

# An Outline History of the Sydney High School.

**I**N 1883 the Government of New South Wales assumed responsibility for the secondary education of all the pupils who, having passed an entrance examination, desired to proceed to higher standards than had been possible previously under the Public School System.

In the public schools, the pupil of ordinary intelligence had learnt all the curriculum provided before he was fifteen years of age, and had then gone to work, as very few parents were in a position to send their promising children to any of the private secondary schools.

The object behind the Public School Act providing for High Schools in New South Wales was to prepare students for the University, and a code of regulations to establish these schools was adopted as far back as November, 1880. It was not, however, until 1883 that Sydney High Schools, the first High Schools established, were opened.

**T**HE 20th September, 1883, was, therefore, a red-letter day in the highest classes of the public schools. On that day the test examination was held to decide which pupils should be the pioneers of the new system which was to link up the primary schools with the University, and also to provide those scholars not proceeding to academic honours with the groundwork necessary to fit them for positions in the commercial world.

One hundred and twenty-six candidates, sixty-three boys and sixty-three girls, sat for the test, and fifty-four boys and forty-three girls were successful. With these small numbers the Sydney High Schools were inaugurated. Although the official opening took place on the 8th October, 1883, the Schools actually commenced work on the first day of that month.

**T**HE Sydney High Schools were officially opened Mr. (later Sir) George Reid, then Minister for Education, and the inaugural address was delivered by Dr. Charles Badham, Professor of Classics at the University of Sydney. His address, which is noble in its vision, beauty of expression and lustre of scholarship, is reprinted here from the *Sydney Morning Herald's* report of the 9th October, 1883:—

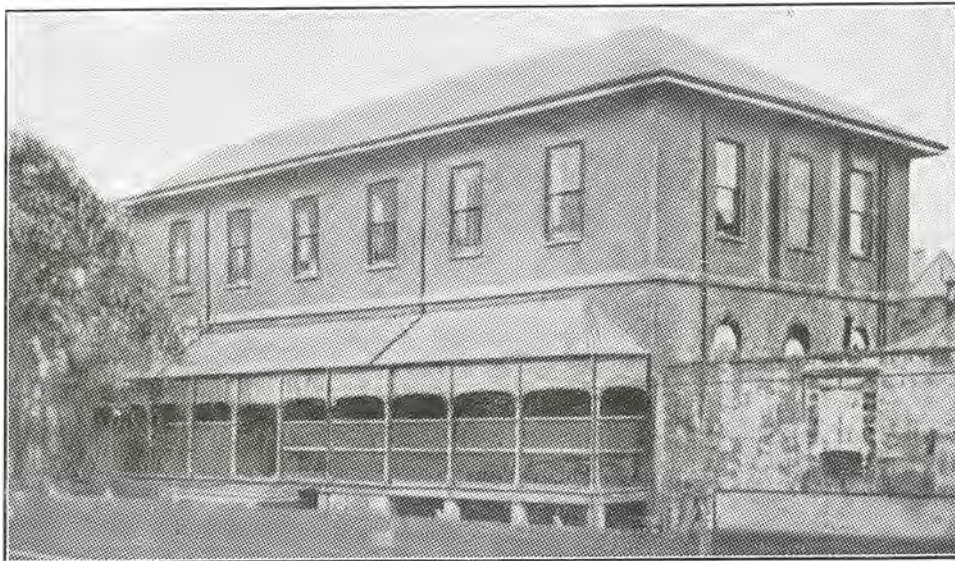
**Dr. Badham's Address.**

**YOU** know that when persons are starting upon a long voyage, their friends and well-wishers are glad to assemble on board the ship which is to carry them away, and to make this the scene of their last and fondest farewell. The ladies and gentlemen who come to see you this morning are the friends and well-wishers assembled on board to bid you 'God-speed' on the voyage which you commence this day. It is one of the most interesting voyages on which anyone can set forth, for it is the commencement to you all of a new kind of education. I do not mean that you will be taught entirely new subjects, or after a new method, for, indeed, had you not been well taught already, we should not have had the pleasure of meeting you here. But you are entering upon a course which, if maintained with perseverance, will, after a few years, enable you to say that you belong to the rank of educated men and women. I call this higher education 'a rank.' Do not understand by that, that it is intended you should necessarily enter upon any higher occupations than were first intended for you. Some of you may indeed rise to callings which, in the estimation of the world, command more respect than others; but even those who follow the occupation of their fathers will have

acquired a dignity, a place in the world, which can be gained by no amount of wealth, and which no trade or calling, however humble, can rob them of. The time is coming, and perhaps you may live to glory in its being come, when the only thing which ennobles a man in the estimation of his fellows is a cultivated mind.

“What I said to the students of the University fourteen years ago, I say to you now; only I said it then in Latin, which, perhaps you would not be quite able to follow, so I will tell it you in English. After mentioning some of the humblest

now I say to you, children of New South Wales, that you are beginning on this day a career which will lead you, not only to knowledge, but also to the rank which higher education confers. And to whom are you indebted for all the contrivances which are to give you this blessing of higher education? To your Country—to the public opinion of New South Wales, as expressed by its Parliament. Well, then, the first point that I want to impress upon your young minds this day, is, that at every step which you gain in knowledge, in power of thought, and readiness of speech, you should re-

occupations by which men can earn their bread, I told them that I could see no reason why a youth who was intended for any of these should not carry into them a mind so far cultivated that he could not give a part of his leisured time to further and continual self-improvement; and I heartily sympathise with the demands for early closing and for shortening the hours of labour as a means to that end. I said what I then thought, and think still, scholarships and scholarly training ought not to be the privilege of the few, but the preparation of all, as far as the time could be spared from the demands of the trade by which they were to live. And so

member that it is to your country you owe it, and so love your country as your greatest benefactor.

“The next thing for you to consider is this : Remember that you belong to a large school, and a school to which it is a privilege to belong; but there are many good things which a boy or girl may learn, even from a school of much smaller pretensions than this. In a school, respect and obedience come as a matter of course, and if you carry that habit of respect and obedience home with you, what a blessing that will be to the parents who sent you hither! There are many homes in which discipline is not strict enough; but, at all events, home

is a place for cultivating love and affection. Bring, therefore, some portion of that love and affection, which you have cultivated at home, and bestow it upon those who will find it a great encouragement in the difficult task of teaching. You see what I want you to do : to set up a kind of commerce between home and school. You know commerce between two countries is that each supplies to the other what the other wants. Be you, then, the honest little traders between school and home, exchanging the strictness of one with the sweetness of the other. But you are members of what will one day be a great body; and I trust that that great body will be animated with a common spirit. That common spirit in the greatest body of all—the people—is called “public opinion.” I trust and hope that you, my young fellow-citizens, will have a public opinion among you, and not be so many

you into wrongdoing; and that duty looks cold and cheerless while you are hesitating about following her, and only smiles upon you when you have discarded pleasure for her sake? Why, you all know this as well as I do; and you also know that one is apt to forget this just at the moment that it is most wanted. Still, you must strive and strive to overcome indolence, for without that you can do nothing.

“But there is one thing that I know better than almost any man in this room, simply because I am older than most, and every year that a man lives brings to him additional lessons in proof of this truth, that idleness means failure, and steady industry, success. Yes; but that steady industry reminds me of another subject which I wish to point out to you—I mean the danger of indolence in disguise; of an indolence which looks like diligence

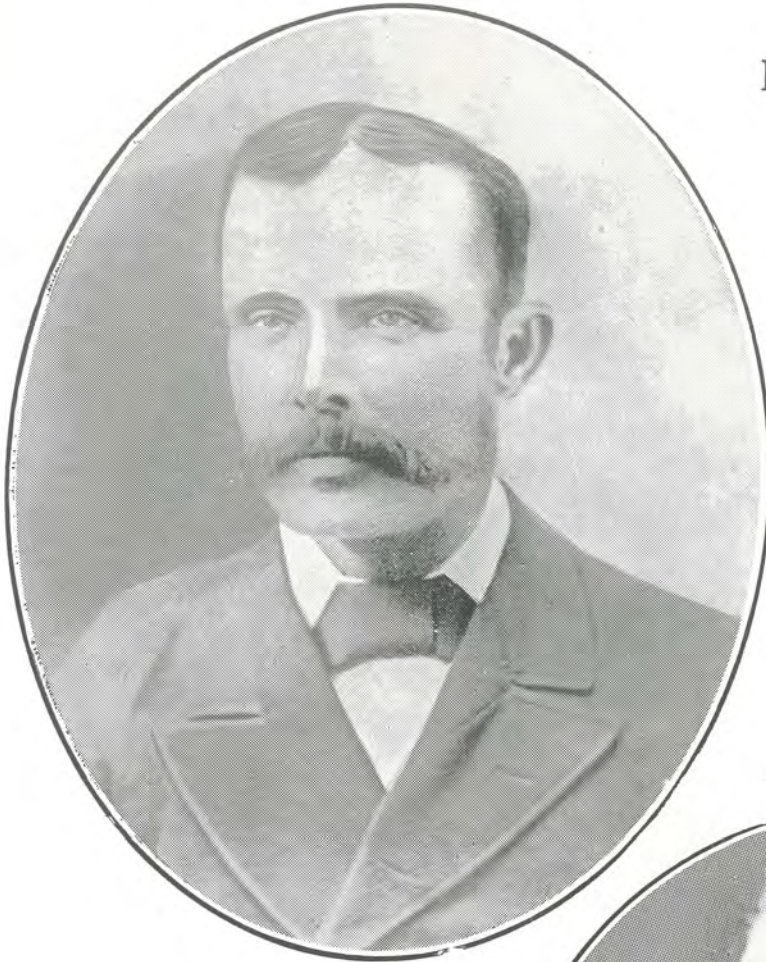

single boys and girls going to and fro without any fellowship among you. Perhaps you will say, ‘Why, what good will it do?’ There are certain miserable persons who indulge in unseemly habits and unseemly language; what is it that enables us to put these wretches down? Public opinion. And, therefore, I say, that in order to keep away all that is unseemly, both in word and in deed, you must band yourselves together to resist it; put all bad exceptions out of countenance by banding yourselves together as the champions of what is honest and decent.

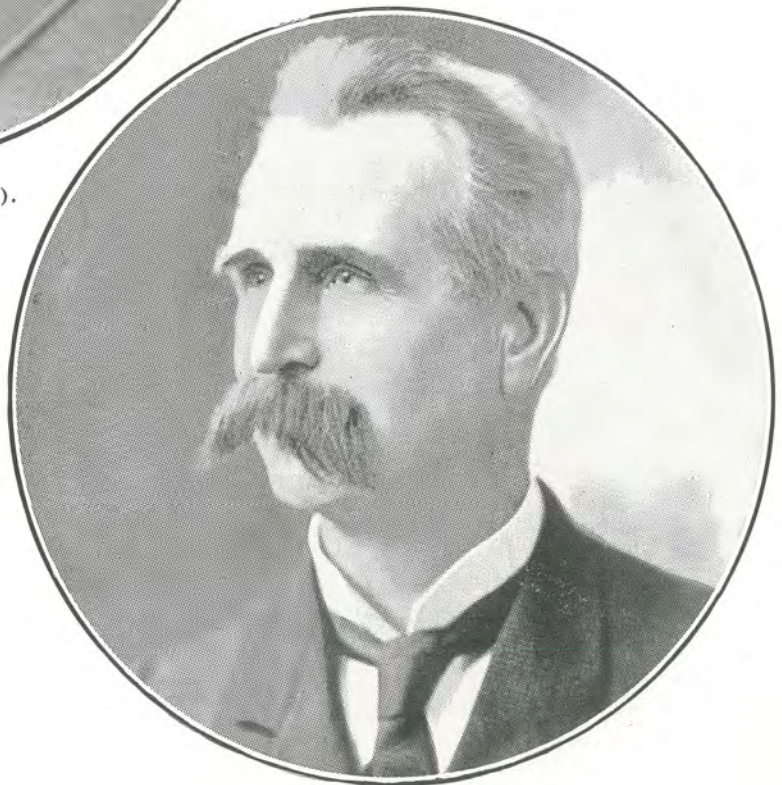
“Now, then, shall I say anything to you about that which is the life of all teaching and learning? I mean industry. I do not think I can say anything that will be at all new to you, or strengthen your good resolutions. Shall I tell you that pleasure is always full of smiles when it tries to attract you, and full of bitter scorn after it has led

and is the very contrary to it. I have known many boys and girls who have seemed to be very teachable, whose eyes are never off their book—except when they are asked to repeat anything, and then they repeat most exactly what they have read or what they have been told; and yet if you look within them there is nothing! It is the garden of a little child—beautiful branches stuck here and there into the dirt, but not a single root to keep any part of this magnificent greenery alive. If they learn a rule, they learn it as so many words, but the words have no meaning for them; for when the occasion arises to make use of the rule, and to show that they understand it, they walk right into the middle of it and trample upon it without remorse. Tell them of a fact and they will repeat it for you word for word as you told it to them; ask them for the same fact in a different set of words, and you will see that it is as perfectly

The scholars who were selected to constitute the highest form, then known as the fifth, were practically all under the age of 14. They were given extra lessons, hurried ahead in those subjects in which they were familiar, and introduced to subjects not previously taught to them in their primary school, in order to establish the gradings referred to above.

**A**T the beginning of 1884, Mr. Joseph Coates, B.A., assumed the headmastership, and the School began to take permanent shape. Mr. Coates was stern and autocratic in aspect, at times very whimsical in manner, intensely keen on cricket and sport in general, and had a wonderful gift of imparting knowledge. Dr. F. W. Doak, one of the original pupils, now an eminent Macquarie Street doctor, says: "Without any exaggeration, I can say that his gift for teaching was never excelled by any teacher that I have ever been under, either in Sydney or in Edinburgh. Without being perhaps a profound scholar, he possessed to a remarkable degree the gift of passing on everything he knew to his pupils. And how he understood boys!"

Mr. Coates set the very high standard which subsequent principals have maintained. He encouraged school sport in all its branches, and his cricketing experience made him a very valuable coach in that game. He was accompanied from Newington College by several senior boys—A. H. MacTaggart, Albert French, S. Fallick, S. Thompson, and George and Tom Boughton. These boys were older and bigger than those who entered the Sydney High School in the previous quarter, and helped considerably in the early efficiency of the School in the sphere of sport.

Mr. Coates taught the top form personally. He was held in awe by the delinquents of the lower forms because of his skill in feinting with his right and boxing their ears with his left hand when they were sent up by their masters for some misdemeanour. Sometimes, it is said, he would follow up the assault with his foot.

Although on exceptional occasions prizes were given, he disdained to hold concerts or such functions to obtain funds for the purpose of procuring

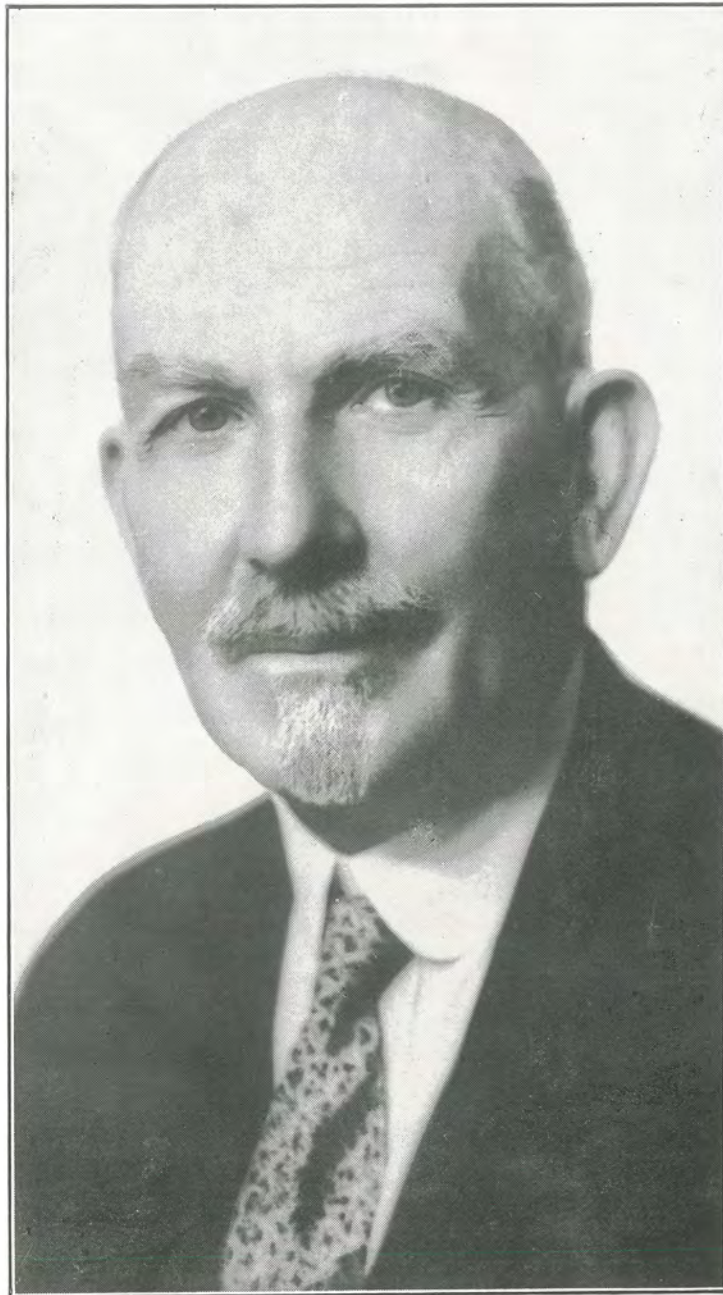
them. At the first breaking-up, when announcing the order of merit in the classes, he stated that "All through life the virtue lies in the struggle, not the prize." This was cold comfort to those who headed the lists. Instead of carrying home a pile of books, as was the case in other schools, they were rewarded with a foolscap sheet stating their position in class and in various subjects.

**T**HE members of the original staff were Messrs. A. B. Piddington, B.A., and J. F. McManamey, B.A., shortly after joined by Messrs T. B. Trebeck, M.A., J. G. Legge, M.A., and W. J. Crompton, M.A.—all remarkably able men, the first two being only twenty-one years of age. No commercial subjects were taught, but drawing was a subject taken by a visiting teacher.

Mr. J. F. McManamey, B.A., was his pupils' ideal as a teacher. His was the second-top form, although he took the highest form for chemistry. In this subject he was much handicapped owing to the lack of a proper science-room, and what little apparatus was available was packed away in a small cupboard as soon as the lesson was over. He was an all-round sport, and was Captain of the 1st XV. of the Sydney University. He was able to get the best out of the scholars and the footballers who came under his control. The boys of his class probably brought the highest early honours to the School in their University careers. He was scrupulously fair, and his pupils had the same confidence in him which players and the sporting public had later, when, having given up active playing, he became the chief and most popular referee in interstate and representative Rugby football. Later he was called to the Bar, but did not practice a great deal. Although no longer young when the Great War began, he was one of the first in Australia to answer the call, and, unfortunately, one of the first of the glorious Anzacs to give his life for the Empire and Country he loved so well.

Mr. A. B. Piddington, B.A., whose intense enthusiasm was an inspiration to his pupils, instilled in them a love of literature, both ancient and modern. There were few pupils who failed to respond to Mr. Piddington's enthusiasm in School,

and his graciousness on special occasions is still remembered by those who were fortunate enough to spend an evening with him in his rooms at St. Paul's College, or to be his guests sailing around the Harbour in the "Old Index," a twenty-two foot open sailing boat well known in those days. Shortly after 1886 Mr. Piddington left the School, was called to the Bar, and later entered Parliament as a supporter of Sir George Reid in the Free Trade interests. He has since filled the positions of University Senator, Chairman of the first Interstate Commission and President of the State Industrial Commission, from which he recently retired.

Mr. J. G. Legge, M.A., came from the Bowenfels Academy to be second Master. He afterwards joined the Army, serving with distinction in both the Boer and the Great Wars, rising to the rank of Lieutenant-General, and being awarded the C.B. and C.M.G.

Mr. Trebeck, M.A., had charge of the class in the "Tin School," as the room taken over from the Castlereagh Street Public School, which adjoined, was called. He had a very long service at the School, and his old pupils have kindly memories of him. He was noted for threatening a great deal, but performed much less than he threatened.

Mr. A. D. Riley was the first Drawing Master, followed later by Mr. F. J. Thomas; whilst Dr. E. Thibault was the first visiting French Master.

Mr. W. J. Crompton, M.A., came from the Old Country in middle life, and was first engaged as a teacher of the girls, but was transferred to the staff of the Boys' School, where he had a long service. Mr. Crompton was noted for having a marvellous store of historical facts and anecdotes.

The whole staff were, in the words of Dr. Doak, "Lovable good fellows." They were all exceptionally keen on firmly establishing the Sydney High School as a first-class scholastic institution, and to this end always impressed on the early pupils the necessity of doing well in the public examinations, thus proving that the Sydney High School—the first School of a new system—was equal to the other secondary schools then in existence.

**T**HE building up of a school spirit is necessarily a slow process, and more easily acquired in a boarding school than in one limited to day pupils. At the first the scholars were mostly unacquainted with one another, and had little over three years in which to lay the foundation of the School's *esprit de corps*. When one considers the dearth of opportunity to know one another owing to the lack of a proper playground and the unsuitableness of the first school premises, one cannot but marvel at the progress made in this direction, as is amply illustrated hereafter.

There were no playing fields attached to the School or in its vicinity, and when school ended, shortly after 3 p.m., the premises were soon deserted. The lack of playing fields delayed the proper establishment of the School in any sport for many years.

**A**T the end of 1883 the pupils began to know one another, and when the School re-assembled in 1884 with Mr. Coates in his post as Headmaster, sport commenced to be organised. The advent of Mr. Coates gave a decided impetus in this direction, not only from his own personal prowess in the inter-colonial cricket field, but also because he was accompanied by a band of senior boys from Newington College. These boys were a decided acquisition, especially in the games of cricket and football.

Rowing, tennis and swimming were then unknown as school sports. There was no sports-master, although once matches were arranged it was usual for a master to accompany the teams. The Sydney High School, being in the heart of the city and having no ground of its own, played on on the opponents' fields. Cricket matches were played against Newington College, St. Joseph's College, Sydney Grammar School, St. Philip's Church of England Grammar School, Royston College, Queen's College, the Electric Telegraph Department and the Staffs of the Mental Hospitals.

A. C. K. Mackenzie was the mainstay of the original cricket eleven, and was later a famous New South Wales interstate batsman. Arthur Ferris

was the School's best trundler, with W. Goodman almost as successful.

The matches against St. Joseph's College were always especially enjoyed, probably because of the fact that the team used to be invited to stay to tea in the College dining hall, which was then portion of a large weatherboard school. The present stone building was then only in the course of construction, but nearing completion. The river trip was something of a novelty to most of the boys at the time.

It was in football, however, that the School was most successful, despite the fact that there was practically no opportunity for practice other than in the actual matches. Mr. W. H. Paradise says: "Our dodging abilities were probably fostered by having such a limited playground space; in this space there were two Moreton Bay fig trees, so that the only game we could play, and that at the peril of our lives, was 'double cross laggings,' in which we used to dodge around the fig trees, over the stone steps which divided the playground in halves, and round along a narrow passage surrounding the School out-buildings."

**THANKS** to some old records kept by Mr. Arthur M. Eedy, the details of the first football games at the Sydney High School have been preserved. In 1884, when the first School team was organised, the members wore a blue jersey with the letters "S.H.S." in red on the chest. The team played matches against junior clubs on Saturdays. The subscription to the club was 1/-, and H. Vallentine was the honorary secretary and A. M. Eedy honorary treasurer.

Thus in the first year of its activity in the football sphere, the Sydney High School won four and lost four matches.

In 1884 the First Honour Caps were awarded to A. H. MacTaggart and A. M. Eedy for prowess in the field of football, and to A. H. Eden and A. H. MacTaggart for cricket. These caps were of blue velvet with silver braid, and a silver tassel at the end of a long cord.

**SOON** after the first year a feeling grew that the School should hold up its head amongst other schools, and to this end the adoption of sports meetings and School colours was debated. **School Colours.** Dr. Doak records: "Well do I remember how, with great gravity, we debated between 'light blue, dark blue, and gold,' and 'chocolate and blue' for the colours of the Sydney High School."

Mr. Coates then lived in a large terrace house in Park Road, near Moore Park, in which he boarded several boys from country districts, and, probably after consultation with them, it was there that Mrs. Coates chose the School colours "chocolate and blue," which persist to the present day.

**I**N the second year of school football, 1885, A. H. MacTaggart was again Captain, H. Vallentine honorary secretary and A. M. Eedy honorary treasurer.

**T**HE Cadet movement in New South Wales originated in 1872, and was under the control of the Volunteer authorities, with Lieutenant H. W. Strong as the Commanding Officer. On the opening of the Sydney High School a request was made to Mr. Waterhouse for permission to form a Cadet Corps in the School. Permission was given, and the Corps was formed within a few weeks.

The first Cadets wore a brilliant uniform. The jackets were scarlet with white braid trimmings; badges of rank were silver stars and chevrons; the long trousers were navy blue with a two-inch red stripe; and the head-gear was a peaked cap with

thusiasm aroused by the departure of the Soudan contingent in 1885, firmly established Cadet Corps in the schools.

The Cadet Corps formed the guard of honour to the Soudan contingent when it sailed from Circular Quay in 1885 for service in Africa, the first Australian participants in the wars of Empire.

The Sydney High School Cadet Corps became most proficient in rifle shooting, at first with the old carbine ("gas pipes," as they were called) and later with the Martini rifle. The "All Schools Match" at the National Rifle Association's meeting of 1883 was won by Colour Sergeant A. C. K. Mackenzie. In this event at subsequent meetings

a silver bugle worked on the front, and with a white pugaree for hot weather.

The sergeant and colour-sergeants were appointed by the Commanding Officer, Captain H. W. Strong, whilst the corporals were more or less elected. A. C. K. Mackenzie was Lieutenant; A. Stewart, Quartermaster; A. Hall, Colour Sergeant; A. H. MacTaggart, Sergeant; and A. M. Eedy, Corporal. George Wynne was also prominent, and later played a leading part in the Australian contingent to China in the Boxer Rebellion and in 1910 commanded the New South Wales contingent to the Coronation of His Majesty King George V.

In 1884 the control of School Cadet Corps was transferred to the Department of Public Instruction. This step, helped by a tremendous popular en-

The N.R.A. programme of 1885 was increased to eleven events, including one carrying the title of "Champion of New South Wales." Five events were open to the School representatives, and they won each of the five, viz.:-

The remaining match for the "Champion of New South Wales" was fired on another day, and was won by Cpl. N. J. Mackenzie.

In the Mayor's Cup in 1887, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th places were filled by Cpl. W. Suttor, Q.M.S. Richardson, Cadet Lilly, Lieut. Poole, Cadet Quodling, Cpl. Cleeve and Cadet Shenstone respectively, of the School team. At this meeting the School Cadets also won the Teams Match, and filled 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th places in the "Champion of New South Wales Cup" with Q.M.S. Richardson, Lieut. Poole, Cpl. Cleeve and Cadet Lilly respectively.

This last meeting may be said to mark the end of the "Golden Age" of the Cadet movement, as from then on the official support to Cadet Corps commenced to slacken, and the lack of rifles handicapped progress.

These successes firmly established the School's fame in the world of riflemen, and a great number of matches between the School team and country corps were arranged. The details of the School's tours to many places in New South Wales, and the remarkably fine performances and achievements registered, have been preserved.

In 1886 the Inter-Colonial Match with the Victorian Cadets was fired, and in the New South Wales team of fifteen, no less than eight were from the School Cadet Corps. In 1888 a return match was fired, this time in Victoria, and New South Wales was represented by a complete Sydney High School team. At the conclusion of this match a trip was made to Ballarat, where the School team defeated a team drawn from all the local schools' rifle clubs.

However, the Sydney High School Cadet Corps carried on till 1913, when compulsory training was introduced, and from then all eligible members were a part of the Citizens' Forces until 1929, when compulsory military training was abolished.

**DURING** the first years of the School prefects were unknown, and such a position as "Captain of the School" did not exist as distinct from the senior scholar, to whom the title of "Dux" or "Captain" was applied. This honour was won by A. M. Eedy at the end of June, 1884, by F. W. Doak at the end of the year, and by G. C. Saxby at the end of 1885 and 1886. A complete list is published on page 19.

**T**HE first knowledge of athletes at the School was gained at a memorable picnic at Athol Gardens in 1885. This picnic was given by Mr. Coates to celebrate the success of the first candidates sent up by the School for the Junior University Examinations the previous year. As the Headmaster did not know the performances of the runners he divided them into three groups, tall, medium and midgets. With these divisions he then had three scratch races, and S. Thompson won the tall boys' race, A. M. Eedy the mediums' race and T. Wicks the midgets' race.

**A**T the end of 1885 an important announcement was made by Mr. Coates that he was quite opposed to the principle of prize giving, and that

he was sure all would appreciate it just as much if the prize-winners were awarded printed certificates instead of the usual ornate prize-books. He took it for granted that the boys' minds were as one with his on this matter, and never gave them the choice of expressing an opinion. This was typical of Mr. Coates' regime, although it may have been a piece of gentle satire on his part, and a roundabout whimsical way of letting the boys know that there were no funds wherewith to purchase books. Anyway, only a few prizes were given for special subjects, and medals to the most successful candidates at the University Examinations.

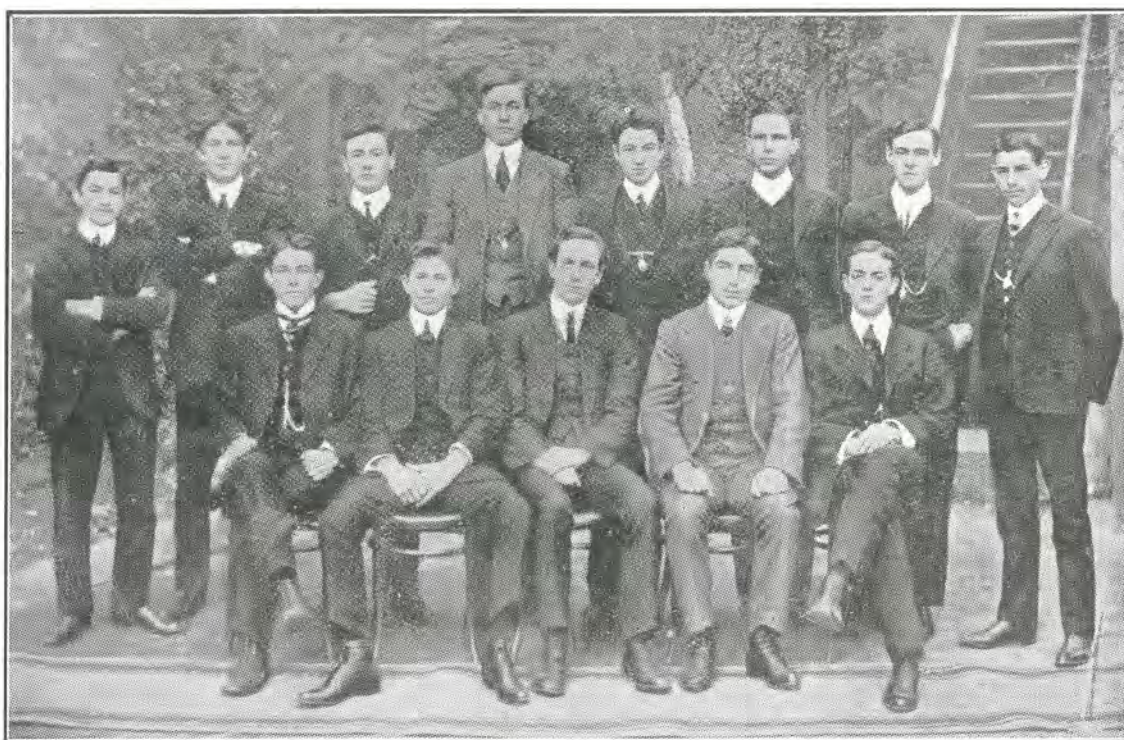

**The First Athletic Meeting.** In September, 1885, and January, 1886, and attending the School at the time, discussed with a few other boys the idea of having a proper sports meeting. The outcome was a notice placed on the screen panel in the main doorway calling a meeting after school with that object in view. This was the first definite move to inaugurate the School sports-meeting, although, as recorded previously, Mr. Coates had held informal picnic sports after the first Junior Examination results. As soon as Mr. Coates saw the notice on the screen panel, he addressed the School and said that if at the

Athletic Meeting held on Wednesday, 25th August, 1886, at the Sydney Cricket (Association) Ground, Moore Park.

The meeting was eminently successful, although no boy on the committee was more than sixteen years of age. Three prizes were given for practically every event, and not one had to be bought. The programme of events was drawn up and printed in practically the same form as the one printed to-day. The secretary of this first Athletic Meeting was A. M. Eedy, and it is a tribute to him and the first committee that the hardly credible number of 7000 persons was present.

meeting called it was decided to go on with the sports-meeting, it should be understood that the responsibility would be entirely on the shoulders of the boys, although he and the staff would assist if they could.

The meeting was held, and it was decided to arrange the first sports-gathering. Every jeweller and firm in Sydney was interviewed by the boys on the committee, with the object of getting them to give prizes. The result was so successful that it was not long before the Headmaster once again addressed the entire School, stating that the masters and himself would undertake the management in conjunction with those appointed from the students. This then was the origin of the First Annual

Each competitor had his own colours for the events, and the 220 yards All-Schools' Championship had sixty-three (63) entrants from various schools. Some of the schools which participated in this event have ceased to exist, whilst others are famous schools to-day. The schools represented in this event were St. Philip's Church of England Grammar School, St. Aloysius' College, Sydney Grammar School, New College, Randwick College, Royston College, Queen's School, Windsor Grammar School, Darlinghurst Grammar School, Briot School and the Sydney High School. Some of the Sydney High boys who ran in this event were G. C. Saxby, the present Headmaster; Sir Henry Barraclough, now Dean of the Faculty of Engineering at the

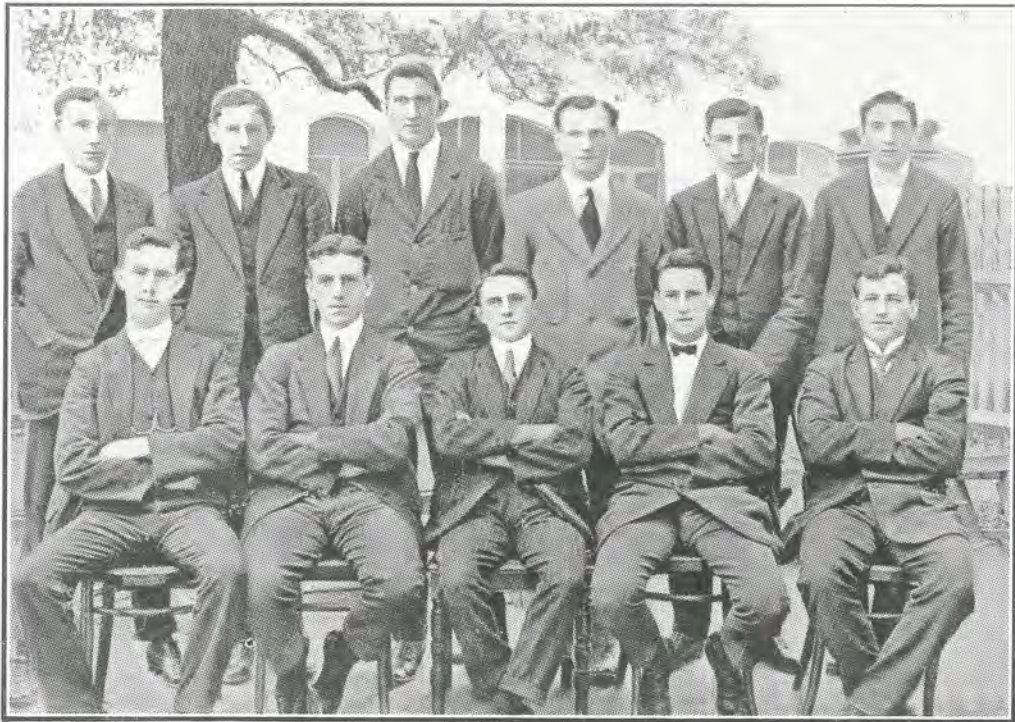

authority on Egyptology. He is probably the most widely known and most distinguished Old Boy, and has brought the greatest honour to our School, which he did not forget on his last visit to Australia, as he arranged a visit to it and gave an address."

Attention should be drawn to the fact that the School was in the heart of the city, and the boys were exceptionally well known personally by sight to the smaller population of Sydney at the time. To quote Dr. Doak, with regard to this first batch of boys: "We were a spritely life-enjoying lot of boys. Many of them are still vivid in my mind—the merry laughing Arthur Eedy, the witty, satirical Clarence Cooke, the handsome Alfred Zlotkowski,

There was, however, a dancing school at which several of the scholars from each School attended, although it was not officially connected with either. Mr. Coates used occasionally to address the whole School on the necessity for, and the wisdom of, totally ignoring the proximity of the girls on the upper floor, and solemnly advise the boys to give them a wide berth.

Occasionally the girls gave a dance, to which they were permitted to invite any relatives they had amongst the boys. The word "relative" must have been very widely construed, as a large proportion of the boys were present on these occasions.

the 'sleepy' Grafton Elliott Smith, the earnest, serious-minded Toms, Saxby, Paradise and Elliott, the deep-voiced Aspinall and Ray, and the cricketing Mackenzie."

The foundations laid in scholarship and sport by the masters and the boys of those early years cannot be over-valued. These pages record in innumerable places acts and achievements by these pupils of the Sydney High School, which have reflected glory and fame on the School, and the help rendered and the interest maintained in the School by these gentlemen throughout its half-century of existence have materially advanced its welfare.

**T**HE boys and girls, although in the one building, did not have much to do with one another.

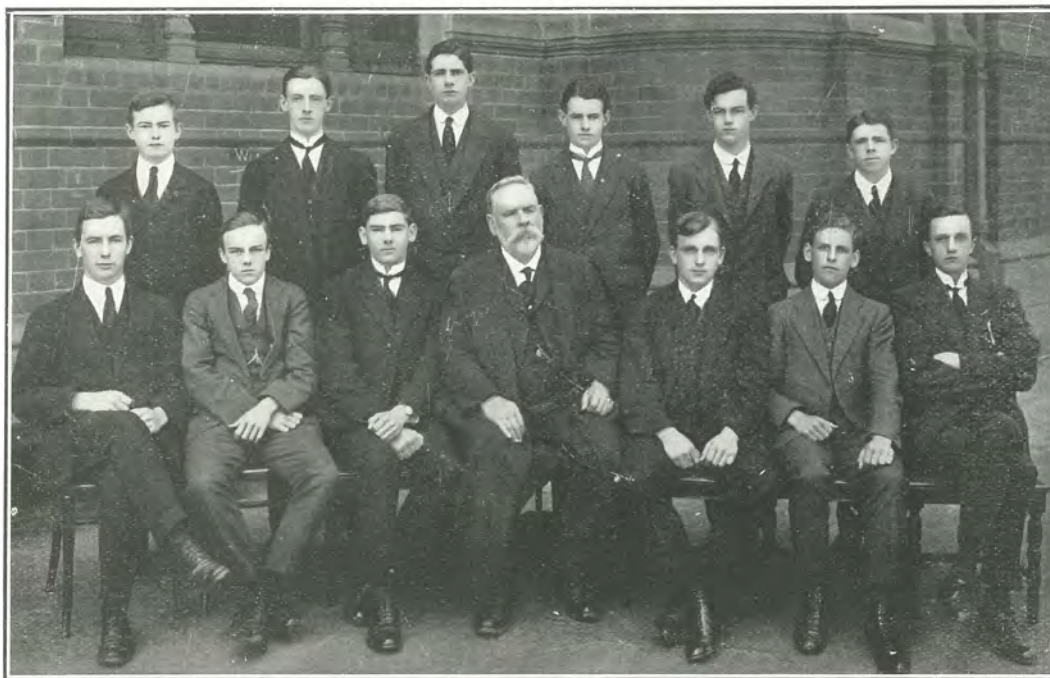
These dances, it should be remembered, were conducted under the supervision of many formidable chaperones.

**A**T the "breaking-up" in 1886, Mr. Piddington conceived the idea of an address in the form of a Latin oration to be read to the then Minister for Education, the Honourable Arthur Renwick, M.B., M.L.A., who was to be present on that occasion. This was a tribute to his University degree, as very few politicians at the time were similarly distinguished. Accordingly the three senior classical students, W. H. Paradise, F. W. Doak and A. M. Eedy, were deputed to collaborate and compose the oration, which W. H. Paradise duly delivered. The

effort ended with the quotation from Horace, "*Longas O, utinam bone dux, Praestes Hisperias,*" which was duly interpreted to Dr. Renwick as a request for some extra holidays, which he graciously granted. The editor of one of the papers, reporting the proceedings, "wondered, and still the wonder grew, that those small heads could carry all they knew"—or were reputed to know, thanks to Mr. Piddington's aid in the matter.

ONE morning Mr. Coates, talking to his Senior Class, remarked that the idea was that the

floors of the building, and the girls "The Chronicle." had issued the first number of their magazine, the boys wished to follow suit. Mr. G. P. Barbour, who had recently joined the staff as *locum tenens* for Mr. A. B. Piddington, and who with another undergraduate a year or two previously had launched "Hermes," the true original of the now important University magazine, was asked by C. M. Drew, F. W. Doak and other boys to help them establish a magazine for the boys' School. He consented, and "The Chronicle" was first issued in December, 1887. It

School should act as a stepping-stone to the University, but he realised that it was hardly possible that all the High boys would go on to the University. He then went on to say that there were other careers open to people than those requiring a University education, and his friend, Mr. R. Teece, had told him of excellent openings for Sydney High School boys in the Australian Mutual Provident Society. Many acted on this advice, and thus the fact that so many A.M.P. Society's senior officers are Old Boys is explained.

IN 1887 the first School magazine was published, under the title of "The Chronicle." As there was always much healthy rivalry between the two

was published for two years, at first quarterly and later monthly.

THE Hon. J. Inglis, Minister for Education, visited the School in 1887, and whilst addressing the boys offered to present a book, on the vote of the entire School then assembled before him, to "the boy who was not necessarily first in sport, nor necessarily first in scholarship, but certainly first in the heart of his fellows." Later, in 1902, when the Old Boys' Union wished to found a prize, the conditions of its award were made similar to those required by the Minister on the abovementioned occasion, and has been awarded annually since 1902. The prize offered by the Minister for

Education was awarded, on the vote taken from the assembled School, to Percy J. Pratt.

ON 7th June, 1888, a meeting was called for the purpose of forming a Literary and Debating Society. Mr. T. B. Trebeck was in the chair at

this meeting, at which it was decided to launch this new society. Mr. J. Coates and Mr. T. B. Trebeck were elected as joint Presidents, H. N. Slee as Treasurer, P.

J. Pratt as Secretary, and W. Andrews, S. Corbett and W. J. E. Davies as the Committee. The subscription was 1/- upon joining, and 1/- per quarter. This Society has continued its activities until the present day. In its first year efforts were made to establish a reference library, and from the small beginning made then the present School Library has evolved. On 13th September, 1888, the Literary and Debating Society organised the first School Concert. At this performance it is interesting to recall that between 500 and 600 attended, a number which compares more than favourably with the attendances at similar functions held nearly fifty years later.

THE results of football matches played in 1888 are preserved in the files of "The Chronicle" for that year. Six matches were played, of which the School won three and lost three.

Those who played with the 1st XV. that year were:—Commins, Hopkinson, Suttor, Jenkins, Zeitler, Cleeve, Watt, Tunks, Cullen, Slee, Stephenson, Lilly, Moberley, Diamond, Nelson and H. Quodling. A special match between High School Past and Present and St. Philip's Grammar School Past and Present was played on 5th September, 1888. This match was won by St. Philip's by 7-4, but it seems that the umpiring of the game by a St. Philip's

Old Boy left much to be desired from the point of view of the High School supporters. The sentiments of "The Chronicle's" reporter on the partiality of the umpire are vividly expressed in the September issue of the paper, with references to his "always having something in his eye" or "always looking another way" when it was advantageous to St. Philip's.

There is no record of the cricket results in 1888. In that year S. Hopkinson was secretary of the Club, and E. H. Quodling was treasurer.

IN 1889 the Literary and Debating Society took over the publication of "The Chronicle," and endeavoured to bring it out monthly. To quote

the Editor of "The Record" in 1909 (C. G. McDonald): "The youthful zeal and enthusiasm of the officials of the Literary and Debating Society was too sanguinary for the success of such an ambitious undertaking. The strain on the editorial imagination and on the pockets of the subscribers proved too exhausting when monthly publications were instituted, and 'The Chronicle' breathed its last in 1890." The Debating Society staff of "The Chronicle" was composed of C. N. Mell (Editor), S. L. Drummond, A. James, A. B. Davies and J. H. D. Brierley. According to the issues of the paper which appeared in 1889, activities at the School were many and varied. They record the activities of a Harriers' Club, which organised many cross-country runs, including one of eight miles.

In 1889, the fourth Athletic Meeting was held. The secretary was C. P. Watt, and the treasurer was W. Suttor. The 100 yards was won by C. P. Watt in 11 seconds, and the 220 yards championship by F. Tidswell. This race carried with it the cup presented by the Girls' High School. At this meeting, place kicking at a goal was first included in the programme.

The 1889 football team comprised:—Tunks, Suttor, Lilly, Watt, Stephenson, Thompson, Walford, Fisher, Todhunter, Fyfe, Tidswell, Wickham and Mitchell. Four matches are recorded, only one of which was won by the School. The results of the four matches played were:—

**T**HE cricket secretary of 1889 was J. O. Lilly, and the treasurer S. L. Drummond. Matches were played against St. Joseph's College, Sydney Grammar School, The King's School and the **Cricket.** Royal Garrison. Mr. G. P. Barbour records of this game against the Garrison that "it lives clearly in my recollection as one of the most

remarkable games in my fifty years of cricket. The Barracks had a team distinguished rather for brawn than skill. In this match they swiped around for 80 runs, but Sydney High School were all out by 5.15 for 67. As most of our side had far to travel, I suggested that we draw stumps, but the suggestion was received coldly. So out in the field we went again at 5.20. We had a very good bowler in Traill, and I myself, though harmless against anything good, was always able to account for the

rabbits. In half an hour they were all out for 15, and it was then their turn to suggest drawing stumps, but the suggestion met with a frigid reception from us. We had eight minutes to bat and 29 runs to get in perhaps two or three overs, but the latter was extremely unlikely, as the umpires (Sergeants Mulvaney and Orthis) were not likely to play into our hands. I kept the strike for five balls, and ran a boy out on the last ball, but still had the strike. We had one ball to spare and about two minutes to go, when 31 went up on the score board. Thus a game lost by 13 runs at 5.15 was won by the Sydney High School by 9 wickets at 6 o'clock."

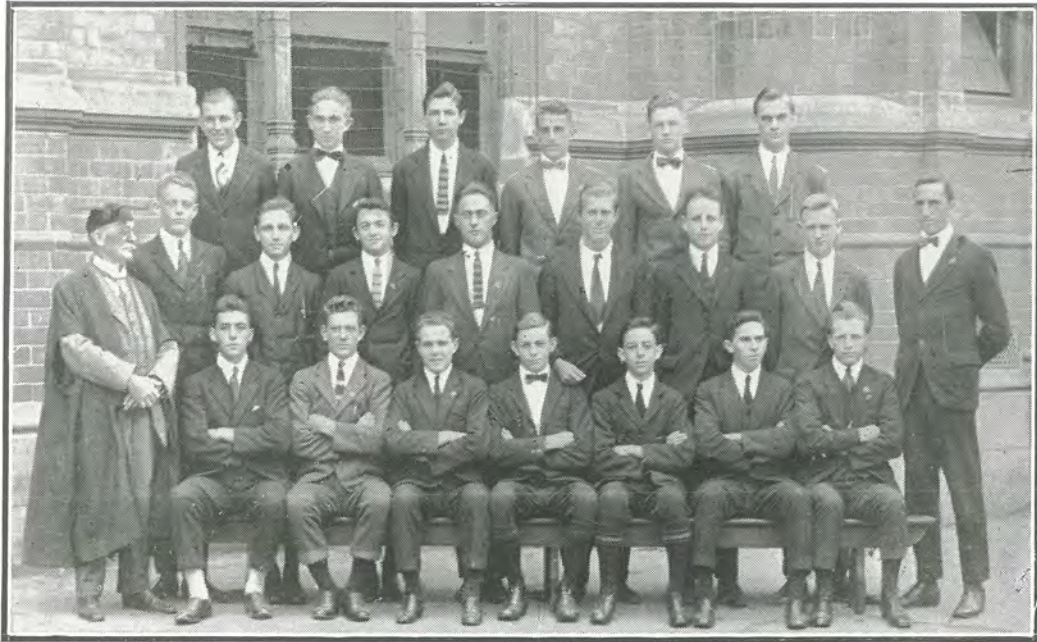
**I**T was during this year that Mr. A. B. Piddington, who had resigned from the teaching staff, presented the School with a framed copy of Dr. Badham's Inaugural Address. Badham's inaugural address, entitled "Golden Words to Young Australians."

In general equipment, conditions at the School were lamentable. The two highest forms had separate rooms. Three others were in corners of the main room, but surely no forms were ever worse housed than the lowest three, which were huddled together in a narrow iron shed flanking Castlebreagh Street. The shed was stifflingly hot in summer and bitterly cold in winter. The rumble of horse lorries and a medley of street noises incessantly contended with the human voice.

In the early days there was little provision for the masters' convenience; they threw their hats and bags on any old window sill, and for lunch turned the boys out of a school-room and bestrode the forms.

The tuckshop of those days belonged to Holmes, a baker in King Street, who used to make special lines for sale at low prices to the High School boys, and a rushing procession to and from King Street about 12.20 p.m. was for long a common sight in the centre of the metropolis.

According to Mr. W. H. Paradise, "the punishment meted out by Mr. Coates was severe. He had a habit of meandering around the various classrooms, which were separated by green baize blinds,

rounding up boys who were doing anything of a forbidden nature, and driving them into his room for a severe caning. The worst punishment of all was to be made to return to the School on Saturday morning at 9.15 o'clock, and be detained until 11 o'clock."

**T**HE Cadet Corps, as recorded previously, had begun to dwindle in numbers and efficiency towards the end of the 'eighties, but was to receive new force when the Department of Cadet Corps. Public Instruction decided to form a battalion of its own from the leading public schools, and to officer it with members of the teaching staff.

Two companies were formed at the Sydney High School. "A" Company was commanded by Captain T. B. Trebeck, with Arthur Fitzhardinge and Stanley Spain as lieutenants. "B" Company was under the command of Captain R. C. McCoy. Because of the splendid reputation which the Sydney High School Cadet Corps had built up since 1883, certain privileges were granted to the re-formed Corps. It was the only unit granted the privilege of having officers appointed from the scholars, was permitted to attend the Easter Training Camp with the Permanent Land Volunteer Forces, and its members were armed with a Schneider Carbine, which would fire a bullet, whereas the other units merely carried wooden dummies, except when actually on the rifle range.

The Sydney High School Corps was further privileged by being entrusted with the care of the Queen's Colour and the Battalion Colour, which had been presented by Lady Carrington on behalf of the ladies of Sydney at a huge parade of all Public School Cadets at Moore Park.

**T**HE absence of a School magazine from 1890 to 1910 has materially retarded the compilation of this history. The particulars of the activities of this period have had to be gathered mainly from articles written by Old Boys who attended the School over these years, and the facts we are able to set down are largely attributable to their memories and personal memoranda. The exception is that the

minutes of the Old Boys' Union since its formation in 1892 are intact, and many facts have been culled from this source.

**T**HE old School building was very inconvenient and noisy. Eventually, in 1891, the Department of Education decided to move the School to Ultimo. The Technical College was being built at the time, and a new building was built alongside. It was intended that both the Girls' and the Boys' High Schools should occupy this building. However, protests from the then Headmistress regarding the locality led to a change of plans, as far as the girls were concerned. The boys moved to the new building, and the girls occupied the whole of the original old building at the commencement of 1892.

**I**N 1892 an event of great importance took place, for in that year the Sydney High School Old Boys' Union was founded. The original name of this body was "The Ex-Students' Union." Since its foundation it has proved a benefit to the School on many occasions and in various matters, as may be amply proved by a perusal of this volume. Later in this book, the names of the office-bearers throughout the years are recorded.

**M**R. H. S. DETTMANN recalls that in the early 'nineties the original sporting activities had fallen away, and there was no organised sport, except the Annual Athletic Meeting, which has survived since its inauguration in 1886. In 1890, H. S. Dettmann was instrumental in resurrecting a Cricket XI. Mr. Coates gave £5 for the purchase of cricket material, and offered bats, once used by P. S. McDonnell of an Australian XI, for any School-boy who scored over 50 runs in an innings. H. B. Lusk won the first of these bats in a match against Sydney Church of England Grammar School, and H. S. Dettmann won one against Sydney Grammar School in 1894. The latter, now Headmaster of "Grammar," was the Captain of the Sydney High team in this match.

The School lost the match, the Grammar School scoring 87 and 82, whilst High scored 78 and three for 44. H. S. Dettmann scored 50 of the 78, this being his best School performance.

In the field of athletics, all we can record is a hat-trick of victories by R. C. Forsyth, who won the Championship Cup awarded for the 100 yards race in 1890, 1891, and 1892.

**I**N 1896 Mr. Coates retired, and was presented with an illuminated address, which read as follows:—

June, 1896.

Dear Sir,

On the eve of your retirement from the position which you have held for nearly thirteen years, we, your past and present pupils, desire to recognise in some slight form the valuable service which you have rendered to us and to the institution with which you have been connected.

Associated as you were with its first beginnings, you soon, by your able guidance, just discipline, and powers of organisation, raised it to a position never before attained by a State School, and the value of your work is manifested by the success achieved by its pupils.

Those of us who still remain at the School will feel for many days the influence of your kindly spirit and able instruction, and those of us who have gone forth into the world, and entered upon the more serious duties of life, will ever feel the debt of gratitude due to one who has been both teacher and friend.

Believing as you do in the precept, "A sound mind in a sound body," you have always encouraged proper indulgence in athletic exercises, in which you yourself were so proficient.

To your colleagues you have ever been a wise and generous leader, and have always commanded their allegiance and respect by those qualities of mind and heart so necessary to one occupying your position.

You are now retiring full of honour from your high and important post where you have for so many years skilfully guided the destinies of the premier State School of the Colony, and endeavoured to sow in the minds and hearts of your pupils those good seeds of manliness and uprightness which, we trust, may one day bring forth good fruit to the lasting benefit of the land in which we live.

In parting from you, we trust that the remaining years of your life may be passed in a peace and comfort freed

from the cares of office, and heightened by the consciousness of good deeds done.

**A**T the time of Mr. Coates's retirement the School was passing through a period of decline, and apparently had reached the lowest point consistent with usefulness. The enrolment **Mr. J. Waterhouse,** had fallen to a few over one **Headmaster.** hundred, while the attendance at times fell below the century.

This was due to the prevailing economic conditions and the transfer of the School to Ultimo. Mr. J. Waterhouse, M.A., who had been Acting-Headmaster for the first three months of the School's existence in 1883, was the man chosen to restore the School's prestige and fulfil its early promises of greatness. "His great organising ability, his untiring energy, his stimulating example, his high academic qualifications, and his lofty ideals of service immediately initiated an upward movement in every department of the School's activities."

Of the period following his assumption of office there are few records, apart from those concerning the Old Boys' Union and the fact that the School Cup for the 220 Yards Championship was won in 1897 by S. A. Smith, the present President of the Old Boys' Union.

By 1900 all sport organization had fallen away, and with the exception of the Annual Athletic Carnival no sports at all were participated in. Mr. A. G. Henderson recalls a challenge from the Scots College for a football match, which had to be refused, as there was no possibility of raising a team.

The scholastic results obtained by the School towards the close of the century are remarkably good. The Dux of the School, 1896-1900, were:—1896, F. A. Todd and J. P. V. Madsen; 1897, F. A. Engineering, and O. U. Vonwiller is Professor of Physics, at the University of Sydney; C. E. Weatherburn is Professor of Mathematics at the University of Western Australia; and O. A. Diethelm is an eminent Macquarie Street doctor.

**WHEN** arrangements were being made for the 15th Annual Athletic Meeting, which was held on 24th August, 1900, Mr. W. J. Crompton, M.A., was asked to suggest a motto for the meeting. He proposed *Extremos Pudeat Rediisse*. "Extremos Pudeat Rediisse" and the Honorary Secretary of the Athletic Club, O. A. Diethelm, had it printed across the invitation card. This motto was suggested as being appropriate to the School's athletic meeting, but it gradually slipped into general use as the School's motto until 1928.

**WHEN** the clarion of Empire was sounded during the Boer War, 1899-1902, many Old Boys answered the call, and, to the everlasting glory of the School, many of them earned great and glorious personal honours for their conduct and achievements during this struggle. These gentlemen include Colonel W. Watson, Major G. W. Wynne, Sergeant S. C. Barnes, Captain J. O. Lilly, L. J. Richardson, G. F. Mortimer, H. H. Blunden, H. W. Cortis, and J. S. Allen.

It was Colonel Watson who demanded the surrender of Pretoria, and carried the Union Jack when the British Forces marched triumphantly into that city.

Another of the Old Boy participants of whom the School is proud is S. C. Barnes, who was one of the first to enlist for active service. He served with the 1st Australian Horse, and took part in the activities in Cape Colony, Orange Free State, through the Transvaal and on to the Portuguese border, South-West Africa. He holds the Queen's Medal with six clasps :

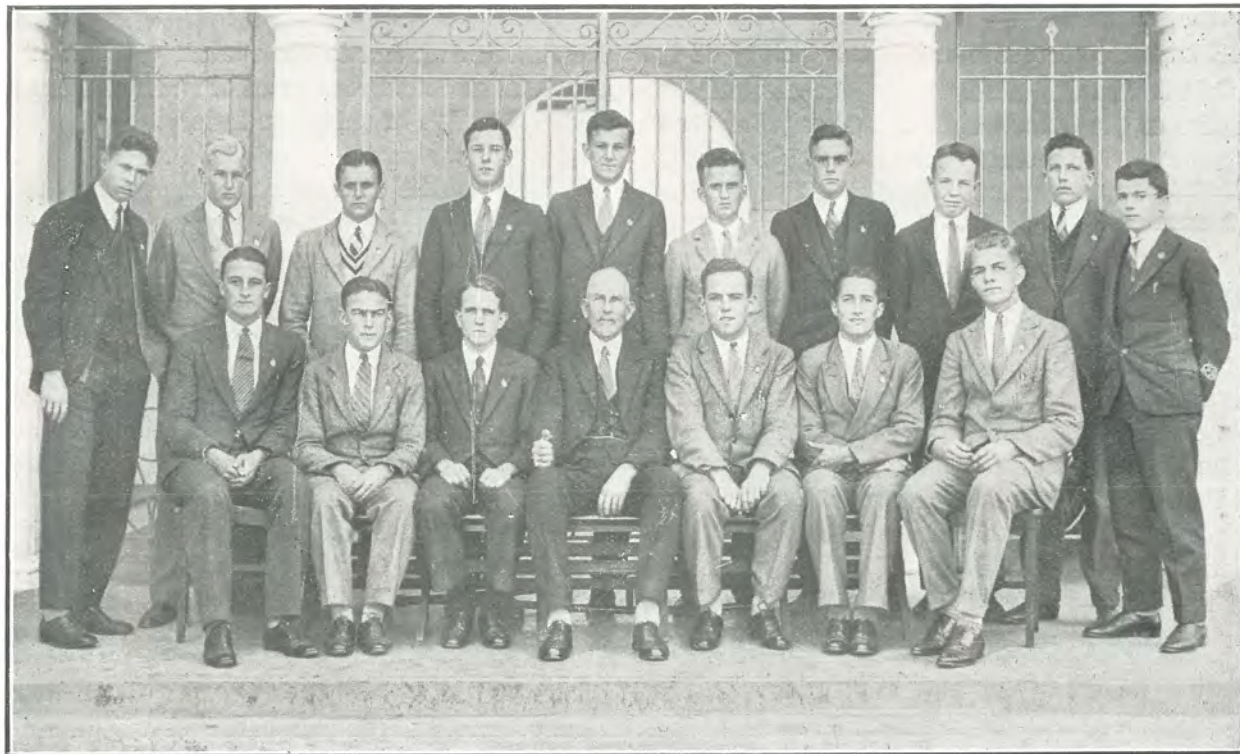

which indicates having been present at all those engagements, and many others leading up to them. It was not possible to obtain more bars to this decoration in this Brigade.

**THE** Old Boys' Union ceased to function in 1896, but in 1902 was re-formed under a new Constitution. A. G. Henderson was the prime mover of this re-birth of the O.B.U. He, in consultation with O. A. A. Diethelm, brought about a meeting of the Old Boys. The meeting was held on the 11th August, 1902, at the Girls' High School. Mr. Arthur M. Eedy was in the chair, and it was decided to reconstitute the Old Boys' Union. A provisional committee consisting of Messrs. A. M. Eedy, R. C. Forsyth, O. A. Diethelm, A. J. Palmer, R. H. Shorter and O. U. Vonwiller was appointed. This committee drew up a draft Constitution, which was submitted to a further meeting on the 25th August, 1902. The Constitution was adopted, and the office-bearers for the year 1902-1903 were elected. The first President was Mr. A. M. Eedy; the first Secretary, Mr. A. G. Henderson; and the first Treasurer, Mr. P. J. Pratt.

**ONE** of the first acts of the Old Boys' Union was to found the Old Boys' Prize which, as mentioned previously, was inspired by the words of the Minister for Education in 1887, when he presented a book. This prize has been awarded continuously since 1902 to the scholar who, on the vote of the entire School, is "not necessarily first in scholarship, nor necessarily first in sport, but certainly first in the hearts of his fellows."

**IN** 1905 the first recorded S.H.S. v. O.B.U. cricket match was played, and resulted in a draw. In 1906 the first football matches between the S.H.S. and O.B.U. took place, the first match resulting in a draw and a subsequent match resulting in a win for the Old Boys. These annual matches have been a feature of the School's sporting programme since, and complete lists of the results are published elsewhere in this volume.

THE next momentous event in the history of the School was its admission to the Athletic Association of the Great Public Schools of New South Wales. As has been shown in the

previous pages, the Sydney High School had been connected for many years with the schools of that period which had formed the Great Public Schools' Association. On the 14th February, 1906, Mr. D. J. Sullivan, a master of the Sydney High School, appeared before the Committee asking for admission to the Association. On the motion of Mr. McBride, the admission was granted, and thus from the 14th February, 1906, the Sydney High School has been a formal member of the Association of the Great Public Schools. From that date the School has participated in the activities of

the Association, and in the sporting section of this book will be found records of the competitions held under the aegis of this Association.

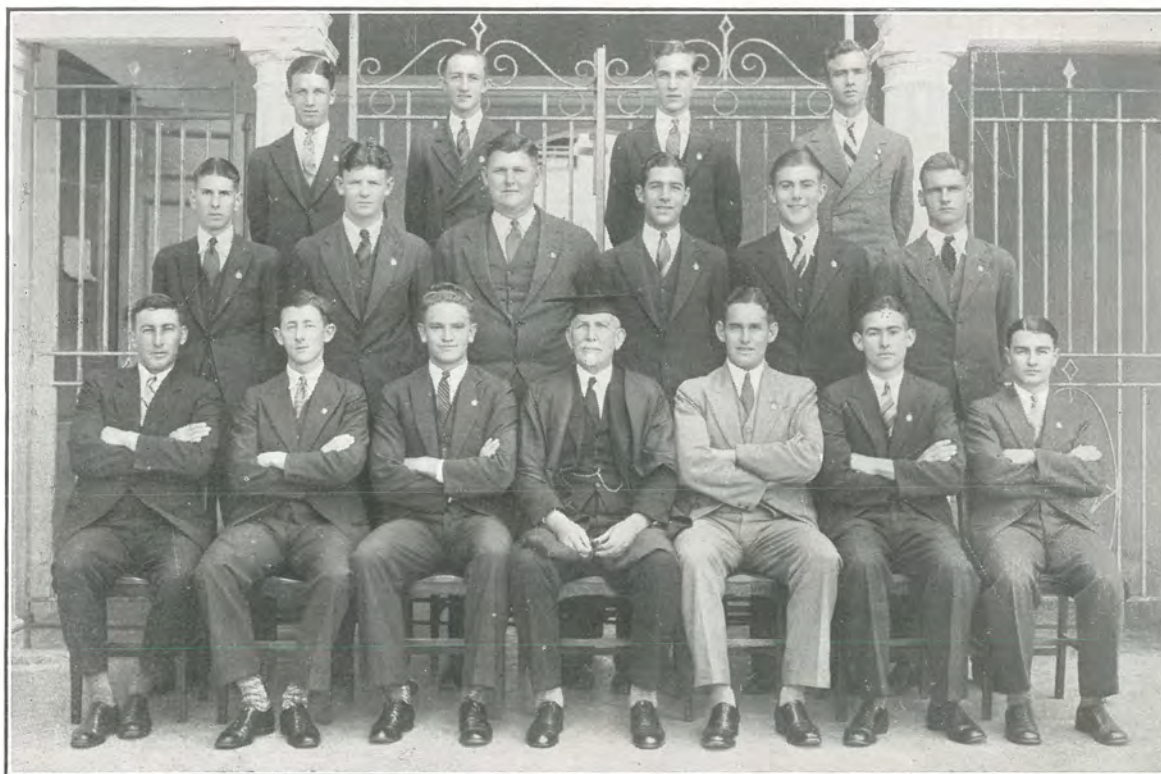
THE attendance at the School about this time was approximately 350, but the average age of the boys was decidedly lower than that of the average age of boys of the other member schools. Thus in the competitions, the Sydney High School was undoubtedly handicapped by the lack of that couple of extra years which means so much in sport.

The teaching staff comprised:—The Headmaster (Mr. Waterhouse), Messrs. Crompton, Stephenson, Studdy, Saxby, Smith, Atkins, Williams, Moore and Redshaw. Of these, Mr. G. C. Saxby was the only Old Boy. He had been appointed as

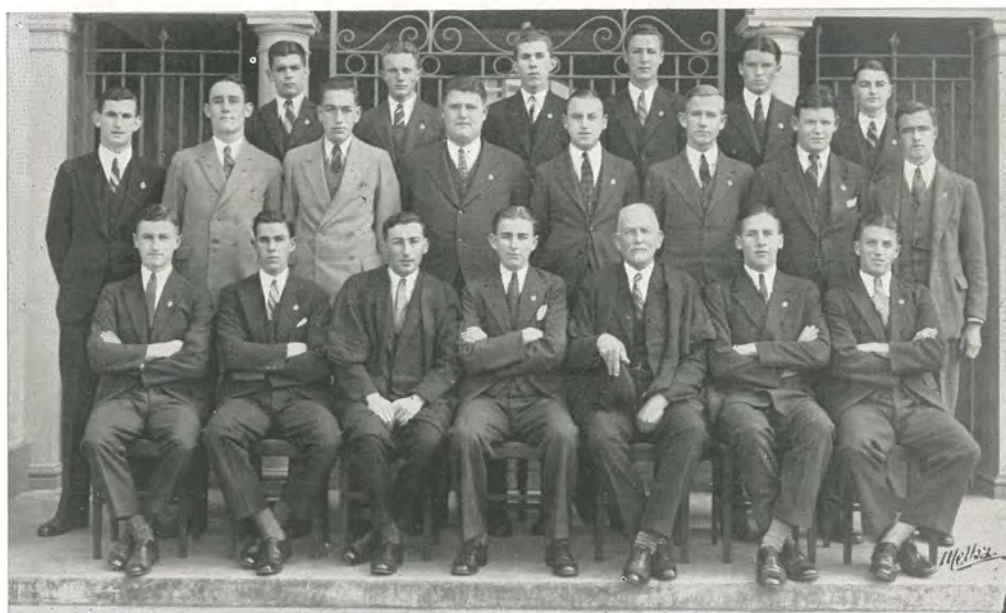

Junior Mathematics Master to the School in 1892, and was a member of the staff continuously until 1914, when he was transferred to Orange High School as its Headmaster. About 1905 Mr. C. E. Weatherburn, an Old Boy with a brilliant scholastic record at the School and at the University, was appointed Master in Physics.

After an entire absence for some years, sport at the School revived early this century, greatly due to the recovery in the attendance figures, but the activities in cricket, football, and athletics were rather badly managed. The facilities as regard playing and practicing grounds were lamentable. A small asphalted area, attached to the School, was used as much as possible, but the environment of the Ultimo locality was not conducive to the best interests of the School.

For a few years prior to the admission of the Sydney High School to the Great Public Schools' Association, it was customary to play the G.P.S. team which had a bye on a Wednesday, and the home ground of the School was the Petersham Oval. R. B. Bush recalls of the cricket of this time, that "L. W. and H. Hudson, H. S. and S. Wenzholz, M. Moore, and C. Baum were outstanding; whilst in football, J. Hynes and Norman Royle, now an eminent Macquarie Street doctor, were most prominent. Norman Royle was probably the strongest school-boy of his time and the hardest man to bring down at football that I can remember.

"The annual athletic sports were always well conducted, and I well remember the considerable

amount of preparatory work required for those functions by the secretary and committees. Assistance was always sought from various city firms and Old Boys in the way of making the trophy list worthy of the occasion. One incident that may be of more than passing interest occurred during my last year, 1906, at the School. As Secretary of the Annual Sports, I was approached by a very slim but earnest youth who, obviously too young to have any chance of success in open events, nevertheless tendered the full entrance fee for all events. Fully realising from my own experience the value of money to schoolboys, I explained this aspect of the question to the budding athlete. However, he did not waver, so I accepted the nomination and congratulated him upon his generous spirit. He won his junior events, and I watched with interest his future career. It was not long before this youth won most of the School championships, and his subsequent athletic and sporting career, not to mention his scholastic and personal attainments, have reflected great credit upon his old School. This youth was E. A. Southee, who later won the New South Wales Rhodes Scholarship, won football and athletic 'blues' at Sydney and Oxford Universities, represented New South Wales and won Australasian championships, had a brilliant military career during the War, being awarded the M.C. and O.B.E., and is now Principal of the Hawkesbury Agricultural College."

At this period of the School's history each particular sport was conducted separately, and there was no obligation on the part of the pupils to

support all or any branch of sport unless they so desired. In a letter, Mr. R. B. of a Sports Master. The Headmaster offered every assistance in these two objects, and through his representations Mr. D. J. Sullivan, B.A., was officially appointed the first Sports Master at the Sydney High School. The Sports Union was also duly formed, and I was appointed the first Secretary." The innovations of this period recalled by Mr. Bush were the foundations of the present organisation of sport at the Sydney High School.

**I**N 1906 action was taken by the Old Boys' Union towards establishing a Memorial to the late Joseph Coates, the first Headmaster. In 1909 the sub-

the Governor of New South Wales, Vice-Admiral Sir Harry Rawson, G.C.B., accompanied by his daughter, honoured the gathering with his presence; whilst Sir George Reid, the School's founder, and Mr. A. B. Piddington were the chief speakers.

**I**T must be mentioned that from an early date, certainly back to the beginning of this century, the front verandah just outside the Headmaster's room was sacrosanct to the boys of the Sixth Form Privileges. Sixth Form, as was a small room under the stairway. Up to the date of the

School's transfer to the Moore Park building this tradition was maintained. Furthermore, only the boys of the privileged Sixth Form were permitted to use the front entrance to the building.

The year 1909 saw the disappearance of the last advantage which the transfer from Castlereagh Street had brought. In the corner of the School ground a gymnasium had been erected and constantly used, but in 1909 this gymnasium was pulled down to permit of the Science Building being erected.

adopted. Subsequent changes were made in 1928, when the School badge and motto were altered, and again in 1932.

IN 1910 the School Tuck-shop was introduced, and was run by a management committee composed of seniors. It showed a profit in the first year of £32, and was conducted by similar School Tuck-shop committees until 1920, when the system of leasing was introduced. Since this date the Tuck-shop has been conducted on this system.

DURING two or three years prior to 1909 the senior boys had been talking of publishing a School paper, but nothing had been done in the matter. However, in 1909 C. G. McDonald and F. A. Tidswell decided to call a meeting of the seniors. The meeting was held, and, with Mr. Waterhouse's sanction, it was decided to found a School magazine. C. G. McDonald (now a leading physician of Macquarie Street) was appointed first editor, and F. A. Tidswell business manager. Many names for the magazine were suggested, and eventually "The Record" was adopted. After considerable difficulty, arrangements were made with a printer, and the first issue appeared in December. Several Old Boys paid subscriptions to the business manager, and the first issue was a financial success. From the date of its foundation "The Record" has been published consistently, and now appears twice per annum. A complete list of the Editors appears on page 53.

M. Arousseau, an Old Boy, designed the cover of "The Record" which was in use until 1915, when a new design by another Old Boy, R. Hansen, was

IN 1910, Mr. Waterhouse introduced a Prefect system. This innovation altered the whole aspect of School organisation. The first Senior Prefect was C. G. McDonald, and powers of discipline and control were vested in prefects. These were annually appointed by the Headmaster and staff as a committee until 1917, when an elective system by the boys themselves was introduced. These first Prefects started an era in which the School has benefited in organisation, training and discipline. The authority vested in them was comparatively arbitrary. They had power to administer corporal punishment, and at a later date it was found that their powers had to be considerably curtailed. However, corporal punishment was a rarity, and it was carried out in a mild way. No boy was punished till he was tried by the Prefects, who constituted a kind of court, with the Senior Prefect presiding.

There is no gainsaying the tremendous advantage in the training of the boys, and in the discipline of the School in general, in vesting representatives

of the scholars with authority to conduct and control many aspects of the School's activities which are beyond the normal orbit of the staff.

A special Hat Badge for Prefects was introduced bearing the words, "*Virtus et Pudor*," after a design by R. Mauldron, an Old Boy. The special watch-chain Prefects' badge was not introduced until 1919, when it was adopted after a design by Mr. H. W. Moffitt, a member of the staff.

**T**HE Dramatic Society, about 1910, was more active than it had been since its inception in the 'eighties. R. R. Kidston was the Society's manager at this time, and several plays and farces were presented.

**I**N 1911, upon the occasion of the Coronation of His Majesty King George V., nine members, Colour-Sergeant N. E. Biden, Sergeant E. J. Saxby, Corporal E. Sealy-Vidal, Cadets H. Kershaw, W. McLean, D. Webster, —, Rae, W. Bevan and Bugler J. McKellar, of the Sydney High School Cadet Corps, were chosen to attend the ceremonies in London. Captain J. A. Hedberg, the master of the School in charge of the Sydney High School Cadet Corps, was selected to control all the cadets, whilst an Old Boy, Colonel G. W. Wynne, commanded the entire New South Wales Contingent.

**T**HE whole order of the educational system was altered in 1912, as in that year many changes and reforms were introduced. Up to this time, boys had been recruited to the School in one of two ways:—

**Changes in Educational System.** (1) By State School Scholarships and State School Bursaries.

There were five of the former and six of the latter, tenable at the Sydney High School for three years, and won by competitive examination each six months. The Bursaries were for boys whose parents could not afford to keep them at school. The Scholarships were for open competition. As the Sydney High School was then the only Boys' High School in Sydney, and as only five Scholarships and six Bursaries were to be won each six months, the winning of one of them was an achievement.

(2) By paying three guineas for each of the four terms.

**T**HE latter system was altered in 1912 to the extent that all fees were abolished, and entrance to all High Schools was by way of success in competitive examinations. The system of awarding scholarships was also altered in that a specific number for each school was no longer made available, but a certain number was to be granted annually to successful candidates in a State-wide competitive examination. The Junior and Senior examinations were abolished, and the Intermediate and Leaving Certificate examinations were introduced.

A further change was made in that the practice of frequently moving masters from school to school throughout New South Wales was adopted, and thus since 1912 the staff at the Sydney High School has never been of a permanent nature. It was also during 1912 that the Commercial Course was instituted at the School, with Mr. A. G. Steele as teacher of the subjects involved.

**M**ANY innovations came into force in 1913, the chief one being the formation of the School Union. A constitution was drawn up and adopted whereby all School activities, which had previously been run independently, were brought under the control of the School Union. A fee of ten shillings per annum was fixed for membership, and payment of this subscription entitled one to participate in any sport or activity within the School. No one could play in the School teams unless he was a member of the School Union. The foundation of the School Union altered the School activities, placing them on the sound basis which they have since enjoyed. Attempts had been made some years earlier to do something along similar lines, but had not resulted in permanent success.

The successful founding of the School Union in 1913 was a triumph for the zeal and energy of Mr. C. E. Fletcher, B.A., ably seconded by other members of the staff. The first office-bearers were:— J. Waterhouse, President; C. E. Fletcher, Honorary Secretary; and W. A. Moore and E. H. Parker,

**T**HE next important change of 1913 was the formation of the Combined High Schools' Amateur Athletic Association of New South Wales. Since the inception of this body, the Sydney **C.H.S.A.A.A.** High School has been actively participating in most of the activities under its control, but, as has been recorded, has been a member of the Association of the Great Public Schools since 1906, and has regularly played against G.P.S. teams since 1885. Thus since 1913 the Sydney High School has been a member of both the G.P.S. and the C.H.S. Associations.

**T**HIS year saw the School gain its initial success in the Rhodes Scholarships, the **Rhodes Scholarship** coveted prize being secured by **Won by Old Boy.** E. A. Southee, who proceeded to Oxford, there to add the degree of M.A. to his B.Sc. (Agric.) (Syd.), in addition to gaining his Rugger Blue and being placed in the All-England Broad Jump Championship.

**T**HE outstanding event of 1914 was, of course, the outbreak of the World War. From the day when the newspaper placards bore the words, "**Britain declares war on Germany,**" **Outbreak of Great War.** until the cessation of hostilities in 1918, the heritage of glorious tradition which has been handed down at the Sydney High School daily grew. The School Roll of Honour bears eloquent testimony to the number of Old

**I**T was also during this year that the Commonwealth Government introduced compulsory military training, an act which caused the old Sydney High School Cadet Corps, which had had a **Cadet Corps** continuous, if somewhat spasmodic, life since 1883 to disappear. All scholars at the School from 1913 until 1929 were **Superseded.** compulsorily members of the Citizens' Forces. In 1929 compulsory training was abolished by the Commonwealth Government.

**O**NCE again the Sydney Girls' High School and the Old Boys' Union rendered the School practical assistance, for in 1913 the Old Boys' Union organised a Concert, which the Sydney Girls' **Piano Fund.** High School generously gave, for funds to purchase an upright piano. A subscription list was opened and availed of by many Old Boys.

Boys, and indeed some pupils, of the School who rallied to the Flag. Over six hundred Old Boys served in the Great War, being more than one in every five of those who had been enrolled on the School's books from 1883 to 1918. To the Old Boys who gave their lives for King and Empire in a practical demonstration of courage, manhood and loyalty, attributes which any school is proud to see in her sons, this history is dedicated.

At the time of the Declaration of War preparations for the Annual Athletic Carnival were well in hand. At a special meeting, it was un-animously decided that the money raised for sports prizes (about £35) should be given as a donation to the Red Cross funds.

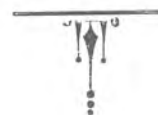
To commemorate this act of spontaneous sacrifice, a medal bearing the words "*Pro Patria*" was struck, and, instead of prizes, the winners of cham-



Great Public Schools' Debating Association of N.S.W.

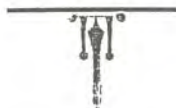
COMPETITION COMMENCED 1920.

pionship events received this medal. In addition, medals were presented to Mr. Peter Board, Director of Education, and the Headmaster, Mr. J. Waterhouse. The latter handed his medal back to the School in 1932 as a souvenir of a worthy incident in the School history.

**A**T the second annual C.H.S. Athletic Meeting in 1914 the Sydney High School team won the Senior Athletic Shield, which it was successfully to defend at the next four annual athletic meetings. It was also in this year that the School Union founded the "Junior Athletic Cup," which has since been annually presented to the successful competitor in Junior Athletic Championships.

**D**URING his short visit to Australia in 1914, Professor Grafton Elliott Smith, one of the "Originals," and the most famous Old Boy, paid a visit to the School at Ultimo and delivered an inspiring address, in which he attributed much of his success to the

teachings and the ideals instilled in him by the masters and associations of his time at the School.

**I**T was at the end of 1915 that Mr. J. Waterhouse resigned from the Headmastership, after having been in that position since 1896. His retirement was not made such an important event as was merited, as the War occupied the interests and activities of most people. However, the masters tendered him a farewell dinner, and a presentation was made on behalf of the boys. The Old Boys' Union presented Mr. Waterhouse with a gold watch, suitably inscribed, at a special gathering in the Assembly Hall of the Department of Education on the 19th April. The President of the Old Boys' Union, Mr. W. G. Lewis, and Mr. A. M. Eedy, made the presentation, and the formal inauguration of the John Waterhouse Prize was announced. A fund was opened by the Old Boys' Union to provide for an annual prize to be called the "John Waterhouse Prize" for competition at the School. The names of Old Boys who subscribed to this fund, and the winners of this prize, are recorded on page 75.

## THE RHODES SCHOLARSHIP.

Since 1904, a Rhodes Scholarship, now of the value of £400 sterling a year, has been open annually for application in this State, as in other parts of the Empire, the United States, and, once again, Germany. Its duration is three years, and it is tenable at Oxford only. Its continuance from year to year is subject to the approval of the College at Oxford, of which the Scholar becomes a member. Provision has recently been made, to meet exceptional circumstances, whereby the third year of the Scholarship may be spent at a University other than Oxford.

In his will, in establishing funds for the Scholarship, Cecil Rhodes wrote:—

*My desire being that the students who shall be elected to the Scholarships shall not be merely bookworms, I direct that in the election of a student to a Scholarship regard shall be had to (1) his literary and scholastic attainments; (2) his fondness for and success in manly outdoor sports, such as cricket, football and the like; (3) his qualities of manhood, truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy for and protection of the weak, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship; and (4) his exhibition . . . of moral force of character and of instincts to lead . . . for those latter attributes will be likely in after life to guide him to esteem the performance of public duties as his highest aim.*

The Rhodes Scholarship is the most important and honoured Scholarship to be won at the University of Sydney and at the other Universities throughout the world.

**I**N 1916 Mr. R. J. Hinder, B.A., was appointed third Headmaster of the School. Mr. Hinder had been at one time a pupil of the Sydney Grammar School, a point which is interesting to note, as **R. J. Hinder,** at the present moment the Sydney **Headmaster.** Grammar School has an Old Boy of the Sydney High School (H. S. Dettmann) as its Headmaster. He threw himself into the activities of the School with great zeal, and it was mainly due to his efforts, together with those of Mr. C. A. Fairland and Mr. J. H. Smairl, that the Honour Board, as a tribute to those scholars who answered the Call to Arms during the Great War, materialised. This Honour Board, after a design by John Kirkpatrick, architect of the Commonwealth Bank building, was unveiled at Speech

**S**PORT at the School during 1917 was in a flourishing condition, and success attended the School's representatives in many spheres, as the records in the sporting section of this volume indicate. The award of Honour Caps was again introduced for the first time since the 'eighties. The only occasion on which boxing was a serious School activity was also in 1917, and J. A. Vote won the School Championship. In 1918 two more G.P.S. titles were won: S. A. Willsher gained the 100 Yards Swimming Championship, whilst A. S. Watt carried all before him in the G.P.S. and New South Wales Schoolboys' Tennis Championships.

of such matches. Captain E. A. Southee had returned from the War on furlough, after four years with the British Forces, and captained the Old Boys' team against the School XV. before what was probably the largest attendance at any Sydney High School football match to that time.

**R. N. KERSHAW** (now Economic Advisor to the Bank of England) won the Rhodes Scholarship in 1918, this being the second occasion on which the high distinction was won by an Old Boy.

**T**HE year 1918 closed sombrely. On the eve of the Armistice, and but a few weeks prior to the Christmas vacation, the Headmaster, Mr. R. J. Hinder, suddenly passed away. **Death of Mr. Hinder.** With regard to this, let us quote Mr. A. R. Beveridge, who was a scholar at the School at the time: "Known to all

for his boundless energy, devotion to duty and human kindness, we were aghast that one so well respected had gone beyond the reach of human tokens of love and reverence. Not many appear to have gained reputation without some gift that in due degree deserved it, and as the then Chief Inspector of Schools said, 'Robert Hinder was a fine man, every inch of him, and he wrote his record deep in the hearts of all who knew him, and because they knew him, loved him.' "

**MR. C. R. SMITH, M.A.**, was appointed to fill the Headmastership left vacant by the sudden death of Mr. Hinder. Mr. Smith, a graduate of the University of Aberdeen, Scotland, had acted for a short time as Assistant Master at the School under Mr. Coates, and, after having been on the staffs of two other schools for some time, had been for the second time at the Sydney High School,

under the Headmastership of Mr. J. Waterhouse. In 1906 he had gone to take charge of the Newcastle High School, and thus his appointment to the Headmastership of the Sydney High School was his third appointment to the School. During the six years in which he filled this position the School achieved some remarkable scholastic successes.

**I**T was during 1919 that the first efforts to establish rowing as a sporting activity at the School were

made. The previous year £10 had been set aside by the School Union for the purchase of a skiff, and a Rowing Club was formed mainly due to the work of Mr. J. Towns, A.T.C., a master at the School. Certain boys were selected to train for the G.P.S. Regatta of 1919, and the North Sydney Rowing Club lent their sheds for the use of the School. However, the Club fell through, and was not revived until 1924.

**FOR** the third time, and the second year in succession, an Old Boy was awarded the Rhodes Scholarship, it being awarded in 1919 to A. W. When.

Two years later, the fourth Old Boy to receive this coveted honour was A. S. Watt, B.A., who was awarded the Scholarship for 1921.

**IT** was also during 1919 that the School Song, "*Extremos pudeat rediisse*," written by Mr. H. O. Craddock, M.A., was set to music by Mr. A. G. Steele, Dip.Ed. Both were masters at the time. The words had been published as a poem in the School magazine in 1913.

**THE** Sydney High School Debating Team in 1921 won the Louatt Shield awarded by the G.P.S. Debating Association, which had been formed the previous year, an achievement which was repeated in 1924 and 1929.

**TO** perpetuate the memory of her son, John Skyring Cross, an Old Boy who had given his life in the Great War, Mrs. Cross founded the John Skyring Cross Memorial Prize. This has since been awarded annually on the vote of the members of the School's G.P.S. teams to the one deemed to have shown the best "sportsmanship." A list of the recipients of this Cup is published on page 86.

**IN** 1923 the School promised the G.P.S. Association to enter a crew in the 1924 Regatta. Immediately upon communicating this decision to the Old Boys' Union, that body opened a Rowing Fund, to which Old Boys were invited to forward donations. In the three months of 1923 that this fund was open, they subscribed £77/15/6. The School entered two Fours in the 1924 Regatta, the First Four winning the Yaralla Cup for its event by ten lengths. This victory was so encouraging that the School decided to enter an Eight in the next Annual Regatta.

In order to purchase a boat to accommodate the Eight, a group of twenty-seven Old Boys contributed £50/3/5, to which was added £3/10/- from three other gentlemen. This amount was further supplemented to the extent of £49 by a performance of "Princess Chrysanthemum" given by the Sydney Girls' High School. With the assistance of the Old Boys' Union, whose Rowing Fund has practically financed the School rowing, an Eight was purchased.

**THE** School Rifle Club was re-formed in 1924, after a lapse of some twelve years. Its revival was mainly due to the enthusiasm of E. G. Pont, C. Grout-Smith and S. Crumlin. At first it was entirely a military organisation connected with the 30th Battalion, but later on in the year its membership increased, and rifle shooting took a definite place in the sporting activities of the School.

At this time a series of monthly rifle matches was being conducted by the Citizen Forces Rifle Association. The Sydney High School team competed in the "B" Grade division of these competitions in 1924 and 1925, but did not meet with any outstanding success.

In the annual two-day matches held by the Citizen Forces Association in June, 1925, several members met with success. E. Pont came third in the Grand Aggregate, and was selected in a team representing the Citizens' Forces to compete against teams representing the American Fleet then visiting Sydney and the National Rifle Association.

During the season 1925-26, the Sydney High School team was easily the most outstanding in the "B" Grade of the Citizen Forces' monthly competitions. It won the Anderson Cup and the Pacific Boot Polish Cup awarded for total aggregates. D. Johnson won the medal for the highest individual aggregate.

The School entered for the first time for many years in the G.P.S. Rifle Shooting Championship in September, 1925, and since then has regularly competed. Since its re-formation in 1924 the Rifle Club has steadily progressed, and has some very good performances to its credit.

AT the end of 1924 Mr. C. R. Smith retired from the Headmastership. Mr. Smith's regime certainly covered a period in which the School achieved great scholastic fame, surpassing the most brilliant records yet attained. During his Headmastership, the Cooper Scholarship for Classics was won on three occasions, the Lithgow Scholarship for Modern Languages twice, Barker Scholarship for Mathematics three times, Horner Exhibition for Mathematics twice, John West and Grahame Medal and the Bowman-Cameron Scholarship for General Proficiency once each.

Upon his retirement the School made a presentation to him at a concert, in the King's Hall, Sydney, in which nearly half of the School enrolment participated.

To quote from the School magazine: "The remarkable scholastic success gained by the School in the last six years, during his regime, is the monument and record to his influence. The love and esteem felt by the boys towards him is the outcome of his never-varying, straightforward and manly method of dealing with them. The honour and respect in which he is held by the whole School is a witness and testimony to his ripe scholarship. A fine teacher, a fine scholar and a fine gentleman, Mr. Smith has proved himself worthy to rank with his great predecessors in office."

THE next year, 1925, Mr. G. C. Saxby, B.A., was appointed to the Headmastership. Mr. Saxby had had a long association with the School. He had been a pupil in the 'eighties, had been Dux of the School in 1885 and in 1886, had been a member of the staff from 1892 to 1914, and had been an active member of the Old Boys' Union since its inception, and its President in 1908 and 1914.

In the nine years since Mr. Saxby first became Headmaster, the School has advanced tremendously in all its activities; its sporting achievements, its scholastic records and its organisation have attained heights which were undreamed of in its earlier years.

MR. SAXBY'S first year as Headmaster was marked by the great win of the School's First Eight in the "Head of the River" Championship.

This crew won its event by three lengths. The achievement was repeated in 1926 and 1927, making a "hat-trick" of wins in the first three years in which the School participated in this event. The School also won this event in 1929 and 1930, a truly remarkable rowing record. In the latter year, the School Crew won after a hard and stirring race. However, at a later date, nearly four months after the event, allegations were made of irregularities in the School rowing, and the G.P.S. Committee eventually declared the event for that year "No Race." It is the considered opinion of the School and the Old Boys' Union that this severity was unmerited, and they endorse the words of the Headmaster, Mr. G. C. Saxby, on this occasion: "To any allegations of unsportsmanlike conduct or tactics contrary to the rules of the Association, I give them on behalf of the High School an unqualified denial."

The Yaralla Cup for First Fours was won by the School crews in 1924, 1929, 1931 and 1933, and the Second Fours event by the School crews in 1925 and 1932.

The rowing has been mainly financed by the Old Boys' Union, which body, since it promised support when the First Crew was entered in 1924, has continued to bear the main expense of this activity. The Old Boys' Union has expended about £1800 on School rowing, an average of some £200 per annum. This expenditure covers the purchase of the second Eight at a cost of some £150 in 1929, a racing Four purchased in 1931 at a cost of £78/10/-, and the hire of a launch for the purpose of coaching School crews since 1924 at an average cost of £100 to £120 per annum, and many other necessary items. A great deal of this money has come from direct donations by Old Boys to the Rowing Fund, complete records of which are to be found on pages 76 and 77. The Parents and Citizens' Association has also borne a large share of the rowing expenses, having disbursed over £700.

The "Eight" purchased in 1929 was called the "George E. Hancock," in appreciation of that

gentleman's sterling services as coach of School crews since 1924, and to whom most of the credit for the School's championship rowing successes is due. The racing "Four" purchased in 1931 was called the "Charles R. Smith," in appreciation of Mr. C. R. Smith's services as coach of the School Eight in 1927 and the First Fours in four other years.

In 1924 arrangements were made with the Glebe Rowing Club to house the School's crews and materials at the Glebe Shed, and to supply coaches. This practice continued until 1931, when a change was made to the Drummoyne Rowing Club's shed. The coaches of the School crews have since been members of the Drummoyne Club, with the exception of Mr. G. E. Hancock, who has continued to coach the School Eight.

**I**T was in 1925 that the Parents and Citizens' Association was formed, an event which has proved one of the most beneficial steps taken for the welfare of the Sydney High School. Mr. G. C. Saxby and Mr. C. A. Fairland, who had advocated the formation of such a body for many years, were responsible for its inauguration. The Parents and Citizens' Association has achieved much, and has become an integral part of the organization connected with the Sydney High School. On a later page will be found particulars of the activities and office-bearers of this body.

**D**URING this year Mr. Phillip Moses offered £50 to the Sydney High School, provided that the School raised £ for £. This offer was gratefully accepted, and was communicated to Old Boys with an invitation to subscribe to the School Fund. Thirty-eight Old Boys forwarded donations which collectively passed the £50 mark, and brought to the School the £50 promised by Mr. Moses. The latter amount was spent on books for the reference library, whilst £65/13/- donated by the Old Boys was spent on other School activities. A list of subscribers to this fund is published on page 78.

**I**T was also during 1925 that two long-felt wants were practically met, these being a new building at Moore Park and a sportsground. These two requirements had occupied the attention of the School and Old Boys' Union for many years, and O.B.U. minutes record many deputations to various Ministers about these matters. The earliest recorded movement for a new School building was in 1906, and for a sportsground in 1908. The newly-formed Parents and Citizens' Association also commenced in 1925 working enthusiastically for a new building.

It was at the Old Boys' Annual Dinner on 25th November, 1925, that the then Minister for Education, the Hon. T. D. Mutch, M.L.A., promised to have a new School building erected at Moore Park, provided the Old Boys did something towards its equipment and the playing fields. In less than ten minutes £800 was promised by Old Boys present. A Sports Ground Fund was opened as from that night, and the names of the donors to this fund appear on page 79.

Mr. Mutch honoured his promise, and immediately took steps to have plans drawn. Every step was taken to ensure the best of facilities. Provision was made for an up-to-date gymnasium, a library, a prefects' room, a magnificent assembly hall capable of seating a thousand persons, with dressing, cloak and cinematographic projection rooms, well equipped science laboratories, store-rooms, and a large basement. On 5th March, 1927, he set the foundation stone. The President of the Old Boys' Union (Mr. R. T. McKay) presided, and the speakers were Mr. R. T. McKay, the Honourable T. D. Mutch, Sir Mungo MacCallum, K.C.M.G., Mr. Justice A. G. James, Mr. S. H. Smith (Director of Education), Mr. David Maughan, K.C. (President of the G.P.S. Association), and the Reverend H. E. Hulme (President of the Parents and Citizens' Association).

**I**N 1926, the Hon. T. D. Mutch also granted the request of the Old Boys' Union to set aside each year seats for the sons of "Old Boys." This object had been one dear to Old Boys for many years.

Dear Sir,

In recognition of the promises of strong support received from the "Old Boys" of the Sydney Boys' High School in connection with the equipment and endowment of the new school at Moore Park, I have decided to concede their wish that a definite number of vacant places at the beginning of each year shall be set apart for competition among the children or grandchildren of former pupils.

At the coming Entrance Examination to be held on the 29th October, twenty-five (25) vacant places will be reserved, but when the new building is completed, fifty (50) places will be so reserved. I am proposing that, to qualify as a former pupil for the purpose of this competition, the father or grandfather's name, as the case may be, shall have appeared on the School record for at least two years continuously.

I am in full sympathy with the desire frequently expressed by parents and grandparents to send their sons or grandsons to the High School which they attended when they were boys, so that they may hand on to the newcomers a heritage whose worth they themselves have proved. I am hopeful that this concession will help to develop a school tradition the value of which will increase from year to year.

**I**N 1928 the new School building at Moore Park was opened by the Hon. D. H. Drummond, M.L.A., his successor as Minister for Education. The occasion was one of the greatest in the history of the Sydney High School. **Opening of New School.** The School was actually transferred to its new building after Easter, and the official opening took place on the 9th June, 1928. The ceremony was one of the most brilliant functions ever associated with the Sydney High School. The President of the Old Boys' Union, Mr. A. M. Eedy, who was the first pupil enrolled, presided. Over a thousand persons were present, and the speeches—eloquent, thoughtful and inspiring—matched the occasion. The speakers were Mr. A. M. Eedy (President of the Old Boys' Union), the Hon. D. H. Drummond, M.L.A. (Minister for Education), Sir Mungo MacCallum, K.C.M.G. (Deputy-

Chancellor of the University of Sydney), the Rt. Hon. Dr. Earle C. G. Page, M.P. (Commonwealth Treasurer), Mr. S. H. Smith (Director of Education), Hon. T. D. Mutch (ex-Minister for Education), Mr. G. C. Saxby, B.A. (Principal), the Rev. H. E. Hulme (President of the Parents and Citizens' Association), Mr. H. S. Dettmann, M.A., B.C.L. (Headmaster of the Sydney Grammar School), and Mr. Justice A. B. Piddington, B.A. (President of the Industrial Commission). Subsequently the speeches were issued by Mr. Eedy as a booklet to all interested in the Sydney High School. Grateful acknowledgment is also due to Mr. Eedy for the booklet containing the speeches delivered by Sir George Reid and Dr. Charles Badham in 1883, which was distributed at the gathering.

**T**O mark the occasion, many Old Boys and others founded scholarships and made benefactions. Mr. Eedy gave £200 to provide prizes for English and the 100 Yards Championship, the **Endowments.** first to be called the "A. B. Piddington Prize," in honour of the first teacher of English at the School; and the second to be called the "A. M. Eedy Prize" for the 100 Yards Championship, A. M. Eedy being the winner of this event at the first Sydney High School Athletic Meeting in 1886. Mr. Frank Albert donated the "Frank Albert Cup" with two miniatures, one to be presented to the Dux of the School and the other to the Senior Athletic Champion. Thirty Old Boys donated £142/19/6 for the purchase of a cinema lantern and equipment; Mr. W. J. Cleary, B.Ec., presented a shield, to be known as the "Cleary Shield" for the Champion House at Studies; Mr. G. C. Saxby, B.A., a shield for the Champion House at Sport; the Rt. Hon. Earle C. G. Page, P.C., M.B., Ch.M., M.P., £100 to provide Language prizes; Mr. G. C. Saxby, a piece of statuary, "The Lady in the Mantilla"; Mr. H. C. Wilson, a painting, "The Interior of Milan Cathedral"; Mr. E. Langker, a painting; the Old Boys' Union, framed portraits of the four past headmasters to be hung in the School; Mr. A. M. Eedy, framed portraits of Sir George Reid and Dr. Charles Badham. The Old Boys' Union also laid down three cricket pitches within the School grounds at a cost of some £120. Besides the

Old Boys mentioned above, Mr. J. Saxby, father of Mr. G. C. Saxby, donated £200 to provide an annual scholarship to be known as the "J. and E. Saxby Scholarship" from the Lower to the Upper School. Mr. R. M. Clark presented a piece of statuary, "The Tambourine Girl," by Angelo Bertozzi, Carrara, 1885, and an engraving, "The Relief of Lucknow." W. Lister-Lister, Albert Collins, Harry Julius, Scott Gunn, A. Dattilli Rubbo, F. Wimble, H. C. Hadley and F. Meade Norton presented paintings, S. Ure Smith and Syd. Long etchings, and A. Aitken a Hans Heysen print.

**T**HE transfer to Moore Park enabled the enrolment at the School to be increased, as the building is designed to accommodate 700 pupils.

**Increased Enrolment.** This increase in enrolment has brought with it greater potentialities in School activities, and it is noticeable that a great improvement in the School's sport has resulted.

**I**N order to honour the promise given to Mr. Mutch, the Old Boys' Union looked round for a suitable site for a Sports Ground. A site consisting mostly of swampy ground in Centennial Park was eventually chosen. Mr. R. T. McKay, the President of the Old Boys' Union in 1926 and 1927, brought this area under the notice of the Government, pointing out its suitability as a sports ground. After much difficulty, a lease of 18 acres in Centennial Park was obtained, to which another acre was added at a later date. Most of the 19 acres were in a very swampy condition, and their reclamation seemed an almost insuperable task for the Old Boys' Union to tackle. Work was proceeding slowly, when Mr. McKay took the matter to the Unemployment Relief Council, which made an initial grant of £7000 available for work on the area. Further grants at later dates brought the total to over £10,000.

Two Old Boys, Mr. A. Trier, L.S., and Mr. F. Della Ca, L.S., prepared sketches and plans of the playing grounds, the construction of storm-water channels and underground drainage.

Mr. C. A. Fairland arranged matters in connection with the laying of a cricket pitch on the No. 1

Oval; while two more Old Boys, Messrs. C. N. and S. Hirst, architects, have designed a dressing shed, which it is hoped will be erected this year.

Mr. McKay obtained the permission of the Minister for Agriculture for the erection of a fence fronting the Grand Drive to enclose the area, and the Old Boys' Union, with the assistance of Mr. O. D. Oberg arranged for its erection.

Six acres of the area have been given to the Sydney Girls' High School, whilst the other thirteen acres will make two full-sized ovals, a further football field, and seven tennis courts.

The work and efforts of Mr. McKay in acquiring the Sports Ground have been tremendous. It was no easy matter to obtain the lease of 19 acres in Centennial Park, the north-western boundary being within one hundred yards of the Royal Agricultural Show Ground. In order to accomplish this object, meetings, deputations and interviews were innumerable, whilst for over four years Mr. McKay paid visits to the ground practically every morning to render assistance with his engineering knowledge.

The first match to be played on the Sports Ground was the annual match against The Armidale School in May, 1932. The President of the Old Boys' Union, Mr. H. F. Halloran, kicked off in this match.

Throughout the years that the Sydney High School has been handicapped by the lack of a Sports Ground for use on Saturdays, the other G.P.S. have courteously and generously permitted their fixtures with the Sydney High School to be played on their fields. For this courtesy all those connected with the Sydney High School hereby express the sincerest appreciation and thanks.

**I**T was felt at the time of the transfer to Moore Park that the School Badge then in use, which had no heraldic significance, could be improved.

Accordingly a special committee of the School Union designed the present official badge of the School. This badge bears the shield of the City of Sydney, an open book thereon, denoting scholarship, surmounted by a crown and based on a scroll with

the School motto, "*Veritate et Virtute*," which was also adopted at that time. These changes were well justified, in that the old badge and the old motto contained some anomalies whose origin cannot be traced. The School Song, adopted in 1919, had been based on the old motto, so that the change of motto in 1928 resulted in the abandonment of the song. Some efforts have been made to introduce a new and appropriate School Song, but this has not yet been achieved.

1928 also marks the introduction of a House System into the School organization. The entire School is divided into four Houses, Gordon, Parkes, Reid, and Wentworth, and competitions are organized between the various Houses.

**I**N 1929 the School was runner-up to Sydney Grammar School in the G.P.S. Athletic Meeting, this being the highest position it had attained in any G.P.S. competition (apart from rowing), although it had participated in G.P.S. Athletic Premiership. G.P.S. cricket, football, and athletics since 1906. The next year, 1930, the School Athletic Team swept to the Premiership in the G.P.S. Athletics, mainly due to the efforts of R. E. Ashbarry, who won the 100 and 200 Yards Championships; T. Pauling, in putting the shot; and J. P. Metcalfe, who won the running high jump. A photograph of this team is published in the sporting section of this volume.

The standard of sport has steadily advanced, and in 1932 reached the highest peak yet achieved. The School teams were runners-up in the G.P.S. Football and G.P.S. Cricket Competitions, won the 2nd Fours Race, whilst its teams won the C.H.S. Senior Athletics, and the Senior, Junior, and Under 14 Swimming Shields.

**I**N 1929 four tennis courts were constructed within the School grounds by the School Union, in conjunction with the Parents and Citizens' Association, and with the help of six Old Boys acting as guarantors. The construction of these courts gave a decided impetus to the School tennis—an ad-

vance made possible by the transfer of the School to Moore Park.

**I**T was also in 1929 that Lodge Sydney High School—the first G.P.S. Masonic Lodge founded in this State—was formed. In 1930 the Lodge S.H.S. formed a prize to be awarded annually to a Fourth Year Student, proceeding to his Fifth Year, for character and scholarship.

**S**PEECH Day of 1930 was the occasion of the second Vice-Regal visit to the Sydney High School, his Excellency the Governor, Sir Philip Game, K.C.B., G.B.E., D.S.O., honouring the gathering with his presence and presenting some of the Senior prizes.

**D**URING 1932 Mr. H. F. Halloran, the President of the Old Boys' Union, presented a new copy of Dr. Badham's inaugural address. Mr. A. E. Waddell, another Old Boy, presented the School with etchings of each of the buildings which have housed the Sydney High School, and Mr. H. K. Prior, through the Old Boys' Union, a commemorative plate to mark the opening of the new School.

**T**HIS year, 1933, will mark the end of Mr. G. C. Saxby's headmastership of the School. As recorded previously, he has been associated with the School since 1884 as pupil, teacher, master, and headmaster. The tremendous advances in scholarship, sport and organization during his period of office stand as a monument to his inspiring leadership and example. Upon him fell the difficult task of re-organizing the greatly enlarged School when the transfer to the new building was effected. The many and varied improvements at the School are greatly due to his untiring efforts, and this book shows how, under his guidance, the School has gone from success to success in scholarship and sport.

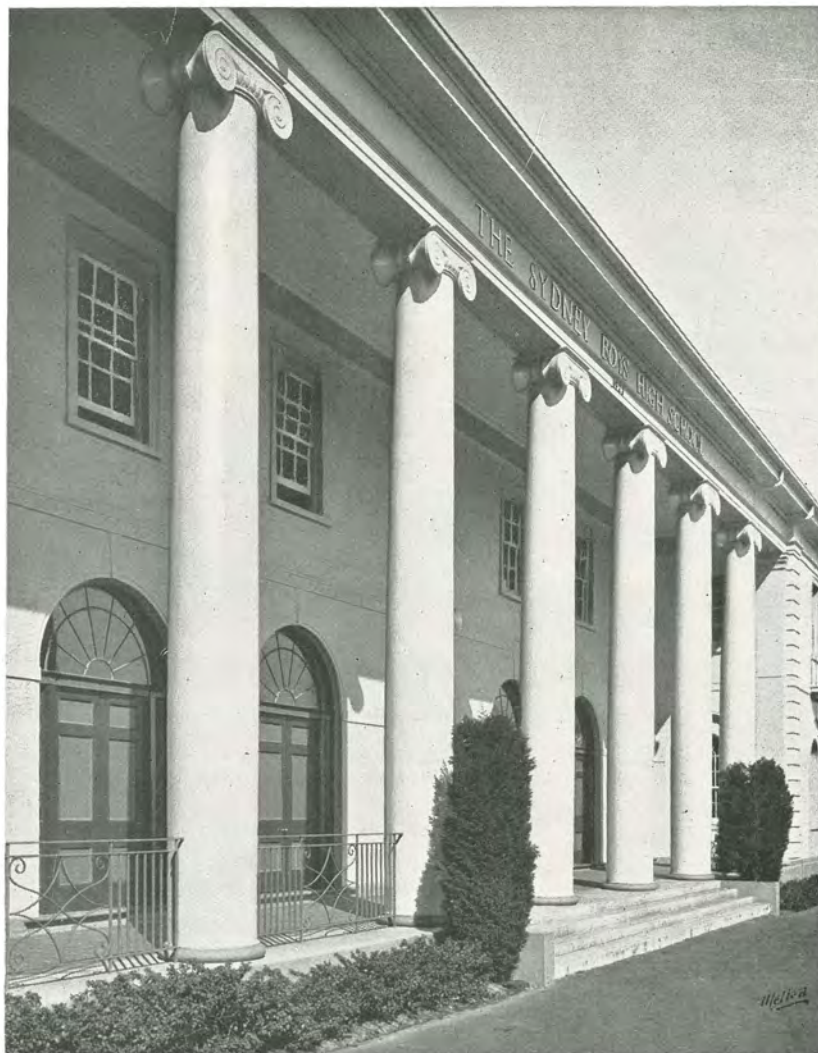


TO signalise the Jubilee of the School's foundation this year, 1933, a combined Jubilee Celebrations' Committee was formed of representatives of the School, the Old Boys' Union, and the Jubilee Year. Parents and Citizens' Association.

This Committee drew up a programme of appropriate functions, which were held in October.

In addition, the Old Boys' Union decided that, by way of commemorating the fifty years' history of the School, a record of its activities, personalities and achievements should be compiled. ## Coates' Memorial Library.

In 1906 action was taken by the Old Boys' Union towards establishing a Memorial to the late Joseph Coates, the first Headmaster of the Sydney High School. In 1909 the subscribers decided that the Memorial should take the form of a Reference Library at the School, and this was established.

£38/9/- was subscribed by 55 Old Boys and Masters, and this fund has since been administered by A. M. Eedy as Trustee. £35/14/7 has been spent on books for the Library from this fund, additions being made in 1909, 1911, 1914, 1916, 1922, 1928, 1929 and 1931, whilst the fund has now amounted to £55/4/10.

- (i.) The second School Eight at the cost of some £150 in 1929. This craft was called the "George E. Hancock" in appreciation of his sterling services as Coach of School Crews since 1924.
- (ii.) The Racing Four, purchased in 1931 at the cost of £78/10/-. This craft has been called the "Charles R. Smith," in appreciation of his services as Coach of the School Eight in 1927 and the First Fours in four other years.
- (iii.) Defraying the cost of hiring a launch for the purposes of coaching School Crews since 1924 at an average cost of £100 to £120 per annum.

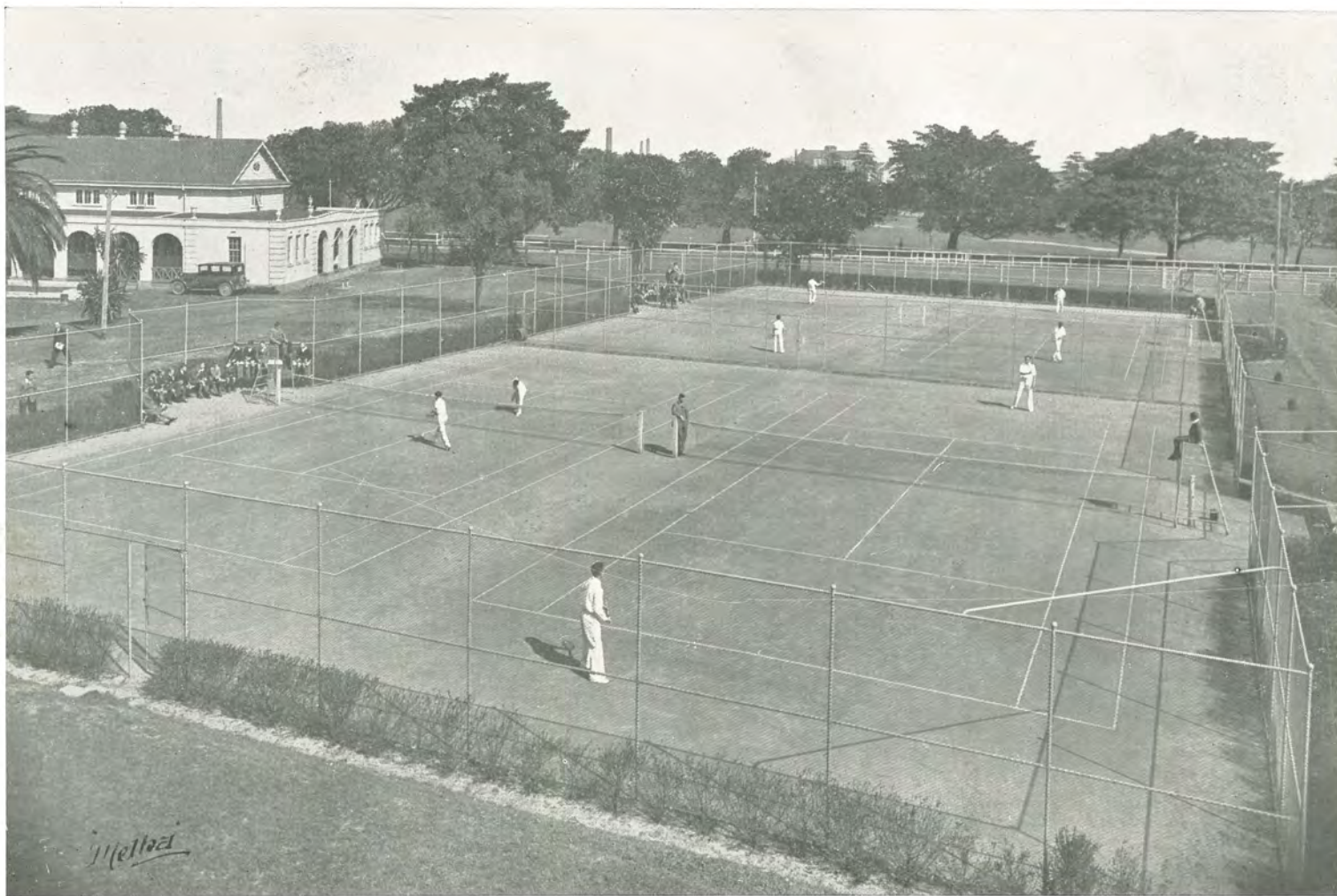

The Wright Memorial Science Library was formed as an adjunct to the School Library in memory of Mr. R. C. J. Wright, a Science Master at Sydney High School from 1917 till 1927, in which year he lost his life in the "Greycliffe" disaster on Sydney Harbour.

The members of the School, in response to an appeal, raised £25 for the purchase of books for this Library. The Parents and Citizens' Association purchased Mr. Wright's own science books from his family and presented them to the Wright Memorial Library.

## IN THE REALM OF SPORT.

**HONOUR CAPS** were awarded at Sydney High School in early years for prowess in sport, and were analogous to the present system of the award of "Blues." In 1917, a system was introduced whereby Honour Caps were awarded for—

1. Ability in particular sport.
2. General interest in School.
3. Credit brought to School in representative sport

### NOTE !

**Great Public Schools' Competitions.**—S.H.S. teams have participated in G.P.S. competitions in cricket, football, and athletics since 1906; first took part in rowing by entering in the 1st and 2nd Fours in 1924, and in the Eights Championship Races in 1925.

## Football.

Rugby Union has been played at the School since 1884, and the records of the very early matches and teams that are available are published elsewhere in this history. ## The Senior Athletic Champion.

From 1886 to 1905 the 220 Yards Champion was regarded as the Senior Athletic Champion. In 1905 a point score system was instituted, and since then the Senior Athletic Champion is the athlete with the greatest aggregate of points. The earlier records are incomplete.

The reward for the Champion was, until 1930, a cup presented by the Sydney Girls' High School, and known as the School Cup. Since that date the School Cup has been awarded to the best all-rounder in all sports, and the "Frank Albert Cup" is the prize for the Champion Athlete.

## RIFLE SHOOTING.

The Cadets first introduced rifle shooting at the School in 1883. Until 1889 it continued to play an important part in the School's activities, and the remarkable successes achieved are recorded elsewhere in this History. After 1889, rifle shooting spasmodically assumed importance at the School. Under the guidance of J. A. Hedberg, B.A., the School achieved some prowess in this activity about 1910, but some years later the Club ceased to function.

In 1924 the Rifle Club was revived, and has continued since that date. It was attached to the 30th Battalion until 1929, when it became an independent Club.

A team has regularly been entered in the G.P.S. Competitions since 1925, coming third on two occasions, and winning the Buchanan Shield for Snap-Shooting for 1931.

In open competitions the School has achieved many laurels, especially in 1925, 1930 and 1931.

## Sydney High School Old Boys' Union.

WITH the object of forming an Ex-Students' Union, a meeting was held at the Sydney Girls' High School, Castlereagh Street, Sydney, on the 6th June, 1892. Mr. T. B. Trebeck, M.A., presided over the gathering, which decided to appoint a provisional committee composed of Messrs. P. J. Pratt, F. W. Doak, A. B. Zlotkowski, C. H. Cooke, and H. Vallentine to draw up a constitution.

At a further meeting on the 13th June the provisional committee submitted a draft constitution, which was adopted. The office-bearers for the year 1892-93 were elected, the Headmaster (Mr. J. Coates) President; A. M. Eedy, Hon. Secretary; and A. H. MacTaggart, Hon. Treasurer. On following pages, the names of all office-bearers throughout the years are recorded.

After three years of activity, in which several successful re-unions and functions took place, the Ex-Students' Union's activities lapsed in 1895. This was partly due to the greatly reduced enrolment at the School and the consequent lack of new ex-students to take the places in the Union of the earlier members, whose natural trend was to scatter throughout the colony and to go abroad.

On the 11th August, 1902, through the work and energy of A. G. Henderson and O. A. A. Diethelm, a meeting was held at the Girls' High School to reconstitute the Old Boys' Union. Upon this occasion Mr. A. M. Eedy was in the chair, and the meeting appointed a provisional committee composed of Messrs. A. M. Eedy, R. C. Forsyth, O. A. A. Diethelm, A. J. Palmer, R. H. Shorter, and O. U. Vonwiller to draw up a constitution for the reformed body. At a further meeting on the 25th August, a constitution submitted by the provisional committee was adopted, and the office-bearers for the year 1902-3 were elected. Since 1902 the Old Boys' Union has functioned continuously.

Throughout this History the many and various offices, presentations, prizes, funds, and gifts by the Old Boys' Union and Old Boys have been recalled.

The School Rowing, since its commencement in 1924, has been mainly financed by the O.B.U., and the supervision of many branches of this activity has been undertaken by this body. Upon the occasion of each win registered by a School crew in the "Head of the River" Race the Old Boys' Union has given a dinner and theatre party to the members of the crew, and made a presentation of miniature oars.

The provision and equipment of a Sports Ground has occupied the attention of the Old Boys' Union of recent years, and elsewhere in this volume is recorded the success attending this matter. On page 79 the names of the donors to the Sports Ground Fund are published.

To the Old Boys' Union falls the further task of enabling those who have passed through the School to keep in touch with School affairs and with each other. To this end a Ball and Dinner are held annually, besides many other social functions, at which Old Boys may renew friendships formed whilst at School. Notes and articles about and of interest to Old Boys are regularly published in the School magazine, "The Record."

Since 1905 football and cricket matches have been played annually against the School, whilst some debates have also been organised. Results of the matches are recorded in the sporting section of this volume.

The Old Boys' Union has been an integral part of the School organisation. The help rendered by it in many spheres and activities has been greatly instrumental in building the School up to the position it now occupies. There is yet, however, much more to be accomplished, and it is felt that all those who have been scholars of the Sydney High School owe something to it. To most it has given an expensive and invaluable education at a small cost. Those who have won University Scholarships, Bursaries and Exhibitions through its teachings probably owe

to it a successful embarkation in life. Many famous and prominent men have been scholars of the School and the gentlemen who have occupied the honoured position of President of the Old Boys' Union are some of the School's most worthy sons. In the ranks of the Old Boys' Union are Old Boys the School is proud to claim, and one need only look at the list of Life Members of the Union to realise the interest and keenness shown by Old Boys in the welfare of their School.

The growth of the Old Boys' Union is no less remarkable than that of the School. Its membership has grown, and its revenue has increased from £22/1/- in 1892-93 to £820/11/6 in 1932.

It is fitting that appreciation be here placed on record of the courtesy of the Mutual Life and

Citizens' Assurance Co., Ltd., in making its Board-room available for meetings of the Old Boys' Union Council over the greater number of years of its existence.

To mark the Jubilee Year, the Old Boys' Union held a "Jubilee Chocolate and Blue Ball" in July, which was the most brilliant function ever associated with the School. His Excellency the Governor, Sir Philip Game, and Lady Game honoured the function by their presence, and the attendance of six hundred people included representatives of every decade of the School's existence and of all other Great Public Schools.

Old Boys are proud of their School, and it is felt that the achievements recorded in this History amply justify their pride.

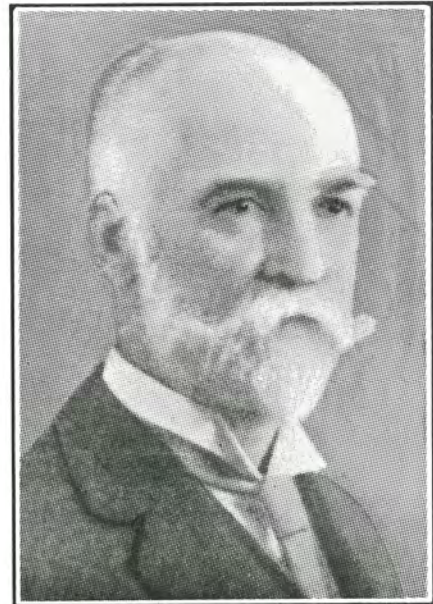

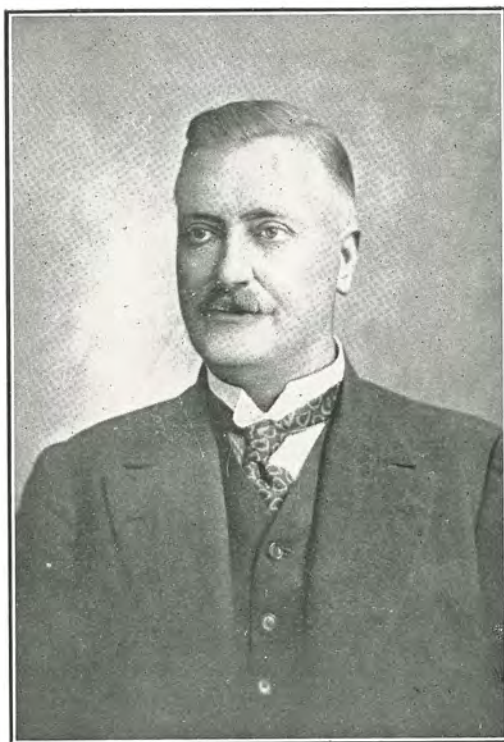

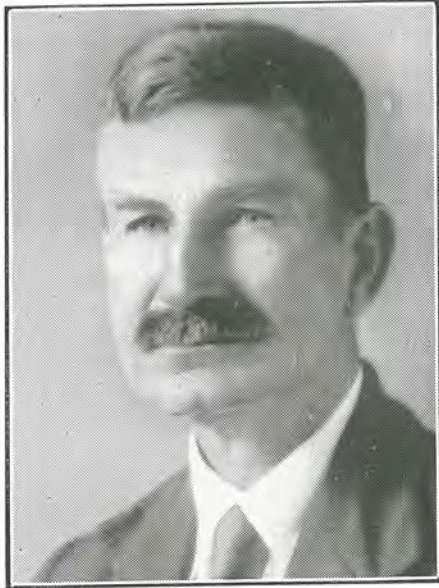

## The Sydney Boys' High School P. & C. Association.

IN 1925 the newly appointed Headmaster, Mr. G. C. Saxby, and Mr. C. A. Fairland, of the Old Boys' Union, called a meeting of parents to found a Parents and Citizens' Association.

The meeting decided to form such a body, and a constitution was drawn up and adopted. Since its foundation the Association has continuously grown in value and importance to the School, and the names of its executive officers throughout the years are published on the opposite page.

As the locality and lack of conveniences at the School building at Ultimo were not thought conducive to the welfare of the Association, it was decided to form branches in various districts. These branches organised and held various functions until 1928, when their activities were combined under the central Association, with its centre of activities at the new School building at Moore Park.

During the period 1925-1932 the Parents and Citizens' Association raised £2643/3/9, of which £2257/5/6 was spent for School purposes and some £220 on administrative expenses, printing and

stationery. Particulars of the items supplied to the School are published on page 85.

The revenue of the Association has come mainly from fêtes, dances and concerts—fêtes, £1172/11/8; dances, £908/15/11; concerts, £249/15/3. Donations and subscriptions to the end of 1932 total £268/17/10.

The voluntary work and enthusiasm of the parents in order to raise the Parents and Citizens' Association's revenue has been tremendous. They willingly undertook to organise the various fêtes and dances.

Mention should also be made of the members of the ladies' committees, who have provided lunches for visiting cricket teams and suppers for visiting debaters.

In the comparatively short period of its existence, the Parents and Citizens' Association has become an invaluable adjunct of the School, and, by its help in many directions, has been largely responsible for the School's great developments and achievements in recent years.
