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EDITORIAL COMMITTEE

The production of *Record 90* marks a radical departure from past editions. It is the result of a bold venture into the arcane activity of desktop publishing, and for the Record Committee this presented a formidable challenge. The process of conversion from employing outside interests to produce the magazine to having a camera-ready version completed at school was intended to be executed in stages over three years. As things turned out, the process is completed in the present volume, but unforeseen difficulties delayed the final process of printing until November 1991.

At first articles were typed on the school's Apple IIe computers by members of the Record Committee. This information was later imported onto an Apple Macintosh computer system and was formatted by Nathan Scudder and Daniel Lewkovitz (yr 10) using *Aldus PageMaker 4.01*, a software package donated to the school by InfoMagic Australia.

The decision to launch into photographic reproduction was made possible by the acquisition of a flat-bed scanner which allowed the production of computerised pictures and circumvented the need for bromides. The purchase of a SyQuest removable hard disk enabled us to store the computer photographs compactly. The entire production was then printed using a Linotron machine at a desktop publishing bureau.

The Year 11 Record Committee has done a fine job in collecting, collating and filing articles, but without the energy and vision of Mr Charles and the expertise of Nathan Scudder and Daniel Lewkovitz the entire project would have come to nought. The venture into desktop publishing has been a valuable, if at times nerve-racking, educational experience for pupils and staff, and has brought a considerable saving for the school in production costs.

Vic Wilding, a well-known personality at High, has given loyal service to the school in his capacity as a cleaner for eighteen years, from January 1972 to December 1989.

Though stricken with polio at the age of four and afflicted shortly after with partial deafness which deteriorated over the years, Vic carries his afflictions graciously and has earned the admiration of all.

Renowned for his stentorian voice, one-way conversations and pen and paper at the ready, Vic is remembered fondly by generations of pupils who have passed through the school, as well as by the staff. Vic has vivid memories of narrowly missing injury during the course of his duties. On two separate occasions he was fortunate to escape dire consequences of falling trees in the playground. Vic fancies himself as something of a raconteur; and when the staff gathered to bid him farewell, everybody present drew deep breath when he proudly announced that he could talk for hours about his experiences at High. Certainly a general sigh of relief was clearly audible when he spared the audience the full powers of his rhetoric.

HEADMASTER AND OLD BOY HONoured

This year the Headmaster, Mr Robert Outterside, and old boy, Professor Geoffrey Kellerman, each received the award of Officer in the General Division of the Order of Australia. Both were invested by the Governor of NSW, His Excellency Rear Admiral Peter Sinclair AO, at a ceremony held at Government House on 14 September. The Headmaster's award was given for Service to Education and Professor Kellerman received his for Service to Medical Education, particularly in the field of Biochemical Research.

PROFESSOR GEOFFREY KELLERMAN AO Professor Kellerman was Dux of the School in 1942. The following year, at the age of 15.2 years, he enrolled in Medicine at Sydney University. He graduated BSc (1947), MSc (1948) and MB BS (1951). During his early post-graduate years he received scholarships from both the Nuffield Foundation (1955) and the Rockefeller Foundation (1956). He was appointed Senior Lecturer in Biochemistry at Sydney University in 1958, Assistant Profes-

sor of Medical Biochemistry in 1966, and in 1969 he accepted the Chair of Biochemistry at Monash University where he remained until 1975. He moved to the University of Newcastle in 1976 as Professor of Biochemistry, was Dean of the Faculty of Medicine from 1981-3, and is currently Dean for Research at the university. A truly outstanding scholar and Australian, Professor Kellerman has also served his profession as President of the Australian Association of Clinical Biochemistry and President of the Australian Biochemical Society.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

THE SHS YEAR OF THE PARENT

In recognition of the role played by High parents, 1990 was declared by the School the Year of the Parent. It seems that the Government, Ministry and Department of School Education have also come to appreciate their value in terms of human resources. Current initiatives such as Schools Renewal, the formation of School Councils, community use of school facilities and increased community involvement in school management attempt to make use of the energy, interest and expertise of parents. For too long they have been regarded only as fund-raisers - but not at SHS. Here they have been, and continue to be, an incalculable asset to the school.

The partnership that exists between our parents, teachers, students and the school organisations is no doubt a major factor contributing to the very positive image of the school within the local and wider community. The Year of the Parent has focused attention on the role and contribution of parents within the broad school

family. To this end parents were invited to be guest speakers at special assemblies and Speech Night. The school expresses its gratitude to all parents who have tried so hard to create a happy and stable environment within the school, not only for their own sons but for all boys.

The Parents and Citizens Association provides the principal rallying-point for parents, and fosters the activities of the Canteen, High Store, Auxiliary, Sports Council, Music Council, Education Forum and Finance Committee. The Association also elects delegates to the School Council and the SHS Foundation Inc. Through the efforts of these organisations the boys are given access to educational and sporting activities far beyond those possible by government provision alone. The assistance given by parents has now become essential to the effective management of the school, but it should never be taken for granted. A great deal is owed to the parents who work within these organisations. At Moore Park, McKay and Abbotsford there are daily reminders of their efforts.

SHS COUNCIL

This was a very significant year for the Council inasmuch as there were strong moves from members to bring its constitution within the guidelines established by the Department of School Education. Driven by the recommendations of the Schools Renewal Policy, a strategy to revitalise schools, the major part of the Council's activities towards the end of the year was the development of a School Management Plan. Other activities of note during the year were:

- approaches to the Assistant Director-General for the restoration of the position of Bursar, the appointment of a second Deputy and Leading Teacher and an additional groundsman for McKay.
 - property matters included the pursuance of cyclical maintenance, construction of a carpark, repairs to the tennis court fence and improvements to the gymnasium toilets and shower facilities.
 - a revitalised Sports Council consisting of a teacher and parent representative from each sport was brought under the aegis of the Council. Regular monthly meetings were held with significant impact on our sporting programs.
 - Council continued to play an advisory role in the formulation of the Code of Conduct, student welfare, the activities of the Gifted and Talented Children's Committee and pupil placement.
 - consistent with government policy the Council became more active in determining the school's broad budget priorities and the development of a budget plan.
 - the Cluster Director, the Headmaster and a Councillor, Robert Mitchell, formed the interviewing panel for the selection of the advertised positions of Head Teacher in History and Administration.
 - special meetings were devoted to the development of the School Management Plan which is expected to be finalised and made available through the Cluster Director to the Assistant Director-General by the end of second term next year.
- Thanks are extended to the Councillors and the Foundation Directors for their sustained goodwill and service to the boys and the school throughout the year.

THE SHS FOUNDATION INC.

Throughout the year the Foundation maintained a high level of activity which continued into the summer vacation. The major achievements and decisions are as follows:

- the building of the Alan May Weights Room as an extension of the gymnasium. Funds for the addition were made possible by a bequest from the estate of the late Alan May and the balance from the parent-supported Foundation Building Fund.
- work continued on a review of the Foundation Rules to be completed next year.
- arrangements were completed for the purchase of a new bus, the actual purchase price being \$16,000.
- the Foundation High Store expanded its operations and by the end of the year, boosted by large sales on Orientation Day, provided a solid financial base for the future.
- a committee was established to produce a Foundation publication to be known as *Heritage*.
- a tender was submitted to the Centennial Park and Moore Park Trust for car parking operations at Moore Park. The successful tender has yet to be announced.
- a committee was formed to draw up a job description and advertise, over the vacation period, for the position of a Foundation Manager.

The sudden death of Peter Cappe robbed the school of a valued member of the Foundation, Council and P&C Association. Well-known for his devotion to family, friends and school, Peter epitomised that special brand of parenting that is directed to the welfare of all students. Vale Peter Cappe.

VALE LADY HELEN CUTLER AC, DStJ

The entire school family was saddened and shocked to hear of the sudden death of Lady Helen Cutler, the wife of former Governor of NSW and mother of their four sons, on 8 November at the age of 67 years.

During the service of thanksgiving at St Andrews Cathedral on 14 November, the Most Rev. Sir Marcus Loane KBE spoke of Lady Cutler's life of unselfish devotion in the home and community. "Lady Cutler carried herself with dignity in all areas of her life. She trained herself to share the life of a diplomat and Governor".

Two of her sons, David and Anthony, read the lessons. Among the great number of people who attended were His Excellency the Governor, Rear Admiral Peter Sinclair, the Premier, Mr Greiner, and former Prime Minister, Mr E.G. Whitlam. There were also representatives of the many charities with which Lady Cutler was involved, including Save the Children Fund, The Girl Guides, and The Red Cross. Sydney High, of which Sir Roden Cutler is an old boy and for a considerable time has held the position of patron of its OBU, was represented by the Headmaster, a number of teachers, a considerable number of pupils and many old boys. To Sir Roden and his four sons we extend sincere and heartfelt sympathy.

PARENTS AND CITIZENS ASSOCIATION

In reporting on the past year I refer the reader to page 14 of the 1989 edition of *The Record*, and in particular to the part entitled "The Year Ahead."

The introduction of the Schools Renewal Strategy has brought increased pressures on the Headmaster and his Executive. Currently he is working with the School Council on the development of a Schools Renewal Plan for implementation in 1991. This total review of the operation of the school will be time-consuming, will require commitment, constructive criticism, and will require all who contribute to the development of the plan to be sympathetic and wise in addressing the future needs of the pupils of the school.

We are on the threshold of a new era in public education and in the operation of each school as a separate entity rather than as a small part of a centralised bureaucracy. The P&C Association has begun a review of its operations and its Constitution which in 1991 will proceed in parallel with the development of the School Renewal Plan. Reviews are also to continue on the structures of the School Council and the Foundation: their completion will provide a clear direction for the entire school family to take into the future.

Parents will have a significant role to play in the planning and implementation of these strategies. The year ahead will be an extremely testing and challenging period. Now more than ever is the time for the development of a spirit of cooperation between staff, parents, old boys, pupils and friends of the school. Personalities and individualism are to be recognised, but only as part of a unified program of support and cooperation to the ideals to be established with the Renewal Plan; and teamwork is absolutely essential if we are all to be successful in achieving our aims and objectives in the best interests of our pupils.

Despite the difficulties of the past year, your association has worked to support the needs of the school, and we are pleased to have helped provide hot water to the gymnasium showers and a weights room for the benefit of those who wish to develop strength and fitness.

Most significantly, we have been successful in convincing the Minister to reverse a departmental decision so that in 1991 we might maintain an enrolment of 180 pupils in Year 7. I recommend that the incoming executive of the P&C pursue this matter with the Minister to ensure the status quo in future years. The financing of operations of the school during the year has been for the Headmaster a difficulty that should not have occurred; lessons should be learned to ensure that the problem is not repeated. A support structure exists in the school to assist needy families to meet the school fee and to ensure that no pupil is put at any disadvantage. This support is available by reference to the Headmaster: it ensures that privacy is maintained and that all people can meet the school fee without undue stress. This fee structure, combined with a donation to the building fund, provides the means for the Headmaster to work to a budget with a degree of assurance. It is imperative that this basic structure of fees and donation is understood by all parents to provide a financial support of approximately \$1 per day for your son's schooling. There is a need for additional fundraising by parents to support special projects.

This report is written with a sense of sadness as I stand down as President of the Association, particularly when I recognise the significance of the challenges ahead. I offer my best wishes to all who are to meet these challenges and my thanks to the many people who have given me support over the past six years. I especially want to thank my family for having borne the pressures placed upon them; I know none more committed or caring than my wife Robyn in her support of the school, pupils, staff and parents. There is a need to be positive in our future directions, to look to our strengths and not dwell on our weaknesses, to give priority to the education of our gifted and talented students, to develop a caring approach to all who are associated with our school, and to establish and maintain high standards at this, the flagship of public education in NSW.

During the year Arch Ferguson, long standing editor of the *High Bulletin*, retired after many years of valuable service. Nye Perram (1986) was elected editor of the publication and the use of computer desktop publishing has brought considerable cost savings in production.

On 6 June, the Rev Mr Bernard Judd MBE (1935) delivered the 1990 Keith Cameron Memorial Lecture on the subject of Old Boys in Christian Ministry. Mr Judd praised the late

Cecil Ruby (1928) who initiated the SHS Ecclesiastical Society in 1960 which organises the Annual Service to commemorate the foundation of the school. He also praised the research which produced the list of eighty Old Boys who have been ordained. Of these, the largest group are Anglicans then Uniting Church. There are also Baptists and Salvationists and three Roman Catholic priests.

OBU LADIES AUXILIARY

The SHSOBU Ladies Auxiliary had a very active year with visits to the Central Coast, the Ray Martin Show, the School Archives and many other activities. They once again supported the school with a \$1,000 donation.

GPS OLD BOYS UNION

High was prominent in the GPSOBU activities this year. We won the GPSOBU Rugby Competition held at St Joseph's where we were undefeated on the day. In addition we won the GPSOBU Golf Day held at Manly. The GPS Ecumenical Church Service, held in Newington College Chapel, was a memorable experience.

CAREERS DAY

The OBU is in the preliminary stages of planning with the School a Careers Day where Old Boys make themselves available for sessions with the boys to discuss possible careers choices. The idea is to expose the boys to as many careers as possible so that they may make an informed choice when they leave school.

SHS OBU AND SCHOOL COMMUNITY

During the year a paper was put together in which the OBU analysed its relationship with the school. It was felt that OBU was one of the most consistent and stable parts of the school community. A large part of High character and spirit has been formed, maintained and refreshed by a century of commitment from its OBU. This paper will form the Basis for launching future OBU campaigns.

The centenary of the founding of the OBU will occur in 1992. LODGE SYDNEY HIGH SCHOOL No 631

With extreme regret we report the sudden death of our Worshipful Master Elect (1990/1), Right Worshipful Brother Henry Angus Coss. This tragic event occurred on the morning of his proposed installation, Thursday 23 August. The many dignitaries, including Grand Lodge, Lodge Sydney University and School Lodges, were dismayed to arrive for the Installation Meeting and to be informed of the sad occurrence.

Persons who attended the Anzac ceremony in the Great Hall of the school, organised on behalf of the Combined School Lodges Association, where Sir Roden Cutler and Lady Cutler were guests of honour, will recollect how capably Harry officiated as Director of Ceremonies. He had Masonic honours but dearly wished to be Master of his old School Lodge, an office which had eluded him.

HENRY ANGUS COSS attended High from 1933-37 and served as an official of the Australian Taxation Office during his professional career. During the War he was a member of the 8th Division Signallers and was a prisoner of the Japanese following the fall of Singapore. He was imprisoned in the infamous Changi Gaol and transhipped to a Prisoner of War Camp at Naoetsu in North West Japan where the conditions were extremely harsh. When released following the Japanese surrender he weighed a mere 6 stone (40 k).

He was a Life Member of the Returned Services League, an Elder of St Stephens Church in Macquarie St, which was filled to capacity for his funeral. Harry was an enthusiast in everything with which he was associated, particularly this school, an outstanding personality who will be missed. He was the donor of the H.A.Coss prize for English. His two sons Ian and Graham also attended High; Ian won the Lodge Sydney High School prize in 1969, excelled in languages and is the Conductor of Encore Kammerorchester, a new Chamber Orchestra in Sydney. Graham, recently married, is a Master of Laws.

Harry's wife is the sister of the late Ron Rankine, former Sports and History Master of the Scots College, many years coach of the Scots 1st XI, and well known to old boy cricketers. A popular master, known affectionately as "Tubby", he was a past master of The Scots Lodge.

SCHOOL NOTES

MILLENNIA - For the first time in at least a decade the School enrolment has exceeded one thousand. The official figure for first term was 1014 boys, taught by 66.9 teachers, giving a pupil/teacher ratio of 15.16.

LIGHTWEIGHT CONVEYANCE - The members of the First VIII were delighted to receive, in good time for the Head of the River, a new boat of revolutionary design and construction. Weighing in at 93 kilos, fully rigged (and dripping wet), it was, by just one kilo, the second lightest boat in the race. Our thanks are due to an anonymous benefactor.

SPEAKING PUBLICLY - Gus Wong of Year 11 won this year's Rostrum Youth State Final in the Prepared Speech division, and won the Silver Medal in the Sydney Eisteddfod Under 18 Prepared Speech competition.

HISTORICAL RELICS - On 9 June thirty-five members of the Randwick and District Historical Society visited the School, inspected the Archives, and other historically interesting items, including the bear pits, Apollo (who came from the Botanic Gardens circa 1945), and the "Encounter" bell. It was pronounced a most interesting visit.

SPEAKING CLERICALLY - This year's Cameron Memorial Lecture was delivered on 6 June in the Library, on the subject of Sydney High and the Clergy, before about forty persons. Next year Mr Gary Neil MP, will speak on the School's parliamentarians.

IN STORE - Regular readers will be sad to learn that "Tambourine Girl" still resides in the wood store, patiently awaiting restoration. Perhaps this would be an appropriate project for a group of Industrial Arts students.

ALIENS - "What are those girls doing on the assembly?" the Head was heard to ask, but he was relieved to hear that they were members of a group of French exchange students visiting the School for a few days. Later in the year several pupils from Germany made a similar visit.

IN TOUCH - During third term, when the School's manual switch-board broke down, the Telecom serviceman pronounced the last rites ("Can't get the parts!" he announced.). Staff had to endure weeks of wandering in search of an outside line, and those hoping to ring in often gave up and sent a fax. Relief came halfway through fourth term when NEC began installing a new automatic system with so many bells and whistles that most will remain a mystery. At least we are again in touch with the world.

WEIGHING IN - The whole of the School's family was delighted to observe the speed with which private contractors (not unknown to family members) erected the new weights room, an extension of the Gymnasium. This was made possible by a very welcome benefaction.

FOURTH ESTATE - The long-standing need for a regular in-house publication by the boys of the School (briefly addressed by ill-fated publications in recent memory) has this year been filled by *Highlights*. Edited originally by Kiri Paramore, and lately by Nathan Scudder, and largely supported by sponsorship, it is a high quality production wholly set up on the school's Macintosh equipment, but printed externally. Debate has been lively in its letters pages about a number of issues, mainly to do with sport (see page 19).

DECADE COUNTER - In the just over ten years since the School acquired its first computer, then regarded more as a novelty than a useful piece of educational equipment, new machines have been acquired at an increasing rate. A recent count reveals: 21 Apple IIe, 1 Macintosh IIcx, 8 Hypec OASIS machines, 3 other IBM clones, and 1 Acorn Archimedes (see School Notes, 1989).

THE FLAG FLIES HIGH - The lack of a flagpole at the Abbotsford Centre had been felt for some time. Late last year when a local primary school closed the school was able to salvage an almost brand new aluminium pole. This was recently erected on the western end of the roof at Abbotsford and is now doing sterling service.

LIBRARY

This year there was an increase in the co-operative planning and teaching of units of work involving Library resources, with a strong emphasis on the development of Information Skills. In line with the Information Skills Document it is most important that all pupils understand this process in order that they can respond to essay/exam/research topics.

With the help of student librarians, the Library continues to be opened on a voluntary basis three mornings before school. We also open during the lunchbreak except on Wednesday (sport day) when we open at recess.

Administratively we experience some problems with our Love Data computer program and these were compounded when the service contractor failed to honour his agreement. As the Department of School Studies had made a decision to install the OASIS Library and Administrative programs in schools, we applied for and have now received the basic equipment for conversion to OASIS.

A matter of some concern is the number of books that disappear from the Library each year. We now feel that we must follow the lead of other school libraries and are considering the installation of a security system. I would like to thank the Library Ancillary Staff and the student librarians for the service they provide through the library and also Mrs Kremer and Mr Klarnet for their contribution during the year.

At the same time we received biographical details from the Old Boys who attended, and a photo or two to add to our collection.

Many and varied were the requests for Archival information. The most popular reason was for people to research their family genealogy, but there were also some requests for an Old Boy application to a position of national security.

We are always grateful to receive materials, some of which come from unusual sources. During the year we were given one Old Boy's Law Degree, Higher School Certificate, and Primary Certificate which were found by a child on a rubbish heap on the North Shore. The child was attracted by the frames and took them home where his father recognised their significance and presented them to the school.

Gratitude must be expressed to the school archivist Joseph Waugh, to student archivists Angus Edwards and Peter Barakate and to archival apprentices Jonathan Gadir, David Eysers, and Robert Doran for the many hours they have devoted to developing and researching our school history.

STUDENT NEWSPAPER

This year marked the formation of the newest SHS Student Newspaper, *Highlights*. Throughout the year, the newspaper has been published monthly at no cost to the students or the school through generous sponsorship.

The newspaper began as a 4- page type-written publication, but now has 12 pages produced using professional desktop publishing software donated to the school.

Originally edited by Kiri Paramore (Yr 12) and later by Nathan Scudder (Yr 9), the Newspaper took on many staff and is now a very popular part of school life. Featuring articles such as "Larry Lizard"- ever-feared gossip monger - *Highlights* has been successful in its aim of informing pupils about happenings at High.

The Newspaper also enjoyed success in other areas, and was shortlisted in the Sydney Morning Herald Student Newspaper of the Year Competition, with newspapers that had been in circulation for many years with large staff and funding.

We wish to thank Mr Outterside and Ms Bourne for assisting in the formation of the newspaper, and Mr Mogensen for patiently proof-reading each issue. Newspapers have come and gone at High but we hope *Highlights* will continue to be an important part of the school in the years to come.

ANZAC ADDRESS

I make no secret of my own beliefs about war - I find it evil, ugly, very unnecessary and a very destructive way to resolve conflict, and it is symbolic of everything brutal in the human spirit. However, there is another side to the human spirit, and it is that I hope Anzac Day commemorates - bravery, loyalty and courage of spirit when surrounded by death and horror.

To fight in the trenches of WWI, the battlefields of WWII or the jungles of Korea and Vietnam; to retain one's wits, living in constant fear of death, surrounded by hostility from both the opposing side - men just like themselves - and from the elements that left them prone to disease and discomfort; to shoot and be shot at; these things required these men to plunder every depth of their reserves of courage, of strength, of both mind and body and loyalty which must have been tested when the battle zone seemed so removed from the offices, high up and far away, where decisions on men's lives took place.

The men we remember today did find within themselves what they needed to fight for Australia's future. Today we remember the struggle and the efforts of the common fighting man, the known and unknown soldiers, who, by contortions of history, have helped bring out peace today by exposing and enduring the full horror of war. They died that others might live.

We must also remember the comrades they left behind, the other soldiers whom destiny

chose to let survive, who come together on this day not to glorify war, as I once believed, but because it is the day chosen to represent the experience they endured many years ago which so altered their lives; in the same way, have significant personal and emotional dates in our own lives, such as the death of a relative or loved one, an anniversary or a farewell on which we often reflect when that day comes around in future years, thinking "this was the day it occurred". One cannot go to war and come back unaltered, unmoved by the intensity of it. But one cannot think about what one has experienced all the time, and so this day serves as a time when those painful memories come out.

There are other memories too, however, like those of mateship, and of the trust that the soldiers had for one another, embodied for me in the spirit of those elderly men now making a return voyage to Gallipoli after 75 years; these men do not come together to talk about "the good old days" - they do it because nobody who has not been to war can truly understand and share their feelings.

I don't pretend to understand, just as I don't pretend to uphold the concept of war, but I do respect the soldiers, living and dead, who risked and often rendered their lives for what they believed in - and what they believed in was me and you - their country's future, their country's children. That is what they will tell you. We should not be ungrateful, and we should never forget them.

MATHEMATICS

The tradition of good performance in the various Mathematics competitions was not only maintained, but grew substantially this year. For the first time since this school began participating in the Australian Mathematics Competition a majority of students, 551 in all, entered the contest on 31 July. The results this year were better than ever; 179 credits, 273 distinctions and 20 prizes.

On 7 June twenty-four of our students entered the University of NSW/IBM Mathematics Competition. It is not an open competition: entrants must be proposed by the school. Julian Cappe did very well to win a cash prize.

We had three entrants in the prestigious Telecom Mathematics Contest, held on 14 August - S Vaccarella, A Nyugen and T Maltz. Although none of these mathematical stars won a prize, it is pleasing to note that entrants from this school represented 1% of the total number of invited competitors. Tamir Maltz was also invited to apply for a place in the National Mathematics Summer School.

Thanks for these fine efforts are due not only to the participants in these various contests, but also to the Maths staff and cooperation of the staff in general, especially the secretaries, who have the heavy task of typing all the AMC certificates. With luck, work and good management, their workload will be even heavier next year.

SCIENCE

It has been a very busy year. The revised junior syllabus has placed greater emphasis on the processes and skills of science. This trend has been reflected in the implementation of revised programs in Junior Science.

International Chemistry Olympiad

Ben Kremer, yr 12, was selected in the Australian team which competed in Paris. He gained a bronze medal (see page 39).

National Chemistry Quiz

The school had 108 entrants in this competition. Sixty-two of these gained a high distinction, twenty-eight gained distinction, and three boys gained a perfect score: they are B Balalla and R Doran (yr 8) and Ben Kremer.

National Titration Competition

Three Year 11 boys were awarded medals in the finals of this competition. D Szulewicz won a gold medal, while C Kuan and E Wong were awarded silver medals.

Australian Schools Science Competition

342 boys from years 7 to 10 entered this competition, held in June. Of these, 246 were represented in the top 20% of the State-wide candidature, and were placed as follows:

112 Credits (next 10%)

MODERN LANGUAGES

The past year has been one of steady progress for this department. A sea-change in European politics and a renewed focus upon German affairs led to a great upsurge in the study of German language. We exploited the situation to reinforce the relevance and vocational importance of learning the language of the third most important world economy and pivotal nation of the EEC. *Wiedervereinigung* became a catchcry as we traced the course of the emerging economic superpower through videos and newspaper headlines.

The study of French has been given impetus with the introduction of the *Arc-en-Ciel* Course in the Year 8 classes. Excellent integration of the four language skills, with cultural aspects as well as lively visual presentation in the text and flashcards and aural presentation in the accompanying cassettes, has led to considerable student interest in and commitment to the study of French. A strong emphasis on authentic listening situations from the beginning of study has led to more student confidence and ability in this area.

Indonesian was introduced for the first time into the Year 7 language course. We see it as a valuable contribution to the multicultural perspectives within the school. Although no Year 8 Indonesian class was formed, pupils gained benefit from the insights gleaned from study of a non-European language.

Our school participated for the first time in a French and a German exchange. In April we received a group of 13 students, two teachers and two accompanying friends from Jaz de Bouffan High School in Aix-en-Provence. Friendships were formed, cultural interchange occurred, and French was used (as well as English for our visitors) as a tool to better understanding. During third term a group of German students stayed with families from our school, and already the return visit is in progress, with six of our boys taking part in an end-of-year trip of six weeks to Germany. A group of about twenty French students from years 9 to 11 will make a return visit to Aix at the end of next year. Such programs remind us that the study of languages provides skills and

experiences which enrich the lives of pupils. End-of-year excursions to the restaurants *Amadeus* and *L'Aubergade*, as well as Ms Salisbury's German feasts provided interesting cultural dimensions to language studies.

The department is upgrading its administrative procedures through use of a newly-acquired Apple computer and printer. Certain members of staff finally bade farewell to their technophobia. We look forward to 1991 where not only will the implementation of the computer as an administrative tool continue, but an evaluation of our needs in software for the classroom will be carried out.

CLASSICS

It was a year of consolidation and transition for this department. In the latter half of the year, Mr Pettit, the long-standing head of department, took long-service leave prior to his retirement early in 1991, when a new Head Teacher will be appointed. Mr Carey, a now-familiar figure at High in the Classics and Modern Languages Departments, has once again joined the staff on a casual basis, and his valued contributions in the classroom and advice on matters of policy are much appreciated.

At the finals of the Annual Latin and Greek Reading Competition, organised by the Classical Society of NSW and held at Sydney University in August, SHS made history when Thomas Barbour of year 11 (pictured), the only representative of the State system among the six finalists, was the unanimous winner of the Greek Section of the competition. For many years High has entered contestants in both the Latin and Greek Sections and this is the first time SHS has won the competition. Congratulations, Tom!



Latin and Greek reading competitions are a world-wide phenomenon aimed at promoting orality in classical languages. Contestants are judged on the basis of accurate pronunciation, comprehension, style and expression. Book prizes are awarded to first and second place-getters.

The restoration of the chair of Classics at Sydney University to replace the separate Chairs of Latin and Greek, established exactly one hundred years ago, is a development of considerable interest to all classicists. The establishment of the new School of Archaeology, Classics and Ancient History arises partly from the recognition of the difficulties facing the survival of Classics in the modern world, and partly from the conviction that these difficulties can and must be overcome if we care about the ideas and values which infuse our civilisation.

At the launching of the new School in October, Mr Chris Wells, Personnel Manager of IBM Australia, spoke about the relevance of Classics graduates to the private sector.

"One might imagine that since we are a high-tech computer company we hire only technical people, graduates with a specific skill or knowledge of computers. We don't. A good Classics graduate would be a first-class thinker, and that's the type of person we want.... We would welcome any good graduate from the new School to apply to IBM for employment because we would know they had demonstrated their reasoning ability and decision-making capacity. IBM needs such thinkers, innovators and achievers."

SOCIAL SCIENCES

Many students scored excellent results in Economics and Geography in last year's HSC examination. It is pleasing to see the growth in the numbers of students from this school achieving so well in the 3 Unit exams in these subjects. Careers in the economics, commercial and legal fields are still the most popular choices with students from this school. Most of our Geography students continue with studying the subject at tertiary level. The popularity of Commerce and Economics has reached a very high level in NSW schools at this stage, and this is no doubt due to the relevance of these subjects to the real world and indeed to the

variety of career choices relating to them.

This year Business Studies was introduced for Year 11 students and will be examined for the first time in next year's HSC. The 3 Unit course is excellent and is geared to prepare students for careers in merchant banking, money market dealing, human resource management, marketing and living in a technological business world. This course will be offered to Year 12 pupils in 1992. The growth in the number of Year 8 Geography students for next year is also most pleasing.

Excursions into the commercial, legal, economic, political and geographic worlds have always been an important part of the curriculum of this department. During the year, the following excursions took place:

- Year 11 Economics and Business Studies visit to the Sydney Futures and Stock Exchanges and Merchant Bank.
- Year 10 Commerce excursions to Canberra, Law Courts and state Parliament House.
- Year 12 Geography excursion to Botany Bay for the Management of Water Catchment Areas.
- Year 10 Geography visit to the Museum for the Physical and Bio-Physical Environment Exhibition.
- Year 11 Business Studies visit to ICI and TRW.

Economics and Geography students also attended special lectures for HSC students during the year. Once again the school entered a team of its Year 12 economists in the computer simulation game "Managing the Australian Economy", but unfortunately this year we did not enjoy the success of previous years.

The members of this department made a significant contribution to the wide corporate life of the school as sporting coaches (rugby and soccer) and by being in charge of various sports (swimming and soccer). Members of the department were also involved with the Peer Support Program and the Year 11 Study Camp.

During the year Ms Shield took long service leave to travel overseas, and Ms Cradock took a combination of long service and maternity leave. We were indeed fortunate in having excellent replacement teachers in Ms S Stock, Mr D Dixon and Mr G Moody, and our sincere thanks go to them for their efforts during the year.

22ND INTERNATIONAL CHEMISTRY OLYMPIAD (PARIS, JULY)

On 17 March I received the call I had been eagerly awaiting. "G'day, Ben. Do you have a valid passport? You're off to Paris!" The voice belonged to Prof. Richard Russell of Bond University's Graduate School of Science and Technology. Little did I know what toil and excitement lay ahead.

After many long and arduous study sessions at the University of NSW under the tutelage of Prof. David Black, Head of the Department of Organic Chemistry, and Prof. Robert Lamb, lecturer in the Department of Physical Chemistry, and others during a week-long study camp at Bond University, the four members of the Australian team - Alan Ng (Perth), Richard Bryant (Brisbane), Tim Mallam (Bowral NSW) and myself - were finally ready to leave overseas. We had worked through sixty problems set by the French examiners. They covered many diverse areas of chemistry - organic, inorganic, physical, biological, analytical, industrial, theoretical and solid state.

Late in June we were officially farewelled by the Federal Minister for Education, the Hon. John Dawkins, and members of the scientific fraternity, and were soon flying to Frankfurt. We spent a week in the colourful old university town of Heidelberg before travelling to Paris by train.

We had a few days exploring the treasures of the French capital (Eiffel Tower, Louvre, Arc de Triomphe) before the Olympiad opened on 8 July. The long and sombre ceremony was held in the magnificent grand theatre of the Sorbonne, in full view of the busts of Lavoisier, Voltaire and other savants. This earned us some free time which we spent on a bus sight-seeing tour and acquainting ourselves with the teams from Canada, USA, Poland and Romania. We found the teams from Eastern Europe to be very friendly, and demonstrating absence of humour and propensity for loud Beatles music.

The examinations themselves were extremely difficult. The rigours of a five-hour written exam were followed by an exhilarating visit to the Palace of Versailles. Next day the practical task - an organic Aldol Condensation, a qualitative analysis, a measurement of reaction kinetics, and the estimation of oxygen in water.

The next few days were ours to enjoy. Tours to Reims and Lyons were capped off with the celebrations in Paris marking Bastille Day - a four-hour extravaganza by night including fabulous music, an amazing laser show and fireworks display.

Then to everyone's great sadness, the Olympiad came to an end. At the presentation ceremony Alan received a Diploma of Recognition, while Richard, Tim and I were each presented with a bronze medal.

The Olympiad was the best time I have spent anywhere. Apart from the actual event and training schools, it led to wide media exposure as well as occupying all my time for half a year. I have received great support from my Headmaster and teachers, and for this I thank them deeply. I also wish to thank Professors Black and Lamb for their help throughout the year. The Olympiads are a great learning and fun experience, and I recommend that everyone interested in Chemistry and Physics apply for entry. My only regret is I cannot do it all again.

FIRST GRADE DEBATING

Manish Gupta (first speaker): Always provides a solid start for a good case, but whenever he says "No offence but..." you know there is an insult coming.

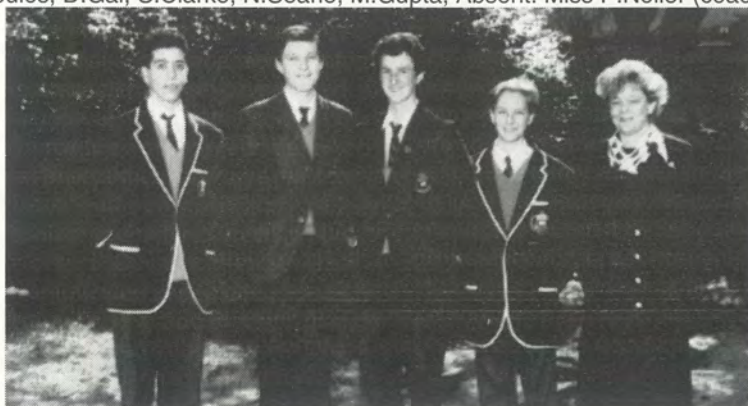

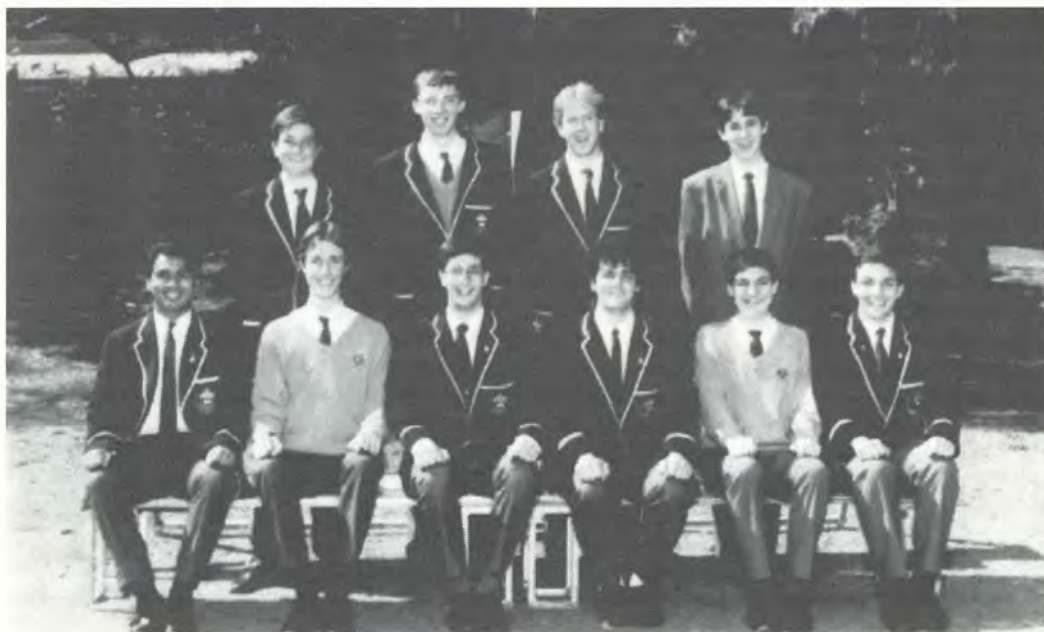

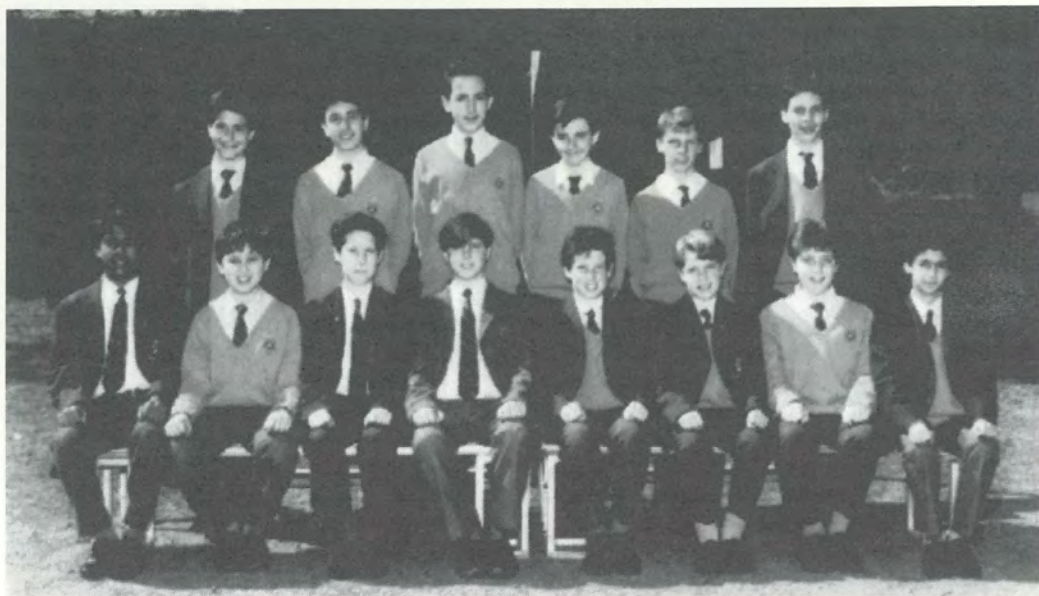

The Tefillin contains four biblical passages which mention the unity of the Lord and the Exodus from Egypt. The Tefillin are placed on the arm, level with the heart, and on the head, over the brain, symbolising the binding of one's arm, heart and mind in the service of the Lord. Tefillin, one of the most important precepts of Judaism, is part of the "Ten Point Mitzvah Campaign" instituted by the Lubavitcher Rebbe Shlita to enhance Jewish awareness worldwide.

Some of the other activities of the club include a discussion group led by Rabbi Lesches on Tuesdays, and on Monday led by Daniel Friedman, and Lulav and Esrog.

CADET UNIT

The cadet corps at High has completed another very successful year, both at home training and in the field. From the start officers decided to stress quality in home training. This was achieved by continuous assessment of the standard of instruction.

The year started as usual with many enthusiastic recruits turning up on the first day to be issued with uniforms and divided into platoons. Training in first term was devoted to preparation for the Annual Bivouac, three days continuous training in the field, held at Fiddletown in the first week of second term. During this period the recruits became acquainted with cadet life, and learned basic drill, dress, and fieldcraft. Meanwhile the senior platoon was learning advanced drill, and starting its specialist training in the areas of Signals, Medical, and Assault Pioneering.

Besides, our first term training had to fit in practice for the Guard of Honour at the Lodge SHS ANZAC Commemoration Service, where the Guest of Honour was Sir Roden Cutler. On the day the Guard was a credit to the Unit and the school.

The Bivouac was a great success, with many valuable lessons being taught, and invaluable experience gained by all members of the Unit, especially by recruits, since for most it was their first excursion into the field.

Second term training was aimed at improving basic skills for Annual Camp. This involved the recruits in elementary first aid and signals training, and further developing their map-reading and navigation skills.

This year Annual Camp was to be different. Instead of going to Area 8 at Singleton (where we had been inundated last year), we went to F Range at Holsworthy. Being a new campsite, it presented challenges and interest to members at every level, because those planning the exercises were not familiar with the terrain. It is pleasing to report that each phase of camp was successful and contributed to the cadets' growing knowledge. During Camp we visited the School of Military Engineering at Moorebank, where we were given a guided tour of the Engineers Museum. Later we had great fun going through the SME confidence course, which was made the more interesting by the presence of some sappers throwing whizz-bangs and smoke bombs, and rattling

off a few hundred blank rounds. After this came the highlight of Camp, the trek, where each platoon went off alone for an overnight exercise. Whatever the other successes of this exercise, it always results in a great increase in morale and platoon spirit. On the final day of Camp, just as we were completing our packing, a young cavalry officer arrived to demonstrate the capabilities of his armoured personnel carrier (APC). When he hinted that the cadets could inspect the vehicle at close hand, he and his crew were instantly mobbed.

A few days after the Camp several members attended the Adventure Training Award Assessment Course at Singleton. This is currently the most prestigious award a cadet can obtain, and involves a six-day continuous assessment in navigation, first aid, weapons, leadership, and fitness. Sgt Grant Hitchen and Sgt Justin Parsonage were successful, and now wear the coveted badge. Much of third term was devoted to weapons training and shooting. Members learnt how to deliver safely, well-aimed fire, with both the .22 calibre BRNO and the 7.62 mm SLR. Each platoon fired on the school range, and the Unit as a whole attended the Annual Range Practice at ANZAC Range at Malabar at the end of term. The annual shoot was a great success, largely due to the efforts of a number of supporters, including Colonel McNamara, who was able to supply rifles and two instructors.

Fourth term is devoted to preparation for the promotion courses, at which the Unit expects to be very successful this year, and for the Guard of Honour for Speech Night. In late November I was privileged to represent the Unit at a reception for the Colonel-in-Chief of the Australian Cadet Corps, His Royal Highness Prince Phillip, the Duke of Edinburgh.

The success of the Unit this year has largely been due to the quality of leadership and instruction at all levels. On behalf of the Unit, and especially my fellow officers, I would like to thank our OC Captain Gainford for all his organisation and advice, as well as our Quartermaster Lieutenant Barratt, and Adjutant Lieutenant Stravs. We would also particularly like to thank Mr I. Campbell for his timely and practical help, and the P&C Association for its continued financial support.

Take a mute and lecherous King, a ranting neurotic Queen, a sycophantic Wizard, a zany Jester, a Knight invincible and his Lady doting and pregnant, a lusty moat-swimming Princess, a Prince who idolises domineering women, and a Minstrel with the voice and presence of Placido Domingo; add to these a large chorus of talented singers and dancers, a Hans Christian Andersen tale suitably revamped to suit contemporary taste (hey-nonny-nonny!), and an engaging, if largely unknown, musical score - and you have all the ingredients for a rip-roaring spectacle full of youthful exuberance and spontaneity.

The High production of *Once Upon a Mattress* was the result of three months toil involving regular singing, acting and dancing rehearsals for its cast of sixty. And if only it had been that simple! For last year's so-called upgrading of the Great Hall to meet statutory fire regulations resulted in what the practitioners of the performing arts at this school can regard as the wholesale desecration of the building. Stripped of all rigging, soft furnishings and storerooms, the stage area was rendered useless and the auditorium an acoustic nightmare. However some clever improvisation brought a temporary solution to the problems affecting the stage area, but the auditorium remains an echo

chamber. It is a tribute to the ingenuity and goodwill of the producers, cast and crew that these difficulties were largely overcome and that the show was the resounding success it was.

First produced on Broadway in 1959 *OUM* had a modest run of 357 performances with Carol Burnett as Winnifred. The story is set in a mythical kingdom where the dominating Queen Aggravain is looking for a suitable wife for her son, Prince Dauntless. As each new princess is tested, the people of the kingdom are beginning to lose hope of anyone ever being acceptable. Since no Lady is allowed to marry before Dauntless takes a wife, a certain Lady Larken is worried she will be in disgrace if a prince is not found quickly.

Through the efforts of Sir Harry, Lady Larken's love, a princess is found. But she is not just any princess - she is Princess Winnifred, Princess of the Swamp. She quickly endears herself to Dauntless and his mute father, King Sextimus the Silent and sets about conquering Queen Aggravain's test.

At the outset it was obvious from the enthusiasm of the whole company that the show was going to be a hit. Yet despite all the technical difficulties, as well as the questionable wisdom of having a rest day on the eve of the performance after a very rough and rushed dress rehearsal on the Sunday, and not to mention the drama over a certain codpiece, no-one could have dreamt that Opening Night would be such a remarkably magical experience. All the principals proved to have been well-cast, and they each strove to grow into their roles and to put an individual stamp on them, while sub-principals and chorus all played their part with admirable aplomb. The sumptuous costumes, handsome sets and masterful Bayeuxesque scenery lent a mystic air of wonderful unreality which can best be defined by the term 'holism', whereby the end result is greater than the sum of the parts.

As the Minstrel, Michael Roache handled some difficult tenor songs with consummate ease, and his straight acting was a fine counterpoise to the buffoonery of the Jester and the King, played so ably by Nick Searle and Andrew Greenfield respectively. Their Act One trio, "The Minstrel, the Jester and I" was a highlight of the show, as was Nick's fine rendition of "Very Soft Shoes" which, supported by some

flashy precision dancing by our well-drilled troupe, brought the house down.

Helena Stratakos and Stephen Clarke complemented each other beautifully as Lady Larken and Sir Harry. Stephen's rendition of "Tis I" (stolen from *Camelot*) was well-executed, and their lovely duet "Yesterday I Loved You" showed off their voices to perfection. Karen Reiner (Queen) and Daniel Gal (Wizard) worked very well together; Karen's performance was a real tour de force. She proved to be a consummate actress and put across the clever monologue of her only song "Sensitivity" like a seasoned troupier. Jake Blundell gave a spotless performance as the starry-eyed Prince. His smooth delivery and wonderful ability to improvise showed his very considerable talent. A chip off the old block, you might say!

The success of this particular show depends on the performance of Princess Winnifred. At one time or another during the play she is required to be outrageous and boisterous (as in "I'm in Love with a Girl Named Fred"), naive, coy and vulnerable ("Shy"), wistful and misty-eyed ("Swamps of Home"), as well as seductive and sultry ("Happily Ever After"). She needs to be a superwoman who can match males on their own terms, yet submissive enough to see true fulfilment only in marriage to any man of her dreams. A tough assignment for anyone, but handled with brilliance and professionalism by Emily McMurtrie.

Yet the efforts of even the most talented cast would be in vain without a competent production team. We at High are very fortunate to have so many talented staffmembers and parents to ensure a first-rate show. A debt of gratitude is owed once again to Ms Barda and Mrs Roache who not only costumed the multitude so exquisitely but maintained order behind the scenes and promoted esprit de corps; to Melanie Alexander (yr 11) who once again choreographed the show so expertly; to Amy Janes (yr 12) who stepped so ably into the stage manager's shoes vacated after so many years by Mr Hannon; to Mr Wynyard and Zoe Backes (yr 9) who did such a fine job on sound; to the lighting crew, the Visual Arts Department and girls on make-

up; and especially to Ms Healy and Mr Charles who collaborated tirelessly and effectively to ensure that music and staging were up to scratch.

The drawing of the curtain at the last performance brought to cast and crew a mixture of exuberance, sadness, and satisfaction with a job well done. For, sadly, this year's production signals the end of an era, with the departure of a number of people who have played an important part in building this tradition. We bid farewell to the girls and boys of Year 11 who have served so faithfully in musicals over the years, and especially to Melanie Alexander, Joanna Fishman, Emily McMurtrie and Michael Roache who, as pint-sized Year Sevens, skated their way across the stage in our 1986 production of *Bye Bye Birdie*.

To mark the end of "The Alexander Era" a public presentation was made to Justine and Melanie Alexander in appreciation of the wonderful job they had done in choreographing four High shows and in leading the chorus in no less than six productions going back as far as *West Side Story* (1985). Mr and Mrs Greenfield were also honoured for their support of High musicals all the way back to that memorable production of *The Mikado* in 1983 when their son Jerry was a Year 7 Guardsman. And it was with sadness and gratitude that we bade farewell to Mr Charles Marussich who for many years oversaw the all-important technical aspects of our shows. We shall miss your expertise, your sense of fun and the lash of your barbed tongue.

This year's production marks the tenth anniversary of an unbroken cycle of Musicals at High, an annual event that has evolved into an important tradition in the cultural life of both schools. More than just your average school play, the High Musical has become a Grand Occasion renowned for its energy, flair and professionalism.

Hey, does anyone know what we're doing next year?

A DECADE OF HIGH MUSICALS

The nineteen-eighties will be remembered as the Golden Age of Musicals at High. For during that decade was produced an unbroken line of annual musical productions which have come to be regarded as a valuable tradition involving both schools.

A study of the performing arts at SHS, compiled by Peter Barakate (yr 11) (see below) reveals that the history of dramatic productions at this school has been a stop-start affair, dependent upon the initiative and enthusiasm of individual staffmembers; and given the amount of time, dedication and patience required of all concerned, it is somewhat surprising that the history of drama at High is as rich as it is.

The pioneer of High's Golden Age of Musicals was the inimitable, the legendary Mr Steve Williams who in 1980 had little difficulty convincing students and staffmembers to collaborate in bringing to the Great Hall an extravagant version of the Tim Rice/Andrew Lloyd Webber phenomenon that was currently sweeping the world, *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*. Spurred on by the wonderful success of this show, pupils and staff worked hard to eclipse the previous year's achievements; and certainly the SHS/SGHS production of Gilbert and Sullivan's *Mikado* in Centenary Year, accompanied as it was by the euphoria of Australia's winning the America's Cup for the first time, was hailed as nothing less than brilliant.

The departure of Steve Williams at the end of 1983 was a great loss to the school; certainly no-one felt either willing or competent to mount a full-scale production the following year. Then, most unexpectedly, the school received an invitation from SCEGGS Darlinghurst to provide boys for a joint production of the Cole Porter classic, *Kiss Me Kate*. The collaboration proved to be a highly successful one. SCEGGS hailed the boys from High as more talented, intelligent, cooperative and polite than those from neighbouring private schools (no names please!) with whom they had worked in recent

years. From this time dates an activity which producers of High musicals have insisted should become an important aspect of the show for boys as well as girls - dancing!

A baptism of fire awaited us in 1985. The very able and single-minded music teacher, Ms Edie Rens, passionately championed the merits of a work which polarised the support of those teachers who had produced musicals at High over the past five years - *West Side Story*. Mr Humphrey Charles was coaxed trembling from behind his piano and told to direct this Sondheim/Bernstein masterpiece, while the enthusiasm of Mr Glen Davies, Ms Rita Barda and Mr Charles Marussich, all new arrivals at the school, helped to silence the opposition of the Old Guard.

The auditions attracted a phenomenal response from the student body and, regrettably, many hopefuls had to be turned away. An energetic and creative production team and a talented cast including Jahan Tyson, Grant Overland, Joshua Honigstock, Catherine Boundouris and Fiona Ta'akimoeaka helped generate immense interest in a show whose momentum, flair and excitement became the benchmark for all subsequent productions.

Bye Bye Birdie (1986) will be remembered as a show in which the boys' dancing was at its most brilliant and displayed the amazing ability and patience of the choreographer Justine Alexander (in Year 10 at the time) to transform a group of rowers and rugby players into confident, competent dancers. It must be said at this point that Justine did such a brilliant job in choreographing the entire show that right up to the present day the producers have felt confident enough to entrust this most important aspect of productions to capable dancers from the ranks of the girls. That year we also welcomed to the production team a parent whose loyalty, dynamism and humour have contributed in no small way to the success of many High ventures. Lesley Roache, take a bow!

The obvious success of a string of musicals prompted healthy rivalry from more serious thespians who could not or would not sing in public. In 1986 we witnessed the re-emergence of full-scale non-musical drama at SHS. An ambitious production of Shakespeare's *Henry IV Part One* was the first of a line of dramatic works continuing to the present. Drama was introduced as a Year 8 Elective in 1988 and a full-time drama teacher was appointed two years later. The performing arts were alive and flourishing at High!

In 1987 Mr Charles tried his luck with a left-handed baton as the peers and fairies breathed new life into Gilbert and Sullivan's *Iolanthe*, a production memorable for Mr King's wonderful psychedelic backdrop and Mr Marussich's pyrotechnic wizardry. Yet it seemed that less well-known works failed to arouse the interest of the student body the following year, for only fifteen boys attended auditions for *Guys N Dolls* in 1988. A personal approach reassured the more diffident lads, and males soon appeared in respectable numbers at rehearsals

for a show which generated immense audience support and was acclaimed a brilliant success.

The 1989 production of *My Fair Lady* reaffirmed the belief that no matter how difficult the work a talented and enthusiastic cast and a cohesive crew can produce a first-class result and have a lot of fun at the same time.

During the past decade pupils have come to realise the great benefits to be gained from involvement in musical productions. First and most important, it is an educational experience. All involved have the opportunity to become familiar with a complete and substantial work from the standard corpus available for amateur production. It is a forum for singers, actors, dancers, musicians and stagehands to perform to their best, and for sound, lighting and make-up personnel to gain valuable experience in a real-life context. Moreover it has many social benefits and has fostered closer harmonious relations between our two schools at all levels, and laid to rest the popular misconception (at least at the boys' school) that singing and dancing are uncool.

THE SCHOOL FOR SCANDAL

Producing a play set in the Restoration Period is even more demanding because of additional complications such as stylised make-up, elaborate costumes, ornate furnishings, extremely difficult dialogue, and the peculiar mannerisms of the period. It was always the intention of the directors to undertake a play which would provide stimulation for students in the area of stagecraft and character development. Students must be able to work together as a team and display competence at all levels of the production process. Consequently publicity, artwork, and stage design for *The School for Scandal* were all based on student submissions. This play was chosen because of the opportunities it presents to develop and extend the skills of students. Those who were not part of the cast were involved in lighting, sound, and stage management. The female roles in the play were managed brilliantly by actors who auditioned from Sydney Girls High. Mrs Candour, the oldest member of the group called *The School for Scandal*, was courageously played by Jake Blundell. Other notable character performances were by Joseph Bilbao, who played Sir Benjamin Backbite, and Martin Kovac as Crabtree. These students brought a uniqueness to the characters they portrayed. Special mention must also be made of the fine performances by Arron Fletcher, Ben Searle, Jonathon Coleman, David Grant, Chris Jones, Tina Stavrou, and Maria Kalamatianos. The whole cast must be congratulated on taking up the challenge of this play and striving for nothing less than excellence in their presentations. The play opened on Monday 22 October and ran for four nights. The final performance on Saturday 27 October was accompanied by a performance of *Rinse The Blood Off My Toga* by the Year 8 Drama students. They were keen to display their talents and their support for the Year 10 venture by providing a brief but engaging interval performance. The Year 8s, who have now been exposed to the excitement of public performance, have expressed a desire to return to the stage as soon as possible. We can now look forward to many future performances by them. We are delighted to recognise the generous support of so many parents. Mrs Roache again put her busy personal schedule on hold while helping to get the play underway. She organised stage furnishings, props, make-up, and co-ordinated costumes with Ms Barda. Mr and Mrs Searle and Mrs Coleman were always there to help during the busy, pre-performance make-up and costume preparations. The P&C Auxiliary provided refreshments for each performance. M. and Mrs Tzannes allowed the entire cast and crew to "invade" their home after the final performance for the traditional celebratory romp. To all these people, as well as the teaching staff involved,

thank you. It is through your fine efforts that projects such as these are now an integral part of the school year. The end product was a standard of performance which was extremely professional and a true indication of the calibre and capabilities of the drama students.

JUST FOR THE RECORD

Richard Brinsley Sheridan was forced to find a way of earning money, as he refused to allow his famous and beautiful wife to sing in public. He wrote *The Rivals* at the age of 23 and when it was produced in January 1775, it was a complete failure. He rewrote the play and in its new form it was a brilliant success. He devoted only five years of his life to play-writing but *The Rivals*, *The School for Scandal*, and *The Critic* made him famous. He was always in want of money and was arrested for debt in 1813. After suffering from brain disease, he died in abject poverty in 1816 and is buried in Westminster Abbey.

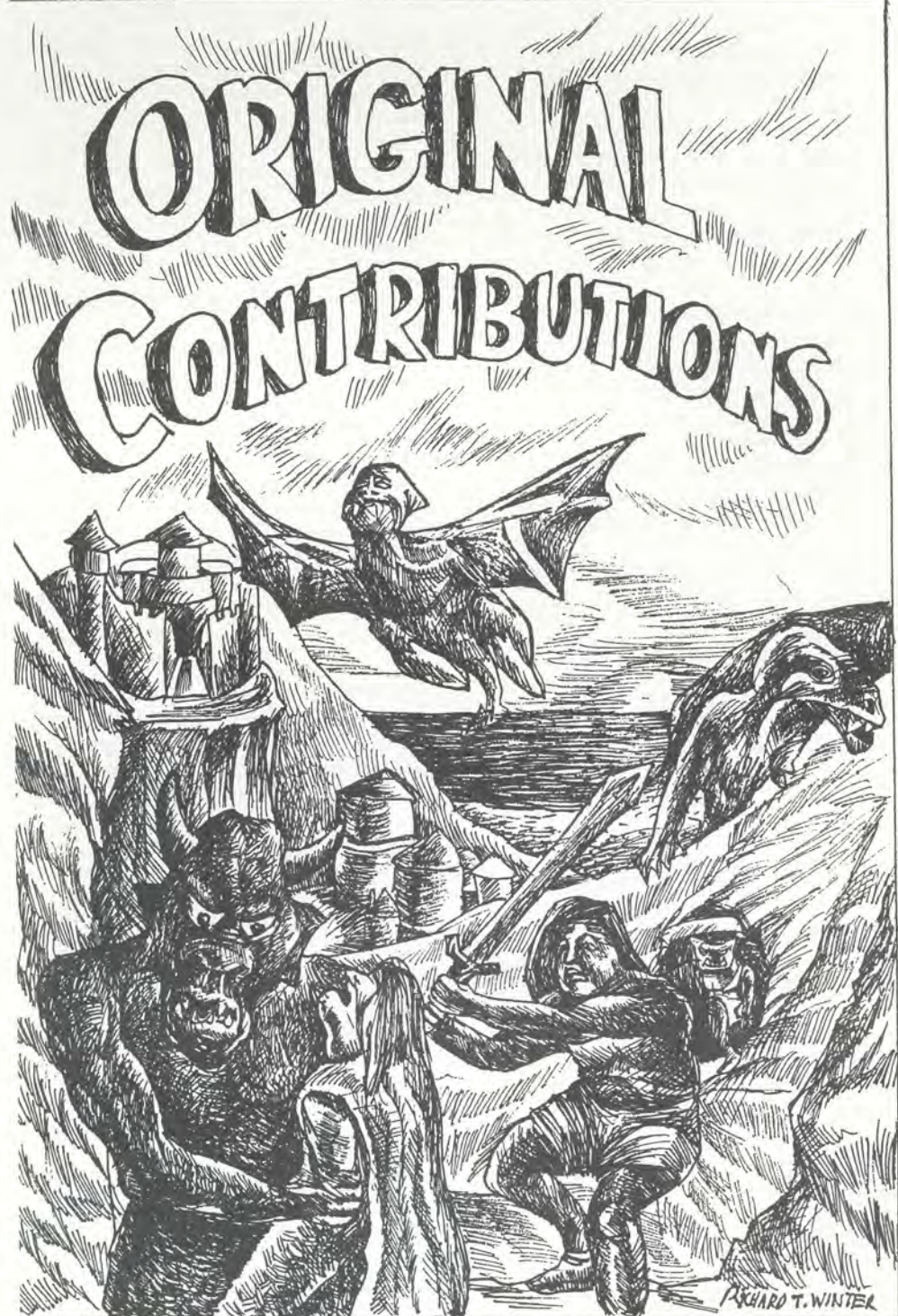

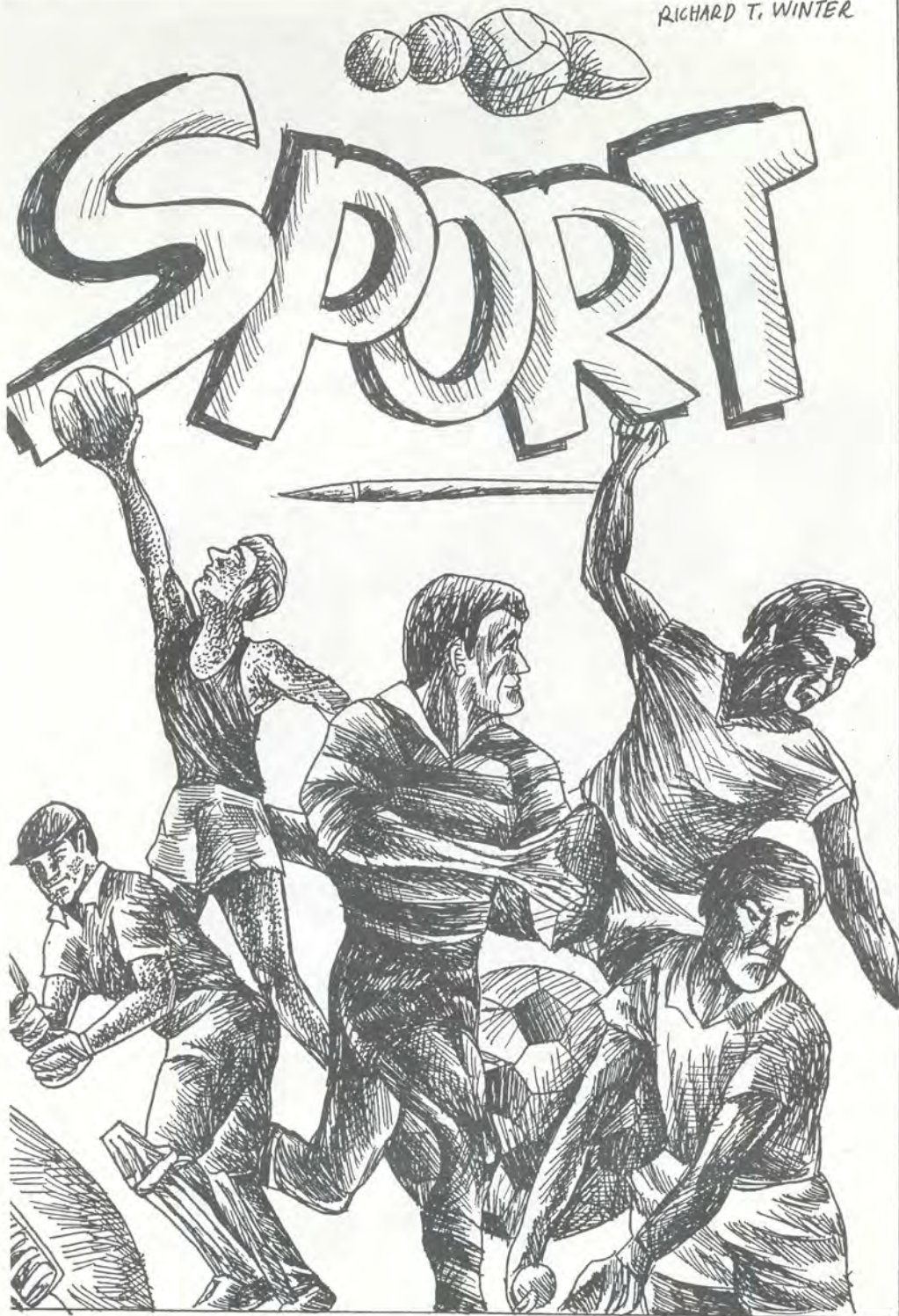

CAPTAIN OF BOATS

In some respects it was a year of disappointment. Early optimism, promise and potential again took second place to the fact that other schools were even more competitive. The junior crews, although recording no wins, do provide us with hope. Competition among the juniors gave us some good crews. This attitude must be carried on to the senior ranks as well. The results of such a competitive atmosphere can be seen in the success of the Newtoning Eights again this year.

On a more positive note, many improvements have been made to conditions at the sheds. The installation of new dormitories created a more relaxing atmosphere for senior crews, while a new kitchenette made life much easier for both parents and boys at mealtime.

I would like to thank all the people involved with

rowing this year, especially Mr Barris who again gave so much of his time and was always available when needed.

In conclusion I would like to emphasise Cameron Cheetham's remarks from 1988. "Don't let us become the easy beats again." We were on the verge of a major breakthrough. Now we must review our methods and rebuild. We have the potential and size to do this. Let's use the potential we have.

we were about to withdraw since Josh McKay was out with an overworked groin and the rest of the crew had the flu. 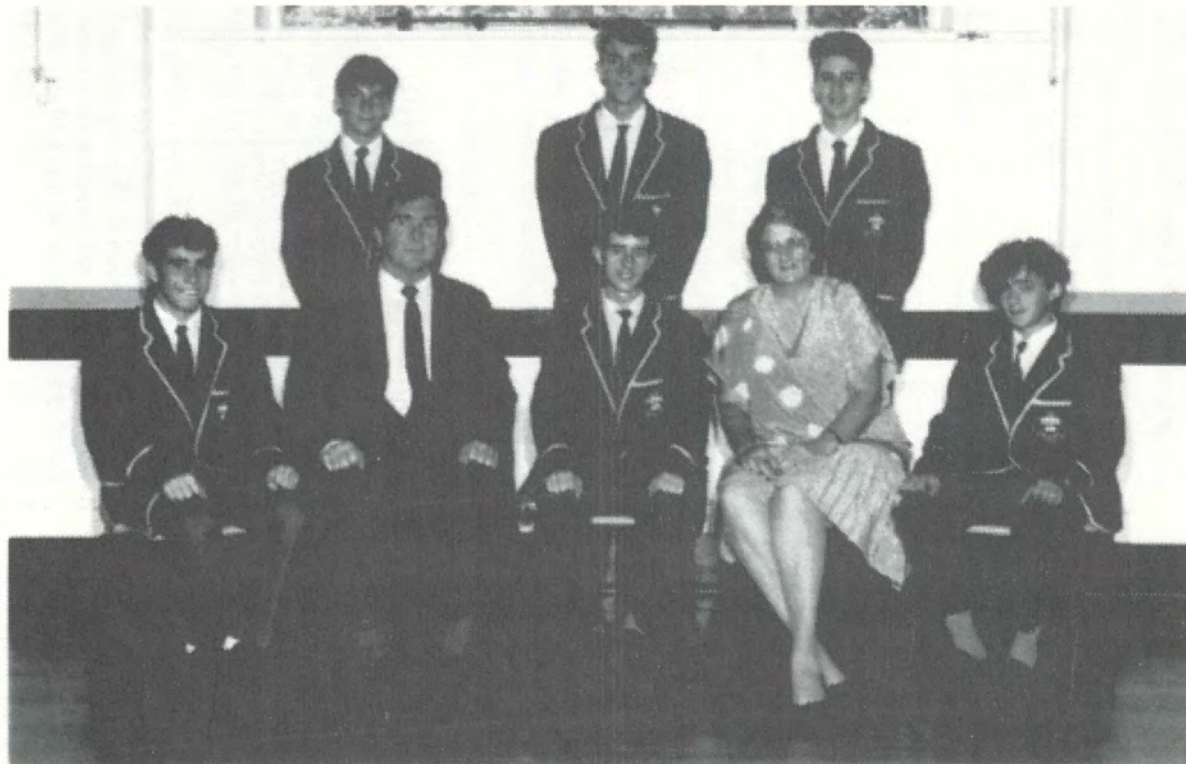

RUGBY MASTERS REPORT

It was generally a pleasing season. In Waratah Shield the First XV was defeated by St Edmunds Canberra in a tight match. In GPS they finished fourth with the most pleasing win being against Scots who eventually won the Waratah Shield. Our Second XV won its first three GPS matches but then faded somewhat as injuries took their toll. Lack of depth in senior rugby is a real problem with good players deciding to opt out in Year 12 because of pressure of study and the significant training schedule which is now required in order to stay competitive. The old training session has now been superseded by skills work, weight work, etc., which are placing more and more pressure on both players and coaches. It is a huge commitment.

In the age groups our 16s were very competitive considering that seven of their rank were playing 1sts or 2nds. They won three GPS matches. The 15s were also competitive making the quarter finals of the Buchan Shield. This however was somewhat disappointing as we have reached the final in the previous five years. The 14s took star-billing this year. The 14As were undefeated in the trials and GPS, a significant and pleasing performance. The 14Bs lost only three matches and the 14Cs were also competitive.

The 13As were most inexperienced with only six of our Year 7 intake having played Union or League previously. The problem of little or no sports coaching in primary schools is evident. Nevertheless the improvement in skills of the 13s was dramatic and the enthusiasm was great. Our thanks must go to the development officers from the NSW RU. They were of great assistance, particularly Rob Egerton whose cooperation and great experience were invaluable.

Despite a pleasing season rugby at High faces the problems of most high schools in NSW: parental concern about safety, decreasing commitment of unpaid staff (understandable), significant ethnic groups whose traditions do not include rugby, general indifference to participation in physical activity etc. One wonders what the future holds.
