

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School Captain's Report

he class of 1995 finishes its schooldays with mixed feelings. Whilst we are keen to advance to the next stage of our lives, it is nevertheless a wrench to leave the familiar ground of Sydney High School behind us.

There is no doubt that we are leaving behind a school which has changed dramatically over the six years of our attendance. Next year's new boys will have the benefit of the new sporting complex, the senior study centre, an updated library, an extended Abbotsford Centre and modern computer facilities.

Yet in some very important ways the school remains the same as when we first entered it – a proud academic and sporting tradition, a body of dedicated staff, a supportive P & C, Old Boys Union and High Club, countless opportunities provided by GPS & CHS competition and an extremely talented and diverse student body.

Sydney High is an excellent school but it always remains up to the individual student to try to obtain the most out of the opportunities the school provides, and the key to this is application and participation.

Let me refer you to our original school motto:

"Extremos pudeat rediise"

This can be translated as -

"Let it be shameful to be content to come in last"

This exhortation was spoken by Mnestheus to his crew as they were falling behind in a boat race at the funeral games of Anchises (Aeneas's father). The crew gave their best efforts and were rewarded by improving their position from last to second.

I believe this is still an appropriate motto because it is surprising what can be achieved by all of us when we try to maximise our potential, work co-operatively and aim to achieve the best result. We should never be content to just "go through the motions" in any facet of our school lives.

I could give numerous examples, from my year, of boys who have achieved at the highest level in their chosen pursuits during 1995. Their names appear elsewhere in *The Record* and we can all take pride in their success and level of achievement. However many other names come to mind of those who were not "high fliers" but who nevertheless worked hard, did their best, and in doing so they have earned the respect of their teachers and peers. I would also like to thank the Prefect Body for supporting and assisting me during the past year, in particular, Adair Durie (Senior Prefect) and Ben Clarsen (Vice Captain) and finally Mr Gainford whose support and guidance have been invaluable.

Principal's Address

join with Phillip Lyons in welcoming you all to The Great Hall tonight for Speech Night and Annual Prize Giving. Schools need their ceremonies in order to enhance their tradition and to enrich their culture. There is no more important ceremony in the life of High than this one, where outstanding achievers are acknowledged by the assembled School Family.

First of all I add my congratulations to the prize winners. I am very proud of each one of you. I am very proud of the teachers who have worked hard to get you to your standard of achievement. And I am very grateful for your contribution to the school's reputation and tradition. To the parents or guardians, grandparents, brothers and sisters and your friends who are here tonight I say that you, too, have every right to share in the satisfaction of achievement. No student achieves at this level without the support of others, generally the family. You yourselves may not have sat in the examination room, played in the orchestra or run onto the field but you have played your part. To you all, students and essential backup people, I say well done!

To those who have achieved their outstanding success at the Higher School Certificate I pay particular tribute. The Class of '95 did a lot of good things but probably the most important thing they did was to endorse, emphatically, the central purpose of the school which is to have students reach their academic potential. An analysis of the 1995 HSC will be distributed at tomorrow night's P&C meeting and will be published in next week's Newsletter to all families. The school can be pleased with the overall picture. I say in passing that members of the Class of '96 are aiming to do better. We'll see.

I would emphasise the importance of the last eighteen months in having all elements of the



School Family working together in strong endorsement of the school's Development Plan. Foundation in particular has come to be identified not only with sporting facilities but also with the academic core purpose of the school. I cannot overemphasise the importance of this alignment. The willingness of the P&C and Foundation to work together to make the Senior Study Centre a reality in 1996, rather than in several years' time, is a tribute to both organisations. I hope that students and their families appreciate what has been done for them. I acknowledge again, probably again to his discomfort, the leadership of Mr Phillip Whyte. I state also my gratitude to The High Club, represented here tonight by its President, Mr Ken Baret, for making a substantial contribution towards the completion of The Outterside Centre at Abbotsford. The extensions at Abbotsford will be opened next Friday evening, capping off an historic week for the school.

I wish to acknowledge the pivotal role played during 1995 by the School Council under the leadership of Mr John Goddard. Council has worked hard over past months to produce Sydney Boys High School - Towards 2000, a strategic plan that probably 300 or 400 people have contributed to. This important document will shortly be distributed to every family and to other interested parties. The school's annual management plans will be framed within the context of the strategic plan. Members of the School have worked out in broad terms what they want to achieve in the next five years. We must now work together to bring these plans and aspirations to fulfilment.

The Old Boys Union, led by Jim Norrie, has continued to provide support and advice to the school. I note with regret the recent passing of Wing Commander Jack Davenport, a distinguished Old Boy from the Class of 1935 at whose memorial service the school was represented. The school was always dear to Jack's heart and I understand that a portrait of him is to be presented to the school. On a happier note I am pleased to acknowledge the continuing interest of another distinguished Old Boy from the Class of 1949, James Wolfensohn. Jim, as many of you know, was appointed last year by President Clinton to be President of the World Bank, a job to which he has devoted himself totally. He retains a fondness for what he describes as "my favourite school in my favourite country". He is delighted with the progress of the arts in the school and is most supportive of a centre for the arts at the school. What we are seeing is an increasing interest in the school by Old Boys and a keener awareness of developments at the school.

I commend the work of the Creative Arts Council, chaired by Mrs Brenda Corea. This body will continue to guide arts policy within the school. It is a central tenet of the philosophy of this school that we are educating the whole boy. That is why we do not measure achievement, or make judgments about so-called value added elements, solely in terms of statistical outcomes, be they related to the HSC or not.

I make special mention here of a special person who is shortly to retire from teaching: Freya McKellar-White. I say simply that Freya McKellar-White has exemplified the very best of the teaching profession in her 14 years of service at High. From her example the boys have learned much, much more than a knowledge and love of art. In Freya they have seen an outstanding example of personal commitment and of leadership of an un-

assuming but purposeful kind. I hope that they have taken this example to heart. Freya has led the arts to a central position within this school from which they will never be dislodged. Many students owe a lot to her. I take this opportunity tonight to thank her on behalf of the School Family.

I commend also the work of the Sports Council, chaired by Mr Harry Stanley. That body will work to ensure that we have short, medium and long term plans for sport in general and for each sport in particular. Our competitiveness will be assured. From this year the Sports Council will have responsibility for the general sport budget. Harry Stanley has contributed to the deliberations of the Moore Park Management Plan and his ideas and concepts have been given serious consideration by the Centennial Park & Moore Park Trust.

I make brief reference to High's participation in the competition of the AAGPS. One still hears from time to time that GPS is elitist. Well, in my six years' involvement in it to date I have found it to be lots of things but never elitist. It is demanding, time consuming and complex; it is hard work; it is challenging and testing; it asks a lot but it gives a lot. Let me illustrate by reference to a most intrepid group, the current 13D cricket team. To date the Ds have played 2 and won 2. The wins, however, are a bonus, over and above the camaraderie and friendship that are developing. This group of boys is still getting to know each other, having come from a number of primary schools. They come from a variety of ethnic backgrounds but no one notices, so keen are they on the common business of fearlessly taking on the opposition. High parents umpire and score for the team. A young Old Boy, Aaron Neal, coaches them. I am personally delighted to have been entrusted with the role of their manager. The enthusiasm of the boys is a delight. Their growing skill is reflected in the diminishing number of sundries conceded, though sundries remain a significant part of the opposition's score. The Ds play the game with comradeship and generosity of spirit. They take great pride in wearing the sky blue and chocolate colours of their new school. They play an ego-free brand of cricket, quite unlike some of the cricket one sees on television. In the GPS, High is known and respected for good sportsmanship and for its level of school spirit and volunteer support. The 13Ds have already started to maintain that reputation. The Class of 2001 is off to a good start. One senses that the future of the school is in good hands.

I would now depart slightly from the script and ask the Sydney High cross country team to stand

and come forward, together with their coach Mr Mark Noonan. The team will represent Australia in international competition in Turkey in April. Here is your chance to acknowledge them and to wish them well.

I should make reference to the foreshadowed Centre for the Arts. You have heard the chamber choir tonight under Carol Hardy's direction and you have heard the stage band under Jason Cooney's direction playing a jazz standard Take the A Train. These groups have done their rehearsing in facilities built in 1928. The acoustics of our music facilities most definitely belong to 1928! We have nearly 200 boys involved in structured extra curricular music programs. We must now work to get them better facilities. Much thinking has gone into the planning of a centre for the arts. The bonus for the school is that a centre for the arts would allow our present art block to become part of a new library, replacing our present library which would have to be one of the least satisfactory school libraries in New South Wales. At a relatively small outlay we can convert the art block into a library stack, allowing the senior study centre to become a reading room while maintaining its present functions.

A centre for the arts, moreover, could be available to the general community as an arts facility, reinforcing the school's determination to be and to be seen as a good citizen of the inner city. Like the UTS/Sydney Boys High School Sports Stadium, a centre for the arts would provide a model of the

intensive use of a school facility for the wider community. The school site is beautifully located for such a purpose. It does not have neighbours to be affected by noise; and it does not create traffic problems. Thus the two main problems that beset any new development are eliminated at the outset.

I remain optimistic that we will be able to include a purpose-built performance space or even a theatre within the concept. When we achieve a centre for the arts we will have provided the school with the facilities it needs for the next 50 years.

My last point concerns relationships with universities. It makes sense for an academically selective school to seek to develop close relationships with universities and we have done this, especially in relation to the University of NSW and UTS. Another interesting possibility is now presenting itself. Mr Ralph Watson, our Careers Adviser, spent last weekend as a guest of Bond University and has come back with a range of interesting ideas which I propose to pursue. Little or nothing may come of this but it is worth pursuing nonetheless. I am impressed by the flexibility of Bond's thinking and by the level of support for their students. It may be that one can negotiate an agreement on mutually favourable terms. The first step is for me to seek a briefing from Bond University people and I will do that shortly. Whether or not the discussions proceed will depend on that briefing.

I thank you all for your continuing affection for and support of High during 1995. I look forward to a good year in 1996.

Overall

Specific analysis by faculty will be carried out by the Principal and Head Teachers. These discussions will look at issues such as appropriateness of placement of students in courses, distribution of subject scores etc. There is a general feeling around the school that the results of the Class of 95 were very good. The median TER was 87.8.

The Sydney Morning Herald continues to give prominence to TER scores, listing the top 5000 students. Our contribution was 76. The Herald never reports that three schools which figure prominently in their list actually recruit an additional class into Year 11. You can imagine the quality of their intakes! It would boost our list significantly if we were

to take an additional class into Year 11, picking and choosing from among the very best applicants from other schools, with an excellent chance that each one of the additional class would be in the top 10% of the HSC.

At the 1995 HSC, 13 students in the state tied for the highest rank. Of the 25 students who tied for 2nd highest rank, 4 came from High. Of the 25 students who tied for 3rd highest rank, 3 came from High. Viewed this way, High had 7 of the 63 top students in the HSC. For the first time in the history of the school we have had to declare a 4 way tie for Dux of the School. It would have been both unfair and Pythonesque to try to find a 'winner' from *The Magnificent Four*.

School Notes

- Taking the Shilling Christopher Duffy, Trent Dickeson, and Benjamin Ng were each awarded scholarships by the Australian Defence Force Academy (ADFA) to assist them in year twelve, and guaranteed places at the Academy in 1996. All are Under Officers in the Cadet Corps, Chris and Ben in our own Unit, and Trent in his local regional unit, 208 RCU.
- Old Boys I Also hearing the call was Peter Cumines (1987) who, having completed his studies in the law, has taken a commission as a Captain in the Legal Corps, after enduring a challenging three month course at Duntroon. He expects to be posted to Sydney in the new year.
- A Room with a View After three long years in the stairwell near Room 108 (formerly Room 1) the Prefects have at last got a new place to call their own, at least for the time being. The new Prefects' Room was until recently briefly known as Room 801, previously having been 35A, and long ago the soft craft room. It is situated under the Great Hall, just next to the previous Study (of fond memory), which is now the High Store
- Earth to Earth During the construction of the new Gymnasium, a large mound of earth grew behind the cricket nets. After sieving, it has been used to landscape the area between the main building and the tennis courts. A verdant new lawn is making valiant attempts to establish itself here.
- Room to Move Another minor consequence of the completion of the Gymnasium was that the portable classroom, which had been used as a wood technology room during refurbishment of the Technology and Applied Science area, could at last be removed from the grounds. It had been trapped by the building works. However the space it once occupied soon became part of the builders' yard for the construction of the Senior Studies Centre.
- Oarsome Reception On Saturday 2nd September a group of eight rowers attended the wedding of their coach, John Croll, an Old Boy and former vice-captain of the School. The boys, in uniform, formed a Guard of Honour with crossed sculling blades as the couple came out of the church, to the delight of the crowd, which included many well known members of Sydney Rowing Club.

- Glittering Prizes Recent Old Boys featured in the university medal tallies again this year. At the University of New South Wales Jason Hui and Marc Gorbatov shared the medal in Medicine, and Patrick Waugh won the medal in Anatomy. At Sydney University Ben Kremer took the medal in Organic Chemistry.
- Crest of a Wave Luke Hitchings (1993) joined the professional surfing circuit this year and is regarded very highly by those in the know. He is also studying building construction management.
- Oscar! Old Boy Tim Chappel (1984), and his partner Liz Gardener, won the Academy Award for Best Costume Design for the costumes in the Australian film *Priscilla: Oueen of the Desert*.
- Medal Scheme At the instigation of the Principal, discussions took place in the first half of the year to finalise the new School Awards system. Gold, Silver and Bronze medals will be awarded for participation or achievement in a number of areas of School and community life.
- Work Experience? As reported in Column 8 of the *SMH*, Marc Bennie found his duties in the SCG Trust office included making up the numbers in a corporate box annual match. His team was captained by state player Richard Chee Quee. Marc took the wicket of Phil Emery (caught), and made six runs not out.
- **Sporting Scholar** Ben Ebel was honoured to receive a Ben Lexcen Sporting Scholarship at the University of New South Wales in swimming.
- A Knight in the Field In October Ricky Lopis of Year 8 represented Australia in the junior division at the World Chess Championships held in Brazil
- Yes Prime Minister Leading mathematical ecologist (and Old Boy) Bob May was awarded an honorary doctorate by Sydney University this year. Upon his return to Britain he was appointed by John Major to the post of Chief Scientific Adviser to the Prime Minister and Head of the Office of Science and Technology.
- Banker to the World Former leading investment banker and chairman of the prestigious Kennedy Centre for the Performing Arts, James Wolfensohn, was appointed president of the World Bank from 1st June

Careers

Tertiary Awareness Symposium

This was once again a successful event. All NSW and ACT universities were represented, including faculty and student representatives from most. TAFE (the Sydney Institute in particular), the Australian Defence Force Academy, and private provider colleges completed a great tertiary representation.

Scholarships and Cadetships

Guest speakers from a number of institutions came to High this year. Our students have been well in the running for a number of accounting cadetships and University scholarships. Last year three boys won UNSW Co-op Scholarships and two obtained accountancy cadetships.

Interstate Study

1994 saw the University of Tasmania launch its northern campaign, and they targeted High amongst other schools. They were offering ten scholarships worth \$20 000 each, and one hundred and ten worth between \$7000 and \$9000. This year the University of Melbourne specifically targeted NSW as a place to catch academically gifted students, and so also came to High. The upshot is that a number of our old boys are studying interstate. This is a trend that has merit as boys seek the right course at the right institution for them.

Guest Speaker Program

This program is always a success and this year was no different. A total of eighteen speakers included a notable old boy engineering consultant.

Work Experience

One hundred and seventy-six boys from Year 10 completed a week of work experience, and twenty-four of these came back for a second week later in the year. Nikyar Elhami-Manesh put together a creditable written and photographic record of the week. Some Year 11 and 12 boys also undertook one to five day placements during the year.

Green Job Day

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Ten boys were successful in being selected for the Department of School Education's Green Job Day. They met and worked with people actually employed in environmentally related jobs, from the Land and Environment Court to a water research consultancy, including an excursion on the harbour

to test water quality.

E-Team

Matthew Malouf, Colin Tan and Michael Benjamin of Year 11, and two girls (Rowena Forsyth and Audrey Chung) from the Girls' School were chosen to represent the Sydney High Schools for the first time in this prestigious and worthwhile exercise. The Australian Quality Council in conjunction with the Department of School Education and various employers allow student teams of five to be assigned to an organisation. The team uses the principles and tools of quality control to help solve a real problem facing the host organisation. Our students thoroughly impressed their host organisation, the state Attorney-General's Department, with the quality of their presentation.

Software

The programs *Career Builder* and *Career Link* continue to prove to be very useful resources.

Year 12

The Year 12 interview system was again a vitally important method of providing help to seniors throughout the year, particularly in the areas of clarification of HSC goals, and UAC and TAFE selections. May they all fulfil their hopes and aspirations.

ANZAC Day Address

e arrived at Changi at 1 a.m. on the 21st December, 1943. The prisoners who had remained at Changi were expecting us and were anxious to find out about our friends who had gone north to work on the construction of the Burma-Thailand Railway some nine months before.

"They were waiting for us as we climbed or were lifted from the trucks which had brought us from Singapore Railway Station. We lined up on the road, some who found it difficult to stand sat on the ground but were still part of us.

"There was almost no conversation between the groups that night. To them we were unbelievable. Our emaciated, cadaverous bodies were covered in rags, we were all barefooted, with bandages covering our ulcers and we were almost all rotten with malaria and beri-beri. The shock to those who had remained at Changi evoked a gesture which was typical. All the small odds and ends which they had been saving for Christmas were given to the F Force survivors through the kitchens. Sadly, we were so ill we did not realise what had been given."

That extract is from Stan Arneil's diary of his prisoner of war experiences in Malaysia and Burma. Some Sydney High School old boys were among that group of Australian prisoners in Changi. I don't suppose that when they sat in this hall in the 1930's they would have been able to imagine what was in store for them. My own grandfather worked alongside Australians on the Burma Railway - he was a British prisoner of war.

So what is then the purpose of ANZAC Day and how is it relevant to us? Well firstly it is an acknowledgment and remembrance of the personal sacrifice and suffering of many Australian men and women during the armed conflicts which have occurred this century. They endured horrible events, many of course were killed while others suffered physical and psychological injuries which had a lasting effect on the rest of their lives.

Secondly, it is a tribute to what has become known as the ANZAC spirit. What you may ask is ANZAC spirit? Well, it's **not** some kind of stereotypical "digger" image as created by American film directors in the old war movies. The true ANZAC spirit was indeed created by the actions of the men themselves and was noted and reported on by other witnesses. The spirit which was displayed by our troops was a reflection of their social and cultural upbringing and has helped to give all Australians a sense of a national identity. Under extreme hardship our troops displayed qualities of fortitude, resourcefulness, good humour and concern and caring for their comrades, which was often the difference between death and survival.

Thirdly we need to remember the complete self-lessness of the ANZACs. They stood to gain nothing personally from their sacrifices except the knowledge that they were trying to make the world a better place for future generations. Their motivations were idealistic, they were inspired by duty to their country and countrymen, they believed in freedom and pursuit of the greater good.

There is a message here for us in ANZAC Day. We need to use the example set for us by the ANZACs - the selfless acceptance of their duty. We too need to look outside of ourselves and make sure we accept in the same spirit the challenges that our times and our society throws out to us.

What are these challenges? To sum up, they are what will make the world a better place for future generations of Australians. Things such as: preserving the environment, dealing with social problems such as poverty, homelessness and drug dependence, preserving ethical and moral standards, and using science to solve problems and not create more. Charles Bean, a war historian and war correspondent during World War One reported back to Australia in 1915 in these terms, "They are not heroes; they do not intend to be thought of or spoken of as heroes. They are just ordinary Australians doing their particular work as their country would wish them to. And pray God Australians in days to come will be worthy of them!"

That was 1915 and today is 1995 - 80 years on we are those "Australians in days to come."

The challenge is whether you can now be worthy of them!

School Award Scheme

he intention of the SBHS Award Scheme is to encourage and recognise participation in a range of activities. It is not an addendum to Prize Giving, Sports Blues etc. Thus membership of the 1st XV will count the same as membership of the 13C soccer team.

There will be three categories of award: bronze, silver and gold. A student who obtains two bronze awards will be eligible to seek a silver award. A student who qualifies for the silver award will be eligible to seek a gold award. It will not be possible to qualify for more than one award per annum and the criteria will not be cumulative beyond a single calendar year except in special circumstances, for example prolonged illness.

The scheme is essentially student-administered. Boys will seek to meet simple, well publicised criteria. It will be their responsibility to check eligibility. Awards will be presented at a special school assembly.

A student will be deemed ineligible for an award through suspension; persistent failure to wear the approved school uniform; persistent unpunctuality; consistently unacceptable behaviour; truancy; misbehaviour on an excursion or on public transport; or for any other reason deemed appropriate by the Awards Committee.

Disputes will be adjudicated by the Awards Committee consisting of Principal, Deputy Principal, Advanced Skills Teacher (School Awards), Chairman and one other from the Student Union.

To gain an award a student will need to prove eligibility in at least FIVE of the categories below in one calendar year.

1 Academic Achievement

- A student in Years 11 or 12 will need to be placed in the top 50% of students in 9 units or more
- A student in Years 7-10 will need to have achieved a grade of Credit or better in all his subjects.

The achievement will need to have been made in a single set of scheduled school examinations, which may include the Trial HSC.

2 Summer Sport

A student will need to have participated satisfactorily in a summer GPS sport or one of the following:

- A recognised school non-GPS sport eg water polo, fencing.
- Regional, State or National selection arising out of membership of the school.

3 Winter Sport

A student will need to have participated satisfactorily in a winter GPS sport or in one of the following:

- A recognised school non-GPS sport eg small bore shooting, snow skiing, fencing
- Regional, State or National selection arising out of membership of the school.

Note that the sport in category 3 cannot be the same sport as in category 2.

4 Carnivals

A student will need to have participated satisfactorily in the three annual school carnivals. The requirements are as follows:

- Athletics Carnival: Compete in three events.
- Swimming Carnival: Compete in one event.
- Cross Country Carnival: Compete in one race.

5 Cultural Activities

A student will need to have participated satisfactorily in one of the following:

- School Musical production.
- A school instrumental group.
- · A school choral group.
- A formal school drama production (excluding drama class productions).
- A regional or state performing group arising out of membership of the school.
- The Schools Spectacular.

6 Other School Activities

A student will need to have taken an active part in two of the following:

- · School Prefect.
- · Delegate to Student Union.
- Cadets.
- Record Committee.
- Badges Committee.
- Hall Monitor.
- Library Monitor.
- Computer Room Monitor.
- · Peer Support leader.
- · Archivist.
- Environment Committee.
- Calendar Committee.

7. Other Competitive Activities

A student will need to have participated satisfactorily in one of the following:

- Chess Club.
- Representative debating.
- · Representative public speaking.
- Tournament of the Minds.
- · Mock trial competition.
- · Latin or Classical Greek Reading Competition.
- Assistance with coaching a sporting or debating team.

8 Activities Arising from Membership of the School

A student will need to meet two of the following criteria:

- Entry of satisfactory standard in two of the school's Writer of the Month competitions.
- Gain a grade of at least Distinction in a national standardised test.
- Gain a grade of at least High Distinction or a Prize in a second national standardised test.
- Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme.
- Gain at least a commendation in the Herald Young Writer of the Year competition.
- Have an entry accepted into the ICI Young Playwright of the Year competition.
- Have an entry accepted into Art Express.
- Have an entry accepted into the Industrial Technology exhibition..
- Winner of a competition entered as a member of the school eg Municipal art competition, RAS.
- Gain at least a commendation in a competition such as the RAHS Essay competition.
- Participation in a Latin Play or its equivalent.

9 School and Community Service

A student will need to meet two of the following criteria:

- Participation in a working bee at the school, at McKay or at Abbotsford.
- Participation in a second working bee at the school, McKay or Abbotsford.
- Participation in twelve hours of School parking.
- Participation in Clean Up Australia.
- Participation in a school-approved community service project.
- Participation in a School Service Activity (eg flag-raising, etc)

To facilitate introduction of the Awards Scheme the following special provisions will apply:

- It will be possible for the current Year 12 to qualify for a Gold Award in 1995 but only on 1995 achievements.
- It will be possible for the current Year 11 to qualify for a Silver Award in 1995 and for a Gold Award in 1996.
- It will be possible for the current Year 10 to qualify for a Bronze Award in 1995, a Silver Award in 1996 and a Gold Award in 1997.

Sydney High School Cadet Unit

he Cadet Unit began 1995 with approximately thirty recruits and a highly motivated senior platoon. As in previous years, first term training was directed at preparation for the Annual Bivouac, three days of intensive field training held at Fiddletown early in second term. For the junior platoons this involved instruction in basic signalling skills, navigation, basic first aid, fieldcraft and drill. Senior Platoon training was devoted towards specialist training in the fields of signals, medics or assault pioneering. This resulted in a highly successful unit bivouac with cadets gaining valuable field experience and all levels of command further developing their skills in leadership and instruction or in organisation and administration.

No sooner had the unit returned from the field, than training resumed, this time directed towards Annual Camp held in the last week of second term. This is essentially the culmination of the year's training with all members of the unit putting into practice everything they have learned in the six nights and seven days they spend in the field. The training area for Camp was located in the Meryla State Forest near the Southern Highlands. The area was practically tailor-made for the unit's needs, offering an abseiling site, excellent panoramic views,

multiple roads and four-wheel drive tracks for safety considerations and several cosy locations for overnight 'locs' on trek such as the old quarry which accommodated 1 Platoon on their trek. Highlights of Camp included the arrival of several recent old boys, chiefly WO2 Luke Bannister, Ssgt. Luke Farago and WO2 Sam Haeata with his 'car' (perhaps best described as a stereo system on wheels). Throughout the week 1 Platoon were called on to conduct numerous salvage operations, rescuing the intrepid driver and his mud-wrestling 'tank' from the vile clutches of countless vehicle devouring bogs and in one instance lifting the front end of the vehicle off a tree stump after its driver had 'parked' on it, albeit unintentionally ("I didn't see it - what a stupid place to put a tree stump anyway!"). Although greeted by rain, this year's Annual Range Practice held on the last Sunday of term was brightened by the unit obtaining the use of several L1A1 SLRs in conjunction with the usual complement of Lee-Enfield .303 in rifles. Those who weathered the heavy rain were well rewarded with the chance to try their hand at shooting with the SLR with several good groupings recorded, and Cdt M. Pollock being awarded Skill-At-Arms.

On Sunday 6th August, the unit took part in a parade held by the Kensington Branch of the RSL to commemorate the 50th Anniversary of the end of World War Two. Marching down a one kilometre stretch of Anzac Parade with the unit flag in front and accompanied by marching bands, those who participated were a credit to the unit as well as the school with several compliments being received from parade organisers impressed by the dress, drill

and bearing of those from the unit on parade.

Although small in number compared to other school cadet units, notably the Sydney Grammar School Cadet Corps, the unit has always had a reputation for excellence. Evidence of this can be found by looking at this year's (as well as previous years') Combined Promotion Course results. SHS candidates consistently outperformed SGS candidates in most fields. Noteworthy performances include Cdt S. Lee and Sgt P. Nicholas who finished first in the Junior NCO Course and second in the CUO Course respectively. These results emphasise the high standards found in the unit with respect to discipline and training among other things.

On behalf of the unit and my fellow officers I wish to thank all those who have supported the unit throughout this year. Special thanks must be given to Lt Ian Barratt and Lt Richard Young for their assistance in the running of the unit. Above all, special mention must be made of Captain Mark Gainford, who after twenty years of service, eighteen of them as Officer Commanding of this Unit, will resign from his position at the end of the year. Without him the unit would certainly not have the high standards of tradition, training and discipline that it has today. Capt. Gainford will leave the unit with a good future based on the firm footing he has provided it.

School Council Annual Report

ineteen ninety-five was a year that has seen both consolidation and development. The most significant event of the year was the ratification of the revised constitution of Council following a lengthy period of discussion among the constituent groups and subsequent negotiation with the Department of School Education.

Council addressed the issue of school uniform during the year and came down heavily in favour of approving current uniform policy. Council noted the firm direction given by the Director-General of School Education allowing school communities to set their own standards of uniform. The Principal was given Council's authority to take firm action against the wearing of earrings and the like.

A policy was adopted for the operation of the McKay Canteen.

The 1995 school budget was approved and endorsed. Council noted with increasing concern the downturn in income from voluntary contributions following publicity which emphasised their voluntary nature. It was noted that this school had traditionally made generous provision for families in financial difficulty and that the kinds of problems that had arisen elsewhere in respect of methods of collection had not arisen here. It was Council's view that the school should have its backing to maximise income from voluntary contributions.

It was noted that a comprehensive review of the Prize Account remains to be completed. Mr Ken Matthews had done a certain amount of work before his untimely death and Ms Kerri Long had gone so far with it before her resignation. The task, however, remained to be completed. To this end Council organised a review of the Prize Account with a view to its completion at the earliest practicable time.

Council noted with gratitude the donation of two air tickets from Singapore Airlines to enable the P&C to enhance its fund raising. It is understood that there is some prospect of the donation being repeated in 1996. Council noted the issuing by the Department of School Education of a revised Code of Conduct for students and the requirement that the school revise its code of conduct in the light of this new statement. The exercise is to be initiated in first term, 1996 and Council looks forward to playing its part in this important statement.

The construction of bus bays in Anzac Parade is looming as an important matter and Council endorsed the Principal's action in writing to the Roads and Traffic Authority to this effect. It was noted that a submission from both schools would be entered as part of the foreshadowed environmental impact statement for the Eastern Distributor.

Council noted continuing improvements to the school environment and wished to encourage voluntary efforts by school family members. To that end Council endorsed a plaque scheme whereby contributors could be acknowledged.

A parking policy was developed and approved in order to rationalise this operation.

Council created sub-committees for specific tasks during the year to coordinate preparation of the Strategic Plan and to consider the school budget.

Sydney Boys High School 2000: a Strategic Plan was prepared as a major statement of direction for the school. Council resolved to issue the plan as a good quality publication and to distribute a copy to each member of the school family. Students, staff, parents, Old Boys and constituent organisations contributed to this important document. Annual management plans will be framed within its general context. Budget and resourcing decisions will be taken the same way.

I put on record my thanks to members of Council for their conscientious attention to the work of Council during 1995. Next year, the first year of the Strategic Plan, promises to be just as challenging.

Principal's Speech

adies and Gentlemen, it gives me great pleasure to welcome tonight our special guests, the Hon John Aquilina, Minister for Education and Training and Professor Peter Johnson, Chancellor of The University of Technology, Sydney and distinguished Old Boy of High.

I take this opportunity to wish you well, Mr Aquilina, in the administration of your important portfolio. It is clear from policy statements that you have in mind a number of significant initiatives, some of them in the vital areas of computers and literacy. There will be strong support from teachers and parent groups for initiatives in these areas.

Sydney Boys High is, in word and in deed *and* in fact, a government school and proud of it. Like other schools in the government system, it is trying to do its job to the best of its ability. Through the school's unique historical link with the GPS sporting organisation, however, it also provides an important bridge of communication and understanding with the non government sector of education. Part of the tradition of the school derives from its unique involvement in the GPS. It is pleasing to note, therefore, the Premier's love of history and his strong sense of the value and importance of heritage and tradition in the life of the community and its elements.

To you, Mr Chancellor, I say welcome back for the second time this year. It is, as always, a delight to have you with us. The community of interest between our institutions of learning I believe to be a good thing. It will eventually find a level that is beneficial but not burdensome to both institutions.

I welcome also Professor Gus Guthrie, Vice Chancellor of UTS; Professor Tony Blake, Deputy Vice Chancellor of UTS; Mr Peter Tynan, President of UTS Union; board members of UTS Union; and Mr Michael Georgeson, Secretary-Manager of UTS Union.

I add a welcome to Mr Don Goodsir, Director of Schools, Woollahra; Mrs Margaret Varady, Principal of Sydney Girls High School; Mr John Goddard, Chairman of Sydney Boys High School Council; Mr Phil Whyte, President of our P&C Association and Chairman of the Sydney High School Foundation; Maj General Jim Norrie, President of the Old Boys Union; and Mr Ken Baret, President of The High Club.

I welcome all of you who have come tonight to see this wonderful new facility officially opened. And I thank everyone who has contributed to the occasion including our school's concert band under the baton of Ms Debra Gilmore.

Sydney Boys High School seeks to educate the whole boy: intellectually, aesthetically, physically. The school's primary mission is academic achievement and we provide a wide range of opportunities for boys with particular intellectual gifts and talents. There is also strong commitment to the arts and I note in passing that 170 boys are involved in musical or choral performance groups in 1995 and that the school finally has, by dint of extremely hard work from a lot of people, its symphony orchestra. Tonight, however, is essentially a sporting occasion and an endorsement of the school's commitment to sport and to individual fitness.

With this building we have solved a major problem. The old gymnasium, the photographs remind us, was a building in decay, a fact which demolition confirmed. Within five years it would have needed a very large sum of money spent on it. Then along came the joint venture and the rest, as they say, is history. The school's Development Plan has been able to proceed in the knowledge that the stadium has been taken care of.

The project has gone well, probably because it was a good idea in the first place. One doubts there is a plot of ground, public or private, that will be better and more efficiently utilised than this one. The concept of this joint venture can be summed up in simple terms: it makes sense. I say in passing that it may also make sense for future sharing of other sporting facilities with UTS, beginning with the tennis courts.

The stadium will provide a wonderful sporting venue for the 2030 students on the two campuses at Moore Park. It will allow for occasional use by primary schools in the vicinity. There may be certain primary and secondary representative sporting carnivals that will find themselves attracted to this venue. Sydney High has a tradition of making its facilities available to others. The McKay Playing Fields have been used by school and community groups. On Australia Day this year McKay number one ground, at the request of The Australia Day Council, was the venue for a cricket match between the Lord Mayor's XI and an Aboriginal Australian XI. The boatshed at Abbotsford has been

used as recently as a month ago for accommodation by a country government school. That was not the first time nor will it be the last. The Great Hall is the headquarters of the Metropolitan East Regional Choir and is used by Bourke Street Public School for its annual prize giving. The school has been used for some years as the venue for selection trials for NSW Schools debating teams. And so on.

The stadium will provide students of UTS with a first class facility close to their place of learning. It will provide selected outside sporting bodies with an excellent venue. It will provide a training venue for the Olympics. In short, the UTS/Sydney Boys High Stadium is a significant addition to the sporting facilities of New South Wales.

The first impact of the stadium on this school will be the introduction of volleyball to the range of sports that the school offers. I have no doubt that badminton will follow. In the classroom upstairs will be computer facilities to enable the boys to establish and monitor their fitness levels.

To Michael Georgeson I give warm thanks. It has been a pleasure to deal with you, Michael. Personally and professionally, I value your friendship. To Mr Peter Tynan, President of UTS Union and to the board of UTS Union, congratulations on your vision. History will judge you well on this project. A big thank you as well to the staff of UTS Union and to staff members of the school who joined with UTS people and others in the design of the stadium.

A word of congratulations to the project consultants, Grindleys. I do hope there are other projects in the public domain that come your way. Special thanks to Mr Bob Southerton, Managing Director and to Mr Alan Carstens, Project Manager. And a big thank you to Mr Bruce Mason, the foreman. In his daily dealings with me, Bruce was forebearing, understanding, patient, tolerant and courteous and showed that he could suffer a fool gladly. I imagine he treated the rest of you, fools and non fools, the same way. To the subcontractors, a big thank you, especially the two brothers who did the floor. To watch them work was like watching Michaelangelo work. And a word of praise to the man who drove the little grader, a man known to me only as H, who was extraordinarily generous with his time and his energy. His friendly wave and G'day were typical of the goodwill on this building site.

Within the Department of School Education I must thank Mr Alex Scott, now ADG in North

Coast Region, for his support and encouragement in the initial stage; Mr Denis Clancy, Director of Finance, for his carriage of the project through the Regional Office; Mr Bob Demkiw, who helped at vital stages; and, in particular, Mr Brian Jarman, Assistant Director of Properties. I have worked with Brian before. He is a good operator with a genuine commitment to education and a strong commitment to the efficient use of public resources. To you, Brian: *Thanks, mate.*

I thank the School Family for their support of the project. In particular I thank Mr Phillip Lambert, immediate past Chairman of Council; Mr Phil Whyte and the P&C; Mr Robert Mitchell, immediate past Chairman of Foundation; Major General Jim Norrie and the Old Boys Union; Mr Ken Baret and the members of The High Club; and all members of staff who have contributed to the project and who have supported it so enthusiastically.

I thank the May family, strong supporters of High, for their attendance tonight. Alan May, a distinguished Old Boy, left money to construct the original weights room in the old gymnasium. The room inevitably suffered demolition with the rest of the gymnasium. I feel sure that Alan May, an economist by training, would have understood. An undertaking was given, however, for the weights room in the sports stadium to be rededicated to the memory of Alan May. A ceremony was held at 7:15 tonight and Mr Phil May performed the rededication.

Mr Terry Meakin played a catalytic role in the genesis of the project. Terry and his wife Robyn are typical of the many good families of High who give unstintingly and unselfishly of their time and their sweat simply because they believe in the school and have the school's interests at heart. They and their family have a characteristic that all staunch and loyal High families have: one blue eye and one chocolate eye. To you, Terry: *Thanks, mate.*

The pleasure for me personally in this stadium will come when I see basketball and volleyball and badminton being played and, importantly, being enjoyed by the boys. That is the special reward of Principalship. That's what brings Principals to work each day.

Mr Minister and Mr Chancellor, tonight is an important event in the history of the school. On behalf of the School Family of Sydney Boys High School, I thank you both for being part of it.

The boys and girls spent the entire second term engrossed in the production preparation for *The Caucasian Chalk* Circle by Bertolt Brecht. The performances gathered full houses which was good for the students as they not only acted but also produced, directed and designed the whole show. As a result Daniel, Andrew and Ben received scholarships to the Australian Theatre for Young People, Daniel and Ben for acting and Andrew for technical production.

The five boys from Year 11 and the entire Year 10 Drama class attended the Metropolitan East Regional Drama Camp this year. There they participated in workshops on improvisation, character, Commedia del 'Arte, script writing and play building. Two of the playbuilt pieces were selected to be shown at the 1995 Festival of Drama at the Newtown Studio Theatre. *Cluedo* and *Aeroplane* were performances written and directed by the students at the camp. The Year 11 Drama class from SGHS also presented a scene from *The Caucasian Chalk Circle*.

Steven Brandon and Andrew Ivanov were also chosen to attend the State Drama Camp. This year the camp was exclusively for Year 11 drama students drawn from across the state. The camp concentrated on the development of playbuilding skills which are essential for the HSC course. During the camp, professional industry tutors gave workshops in movement, mime, improvisation and characterisation. The camp was treated to a performance of *Saint Joan* at the Sydney Opera House, as well as *The Real Thing* at the Marion St. Theatre.

Sydney Girls High had their annual Shake-speare Festival for which students could enter in the categories of duologue and groups scene. Daniel Fitzgibbon and Yi Chen won the duologue category with a scene from *Romeo and Juliet*. Steven Brandon, Steven Laurent, Nikki Marczak and Bryoni Trezise won the group scene category, performing *A Midsummer Night's Dream*. These both went on to perform at the Regional Shakespeare Festival and *A Midsummer Night's Dream* was highly commended.

At the Sydney High Student Art Show a group of year ten students performed *Toyz in the Hood* a play written by student Jon Berengut. Steven Brandon and Ben Wood performed a classic Monty Python sketch *The Book Shop*.

China Exchange, October 1995

THE UNKNOWN JOURNEY

he inaugural trip to China opened many doors for the school and students who participated. In 1995, Mandarin students from Years 8 to 10 were able to obtain a learning experience like no other.

Many left Australia for the first time, leaving behind their way of life in preparation for the strange new world. No tears were shed however, since many of the students were too excited to think about missing their families for nineteen days.

This was a first for many students and it was the first for the school. When we left no one could foresee the journey that lay ahead. To many this was just another simple holiday, but by the end of the trip we all knew better.

The group of twenty-five students were led by Mr Davies and Ms Xayasy. Add to this a handful of parents giving a group of over thirty. Such a large group is always hard to manage, but surprisingly there were no major mishaps.

One of the greatest learning experiences for us was in Shenzhen, a fast growing city, just a train ride from Hong Kong. Students were able to stay with students from the Shenzhen Experimental School. The school itself has facilities which match our own, placing it among the best schools in China. Students there welcomed us with open arms. Their hospitality was amazing - not one student could say he did not enjoy the stay.

Students from both schools were able to participate in cross-cultural games, including basketball and soccer, as well as a concert where we sampled the best from eastern and western cultures. Even though we did not always win, all the students felt the importance of the friendly competition, strengthening the bonds between the two schools and hopefully the bonds between the two countries. Unfortunately our Shenzhen stay had to end, the three short days flew by in minutes. Many students felt the need to come back on future holidays, urging the teachers to extend their stay at the school for future visits. Friendships which were only allowed a few days to bloom, had strengthened into inseparable bonds. Many hope that our Chinese billets will be able to visit us just as we visited them.

The group then moved onto Guilin, where we were able to experience the night life of China, from the dancing to very distressing scenes, such as birds

in cages waiting to be purchased and a man drinking a glass of snake's blood.

We then moved into a very small town named Yangsu. There is an old Chinese saying about Yangsu:

Guilin has the best scenery under the sky, Yangsu has the best scenery in Guilin.

We greatly appreciated the chance for a bicycle tour of this small town and its environs. Even though a few had never ridden a bicycle before, they quickly got the hang of it. There was a case of a student falling into an unmarked ditch but incidents like that were rare. After riding for over three hours, Ms Xayasy and a few others resorted to taking a taxi back.

The group moved onto Xian, the site of the Terracotta Warriors, life-size clay statues of men buried with the emperor, so that the emperor could have a place like earth for him to rest underground. Unfortunately, photos were not allowed, but nevertheless many clicked away anyway.

Clicking away led some into trouble. At the Prince Zhang Huai Tomb, a member of our group was caught videotaping the museum, which was not allowed. It was argued that videotaping was not the same as taking photos but this argument was not accepted by the guards. Risking hefty fines and the confiscation of the tape, our travel guide came to the rescue. Speaking a different dialect, the guards and the guide came to a deal, the offender would slip 100 yuan (around \$15 Australian) to the guard. This experience gave the group an insight which could not be gained from any text book.

On the first day at Beijing, the students saw something that was an utter amazement, and a much needed relief from Chinese cuisine, a Kentucky Fried Chicken store. This find bought uncontrollable joy, like hunger crazed maniacs we went for the store. Some students had limited ability to speak Mandarin fluently, but this did not hinder them from purchasing, with skilled pointing and waving, their desired purchases.

Beijing not only had KFCs, there were also McDonalds and Pizza Huts. There were many unsuccessful attempts to get pizza delivered, but when the correct phone number was found, the students decided Chinese cuisine was not that bad after all.

Tian An Men Square was much more peaceful than the last time I saw it on television. It was very crowded, and taking photos became a challenging task. Dodging and weaving out of others' camera view, whilst attempting to take your own without the added extra nimbleness and diplomacy, but by the end of the trip many of us have perfected this skill.

There is another Chinese saying:

A man is not great unless he has visited the Great Wall.

That is exactly where we went next. The Great Wall is a very tricky enterprise, more steps than one can imagine, due to the hilly terrain of China. Obviously we did not complete the 3000 km that

the Great Wall stretches, as we only had four hours. Many of us could not take the pressure, returning to the bus after a few towers. Some, inspired by Mr. Davies, managed to make eight or nine towers in that time, no mean feat by anyone's standards.

Like all good things this trip had to come to an end. This fruitful experience taught us in many ways, strengthened friendships not just among ourselves but with our new friends 10 000 km away. Everyone thought this experience was successful for different reasons - some were just glad they could practise their Mandarin! Also, thanks to the teachers and parents who put up with twenty-six junk-food crazed Sydney Boys High students for nearly three weeks. Hope to do it again soon.

Orchestra

his year was one of the best years ever as far as the development of the orchestra is concerned. The group has improved in all areas, and has come a long way since its humble beginnings. As a result of long hours of practice, many morning rehearsals and much assistance from our conductor, Mrs Gilmore, we are now playing as a cohesive group, rather than as a group of individuals.

This year saw the addition of several musicians to the orchestra's ranks. The departure of some of our Year 12 members was a great loss to us, but this only furthered our determination to work harder. Our Year 7 members have settled in and now feel that they are part of the orchestra, and are accepted as important members. People from other musical ensembles have also been invited to join the orchestra this year in recognition of their talent and ability. These factors have all balanced out to make for a well rounded group with a wide range of abilities and skills.

The pieces of music that the orchestra worked on this year would have to be the most challenging that we have received yet. They required us to learn many new techniques and fine tune those already possessed. Most importantly, though, the new music called for extra practice as a group to create a solid, and connected feel to our performances. although there are many different levels of skill present in our ensemble, ranging from the complete beginners to those who have studied music for most of their lives, it was important that the whole orchestra, and not just a select few experts, contributed to the overall sound in order for it to be full bodied and rich.

The orchestra rehearses once every week, although on most occasions only the string players needed to attend. Other members, such as those playing woodwind or brass or percussion instruments, were only required to come to rehearsals at the request of our conductor. This was because the string section forms the main body of the orchestra and much work was put in by our conductor to achieve the sound which was required of it. The woodwind and brass sections of the orchestra were assumed to be practising their parts in the music at home. These sections needed more individual work by the instrumentalists to perfect. When we rehearsed together everything seemed to come to-

gether and the guidance of our conductor improved our combined sound further.

There were several performances for audiences, such as during the Winter Festival, and at the final concert at music camp. On all occasions, our hard work and long hours of practice showed through, and there were very few errors. However when things did go wrong, such as errors of note-reading or timing, they only heightened our understanding of the things which needed to be improved for the next performance.

Summing up, this year represented a major leap forward for the orchestra in all areas. None of this of course could have occurred without the hard work of all our members and, most importantly, Mrs Gilmore. As our conductor she has had to prepare the music we play, attend every rehearsal and spend time correcting our mistakes, and lead us on to cover new territory.


Chamber Choir – 1995




Intermediate A Chess





We couldn't see it and didn't know the result of it until the next day when Peter found out from one of the cross-country runners that Newington had beaten Ignatius! We had done it! We had won the GPS and we couldn't have been happier.

During the year we were also involved in the Karl Cramp competition. The team of Sherman Lai (1st Speaker), Prashant Khera (2nd Speaker), Alexander Daniel (3rd Speaker) and Adam Malouf (4th Speaker) completed our round-robin with ease, defeating Maroubra, and Leichhardt and winning on forfeit against Marrickville. This meant that we were now in the regional final, to be held the following Friday out at Peakhurst.

The debate against Sydney Tech was one which we would all rather forget. For starters the person who decided to have the debate start at 10:00 a.m.





1st innings loss



On behalf of the team I would like to thank Mr Hassall and Mr Legg for coaching throughout the season.




nfortunately, the 1995 season was an extremely short one. We were only able to play three matches; all the rest were washed out.



We improved with every match, culminating with a victory in our last game. Every member of the team enjoyed the season, and just wanted to keep on playing.



Rowing

Captain of Boats

he achievements and disappointments of the 1995 Rowing season are detailed in two parts. The first is an edited version of the address given by Gareth Morgan, Captain of Boats, at the Annual Rowing Assembly, a week before the Head of the River finals. It is followed by detailed results of the Head of the River Regatta.

Atmosphere at the Sheds

The camaraderie at the sheds this season has been better than any before in my experience. Off the water everyone is good mates and the Shed as a whole gets along very well. In previous years there was fierce rivalry between the crews but this year all crews are encouraging each other on, genuinely happy for those performing well, and genuinely concerned when things go wrong. This has promoted a friendly atmosphere and meant that we all enjoy time spent at our home away from home. But the mateship doesn't stop with just the crews. The coaches have been supportive of everyone and I think every crew considers their coach to be one of their mates. Also the bond with those who help out at the Sheds is very strong and the encouragement and support from all the parents has ensured that the bond extends right throughout the rowing family.

There is a great selection of personalities this year ranging from those with good humour to those with poor humour, those who make things happen, those who wonder what happened. But everyone has contributed to form a bond between friends that will remain intact well after the finish of the season.

Dedication

For anyone to succeed in anything, I think we all know there has to be a huge amount of dedication and commitment towards their goal. In the case of rowing there must be underlying dedication from all ten members of the crew, being the eight rowers, the coxswain, and the coach, and in the case of the fours, all six members. The commitment this season has been unsurpassed. The rowers of the top few crews are selected on their sculling ability and their fitness is tested on ergometers. With such pressure on all the rowers to make these crews we saw them doing fitness training since the end of last

season, we saw them doing twenty kilometre sculling races two to three times per week and we saw them doing unending weights sessions to build them up for the tasks ahead.

These rowers have endured pain this season that rivals any years of the past. The determination to make their crews and to succeed in one race, on 1st April, saw some out at the Sheds at sunrise even on Christmas Day. The sculling, runs and weights combined with the pain that the coxswains and coaches have inflicted upon them in the Fours and the Eights have led to Sydney High producing its toughest fleet this year in the history the sport.


Standard of the Season

Each year the standard of the GPS competition improves dramatically. It happens in Rugby, it happens in Cricket, Basketball and Waterpolo and any other sport you could name. Rowing is no exception to this. Most crews put on the water during a season would be capable of winning the Head of the River of the previous season. This was the case with the Sydney High VIII last season, the season before, and for as long as I can remember. This goes to show how intense the competition is and how every stroke that each crew makes during the season will contribute to that crew's result when the big day comes.

The training of this year's fleet has supported that theory and has allowed Sydney High to once again be up with the competition. In the First VIIIs and in the Second VIIIs the competition is closer and faster than it has ever been. Almost every school has had its share of victories in these disciplines and now, at the end of the season different crews are hitting their peaks, which means the outcome of the race will be determined by the race itself. There are no longer any preset winners – it now comes down to the crew that is the toughest and wants it the most on the day.

Crews and Coaches

One crew that will certainly put the effort in is the Fourth IV. At the CHS State Championships these guys came within two metres of beating the Taree First IV for first place. This crew is dedicated and they will be doing their best over the next two weekends. With a stylish rower at either end and a very powerful middle pair, the Fourth IV will be driving themselves all the way down the course under the

influence of Neville Morgan's coaching.

The Third IV is an enthusiastic crew that will be pushing themselves to the limit both in the heats tomorrow, and in the Head of the River finals next Saturday. They are coached by Old Boy Darren Coleman whom I had the honour of coxing two years ago. He knows all the tricks of the trade and this team is determined to make the Head of the River their best result yet.

The Second IV are another great combination. With the experience of coxswain Willie Chi they will be coping well with the pressures of the Head of the River. They work well as a crew and are determined to make their best performances those at Penrith. Their style has been worked on by the experienced coach and great personality Reg Stride. These six people form a great team and will be pushing themselves in the name of Sydney High.

The First IV have been getting the results since the first race of this term. They have made the final of every race they have entered, but have so far been denied a victory by Shore. Under the experienced and influential coaching of Mr Barris this crew looks as though they will hit their peak just at the right time. With a Sydney High First IV not having won a Head of the River since 1976, this crew is looking for a victory and they have more determination to get it than any other First IV in the GPS. They have the potential to win the Head of the River.

The Sydney High Second VIII is the biggest Second VIII on the river. These guys have the grunt to bunt dinghies skyward and leave everything else trembling in their wake. With the technical knowhow and the enthusiasm of Roger Jackson, their coach, these guys can really rip the oars through the water. They have more psych than any of their rivals and the undying determination to achieve their goal of a Head of the River victory will be supported by the combination of experience and raw power. These guys are just off the leading crews but have been improving many lengths per week. Their determination will see them peak at the Head of the River and with this in mind they have a good chance of taking out the major final.

The First VIII this year is the fittest, the most experienced, and one of the biggest crews on the river. After a brilliant start to the season we had a performance slump, but the experience of this crew and the pure determination to win the Head of the River saw us pull out of that slump to be better than ever before. We have pulled back four lengths per week on the opposition and are about to hit our

peak and overtake everyone. We have the knowledge and dedication of our coach John Croll who has stuck by us and driven us up to where we are now. For most of the crew this will be our last Head of the River. A Sydney High First VIII has not won the Head of the River in thirty-six years, and we are going to put Sydney High's name back in the record books.

Last Saturday we made the final of the Riverview Gold Cup. From a fleet of twenty we made it through to the top four, which no Sydney High VIII has done in a long time.

The Head of the River

For those of you who have never been to a Head of the River, you have no idea how big it is. It is huge. It has been described as being the biggest event in the GPS calendar. Eight of the nine GPS schools turn out to determine which school has the best crew in each discipline. For several of the seven other schools, Scots, Newington, Grammar, Shore, St Ignatius, Kings and St Josephs, it is compulsory for the boys to attend. There is a grass hill on one bank of the river and the entire population of the GPS fills it. The noise and the atmosphere are unrivalled.

These guys that you will see before you have been training, some of them have been training for five years for this one race. It means everything in GPS rowing. These guys have endured pain, suffered hardships and given up a huge amount of their time so that they can represent your name in this one race. Every year we paddle down to the start and the first crowd we pass is Sydney High, you guys have the best position, right on the finish line. But every year, although we get psyched up by those who do support us, we always feel a hint of disappointment at the fact that every one of our rivals is represented and cheered on by at least a thousand supporters. Sydney High sometimes has about two hundred. This year we want it to be different. These guys have endured pain so that they can represent you, this school, in their one race, the Head of the River. When these guys come down the river next Saturday they are going to feel a pain like they have never felt before and they are going to do it in your honour so that you can bear the name of Sydney High proudly.

This year we want to feel that we have our school, you guys, behind us. When the pain kicks in these guys are going to need something to spur them on and this year we want you guys to be the ones to do it. We want you to help us show the other

schools that Sydney High can leave them all for dead and win the Head of the River. Because these guys are tough enough to do it, they just need you, every one of you, to push them that one step further, back into the record books.

We want your support, don't let us down.

he group of rowers who were to comprise the '95 VIII came together in September of 1994 expecting big things from the coming six months. Many rowers had been building for this season for a number of years, all having been in reasonably successful crews in previous seasons, and all having trained hard throughout winter. January Camp at Penrith saw us completing some hard rows and clocking up a lot of kilometres, however we struggled to find the technical form we had had before the holidays. On the final day of the camp we had a disastrous series of races against Shore, whom we had beaten in the Head of the Parramatta, and expected to beat again. They beat us convincingly three times and we went home from Penrith with our heads hanging low. Unbeknownst to us was that this Shore crew were to go on and remain undefeated through the season, winning the GPS Regatta, the National Championship and the stern four winning the World Junior Championship.

We struggled to make the finals in our early season races, fighting over the tail end of the field with Scots and Joeys. Everything we tried to increase our boat speed didn't seem to work and we didn't come out of this slump for a number of weeks. We did eventually begin to get things together and improve our boat speed, however by this time, we were far from the leading crews of Shore, Newington, Grammar and Kings.

Over the last few weeks of the season we caught these crews considerably, and began to show glimpses of our potential. We finished third in the school eights at the Riverview Gold Cup Regatta and made the final of the Gold Cup, something no Sydney High School crew had done for many years.

The heats and repecharge for the Head of the River were held a week before the day of the finals. Although we were improving rapidly, this day came too soon. We found ourselves having to beat Newington or Kings for the first time in the repecharge to qualify for the A final, a feat which proved to be just beyond our grasp. The fact that we got to within a length of Kings, who were beating us by almost five lengths only three weeks before, was some consolation, and we couldn't have been disappointed with the way we rowed, which was a marked improvement on races earlier in the season.

To our credit we maintained enthusiasm and kept improving in the week leading up to the B final, even though we were racing the bottom half of the GPS and couldn't do better than fifth place. Gareth's speech at the rowing assembly was inspirational, really firing up the whole shed, and the standing ovation following it left us feeling that the whole school was behind us.

In front of the largest and most enthusiastic Sydney High rowing crowd I had seen in my six years at the school, we won the B final by clear water to Joeys, Riverview and Scots. This was by far our best outing of the season, which we raced very aggressively, leading from start to finish, and it was enjoyable winning a race in front of such a huge crowd, even if it was for fifth place.

Congratulations to Shore, who won the A final from Newington, Kings and Grammar, and to the First IV for their great season culminating in their second place in the Head of the River.

The last regatta we entered as a crew was the National Championships in Collie, Western Australia. On a disappointingly windswept course we did some good racing, coming within a length of Newington three times, and beating the winners of the Victorian and South Australian Head of the River Regattas. We came fourth in the Men's Junior VIII, and finished seventh in the Schoolboy VIII.

On the behalf of the crew I would like to thank our coach, Mr John Croll. Both technically and motivationally John's ability as a coach is second to none. His experience and dedication have been invaluable in bringing the Sydney High Boatshed to the point where fifth place is a disappointment, rather than an achievement.

Many thanks from the First VIII to the organisers of the Western Australia trip, in particular to Mr Barris, to Mrs Morgan for her fantastic food at our twice weekly camps, and to all the other parents and teachers who helped at the sheds.







The Captain's Report

ith expectations not as high as in the previous two years to win the GPS Competition, we found that "the monkey" was "off our back" as they say. The Trial Games

The GPS Competition

Rifle Shooting

Captain's Report

he First Grade lineup for 1995 remained basically the same as the previous year with the exception of the replacement of Anthony Guth with Daniel Thomson, the major change occurring in the second grade team with an entirely new team being fielded this year. This team would later prove their worth at the GPS Premiership, equalling last year's excellent performance in the competition.

As usual, training commenced in early January with training camps at Anzac Rifle Range, Malabar and at the McIntosh Rifle Range in Canberra. During these training sessions, hundreds of rounds of both full bore (7.62 mm) and small bore (.22 in) ammunition were sent down range with new shooters learning the ropes from the senior club members, and experienced shooters and coaches brushing up on their existing skills. Many hours were also spent indoors studying the theoretical aspects of shooting such as sports psychology, body position, breathing technique, effects of wind and light conditions, and plot interpretation with the coaches.


As the months progressed and performances in training sessions and prize shoots were examined, things were looking good for both teams in the GPS Annual Shoot with First Grade expected to make a big improvement over last year's exceptional performance (the best result for High in a decade). Second Grade were also improving dramatically and looking like they could give TAS and Kings (the predominant schools in shooting) a run for their money.

On Monday 17th July, both teams were driven up to Hornsby Rifle Range by Mr Blinkhorne in the school bus. Typical frigid winter conditions greeted us as we arrived at 8:30 in the morning to begin the official "preparation" but unofficial "let's see what you've got" day with the other GPS schools. The day progressed uneventfully with all schools outwardly minding their own business but covertly sizing up the competition with many sideways glances at opposing team scoreboards and targets being made. As each school departed at the end of the day, every team coach had a copy of every other team's scores, furiously copied down from scoreboards by team spies who "just happen to be passing by". Intelligence gained through such acts of sporting espionage gave all coaches an indication of where each school stood in the competition

Official Competition began the next day for First Grade at the 500 m mound with the first stage of the Rawson Cup. High began well with two 'possibles' (full scores - Daniel Thomson 35-2, Phil Wong 35-4) being recorded. However, after the next stage at 600 m, High had finished a disappointing sixth, 12 points behind the winners of the Rawson Cup, Sydney Grammar School. After lunch (prepared by the parents of team members) High came back with a vengeance in the next competition, the NRA Shield held at 600 m, finishing second behind TAS - the highest placing Sydney High had achieved in a competition in the GPS since it won the Buchanan Shield in 1931! The day ended with First Grade leaving Hornsby still within striking distance of the Premiership and the coaches of the other teams still flapping out at our powerhouse performance in the NRA Shield.

The third and final day began with the Second Grade Premiership Competition, which takes place at 500m and 300m. As the wind coaches of the team, Matthew Pollock and Tom Vogelgesang did an outstanding job reading the tricky wind conditions and adjusting the sights of their teammates. Second Grade finished fourth in their competition, equalling last year's result which was the best result High had achieved in the Second Grade Competition for about 25 years. Top scorer was W.Lee with 64-5 out of 70-14 followed by Anthony Mak with 64-2.

The final competition for first grade, the Buchanan Shield, was held in the afternoon at the 300 m mound. The tricky conditions which had hindered Second Grade in the morning remained resulting in lower scores in all teams compared to results of previous years. At the end of the first stage High was running fifth, top scorer being D. Thomson with 39-2 out of 40-8 followed by Ben Ng with 38-2. The second stage, Snap, was literally a hit and miss affair for all involved (some more than others) with a large spread of scores (from 4 to 40 out of 40). Despite a valiant effort, High again finished fifth in the Snap (Top scorer being Peng Ly with 38 followed by Kris Webster and P.Wong on 37) and fifth in the Buchanan Shield. This resulted in High finishing a disappointing sixth in the GPS Premiership (Our expected improvement in fact turned out to be a degradation of 1.5% compared to last year's result, but who's counting?).

Our spirits were not lifted by the fact that had we gained a mere two more points (out of 560) in the *Rawson Cup*, we would have finished fourth, on par with last year's effort. On the bright side, High managed to get two of its team members selected for the GPS Combined Rifle Team (D.Thomson and P.Wong). In the last two years SHS has now had three shooters selected for the GPS Combined (Scott Denton - GPS Combined 1994). As far back as can be remembered, before 1994, the GPS Combined Team had never had a single High Representative in its lineup.

Any traces of disappointment remaining in the team quickly evaporated after the release of the *GPS Smallbore Postal Competition* results later in the year. The Open team entered by SHS finished an unprecedented second in the competition behind one of the open teams entered by Joeys. This was the best result Sydney High had ever achieved in the short history of the smallbore competition.

At this point it should be noted that no results, good or bad, would be achieved by either team if it

were not for the tireless efforts of certain individuals. On behalf of the club I wish to thank: Angus Edwards and Nathan Scudder for their tremendous efforts in coaching, organisation and administration in every aspect of the club; Mr Geoff Blinkhorne, our Shooting Master who spent (and continues to spend) mind boggling amounts of time in the care and transport of both people and equipment to wherever they need to be whether it be Canberra, Armidale or Mudgee, in or out of school time as well as in the general running of the club; Mr David Rosenfeld, Chairman of the Friends of the Sydney High School Rifle Club committee and all the parents and associates who make up the committee. Your support is valued and much appreciated. On a personal note I wish to thank Vice Captain Scott Denton, fellow Wind Coach Kris Webster and Second Grade Captain Peter Ree for their support and friendship throughout the year.

First Grade Soccer

nother successful season for Sydney High soccer... this is how many will no doubt remember First Grade's campaign for 1995. However our fight to gain the GPS premiership which eluded us so cruelly last year was by no means a formality. The GPS Championship was held at St Ignatius by Newington and High lived up to its earlier prom-



The State Representative Teams matches at Brisbane also saw SBHS pupils to the fore. NSW A was captained by our M.A, beating Victoria, NSW B and Queensland, to carry off the palm in foil. Luke Twigg captained the Bs with a 3rd place result. This success was repeated in epee with the

M.A. captaining NSW to a 1st place by defeating Victoria and Queensland.

To give a small illustration of the stamina shown by our three fencers, the team bout started at 8.30 am (call-over), finishing at 10.30 pm on Saturday and Sunday. This was in addition to a couple of days spent on individual competition.

It is only four years since Henry Adams, then a Year 8 boy, without any teacher support, introduced the sport to SBHS. Four years on our Magister Armorum can look with unalloyed pride at his achievement and leave the school well satisfied with what he has done.


