

Occasional Address by Lieutenant-General Peter J.Cosgrove AC MC Chief of the General Staff

Principal's Report

[The following is an edited version of the address given by the Principal at the Annual Speech Night and Prize-Giving.]

ieutenant-General Cosgrove, distinguished guests, ladies and gentleman. As I report to ✓ you this evening, I am moved to observe how inspired I have been by the atmosphere of common purpose and focus within the School Family. Many talented people are working with impressive dedication and affection to further the interests of this great school. I believe that progress was made in several areas in 2000: strategic planning, asset management, site development, marketing and promotion, financial management, communication with stakeholders, sports administration, school environment improvement, technology in teaching and learning, curriculum development and student welfare. The thirty-eight editions of High Notes 2000 have traced the steps taken in policy development and practice.

Relationships with our partners who are working to support Sydney High have been clarified and enhanced. We will strive to build further goodwill towards the school among our interest groups and supporters this year. The historical partnership between the Old Boys Union and the school P & C remains critical for our future.

I should mention four highlights of the year for me. The agreement to implement of the Living Skills program for years 7 and 8 was a vital and symbolic first step in modifying our school culture in the future. The great efforts of staff in rewriting programs and assessment schedules for all HSC courses and many junior school courses will help us to move closer towards inculcating the principles of autonomous and lifelong learning in our students. The historic signing of a Deed of Licence with Centennial Parklands has assured our sports delivery for the next twenty years. The

completion of the Barris Cottage and new pontoon at the Outterside Centre raised our capacities to compete in rowing significantly.

I must record how fortunate I am to have had such strong support from Lee Ruth, Terry Meakin and Bob Outterside (Sydney High Foundation), Ken Baret (High Club), Nathan Scudder (OBU), Dennis Briggs and John Kaldor (P & C, School Council) and Bob Dowdell and John Beringer (SBHS) during my first year at High. Without their acceptance of my future directions for the school and wise counsel on priorities and implementation strategies, not nearly as much could have been accomplished.

There are many fine achievements worth celebrating this evening.

High quality H.S.C. results were earned by our students again. Loius Wang was awarded a UAI of 100 and accompanied by Yi-Hong Li and Rahul Dubey, received a Premier's Trophy for Excellence. Yi-Hong also gained a Premier's Certificate for his first place in the state in 2-unit Classical Greek.

Great Mathematics results showcased the talent of our students and the professionalism of their teachers. Our 4-unit Mathematics students performed excellently, second in the state for the top 100 mathematicians. The 2-unit Mathematics results were the best for eight years.

In English the 2-unit results showed improvement despite the candidature increase to 90 students in the demanding 2 unit related course. Our results in Physics, Business Studies, Modern History, Legal Studies, and Mathematics 3-unit, were well above the school's long term average. Twenty-two of forty-four courses had results above the long term average (as measured in state standard deviation units).

At least 32 boys achieved UAIs of 99 or more, while more than 100 students had UAIs of 90 or better. All 171 applicants to university were offered places.

The elusive double in debating – GPS Louat Shield and State Hume Barbour Shield – was achieved for

only the sixth time in our history by an undefeated team

Water polo claimed the second division premiership. Fencing held the Nutt Shield again for the third time in four years.

Our cricketers regained the Cec Rubie Trophy in the Five Highs competition in Melbourne.

Michael Terry-Whitall made the Australian Under 17 Youth Water Polo team.

Hamish Scott-Stevenson was awarded a CHS Blue for rowing.

Stephen Irwin played in a combined GPS First XV; Andrew Light in the First XI and Paul Carvoni and Gabriel Knowles in First Grade Soccer.

The Australian Sports Medal was awarded to David and Andrew Jacques for Rifle Shooting.

Daniel Gilbourd won a silver medal at the International Biology Olympiad held in Turkey.

David David was successful in the National Bible Quiz, winning a trip to Israel.

Phillip Lesnie won the Sydney Theatre Company's 'Young Playwrights Award'.

Robbie Moore had his play Wolves read by an amateur theatrical company.

At the City of Sydney Junior Chess Competition, llya Zvedeniouk and Alex Feldman top scored in their age groups.

We were represented in choirs at the opening ceremonies of the Olympic Games, the Paralympics and the Pacific School games. Our boys worked very successfully as volunteers at these great events.

Michael Nelson, Jason Kok and Thomas Norrie played in the NSW Public Schools Symphony Orchestra.

Eugene Schofield-Georgeson had his artwork exhibited in Artexpress.

All round excellence was pursued and achieved by a significant number of our students. They showed us how talent and determination reap rewards. Tonight we honour the achievements of our students and acknowledge the support and encouragement they received in so many of their endeavours by parents, staff, old boys, peers and friends of High. To those of you who are leaving us for the last time tonight and to those of you who have more schooling ahead, I say – formulate your goals. Motivate yourself to pursue them. Override procrastination and self-doubt. Remember Claudius' words to Laertes, so ironically similar to Hamlet's self-recriminations about his own lack of effective action against the usurper:

"That we would do

We should do when we would: for this 'would' changes

And hath abatements and delays as many As there are tongues, are hands, are accidents, And then this 'should' is like a spendthrift sigh, That hurts by easing..." [Hamlet, IV,vii,l 17-122]

Be resolute in the pursuit of your objectives. Congratulations on your performances.

School Notes

Fine Fellow It was announced in March that Professor Sir Robert May (Dux of SHS 1952), Chief Scientific Advisor to the UK Government and Head of the UK Office of Science and Technology, was to be elected to the position of President of the Royal Society. Previous presidents include Samuel Pepys, Sir Isaac Newton, Sir Joseph Banks, Lord Kelvin, and Lord Florey of Adelaide and Marston.

Sir Robert has held chairs in Physics at Sydney University, Zoology at Princeton, and Royal Society Research in the Department of Zoology at Oxford and Imperial College London. He has honorary degrees from several universities, including Uppsala, Yale, and Sydney.

Making Peace Tim Griffiths (1984) reports that Grant Palmer (also 1984), currently second-in-command of the 8/12 Medium Artillery Regiment based in Darwin, is off to Dili to work as SO2 Operational Plans at UNTEAT (United Nations Transitional Authority East Timor).

Inaugural Captain It was discovered (rediscovered?) this year that the captain of the first Australian Rugby team to play a test match against England, on 24th June 1899, was Frank Leonard Row, an Old Boy of the School.

Chrystal Fountain During the work to repair the roof after the Geat Hail Storm, the fountain in the courtyard suffered some damage. As the original fountain had been a gift from

a grateful final year (possibly 1969), it was decided to refurbish it straight away. The work was completed in time for speech night in February 2001.

Glittering Prizes It was announced in October that Jeremy Heimans (1995) had been awarded a Fulbright Scholarship to study Government and Politics at Harvard. Earlier in the year the school learnt that Adam Pretty (1994) had won the World Press Photo Organisation's award for sports photo of the year. Meanwhile, Sydney University has awarded an Undergraduate Scholarship to Danny Ho (1999), seen in the accompanying photograph receiving his award from the Chancellor, Dame Leonie Kramer.

Historical Encounter The bell from *HMAS* Encounter, which until recently languished largely unremarked in a corner of the main building, was recently moved to the cloisters, remounted, and polished. Mr John Fittler, who organized the move, is preparing a small plaque to inform passers-by of the bell's history.

Foreign Affairs During late July the School hosted an inaugural visit of five students from Zhejiang Province in China. The touring party was personally accompanied by Mr Xu Yaogen, Director of Foreign Affairs for the province, and had been largely arranged at our end by Ms Fleming of the Modern Languages department.

The Moving Finger During August the School was honoured by a visit from a group of Old Boys who are published writers, including a retired ambassador and a professor or two. Professor Gary Scrimgeour addressed the gathering on the place of writing in modern society and the importance of supporting boys in their writing endeavours, and opened a new section of the K.J.Andrews Library dedicated to the donated works of Old Boys.

Family Torch Bearer Mrs Lola Harding-Irmer, who, amongst her many other outstanding achievements, was a PE teacher at Sydney Girls High School in the 1960s, carried the Olympic torch past Sydney Boys High School on the 14th of September. Her son, Patrick, is an old boy of the school, attending from 1958 to 1963 before going on to Sydney University. Both Mrs Harding-Irmer and Patrick have been involved in the Olympic games at some stage in their lives. Mrs Harding-Irmer coordinated part of the opening ceremony to the 1936 Berlin Games, and in Munich in 1972 she was Australia's delegate for the scientific congress for rhythmic gymnastics. Patrick was at Seoul

in 1988 as a solo dancer representing British Contemporary Dance. In 1984 he represented the same company in the Arts Festival prior to the Los Angeles Olympic Games.

Whilst Mrs Harding-Irmer is 86 years of age, she was not the oldest runner in the group carrying the torch to Homebush, and her involvement in the Olympic Games was capped off by her run with the torch down South Dowling St, along Oxford St and into Crown St. (Robert Crofts)

Overwhelming Success In the first week of November it was announced that Hamish Scott-Stevenson had been awarded a CHS Blue in rowing. This is a very high honour indeed, as only one or two are awarded in each sport. The last High boy to be so honoured was James Holbeck (Rugby). In the same week Mark Benjamin was chosen to attend the Mathematics Summer School, and the Second XI beat Grammar outright at McKay!

Earthworks Late in the year, entirely at his own volition, recently elected Captain of the School Nicholas Armstrong completed a long-running personal task of landscaping the hill to the immediate South of the McDonald wing. The prime purpose is to provide a landing place for those brave souls who will use his main project, a climbing wall, but the work has stabilised a long-standing site of erosion.

arol Hardy, a former music teacher at SBHS, passed away at the Sacred Heart Hospice in Darlinghurst on Saturday, 29th July, 2000 after a long battle with cancer. Carol and her family had a strong and close relationship with both Sydney Bovs' and Girls' High Schools over many years. As a teacher here from 1991 to 1999 she made a very significant contribution to the Music Department and to the extra-curricular life of the school in a variety of ways.

Carol's funeral service was held at the historic St James' Anglican Church, King Street Sydney, on Thursday, 3rd August, 2000. St. James' Church has strong links with Sydney Boys' and Girls' High Schools and with Carol's family.

The funeral service was a deeply moving and an appropriate celebration of Carol's life. The large congregation heard about Carol and her life in eulogies presented by six different people. A large contingent of past and current students, teachers and parents, represented the school. Sydney Girls' High was also represented. The School Choir led the congregation in singing the School Song, and the Hymns, and then sang The Lord's Prayer from the African Sanctus. High students acted as acolytes carrying candies and the School Banner in procession.

Australian Mathematics Olympiad Competition

his competition is held annually amongst students chosen by invitation, to determine the team to represent Australia in an International Mathematics Olympiad.

Two boys, Charles Qin (Year 9) and Revsion Tam (Year 11), entered the Senior Division (89 participants from 59 schools), and Charles was awarded a Credit.

In the Intermediate Division, twenty boys from Years 9 and 10 entered (834 participants from 180 schools). High Distinctions were awarded to Shihab Hamid and Cheng Fu of Year 10, and to George Zhong of Year 9. Distinctions were awarded to nine boys, and Credits to four. It is expected that several of these boys will be invited to go on to the next stage of selection.

The Olympic Volunteers

It was the middle of the year and the cynicism towards the Olympics was slowly, but surely, converting itself into a new, previously unseen, branch of jingoism. The call came to school to sign up as volunteers for the games and I, along with several of my friends, decided to grasp this opportunity with both hands and signed up without reading the small print.

There was one reason the government gave for people signing up: it was to join what was widely regarded as the biggest peacetime effort our nation had ever encountered. This was not the reason all members of Sydney Boys' High signed the documents. The real reason for some was to get free tickets to any Olympic event we could with as little work involved as possible.

After signing up, we were subjected to rigorous training sessions where we learnt such vital procedures as how to wear our uniform without looking like we were new recruits to Clown College (many volunteers failed this lesson miserably) and how to remember neologisms that would get us out of any difficult situations that may arise with spectators. After such extensive training we were all confident that what work lay ahead would be easy and volunteers such as ourselves would have no problem tackling it.

What arrived on the 15th September, to our astonishment, was a two and a half week journey of self-discovery that would change our lives forever. I, of course, cannot speak for those members of the school that volunteered at other venues but for my fellow workers and I at the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre, the Olympic games opened many doors to a world we'd never before seen. It showed us that all humans are not equal for the duration of the

Olympic games. For example, the exiled King of Greece receives treatment equal to that of a god though a little boy who just wants an athlete to autograph the plaster cast on his broken arm does not get the light of day. Not only that, but most of the volunteers didn't even believe there was anything wrong with this dogma!

Rest assured, however, that the Sydney Boys' High humanitarian instincts we all possess came into practice as we, despite orders to the contrary, tried to sneak as many children with broken arms as we could into the "ATHLETES ONLY" sections that we ourselves were not permitted to enter. Meanwhile, on the other side of the venue, a young woman stood lost and frustrated because she could not find her brother anywhere. Once again our instinct kicked in and we abandoned checking people's tickets at every door so that we could reunite this woman with her long lost brother.

It was little acts like these that separated SBHS volunteers from the rest and the Ryde Aquatic Leisure Centre was known to all the regulars to be Sydney High's venue. Our fair school's name still rang in the ears of many a drunken Dutchman as the events drew to a close and the sun set on the greatest volunteer movement of all time. On the final day, when all had left, a few lonely volunteers stayed behind and tried desperately to come to terms with what had just occurred and what may happen in the future.

And as if that wasn't enough, they gave us a parade, another T-shirt and all we could eat and drink!

Earthwatch Expedition

In October of last year Sydney Boys High was approached by the Earthwatch Institute in Mel bourne. The idea was to send a team of nine senior High School students from all around Australia, into the rainforest highlands of New South Wales, surveying and collating data about frogs. Three students from the school applied, Tom Caley, Larry McGrath, and Miles Portek of year 11, and all three of us were selected. The project, known as "Australia's Vanishing Frogs" was run by Dr Michael Mahony, a professor at the University of Newcastle, along with two of his assistants.

On 16th December 2000 we rendezvoused at Central Station, where we were met by an assistant. along with the other six students: one other from Sydney, one from Perth and four from Melbourne. We met up with the other scientists in Morrisset and then moved to our first campsite in the Watagan Mountains. A typical day on the trip would involve waking up at around 11 am, and getting into one of the 4WDs to find a suitable creek. We would then mark out transects on that creek with reflective tape at specific intervals. All of this was preparation for the coming night's work, as frogs are best found just as the sun sets. In the evening, we would all help cooking the meals, and then drive back through the bush (fully equipped this time with head-lamps, spotlights and measuring equipment) to the creek we had marked out in the day.


Some of the creeks we arrived at were completely silent, with no noise of frogs evident, however this was either because the frogs were female (only male frogs croak) or they had experienced localised extinction. To identify the frogs, we had to learn what they looked like, what noise they made when 'calling' and of course, their Latin names. We also learnt how to replicate the sounds of the frogs so we could communicate with them and find where they were hiding.

The purpose of the trip was to help find an answer to why nine endemic species of frogs have disappeared in Australia over the last thirty years. The main suspect is a type of fungus, known as the Chytrid Fungus, which is lethal to many amphibians. The cause of this fungus is still not yet known.

Throughout the trip, we found over twenty species of frogs and toadlets, including some from the tree-frog (*Litoria*) genus, and also many rare species from the burrowing frog (*Mixophyes*) genus. On one evening we found many Great Barred Frogs, which are an endangered species.

This trip has helped to further our studies tremendously, within biology and also geography. The opportunity to help in a scientific study, involving teamwork, has given us an insight into the 'goingson' of the scientific world.

The Bell of H.M.A.S. Encounter

his bell, now in the possession of the Sydney High School, is once again fulfilling the purpose for which it was cast. Recovered from Garden Island where it was resting consequent on the burial at sea of the dismantled warship, it again rings out the passing hours, and notes the changing duties for those who "listen-in." The history of the bell, supplied by the Commonwealth Department of Defence, accompanied its acquisition, and, suitably framed, gives opportunity to all who hear its characteristic ship's peal to recall some fact connected with the service to the nation rendered by the *Encounter*. This may well provide now and again a stimulus to some pupils to face up to their tasks with greater courage and thoroughness.

The story of its acquisition has a prologue, interesting on account of its connection with the more famous Australian warship, the *Sydney*. For some time, authority at the school was exercised in mind owing to the inadequacy of service of the existing school electric bell. During this period, the *Sydney* was put out of commission, and later laid up for dismantling. Application was at once made for the gift – and later the purchase – of the bell for the Sydney High School. Much correspondence ensued over a lengthy period, with varying prospects of success. Finally, word was received that the bell had been retained by the Commonwealth as a war memorial.

However, this had the effect of directing attention to the Navy as a possible source of supply for the School need of a suitable bell, and when the Encounter was stripped and the hull sunk outside Sydney Heads, a friend at Garden Island passed the word that the bell had arrived at the depot, and that haste was desirable owing to the fact that negotiations - by the ship's officers, rumoured were already in progress. Prompt application, with a reminder of previous overtures for the bell of the Sydney brought equally prompt reply that the bell was available on the usual terms that were quoted. The terms being accepted, and the history of the bell neatly transcribed and framed, both bell and history have come into the possession of the School, and, as previously recorded, the characteristic ting-a-linga-ling will mark the passing of time and changing tasks for future generations of Sydney High School

boys. The purpose in making this gift is to foster and encourage a spirit of endeavour and loyalty.

History of H.M.A.S. Encounter

Light, unarmoured, "Challenger Class," of 5,880 tons displacement. Eleven 6-six guns, eight 12-pounders, two 18-inch submerged torpedo tubes. Speed: 21 knots.

The vessel was laid down at Development Dockyard, 1902; launched, 1902; completed and commissioned, 1905. Complement: 450 officers and men. Length: 376 feet. Beam: 56 feet. Draught: 20 feet 8 inches (maximum).

Formed part of the Royal Navy squadron; maintained by the Admiralty under subsidy of the Australian Government.

Lent to the Australian Government on the foundation of the Royal Australian Navy in 1912, pending the completion of the initial program for the Australian squadron, and served as Training Cruiser. Served on the Australian Station throughout the Great War (1914-1918), being present at Rabaul after the capture of German New Guinea, and at the capture of German Samoa.

In the course of searches for enemy raiders operating in the Pacific, the *Encounter* proceeded off the Station as far as Fanning Island, Suva, and Tahiti, and carried out escort duty (conveying military transports) as far as Colombo. At one period of the war the *Encounter* was the only British man-of-war in the vicinity of Australia.

After the cessation of hostilities, the *Encounter* was presented to the R.A.N., and was employed as a sea-going Training Cruiser. It was paid off on the 30th June 1920, and subsequently utilised as a depot ship at Sydney, being moored alongside Garden Island.

On the 14th September, 1932, after all serviceable fixtures, fittings, etc., had been removed, the shell of the *Encounter* was sunk outside Sydney Heads in 39 fathoms of water – approximately: Latitude:33 degrees, 54 minutes, 30 seconds South

Longitude:151 degrees, 21 minutes East.



Debating

First Grade Debating

he Year 12 team began this season after the success of last year in winning the CHS Karl Kramp Trophy. The season started early, with the traditional trial debates against Sydney Girls', and Trinity College, as well as future GPS opponents St. Joseph's College and Sydney Grammar. Furthermore, the CHS Hume Barbour competition also began in term one, so this year's debating season effectively stretched across the whole year. There were twenty-one debates in all, the measure of our success I believe, may be summed up by the fact that we won all twenty-one of them

It was not an effortless whitewash though, many debates being painfully close and decided only by split decisions. Both the CHS and GPS competitions were strong and being Sydney High, we knew that we would be targeted especially. A quote comes to mind: "the public schools hate us because we're too rich, the private schools hate us because we're too poor." This year saw the introduction of a three-member adjudication panel for each debate in the

GPS, a change we saw as a major boost to our chances, since previous years had seen ambiguous decisions bring down the better teams. It was also the first season with old-boy David Smith (1st grade 1997-1998) as coach of first and second grade, after the departure of Joe Suttie who had helped us so much in the previous year during the hard times. David brought a new energy to the team, and his vast connections with the debating network ensured that we were never short on information about our opponents.

The 1st Grade team for the GPS competition was Robbie Moore (1st speaker), Hilbert Chiu (2nd speaker) and Oscar McLaren (3rd speaker) when we were on the negative which was most of the time. On the five debates we were on the affirm-ative, Robbie and myself swapped speaking places. Mike Martin came in as team adviser for the CHS Hume Barbour debates.

I believe the strengths of the team were shown early in the season, when although we overcame opposition quite easily, Oscar in particular was never satisfied with our performance, continually driving us with the words: 'Got work to do, boys.' Instead

we developed into a well-rounded team, Robbie's charming manner and witty performances often taking the initiative early, while Oscar's ruthless attacks tore many sides apart. The aggression under Mr. Davies's direction was well served when we realised how many times we were on the negative side (Oscar's coin tossing skills unfortunately not quite as impressive). After last year when we were affirmative almost all the time, it was clear that there was much to learn.

The first real hurdle was of course our old adversary, Sydney Girls' High School, at our old meeting place, the regional final. This debate was held at the state parliament house in front of a hostile audience. It was also our first impressive display of the 'reactive negative', a tactic most favoured by Sydney Girls' and turned delightfully (for us) against them. They didn't recover. This win made us Metropolitan South-east winners and brought us against some of the best debating public high schools in the state. We were humbled by narrow victories in both the Quarter- and Semifinals, probably caused by complacency and we finally reached the State Final rejuvenated and a better team.

North Sydney Girls' High! The team we beat last year to win the Karl Kramp, and the team we had to beat to win the prestigious Hume Barbour Trophy. Their desire for revenge was clear – we had other ideas. The preparation for this debate saw one of the major attributes of this team, the ability to relax under pressure. While North Sydney Girls' were busy over-preparing and trying to talk about too much (a dangerous tactic against a thinking negative), we concentrated on the real issues at hand. The crowd at the Old Teachers' College in Sydney University was impressed, and it was under these circumstances that the Hume Barbour Trophy was taken home to the foyer of Sydney Boys' High, where it belongs.

With half our job completed, we then turned our attention to the GPS competition. The last time Sydney Boys' won this was in 1992, and the last time 1st Grade beat St Ignatius College was also in 1992. By fate we were up against them in the first round, the symbolism of a win here could not be understated.

As such we worked hard all through the holidays, digging up every last vestige of information on the topic area: Refugees. The final coaching session on Friday afternoon was the most tense I could remember, going through every possible strategy and making a rundown on the traditional St Ignatius 'dirty tricks'. This proved to be invaluable, when in front of loyal supporters in the library, we turned St Ignatius's tricks against them and

announced our arrival in the GPS forefront for the year 2000. One down, six to go.

The Scots College were the favourites for this year's GPS premiership, not surprisingly since the captain of the State team was in their ranks. This debate was probably the closest in memory, over a sensitive issue in: 'That it is too late to say sorry'. I can't say it was easy arguing the Prime Minister's side of the topic (the affirmative), but in the end Mr. Howard's arguments took us across the line. The feeling of excruciating relief after the decision was announced is one of the most memorable feelings of a most memorable season. Scots were devastated, they were a good side and we had grown to like them. Two down, five to go.

All week we were reminded not to be complacent; all week we were told that the adjudicators were now aware of our weaknesses and would seek to make us pay for daring to beat their favourite teams. We were determined to thrash St Joseph's College if only to prove a point, and thrash them we did. It was relentless and it was without remorse. Suffice to say there were some teams in the competition we liked more than others – Joeys

were closer to the latter group. Three down, four to go.

The next two debates were probably the most difficult mentally, since they were in the middle of our trial HSC examination period. The balance between study and debating study was every bit as straining as the balance between exam concentration followed by debate concentration. Somehow we managed to pull through the Sydney Grammar School debate, with barely the strength to stand afterwards. Thankfully the IVF related topic was on everyone's lips all week so not too much rigorous thinking was required. Four down, three to go.

The journey west to The King's School was memorable for one huge reason: it was the first time we saw the politics of debating at work. Being now favoured to win the premiership, it was clear that everyone wanted a piece of Sydney High, and some adjudicators prided themselves on picking out our faults. As David later said: 'If you only look for reasons why a team should lose, then it's pretty damn hard for that team to win'. Thank God for the panel system. We departed from Parramatta all the wiser. Five down, two to go.

By now the publicity of our success was becoming widespread at school, and with the trials now finished, many of our friends pledged their support on the night of the Shore debate. This team included not only we debaters, who probably did the least, but our debating MIC Mr Davies, whose guidance since year seven crafted the CHS and GPS undefeated premiers of 2000 from a bunch of high-voiced kids who liked to talk. In between there was Mr. Whitfield, whose calm influence taught us that matter was just as important as manner; Peter Nicholas and Gareth Tilley, the men who instilled the debating sixth sense into us. They taught us to think like debaters. We are happy to say that we leave Sydney High with these people at the helm, and we hope we have begun a dynasty of Sydney High success in debating.

Fortunately we again had the last laugh and knocked Gymea out of a second competition. In Commonwealth Bank Senior luck was also on our side as although we faced a team from Wollongong. We drew them at home and with the support of our

own classmates were able to move through to the next round.

Then came a horror two days which blew Year 11 debating 2000 apart – two state semi-finals and then round six of the GPS competition. On the Thursday we lost to James Ruse in Carl Kramp - a fair result as we were unable to convince the adjudicators that without the dole both the unemployed and the country would be better off. The debate that really sapped spirits though was on Friday afternoon in the semi-final of the Commonwealth Bank Senior competition. In a special debating seminar the audience was treated to a close debate and a little inventive adjudication. Knocked out of two competitions in two days we headed for Shore that evening low on confidence and inspiration. In preparation 2nds threw away a perfectly good set up after twenty minutes and presented a completely unviable definition. Seconds had lost after the first affirmative speaker. Two of the adjudicators couldn't accept the set up, which was fair enough. Third grade also lost, claiming they got rolled. All up a bad few days for us all.

The very last debate of the season was the seventh round of the GPS season. We faced a red hot Newington who were out chasing a Second grade GPS premiership and a leading place in

3rd grade. The teams were driven by a dislike of this particular set of opponents, and a desire not to let them win the comp. Third grade also had the added experience of Mike Martin, a seasoned campaigner whom you would expect to add some backbone to the team. However some of his Year 12 debating associates felt that third grade got a raw deal. Anyway, despite Mike's appearance, third grade lost their final debate. In second grade it was a different story though as we grasped the debate right from the word go, and left Newington and their following to go home empty handed. The second grade premiership we believe went to Grammar.

Overall the season was quite successful – in both Carl Kramp and Commonwealth Bank Senior we made it to the state semi-finals; in GPS second grade we had a 4-3 record and beat both Newington, and Grammar, the team we believe won the competition. In third grade it was 3-4 with every debate being close. Yet in some debates it just seemed all teams lacked the killer instinct really needed to win tournaments. An instinct I am sure will not be lacking next year, because the signs are there for a great season.







First up we had Newington to play away at Stanmore. It was always going to be a difficult task after several late withdrawals from the team to prove ourselves a force. This game was a very low scoring affair due to the terrible pitch, slow outfield and predominantly overcast conditions throughout the match. We were on the back foot in the match before the toss, with Andrew Ross tragically dislocating his shoulder during pre-match training. Many thanks to Daniel Willis who very kindly showed up as a replacement when called. We lost the toss and were sent in. Despite the conditions there was no excuse for the failure of our batting, especially in the first innings. Our wickets just kept falling and there was no chance to build a partnership. Koushik Panda was the only one to put up a fight – he was in for 45 minutes before being dismissed. Our bowling was of a high standard during the match, with two 20 run partnerships proving the difference between the two teams. 


Fourth Four

season could only get better, and that it did.




No.7 Adrian Kuti - Point Guard

With a lack of form going into the first match the odds of a successful season diminished very quickly. An under-strength team faced the hard opponents of Joey's. A disappointing start to the season lead to an under-par performance throughout the term.

A strong reliance was placed on the doubles, to set up a winning lead. This, unfortunately, placed extreme pressure on the choice of combinations and strategy. Nevertheless, through hard work and patience during the Wednesday practice sessions, the right combinations were found and the pressure was reduced. Jarrod and Michael, on the other hand, were able to place in first and second grade respectively, with Michael being one of the youngest members to be selected for GPS tennis in history.

The season may not have been an entire success, in terms of placing, yet it managed to bridge the gap between senior tennis and junior tennis, providing a base for possible future premierships.





Our school Athletics Carnival went very well this year, with participation rates up on previous years. The G.P.S. Season

All but one of our Invitational Carnivals was held at Sydney Athletic Field (E.S. Marks) – our home track! We co-hosted the first of the G.P.S. Carnivals with Sydney Grammar and had to draw upon all our available parent/staff support to do so. On average about 70 boys turned up each Saturday to compete with competition strongest in the 15 years and Open age categories.

The Championships were held over two days this year, due to the 'banning' of Shot Put from the grassed area at Stadium Australia. Shot Put and some 400m elimination trials were held at St Ignatius College on the Friday afternoon prior

to Championships. The Shot competition at least occupied centre stage for a change with a large group of interested spectators. **Andrew Walters** showed great form to finish 3rd in the very competitive 15 Years Championship event.

Championship Day at Stadium Australia on 20th May was the experience of a lifetime. A beautiful day, the Olympic arena, great team spirit and a very professional looking team changeroom – it was all ours! The day began with massage, drinks and the pre-competition 'psych-up' while Event No. 1 the 13 yrs High Jump got under way. **Jacob Stretton,** got the team off to a great start by recording a personal best (very close to the school record) to also gain a 3rd place.

Scott Morrow was our other placegetter on the day with a gallant 3rd in the Open 1500m in a time of 4m. 14.3s. Scott also ran a superb 800m in 1m. 59.8s. to place 5th – an indication of the exceptionally high standard in G.P.S. mid-distance. Many athletes recorded personal best times at the Championships to narrowly miss 'podium' places. Young Paul Watzlaff showed great courage and 'High' spirit to finish both his 800m and 1500m races in the 13 Years Championship after being 'spiked' in one race and 'trampled' in the other. Paul

Andrew Light led the 17 Years Hurdles for 5 flights, only just pushed out of the places on the line. Team Captain Andrew Laurie gave his absolute all, all day, over 4 events. His 51.9s 400m (a p.b.) late in the day was heroic stuff. Rhys Hart's 6th place in 9m 24s for the Open 3000m was another noteworthy performance. Rhys had brought his time for this event down by over a minute during the season, running personal bests at every Carnival! As a coach, you can't ask for more than that.

We placed 8th in both the Junior Team pointscore (won by St Ignatius) and the Senior Team pointscore (won by Kings). Not too far behind Scots in the Juniors and Newington in the Seniors.

The C.H.S. Season

The Olympic Games divided the C.H.S. season into two halves. School and Zone Carnivals were all held early, while Area and State Carnivals were held after the Olympics in Term 4. The season stretched from April to December. Of course, many senior athletes sitting for the H.S.C. were unable to perform at their best this late in the year. After qualifying performances at the Eastern Suburbs Zone and Sydney East Area Carnivals the following boys qualified for the State Championships:

Coach's Report

The Young Ones, the First Fifteen for Y2K, had to hit the ground running this year, as our opponents seemed to be bursting with talent. There is no such thing as a rebuilding year in a coach's vocabulary. There is just, "The Season". But, there is no doubt the majority of those who were blooded this season will return next year with experience and growing strength. This year's team was a lot of fun to work with, characterised by the captain, Steve Irwin, a bubbly mixture of fast quips and very serious commitment to the game. The team won only a single game, but it had many closely fought battles which turned on a whisker.

The Preseason

Waverley tore into the game with a talented side this year. Hard forwards and speed out wide, especially at fullback, gave them the initiative. Our new combinations in the backline learned much about defence. We spent most of the game chasing and tackling – exhausting work, but very useful.

Just how useful the Waverley game was to teach the side about defence and pace became obvious when we played Hurlestone Agricultural High. Playing on their home field they scored a blazingly swift try in the first minute of the game. It looked as if we would be done by fifty points. Somehow, against a big, hard side, the Sydney High team dug in. Andrew Light's sixty metre try, set up by Steve Irwin's half-break and pass, was a highlight. We stumbled out of that game 12-10 winners. We had won our game for the season. Just as well nobody in the team is any good at prescience.

The games against our GPS brothers from Armidale are always great fun. TAS is a small school and we often win, but it is usually a grand tussle. This year TAS came to us to play at McKay, and they came to us in defence. Their astute coach, Allan Jones (no, not that one), whom I taught at Sydney High in his HSC year in 1974, had done his homework. His defence, a mad dog defence, was set right on the offside line and blasted our attack all afternoon. We did not adjust and TAS won a famous victory.

Cranbrook could not play us on a Saturday and could not get early release for a full length game midweek. The game was called off. Our next game was against St Stanislaus, a seriously-rugby school from across the Great Dividing Range. At McKay,

on our side of their Great Dividing Range, Stannies played an enjoyable brand of hard, running, rugby which our First XV matched all day. In the end the visitors took away the spoils with a 6-13 victory against a tenacious High side.

There was just one more trial game. We greeted visitors from the United Kingdom. The school was Uppingham, a private boarding school from the Rutland County in the heart of England. The two coaches were old friends who were originally from other schools in the UK which had billeted Sydney High more than once. The Uppingham visitors were treated generously by the Sydney High families and, although I had trouble filling up the list of volunteers who were needed in the first week of the July vacation, I want to thank all those who took billets despite the difficulties. The Uppingham visitors had a grand time both on the field and off it. Both sides played well in an open game full of interest. Uppingham won the game but High was now well prepared for the GPS season.

The GPS Season

St Ignatius at Riverview is always tough. We matched Iggies everywhere in the first half, clinging desperately close to them, positioning ourselves to take charge in the second half. Unfortunately nobody had mentioned this to the Iggies players who ghosted through to the tryline in the second half to score a lot of points.

We went to Bellvue Hill to play Scots. This was a tough game in which the Scots team was forced to defend close to their line for long periods. In the end their defence prevailed despite our good straight running and excellent ball retention. An early Scots try was the only score of the game – our loss by 0-5.

At Hunters Hill the team played their heart out, but the Joeys machine was presenting a punishing game of keep the ball and razzle-dazzle. Their tries showed flair and precision. Yet, our defence was so punishing that Joeys had to kick goals when presented with penalties. It was an excellent afternoon despite the 0-45 loss.

Then, at last, we came home for the next game, the much anticipated match against Grammar. For Grammar to post a successful season, it's a case of, "As long as we beat Sydney High". Both sides played this one with desperate passion. The lead changed many times and defence was king. But a couple of sudden, exciting, length of the field tries by Grammar steered them into the lead, late in the game and they were able to repel our desperate,

plunging, guttering, attacks just long enough to hold on to their 19-24 lead. Grammar's riotous euphoria on the final whistle was a bitter pill to swallow but perfectly understandable.

Our next game was also at home, against the GPS heavyweight division, Kings School They blasted us with a withering fire from giant earth shaking forwards and bullet swift backs. They had most of the ball. We did most of the tackling. In the end there was no strength in the legs and arms of the High side who were blasted aside for a 3-67 loss. Kings were the complete side, in personnel, and in training.

We were lucky to be treated to yet another game on the High killing field when we hosted Shore for the second last game of the season. Shore teams always produce quality forwards. In this match they used their forwards intelligently. We, again, found ourselves chasing the ball. However, this time there was a lot of tackling to do close to the ruck, but their backs were able to finish the job once

our defence was compressed. This was actually a very tough game for both sides. High, in the last quarter, finished strongly in attack, and forced Shore to defend their line most of that time. It was an impressive effort from a High side that did not have real speed in many positions.

We played our last game in the warm sunshine which had been a feature of this season. We were at Stanmore to play Newington. This was a game of excrutiating closeness. In the end Newington did win 19-23 but it was an open game, full of tries and smashing defence. This was the way to finish the season, because a majority of the team will be back in 2001, the first team of the real next century, and they will know that what they have learned this year will remain with them to start next season on a High.

Thanks go to Steve Irwin, a courageous and gifted captain. His leadership was strong, not only in the games, but at training where his commitment was catching. Our centres are back next year and I have rarely seen a pair of tacklers like these two, George Barris and Andrew Light. They will be stout in attack and defence next year. Reece Hamer is a relentless half-back with vision and flair. He is strong, decisive, and accurate with his pass. Next season should be a highlight for him. Our openside flanker, Lenny Pereira, is a revelation. He is totally committed to learning the trade. He is never switched off, either at training, or during a game, and he is back next season as well. In total, there should be eleven players back next year which will give us an edge, if we can find some speedsters amongst the four new bodies, assuming the surviving eleven don't turn to soccer next year.



Manager's Report

ustralian shooters have always been at the forefront of international competition. It may surprise some readers to find that the first Australian sporting team to tour internationally was a shooting team, to Creedmore USA in June 1876 – twenty years before the first modern Olympics.

Ever since the NRA's move from Wimbledon Common to Bisley Ranges, Australian full bore target shooters have been drawn to England to contest the Sovereign's Prize.

The establishment of the Australian Schools Combined Rifle Team was a challenging task from the outset. To organise the Team, a new association was formed – Junior Shooting Australia – which hopes to promote future tours and reciprocal visits in years to come. Despite the obvious logistical problems associated with exporting thirty-odd target rifles and related equipment, on 1 July 2000, as retailers struggled with the first day of the new GST, twenty-two students departed. The

team members were aged between thirteen and nineteen, and came from as far away as Brisbane and Bourke, including teams from three schools. Additionally, three NSW school students were selected into the Australian Under 25 Rifle Team, taking to twenty-five the total number of Australian Under 19 shooters at the Millennium Meeting.

Bisley, for those of you who don't know of it at least by reputation, is the UK's National Shooting Centre. Bisley Camp is more like a shooting village, with rows of luxurious club-houses, gun shops, and accommodation areas.

One striking thing about Bisley, and about British shooting in general, is the high participation rate of school and cadet shooters. The first week of competition was taken up with the Cadet Shooting Championships, with cadets attending from across the UK and abroad. The Australian Schools Team performed exceptionally well, with eight students (about one third of the Team) finishing in the top six per cent of entries to gain a prize in the Schools' Hundred. When not engaged in serious competition with other schools and cadet units, the students were able to entertain themselves trying out some other

shooting disciplines, including air gun shooting, trap and skeet, and even the opportunity to fire a few shots on a UK service rifle.

As the schools competition drew to a close, and the majority of cadets headed home to commence their summer holidays, competition for the Australian Schools Team was only beginning. Competitors from around the world arrived at Bisley to contest the "Millennium Meeting" conducted over a ten day period. Shooting "Bisleystyle" (three competitors on each target firing shot for shot), the Team began contesting the various matches, including several matches at 1,000 yards. The opportunity to contest the First Stage of HM the Queen's Prize was a real honour for the students involved, despite the gruelling elimination that followed – only three hundred competitors go on to Stage II, with only one hundred firing in the Queen's Final. Two Australian junior shooters (David Jacques and Alex Murray) performed extremely well to qualify for Stage II.

But Bisley is far more than just the shooting matches. Whether it was the Overseas Teams Reception, the Beating of the Retreat featuring an Army marching band, or the Millennium Concert and Fireworks Spectacular held on Stickledown Range, there was plenty to keep the team members entertained.

As the individual matches drew to a close, Bisley moved on to the Teams Events. The Australian Schools Team contested a number of teams events, the most prestigious of which was the Millennium Under 21 Match. For some, this was an opportunity to represent their country, with a team selected at Bisley from amongst all under 21 Australian shooters in attendance. Donning the green and gold was quite an honour. The remainder of the Team formed into an Australian Schools Team to shoot against their fellow team members in the match. The Australian Team was defeated by the United States Under 21 Team, despite some fine individual scores being posted.

From the time the proposed tour was announced, the support from shooting organisations, sponsors and individual shooters was excellent. Beginning with the "Bisley Barbecue" held at the ANZAC Rifle Range during the 1999 Queen's, and culminating in this publication, support from all quarters has been terrific.

So what was the upshot of the 2000 Tour? For the students involved, the opportunity to contest a major international sporting event, and to interact competitively and socially with some of the world's best shooters was a rewarding experience. Additionally, the structure for future schools team tours has been left in place.

The tour represents more than two years of hard work for a dedicated group of individuals led by Mr Douglas Fergusson, the Team Manager.

The 2000 Australian Schools Combined Rifle Team has, like generations before them, visited and experienced Bisley at its finest hour and through their involvement demonstrated, at a time when shooters from around the world gathered to celebrate the end of the millennium, that Australian shooting is set to prosper and continue well into the new century.

First Grade Rifle Shooting

ith five of the original eight First Grade members on tour to England, the Sydney High team for the GPS shoot 2000 was never expected to match the results of recent years. Things were made particularly difficult by the fact that not only the rifles, but the equipment and even ammunition were largely carried off to Bisley and we were left with the meager remainder.

Nonetheless, with the help of the newly installed MIC, Mr J.Fittler, Mr M.Mason, and the other senior members of the team, training got underway during the Easter break and continued on through second term and into the July Holidays. After Mr Fittler's departure for England in early July, Mr Mason and I organised the holiday training 'camp', and it was at this point that we realised that High could exceed all expectations this year.

Even with limited ammunition, it was plainly obvious that we had a few new shooters with plentiful talent. Young Quan Choi in particular, began to show his class with a few 'possibles' (maximum scores), and both Robin Alexander and Ricky Fong were promising. Things were aided by the experience of wind-coach Simon Burnett, who dropped out of the Bisley tour for the salvation of our team. Kevin Chan deserves a special mention as we would have given up early had his car not always been there to aid tired legs and broken bodies.

The GPS shoot loomed closer, and it became clear that the snap shooting, traditionally the toughest even for the most experienced shooters, was going to be a major obstacle for a youthful team. We practiced and practiced until there was no more ammunition, and then hoped for the best.

On the first official morning of the GPS shoot, Sydney High were seen as out of the competition, other schools and their spies not even bothering to sneak a glance at our scoreboard; but how surprised they were, when this young and inexperienced team rallied and put in excellent scores at both 500m and 600m for the Rawson Cup. Young Quan Choi (68/70), Robin Alexander (67/70) and myself (67/70) steered the team to a respectable fourth on the rankings list, only several shots from the winners (Kings) and unlucky to miss out on third place when we were beaten by TAS on centres.

The NRA Shield in the afleernoon had been in recent years a Sydney High favourite, since our difficult training at Malabar created a race of expert wind-coaches, Simon Burnett being perhaps the best on the range. His possible (50-3) as the last

shooter in his last year at Sydney High reconfirmed his status as the best at 600m out of all the shooters from all the schools. Again Young Quan Choi (49-2) and Robin Alexander (47-3) were joined by a rejuvenated Tim Brown (48-0) to push us way ahead of the other schools.

However, being the cruel sport that shooting is, our most inexperienced shooters could not cope with the difficult conditions, and although trying their best, put in two scores from which we could not recover. It became clear to us later that day, Sydney High had lost the NRA Shield to the Kings School. It did not matter that we were never expected to retain it, our pride was still hurt.

It was a momentous occasion from which we failed to recover, when on the final day we put in only competent scores at close range, a range which traditionally the other schools have excelled in. Our Snap scores were disappointing to say the least, and with lowered heads and much humility, we returned to Moore Park. Simon Burnett, Young Quan Choi and myself missed out on selection to the GPS combined team due to our disastrous performances at the Snap shooting. At the end of the day, we simply did not have the glare protection equipment we most needed when shooting into the sun.

However, upon some thought on the way back, we realised that the team as a whole had grown on each other over the months and we really had enjoyed ourselves immensely. We were never expected to win, and I think we exceeded all expectations when a team missing most of its star shooters still managed to conquer many of these well-equipped, full strength teams. An effort to be commended.

he 2000 Australian Combined Schools Rifle Team tour to Bisley was a unique experience in that it was the first of its kind conducted by three separate schools from Australia – Sydney High School, The Armidale School and New England Girls School. The schools individually have had shooting success with Sydney High winning the Great Public Schools Shooting Competition for the first time ever in 1998, TAS winning in 1999 and NEGS participating in the all-boys competition, albeit by invitation, for the first time in 1999. This impressive depth of experience and competitive success forged a team of talented young shooters ready to compete with the world's best shooters at Bisley.

During 1999 and the early months of 2000 the Team was finalised and members further acquainted with one another. For High and TAS this was a strange concept as the two schools had long been fierce competitors in all GPS sports. By the final training camp, the three schools were starting to resemble a comfortable and formidable team.

Unfortunately, due to the timing of the Queen's competition at Bisley, the three schools wer unable offer their best for the Annual GPS shoot. This was especially disappointing for reigning champions, TAS, and for SHS, who had only narrowly lost to TAS in 1999.

On 1 July the Team assembled at Sydney airport. We were all well prepared and eager to

embark on a month of touring a foreign country. Several members of the Team had never left Australia before and for some it was also their first trip on a plane.

Once settled in Bisley, we had an extensive schedule of both individual and teams matches. Amongst the first competitions was a cadet match, including individual and team competitions. The match attracted teams from throughout England and boasted a field of more than six hundred cadets. The Team also competed against the attending national teams, of both Under 25 and senior teams, in a general match. We finished in a commendable position, beating countries both obscure and renowned. The Team achieved success in the Under 19 International Match, beating the Canadians to finish second, behind an elite British squad, hand picked from more than six hundred shooters. Several members of the Team were also selected in an Australian Under 21 Team to compete against South Africa, America and Great Britain.

The individual shooting was even more demanding than the teams matches with students required to follow a comprehensive individual shooting schedule each day of competition, generally involving three matches.

While a large portion of time was devoted to shooting, the tour provided much more. The Team gained an insight into the history of a country at the heart of an Empire that has shaped Australia and the modern world. We experienced, first hand, the

different cultures of the world, not only England's but also of many of the nations that attended the Championships. The Team integrated well into the Bisley community, socialising and forging lasting friendships.

Sightseeing took place as much as possible within the restrictions placed on us by our shooting schedules. Most of all, the students benefited from the responsibility bestowed upon them during the tour relating to such matters as being prepared for individual matches and general conduct as representatives of their schools and their country.

In any mention of the tour and its success the people who enabled this success must receive recognition and the thanks that they deserve on behalf of the Team. Foremost was Sydney High Old Boy, Nathan Scudder who made nearly all the arrangements that allowed such a tour to take place, as well as providing the vision for this threeschool tour. The supervision:and organisation of Team Manager, Mr Douglas Fergusson, SHS Shooting Master Mr John Fittler, and TAS and NEGS Shooting Master Mr David Rose was instrumental in the running of the Team. We also benefited from the assistance of Mr Bondfield, Mrs Stening, Mrs Larsson, Mr Govendir and Mr Nelson, all of whom accompanied the Team to Bisley and provided ford the welfare of the students. Finally the parents and friends of the respective rifle clubs must be thanked for their tireless efforts in raising funds to help defray the cost of the tour.


