HEADMASTER'S REPORT

As I reflect upon the past fifteen years my thoughts reinforce the belief. I have always held that Sydney High School is a remarkable, fascinating and unique public institution. Members of the school family, local visitors and guests from interstate and overseas have been similarly impressed.

It is in the reception areas of schools, tertiary institutions and business houses that first impressions are mostly formed. At High this experience takes place upon entering the grounds. Here you are met by intelligent, cheerful, well-presented young men who, above all others, best represent the ethos of the school. Impressed visitors always remark on the courtesy and warmth of their reception and the readiness with which boys will interrupt their own activities to offer assistance.

The boys accept their ambassadorial roles and responsibilities with good grace and deservedly are acknowledged and praised for this. Staff, parents and old boys too are renowned for their hospitality and goodwill which draw favourable comment from many quarters. Together the members of the school family make High a nice place to be - and I shall miss it.

I feel very humble when I recall the number of students, staff, parents and old boys who have thanked me for my efforts and wished me well for the future. But I look back with deep satisfaction, remembering all that this job, this school and staff, parents, alumni and the boys have done for me.

I have broadened my circle of friends quite substantially since coming here in 1977. By friends I mean people I trust - people who can be relied upon to do a job without complaining - happy contented people who rally round to assist in ways that enhance the reputation of the school and add to the quality of education that it offers. In consequence of this High provides boundless opportunities for the boys and all of those who choose to participate in its activities. It is also a demanding school for pupils, teachers and ancillary staff. Were it not for its network of support systems and its

distinctive brand of community involvement those demands could not be met. To observers High must seem a fascinating if not a strange place. It is certainly true that the close association of our school family generates strong feelings of independence - but it also galvanises us into a strong workforce determined to pursue excellence in all that we do - while remaining faithful in our support of the State education system and to our affiliation with the Great Public Schools.

Much of what I have said thus far deals with the corporate spirit of SHS. The preservation and enhancement of this spirit is crucial to the strength of the school and the continued wellbeing of the boys - but so too is our ability to cope with change - particularly in the areas of school management and curriculum. The Scott Report on Schools Renewal and the subsequent document School Centred Education have now been followed by the First Annual Report of the External Council of Review - a report designed to provide a perspective on both progress and problems encountered in the first full year of putting Schools Renewal into practice. Excellence and Equity, the Carrick Report and the Education Reform Act 1990 describe the program of curriculum reform to be introduced in NSW from the beginning of 1992. Past performances indicate clearly that the SHS community will cope very well with these changes in requirements under legislation and government policy, as it will with the change occasioned by my retirement.

There are management changes elsewhere. The new President of the Foundation is Mr Robert Mitchell, a tried and proven leader who has given outstanding service to the school over the past eight years. Mr Phillip Lambert, another tireless worker, has taken over as Chairman of the School Council. Mrs Veronica Moschione has been re-elected as President of the P&C Association. Together they and their committees, along with the OBU, the High Club Ltd under its President Mr Ken Baret, and Lodge SHS through Worshipful Master Mr Ken Matthews, will maintain support to the headmaster and staff in the interests and welfare of

the school. Legions of parents and old boys not on committees also provide much-needed support.

SHS continues to demonstrate its capacity to adjust to current economic, social and educational needs and constraints. Reforms in curriculum and school management have been quite radical. While addressing such issues the school has gone about its business of achieving outcomes which have been determined by the school independent of the system. The celebration of the school's Centenary, the building of the Abbotsford Centre, the upgrading of the Fairland Pavilion and the establishment of the Foundation Inc. were some of these targets. The maintenance of two language departments and the expansion of Industrial Arts. Visual Arts and Music are others. Though Departmentally-driven, the production of a School Management Plan was another achievement of note. One goal however has been of critical importance. That is the highly selective six-class Year Seven intake. It is this selective base which will ensure the viability of High well into the future.

Two of the school's stalwarts who fought for its

selectivity and enrolments were honoured at Speech Night on 2 December. They were His Hon Judge Kenneth Frederick Ernest Torrington and the late Cecil Edward Henning Rubie whose wife Joan attended Speech Night with the Judge. Judge Torrington attended the school from 1931-5 and became a NSW District Court Judge. He served on the School Council for many years and was OBU President in 1971-2. He will be remembered for his important work in securing tax deductibility for contributions to the Building Fund established for the Centenary Project.

Cec Rubie attended both the Mary Ann Street and Moore Park schools from 1925-8. Upon completing his university studies he became Public Relations Officer for the Department of Education where he was responsible for the introduction of Education Week. He was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1976 for his services to the community and in particular to education. For many years he served on the School Council and as Secretary to the OBU of which he was President from 1965-6. With the Year Seven intake of 180 pupils now assured. it has been decided to reorganise the house system to provide for two additional houses. They are to be called Rubie and Torrington to honour these two great men and their work for SHS. Their colours will be white (Rubie) and royal blue (Torrington). It was very pleasing for us all to have Mrs Rubie and Judge Torrington present for this announcement.

Before closing I wish to say a word about the staff - to the teachers of SHS I extend my sincere appreciation for the dedicated service they have given to the school and the unqualified support to me personally. I am grateful too to the boys for their warmth, support and good humour. The executive and teachers have inordinate demands placed upon them due to the additional commitments of this six-day school. These additional duties also affect the workloads of the ancillary staff. Along with the teaching staff they are owed a debt of gratitude by the pupils and by all other members of the school family.

I bid you and your families farewell and sincerely thank all who have made my stay at High so memorable and worthwhile.

There were several significant developments in Foundation operations this year:

This year saw the retirement from the office of Foundation President and Chairman of Mr R Outterside, whose contribution to the school in all the offices he has held has been outstanding. Foundation in particular owes him a considerable debt for his leadership, energy and wise counsel during his period in office from Foundation's inception. Bestwishes are extended to Robert Mitchell who has taken over as the new President. With his responsibilities as President of the OBU, particularly in its centenary year, 1992 promises to be a very busy year for him.

OBITUARY

Philip John Ainsworth (1953-91)

Phil Ainsworth joined the staff of SHS as a teacher of English in 1987. His warm personality quickly endeared him to his colleagues and pupils. Keen to seek full involvement in the life of the school, Phil coached a basketball team, assisted with the fitness program and management of the First Fifteen, was influential in the creation of the Weights Room, and was a most competent producer of *My Fair Lady* in 1989.

Increasingly debilitated by the effects of the AIDS virus, Phil was granted medical retirement

in May this year. He continued to make pilgrimages to the school he had grown to love. For many colleagues and pupils it was their first direct contact with AIDS, and Phil's example contributed much towards raising awareness and understanding of the effects of this terrible disease.

Phil died on 27 October. However his undying warmth and cheerfulness remain an example to us all.

RETIREE Geoffrey John Pettit (1971-91)

Geoff Pettit retired this year after twenty years at SHS. Possessing an incisive mind, quick wit and practical approach to problem-solving, Mr Pettit steered Classics at High through the turbulent seventies and in the eighties consolidated the position of Latin and Greek in a curriculum which placed increasingly less emphasis on the importance of classical learning.

Mr Pettit actively promoted the image of an unconventional classicist by being a keen sportsman and rugby savant, habitue of the western annexe, a competent jazz musician, and well-known identity on beaches from Bondi to Maroubra. Photographs of the Pettit Era at

SHS reveal that in the tightness of his shorts, the length of his hair and the depth of his suntan may be found an accurate study of the social history of the Eastern Suburbs over the past two decades.

In addition to being an influential member of the School Executive, Mr Pettit assumed varied responsibilities during his time at High, including coach of the First Fifteen, Prefect Master and Chief Timetabler. An example of his devotion to the school is seen in the fact that while on long-service leave prior to his retirement he voluntarily continued to coach his rugby team through the winter. The school extends to him every good wish in retirement.

CAPTAIN'S REPORT

"The worth of a state in the long run is the worth of the individuals composing it. " - John Stuart Mill

None could disagree that High is a unique school, A selective school whose intake is from the entire state is a diverse melting pot of many different religions and nationalities. Through the programs of sport and extra-curricular activities friendships are forged across these boundaries, and trust and understanding are developed between different people. In the crusade to build a society free from irrational fears and prejudices, Sydney High can play a major role.

The communal spirit of the school is evident in many aspects of its life. Whether a raucous rendition of the war-cry in a huddle before a match on a Saturday or the proud singing of the school song in the Great Hall, the sense of unity is powerful. Yet for such a show of unity you may as well be just another face in the awesome mob of pink-and-blue at Hunter's Hill or chant mindless slogans at the opposition from the blue-and-white swarm at the western end of the King's Main Oval. Clearly, High is different.

Our school's greatest asset is its ability to cater for the individual. At life's prime learning age there is an unmatched ability for self-discovery at High. This opportunity to establish your own identity is vital. To think about your own aims, hopes and ambitions, then strive to achieve them. Do so by setting your own goals.

Surrendering these personal aims is the cost accompanying mindless subservience to anyone (be they parents, friends or teachers). The imposed will sets your goals. Your actions in trying to realise these imposed goals will be hampered by less personal incentive or "drive" and the goal, once realised, will mean far less than one of personal significance. Your self-image also suffers.

No-one can tell you what to like in others - you choose your friends. More so then, in evaluating your own actions, you should be the judge. For example, all of your friends may imply their measure of success in the grade of the football team in which you play. However, making the As in rugby may not mean as much to you as making a higher rowing crew or excelling in some area of academic work. Consequently, your time and effort must be directed towards maximum satisfaction of these goals as you see them. If this involves absorbing some flak from your peers you will soon find the integrity to rebut their jeers. Now you are plotting your own course. The way to order your goals is to discover what you

most enjoy. The way to find out what you enjoy is to try as many activities as possible. Thus your experiences broaden. This is the unique opportunity supplied by High. Just as no-one could possibly participate in all activities, no-one can say that none are of interest. Experiencing so many facets of school life will help you to direct your activities to areas you will find most rewarding.

There are several important decisions you must make along the way. First there is the act of decision. The options are endless and you must consciously narrow the field and select something you think you may enjoy.

Second there is the act of serious participation. Give yourself the opportunity to excel. If it is football, go to training and kick a ball around the home.

Finally is the act of discovery. Discover for yourself what your capabilities are. This often involves reaching new heights by crashing through old barriers.

This process of self-discovery and forging an identity can often be made difficult by several things that limit your personal development. These you must strive to overcome. The most serious hindrance is often your own self-image. The danger comes from the insecurity of trying to label yourself, or to put yourself into a stereotyped category. How many consciously or unconsciously classify themselves as surfies, footballers, nerds or as members of one of the countless other groupings ?

How can anyone be categorised? As individuals we must seek to break new ground. Your self-image may tell you (as it did in my case):" You're not the sporting type. Stick to studies. "The first thing I did was to break out of my self-imposed limitation to success as I tried rowing and rugby. With much enjoyable work I reached 1st VIII-stroke and was a member of the 2nd XV - without sacrificing my still important studies.

In many cases this self-image is built up by others; and this is a danger. You are handing the power over yourself to others who would like to think they can manage it better. Even the rare true and best of friends could only tailor your needs to their goals - a recipe for disaster.

This leads to the importance of self-confidence. If you set your goals and know which path your life is taking, contentment will then arise from within. The need for the approval of others is less important, and susceptibility to peer pressure which inevitably leads to a compromise of your values for quick popularity is greatly reduced. In time people will come to know you as the person you have the courage to be and respect, and true friendship will follow. High offers a unique opportunity for self-discovery in the necessary personal way to a degree matched by few other schools. It would be a shame not to recognise its significance.

(It would appear that Wor.Bro.Studdy taught Bishop Hilliard at SHS in those early years.)

1963 Wor.Bro.Les Shattock. Two of his daughters, Marilyn and Robyn, were vice-captains of SGHS in

1960 and 1966 respectively.

For the years 1961,76,86-7 Rt.Wor.Bro.Harry Coss served as Worshipful Master. The H A Coss Prize for English at High is presented annually in his honour. At the conclusion of the evening Mrs Peggy Coss, on behalf of Lodge Victoria, presented to the NSW Masonic Youth Welfare Fund an amount to establish "The Lodge Victoria No.73 H A Coss Memorial Prize for Literature."

SCHOOL NOTES

ON THE LEVEL - After several false alarms the Department of Works sent its bitumen machine to the grounds in third term to pave the staff car-park. BEAR FACTS - Historians will be pleased to learn that for the first time in a decade the bear pit has stayed largely empty of broken furniture for most of the year, and can be employed as a shelter in inclement weather, if we ever have rain again.

MODEL PUPIL - Nick Testoni, recent Vice-Captain, is currently carving out a modelling career

in Paris, the home of High fashion.

THIRD LEVEL - After several years lying fallow, the once infamous McKay No 3 football ground was resurrected this season, with the application of several tonnes of topsoil in the lower parts, and a slight relocation to avoid some of the wetter areas. This was necessitated in part by the continuing gradual resurgence of interest in Rugby, and in part by the conversion of No 5 ground to full-time soccer duties.

SECOND MILLENNIUM - For the second year in a row the School had over a thousand on the rolls. The official enrollment was 1057, served by 69.9 staff, giving a ratio of 15.1 boys per teacher.

OVERSEAS STUDENTS - Recent pupils Hans van Leeuwen and Jamie Benson began studying at Oxford and Cambridge respectively, late in 1991. Their breadth of vision, including the ability to look beyond the ordinary horizon, will serve as an example for current scholars.

ON BOARD - The honour of supervising the restoration and up-dating of the School's honour boards has fallen to Mr Lucan-Roberts, whose careful vetting of craftsmen to do the work has recently born fruit. The long absence of the boards from the walls of the Great Hall is at an end.

BOARD ROOM - The Sir Frederick Deer Board Room (formerly the Main Office) will soon have a framed photograph of Sir Frederick to oversee the deliberations of the School Council, The Foundation, and the many other bodies and groups which meet there. In the interim, just to give an idea of the intended effect, George Saxby's photograph has hung in the place of honour. Several curious passers-by, both boys and staff, have asked why a portrait of Lenin hangs in the board room!

IN THE FRAME - Meanwhile the painting of Gentleman George is away being restored, having recently fallen from the wall and suffered some damage, principally to the frame. What does this signify?

FOR THE RECORD - The First Fifteen's 46-3 defeat of Newington on 24 August surpassed the previous record score for a High First Fifteen match in GPS Competition by ten points. The previous record had stood since 1946. At the other end of the spectrum the 13D Fifteen's 68-0 defeat of St Joseph's on 3rd August may well be a minor record in itself.

LONG DAY'S JOURNEY - The School's recent visit to the Armidale School involved more than three hundred boys and ten adults in a classic train journey of ten hours each way. The specially engaged special train departed from Regent Street Mortuary Station at eight in the morning, and after stopping at Werris Creek for re-watering, arrived at Armidale just after six, to the glare of television camera lights, for this was the first passenger train to reach Armidale since the XPT service had been withdrawn many months before. After the return journey opinions varied as to the success of the idea of going by train. Whilst all agreed that the freedom to walk about was welcome, many thought that the extra three hours travelling time each way compared to coaches was too much. On the other hand some parents remarked that they thought the added safety of train travel was the key factor.

OUT OF SIGHT, BUT... - Regular readers will be saddened to hear that "Tambourine Girl" still languishes in the wood store awaiting restoration. For the information of newer readers, she used to stand in a corner of the courtyard until she met with an accident some years ago.

UP THE POLE - During a working bee at McKay to prepare for the Rugby season, the weather-beaten flagpole was lowered, painted, and given a new halyard. Sadly there is not a currently working flagpole in the School grounds.

HIGH SPEED BALLS - The cricketers are now either taking cover, or rapidly increasing their batting skills, since the acquisition of an automatic bowling machine. Several members of staff have the bruises to show from their manly attempts to brave its fastest balls.



HMS PINAFORE

4578 JUNE



This year a talented cast of over fifty girls and boys, supported by a crew of almost twice that number, took part in a rollicking production of Gilbert and Sullivan's timeless masterpiece HMS Pinafore. At the auditions, held early in March, there was no shortage of candidates for principal roles, and for the first time in many years the directors had to hold several auditions to fill the role of Ralph Rackstraw: regrettably there could be only one successful tenor, while the unsuccessful candidates seemed content to lead the chorus of Her Majesty's sailors and marines.

The operetta, first produced in 1878, is a satire of British society in general and of the Royal Navy in particular. Josephine, Captain Corcoran's daughter, rejects the advances of Sir Joseph Porter, First Lord of the Admiralty, in favour of an ordinary sailor, Ralph Rackstraw. Their planned elopement is discovered and Ralph is incarcerated. Mrs Cripps, a gipsy and street-seller better known as Buttercup, reveals that she mixed up Ralph and Corcoran when they were babies. So there are no class distinctions to prevent Josephine's marriage to Captain Rackstraw.

As Sir Joseph, Joseph Bilbao performed with just the right amount of eccentricity and joie de vivre and, supported most ably by Mr Walker (dialogue) and Mr Charles (singing) on the two nights when he was cruelly robbed of his voice, obviously enjoyed the part. As Captain Corkscrew Cockroach Cock-up Corcoran Jake Blundell was wonderfully self-assured, innovative and dramatically competent. Jordan Spence, playing Josephine, proved to be the Find of the Year. Her fine soprano voice, stage

presence and professionalism helped greatly to make the show run smoothly.

Benjamin Hart made a very creditable Ralph and his fine singing voice was a highlight of the show: a fabulous performance from one so young (year 9). Jon Coleman was more than equal to the task of playing a swashbuckling Dick Deadeye with an identity crisis. The villain of the piece, Jon found himself cast as the universal hunchback, Quasimodo one minute, Richard the Third the next and, in one brilliant episode in the middle of Josephine's second act aria, the Phantom of the Opera singing Music of the Night. Needless to say, Jon carried off all his roles magnificently: thanks must go to Pam Coleman for helping Jon to master the songs.

Karen Reiner's Buttercup was portrayed with conviction and Cora Purnell's Hebe well sung. Ben Searle led the chorus admirably, and his For He is an Englishman was another highlight of the show. The first act trio involving Ben Hart, Ben Searle and Philip Bonnet was executed with splendid harmonies. Well done, chaps!

Behind the scenes a small army of technicians, stage hands and musicians contributed in no small way to the resounding success of the show. Special thanks should be given to Ms Surbey (lighting), Ms Schlesinger (sets), Mrs Gunsberger (make-up), Mr Hassall (front of house), Amy Janes (stage manager), Alexi Warn (year 10, choreographer), Mesd Roache and McKay (costumes), and to the directors, Ms Healy, Messrs Charles, Davies and Walker.

HIGH RENAISSANCE

A Day for Gifted and Talented Children

On Sunday 1 December was held La Haute Renaissance, as it was described in numerous French posters displayed around the school grounds. It was a day when the gifted and talented of the school would express themselves in numerous ways, while revealing to the public the abilities of Sydney High. There was a Science display which exhibited numerous experiments and pieces of apparatus. In the main foyer was a display of the art of the cream of the school's artists. The Environmental Committee showed what it has achieved and what it had to offer. The History presentation had numerous Year 10 major projects on show (including video and cassette interviews), as well as a demonstration of historical database utilities, run by Year 9. The Student Newspaper displayed a vast array of computer technology, with information on the newspaper and its production. The Commerce Department's displays ranged from stockmarket consultancy to managing the Australian economy.

The Science display offered a great range of equipment and techniques, including bacterial and fungal cultures taken from around the school and its environs (including the canteen, toilets, the Flat and Moore Park - the latter two showing vast amounts of airborne fungal spores, all of which are breathed in by every passerby), the Science Department's giant Queensland cockroaches, which have had babies (and lots of them) and each measures 6-7 cm, old scientific equipment, including a periscope, which was dug up from the dust-bound science storeroom, optical displays, electric circuits, a Van-der-Graff generator which can (and did) make one's hair stand on end (as well as giving Mr Dolan a very nasty shock), and the Year 9 computer demonstration, which used computers to calculate speed and velocity of objects. Two intrepid Year 10 boys set about making various explosive powders: touch powder (which when disturbed produces a disconcerting explosive noise but no heat) and flash powder (which produces only a flash when disturbed). Both of these wreaked havoc as unsuspecting visitors stepped on them and triggered off small explosions. During the day the school archives were open to the visiting public, showing their vast collection of memorabilia. Old photographs of the school in its former role as a zoo and the Mary Anne Street campus were also on display.

In the hall various dramatic performances were held: a Year 11 French extravaganza, a classical play, and musical performances. The French Play in the hall was very interesting, with the Year 11 students combining various scenes of a play with a few songs and pieces of poetry. The highlight of the performance was the singing by Jake Blundell of *Parachutiste*. It was indeed a masterful vocal display. Overall it was a very entertaining sixty-minute performance, and the long hours practising could be seen in the end result.

The Latin performance of "In Basilica" (from the Cambridge Latin Course) featured five Year 7 students (from 7M/S). The story was about Caecilius (Rory Murphy), a banker, who has brought to court Hermogenes (Mark Jackson), a Greek Merchant of dubious commercial practices, who has failed to repay a debt. Hermogenes and his hired witness (Steve Laurent) are as inept at perjury as they are at larceny. Hermogenes wears to court the signet ring which proves his liability! The Judge (Ben Wood) establishes the facts of the matter in four minutes forty-five seconds – a shining example to the dilatory jurists of the modern world!

The cast performed with gusto, and was well received by the audience, who were indulgent towards the outrageous liberties and anachronisms imposed by budget constraints. William Chi was an invaluable ancillary with his terse and colourful subtitles.

Work Experience played a major part in High's Career Education Program. Years 10 and 11 each completed one week of work experience and a number had a second week: a booklet was produced. Visits to tertiary institutions were conducted, and SHS and SGHS co-hosted the MER Tertiary Awareness Symposium where representatives, including faculty reps from all NSW and ACT universities and TAFE were present.

SCIENCE DEPARTMENT

The year was an extremely busy one for the Science Department, with a number of programs begun as well as expansion of many others. A very pleasing feature was the increased number of students studying Science in the Senior School and the excellent HSC results.

HSC Results

The highlight of our results was a 3rd, 4th and equal 5th placing in the State in Chemistry, these were achieved by Anthony Abrahams (3rd), Tamir Maltz (4th) and Michael Miroshnik (Equal 5th). Tamir Maltz and John Balafos both gained one hundred per cent in the HSC exam. Eight students gained 90 or above in Chemistry, while seven students gained 90 or above in Physics, placing them in the top two per cent of the State.

Australian Schools Science Competition

Our results surpassed even last year's efforts. A record 399 boys from Years 7 to 10 entered the competition. Of these, 186 boys (47 per cent of entrants) gained distinctions or better, placing them in the top eleven per cent of the State. The results were:

24 High Distinctions (Top 1% of the State) 162 Distinctions (next 10% of the State) 143 Credits (next 20% of State)

The highest aggregate score in the School was achieved by Robert Simmons, Year 8, Ron Granot and Roderick Sweeting were equal first in Year 10, David Eyers was first in Year 9 while Michael Benjamin and Christopher Dooley were equal first in Year 7.

National Titration Competition

The School entered five teams in the State heats of the competition held at UNSW. The team of Paul Joshua, Mark Denton and Kenneth Doo Chew of Year 11 were successful in reaching the National Finals, and were placed in the

top 25 schools nationally, for which the school was awarded a plaque. Individually the boys gained two gold and one silver medal. Congratulations also to coach Mr M. Smith.

National Chemistry Quiz

Again, oustanding results were achieved. A total of 211 boys from years 8 to 12 entered. The results were:

81 High Distinctions (Top 10% of Australia) 69 Distinctions (Next 15%)

Highest scores were gained by J. Lee in Year 10, who was placed 99.5 in the State Percentile Rank and was offered a place in the Chemistry Olympiad Training School at the Australian National University in Canberra. K. Wong in Year 8 was placed 99.19 in the State Percentile Rank and was awarded a plaque.

National Science Summer School

Gerald Cheong (Year 11) was successful in being selected to attend the CRA National Science Summer School in January 1992 at ANU. He was sponsored by the Rotary Club of Kings Cross.

Physics and Chemistry Olympiad

Steven Rodwell, Gerald Cheong and Steven Vaccarella (all year 11) were invited to attend the National Physics Olympiad Training School at ANU in January 1992. Steven Rodwell was also invited to attend the National Chemistry Olympiad Training School. All were successful in being placed in the 'train-on' squad for final selection in the National team.

Introduction of Geology in Year 11

This year 2 unit Geology was introduced into Year 11 for the first time at SHS. The course is an interesting one with plenty of practical fieldwork and we were confident of good results in the HSC in 1992.

Excursions

The excursion program was expanded this year to include Years 7 and 8. Year 7 boys visited Taronga Zoo while Year 8 boys visited the Royal Botanical Gardens and the Australian Museum. Year 10 boys visted the Australian Museum and the UNSW Science and Technology Exposition where they investigated based careers. Year 11 Biology science students visited Bantry Bay for an ecology study. Year 11 Geology students started the course with a three day camping field trip to the Bathurst area. Students then visited Bondi Headland, the Australian Museum, Narrabeen Lagoon, Turrimetta Headland and survived on underground tours of Cumnock No 1 Colliery at Singleton, While underground, miners held a stop work meeting and called a strike, leaving us to walk out behind the transporter. Year 12 Physics students reported mineral radiation during their walk through the atomic reactor at Lucas Heights.

GTC Computer Interfacing Group

An innovative program was begun this year, led by Mr Woolnough. A group of very talented

boys headed by David Eyers (Year 9) and James Slezak (Year 8) are working to interface computer technology directly with science experiments using temperature and light sensitive probes. The group are designing and adapting their own apparatus and writing appropriate computer programs to display their data, with considerable success. This program is particularly exciting. They have been assisted by the donation of an Apple IIe computer by Mr Terry Meakin, and a similar machine donated by Dr Peter Slezak at UNSW.

Giant Cockroaches

To many, the real highlight of the year in the Science Department has been the long awaited birth of twelve offspring from our pair of giant Queensland cockroaches. Mr Harvey has spent a nervous few months during the confinement carefully nurturing the parents, but mother, babies and Mr Harvey are all doing well now. The father cockroach couldn't seem to care less; it is not setting a good example to the boys.

Sydney High Impecunious Trekkers' Society

(Founded 1974)

In my first year at High an unruly mob, 8M, provided the Foundation Members of the Trekkers' Society. Our first expedition was a scramble up the cliff behind Little Wobby Sport and Recreation Camp at Broken Bay. At the top we were too shaken by the climb to enjoy the view below us, nor did anyone notice that I was now 180 degrees off-course as we tottered off into the scrub. Eventually we made it back, surviving more navigational blunders, savage scrub, mozzies, oyster cuts and mud.

Since that time little has changed except the faces.

Before the first trip to Tasmania I informed the boys that the cheapest accommodation in Hobart would be the Youth Hostel. This was correct. But the hostel turned out to be on the other side of the harbour. No problem, I would just drive us in our hired mini-bus, sweeping over the bridge, taking in the view from the majestic arch as we motored to our well-earned rest after a week in the Tasmanian wilderness. Unfortunately, just before we hit Hobart, a ship rammed the bridge, knocking one of its arches into the depths below. So our route to the hostel was miles out of the city, up harbour, to the army's sort-of floating bridge, where the battle to cross brought victory only to the fittest and meanest. Then it was a similar drive on the other side of the harbour back to the city, to the hostel - which was closed! We had taken 90 minutes from downtown Hobart which sat winking and beckoning just across a narrow strip of water.

In the four later expeditions to Hobart we pitched tents in the Sandy Bay Caravan Park. From there the lads strolled down to the Wrest Point Casino, towels in hand, swimmers under shorts, waving to the doorman at the hotel entrance as if they were the children of rich guests staying there. It was a short strut from the entrance to the pool and gymnasium. The fact that they were not coming from the hotel but were streaming in from the outside did not seem to register with the doorman. I was not game to try the same trick.

Once, just before a Christmas trip to the Blue Mountains, one of the campers, Adam Herdman, phoned me to say that he was not allowed to go, as his mum thought that the bushfire danger was extreme.

"Quite right," I said. "I will take the group along Ettrema Creek, west of Nowra - non-bushfire country."

Three days later we found ourselves sitting for a whole day and part of a night, trapped by bushfires on all sides. Adam dared not tell his mother because he was certain she would ban him from hiking altogether. Now it can be told.

Once, on a ten-dayer across the Shoalhaven and Ettrema Wilderness area, one of the smaller hikers had overpacked.

"Listen, Robbie," I said, "You won't need that big Dolphin torch. You can borrow our little ones. Leave it here to be picked up on a later trip."

Despite his wild protests we left it behind. Two nights later the whole party was in Tullyangella Creek which was running high. To walk this wild creek takes 12 hours with some groups, as it drops steeply, boulder-choked, to Ettrema Creek. Robbie was slow. Suddenly it was 9.00 pm; night had dropped its cloak; the group had spread out and we were last. I whipped out my (small) torch and found that the batteries were almost flat. I had been too mean to buy new ones. With Robbie's Dolphin torch in hand we would have cruised into camp some 35 minutes later. With my woozy batteries we took three hours, impaling ourselves on every small obstacle in the creek, up to our knees in water all the way. The last obstacle, some 25 m from the campsite, seemed to be a vast barricade of tree trunks which kept us occupied for ten minutes. In the light of day it turned out to be three or four logs piled up, easily sidestepped. Nobody dared mention the Dolphin torch in my hearing.

Once, on a trip from Robertson to Kiama, one

of the hikers, who shall remain John Skinner, was annoying me by his effortless (and arrogant) navigational ability. To make matters worse, his decisions were lightning-fast, with barely a glance at the map. I cracked under the pressure on several significant changes of direction, making simple mistakes that even I would not normally make. Finally the group burst out of the mountains, not strolling through rustic laneways, but running hard, rucksacks bumping and grinding, hearts and lungs aflame, because I had not been able to find the pass through the cliff-line soon enough. Kiama was in sight and we were meant to catch the train. We were not going to make it unless we kept running and took short cuts. John, the Smartypants Navigator, also fitter than I was, held the lead.

"Quick! Through the school here. It's a short cut," he opined.

It looked all wrong to me, and I told him so, and loudly. But he was already in through the gate, jogging and panting (but not much) through silent playgrounds. I was nearly trampled by his disciples as they too cut through the school.

He was right. It was a brilliant piece of shortcuttery, and the odds wavered slightly, ever so slightly in our favour - we just might get this train after all. Then the station was in sight. Now it was my turn to reclaim the leadership. "Quick! Over the ridge here! Let's go!"

"But, sir, it's not......"

"Shaddup, John! Let's go!"

So the group was with me, pounding over the bridge, turning left down the narrow, dead-end (Dead-End?!!) Ianeway. No problem: two kicked-out palings, more torn out by the ruck-sacks, a ragged charge up the railway line, me hopping along behind picking splinters out of my boots, startled passengers and officials, and we were onboard. Piece of cake!

One five-day trip started at Central Railway with the 4:07 AM train. Simple. Pack the bag, book a taxi for 3:15 am, and relax. At 3:35 am it was obvious that the taxi company had no intention of coming my way. No worries: just go back upstairs and call the taxi company. 3:45 am: no taxi company in Sydney was

answering phones. (Light drops of sweat on the brow now). Not many worries: grab the rucksack loaded with five days' supplies and run up the hill 250 m to the main road and catch a taxi. During the whole run, before reaching the main road, I could see empty taxis up ahead, swimming like sharks to and fro across my vision. Then I got there. Not a taxi or car in sight. Nothing stirring. Anywhere. (Sweat in trickles now). 3:55 am: I finally crack. The legs jerk into action and I scamper like a maniac back to my garage, pausing briefly on the way to hurl the rucksack into Centennial Park.

4:00 am, and the squeak of my watch tells me I have 7 minutes to catch the train. Hurl the car out of the garage, burn rubber to the rucksack, toss it into the car, run every red light to Central (heavy sweat in my eyes now), lock the car, hide the key for one of my poor relatives to pick it up later, and totter (legs fading now) into the main concourse. A little group of despairing figures at the far end is suddenly galvanised into action, and at exactly 4:07 am we are a herd, the train our only objective as we thunder onto the platform. Did we make it? Piece of cake!

Now the Trekkers' Society is in its 18th year. The total number of individual hikers who have stumbled and cursed through the Great Aussie Bush may be more than 300; the number of trips may be higher than 200, ranging from 3 to 16 days. Many times we have tramped in Tasmania, climbed in the high country of the Australian Alps, traversed the Great Dividing Range, waded through swamps, crashed through miles of dense scrub, navigated up and down mazes of ridges, air-boated and liloed down rivers, explored valleys and tablelands, gazed on plunging waterfalls, moved over the landscape in times of flood and times of drought. For the 90% who never trek this is stupid, even repulsive. Fair enough. I cannot explain why we hike with ten days' of food and equipment hammering us into the earth with every step. All I know is that the disease is incurable - thank God.



DEBATING

SECOND GRADE DEBATING

The year started off well for the Second Grade Debating team, with a masterful victory over the First Grade team. Hopes were high, and we were looking forward to a great season. In 1990 the team had been unofficial champions in the GPS competition, winning all of their seven debates. We hoped to repeat this feat, winning the premiership officially.

During the first part of the season, we had a number of trial debates against SGHS, Kings, Shore, Trinity and TAS. We were successful in all of these, and went into both the CHS and GPS competitions hoping for victory. The GPS competition was held over seven weeks during third term, and was a mixture of success and defeat. In a controversial decision, we lost to Scots in a debate focusing on government control of the media. This, of course, made us even more determined to win against Grammar, but they successfully argued "that the moral minority has too much voice" and plunged us into the depths of despair.

Luckily, these two disappointing defeats were followed by a number of wins, against Kings, Joeys, Newington and Shore (who had the effrontery to assert the fact that Liberal was better than Labor). It was inevitable that we lost one more GPS debate, just to make it clear that we had not won the premiership, and the loss was against St Ignatius. The debate was "that public figures should not have private lives." In a brilliant move, Iggies argued that we couldn't trust our politicians unless we knew everything about them. This, of course, was completely impracticable, but unfortunately none of the High team realised this until a couple of weeks later. We finished the GPS season sorely disenchanted, with four wins and three losses (coming third on the table).

our chances of winning the Karl Cramp trophy. We began the competition before the GPS season commenced with debates against Randwick BHS, Maroubra and Vaucluse. We won two of the debates, but lost the debate against Vaucluse. This loss necessitated another round of zone finals against Randwick and Vaucluse. We won them both, and proceeded to the higher levels. We debated against Concord and Strathfield South, and were fortunate to win both contests, going on to the Regional Final. This debate, against Sydney Technical HS, was certainly one of the best debates we had all year. We were forced to argue "that the media are our master", and took the easy line, saying that they manipulated our opinions, which enabled them to control us. Of course, Sydney Tech argued that the media do not control us because they are not able to force us to go and buy a certain type of cereal for breakfast. We again won this debate, though by a small margin, and this propelled us into the State Semi-Finals.

While this competition was occurring we participated in the Sydney Eisteddfod, which was an interesting (if a little unusual) competition. In our first round we defeated PLC, arguing "that the Olympics should have a permanent home". The second round was against Pennant Hills HS (1990 State Champions), and as can be imagined we approached this debate with a fair amount of trepidation. We were to meet this team again, under more auspicious circumstances. Our final round in the Eisteddfod was marked by a singularly pathetic but fascinating debate. The state semi-final was against Sir Joseph Banks HS and was probably the most amusing debate we have evertaken part in. By the end of the debate ("that youth is a lost generation") the speaker, David Grant, was strenuously arguing that drunken, pill-popping, murdering teenage lesbian vampires did not represent today's youth. We won that debate, but also won a dressing down from the adjudicator. This win sent us to the State Final, against a team we had previously debated-Pennant Hills HS. This time, however, the debate was more serious. Pennant Hills were state champions in Year Ten and Sydney High's 1990 Second Grade Team had won the Karl Cramp, and we had to try to keep it. The topic was "that human rights must bow to progress",

and Pennant Hills was unlucky enough to be arguing the affirmative. Due to the importance of the event, and ensuing nerves on both teams, it was not an incredibly good debate, but a rather average one (although Pennant Hills were fantastic opponents). High won the debate with a unanimous vote from the three adjudicators, ending the season on the highest possible note. Thanks must go to Ms Kenway from all four members of the teams: Mark "C'mon Guys, I've gotta write my speech" Lang, Richard "Well, in New Zealand, the social centre of Europe" Pearshouse, David "Ladies and Gentlemen, the fact is" Grant and Paul "I want to talk about Israel" Joshua. Ms Kenway was organiser of all our debates and put a lot of time and effort into our team. Thanks also to Ricky Kalowski, and all the Old Boy adjudicators. Next year, as First Grade, we hope to be even more successful.

Duncan McRae and David Hamer were both magic in slip and gully fielding. They took many



RUGBY MASTER'S REPORT

While it was for many High teams a season of learning and developing skills, for several 1991 can be counted a great success, and only one of our sixteen teams failed to win at least one match.

The First XV lost only two games (to St Josephs and Randwick BHS in the same week) of seventeen played, and finished a clear second in the GPS competition. Eleven members were selected to represent at GPS level, and eight were selected to play for the NSW sides. One member, Richard Ball, played for the ARFSU side against New Zealand Schools. The Firsts also entered the Waratah Shield, but were knocked out in the quarter final by Randwick BHS 8-9. The Second and Third Fifteens each had several victories and many close matches, the Seconds finished 6th in the competition with one victory over Grammar and draws against Scots and Newington.

The sixteen years' sides showed skill and determination, but were unable to post many victories. It was the fifteens who showed the way in the age groups, with both the As and Bs losing just two matches apiece. The 15As did not concede a try in competition matches, and finished the season with a convincing victory over Randwick BHS (20-0) in the final of the Buchan Shield competition. In their nineteen


matches they scored 333 points to 47 against. The skill level of our fourteens players continues to improve and the As found most of their matches were very close encounters. The thirteens, many of them in their first season of football, found the going a bit tough, but their enthusiasm was boundless.

A highlight of the season was the visit (by special train) to The Armidale School, where over three hundred boys (not all Rugby players) were accommodated over two nights. The honours were evenly divided in Rugby, and we thank TAS warmly for their hospitality.

We are again grateful for the enthusiastic support provided by the Development Officers, especially Tony Daly and Michael Jorgensen, whose contribution was outstanding. The continuing problem of appointing referees to junior matches was in part alleviated by the efforts of Mr Peter Meagher of Easts-Randwick, who trained five junior referees for the start of the season. The continuing dedication of our referees, coaches, and parental supporters is also greatly appreciated.

The successes of this season, and an anticipated increase in playing numbers with the growth in the size of the school, are encouraging signs that there are good years ahead for High Rugby.

FIRST FIFTEEN

The final line of last year's Rugby Master's Report read,"One wonders what the future holds," with a sense of understandable bleakness, but due to hard work by people like Mr Eggleton, and many more, the same line could be used in the 1991 Report with a totally different feeling: one of excitement and accomplishment as the First XV, and SHS Rugby as a whole, had one of the most successful seasons in quite a few years.

Losing just two games throughout the season the First XV finished runners up in the GPS premiership. The one GPS loss was to eventual champions, Joey's, with whom we were mentioned at the GPS representatives' dinner as easily the two best sides in the competition.

We started the trials at a furious pace, ending up with 145 points for and 24 points against in just 6 games. Results included a solid 21-0 win over TAS, a free-running and entertaining 36-9 victory over Scots Bathurst, and a most satisfying 28-0 win over Waverley at Queens Park. One of the best games was against Cranbrook, a hard fought but spectacular 24-6 win, the result of tremendous support play, marking the return of Jacent Markou and the sideline plunder of Sam Tam.

The trials were a good indication of how we were to go in the GPS competition and of the style of rugby we were to play. The GPS games went like this:

VS SCOTS (HOME): 13 - 10

The opening GPS game is almost always one of the hardest because if lost, hopes are dashed. However, we were never going to lose this one, despite the closeness of the scoreboard. A solid try to Ben Waldock after some power phase work from the forwards showed our will to win, and it was our ability to withstand pressure and then exert it in our own powerful style which proved the difference. Not our best game by far but a win in the first game is very tough yet essential. We took the points happily!!

VS GRAMMAR (AWAY): 22 - 6

This was a game in which Duncan McRae showed exactly what he can do on a Rugby 98

field - almost everything! The the ever-present 'birthday boy', Rohan Taylor, scored a well deserved try. Revenge for last season's 15-15 scoreline was deep in the minds of many and despite never fully hitting our straps we were always in control and with coach Hannon calmly engineering our second half effort we won comfortably. Dunc scored 18 of the 22 points including a memorable try which he had started well in our own half with a counter-attack from an unfortunate Grammar kick. The forwards, as they will tell you without hesitation, were again powerful and easily came out on top.

VS ST JOSEPHS (HOME): 3 - 17

Both Joevs and Sydney High had illness that week. However, High's was the more serious because it was so sudden. On Friday afternoon we trained the house down. That night a sudden virus hit Ben Whitaker, captain, fiveeight, play caller, and play-maker. He was violently ill and desperately disappointed to miss this looked-for climax to the season. As it turned out, with Rohan Taylor at five-eight and Nick Higgins at half-back this game was a cracker. Both sides enjoyed this furious game. Joey's adopted the tactic of pinpoint high-kicks to tack Dunc against his own line. He withstood the pressure calmly all game. High came out running and hit the ball up all day. In the packs the honours came out evenly, the difference being the genius of the Joey's five-eight who had a blinder. A terrific game. (Reported by A. Nother, since Ben Whit was in bed at Death's Door.)

VS ST IGNATIUS (HOME): 22 - 21

This game turned out to be the ultimate heartstopper for coach, players and spectators. Despite eventually finishing at the bottom of the GPS ladder Iggies showed enterprise and speed in running in two long-distance tries. However, we remained controlled and calm as Richard Ball ran through a monster hole on Irish without a finger within a metre of him to put us within two points. And then our own "Joe Montana", Dunc McRae waved to John Candy in the crowd and neatly potted a wide-angled penalty goal to give us a 22 - 21 victory. Not exactly a convincing win, but good teams win

the close ones!

VS KINGS (AWAY): 15 - 13

Kings' enormous pack, accurate kicking and steady defence proved difficult to overcome but again Duncan McRae coolly kicked a penalty goal towards the end of the match to secure our 4th victory. We finished easily the stronger with our quick pack taking control. First there was a powerful try by Garrett Robinson in the first half. Then we scored another of which legend camera man, 'Slobba', was heard to mutter, "That is the best try I've ever seen!" Dunc started the counterattack with a bomb and chase which he regathered, and after several phases Steve Bell neatly place the ball over the tryline on the other side of the field. A tough game, a good game to win.

VS NEWINGTON (HOME): 46 - 3

The 46-3 scoreline which included 9 scorching tries and 5 conversions entered the records as SHS's highest ever score in GPS competition, eclipsing a record held since 1946. Individual efforts were overshadowed by a sensational team performance with control, power, intensity and speed. The highlight of the season in many eyes and a great way for many to enjoy their last game for SHS at McKay Oval.

VS SHORE (AWAY): 33 - 4

We finished the GPS season the way we started in the trials, full of pace and precision. Against a solid opposition who were competing this day for equal second with us, both our forwards and backs dominated and Shore were blown away. For many it was their last game for SHS and this spurred the side on to one of its most entertaining and convincing wins. Sadly, one of our most essential team members, Jacent Markou had to leave the field early but it wasn't before he unselfishly delivered a final pass to Matty Cowden to allow him to cross over for a scorching second half try. Again it was a sensational team performance, no doubt pleasing our coach for the day, Mr Outterside,

who was specially handed the reins by Mr Hannon, as it was his last GPS rugby match as Headmaster. The 6 tries to Dunn, Murray, Ball, Robinson, Cowden, and Taumoepeau were all crowd-pleasers. After this victory, despite a long season, the team would have loved to have continued playing in this type of form. Who would blame us? A great game to end a great season.

The end of the GPS competition saw the beginning of the representative scene and the 1991 SHS First XV set another record for the school with 11 players being selected to play in the 3 grades against CHS and CAS teams. They were:

NSW II Sam Taumoepeau Duncan McRae Lawson Donald Grant Hitchen Richard Ball went on to gain the highest representative honour by being selected in the Australian Schools' Team to tour New Zealand. Rich played winger in the starting test line-up, a great achievement and one fully deserved.

The Waratah Shield was placed second in order of priority to the GPS competition but winning it was always part of our plan. Unfortunately we lost a hard fought game 9 - 8 to a spirited and thinking Randwick Boys' High. Interestingly, the only two games we lost all season were within a day of each other. Victories in the Shield were posted against Marist Brothers Eastwood, 40 - 0, and Malvina High School, 36 - 3 before we were eliminated.

PLAYER PROFILES

Grant Hitchen: (Loose-head prop.) Grunter sometimes gave away size and height but not in any game was he outplayed by the opposition front row. His sweeping of the lineouts was phenomenal, and this was even more evident in his games for the GPS III team. Grant capped off a great season by being selected for NSW where he played breakaway as well.

Jared Dunn: (Hooker.) The middle-man of the terrifying threesome, Geoffro excelled in all aspects of his play, throwing, striking, running, tackling. Afierce competitor especially against the even tougher backs of his own side, at training. A well-deserved representative in GPS and NSW sides.

Christian Roberts: (Tight-head prop.) The front row is the most vital part of the team. Champion props are rare. With Robbo we were always strong up front. A great team man, he was always in the tough stuff making the hard yards. Tragically his exceptional goal-kicking talents were never truly tapped!

Lawson Donald: (Second row.) An amazing player never more than a metre from the ball or the action. A second rower with a breakaway's mobility and speed, yet a number two jumper of top class in lineouts. Played GPS II as a second rower, and went on to play for NSW II as a breakaway. Will go berserk next year. Fancies himself as a line-kicker?

James Parkinson: (Second row.) Parko was another of the real team men so vital to the team's success in 1991. JP's courage to go down on loose ball to secure it for further attack made his own five-eight grimace, then praise. A top season where his quickness to the breakdowns was only beaten by his quickness in the joke stakes!

Matthew Cowden: (Breakaway.) A standout in a side full of freaks, Matt at last caught the selectors' eyes in a big way making both GPS I and NSW I sides. Covertackling, cleaning up, crashing over, you name it, Matt did it. There was always 100% commitment and speed. A terrific year in which the side attributed his success to a vigorous and strict health regime.

Jacent Markou: (Breakaway.) After a knee operation at the end of last season it took courage and commitment to return to the First XV spot he had made his own. There is nobody quite like Jacent with his ability to play at a level which is beyond most people. He was the morale captain of the side in the heat of the game. His spirit was outstanding. It was the team which mattered to Jace. He never played for himself. The range of skills he displayed in defence and attack would do justice to both forwards and backs of quality.

Garrett Robinson: (Lock.) An enormous force at the back of the pack, Gazza was on many occasions unstoppable. His great season brought GPS I and NSW I selection and respect from all opponents. As vice-captain Gazza led from the front with speed, strength, and skill. Another one of the forwards likely never to kick a successful field goal!

Rohan Taylor: (Half back.) One of those players who get to impossible areas of the ground in impossible times. An outstanding tackler and controller of the pigs. Rohan was unfortunately forced to miss the last three games through injury after impressing in all matches. He was a certainty for representative selection as, possibly, the leading half in the competition.

Chris Whitaker: (Half back.) Chrissy Whit came into the side after the injury to Rohan. He

played the last three games and did not put a foot wrong. His sweep-pass is swift and accurate, his positional play is instructional, full of fine instinct. His reading of the game meant our attack and defence flowed from phase to phase. Huge ticka with skill to match unlike his training hero, Gavin Orr!!

Ben Whitaker: (Five eight/captain.) This pen portrait written by the Coach. Ben has captained every side he has played in, and he has been playing since he was eight. His humanity, his humility, his leadership, his skill, and his sheer knowhow have always marked him and set him apart. It has been a privilege to have been his coach in his first two years at High and in his last two years. He has been, in effect, a cocoach with responsibility for training the backs for long periods, something he did with skill and leadership. The respect I have have for him goes deep. He climaxed his career, in my opinion, with his performance in our last game of the GPS season at Shore, where he controlled everything with eyes, hands and feet. A soaring field-goal, from the side, under pressure, in a gale, was an elegant finish to an exceptional stewardship at High. Picked in the GPS III's, he was, of course, the captain, and led his side to fine victories. (A.M. Hannon)

Ben Waldock: (Inside centre.) Strong and quick, Ben proved a handful in the early GPS games, demonstrated in his try against Scots which in the end became a match winner. A valuable goal-kicker, Ben also came close to deflating a few Mitres with monster line kicks.

Ken was much more than a strapper and water squirter (even if it was in the eyes most of the time!!) always giving up his time to assist us all to make our season fruitful and therefore enjoyable. Thanks for being a vital part of the team.

As GPS Rugby gets increasingly serious and the season becomes virtually the whole year it is Mr Hannon who has not only kept SHS rugby competitive but has influenced how the game has been played along with the training methods required to be successful. To prepare the First XV for the season alone Mr Hannon does at least three time the work of an individual player and fittingly we were able to repay him with some great performances. Through immense knowledge of the game and the respect he has gained through this and his friendship, Mr Hannon automatically instills confidence in his team to play the expansive, fast and running rugby that pleases so many and no more so than himself. Many thanks to Mr Hannon, not only for the season, but for all the years he has been involved with the players within the team because 1991's First XV success was probably thought about three years ago, evidence of his never ending commitment to enable us to play 100% all the time. Not only an amazing coach but someone who has helped everyone at one stage with understanding and friendship. RIFLE SHOOTING

It has been a very busy year for the Rifle Club, with a growing membership and participation in both full-bore and small-bore competitions. A large number of junior students joined the club and have made great progress in their marksmanship training, with a few competing in rounds of the small-bore competition.

Small-bore training was held twice a week on the school range, in preparation for the GPS small-bore postal competition in which we entered an Open A and Open B team. The best scores to date have been Justin Parsonage, David Pointing, and Daniel Lewkovitz scoring 93/100.

In early June our two teams competed against the Armidale School on their newly-constructed 50-m small-bore range. The top scorer of the day was Angus Mitchell (187), TAS rifle club captain , and of our shooters Angus Edwards scored 181 and Justin Parsonage 178. Our top Second Grade shooter was Ben Edwards with 172. By the end of the match TAS firsts (1431) had defeated SHS firsts (1262) and in Second Grade TAS (1335) defeated SHS (1144). This early competition was invaluable to our training for the GPS competition, although it indicated that we needed more consistency.

Our preparation for the full-bore competition began early in second term with Sunday morning training at the Anzac Rifle Range, Malabar. We practised over 300, 500 and 600 metres, under the often difficult windy conditions that prevail on that range. This weekly training was crucial to improving our performance, and Mr Wigan's tireless efforts are very much appreciated. Our full-bore training camp was conducted during the first week of the July vacation and we were grateful for the shelter provided by the new school bus in less than perfect shooting weather.

The GPS Annual Shoot was held at Hornsby Rifle Range on the 16-17 July. In the Rawson Cup Competition First Grade competed at 500 and 600 m. At 500 metres Angus Edwards scored 34.3/35 and Sam Kremer 34.2/35. Daniel Lewkovitz was our top scorer at 600 metres with 31.1/35 followed closely by Sam Kremer on 31.0/35.

The GPS Annual Shoot was held at Hornsby Rifle Range on the 16-17 July. The winner of the Rawson Cup was Kings with 524.29/560. In the NRA Shield from a possible 50 Ben Edwards scored 45.3, narrowly beating his brother Angus on 45.2. Kings won this event with 371/400, with High coming sixth.

The final First Grade match was the Buchanan Shield, shot at 300 m both on application and snap targets. Top High shooter was Daniel Lewkovitz scoring 62.0/80. Yet again the Kings team proved victorious scoring 565.14/640.

In the Second Grade competition, team captain Michael Hughes scored 53.1, with David Hamer scoring 55.1. Our Second Grade total was 323.4, putting us sixth, having shot at 300 and 500 metres.

The dedication and continual support of Messrs Blinkhorne (Shooting Master) and Wigan (full-bore coach), working hundreds of extra unpaid hours, is appreciated by all club members. Rising before dawn, they chauffeured us to Hornsby, supplied lunch, and kept the team in good spirits in the face of defeat. We are also grateful for the efforts of Mr Pointing (P&C representative) and Mr Govendir (Range Officer) with fund-raising and coaching.

It is hoped that before the 1992 competition commences shooters will compete regularly on Saturdays with the Metropolitan District Rifle Association in order to gain the necessary experience under competition conditions.

The efforts of vice-captain Sam Kremer and Treasurer Jeffrey Barr-David have aided the club's smooth operation. With junior shooters now progressing up the ranks, it is hoped that 1992 will prove a very competitive year for our marksmen, if the enthusiasm of this year is any indication.

CADETS

We have indeed been fortunate to have had so many new and exciting things happening in one year: Not only did we use totally different bivouac and camp sites, but 1991 also saw the introduction of abseiling for senior cadets. Perhaps it should also be noted that we saw in 1991, CUOs with the longest hair since the mid-seventies.

Though the recruitment was slightly down on previous years, the quality of the cadets was much higher than average. This enabled the training program to run smoothly and efficinetly. The most startling thing about the training in first term was the size of One Platoon, which from time to time registered a parade strength or 25 or more. This made for an excellent term of training, and an excellent bivouac at the beginning of Term Two.

The bivouac site of this year had to account for a reasonably close abseiling point. This presented some difficulties, as we had to take great care not to compromise the safety of the unit by placing the campsite to close to a cliff. Howeve, in the end we came up with an excellent site. The only problem with it was, in my opinion, that the CUO's area was about half a kilometre from the lines, resulting in a brisk wald for one and all at all hours of the day and night.

The short First Term meant that some of the exercises had to be simplified, and lessons in the field were given the priority for the junior platoons. The seniors also had some changes in their traditional bivouac program. An abseiling exercise was slotted in, as well as an overnight trek. The other 'highlight' of the bivouac has be CUO Ashley Sweeting and his Nissan Pathfinder. He found that there were some who doubted the car's potential for driving through swamps, and set about to prove them wrong. The resulting muddy difficulties left us in little doubt as to who was right.

On return to school, we began the build up to the annual camp. Again, the need for an abseiling site amongst other things left us in need of a new campsite. With Area 8 Singleton being prone to flooding (as we discovered in 1989) and last year's campsite being far too flat, we eventually decided on an area in Darkes Forest. This site (in the same area as the North Cliff Colliery) was perfect for our needs. It offered an excellent campsite, reasonably difficult navigation, some small cliffs for abseiling and plenty of roads for safety purposes.

Once again our movement to camp on the Saturday was complicated by pre-GPS season sport. Apart from this, things began, and continued to run very smoothly. With sufficient training having been completed, exercises could now be organised to their usual level of difficulty. There was one deviation from the traditional pattern. This year CUO Brewer decided to run a 'Red Army-BlueArmy' night training exercise, instead of the usual lantern stalk. this ran very well, and I believe that it will become a regular inclusion in the camp training program.

On difficulty with the Darkes Forest training area was that it was not sufficiently close to a military base to enable the unit to use their obstacle course on the Tuesday of camp. We were able to overcome this difficulty, however, by building our own obstacle course, and I am being honest when I say that it was just as good as the courses we have used over past years. The lack in professionalism in its manufacture was offset by its closeness to camp and the fact resulting section versus section competitions and the Officers versus Sergeants race were amongst the highlights of the camp.

The two day platoon treks over unknown ares seemed to threaten great problems. However, great problems were not going to be had. Probably the biggest problem encountered was on the One Platoon trek, when we fetched up against a river that was too wide to jump, too deep to wade, and too long to go around. The solution "Build a Burma Bridge!!!" called out the cadets, who didn't know just how difficult it would be. However, it seemed the only solution

and so Mr Williams and several other likeminded men stripped off and jumped in. As it turned out, this was not such a good idea, the water having come straight of the South Pole (or so it appeared). While Mr Williams and others stood shivering on the other bank, though, an alternate route was discovered by the only dry officer, me. The cadets were transferred and I was berated by Mr Williams and the CSM for not looking around earlier. All the treks went smoothly, and the camp was topped off by the traditional final night barbecue. which itself was a resounding success.

Term Three training had at its goal the Annual Range Practice at the Anzac Rifle Range. Malabar. Despite this falling on the day of the Grand Final of a certain Football code, the turnout was reasonably good, and everyone enjoyed themselves. The final goal of training for the majority of the unit was the Ceremonial Guard at Speech Night. Despite losing a practice at the moving of the occasion from the fifth to the second, it also was a great success, and the Guest of Honour, Professor Ian Dawes, was very impressed.

We seem to have proved that great things can be done, even with a small unit. We went on to prove this at the Promotion Courses, with our few candidates outshining the Sydney Grammar Cadets in most fields. This year overall has been a great success. Thanks must be given to those who have assisted in the running of the unit, chiefly Lt. Ian Barret, and Lt. Nick Stravs. Above all, we must profusely thank the OC, Captain Mark Gainford, without whom the unit would be little more than a memory.
