Principal's Report

[The following is an edited version of the address given by the Principal at the Annual Speech Night and Prize Giving.]

Outstanding Achievements in 1996

- The following students were awarded an Australian Students Prize (a Certificate of Excellence and \$2000) by the Australian Government: Christopher Rodley, Kim Hoe Chan, Lennart Choo, Jeremy Heimans, Darren Lee, Edmond Park and Emil Stern. In the words of the Minister, Dr David Kemp: the Australian Students Prize celebrates the outstanding achievement of the very best students who graduate from our secondary schools each year. Winners of these prizes are of the highest international standard and I congratulate them on their meritorious results.
- Results obtained by the school in the Australian Mathematics Competition were outstanding. *[Reported later in this issue.]*
- SBHS Cross Country team (Andrew Bennie, Marc Bennie, Justin Lodge, Joshua Lodge, Thierry Lamvohee and Sean Garber) represented Australia at the world titles in Turkey. Also GPS Premiers in Cross Country (places by Andrew and Marc Bennie, Steven Croft, Ognian Kolev). Andrew and Marc Bennie were selected in the Combined GPS Cross Country team.
- SBHS fencing team (Luke Twigg, Karl Grenet, Kahne O'Hanlon) won the NSW Schools Championship. Later in the year the team took out the NSW Schools Fencing League with Luke Twigg being named Best Schoolboy Fencer in the state. The team achieved number one ranking in schools

fencing. Matthew Baker was the reserve for the team. In U13 fencing Sam McMahon, Miles Portek and James Rudd took out the Mini League A title.

- Steven Croft was a NSW and Australian Junior representative in biathlon.
- James Moar was a NSW and Australian Schools representative in water polo.
- Todd Ollivier and Chris Daish represented Australian Schools in rugby (v Irish Schools). They were joined by Paul Morris for NSW selection, again v Irish Schools. Eight High rugby players were selected in Combined GPS sides.
- Thomas Vogelgesang won the C Division of The Queen's Prize in rifle shooting, an outstanding achievement for a boy in Year 10. Thomas, along with Viv Rosenfeld, Robert Hagar, Danny Hui and Matthew Pollock, travelled to England to compete in the prestigious shoot at Bisley. They were officially competing as an Australian under 25 team.
- Jack Clegg, Jonathon Dooley, Karl Grenet, Michael Klooster, Gareth Tilley and David Harvey played in the NSW Public Schools Symphony Orchestra. Karl Murr played in the Intermediate Symphony Orchestra.
- Winners of the most prestigious 1996 University of NSW Co-Op Scholarships: Scott Denton (Mechanical Engineering); Kenneth Wong (Business Information Technology). Steven Kovac (Materials Science) was offered one but did not accept. Cameron McKnight won a scholarship in Accounting to the University of Technology, Sydney.

- Gareth Tilley was selected to attend the National School for Young Conductors, and placed third in the Lawrence Campbell Oratory Competition.
- Greg Flynn played guest spots on trumpet with the Sydney Symphony Orchestra.
- Jonathan Corea gained his A Mus A with Distinction in Piano.
- Prashant Khera represented the Department of School Education at the Commonwealth Day festivities for 1996 at the invitation of the Commonwealth Day Council. Prashant gave an address at an official luncheon in the Parliament House Dining Room.
- Kenny Chan reached the final twelve in the selection trials for the International Physics Olympiad.
- Brendan Wilson and Jonathan Yu gained Distinctions in the 1996 Australian Science Olympiads Biology National Qualifying Examination.
- Andrew Dimitri and Quang Phan gained Credits in the 1996 Australian Science Olympiads Chemistry National Qualifying Examination.
- Aaron Hayek and Quang Phan gained Distinctions in the 1996 Australian Science Olympiads Physics National Qualifying Examination. Andrew Bowman, Andrew Dimitri, David Harvey and Tushar Singh gained Credits. Quang Phan was selected to participate in the Physics Olympiad Training Program.
- The Chamber Choir was selected to take part in the Secondary Schools Choral Concert at the Opera House.
- Chris Daish was selected in the NSW Junior Rowing VIII to compete in the Trans Tasman series. Adrian Webster was also selected in a IV.
- Gareth Tilley, David Harvey, Michael Klooster and Jonathon Dooley were members of the NSW Performing Arts Orchestra which toured to Amsterdam.
- Ognian Kolev was selected at number one seed for Combined GPS Tennis; at number two seed for Combined Independent Schools; then capped

a fine year with selection in the Australian Schools team.

- Les Robinson attended the National School Constitutional Convention in Canberra as a NSW delegate.
- Ricky Lopis was selected for the second time to represent Australia in Under 16 chess.
- The Senior Stage Band travelled to Mt Gambier for the national championships. David Harvey and Dean Kelly won selection in the Australian Superband. The Stage Band also performed with distinction in the Festival of Instrumental Music at the Sydney Opera House.
- Nicholas Seow reached the semi finals of the Open Amateur Poetry Section in a competition organised by the International Society of Poets.
- Robbie Moore won the inaugural prize of the Children's Book Council with his writing.
- The Music Department's Winter and Summer Festivals were wonderfully successful and included original works by High students. The residential music camp was a great success.
- Eighty-seven students entered the Australian Schools Computer Competition: 37 received a credit, 34 a distinction and 5 a high distinction. Those achieving a HD were Romily Webster, Kevin Lurie, Robert Schonberger, Matthew Baker and Daniel Gilbourd.
- Stephen Thompson achieved a Gold Medal at the NSW Gymnastics Championships.
- Vincent Chan won a medal in the Australian Schools Mathematics Competition and went to Canberra to receive his medal from the Governor-General.
- Joshua Lodge represented NSW in under 17 High Jump at the Pan Pacific Games in Perth. Joshua's personal best so far is 1.95m.
- The Chamber Choir took part in the International Symposium of Choral Music.
- Prashant Khera and Alexander Daniel were selected in Combined GPS Debating. High's 1st and 2nd grade Debating teams each came second

in their respective GPS competitions.

- The 14Bs won the Dolan Cup for the most outstanding Sydney High soccer team of 1996.
- High won the Stan Jones Trophy for CHS Tennis. The team was Ognian Kolev, Joe Kim, Kit Wong and Peter Schofield. The team then played Knox College for the NSW Schools Championship and lost 35-39 on countback. Then they competed in the National Championships following the withdrawal of Tasmania.
- David Harvey came fourth in the Senior Division of the UNSW IBM Mathematics Competition. Other outstanding performers were Johnny Wong, Kenny Chan, Andrew Goodwin, Prashant Khera, Oscar Kwon, Adam Solomon, Garley So, Kim-Kuan Chan and Peter Ly.
- Under 16 volleyball took the silver medal in the NSW Junior Schools Cup in their first year of competing.
- Oliver Lau, David Jacques, Thomas Caley and Peter Hayward were guest singers at the symposium of the Australian National Association of Teachers of Singing.
- Pierre Richard gained top mark of all boys in NSW and ACT in the Australian Science Competition.
- David Harvey and Kim-Kiat Chan were selected for the National Summer School in Mathematics.
- Kim-Kuan Chan and Adam Solomon gained High Distinctions in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee's Mathematics Contest. Kim-Kuan Chan was selected for the Training Program.
- Corrin Varady, Peter Hayward, John Baik, James Rudd and Edouard Cousins reached the final in the documentary division of the Australian Schools Film and Video Competition.
- Alex Bodman won the Junior Plain English Speaking Award for NSW.
- Kendall and Alexis Robinson had bit parts as rowers in the film *Oscar and Lucinda*. Jamie Croft continued his film and stage career with performances including a part at The Wharf Theatre.

- In the Esso National Science Competition students achieved 50 High Distinction, 344 Distinction and 280 Credit Awards.
- Prashant Khera and Young Wang of Year 12 won prizes in the AMP NSW Economics Competition. Twenty of our forty entrants gained a Distinction or High Distinction and the rest gained Credits.
- The High Chess Team of Ricky Lopis (Year 9), Gareth Charles and Simon Burnett (Year 8) and

Leng Yin (Year 7) won the Senior Division of the Secondary Schools Chess Competition. Ricky Lopis and Gareth Charles were selected to represent NSW at the nationals in Perth in January 1997. The team also won the GPS Championships.

In the 1996 HSC Johnny Wong achieved a TER of 100 and came 1st in NSW in 4 Unit Mathematics, the second year running that this school has topped this subject. Kenny Chan came 1st in NSW in 2 Unit Physics and 2 Unit Chemistry. Daniel David came 1st in NSW in 3 Unit Hebrew. Colin Tan came 1st in NSW in 2 Unit Geography. Stuart Angus came 1st in NSW in 2 Unit Mathematics in Society. Victor German came 1st in NSW in 2 Unit Russian as a student of The Open High School. In addition: Stephen Laurent came 4th in NSW in 3 Unit French. Alex Daniel came 9th in NSW in 3 Unit German. Johnny Wong and Oscar

Kwon came 3rd and 9th respectively in 3 Unit Latin. Oscar Kwon also managed to come 2nd in 2 Unit Physics and 2nd in 4 Unit Mathematics. Ali Sepahpour came 8th in 4 Unit Mathematics. Adam Malouf came 3rd in 3 Unit Business Studies. Pierre Richard came 5th in 3 Unit Mathematics. Razman Azmir came 2nd in 2 Unit Geography. Guy Olian and David Treacy came 3rd and 8th respectively in 3 Unit Geography. Seventy-seven candidates were placed within the top 5000 students in the state.

It is important to acknowledge the achievements of those with outstanding ability. The school, however, emphasises effort and achievement at all levels. Not every boy can match the achievements listed above. Every boy, however, can have a go and seek to achieve his personal best, whatever that is.

School Notes

- Wearing Two Hats The year began with the first appearance in large numbers of the new school hat. Designed and promoted by Les Robinson (Year 12, Chairman) and the School Union, it is a navy blue baseball style cap with brown leather trimmings. It joins the boater as the only two hats approved for wear with the uniform.
- Row On Ben Clarsen (1995) was selected to row in the Australian Junior Coxed IV at the World Rowing Championships in Scotland in August this year, to defend the gold medal won last year. Unfortunately Ben had to withdraw at the last minute due to ill health. Chris Daish and Adrian Webster, both of Year 12, were selected to compete in the Trans Tasman Rowing Championships, held at Penrith Lakes in April. Chris was selected in the NSW Junior Eight, and Adrian in a four.
- **Cox On** Peter Nicholas (Year 12), Cox of the Eight, was declared NSW Rowing Association "Cox of the Year" for 1996. The last High boy to achieve this distinction was Andrew Knevitt (1990), who is now coaching rowing at Duke University, Durham, North Carolina.
- Singing Out Mrs Hardy of the Music Department reported that in September four brave Year 7 boys (Oliver Law, David Jacques, Thomas Caley, Peter Hayward) demonstrated their singing voices, solo, at the National Voice Centre Study Clinic at Sydney University, as part of a research project by the School vocal tutor, Mrs Beth Williams.
- What's Cooking? In charge of the kitchen at upmarket London restaurant *The Atrium* is "young Australian chef" Richard Zuber (1983). He has a staff of twenty-two and is hoping to employ more Australians. (SMH 13 Aug 96)
- Wielding the Baton After an exhaustive audition process Gareth Tilley of Year 11 was selected to attend the National School for Young Conductors held over seven days in Brisbane during April. The course included classes with leading Australian conductors Graham Abbot and Graeme Moreton, and concluded with a concert at St Peter's School, Indooropilly.
- **On the Mat** Leonid Zaslavski (1988) represented Australia at the Atlanta Olympic Games in wrestling.
- All at Sea Luke Nye (Year 10) was awarded a Day at Sea with the Royal Australian Navy for his badge selling achievement on Legacy Day.

- Varsity Crew The Sydney University Boat Club VIII recently competed in an international intervarsity regatta in Taiwan against crews including Oxford, Cambridge, Harvard, Yale and Melbourne. The Sydney crew included rowers from Grammar and St Ignatius, as well as High Old Boys Ben Clarsen (1994), Laird Abernethy (1994) and Peter Philipp (1995). The final was rowed before a crowd of twenty thousand and was won by Sydney University from Oxford, Cambridge and Melbourne.
- Family Ties The annual Schools Commonwealth Day commemoration was affected by rain this year, but the official proceedings were conducted over luncheon at Parliament House. Prashant Khera (Year 12) addressed the gathering, linking Commonwealth ties between nations to the family unit and the school community. In his first engagement as Governor of New South Wales, the Honourable Gordon Samuels gave the principal address, and read The Queen's Commonwealth Day message.
- **Short Tour** Recent Old Boy Adam Magro (1988) was called up to join the Wallaby Tour of Europe and the United Kingdom as a replacement. He played one game against a Scottish regional side, scored a try, and soon after left the field, and the tour, due to an injured ankle. The editor is of the opinion that Adam may be the School's first Wallaby since Smith and Brass.
- **Constitutional Matters** Les Robinson of Year 12 joined over a hundred other students for a NSW Schools Constitutional Convention at Parliament House in Sydney, where the issues discussed included the republic, constitutional monarchy, and federalism. He was then selected as one of twenty state representatives to attend a National Schools Constitutional Convention held in Canberra during March.
- **Spreading the Word** In May Justin Clark (Year 10) returned to his old primary school, Lane Cove Public, to address parents on the virtues of Sydney High School.
- **Under the Spreading ...** The canteen area has been greatly improved by the installation of picnic tables, under a large shade cloth. The area has become very popular with senior boys taking a break from work in the Senior Study Centre.

- **Starting Young** Adair Durie (1995) has been a regular player this year for Sydney University Cricket Club First grade side, a rare achievement in the first year out of school.
- Not Quite so Young First Grade Club Rugby players this year have included Chris Whittaker, Lawson Donald, James Holbeck and Adam Magro for Randwick, Caerl Murray at Sydney University, and Marc Stcherbina with Southern Districts.
- **On the Move Again** The Prefects are again camped out in the space at the bottom of the stairs near Room 108 (fromerly Room 1). Their former home under the Hall (now Room 801) has been resumed for use as a classroom. The search continues for a more comfortable space.
- Head of the Lake Objections were raised by many at the move of the Head of the River Regatta from its "traditional" venue on the Nepean River to the newly completed Olympic course at Penrith Lakes. The compelling reasons for the move included the opportunity to return to eight boat races (no heats), and the view that this most prestigious of regattas should be held on the best course available, possibly the best in the world. On the down side was the need to change the race distance to 2000m, from one and a half miles for the eights and one mile for the fours. Those with a bent for history noted

that this was not the first time in over a century of regattas that the conditions had changed. Until 1935 the races were held on the Parramatta River, finishing near Cabarita Point, and in 1946 and 1947 the eights raced over one and a quarter miles (2011m).

- **Signs of the Times** An initiative of the School Council has led to the erection of signs announcing the name of the School on both the Cleveland Street and ANZAC Parade frontages.
- **In Record Numbers** Remarkably during this year, out of thirty-one sports scholarships at Sydney University, four are held by High Old Boys: Henry Adams (Fencing), Benjamin Clarsen (Boat), Adair Durie (Cricket) and Caerleon Murray (Football).
- Silver Screen The producer and co-screenwriter of the hit movie *Babe* was George Miller (1963), whose other credits include the *Mad Max* series of movies, and the docudrama *The Dismissal*.
- Glittering Prizes University medals for this year were won by Bradley Hastings (1992), for Mining Engineering at the University of New South Wales, and by Benjamin Kremer (1990), for Law at Sydney University, to add to his medal in Science won the year before. Scholarships awarded to the Class of 1995 include University of NSW Co-Op Scholarships to Scott Denton, in Mechanical Engineering, and to Kenneth Wong, in Business Information Technology. Cameron McKnight has won a scholarship in Accounting at the University of Technology Sydney.
- **Eloquence** In November Alex Bodman of Year 10 won the state final of the Junior Plain English Speaking Award. He delivered the required five minute prepared speech and two minute impromptu speech with "poise and eloquence", according to our reporter. The next step is the National Final to be held in Melbourne.
- **On the Road Again** Also in November the School took delivery of a new twenty-two seater bus, to replace the old one, which was sold separately.
- **True Blue** Ognian Kolev (Year 11) has been awarded a CHS Blue for Tennis in 1996. These are rare awards (seldom more than one is awarded per sport), and particularly scarce these days amongst High boys since our reduction in involvement in CHS sports.
- Intellectual Athlete Andrew Goodwin of Year 12 was selected in Term I to represent Australia in

the International Chemistry Olympiad in Moscow. He was one of four students chosen from a group of one hundred outstanding young chemists who were invited to try out for selection. He was presented with an Australian blazer and Akubra hat at a ceremony held in the Australian Museum. Andrew ultimately won a Gold Medal in Moscow. This is an outstanding achievement. Andrew was further honoured with an Award for Excellence by the Minister for Education.

- Starting Young II Stephen Hunt of Year 10 was selected to compete in the Australian Short Course Swimming Championships held in Melbourne in December. This high standard event attracted competitiors from the Australian Olympic Team and prominent overseas swimmers.
- **Top Storey** On Friday 23rd February Mr John Coates, President of the Australian Olympic Committee, officially opened the extensions to the Outterside Centre at Abbotsford, in the presence of a large and enthusiastic gathering. Other speakers were Mr Phil Whyte, Chairman of the Sydney High School Foundation Inc, Mr John Bowman, President of the Rowing Committee, The Principal, Mr Dick Stratford, Mr Bob Outterside, former Principal after whom the centre is named. Mr Lee Ruth, Vice-President of the Old Boys Union, and Mr Brian Loundar, rowing stalwart after whom a new four was named on the same day. The three flag poles were occupied by school, national and Olympic flags.
- **Groundbreaking Move** Early in the year the position of groundsman at McKay was transferred from the Education Department to the Department of the Environment, as part of a new agreement with the Centennial Park and Moore Park Trust, which has now taken over responsibility for maintaining the grounds. A high standard of care is anticipated as the Trust has a large staff and excellent equipment.
- An Example Robbie Silberstein (1990), recent medical graduate, public speaker, entrepreneur and lobbyist for the disabled was was named in December the 1997 Young Australian of the Year.
- **Mover and Shaker** The old boneshaker of a tractor at McKay was sold early in the year, and the proceeds were put towards a new ride on mower.

- **Old Story** In May it was discovered that the permanent puddles near the cricket nets were being caused by the infamous pump and sump system on the girls' flat. A new pump was recently installed, but unbeknownst to all concerned, during construction of the new gymnasium, the stormwater pipe into which the water is pumped was broken. This was ultimately rectified, and system again works flawlessly, at least for the time being.
- **Carrying On** Ricky Lopis of Year 9 was again chosen to represent Australia in Junior Chess, this year in the Under 16 division.
- International Award Sir Robert May (1952), currently Professor of Zoology at Oxford, and Chief Scientist to the British Government, was awarded the 1996 *Crafoord Prize* by the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences. The prize is awarded for achievement in disciplines outside the scope of the Nobel Prizes, and was awarded to recognise Sir Robert's pioneering ecological research concerning the theoretical analysis of the dynamics of populations, communities, and ecosystems.

Careers

nce again Careers lessons complemented by the conduct of Year 10 Work Experience were the mainstay activities for the Careers Centre this year. One hundred and eighty boys achieved two hundred and twenty-two placements.

Guest speakers at lunchtime Careers gatherings ranged from the Defence Force Academy through Communications Skills to Engineering. Year 12 participated fully in the annual Tertiary Awareness Symposium, and also responded well to their two interviews at school during the year.

The Young Achievers program was again extremely popular with Year 11, and a number of the companies involving our boys held excellent promotions evenings.

E-Team

The E-Team Program this year involved two combined teams both involving girls from SGHS. Each team had to make application, and attend interviews, before achieving selection for the E-Team Program, run by the Australian Quality Council. Teams are selected from all schools electing to take part, including state and independent schools. Each team is assigned an organisation and given a real problem to work on and, it is to be hoped, by the use of quality management skills, come up with some recommendations for solutions.

A briefing and training day takes place prior to the week of work, which is followed later by a debriefing day.

One of the two teams worked at the Sydney Eye Hospital, whilst the other work in the insurance industry. The first team consisted of Prasad Dongre, Quang Phan, and Yen-Liang Shue from High, and Jenny Nam and Marina Dzuba from the Girls' School. The following is an extract from their excellent report. They were a credit to their schools, and came up with an excellent set of recommendations which will be implemented.

Introduction

During the week Monday 13th to Friday 18th, the E-Team assessed the situation of the Sydney General and Sydney Eye Hospitals in regard to the process of collaborating accurate details of patients.

We applied tools we learnt at the training day to assess the situation and these were the flow chart, customer model, checksheet, and the fish bone diagram.

The role of each customer in the process was expressed as a flow chart. From the flow chart we were able to determine the problems in the process. We then drew a fish bone diagram that shows that only minor adjustments were required to make the system more efficient than the current existing one.

On the following pages are our findings.

Description of the Process

From the data collected through interviewing the customers involved in the process we have been able to assemble a flow chart.

A short description of the process could be 'collecting and processing patients data', however the process itself is much more complex then it would seem at first glance. The process itself involves many stages. These include the ward clerk receiving and recording patient's details into the computer. The computer is linked to the clerical staff's computer which prints out a summary of all patients' details which is called a 'bedreturn' at l2.01 am.

However, the print-out consists of only the data collected during the ward clerk working hours (8.00 am until 4.30 pm) and any information coming in outside of those time limits is not entered into the computer. The only available person in the process

outside the ward clerk hours are the nurses whose attentions are focused on patients and consequently, when they are able to, they record the details into the Ward Day Book. These details are then computed by the ward clerk on their next shift, as well as adjusting the printout, received from the clerical staff during 0815 to 0830. Missing details are confirmed either with the Ward Day Book and/ or with the nurses.

After the ward clerks adjust the printout, it is then returned to the clerical staff who reassess it.

Monthly, the summary of all 'bed returns' is sent to the NSW Health Department who reassess it, and it is returned to the hospital if any errors are found. This causes a need for re-examination from the clerical staff and the ward clerks. On the accuracy of these records the funding level for the hospital is determined.

As the process in whole is very complicated and prone to error in recording the statistics of patients, the funding is often undermined and affects many areas of the hospital.

ANZAC Day Address

n the 25th of April, 1915 an allied land invasion occurred on the Gallipoli Peninsula in the early hours of the morning. The aim of this attack was to open a new theatre of war as an alternative to the stalemate developing on the Western Front. To the young men who made up the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps however, it was simply their chance to make a name for their country and show that their nations had a place on the world stage.

This was important as Australia and New Zealand were both tied to the mother country but had never been tested. War was seen as an initiation and it was widely believed that taking part in bloodshed and sacrifice of battle, would turn these two colonies into nations.

After the declaration of war in 1914, thousands of men volunteered to enlist in the armed forces. They came from the cities, country areas and from varying age groups – in some cases teachers leaving classrooms and enlisting with their eldest pupils. Such was the frenzy to tackle the great adventure of war and be a part of the war effort.

On the night before the landing, Saturday the 24th of April, a twenty three year old lieutenant wrote in his diary that tomorrow "is going to be Australia's chance". On the Sunday, after the torture of the days killing and fighting, an ambulance man noted that "on this day, Australians proved themselves". The privations of war were felt abruptly by these young men as by the end of the nine days of fighting at Gallipoli, most of the officers and about half of each battalion of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps – from then on known as the ANZACs – were either killed or wounded.

The remaining Anzac soldiers were joined by British and French troops a few days later and for eight more months they endured the bombardment from the inspired Turkish forces who were dug in on the cliffs above the beaches. Few inroads and advancements were made in this time and in December a change in command saw the evacuation of all Allied forces as the campaign was finally acknowledged to be a failure. The pointlessness of the Gallipoli campaign was summed up by a survivor, Bert Facey, in his book "A Fortunate Life". It reads:

"It was the nineteenth day of August 1915. I had been on Gallipoli only six days short of four months and I want to say now that they were the worst four months of my whole life. I had seen many men die horribly, and had killed many myself and had lived in fear most of the time. And it was terrible to think it was all for nothing".

The final cost of this futile campaign were the 34 000 lives of Australian and New Zealand troops that were either killed or wounded at Gallipoli. Thousands more British and Turkish soldiers died in battle where no ground was gained and no initiative established. Anzac day however, does not simply refer to the remembrance of these soldiers who bravely fought on the Gallipoli peninsula in April 1915. Anzac day is an acknowledgment to all the Australian men and women who have courageously fought in various continents of the world not just in World War One but also in World War Two, the Korean War and the Vietnam War. It is a day where most of us try and empathise with those Australian's who have experienced the atrocities of war and we remember those who were tragically killed or wounded on foreign shores fighting battles against people they didn't know for a cause they didn't quite understand. I, like many people, have a relation that fought in such wars and, like others, it gives me great pride to know that a relation of mine fought for their country and embodied the Anzac spirit. For every man who enlisted, and every women that worked as a nurse carried with them the Anzac spirit in all wars regardless of which generation they existed.

To me, the war correspondent and historian CEW Bean, best sums up the Anzac legacy. He writes:

"But Anzac stood, and still stands, for reckless valour in a good cause, for enterprise, resourcefulness, fidelity, comradeship, and endurance that will never own defeat."

The prizes were presented at a school assembly. Each boy received a money prize, a certificate and a tie pin. The results were excellent. Congratulations to all who participated. A special mention should be made of Vincent Chan's performance. Not since 1986 has a High boy won a medal in the competition. Vincent was one of only seventeen medallists in a competition which attracted 521000 entries across the Pacific region – a fine effort.

At a higher level, Kim Kuan Chan and Adam Solomon (both of Year 10) have been awarded High

Distinctions in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee's Intermediate Mathematics Contest. This is used to select appropriate candidates to undergo extended training for the Olympiad Team. Kim Kuan has been selected to attend such a training school in Melbourne at the end of the year.

Official Opening Cecil Rubie Study Centre

6 September 1996

The opening of the Study Centre was performed by Mr Phil Whyte, Chairman of Foundation and Past President of P&C. The centre has been named The Cecil Rubie Study Centre in honour of an Old Boy who served the school for fifty years of his life. It was an honour to have Mrs Joan Rubie and Mr Howard Rubie, her son, at the ceremony. The following is a slightly edited version of the Principal's address to the gathering:

Principal's Address

Welcome to Sydney High School on this important occasion. Mr Kerry Rubie sends his best wishes from London. Kerry is thrilled that this centre will bear his father's name.

I give a special welcome to Mrs Joan Rubie. It is an honour for the school to have you here, Mrs Rubie and I do thank you for coming along with your son Howard.

The format of this opening ceremony is simple. I will speak first. Mr Phil Whyte will follow and he will then invite Mrs Rubie to help him unveil the plaque. Mr Howard Rubie will respond on behalf of the family. Mr John Goddard, President of the School Council, will speak in conclusion.

Something always had to happen to complete this part of the McDonald Wing. I would guess that quite a few people over the years have done the regulation walk on the roof.

Mr Mark Gainford of the Mathematics staff put a proposal as long ago as 1976 to the then Headmaster, the late Greg Bradford, to fill in the vacant space with rooms of various kinds. I can recall from my days here as Deputy Principal having a discussion with some senior boys in 1986 about the lack of facilities for private study. I had in fact broached the subject of having the senior school being taught face to face for only five periods per week instead of the regulation six periods per week, leaving the boys with up to six periods of week for private study. We had done that at Narrabri High School in the early seventies and it seemed to me that it would work well here in a selective high school. The proposal failed because there was nowhere for the boys to go to do their private study.

The Foundation magazine *Heritage* reminds us that George Lewkowitz and Joseph Waugh came up with a proposal in 1991, probably the most recent prior to the version that actually went ahead.

In late 1992 and early 1993, following extensive discussions among the staff, a Development Plan was devised for the school. That Development Plan has guided the evolution of the school's facilities since then. It is designed to give the school what it needs for the next fifty years. It encompasses big projects such as this one and little projects such as spaces on Cutler Drive for visitor parking and the filling in of small spaces around the school for storage.

The genesis of the study centre you see here tonight lay in the staff of the school. It is a common theme of mine that the satisfaction of being the Principal of a good school is the joy of being a leader of leaders. The people who did the design work on this centre have demonstrated the kind of professional leadership that I am proud to acknowledge here. I refer to Mr Mark Noonan, Mr Alan Woolnough, Mr Wayne Baldock, Mr Geoff Blinkhorne, Mr John Prorellis and Mr Mark Gainford. It was a pleasure to chair a group of this calibre. Mr Ralph Watson took the role of occasional devil's advocate. Miss Pamela Noller devised the furniture layout.

Other staff members contributed indirectly by making suggestions or responding to ideas that were put to them.

Old Boys Mr John Goddard and Mr Phil Lambert provided invaluable advice on foreshadowed computer facilities. Mr Gary Hamer played an important role in the financing of the project on behalf of the parents. Mr Phil Whyte played a pivotal role in getting the project up and running.

The planning group had the assistance of Mr Brian Jarman, then Manager Properties, Metropolitan East Region, Department of School Education. Without Brian's substantial contribution to this project it simply would not have happened. Brian's assistance in the interpretation of the new schools building code was also critical to the project as you see it now. To you Brian, thanks mate! I would ask everyone to join with me in a vote of thanks to someone who made this happen.

Official Opening

I must thank the Government of NSW and in particular Mr John Acquilina, the Minister, for contributing \$250,000 to the project. Jointly funded projects are by no means uncommon these days but this one is among the more imaginative ones. I should add by way of aside that Cranbrook have already had their Head and their architect here to look at the study centre. Scots will be here soon. And there will be others.

I welcome the architect of the project, Mr Ray Hudson. Thanks, Ray, for the great job you have done for us. It was a pleasure to work with you and to marvel at the quiet way you went about resolving the problems that the site presented. If anyone in tonight's group is contemplating hiring an architect, look no further than Ray Hudson.

Grindley Constructions are old friends of High, having done our sports stadium. They are an outstandingly successful small business with a reputation for innovative and imaginative ways of building things, on time and on budget. Grindley is represented this evening by Mr Wayne Hughes, who was the foreman on the site. Wayne's even temperament and calm professionalism were an example to us all. To you, Wayne, thanks a lot mate for the job and the great association with your firm and with you personally.

Phil Whyte deserves special thanks and it is fitting that he should perform the opening ceremony. During the conception, design and construction phases Phil was both President of the P&C and Chairman of the Foundation. His personal drive and enthusiasm were crucial in getting the project to happen. He was the catalyst in getting the P&C and Foundation to work together in the funding of the project.

The P&C itself deserves great praise. The August 1993 meeting of P&C was critical to this project. From that point on the parent group of this school threw its weight unequivocally behind the study centre and its voice was heard clearly in Council and in Foundation.

The study centre is intended as stage one of a new school library. The present art building adjoins this centre. The intention is that the present art building will become the stack of the library, giving the school a state of the art library. Before we get to that point, however, there is the small matter of the centre for the arts. More of that at another time.

The Cecil Rubie Study Centre is probably the most important development in the school's history. It is important for its symbolism as well as for what it provides in material terms. It is a powerful symbol of the importance the school places on intellectual inquiry. It is a powerful endorsement of the school's commitment to academic excellence. It is a powerful endorsement of the school's central purpose. It gives the lie to the old theory that this school could not think past new sporting facilities.

Over two hundred boys can work here in air conditioned comfort from 7:30 in the morning to 5:30 in the afternoon. It is virtually self supervising, something which people in other schools including independent schools find hard to believe. There is a student committee of management.

You will not see notice boards. The idea is that nothing will distract the boys working quietly in here. Well, some of the art work might be a touch distracting and I should mention that it was chosen by the management committee.

There are no toilet facilities in here. The toilets are downstairs. There are no facilities for eating or drinking. We have built new facilities downstairs near the canteen.

There will be computers in here soon, as soon as the school's computer committee is satisfied that we know exactly what we need. The computer facilities are planned to be integrated into a general school network.

In summary, this project has been a wonderful, cooperative effort right from the beginning when the educational practitioners worked out the concept through to Brian Jarman's help and Ray Hudson's design and finally Grindley's building. The School Family has weighed in with generosity of spirit.

A project long contemplated in one form or another has come to fruition. The important thing is that it is here and that the students of the school have a wonderful place to exercise their intellects. And that is, after all, the main reason why they are here in the first place.

r Kerry Rubie, second son of Mrs Joan Rubie and the late Cec Rubie, is in London and was unable to get to the opening ceremony. He did, however, write to the Principal.

Dear Mr Stratford,

It was with a sense of pride and excitement that I learned ... of your intention to name the newly completed Study Centre at the school after my father.

As you are clearly aware, High meant so much to Dad. Next to his family, it was his consuming passion.

In the personally demanding period (so demanding that he had to take a year's leave of absence) as a student, it was the forum where he developed his extraordinary combination of academic, sporting and leadership skills. It was where he initiated personal relationships which were to stay with him through Sydney University, his early teaching career, his time with the army during the war years and beyond. These were the friends he subsequently recruited to help him build the Old Boys Union into the formidable body that it later became. Friends like Jim Budge, Keith *Cameron, Des Duffy and Fred Deer, to name but a few.*

Shortly after I had the privilege of following in his footsteps down the corridors of the School, my early memories included being repeatedly confronted by his picture in a winning boat, athletic or rugby team as I moved from classroom to classroom.

During my time as a student he shared with me the reasons for his absolute love of Sydney High. Essentially it was because he felt an enormous debt for providing him with the comprehensive preparation from which to confidently move forward onto his personal, academic and professional careers.

Along with my mother and brother Howard, I too am indebted to the school for what it gave to Dad. We all benefited.

I am truly sorry not to be able to attend the ceremony on Friday but I can assure you that it will be uppermost in my thoughts. After the formalities, in my mind's eye, I dare say I will walk down the same school corridors I did in the early fifties and see Dad in his winning VIII. I might even walk a little further and check out the winning VIII of 1957 to see if we really did sit in the boat with the same straight back as Jim and Des suggested we did!

Thank you for honouring my father as you will do on Friday.

The Sins of the Fathers By David Smith

From the shining path terrorist war in Peru to the destructive cocaine industry in Colombia, Latin America's vast array of internal problems can at least be partially attributed to colonial activities of the past which now continue into the present.

he Mayan people of modern-day Guatemala believed that a great disaster would befall them on a certain year every two hundred and fifty-six or two hundred and fifty-seven years. The Spanish conquistadors used this to their advantage when, in 1697, the year upon which the next calamity was due, they seized and pillaged the last Mayan stronghold of Copan. The United States unwittingly fulfilled the next prophecy when it supported a coup in 1954 which overthrew the democratically elected Guatemalan government, and once more the natives of that country lost the means of controlling their own future. Although no credibility is given to the Maya's superstition nowadays, it is a perfect illustration of the lot of the native people of south and central America since European colonisation, whether they be Indians or the American-born descendants of non-American settlers or slaves. Wherever they are, they have always been dominated by a large, distant, foreign power, and have simply not been allowed to choose their own path. Throughout history, the great powers have come forth, one by one. First, it was the Spanish, who came to the then unknown land to try to tap in to the massive wealth which they had heard existed there. That opened the floodgates for the other colonist powers - Portugal, France, The Netherlands, and Britain, who were also attracted by prospects of vast wealth and land. When the colonial powers were gone, they left behind foreign companies who continued to mine, grow and manufacture goods for export at great profit and little expense to themselves. Finally, in the absence of the previously powerful Spain, there was a new superpower in the region – the United States of America.

For the natives of Latin America, there has been little change. Each power has looked for more than the last. When the Spanish drained the Indian civilisations of their gold, the other colonial powers made money by cash crops. When there was no more arable land, the big companies looked for other resources such as oil. The demands of the United States were perhaps the heaviest of all – conformity to its absolute non-Communist political and military agenda as well as its economic one.

Any movement towards self-determination and unity in Latin America is always extinguished quickly, if not by military force, than by the problems created by the acts of societal destruction perpetrated against Latin America by economic means.

Then the Spanish first ventured onto the mainland of Mexico, they found that locals of that region were entirely different from the peaceful Caribbean Indians. Their social, religious, economic and military structures were far more highly organised, and they were able to effectively fight back with great force, as they numbered in the millions, and could muster hundreds of thousands of warriors. However, they were not united, as different cities, which formed the basis of power, feuded constantly, and the Spaniards had little trouble in turning them against each other. When Hernan Cortes conquered the mighty Aztec empire, he commanded only six hundred Spaniards, but also seventy-five thousand Indians, and an African slave carrying the smallpox disease which wiped out ninety percent of the Aztec population. The enormous riches of the conquered Aztecs enticed hundreds of other Spaniards to the mainland, and soon they had also conquered the equally rich Incas and powerful Mayas. But when the gold of these civilisations ran out, the Spaniards realised that they would have to mine it themselves. Thus the gold and silver mines of Peru became the economic lifeblood of the quite resource-poor Spain until the mid-nineteenth century.

Another effective tool of destruction that the Spanish had at their disposal was their mission from the Pope (himself a Spaniard) to "convert the heathen". Jesuit missionaries were often sent to remote, hostile tribal bases, where they would live among the natives and persuade them to become Christians. However, another, far more effective method of religious recruitment was to simply "convert" a whole tribe at sword point after they had been conquered. This mass conversion had a profound long-term effect, as the next generation of Indians would be born and baptised into a Spanish Christian tradition, and thus were effectively subjugated psychologically to the Spanish. By the seventeenth century, there was no effective armed resistance to Spanish rule in Central America.

hen all the gold and silver deposits were mined, a new source of revenue was needed for non-mining colonies. Therefore, they generated money by planting cash crops, such as tobacco, coffee, hemp, cotton, bananas, sugar and coca. These exotic goods were exported to Europe at great profit. Cash cropping soon became the most profitable source of income to colonies, and in the long term, the most destructive. Self-sufficient, ecologically sustainable farming had been the only form of agriculture in Latin America. However, now its ecology was destroyed as natural vegetation was ripped up to make way for the money-making crops. Soon, there was very little left of the original environment. Everything became dependent upon the cash crops. Small communities were no longer self-sufficient, and now they relied on the crop and the power which controlled it for money to buy food. As colonial powers were replaced with huge, foreign corporations, the practice continued, and was taken to new extremes, and Latin Americans were no longer protected by laws of various nations, for the companies were not aligned to any nations, and operated outside laws. The indigenous were especially vulnerable, as they were totally subjugated to the Europeans, and were in no position to better themselves.

The legacy of the cash crop lives on today. The term "banana republic" quite adequately describes Costa Rica, which relies on bananas as its only really profitable export. Colombia had severe problems when its main money-spinner, coca, (the plant from which cocaine is manufactured) was made illegal in Europe and the U. S. Whole countries go bankrupt when, after experiencing a short economic boom, the prices fall out of their crops. It is then that they learn of the magnitude of their mistake, as they cannot rely on anything else because they have destroyed their own ecology.

France, Britain, the Netherlands and Portugal withdrew from the western hemisphere when they had taken from it all that they could. However, at the beginning of the nineteenth century, the Spanish crown was still ruling all of the land that it had seized since 1492, and still relying on it to support its treasury. At this time, there were some three million men, women and children of Spanish descent who had been born in Latin America (known as Creoles), who were usually landowners and traders, as well as fourteen million of African, indigenous and mixed descent, who provided most of the labour base. The largest benefactor of their work was the Spanish crown. There had long been much discontent in the Creole class at Spain's constant interference in the western hemisphere, but it was not until around 1810 that the process of independence began. It was clear that Spain would not give up easily, and in the end, independence in Latin America came at a far heavier toll upon its people than it had in the north. The revolt was led by the Argentine General Jose San Martin in the south, and by the Venezuelan aristocrat Simon Bolivar in the north.

Although Spanish Latin America is now divided into sixteen separate nations, both of the liberating generals had a vision of a far more united Latin America. San Martin marched across Patagonia and the Andes to rid modern Argentina and Chile of the huge Spanish military presence, while Bolivar fought in Venezuela, Colombia, Ecuador and Panama to found the giant republic of Gran Colombia. However, both men looked to expand their republics beyond their traditional power bases, and as a result they clashed in Peru, and the outcome was a legacy of factional civil war and corruption in that country, which to this day has hardly ever experienced stable government.

The Spanish were eventually defeated and banished from Latin America, but the continent now had to cope with the endless stream of problems that were created by the transition – corruption, factional war, reprisal killing, rampant poverty, dependence on foreign corporations. In Bolivar's absence, Gran Colombia broke up, torn apart by the political differences between the Creole groups of different regions.

When unity was destroyed, so was peace. Political groups struggled for power in the new countries, each believing that their vision for Latin America was the correct one. The pattern continues to this day – most Latin countries do not have democratically elected government, and those which do usually have minority governments. Often governments assert their power with the heavyhanded tactics of the Spanish, and others fight back with the ruthless determination of Bolivar and San Martin. In the end the result is always the same. When the political groups, no matter which side they are on, go to war, it is those without power who suffer the most.

Peru is the ultimate microcosm of governmental and revolutionary brutality in central America. There, the "Shining Path" guerrilla movement, whose strict doctrine is based upon that of Mao Zedong, carry out an especially bloody war against the aggressively anti-communist government. Although they claim to fight on behalf of Peru's peasants, not all peasants are aligned to them, and the Andes of Peru have been divided into a political chessboard of pro-government and pro-Shining Path villages. Each group takes massive reprisals against those which oppose them, usually in the form of mass executions. The peasants have no choice but to align themselves to one side and hope for protection from them against the others, protection which is almost never guaranteed.

The new superpower of the western hemisphere, the United States, like the Spanish before them, have a heavy political hand in Latin America, and is responsible for many of the countries', such as Peru's, political problems. Since the nineteentwenties, it has had a firm commitment to the destruction of local and global Communism, and as it considers Latin America to be its "backyard", it always moves especially quickly to stop what it perceives to be Communist organisations from gaining power in the region, although these organisations usually have no commitment to global Communism, instead basing their policies on the traditional socialistic way of the Latin American labourers and pastoralists, a way practised by many Indian groups for thousands of years.

In accordance with this, the United States has often funded whichever group is most powerful and opposed to the "Communists" in a certain country, even if that group is a military dictatorship. Many governments, such as Peru's, have actually been established by the U.S. An interesting example is Nicaragua, whose democratic Sandinista government, which promoted socialism by collectivism in individual farming communities, was constantly harassed by a mercenary army established by the U.S. in a campaign which resulted in the death of thousands of peasants.

hen the American constitution, which today is promoted by the U.S. as a great symbol of freedom in the Americas, was established, one of its basic cornerstones was the principal that the citizens of that country had the right to take their own path as opposed to that of the great, distant power which had ruled them for so long. However, there is no such constitution in Latin America, and its people have no complete power of self-determination from the great, distant power of the U.S. Perhaps the former Mexican president Porifirio Diaz summed it up best when he said, "Poor Mexico, so far from God, so near to the United States." Latin America remains to the rest of the world a distant, unpleasant place, only notable for its coffee, soccer, and institutionalised violence. It is only when it is realised, especially by the U. S., that Latin America's 350 million inhabitants are fit to take control of their own lives without interference from elsewhere, that they will finally be allowed to return to their lands, and take their own direction, in their own time.

ineteen ninety-six will be remembered most in athletics for the exploits of Mr Johnson, Mr Bailey and Ms Cathy Freeman in the Atlanta Olympics. For Sydney High Athletics, versatility was the highlight of the year. GPS representatives in Rugby, Cross Country and the odd triathlete performed admirably in this Olympic Year. The School won the Zone Premiership at CHS level again, thus showing our depth and commitment. However we did not expect to finish eighth in the Senior and Junior Divisions of the 101st GPS Carnival. Although the weather on the day of the GPS Carnival was cold, windy and drizzly, the result did not fairly reflect our talent. Despite lacking the resources, such as hurdles, and the professional coaches, we proved to our GPS colleagues that we will be a force to be reckoned with in the near future.

In the Under 13 years age group, Andrew Light finished third in the long jump and second in the hurdles. In the Under 14 years, Luke Nicholas, the 6'5" giant leapt high to win the high jump. Our shot putters also did well, with Nicholas Chew coming fourth in the Under 15, after a second the previous year. In the same division Joshua Lodge continued his dominance in high jump by winning his third GPS crown. In the Under 16 age group Daniel Jones came second in a tight finish of the 800 m. Houldsworth finished third in the Under 16 long jump, and John Reynaldo, after breaking the School record for the 100m at 10.76s the previous week, finished fifth. I competed in three events in my role of captain, coming sixth in the long jump and the championship hurdles, and running in the 400m.

I wanted the team to perform better amidst the gloomy dark skies and the deafening roars of other schools' supporters, but on the day we tried our gutsy best. I congratulate all athletes who braved the weather at the GPS carnival. It is not like that every year, but I like to think that not even snow or a cyclone could dampen a GPS carnival.

On the CHS front we had in excess of thirty athletes compete in the State Carnival, having to endure two qualifying carnivals to reach the Mecca of State Athletics. Despite the carnival taking place in the midst of the GPS winter representative season, and with some athletes nursing Rugby or Soccer injuries, we made a presence. Joshua Lodge became the best high jumper in the School's history with a leap of 195cm. The Open relay team, consisting of GPS Rugby Representatives, were available only for the heats, but qualified for the final in the process. I performed well in my favourite event, the triple jump, which is unfortunately not part of the GPS program. I leapt 13.39m to come fourth and break the School record. I was happy about my event, but also happy that so many athletes gave up their school time to compete on a Friday (a decision that daunted very few). Although it may seem strange being the only GPS school competing in athletics until September (excluding the Moove Games), it gives many athletes a chance to perform away from the electric hub of the GPS carnivals, and a chance to win a state medal.

Another highlight was the appearance of World War II veteran and School record holder for the long jump for sixty years, Mr Wall, at the athletics assembly the day before the GPS carnival.

I would like to thank Mr Baldock, my father Harry Stanley, and Mr Casimir for assisting in coaching in the lead-up to the GPS. I hope I can assist in the ensuing years as an Old Boy, developing a good long jumping core as well as a pure athlete core.

Nineteen ninety-six was unusual – it was The Year of the Ambidextrous Athlete.

Rugby

First Fifteen

This year we fielded a team dedicated to running the ball. The boys' fitness was out standing. Their passing skills were advanced. The support lines were cunningly run to carry the play forward. As well, with the massive Matty Bowman, Paul Morris, and Todd Olivier in the front row we had the foundation for an irresistible scrum. Behind them Chris Daish and Jamie Hamilton added power and speed. The backrow included the sheer aggression and strength of Michael Kovac and the open field speed of Kendall Robinson and Ben Khan. This was a mean pack, a quick pack, and a big pack.

Behind them was a backline greedy for tries. Half, Steve Blacker, and five-eighth, Lindsay Crawford, were speedy and crafty. Sadly, Lindsay was cut down-and-out in the first game of the season when his knee was badly damaged. Mark Allardice bravely converted himself from lifetimespecialist halfback to five-eighth in record time and carried out his duties with relish. At inside centre David Treacy was a solid chunk of powerful hands. Young Year 11 Captain, Grant Houldsworth, later moved to #12 from #13 when Phil Lyons, with his speedy hands and sharp vision, forced his way into the side at outside centre.

The back three were the perfect mix of attack and solid defence starting with the tackling machine, Michael Hennessy, on the right wing. Josh Nicholson from fullback loved to chime in to the attack and made defences look flimsy at times with his acceleration into a gap. Johnny Reynaldo on the left wing was passionate about the game and was a real personality with his flash of speed and super side step. He could tear holes in any defence. One of the highlights of the season was his 100metre intercept try in the game against Shore. He possesses true speed.

The pre-season went very well. Undefeated in the four trial games the team scored 176 thumping points to 20 against. After this we enjoyed the accommodation at the Burleigh Heads Surf Life Saving Club, right on the beach. For the third year in a row we entered Barry Honan's Gold Coast International Schoolboys' Rugby tournament. For the third year in a row we made the Grand Final. There we suffered our first loss for the year. St Peters of Auckland simply overpowered us. The High boys had shown that they had the firepower to destroy weaker sides. Now, the sheer size, the speed, and the physical maturity of St Peters, in this last game before the GPS competition, had made for a brutal and ill-timed encounter.

As it turned out all of the GPS games were difficult. The competition games are so quick and so tight that the slightest loss of concentration is fatal. The first game, against Iggies, was quite fiery with both sides fully committed to the cause. The power of the Iggies centres and their outside speed was the difference in a bruising game. The following week we played Joeys, at The Hill, in constant, pouring rain. This was a game for the taking, but one error in the first action of the second half saw Joeys score the only try of the game after a slipsliding race for the loose ball in the downpour near our own line.

In a return to fine weather for the next game we found that the Newington tacklers, scrambling and committed, were able to cut us down just short of the line or got under our ball carriers over their line. We were denied try after try. We managed to touch down only once after Mark Allardice shimmied down a channel of narrow gaps near a ruck. Most of the swift Newington tries were scored through excellent penetration by outside backs after firing some slick moves. Our first win, the following week against Scots, was a costly one, since we lost our captain, with a shoulder injury, and our hooker with a bad cut on the scalp. It was a hard fought afternoon and we scored enough tries to win comfortably despite a last second's Scots try under the posts.

Back at McKay the next week, in the sunshine of a perfect day, both Shore and High played fast and open rugby. The outside speed of the Shore side given fast ball by their fine pack saw them assume a handy lead for most of the game. Although we did score some excellent lateish tries, including the Johnny Reynaldo 100m try, we were never going to find the time in the game to win it. It was a most enjoyable game, just the same. In the second last game, still in the sunshine at McKay, Kings came to play rugged and clever football. Their backs had size, especially in their massive fullback, and they had outrageous outside speed to finish the moves. They had to hold us out all day, and although we were often pulled down just short of the line, they kept us scoreless, a real tribute to their defence.

Sydney High School won the NSW Rifle As sociation's All Schools Match contested at ANZAC Rifle Range on Saturday 26th April. The target rifle shooting match was fired over 300 metres, and three stages at 600 metres. The teams were tested in the tricky conditions on the range. Sydney High School finished with 938-50, ahead of The Armidale School in second place on 921-45. Sydney Grammar School ran third with 888-27. Teams from the New England Girls' School in Armidale and Scots College also took part in the event.

Top individual score was recorded by Danny Hui of the Sydney High School team, with and impressive 194-15 from a possible 200. Danny started shooting in late 1994, and travelled to England in 1996 to compete in the prestigious Imperial Meeting. He recently won B Grade in the Sydney High School Open Prize Meeting, following his C Grade victory at Cessnock last October.

Commenting after his team's win, Danny said that his own personal achievement was due to his regular twice weekly practice. "Rifle Shooting is a sport that anyone can participate in, however practice was required to shoot regular high scores".

Their goodwill is a limited resource and cannot be taken for granted. If no additional help is forthcoming we shall be forced to reduce our numbers to accommodate only three teams per grade. This will be most disappointing as I feel the opportunity to play soccer, whatever the level of skill, is of paramount importance. The day that competitive team soccer is only available to 'elite athletes' will be a very sad day. From my own perspective some of the most gratifying moments of the season were spent watching the 5th Grade open team and the 14Ds, every player enjoying their involvement whatever the result.

The solution to the above problem must come from the parent body. Parents may not possess the coaching expertise but by being involved in a supervisory or managerial capacity they can take some of the strain off teachers and old boys. I ask all parents to consider offering such assistance.

In general, as the world game takes on great strides in the GPS competition, it will not be long before some of our ex players play at the elite level. Who knows maybe the Australian Joey's U/17s may one day reach the World Cup Championship Final, only to lose to Brazil on penalties? Only time will tell!

I would like to recognise the sterling efforts of Assistant First Grade Coach Mark Kaizik. Mark was a member of the 1992 First Grade team and had coached junior teams through the ranks, several of whom were now playing in First Grade. Mark's physiotherapy skills were a great asset to the team and he carried out these duties with great professionalism. Mark enjoyed great respect from the players and as a recent old boy was able to enjoy a special rapport with the players. The role of assistant coach is a difficult one and Mark showed great patience and understanding in accepting decisions made by me with which he did not agree. Finally I would like to thank the Principal Mr Richard Stratford and Sportsmaster Mr Ross Farrington for their great support throughout the year.

Cross Country

World Schools Cross Country Championships

Antalya, Turkey April 1996

It was with great excitement that we received the news that we were to represent Australia as the boys' school team at the World Schools Cross Country Championships. This surprising news was announced at the school's November 1995, athletics dinner. We realised that we had only four months to prepare and already one of the team had an injury. The time flew very quickly, and with mounting excitement and a great deal of fundraising effort, we anticipated our departure.

The great day finally arrived, April 2nd. The team assembled at Sydney airport at 6:00 am, preparing for the eight hour haul to Singapore. After a day and a night in. the steamy garden city of Singapore exploring the shops, we left for our eleven hour plane journey to Turkey.

Istanbul, here we are, and now all our images of Turkey are fulfilled: a crowded, polluted, but very interesting place, with many half-built apartments all shoved in as close as possible to each other. In Istanbul we visited the beautiful Blue Mosque. Outside the mosque we had our first experience of pressure selling from six year old Turkish kids.

One of the highlights for us was shopping in the world famous Covered Bazaar, which is much like Paddy's, only hundreds of times bigger. Lots of fun was had bargaining with shopkeepers and resisting pressure sales tactics.

After experiencing Istanbul we flew to Antalya, a city by the beach on the Mediterranean Coast. By this stage, most members of the Aussie team had become friendly with each other and enjoyed each other's company. The day before the race we attended the opening ceremony in which we experienced Turkish culture in the form of music and dancing after which we mingled with the other countries competitors. Also on the day preceding the race, we travelled to the course; this is where things became serious – the teams jogged the course working out tactics here and there, practising starts and worrying about the day ahead.

Sunday April 7, 1996 Antalya

The day everyone has been dreading and expecting feverishly at the same time.

Waking up to a beautiful view of the sun over the sea and rugged mountains, we went down to a filling breakfast of bread, jam, butter and cheese, each one of us at our own time, some getting extra sleep, others driven away from bed by jangling nerves.

Two hours later, all our team managers were back from the last technical meeting and went through the final details of the races with us. We were then given fifteen minutes to be ready to leave.

We boarded the bus ten minutes earlier to take up seats, leaving a surprised Luxembourg team standing for the short ride to the course. An almost silent drive except for some odd conversation here and there, and tension and anxiety may have been getting the better of some of us.

When we reached the course, it was sheer disappointment. It just didn't seem right. It was far from what one would expect for an international event. It looked more like a school carnival.

Sure, there were flags of all the twenty-one countries, and a big banner with "START", red and white tapes mapping out the course and a table displaying the trophies and medals for winners. What was missing, was a big supporting crowd needed to spur the athletes on. Only a handful of people came to watch.

But we were not to be distracted by those details. One could feel the spirit of competition in the air. All the teams were there.

We then proceeded to check the course, expecting to find new obstacles overnight, which would make the track more challenging, but that was not to be.

- 1:50 pm: Turkish time, The girls' school team were marshalled to the start
- 2:00 pm: That was it, there goes the gun! The first race of the World School Sports Cross Country for 1996 has taken off. Australia having two in the first pack. We cannot tell much of the race because the next was ours. What was pretty obvious though, almost all the way through, the Chinese had a lead which was hard for anyone to challenge. The competition was fierce. We were getting the first taste of the cross country at international level. Quite

scary. The Chinese girls ended up winning the first four places.

- Our team, the Baulkham Hills Girls, came 12th place overall.
- 2:20 pm: It was time to proceed to the marshalling area. This is what we are here for. All the hard work and sweat of the last three months of intensive training, all the apprehension and hope. This was the race of our lives. As we walked along, we were encouraged and cheered by our teams.
- 2:25 pm: We were all lined up ready to run, at Barrier 14. Good position to the right side of the track away from the uneven ground in the middle.
- 2:30 pm: The gun went off. We were sent flying down the first hundred metres to the first bend, arms were swinging everywhere as everyone tried to get a good spot at the front.

It just felt good to be under way and it was nice to hear the odd cheer from our compatriots, but the race was over in a flash, and so were our hopes of winning a medal. We just stumbled through the finish line, pushed and shoved by officials. We finished 15th.

That was it. We still think that we had a fairly good result considering that this was Australia's very first. Most of the other countries were there with years of experience. We had five months' notice and three months of training, not forgetting that there were injuries all the time. We probably turned up to training, the six of us fully fit, only three or four times, and we probably made the longest trip to get there.

As for Josh and Thierry, they were among the youngest – mind you, they're not using that as an excuse. Marc Bennie came, 38th, followed by brother Andrew (72nd), Sean Garber (75th), Justin Lodge (79th), Thierry Lamvohee (85th) and Joshua Lodge (96th).

We stayed there and still hoped that Australia would be mentioned for something, like competing the first time, but nothing came up. The representative girls' team had a fairly good result as did the representative boys' team finishing 7th out of 14 countries and 8th out of 10 respectively.

We left the course and from there on we just tried to make the most of Turkey.

It was a fantastic experience. We would not have missed it for the world. Now we know what

to expect we can prepare accordingly for our next great challenge.

The day after the main event our team and all of the other teams, went on a sightseeing tour around the beautiful Antalya. We saw the Turkish natural wonders in three flowing waterfalls and magnificent ruins of huge stadiums or colosseums. While we were there we took lots of photos and spoke to a few Turkish people. That night we went to a Turkish nightclub. As we entered we were frisked for weapons and we then enjoyed the disco with some of the other teams that stayed in our hotel including Luxembourg, Belgium and England. The next day were the friendship relays. Each person was placed in a team according to their performance at the World Championships. Each team of fifteen people was of mixed countries and sexes. These relays provided a good opportunity to meet people from other countries. We ran around the 1 km town square along streets lined with Turks. The yelling Turks gave the race a unique atmosphere. The team that won the race had most of our team managers in it and they certainly wouldn't let us forget it. After the race, a lot of athletes swapped singlets and tracksuits and generally socialised a lot. It was very interesting and fun to meet these foreigners, especially as we all had a common interest. We always found something to talk about.

Now that the races had been run, we could eat street food without the worry of ruining our digestive systems. That afternoon we again shopped around Antalya and most of us tried Turkish-style doner kebabs. Australia's team prepared our act for the closing ceremony on the bus trip there. We decided to sing *Waltzing Matilda, Advance Australia Fair* and *Give me a Home among the Gum Trees*. The other countries seemed to enjoy our acts. The band played music and there was much joyous dancing, with everyone joining in. More uniform swapping took place at the closing ceremony with some people receiving bad deals. As the Australian uniform was undoubtedly one of the best there, it was easy to find someone to swap with.

The closing ceremony ended the World Championships on a very high note and will never be forgotten by anyone who was there.

We hope that our school as well as our country can be proud of our accomplishment.

• he beginning of the open cross country season showed great promise for High, and by winning the teams event at our own invitation carnival we showed that High was going to be very competitive this year.

National Cross Country Championships

10th-12th August 1996, Queensland

team of forty-eight runners, selected on the basis of performances at the state championships, were invited to represent NSW at the National Cross Country Championships. The event was held at Longlea on the Gold Coast, between 10th and 12th August 1996. Placed 4th in NSW, in the U-17 boys 6000M, I was expected to perform reasonably well, especially as NSW has been the champion state for the past three years.

The course was set at the Longlea High School, in the heart of Gold Coast farmland. At a glance, the course looked extremely tough, consisting of many hills, dales, twists and turns. This did not make much difference to a very strong NSW lineup, as was confirmed by the results: a NSW competitor finished in the top five of every race, and the teams won every age group point score on the day with one exception. I finished 13th out of 74 runners, which was a very pleasing result for me, having never contested at the "Nationals" before.

On the second day, the relay events (top five runners from every state) and time trials for the other competitors were held. NSW once again proved to be the top state, winning all the relays and two of the time trials: the U-15 girls and the U-17 boys. Racing in the time trials in the U-17 boys, I felt that I had a good chance of coming in the top few in the age group. As it turned out, I had a great run, winning my age group and the Gold medal.

In 1996 the NSW team was the most successful team ever and I was extremely proud to be part of it, representing Sydney Boys High School.

Junior Cross Country

We are proud to inform you that, as we promised you last year, we have won the Open Premiership for GPS cross country in 1996. This is our first since the sport's introduction in 1988, and the winning combination of Marc Bennie, Andrew Bennie, Steven Croft and Oggie Kolev deserve our congratulations. One should take a look at Oggie's blazer: there is not one inch squared of brown cloth left, with all the badges he has! Maybe it was to compensate for the fact that Mr Noonan, arguably one of the best masters-in-charge of any sport, has left the school, or to impress our new MIC and coach, Mr Prorellis and coach Mr Kesting, but these superb athletes dictated the Opens race from beginning to end, taking 3rd, 4th, 5th, and 6th respectively. Our total of 18 points is ahead, by far, of the runner-up, SCEGS on 27 and SJC on 66. In fact we equalled the record of the least number of points in total, set by another school a few years ago. Such an achievement is simply phenomenal, and will help immensely in building the profile of this sport for a long time to come.

The reason why I raise this point is because, until now, the sport has been largely unknown to most. People talk about cricket, soccer, rugby and basketball all the time but others like fencing and cross country hardly raise a mention. Perhaps our training is not as much a public performance as is often the case in rugby, and we do not have the tradition such as in rowing. Whatever it is, the win will certainly lift the sport's popularity. Like I mentioned last year, we need the numbers. Anyone can afford three hours of compulsory training per week (and ideally much more for keen runners). And for the juniors, it only takes another twenty minutes or so per week to compete in (at least) six of the ten weekly meetings. I do not think there is any other GPS sport with more leniency than this. This is clearly a sport for everyone and everyone, on a voluntary basis, should participate. You jog in your own time and at the same time you maintain your fitness and evoke admiration from your friends. Believe me, people will see you differently if you participate.

Meanwhile to illustrate our desperate need for new blood, just look at our results for the Under 16s and the Under 14s: the 16s came a miserable 7th, while we do not even have enough runners in the 14s to qualify as a school team (minimum of four runners)! We only need four people for each age group, that is only two more participants per race! Surely we can make this target. What I mean is that even if you WALK the whole race, or stop in the middle and go backwards, or even wander off somewhere to get some inspiration in the middle of the race, as long as you finish the race, in any way you wish, you will be qualified, which helps the team and eventually takes you to the GPS championship. How good does that sound? You must help out! High's cross country future cross country is in your hands!

On a lighter note, the school assembly with the public presentation of the trophy was rather well received. It is just a pity that, with the current crop of youngsters, including myself, it will be virtually impossible to defend our win, and that our next win, if there are any, will be long into the next millennium. We do have talents and hard workers amongst us but the sums just do not add up: there are simply not enough of us.

Hopefully with this latest triumph, we can attract the attention of more people and help us to at least stay competitive for the years to come.
