his course and particularly in the year of the award, in respect of scholarship, sport and school example.

The 1977 Year 12 Prize for Excellence — awarded to a student who has excelled in an area (areas) outside school activities.

The J.W. Gibbes Senior School Prize — awarded to a Year 12 boy for proficiency in Latin, qualities of leadership and devotion to duty in relation to GPS Sport.

The J.W. Gibbes Junior School Prize — awarded to a Year 10 boy for proficiency in the humanities — Classics, English and History — soundness in character and interest in GPS Sport.

The Arch Ferguson Prizes — awarded in Years 8-12 to sons of old boys for academic achievements and services to the school.

The Brian Allsop Memorial Prize — awarded annually to an outstanding junior school sportsman who displays the attributes of sportsmanship, courage and modesty with the proviso that no student can be given this honour on more than one occasion.

The prize was made possible by his schoolmates and friends, and established in 1989 to perpetuate the memory of Brian John Allsop, an exceptional sportsman and Honour Cap winner in 1954, as well as the recipient of the Old Boys Prize and the John Skyring Cross Memorial Cup for that year.

The S & PTzannes Prize — awarded to a Year 7 student of sound character, proficient in academic studies, sport and cultural activities. The recipient should also display a willingness to subordinate his own interests to those of the school and his fellow students.

The 1977 Prize for Excellence — awarded for excellence in a field not included in the school curriculum and may be for academic or sporting excellence or whatever.

It is provided from funds given for this purpose by the 1977 Year 12.

Caltex Best Allrounder Award — is a medallion presented to a student judged by the school staff as the best allrounder. The student is selected on the basis of character, sport, scholarship and other activities.

The medal is made available annually by Caltex Oil (Australia) Pty Ltd.

The 1958 Merit Award — awarded to a Year 12 student in just recognition of his sound character and overall performance in studies, sport and other school activities.

Note to the Awarding Committee: The funds for this award were provided by the Class of 1958. It was the intention of the class of 1958 that the recipient should have figured prominently in the consideration for a number of other awards without receiving any of them. There will be years when this award is not made.

The Roger Peyrefitte Prize — is awarded to a student in any year who has exceptional talent in the study of both French and Latin.

The funds for this award were made available by Mr Eric Wohl from the class of 1981. Monsieur Peyrefitte is an eminent contemporary French writer and classical scholar. He is the holder of the Prix Theophraste Renaudot, a major literary award and a prize for scholarship, The Prix Acropole.

ANNUAL ANZAC DAY SERVICE

This year the Anzac Day observance was held in the multipurpose hall of SGHS, due to the restoration of our own hall. The Guest of Honour was Mr Jack Tarrant DCM, a ninety-six year old veteran of the First World War. Sgt Tarrant was wounded seven times and single-handedly captured thirty-six German prisoners, for which he received the Distinguished Conduct Medal.

Anzac Day Address (delivered by Tim Hughes, Yr 12)
Anzac Day is a time for respect and remembrance - to
respect those who served Australia and New Zealand
and to remember those who died for their country.

That's fine, I hear you say, but what does all this really mean for me today? To find the significance of Anzac Day we must consider the rights and privileges that people hold so dear: freedom of speech, religious tolerance, the rights of the individual. It was to protect such freedoms that so many men and women remembered on Anzac Day sacrificed their lives. So it is a day on which to recognise and acknowledge the commitment and sacrifice made by men and women in the Boer War, in two World Wars, in Korea and in Vietnam - the ultimate commitment and sacrifice made in order to safeguard the freedoms we hold so dear.

Anzac Day is more than just a holiday. Our generation must never forget the Anzac spirit, a spirit of commitment and sacrifice made for us. Anzac Day is one of the first and perhaps the most important tradition that has developed in Australia in two hundred years of white settlement. It teaches us about our past and the commitment necessary to protect our future.







My Fair Lady

23, 24, 26, 27 May

When auditions for My Fair Lady were held in March there were at least three questions foremost in the minds of aspiring castmembers:

- How could a work of the monumental stature of MFL possibly be brought to performance standard in just two months?
- Since the usual venue for High Musicals, the Boys School Great Hall, was being refurbished and was out of action till October, how would the Girls School Multipurpose Hall cope with the logistical problems associated with a full-scale theatrical performance?
- 3. Would the producers be able to find a boy and girl talented enough to carry the notoriously difficult roles of Eliza and Higgins?

As things turned out however our fears were unfounded. For the experience of the enthusiastic production team ensured that the show was ready on time; economical use of space, imaginative set-design and a well-disciplined stage crew united to overcome any technical problems onstage; and the audition process unearthed such a wealth of talent that it might have been possible, if impractical, to have a different person playing the leading roles at each performance.

A very tight rehearsal schedule was mandatory because of the demands made upon the auditorium from elsewhere. Tuesday evenings and Sundays were the only times available to us for full cast rehearsals, while principals and close-harmony groups (Costermongers and Servants Chorus) learnt their songs during regular lunchtimes. It was wonderful to see the professional approach of the cast as it strove to work and progress within the constraints imposed upon it. Most rewarding however it was to witness the improvement in the vocal harmonies in the big chorus numbers like the "Ascot Gavotte" and "Get Me to the Church on Time", remembering of course that many of us had little or no previous singing experience and found the often tight harmonies and sometimes awkward intervals rather

daunting. But with Mr Charles' patient guidance, Mr Davies' encouraging threats, and Stephen Clarke's pitch-perfect volume we started to sound surprisingly good.

Then suddenly - all too soon - the final countdown to showtime began. A vast store of exotic props began arriving; sessions were devoted to costume - fitting and alteration; an elaborate Covent Garden set shot up around us; spotlights flashed, feedback boomed from speakers, orchestral accompaniment replaced the bland piano; all those familiar last-minute instructions began to betray the urgency of the situation:

"Let's do it again! - and get it right this time!"


"I can't hear you, tenors!"

The final dress rehearsal was a chaotic affair yet somehow we went from start to finish under performance conditions (well, almost!) and the general impression was favourable. Mrs Shepherd and Mr Davies had done a magnificent job directing the large cast around the triangular stage; our left-handed maestro, Mr Charles, waved the baton about and the response from pit and stage was to lift the performance onto an altogether higher plane. The important task of choreographing the show was placed in the very capable hands of Melanie Alexander (Yr 10) who miraculously transformed the boys into graceful dancers and made big chorus numbers like "Get Me to the Church on Time" as well as the Ball Scene and Flower Girls and Costermongers' Dance in Scene One into truly wonderful spectacles.

Mr Marussich once again did a brilliant job maintaining esprit de corps while coordinating lights and sound, and in this he was ably assisted by Mr W.Wynyard. This year we purchased rather than hired a number of lights as well as six radio (lapel) microphones: this caused our budget to blow out but their cost will be recouped from car parking income and future productions where outlay for hiring technical gear will be reduced considerably. We thank the Headmaster for making available funds for the acquisition of these valuable items. We also thank Miss Shackley for making the hall available to us and to Mr McCall for his help in matters organisational.

Costumes and sets are a very important part of any theatrical performance, but especially so in a show of the scale of *MFL*. Miss Barda and Mrs Roache worked tirelessly at clothing the multitude-taking in, letting out, lengthening, shortening - and amassed a veritable store-

house of bric-a-brac deemed necessary for the show. Mr Hannon and his small army of stage hands worked tirelessly and expertly at sorting said bric-a-brac both on and off stage ready for the many speedy scene-changes required. How Mr Hannon managed to divide his time between stage-managing MFL and coaching the First XV is anybody's guess! A job well done, sir!

A great amount of thought and labour had gone into the construction of the elaborate and magnificent sets and the final result was well worth the effort, for the finished products were strikingly effective and added an extra dimension to the performances. Mrs McKellar White and her group of artists created a masterpiece in their Covent Garden backdrop, and the whole cast is grateful to them and proud of the work they did.

Behind the scenes was someone who ensured that the organisational side of affairs ran smoothly; who negotiated with the American publisher for the rights to perform the work; who oversaw publicity and ticket sales; who cheerfully carried out those irritating but important tasks to ensure that the machinery is in place and in working order. We salute you, Mr Ainsworth. And to Mr Blinkhorne and the Industrial Arts Department we are indebted for your invaluable help with last-minute hitches with sets and musicstands, among other things.

Lerner and Loewe's musical adaptation in 1956 of George Bernard Shaw's classic *Pygmalion* (first produced in 1914) is perhaps so well-known that it is not necessary to give a synopsis here. Ashley Crossland gave a wonderful performance as Higgins; supremely confident one moment, devilishly scheming the next, Ashley was equal to the task, and coped with some difficult songs

very well indeed. In this he was ably supported by Higgins' straight man, Pickering, played by Hans van Leeuwen, who obviously relished getting inside this eccentric and likeable ditherer. But the focus of everybody's attention was Kylie Burgess whose performance as Eliza was superlative. Not only does Kylie have a beautiful singing voice as demonstrated in "I Could Have Danced All Night" and "Would'n It be Loverly", but with speech coaching from Mrs V. Elliot, teacher of Drama at SGHS, Kylie soon perfected the Cockney accent and was able to give a very convincing performance as the common flowergirl from London's East End; so convincing was she that her subsequent metamorphosis into a Lady of Fashion at the ball left many of the audience gasping. Small surprise that Eliza was scarcely recognised by her own father, played by the ebullient Kiri Paramore who kept audiences amused with his leering mien, rollicking joviality, and strictly working-class mentality. Doolittle's very lowness made for a comic contrast with Freddie Eynsford-Hill, that self-indulgent dandy played so well by Stephen Clarke. Stephen's fine voice was heard to perfection in that beautiful evergreen "On the Street Where You Live".

Fine performances were given by a large number of supporting actors, all of whom left their distinctive stamp on the show. Foremost among them were Rebecca Crawford as Higgins' straight-laced yet amiable house-keeper, Mrs Pearce; Zoe Rodgers and Emily McMurtrie as the chambermaids; Michael Roache and Ben Searle as Doolittle's offsiders Jamie and Harry; Nick Searle as bartender, costermonger and servant; Anthony Joshua

as the assertive Zoltan Karpathy; Virginia Macdonald and Claire Zammit as Mrs Higgins and Mrs Eynsford-Hill, and Francisca Pena as the raucous gossiper, Mrs Hopkins. Fine singing by Costermongers and Chorus of Servants was also much appreciated.

A few further points are worth noting. First: of the thirty musicians in the orchestra twenty-one were our own school musicians - a figure which indicates that the instrumental music program at High is in a very healthy state; furthermore that number would have been higher if some musicians had not made it into the cast. Of the remainder three were staffmembers, two were young Old Boys, and only four were paid professionals. Second: rehearsals were held without specialist repetiteur and the piano was not used in performance - a calculated gamble resulting in a much richer symphonic sound. Third: MFL is the tenth Musical presented by SHS in as many years: this is an outstanding achievement, and a tribute to the tireless energy, enthusiasm and expertise of teachers and parents, and to the abundant talent of the boys and girls of both schools.

For a long time people will debate the highlights of this production - the stunning costumes, or elaborate sets, good acting, fine singing, orchestra, choreography ... or perhaps it was the nomadic parrot, or the subtle stripshow on the Wednesday, or the stubborn candle on the last night. Whatever the verdict the Sydney High production of MFL will provide a host of fond memories for many people. Well done, all!

In April the school's pilot Drama Elective (Year 9) performed, produced and directed their own play "The Outsiders", based on the novel of the same name by S.E. Hinton.

Commissioned to script a dramatic version of the novel, David Grant (Year 9) wrote a comprehensive play about the struggle between a group of rich American kids "Socs" and the deprived "Greasers".

Performed In-the-Round at the Girls School (Campbell Hall), the production was excellently coordinated by Morgan Bell (Year 9), assisted by Mr Dallas Watts. Ms Elizabeth Surbey (Girls' School) did a brilliant job with regard to lighting design assisted by Mr Marussich and the very competent Ashley Philip (Year 10) who took over the role of lighting each show from beginning to end. Thanks! Congratulations to Chris Jones and Martin Kovak, who put together an exciting "Miami Vice" Soundtrack with the help of Owen Flood and Ben (Graffiti) Cornford (Year 11).

The most exciting feature of the production (apart from the intimate Theatre-in-the-Round experience) was that the season was sold out before opening night - necessitating an extra (fourth) night performance. Two matinees were also performed - one trial run at Petersham Girls' High and a run for a combined Year 9 audience from both the Boys' and Girls' Schools.

Over one thousand people attended the production which raised a profit of over three thousand dollars for the school. The cast was also invited to tour the production to particular West Metropolitan Schools.

Two casts were selected, including some of the best talent from Sydney Girls' High-including Claire Zammit, Helena Stratakos, Noga Bernstein and Sherly Sulaiman. Among the most scintillating of the boys' performances (replete with American accents) were the empathic Randy (Martin Kovac), the sensitive Ponyboy (Joseph Bilbao), the emotionally vulnerable Johnny (Eddie Bray), the fatherly Darry (Jonathan Coleman and Aaron Fletcher); not to mention the delightful characterisation of the comic Two-bit Matthews (Daniel Chesterman), and the rebellious, enigmatic Dally (Jake Blundell).

Well done, guys! Even though one of the main messages of the play was 'No way out', you found one!

MUSIC

Music has continued to flourish at SHS this year. In February we welcomed Miss Narelle Hay, a new member to the Music Staff who is with us three days per week and has already made a valuable contribution to the string ensemble.

The third and final stage of our keyboard laboratory has been completed; this allows up to twenty-four pupils to work on performance or composition tasks either individually or in small groups. An addition to the Gifted and Talented Program during second and third terms has been the Composition Seminar.

Its assistance at music functions and fund-raising activities (in particular the successful and entertaining Quiz Night) throughout the year are very much appreciated.

This year's International Guest Conductors were Mr Larry Curtis (University of California) and Mr Sandy Feldstein (Composer for Alfred's Music). We were very pleased that each ensemble had the opportunity to work under these fine musicians.

During Education Week our ensembles performed on four occasions, at Bondi Junction Plaza, Darling Harbour, Martin Place and Miranda Fair. As well as the Musicale and Yuletide Concert, two chamber music evenings have been added to our calendar to provide a forum for individual and small group performances.

The winners of the Music Council "Musician of Year" Award are Alex Tzannes and Douglas Campbell. The recipients of the inaugural Klara Hollestelle Prize for Composition are Todd Wynyard with Irish Tapestry for flute trio, and Michael Sitsky's avant-garde presentation of Heatwave for solo flute employing contemporary flute techniques.

As part of the Gifted and Talented Child program, members of the composition seminar attended the Eighth International Gifted and Talented Child Conference held at Sydney Girls High in July. Our composers were selected to participate in a composition workshop, and seven musicians performed in the Fanfare of the Opening Ceremony attended by His Excellency the Governor-General and Professor Manning Clark.

A special thank you to all our young musicians who have worked hard during the year. We look forward to sharing music with you again next year.



CADETS

The Cadet Corps has had an exciting and challenging year. The command structure of the unit was placed under extreme pressure but came through with flying colours. While home training lacked the usual consistency and quality, the Cadet Unit prospered in the field.

The training objective of First Term was effective preparation for Bivouac. The new recruits were introduced to the basics at cadet life-drill, dress and fieldcraft.

Meanwhile, One Platoon and the senior commanders were using their experience to provide effective instruction to the recruits. In addition the senior cadets undertook weapons training and advanced drill.

The annual bivouac was planned and executed superbly. Every exercise taught invaluable lessons and there was a high standard of proficiency at every level. To a man, the Cadet Corps was working efficiently and enthusiastically.

Second Term involved a basic introduction to first aid, navigation and radio use. Again, instruction was carried out with effectiveness but not a great deal of style. The skills and knowledge of the cadets were honed to a reasonably sharp edge and it was with excitement that we looked to annual camp; this once again took place at Area 8 near Singleton, and the Army provided the unit with stores, assisting in the personal comfort of each man. But after three days of intensive training and application of knowledge the campsite was flooded. Torrential rain washed away many tents and it was with reluctance that we had to evacuate. With the assistance of the Army, we moved camp but not before a 90-minute trek through the road-cum-river had been completed. The strength of the unit lies in its ability to adapt and this was borne out in Operation Evacuation. The effectiveness of leadership becomes apparent when everyone is a foot and a half under water and the Cadet Corps' effective displacement of annual camp showed the quality of the men who participated in this year's cadet activities.

Relocated in barracks we recommenced training. A visit to the confidence course was the highlight of our stay in E Block and despite not being in the field, training was continued with much success. Annual camp this year proved, on the whole, to be an outstanding success.

CHESS


THIRD GRADE (INTERMEDIATE)







FIRST ELEVEN

In a long season of mixed success we did manage to enjoy our cricket and to improve our skills. Perhaps the highlight of the year was the Five Highs Carnival in Adelaide in December last year. In a successful series Sydney beat Perth and Adelaide quite convincingly, drew miraculously with Brisbane (who went on to win the tournament), and lost to Melbourne. A forgettable match from High's point of view. We batted first and scored a reasonable total which we were unable to defend.

vs. Grammar at Mackay

The return to a two-day match saw some real Test Cricket resolve by High. After a poor start (2/15) we fought back to be 2/103 at one stage (Hogg 28, Main 55). Support from all the lower order batsmen helped us to 175 off a massive 93 overs. We were proud of our long stand at the crease under difficult circumstances.



ROWING

CAPTAIN OF BOATS' REPORT

This year's rowing season will be fondly remembered for a long time. The First Four's second place in the Yaralla Cup indicates to me that High rowing is emerging from its slump.

Competitive rowing requires total dedication, determination, technique and, most important, strength. We have lacked size and strength for some time now; but the achievement of the First IV gives us hope that if we can continue producing rowers of their calibre we will certainly lead the GPS again. This is not to say that the lighter crews cannot win races, but the ability of the other GPS to tap into far greater sources of talent gives them a competitive edge.

Furthermore, the attitude of rowers must change, I feel, if High is to continue on the path to success. If we always think that we are the underdogs and have no chance of winning then we will always lose. On the other hand if we go out knowing that we are just as good as or better than the other crews then our chances will be greatly enhanced. Even though physical strength is greatly needed I cannot stress enough the need for discipline on and off the water. This was lacking this season. No-one else can be blamed — it is the individual who must decide whether or not he is going to take rowing seriously.

One should not only be determined to row well on the water but one's attitude must reflect that discipline off the water, for if only a single person has an attitude which in any way contradicts the requirements for success then that person is contributing to the Second-Best Syndrome which pervades the sheds at present.

Luckily, the junior rowers this year are probably the epitome of all that is needed for winning. Their high level of off-water training astounded many and with the help of new-found coach Shaun Paisley they were made into the meanest junior rowers I have ever seen. We must concentrate on developing these rowers into winning crews and entice more strong juniors to take up the sport.

On a less critical note, I am pleased to say that every crew trained hard throughout the season and I am disappointed that some crews didn't receive the placements they deserved. In the CHS competition we again won many events: the First VIII, Light Weight IV, Senior and Junior Quads all took out their respective races and with the help of other placements we won the overall point score.

On behalf of all rowers I would like to thank the coaches, parents and teachers for their help and support of the rowing club and especially the following: Mr Barris, whose tireless efforts as Rowing Master go well beyond the call of duty; Mrs Sweeting and Mrs Cordery for organising all the camp rosters and dinners; Mr Mitchell the president of the Rowing Committee; Mr Hamilton the secretary and Mr Loundar the treasurer of the Club. Special thanks must also go to Cec Pearce, Fred Fullerton, Tim Walker and Charles Lynam for their excellent coaching of the senior crews. Of course Messrs Boros,

Donellan and Gainford, Miss Hill, Shaun Paisley and Joe Natoli must be congratulated for all of their work on the junior crews. Once again thanks to everyone and especially the rowers themselves, for without your determination and courage rowing at High would not exist.

I would like to wish next year's crews all the best in their efforts towards success. Remember, hurt yourselves early in the season, get strong now, beat the other schools, but most of all do it for yourselves and I assure you the school which once used to be feared the most in the GPS shall be feared once again. FIRST EIGHT

It is every schoolboy rower's dream to be able to claim we won the Head of the River. But once again Sydney High was disappointed in its hopes of gaining the coveted Major Rennie Trophy. Despite the disappointments throughout the season there have been some wonderful moments, and I am extremely proud to have been part of this fine crew. We did, after all, win the CHS Championships at Grafton.

What is most memorable for me is the level of support that Sydney High rowing attracts from all quarters—that willing band of wellwishers whose encouragement gave us that much needed boost. They were always there, preparing meals for us, or towing the trailers to Penrith, or driving us to early morning training. It was a long season, one that drained us both mentally and physically, and the tireless efforts of those supporters was vital to our well being.

The season saw the reintroduction of winter training, a logical development aimed at improving our strength and endurance. It started only six weeks after last year's GPS Championships and consisted of weights and exercises three mornings a week at first, then scaled down to two sessions. When our coach Cec Pearce finalised the crew late in August he opted for experience: no novices were selected. And here lies an important message for the future of rowing at SHS. In order to obtain the skills necessary for GPS level rowing must be started as early as possible in high school. Someone who has rowed since Year 7 or 8 will have the experience that is lacking in the novice, even the big novice, who joins for only one season at the end of his school life.

From the beginning the new eight came together as if we had been rowing as a crew for several months - a promising sign. The weeks passed, and our visits to Silverwater became regular events, with the occasional excursion to Hardies near Parramatta. Racetime came: our performances were a mixture of good and poor. The



most satisfying race was at the Drummoyne Regatta where, after leading for 1000 metres, we finished second to Shore by half a length.

At about this time Olympic rower Gary Pearce advised us on our style and helped us to increase our boatrun by a metre or so. This gave us a decisive edge at the CHS Championships. We are indebted to Gary for his assistance.

In the run-up to the Head of the River the rain set in; bad water and rain kept us indoors improving our fitness on the ergometer. Race day arrived and the run of the swollen Nepean favoured our lane. Confidence was high but the competition keen. We recovered from a bad start to overhaul St. Ignatius and paced them to the 1500m mark. From there we fell behind, but rowed the last 400 metres very strongly to cross the line in sixth place. A disappointment? Yes, but we did our best.

Many people are owed a debt of gratitude. First and foremost, our talented coach Mr Cec Pearce who for six years has trained Sydney High, without snaring the big prize. We salute you as a gentleman and friend. To Mr. Con Barris who ensured that activity in the sheds ran efficiently. To the many parents involved in the smooth running of the sheds, and especially to Mrs Cordery and her kitchen hands, and to Mr Dadd for his marathon efforts with the trailers. Special thanks and congratulations to the First IV for your morale-boosting efforts in the Yaralla Cup.

And so, where to from here? I believe that the improved facilities and equipment we enjoy today have established us as a competitive force once again.

Let us take the lead from Newington College who only a few years back were vying with High for sixth place. In just five years they have emerged from the wilderness to win the Head of the River. We can do it too!

FIRST GRADE BASKETBALL

It was a very successful and memorable season, filled with many great victories which made it so challenging and enjoyable. SWIMMING

Sydney High had its most successful swimming season in a long time this year. Unlike last year however, where the older members of the team were dominant, the strength was seen this year with the incoming Year 7 swimmers. The team competed at both GPS and CHS Carnivals and we produced some impressive results.

Looking statistically at the results of the GPS carnivals, we find that High gained a total of 74 places in five carnivals; the 19 places at Newington and ten first places at Scots were our best performances.

As already mentioned, the younger members dominated, with Ben Ebel being undefeated at GPS level in four events, Adam Pretty winning 50m. Breaststroke four out of five times, and Brendan Mill, Michael Reuger and Ben Hart all consistently gaining places.

At the Zone Carnival we won 57 placings, including 14 firsts, and from here a large contingent of swimmers (seventeen in all) advanced to the Regional Carnival. Here our relay teams performed well, with the 12 years, 16 years, Open Medley and all our 6 x 50m Age relay teams advancing to CHS along with five individuals.

The CHS Carnival was the climax of the season. Our mighty 12 year old, Ben Ebel, made it through to four finals in which he gained one gold medal (100m Backstroke), two silver (50m and 100m Freestyle) and a bronze (100m Butterfly). The 12 years freestyle relay (Ebel, Pretty, Keller, Byrne) also swam an outstanding race to win a bronze medal. This indicates a strong future for swimming at High. Other individual finalists included Vaughan Williams, who gained fifth place in the 15 years 100m Breaststroke, and Ronnie Glasel who swam his sixth and last 100m Butterfly final managing a creditable seventh place. The Open 4 x 50m Medley Relay team gained fourth place after a gutsy effort, and the 16 years

relay team (Deane, Hathorn, Cummins, Gal) reached the final but failed to swim due to the illness of two of its members

With the CHS Carnival the season drew to a close. Our success was due to a number of factors. First, to our manager and mentor Mr Day. Mr Day had the hard task of replacing Mr Givney who did such a splendid job as Swimming Master over the last few years. Mr Day fulfilled this task admirably: he managed and encouraged the team well, and this was appreciated by all High swimmers. Second, to the parents and students who supported the team, and special mention to Stewart Marshall who attended all the GPS Carnivals. Thanks also to Greg Beard whose team spirit was obvious at the GPS Carnivals, and this boosted confidence and morale for all swimmers. Finally, to all members who made the 1989 swimming season such a successful one.

RUGBY MASTER'S REPORT

In many respects it was a very successful year for High Rugby. In the senior grades both the 3rd and 4th XVs were much more competitive and successful than in recent years. At the same time 2nd Grade was most competitive and 1st Grade most unfortunate. It was suggested during the trial matches that the 1st XV could possibly finish as GPS Premiers or just miss out on winning certain games depending upon "the bounce of the ball". Unfortunately the latter was the case.

Our 16As won three games - a top effort considering that many 16-year-old players are in First and Second Grades. Both 15-year-old teams were very competitive as were our 14As who recorded no less than five victories. The really good news however, was the success of our 13As. The 13As and Bs for example did extremely well, recording many fine wins. The As were defeated 3-4 in the final game of the season by the undefeated Scots team. Perhaps the most telling statistic was when our 13A, B and C teams scored 64 points to Shore's nil!

During the off-season, thanks to the generosity of some parents and hard work of a small group of staff, parents and pupils, we were able to raise funds to purchase two tackle bags, twenty bump pads (useful for mauling, rucking and backline skills) and a very expensive scrummaging machine. FIRST FIFTEEN

The Kippax Cup — highest aggregate points (boys)


