

Farewell Mr Tom Dolan (Social Science Teacher)

Mr Tom Dolan was a long serving social science teacher within our faculty. He started teaching at Sydney Boys High School in 1989 and served under three principals – Mr Outterside AO, Mr Stratford and Dr Jaggar OAM. As of this year, Mr Dolan decided that it was time to pursue other personal interests. Mr Dolan taught Commerce, Business Studies, and Economics. He developed the very popular school-based Elective Commerce Course and had an amazing passion for teaching economic theory and economics. He organised the massively popular ASX game each year and the EBE Business Studies competitions which our boys took great pride in competing, learning, winning and having lots of fun along the way.

Mr Dolan possessed a wealth of knowledge (Mr Wikipedia). He was highly organised, collaborative, smart and articulate. He had a wicked sense of humour. He played tricks on us all, challenged our thinking and understood how to bring out the best in both students and fellow faculty members.

In the 1990'S Mr Dolan was known as Mr Football. He managed the SBHS football program and coached the very successful First Grade team winning the GPS premierships in 1991, 1993 and 1995. Mr Dolan's First Grade football were also runners up in 1992 and 1994, and 1994 and Commonwealth Cup finalists. The school Football Cup, "Dolan Cup" has been named in his honour.


His Friday faculty morning teas were legendary and started as small affairs but developed to be full blown chef inspired buffets. He was never short of a story or two, often describing his gap year that lasted ten years, having travelled from London to Germany, following the hippie route through Turkey, Iran, Pakistan, Afghanistan and India. From there, he somehow ended up working in an Israeli Kibbutz followed by a stint in a North American salmon cannery before finally settling in Australia.

In typical Dolan humour, when asked what have you been up to lately? His response was:

"I now divide my time between Sydney, where I am working on a 'blockbuster' novel 'Terminal Detention' and Burkina Faso, where I have been appointed as football director at Ouagadougou FC".

He is greatly missed, and we wish Tom all the best in his new endeavours. In his own wisdom, "if in doubt about life, have a cuppa".

Farewell Mr Michael Kay (Head Teacher Science)

Mr Michael Kay joined the staff at Sydney Boys High in 1995 as the Head Teacher of Science, after a two-year stint teaching in Texas in the USA.

When asked what the highlights during his 27 years at High were, his answer was swift; being impressed by the brilliance of our students every day. Michael is also proud of the students at High every time they are out in the community either on excursions or representing the school at sporting events. "We always get complimented on their behaviour. I feel privileged to work with them". Michael also expressed his admiration at the collegiality and teamwork of the Science Faculty. He has led the department through 3 major syllabus changes in the last 20 years and stated that every year the teachers are developing and sharing better resources for our students. Michael has also personally, and as Head of Department, guided many students to First in State and/or State Rank positions every year and at the same time looked after the needs of students working at all ability levels. In 2010 Michael managed the upgrade of all 7 labs and in 2022 finally brought about the addition of a new, very much needed, Lab – 307.

Michael's achievements at High are numerous, not only as Science Head Teacher but as MIC of Volleyball. "Being MIC Volleyball has been a treat and a journey full of highlights". Winning the 2005 NSW CHS knock out was one of those highlights. SBHS Volleyball has won the NSW CHS KO another 10 times since then. Winning the U17 Honours Gold Medal at the 2019 Australian Volleyball Schools Cup was also right up there. "Our boys faced off against Volleyball's powerhouse Mazenod College (VIC) in the Final. They were strong, skilled and mentally tough enough to win in 5 long sets". This is an amazing testimony to the skill and dedication of Michael as a coach and as MIC.

All of High will miss Michael. Personally, I would like to thank him for the advice and leadership he has given me over the years. All the Science staff have deeply appreciated the guidance and friendship he has given them. Toastie Thursday's and Fruity Fridays will be sorely missed. Michael commented that he has become good friends with many Old Boys who stay in touch and keep him updated with their careers and families. "One of the things that is special about High is that Old Boys often drop into school just to say hello".

We wish Michael good luck, but not quite goodbye, as we will continue to see him around the volleyball court and in the science office and look forward to hearing about his journeys down the coast and abroad.

Farewell - Geoff Stein (Head Teacher PEHPD and LOTE)



Mr Geoff Stein is an old boy of the school and was in the victorious rugby union sides of 1971-73. All of these sides won the GPS Premiership and Sydney Boys High School held the GPS Title for three magnificent years in a row. He also played First Grade for the Easts Rugby Union Club after school.

Geoff has a diploma in PDHPE (Sydney Teachers College), and a BA in PDHPE and MA in Sports studies (CSULB). Over his teaching career since 1977 he has taught in four NSW schools as well as in California from 1983 – 1984, where he picked up an unshakeable American accent. It was always his goal to teach at SBHS someday.

Geoff returned to Sydney Boys High School in 1998 as the Head Teacher of PDHPE. More recently, LOTE was added to his executive role. As an educator, Geoff advocated that 'actions speak louder than words' and encouraged students to have a go and focus on achieving their personal best. He was a very enthusiastic PDHPE Teacher, who instilled energy and enjoyment in his lessons with his students. He was a great role model as Head Teacher and had genuine care and compassion for his colleagues, encouraging each to be their own "best version". As Head Teacher, Geoff developed, evaluated and produced some great workbooks for the staff to use in theory classes that were tailor made for our students at SBHS. He demonstrated effective teaching practices, lessons filled with passion. programs designed to improve physical competency and develop knowledge and skills for life long healthy living. He modelled and maintained a high level of fitness and a healthy work to personal life balance. A fitness guru, Geoff surfed and enjoyed swimming every day after work. In his executive role, Geoff 's administrative organisation was highly valued. He collaborated across faculties, drawing on the expertise and experience of colleagues to enhance outcomes in his faculty and his classroom, improving the literacy outcomes for his students. He was acknowledged and admired among the teaching body as a man of wisdom, integrity and common sense.

Geoff's contribution to sport at High was immense. He was involved in both seasons of sport: in summer (Basketball) and in winter (Rugby) on both Wednesdays and Thursdays. At sport he was dedicated to helping students achieve their personal bests and had a significant impact on many boys. He was instrumental in continuing the scholar-sportsman tradition.

Geoff was passionate about Sydney High and was a true legend of SBHS. He is in Queensland now and hopefully the surf is great. He is missed at High.

Principal's Farewell Address

Good afternoon Year 12, staff and parents. Welcome to our Farewell and Graduation Assembly for the Class of 2022. I acknowledge the Gadigal people on whose country we meet and pay my respects to elders, past, present and emerging. Lads, as you come to the end of your formal schooling I have to apologise to you for the cultural experiences at High forgone due to the pandemic and its effects. It was not the usual six years at High with all the customary events and rites of passage. We all tried our best, but important pieces were missing from our customary practices. You have had to revive the events and kick start the communal spirit that was lost during enforced isolation. You have made it easier for those who come after you to consolidate and deepen the High experience for new cohorts of students.

One hundred and seventy four of you are completing your six year journey at High. For half of that time you have been impacted by the pandemic. In my Principal's Message printed in the Year 12 Farewell Booklet, which you will receive today, I alluded to your grit and resilience in the face on ongoing obstacles. A selection of notable results by Year 12 students is included for your perusal. My thanks go to our executive team of Joshua, Rahul and Yu Ming. Leadership is often a lonely place where decisions have to be made. Thank you to all of our departing student leaders – Prefects, SRC, Community Service, PAWS, Equality, Social Justice, Environment – your growth in leadership and understanding of service will stand you in good stead in your adult lives.

I want to recognise and honour the six scholar-sportsmen who competed in two seasons of GPS Saturday sport and earned 99.5 ATAR or higher in the Trial HSC (2021-10). They will be presented prizes at Presentation Night next year. Well done to Jason Yan for participating in four sports in his final year. Seven boys played three GPS sports in Year 12 (2019-13, 2018-13). I want to thank the 77 Year 12 boys (2021 -84, 2020 - 91, 2019-77, 2018-95) who showed pride in their school and represented High in at least two GPS sports in their last year. Another 68 played one sport (2019-63, 2018-63). In this third COVID-19 year, 71.8% of the cohort showed their commitment to our scholar-sportsman ethos right to the end (2021-49.7, 2019-73%, 2018-75%). These statistics again affirm that our students value participation in school sport. Twenty-five students played two GPS sports for six years and another 41, one sport. I applaud our graduating Year group for their dedication to our ethos.



Congratulations to the most able and committed Year 12 students who represented the school at the highest levels in multiple sports this year. There were 28 boys from Year 12 (2021-28, 2019-29, 2018-24, 2017-17) who competed in first or second grade in two seasons of sport this year. 'Triple Firsts' were Nelson Cheng, Klimenty Tsoutsman, Kane Shields and Ashwin Barrett. Our 'Double Firsts' were Anthony Wang, Albert Giles, Cody Robinson, Thomas Britton, Leon Chau, Maxime Jalbert-Locke, Jia Jie Sheng, Jack Smiles, Brendan Alcorn, Nicholas Chen, Samuel Ezra, Daniel Low, Yu Ming Lee, David Li, Thomas McFarland, Tarrant Williams, Song Chen and Nikolai Shchekochikhin. Our 'One-Two Club' comprised Danny Pan and Alex Xue. This year our only 'Double-Two' was Alexander Girdis. Thank you all for your commitment to the values of our school - dedication and integrity - combined with the pursuit of excellence. Thank you to all the MICs. coaches and parents who helped to make our best practice co-curricular programs successful.

I want to expand on the value of compassion in our lives that I offered in my Principal's Message. Arthur Schopenhauer believed it was the basis of all morality. Compassion is care for self and others. It is about the acceptance and forgiveness of weakness or error. Compassion is about caring for others and developing modes of behaviour that are respectful of others. It is about behaviour – right or wrong, good or bad, as measured by the yardstick of living with others and treating them humanely. As a first principle, treat people equally. As the black activist and politician Jesse Jackson said, "never look down on anybody unless you are helping them up". To be compassionate is to reach out to others in word or deed. It is to recognise that we all have strengths and weaknesses and share the frailty



of the human condition. People everywhere are trying to achieve goals, succeed, love, be loved, find happiness and intellectual satisfaction, enjoy friendships and have some fun. Principal's Address

On behalf of everyone in our High community – teachers, support staff, IT staff, groundsmen, cleaners, coaches, Old Boys and volunteer parents - I extend a warm welcome to all new students this morning. We celebrate renewal each year by clapping in our Year 7 boys and look forward to clapping out Year 12 young men in 2027, at our farewell assembly. We acknowledge and recognise your previous academic success, earning you a coveted place at High. You were offered enrolment after a rigorous ability test. We understand that each one of you is an academically gifted individual with a unique profile of natural abilities, skills and interests. Our task is to mould these abilities interests and skills into talented performances, in multiple areas of school life.

To the new students joining us in Years 8, 9 and 11, I offer you a special welcome from the High family. You were selected because of your all-round achievements in secondary school so far. You have demonstrated talent in a variety of activities or excellence in one and competence in others. We welcome you and expect you will grow as people and add value to the High culture. You have a great opportunity to establish yourselves at our school by getting involved quickly in the co-curricular program. I urge you not to waste time waiting and watching. You need to grasp every opportunity. Get organised and be prepared to work really hard. Set yourself incremental academic goals and strive to achieve them. Focus on your own academic growth. You will need perseverance and conscientiousness to succeed. Many people are ready to help you. We have a school-wide BYOD policy. Our teachers will be endeavouring to work closely with you to find out more about your preferred learning styles and individual needs. We will be trying to improve your learning. We will be fussy about focus in order to get more out of



each lesson. We will need you to pay attention in class, take notes and participate positively in activities. We need you to discipline vourself to stay on task. Relate respectfully to everyone at all times. We will expect excellence from you, not just adequate work. Care about compliance - do all the work that is set for you at the required standard. Our shared values - respect, compassion, integrity, dedication - permeate our pedagogy. We are dedicated trustees of our reputation and success at High. The Principal's Address

"Special guest Mr Robert Orr PSM QC, Ms Angela Lyris OAM, relieving Director of Educational Leadership, Mr Saheel Afiz (Vice-President SBHS P & C), Professor Ron Trent (President SBHS School Council), Mr Eric Wong (Treasurer of the Sydney High Old Boys Union), Ms Judite Santos (Chair of Sydney High School Foundation Ltd.), Mr Vince Delzio (CEO, Sir Roden & Lady Cutler Foundation), Life Governors Mr Dennis Briggs and Dr George Lewkowitz, guest presenters Nathan McDonnell & Richard Halliday, special guests' partners, Old Boys, staff, parents and prize winners – thank you all for joining us this evening.

As it was for 2020, our major accomplishment for 2021 was to see out the second pandemic year safely. Our 3-year \$800k Classroom Modification Project was completed. During lockdown, we also had time to carry out extensive drainage, asphalting and concreting works in the approaches to the Governors Centre on the Flat and to complete our Wall of Gratitude, honouring more than 500 donors to the joint project. We managed to resurface the basketball courts, erect a storage shed for football and supply lighting, power and water to the barbecue shack. These capital works were delivered by David Isaacs for design, Jim Crampton for restoration works in classrooms and grounds and DP Admin John Prorellis for his expert project management. My heartfelt thanks go to them.

I must commend the High staff who transitioned so well to the Sentral Student Management System along with bedding down more modules in the CANVAS Learning Management System. Piling on top of the workload caused by COVID protocols and restrictions, their willingness to be involved exhibited highly professional cooperation and dedication. Thanks to Jamie Kay and Lynda Pinnington, Brett Jackson, George Barris and the CANVAS Leads who drove the changes. It was another extraordinary year in which High staff engaged in a great deal of professional learning in a context of stress, anxiety and disruption occasioned by the changing Public Health and Government responses to the pandemic.

In ATAR terms, our HSC results for 2021 were marginally better than for 2020, despite the fall in the League Tables, which do not account for the quality of courses in which Band 6s are earned. High boys received 580 band 6/E4s which was below our 600 target. The ATAR average for 2021 was 92.59 calculated for 213 candidates with a standard deviation of 7.54. The 170 students who enrolled in 2016 earned a mean ATAR of 93.1 with SD 6.95. The 43 later-enrolling students had an ATAR mean of 90.59 with a SD of 9.24. [The 16-year averages are 93.21 v 90.58]. 31 students scored 99 or better: 74 students earned ATARs between 95 and 98.95; and 163 overall scored 90 or above. Pleasingly, our tail was shorter with just 7.5% with ATARs below 80, the lowest percentage since 2015 and well below the long term average of 8.89%. We think that CANVAS access to learning materials and our Learning Support Team's efforts had a positive impact on this underachievement. In terms of Band 5 & 6 % per course, 11 courses were higher, 10 were lower and 11 stayed the same (most of which were 100%). Our 2021 course means compared to 2020 - 15 increased and 17 decreased. When comparing High with its SSSG, 24 courses were positive and eight negative. Hanyang Zheng and Ryan Lee earned maximum calculated ATARs. State rankings in their courses -Chemistry - Ryan Lee (1), Eric Ho (7), Auguste McNally (10), Richard Bao (13): Mathematics Advanced – Sarfaraz Ahmed (1) & Andy Xia (14) from Year 11; Mathematics Extension 1 - Hanyang Zheng (1); Physics - Hanyang Zheng (2); Latin Extension - Nicholas Arvanitellis (2); Chinese in Context -Yifei Wu (2); Software Design and Development - Cyril Vivek Subramanian (6); Engineering Studies - Ryan Lee (10) and in Biology - Julian Waring (17). Congratulations to you all. Some more achievements are outlined for you to peruse at the end of your program.

Tonight, we bid farewell to the Class of 2021, but before we do. I want to make some observations about our national context. Our social and political institutions are showing the signs of increasing pressure as the pandemic drags on. People are feeling put upon and want to push back. The antivax movement is disrupting traffic each day in the national capital. The issue of sexual discrimination and harassment in the Parliament and the workplace is becoming a central one as governments are perceived to be dragging their feet on reform. Apologies and promises must be replaced with legislation and enforceable penalties. The amendment of the Sex Discrimination Act and the unravelling of the Religious Discrimination Bill in the form it was presented to the House of Representatives, led to 5 Liberal Members crossing the floor to vote with Labor on amendments to enact protection for LGBOTI students in faith-based schools. These actions demonstrate the rising importance of acknowledging diversity in our society and providing legislative protection against discrimination based on sexuality or gender identity. The NSW Government was smacked by voters at the Super Saturday by elections - another sign of our collective COVID weariness.



Perhaps we will make time in the next Parliament to address the intergenerational problem of institutionalised racism in our society. For 60 years in NSW (until 1969) it was lawful for Aboriginal children to be removed from their homes at any time and for any reason. Despite the Racial Discrimination Act of 1975, the recommendations of Bringing Them Home Report (1997), the Apology to Australia's Indigenous Peoples (2008) and the Uluru Statement from the Heart (2017), it is hard to discern much practical progress towards inclusion and constitutional agency. It is arguable that as a society we are going backwards. In December 2017, 30.2% of indigenous respondents to a survey said that they experienced 'a form of everyday discrimination at least weekly'. In December 2020. the comparable response was 51%. In the last decade there has been a 56% growth in hospitalisations for self-harm among indigenous people. Indigenous men between the ages of 25 and 29 have the highest suicide rates in the world at 90.8/100,000 people. Despite being a small proportion of our population indigenous people complain about their daily 'torment of powerlessness'. As W.B. Yeats observed in 'Easter 1916' – Too long a sacrifice/ can make a stone of the heart'. News vision of an indigenous man attacking police with a tomahawk demonstrates the consequences of extended oppression – violence against the oppressor. You young men, as society's leaders of the future must be in the vanguard of the fight for a fairer and more just Australian society for everybody, so that we can maintain our cherished safe and multicultural society. Try to stop more hearts turning to stone. Goodbye and good luck. It was a privilege for me to serve as your principal'.

Sydney Boys High School Presentation Night, 15 February, 2022 Occasional Address by Robert Orr

I begin by acknowledging the traditional owners of the land on which we meet, the Gadigal people of the Eora Nation, and pay my respects to their elders past and present.

I warmly congratulate all the prize winners, and their support teams of family, friends, and importantly teachers. Well done.

Class of 1971

It is a great privilege to talk to you tonight. I was a student at Sydney High from 1966 to 1971. No doubt like many of you, I look on that as a wonderful but somewhat challenging experience. I now realise that one very important thing it did was expose me to a range of teachers and fellow students, with a range of personalities, interests, views, cultures, beliefs. This seems to me a key part of education; it helps you begin to understand yourself, a lifetime project, and that others are different from you.

Most of my fellow students will shortly meet for our much postponed 50 year reunion, and it will be a very impressive group of people. Any of them could talk to you this evening and discuss important things they have done and learnt. Everyone has a story.

I have been a lawyer, and mostly for the Commonwealth government, which is often a conversation stopper at social gatherings. But I found this career fascinating. I got to work with a range of public servants, politicians, and community representatives, and in particular it took me close to the key features of how our country is governed, and some of the basic issues facing us.

First contact

For one of these issues I want to return to the Gadigal people. In May 1788 Governor Arthur Phillip led a small detachment which went to investigate the killing of two convicts. The party passed quite close to the site of this School. At probably what is now called Little Bay, Phillip stumbled across about three hundred Aboriginal people who were meeting there, perhaps for a ceremony which reflected the complex laws that governed their society.

There were some important legal questions underlying such early meetings: who was in charge here; whose laws operated; and who owned the land, the British who had been here for a few months, or the Indigenous people who had been here for tens of thousands of years?

The answers which emerged and operated for the next 200 years were that British law applied, and the King of England owned the land. Local Indigenous laws and ownership rights under those laws were not recognised by the colonists. The practical reality was that Indigenous laws continued to govern Indigenous communities, but also that there was a conflict which spread across the continent to dispossess, degrade and devastate its Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Native title

However the answers to these legal questions were changed by the Mabo decision of the High Court in 1992 which recognised that Indigenous peoples did have native title rights to lands and waters.



The decision was very significant, very controversial and left many issues concerning native title uncertain. I was involved as a lawyer in dealing with these issues and developing for the Paul Keating Labor government the Native Title Act of 1993, and then significant amendments to that Act in 1998 by the John Howard Liberal National government. This included consulting Indigenous people, pastoralists, miners and others, who had very different views, developing policies, drafting laws, managing their passage through Parliament with the longest Senate debates on record, and implementing and defending those laws.

The Mabo decision and the Native Title Act were important because they went to the fundamental nature of Australian law and society, they adjusted the racially discriminatory effect of what happened at the arrival of the British, they acknowledged regret for this aspect of our history, they treated Indigenous people not as outsiders in our society but as equal and important members and the holders of extensive property rights, and they did so by peaceful democratic processes.

Despite the controversial beginnings, the native title framework which emerged is for now broadly accepted.



I have been involved in a range of other similar processes in my working life, including on whether Australia should become a republic, and protection of the Murray-Darling Basin river systems.

Democracy

More generally, I think that the Australian Constitution and system of government has deficiencies. I have seen these up close.

But one thing it now gets right is that on basic issues it has moved towards treating everyone as having equal rights, without discrimination: everyone can have a say, almost all of us can vote, stand for election, and bring legal proceedings. In the past this was not the case. And there are still some groups who in practice are disadvantaged in these processes and not fully heard, including Indigenous people, and others.

Further, our system assumes that people will participate, and in doing so not only express their views, but also listen to others. Phillip could not listen on that day in 1788, but even when he and his successors could, the European colonisation of Australia took place generally without regard to the views of Indigenous people, and other groups. And even now some do not listen, some are not heard. But the processes I have been involved in and facilitated show that it is possible to have respectful discussions on difficult questions, where people with very divergent views and interests speak and listen, and which can help address the issues which face us.

This experience prompts me to encourage everyone, especially young people, to be involved in debates about the future of our society. Find ways to make your voice heard. But also listen to and show respect for others. This reflects the principle that we are fundamentally all equal, though diverse. We all have a story that deserves to be told, and heard.


In conclusion, I again warmly congratulate all the prize winners, and especially those from year 12. I wish you well as you head off to further challenges and adventures.



The Principal's Address

Good morning and welcome to our Student Awards Scheme Assembly. To all the Student Awards recipients here today, well done and thank you for your dedication. Students who are strongly connected to our school tend to be fully involved in the Student Awards Scheme. US research shows that cocurricular engagement while at high school, if undertaken for two years or more, benefits individuals in multiple ways during tertiary study. Our most successful years academically, come when our boys are also the most engaged in school life, so you can understand why I would prefer everybody to be in the Student Awards Scheme. If you qualified for an award in 2021, I really want you to stay involved in 2022 and earn another one.

When I first started this scheme, it had three levels. So many boys took up the challenge that other levels needed to be added. Over time, we have increased the levels to eight. This growth is a response to the increasing engagement among our student body with the scheme, as well as a result of improvements made in the administration of the scheme and a broadening of the categories. Only Nathan McDonnell and Joseph Coates Awards are awarded on Presentation Night and have honour board entries for the recipients. Several boys have been so committed to school life that we have sought and received further recognition for them at state level.

Today, students receive school trophies manufactured inhouse using our laser cutter. I want to thank Ms Dam and her IA staff for the time and effort spent in manufacturing and engraving these handsome trophies each year.

We depend upon coaches, MICs and program managers to submit text files of the names of boys who have satisfied requirements for the completion of an activity. Nonetheless, students need to check their files frequently to see if they have been awarded all the points they are entitled to. It is their individual responsibility to advocate for the points they deserve.

I want to thank Mr Dowdell, who laid out the awards on the chairs, and Ms Ashton for her ordering, sorting, and checking of hundreds of awards each year. It is a lengthy and complex operation, but I think it describes the co-curricular life of our students accurately. I believe life balance is important – academics and co-curricular involvement complement each other in character development. That is why we go to so much trouble to record and recognise both aspects of personal enlargement. Learn organisation and self-management by involving yourself in school life. It will help your study.

Last year for Years 9 to 11 there were 3 bronze medallions, 61 silver, 95 gold and 67 platinum. Also, 72 School Plaques and 19 trophies. We are making 317 Awards today. Tonight, 15 McDonnell Awards and 11 Joseph Coates Awards will be presented. Given the COVID -limited opportunities during 2021, this was a great effort by Awards Scheme participants.

To the students receiving an award today, you have shown by your broad participation in school life that you understand our primary purpose here – to grow as people, to enlarge ourselves through our involvement with other people. We need to develop our physical, emotional, cultural and cognitive intelligences. Stay involved in the Scheme right until the end. Don't drop off in Year 11 or 12. Universities appreciate students who can demonstrate broad-based commitment over time to co-curricular endeavours as well as to academic success. It shows integrity. You do what you say you are going to do. It shows dedication – you stick at what you do over time to improve yourself. Treat all others with dignity – that shows respect. Treat others as you would be treated – that demonstrates compassion.


The Principal's Address

We want all Year 7 and later-enrolling students to take up the challenge to participate in school life. There are five good reasons you should participate. First, you will develop your social skills more quickly in more contexts to build positive relationships with more people. Second, you will learn how to manage your time better because you will be busy. Third, you will be able to explore a wide range of interests. Fourth, you will learn the value of commitment to an activity over time. Finally, your self-esteem will be lifted by your involvement with others as you grow.

You need to earn a progressively higher minimum number of points in the school year starting with 128 points for bronze. As you reach higher award levels, you need to score more points overall (128 becomes 144 then 160). For 2021, we needed to reduce the points required by 25% to allow for a term missed through lockdown.

The Student Awards scheme at High evolved from a threelevel scheme to a six-level system with an honour board entry for all school trophy winners. However, Nathan McDonnell (SHS 2008) earned so many extra award scheme points that we set up a 7th level for him. The McDonnell Award became the honour board level. Shuming Wang (SHS-2013) earned a whole lot more points than the McDonnell Award required, so an 8th level was added, named after the first Principal of High, Joseph Coates. An extra board was added for this award in recognition of the wonderful involvement in school life demonstrated by the recipients. Beyond that level, recognition is sought for boys at a state level.



The administration of the scheme is electronic, with a running tally of points being kept for every student. Nonetheless, it is the responsibility of each student to check his file to see if he has been awarded all the points he is entitled to. If there is an error, he should notify the Manager in Charge of the activity, to have the correct points authorised and sent to the DP.

Last year students in Years 7 and 8 earned 184 bronze medallions, 49 silver, 20 gold medallions, one platinum and even one plaque – 255 awards in all.

I want to thank each student receiving an award today. You showed by your broad participation in school life that you understand our driving purpose here – to grow as people, caring about other people and collaborating or cooperating with them. We want you to build respectful relationships with others through participation. We hope you will show compassion through school or community service. We want to enlarge ourselves. Our goals are collegial as well as individual. Get involved this year for the first time or stay committed to the Scheme if you are in it. If you do, you will feel a greater sense of belonging to the school; and you will also understand better what we mean when we say, that we have the High spirit.

The Principal's Address

Staff, students, parents and Prefects of Sydney Boys High welcome to our official recognition of student leadership efforts in our school and our investiture assembly for our 2022 School Prefects. I acknowledge this morning the Gadigal people of the Eora nation as the custodians of the land on which we meet and pay my respects to elders past and present and extend that respect to any Aboriginal people here today.

James Comey, the FBI Director who was sacked by Donald Trump because he refused to be manipulated into influencing an investigation into Trump's pre-election behaviour, later wrote a book entitled 'A Higher Loyalty'. It chronicled his career in public service and the Department of Justice and outlined his work with three Presidents of America. He described how he came to value the search for truth and integrity in leadership as driving values during his outstanding career. He was a very effective and popular leader who was called upon to display moral leadership on several occasions in his job. He was sacked in the fourth year of his ten-year term as FBI Director. He refused to provide unconditional loyalty to a President. He believed he had a higher loyalty to the values that made his character rather than loyalty to a President who he believed was telling lies and acting inappropriately in office. Leadership can be shown by not doing, as well as doing.

As student leaders, you will develop a set of moral guidelines or values that suits you as your preferred method of leading. We expect you to understand your duties clearly and to carry them out ethically and faithfully. You are in a learning phase about leadership. Schools can be good places to train and build up your knowledge about what works and doesn't work. Nearly always, leadership involves compromise. Learn how to compromise within a framework of action governed by a pursuit of truth and personal integrity. If you ask yourself whether a course of action is the right thing to do, your honest answer will be the best next step to take.

Thank you to all the students who have served our school in various teams this year. SRC, Community Service, Peer Support, Equality, PAWS, Environment, Media – not matter where you served, you exhibited leadership. We really appreciate that it takes courage to put your name forward for a role and even more courage to carry it out well. Congratulations to you all.

The quality of our Prefect body is a reflection of the quality of our school life. We want our most engaged and committed students to be nominated as candidates for this important school role. If every eligible voter participates responsibly, we will get the best and most diverse team of Prefects possible. Our Prefect traditions are our anchors but can also inspire this cohort to emulate or build on activities and priorities



that will become a new legacy. There have been so many great Prefects at this school that the current group must try to follow in some aspects of their role. The honour of such a long-established and prestigious position exhorts our new cohort of leaders to emulate their predecessors' deeds.

The Senior Prefect leadership team for 2022 - Captain Joshua Suto, as Vice-Captain Rahul Pant and as the Senior Prefect, Ming Lee, have carried out their roles admirably. The long and professional stewardship of Ms Rigby as Prefect MIC must be acknowledged and thanked. She has set high standards and always held our boys to meet them. At the same time, she is unfailingly supportive of the students she mentors in these important tasks. I want to thank her for her dedication to the role and for her effectiveness in it.

To move from internship to the point of getting their perpetual School Prefect badges today, Prefects had to prove that they could meet the requirements for the role. These requirements were demanding. Prefect interns had to continue to meet a predetermined academic standard. They had to maintain their participation in school life, play two GPS sports and earn a Student Awards Scheme Award in their final year. They had to have exemplary standards in behaviour, school dress and punctuality. COVID has interfered with our process to a large degree for two years, but we remain committed to our qualifying framework.

The Internship of our Prefects lasts for a full year. From this annual investiture assembly onwards, a new cohort of candidates will have to meet the requirements to be placed on the ballot. They will have to pass the test of democratic election by a constituency of students in Years 10 and 11, teachers and outgoing Prefects. Once elected they will have to perform well until their induction assembly as Prefect Interns and then for the next three school terms until they reach this culminating ceremony of signing the Prefects' Book and receiving their perpetual School Prefects badges.

Sydney Boys High Prefects are particularly self-disciplined people – they have proven themselves worthy of the honour shown to them. They have earned their recognition and acknowledgement. I congratulate all the students who are to receive their badges and sign themselves into history today in the Prefects Register, a ritual since 1952, and thank them for their service.

School Captain Address

There is no equation for leadership, no five-step process that transforms you into leading thousands or millions of people or followers. In essence what some call the "Apple ecosystem" encapsulates the core principles of leadership, it sums up how leaders are capable of influencing others in non-aggressive, non-assertive ways to create a better, more efficient world – Chinese philosopher Lao Tzu perfectly stated how "A leader is best when people barely know he exists, when his work is done, his aim fulfilled, they will all say: we did it ourselves".

It's this selflessness that distinguishes leadership from management, the difference between encouraging people to do what you want them to do, and inspiring others to do what they thought they could never – and whether you receive it in return, leaders are there for others, they're not there to promote a title or social status.

I know that today marks a significant milestone in our journey as Prefects – etching our names into High's history, and I can't express on behalf of the boys how privileged and grateful we are, for Dr Jaggar, Mrs Rigby and all other teachers, staff that have themselves lead us over the past 6 years, molding us into the boys we are today. Senior Prefect Address



The Senior Prefect

The guidance of the past leads us to our present.

The bones of primitive Homo sapiens first appeared 300,000 years ago, with brains as large or larger than our own. Over the last 100,000 years, brain shape has essentially remained unchanged, yet the human mind has evolved.

For in that time, great civilisations have returned to the dust from where they had first risen, wars have been won and lost, and technology has become more and more advanced with each passing age. And leaders, they have accompanied this development every step of the way - their purpose unchanged.

To listen. To inspire. To empower. During the past six years, the world around us has fundamentally changed – war, the acceleration of our deteriorating climate and an ongoing pandemic as humanity balances short term competition for resources and security, with the long-term survival of our species and ecosystem. And during this time, I have sought comfort and inspiration from the ancient world.

For the ancients, leadership was studied through exemplar. The rise and fall of one such leader, Julius Caesar, exhibits how to lead and, how not to lead. A man who started his career in near poverty and became a victorious general, statesman and Rome's first perpetual dictator since the fall of the Tarquin Kings. Suetonius pays tribute to Caesar's endurance and leadership prowess - his physical attributes, his practical military strategy, and his loyalty.

If a travelling companion fell ill, Caesar gave him the only lodging and himself slept outdoors on the ground. He advanced those who aided him. If highway robbers helped to defend his honour, he once boasted, he would not have hesitated to promote them.

However, for Suetonius, Caesar's virtues as a leader were his greatest flaws. After he became dictator, Caesar rewarded only his men with the most important positions of responsibility. He greedily accepted every honour voted by the senate some of which were traditionally reserved for gods.

Moreover, Caesar had no respect for the senators. He did not care for their opinions nor for the sanctity of their position. Once, when they came to present him with yet more honours, he refused to stand and greet them. According to Suetonius,

"it was through this action especially that he stirred up deep and deadly feelings of hatred."

Rereading history allows us to see where the greatest flaw of a leader lies - in their character.

And despite momentous change in our political and social institutions, there appears to be constants that seem entrenched within our leadership models and ideals.

Here in an election year, we have heard very similar statements about tradition, values, and beliefs that echo the past.

We have an obligation to learn the lessons that great leaders have offered. Yes, we should be loyal. Yes, we should be bold. We must communicate clearly, and we must have a vision. Nevertheless, we should temper these qualities with respect, with humility, and we should have high standards for ethical and just behaviour.

Is it a valid reflection to ask whether leaders have indeed changed in our modern world or if they are just distorted reflections of the past?

The Prefects here today are not the only leaders in this hall. We all lead in one way or another. Our teachers lead our learning; you lead in the classroom, and on the sporting pitch and in the community.

And we... we are the leaders of the future.

There have been hundreds of thousands of years of human history that have culminated to this moment. Will we lead our species to its renewal or accelerate its destruction?

The Principal's Address

Special guest, Jared Smith (SHS-2019), staff and students, welcome to our assembly, held on Gadigal land. Our purpose today is to celebrate NAIDOC week retrospectively as it occurred during the holidays (July 3 to 10). NAIDOC week gets its name from the group responsible for organising the celebration - the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. It has organised the week of events since 2005. The day is set aside in the calendar as a national time to reflect upon and celebrate the history, culture and achievements of First Nation Peoples and to recognise them as the Traditional Custodians of the land we share. Its premier celebration is the NAIDOC Week Awards Ceremony which showcases the achievements of First Nations people. This year's theme is 'Get up! Stand up! Show up!' It is a rallying cry for First Nations peoples to get involved in the struggle for political recognition, truth telling and treaty.

NAIDOC Week arose out of the civil rights movement of indigenous people in the 1930s, culminating in the Day of Mourning held at the Australian Hall in Sydney on January 26, 1938, marking 150 years of white occupation of aboriginal land. Aboriginal people in Australia have struggled for a long time to be recognised and to have their grievances heard respectfully. Their key concerns relate to the absence of closure to the invasion of 1788 by way of a treaty, and to the shameful historical treatment of indigenous people in our national story. Full citizenship and equality of treatment were the pillars of their long campaign. The Day of Mourning was held from 1938 to 1955. It was then moved to the first Sunday in July and recast as a day of remembrance and a celebration of cultural heritage. The second Sunday in July was nominated as a day of remembrance for Aboriginal people and their heritage. In 1975, it was decided that the celebrations should continue for the entire week. In 1991 the celebrations were expanded to include Torres Strait Island people.

Aboriginal people have had the right to vote in Federal elections since a 1962 Amendment to the Commonwealth Electoral Act. Apart from being counted as citizens for the first time, the main achievement of the 1967 referendum for aboriginal people was to raise their expectations regarding civil rights and welfare. Bringing Them Home: The Stolen children Report, was tabled in Parliament in May, 1997. It made 54 recommendations, many of which are still awaiting implementation. The Uluru Statement From The Heart (2017) had three objectives: a constitutional change establishing a first nations voice in parliament; a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement making with the Australian Government and Makarrata commission to oversee the process of truth-telling about Australia's history and colonisation. Progress since 2017 has been slow, despite the efforts of the former Minister for Indigenous Australians, Ken Wyatt and his counterpart in the current Labor Government, Linda Burney. Having a real voice is proving to be a constant challenge for indigenous people. Prime Minister Albanese has pledged support for the Uluru Statement and has promised the long-awaited recognition of First Nations voice in national political decision-making.

We all have to 'Get up! Stand Up! Show up! We can address and call out our underlying racism by education, by assemblies such as these, by recurring conversations with aboriginal people, but more tangibly, by finalising the long invasion with a treaty and by public truth-telling about the massacres, the stolen generations and aboriginal deaths in custody. We have avoided seriously confronting our past for too long. In this term of Federal Government something constitutional really needs to happen. We need to start living the values that we espouse, not just for the colonisers, but for all people of Australia.

At High, we have a policy to engage with indigenous culture through our curriculum topics or texts, our Na Ngara art collection, our 19-year cultural exchange with the Kamilaroi children of Boggabilla Central School and our annual assemblies celebrating Sorry Day or NAIDOC Week. We cannot make a serious claim to being a fair and just society until we have addressed the issues raised so often around voice, treaty, and the need to tell the truth about our past. We must shed our historically paternalistic, if not overtly racist, approach, and adopt a genuine spirit of collaboration, to work together to address the historical recognition and wellbeing issues and legitimate claims of our First Nations citizens. We have a lot to learn from them about managing and maintaining the land sustainably. We haven't been able to do so during the last 200 years. They have 60,000 years of experience we can draw upon to help us. NAIDOC Week is an important time for us all to reflect upon the issues surrounding the future of our First Nations peoples.

The Guest Speaker's Address

Good morning Dr Jaggar, teachers, staff, and all current High boys here today. I too would like to acknowledge the Gadigal people as traditional custodians of the land on which we meet today, and pay my respects to Elders past, present, and future. My name's Jared. I'm a proud Aboriginal man, my mob hailing from Dharawal country which stretches along the east coast from Botany Bay down past Wollongong.

It wasn't long ago that I was sitting in those very same chairs.

I finished high school in 2019, which turned out to be great timing in hindsight, not because of COVID, but because I still had past papers for extension 2 maths. Unlike most of you, I joined High quite late, in Year 11. Even stranger was the fact that I transferred from a performing arts high school without much focus on academics or sports. At least I had a bit of an advantage in Music, which I ended up dropping. The level of sporting competition was also drastically different at High, but luckily, I had a couple years of representative soccer under my belt. I, of course, did rock climbing.

The jump academically was the hardest part though. I went from barely trying at my old school, to feeling like I failed every subject after sitting my first half yearly exams at High. Suffice to say, my marks and rank were complete garbage. But over the next year and a bit, I put in a lot of hard work and ended up doing pretty well.

These days I'm studying Software Engineering at UNSW, pursuing a career in music, and just accepted my third internship offer at Google, so trust me when I say, it's never too late to turn things around. Oh, I'm also getting married in December to my girlfriend of five years.



Now, earlier this month it was NAIDOC week. Originally, I was going to be talking to you all beforehand, but your teachers found out I was coming and decided to stage a strike on that very day. I'm just gammin. But now that I'm here, I'd like to share a bit about what NAIDOC means for me and how you can all get involved, not just with NAIDOC, but with keeping the oldest continuous living culture alive for generations to come.

As I'm sure many of you already know, this year's NAIDOC theme was "Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!" reflecting on the proud history of resistance and activism by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The problem is, if I were to ask you all right now to name an historically important Aboriginal resistance leader or activist, you likely wouldn't be able to outside of maybe Eddie Mabo. Which is completely understandable. Unlike Martin Luther King or Nelson Mandela, Indigenous leaders like Pemulway, who successfully resisted multiple incursions of colonists into Dharug land, are not commonly talked about.

Therefore, the first step is gaining perspective and subsequently, empathy through knowledge. For instance, you may know about the stolen generation, but did you know that it ended less than 50 years ago? There are Indigenous people alive today that are still trying to reunite with their family and culture. What about the fact that Indigenous people represent only 2% of the national population, and yet 27% of the national prison population?

Obviously we still have a long way to go in achieving true reconciliation.

But Indigenous Australia isn't just a short history book of atrocities, it's actually a huge 65,000-year encyclopedia of knowledge on everything from environmental management and navigation to societal structures, back burning, and the Year 11 chemistry syllabus favourite, cycad toxin leeching.

So, the absolute best way that you get up, stand up and show up is by simply learning more about both the good and the bad of Indigenous history, and by sharing that knowledge with the people around you. Because an Australia of the future where there has been a process of truth-telling and conversation about the real history of our great land, is one where healing and unification can take place.

Also, just some quick advice. Looking back on my time at High, it was actually all of the other opportunities, things like representing High in sports, performing as a featured artist at school spectacular and spending my whole Friday night debating that I am most thankful for. Those are the kinds of things that not only increase the strength of your resume or the number of lines on your blazer but build your character. So, while you're here, take advantage of as many of the opportunities you have access to at High. I mean, what other school lets you do rock climbing as a sport?

Sydney High School Foundation

Foundation Report from Chair

The Sydney High School Foundation has a long and proud history. It was established in 1986 as the brainchild of Robert "Bob" Outterside (Headmaster 1977-2001), who's passing we mourned in August 2022. Bob's vision for the Foundation was to ensure that many of High's key assets were managed for the long-term benefit of the school without having regard to the imperatives of government.

The Foundation is governed by a board made up of directors appointed by the P&C, the Old Boys Union and includes our Headmaster. While the largest Foundation asset is the Outterside Centre, it also holds High's interest in the Governors Centre and is responsible for the Fairland Pavilion and the McKay Playing Fields (amongst other things).

My fellow directors and I are both proud and humbled to be continuing Bob's vision today.

The Foundation's focus in 2022 is to continue to improve the Outterside Centre, having completed the new Pontoon and a renovation of the ground floor in 2021. We are also working on capitalising on an acquisition of land from the neighbouring Sydney Water facility which will allow significantly improved access to the Outterside Centre and plan on refurbishing the first floor.

Our other area of focus is a plan for redeveloping the Fairland Pavilion. The Foundation's Board continues to persevere and we're optimistic that we'll deliver a good outcome for future generations.

The Foundation supported the new science demountable classroom (in conjunction with the Department of Education) is incredibly proud of the Governor's Centre becoming fully operational.

The Foundation's ability to continue to invest in our proud School's key assets cannot happen without the ongoing and generous support of donors, Old Boys, teachers, parents, and many volunteers.

P and C Report

The Parents and Citizens Association at Sydney Boys High (P&C) is an active community of current and past parents and carers. Our aim is to focus on the interests of the school community through collaboration with staff, parents, and our affiliated stakeholders to support the learning, recreational and welfare needs of our students.

The Year Summary

2022 has seen a return to some normalcy for our students and teachers with the return of face to face education after two years of COVID disruptions. The P&C has therefore worked





hard to support the school community in bringing normalcy into the life of our teachers and kids. It has been a very active year for the P&C as it moved at pace in helping the school organise various face to face events, engage the parent community through its added social media profile and host a range of information events that have been well received by the parent community. In addition, the P&C committee has continued to contribute financial support to the school for various activities. The P&C also used our social media tools such as Facebook, Whatsapp, Instagram and SZapp to engage more people to volunteer for our school events and build the next generation of volunteers from the junior years to effectively carry the important work P&C do for the school. We wish to extend a deep gratitude on behalf of the community for the time, skills, and effort from our many volunteers across the parent community.

The P&C meetings and events

With school returning to normal but the COVID restrictions still around, the P&C Committee focused on improving hybrid arrangements to continue to build relationships within our High Family (School Executive Staff, Sydney High School Foundation and the Old Boys Union) and the parent community. We continued to host our monthly meetings online to encourage participation from our parents and assisted in organising in person events.

We utilised our monthly general meetings to feature our teaching staff and volunteering community alongside external presenters. In all, we have run an event every month for this calendar year. The first event of the year hosted by P&C was a welcome to our new parents to the High community. The online event succeeded in providing all the relevant information needed to start our new parents (all 204 attendees) journey well at High. The P&C improvised by inviting a student from Year 10 and a parent from Year 8 to speak to the new High community which made the presentation relatable. The March event focused on Dr Jaggar providing a summary of our HSC results for 2021. The April/May event continued our series of information from the school executive staff. Following the HSC results in English for 2021, Ms Cassandra Pride provided our parents a good overview of our English program at High and the necessary steps the school is taking to improve the quality of English at the school. In June the P&C hosted our first webinar hosting Kirra Pendergest, CEO and founder of Safe on Social Media to discuss the important topic of cyber safety and provide practical strategies to support our children's online safety. This event was our annual joint event with Sydney Girls P&C. We then rounded our webinar event by hosting another guest speaker. Brendan Harms from Gameware gave a special presentation on the topic of "Building a Healthy Relationship with gaming". This was a popular webinar attended by over 150 parents which provided practical tips on reducing the addiction to games in our young adults. The P&C does have more events to pursue this year to enrich our parents' knowledge about the school and topics that impact our boys.

The P&C has actively supported the school with key events this year such as providing volunteers and catering for the Open Day and the Year 12 Farewell afternoon tea.

Collaboration and Engagement

The P&C Committee continued its strategy to engage consistently with our students, the parents, the teaching cohort as well as other partner associations serving the High community. In the spirit of collaboration and connection with Sydney Girls High, the P&C extended invitations to the Sydney Girls High parent community to join our June webinar event. To place the P&C in context of the school operations, we invited the chairs of the Old Boys Union (Paul Harapin) and High Foundation (Judite Santos) to speak at our first general meeting. The P&C are represented on the Sydney High Foundation who manage the maintenance and development of our sporting facilities. The Old Boys Union continued to offer support and guidance with a variety of career webinars and offers of connections to our current students. The journey our boys have at Sydney Boys High continues for many years and the links to the Old Boys Union and the Sydney High School Foundation are a timely reminder in these challenging times.

The P&C committee also actively promoted the use of social media channels to better inform our school community. A special recognition has been to setup a Whatsapp group for all new Year 7 parents to help them navigate through various information challenges in their first year at the High. The P&C also collaborated with other sports associations to receive a summary report at end of each season. We also actively promoted the creation of parents Whatsapp groups for each sport which has been highly effective in providing information to our parents.

Appreciation of Teaching Staff at High

It's been another challenging year for our teaching staff due to a combination of return to face to face learning as well as ongoing impact of COVID infections which continued to impact the community in the first half of this year. The P&C would like to formally acknowledge the important role our teaching staff play in shaping the lives of our boys while constantly adapting to the challenges of online teaching due to the pandemic. World Teachers Day, celebrated in October, prompted the P&C to show our appreciation on behalf of the High community with a gift of a coffee machine to the staff room.

The P&C also actively promoted the involvement of parent volunteers during teacher recruitment processes to help the school find quality teaching candidates.

Donations

In the continued spirit of supporting our school in servicing our boys, the P&C has contributed \$71,690 this year. The donations supported classroom technology upgrades, maintenance of the bus sinking fund. The donations also supported a replacement air conditioner for Junior Library as well as a school bus replacement.



Parent Volunteers

The High Spirit continues to be supported by our school community and we wish to extend a deep gratitude on behalf of the community for the time, skills, and effort from our many volunteers across the parent community. Our Year Group Coordinators managed to host an in-person catch up for the Year Group Parent Representatives before the lockdown. Vivian Tan, our Library and Literacy parent representative, kept us well read through her newsletter THE RECORD 2021 92 "Light on Literacy" which promotes the parent book club at High and the learning and reading resources available through our library.

If you follow the P&C and the school on social media (@sbhspandc, @SydneyBoysHigh, @sydneyboyshs) you will notice our communicator extraordinaire Binh Johnsun (Events) has kept the community up to date with what's happening in the school, especially to the joy of Old Boys who want to keep a connection with the school. The P&C has also benefited from more sophisticated technologies and behind the scenes efficiencies thanks to Dan Johnsun as the Communications Officer. Both Dan and Binh have been integral in the P&C contribution to communications and events at High. Thanks to Lily Li for smooth running of all P&C events and keeping detailed records of our executive meetings. Thank you to Susan Mitchell and Lily Li for maintaining the Parent List and Mohit Singh for acting as Parking coordinator. The Canteen

The High Canteen proudly continues the tradition of staff, students and families working together to support the school. As a P&C run canteen, all operating profits are returned to the school to fund specific projects for the benefit of all students. This year, the allocated projects include contributions towards:

- \$15 000 towards the bus replacement programme
- \$15,000 for new Science textbooks
- \$25,000 for the installation of air conditioning in the Junior Library
- \$10,000 for staff professional development on Glasser Choice Theory

This is possible due to the generosity and commitment of our parent volunteers, Prefects, SRC students, and our experienced canteen staff.

The Canteen Committee, comprising parent volunteers, the canteen managers and Dr Jaggar, is responsible for overseeing the operations of the canteen. This year saw the retirement of Tania Kirkland as Canteen Committee President. Despite no longer fulfilling the role of President, Tania is still actively involved with the Committee, and we thank her for her commitment. In addition, we welcomed Janet Yan and Charmaine Francis to the Committee as co-Treasurers. They have worked throughout the year to streamline the data entry and invoicing systems. Finally, Cecilia Chan continues to work tirelessly as the volunteer coordinator. Cecilia recruits new volunteers, manages the roster to ensure we have sufficient volunteers each day and works with school administrative staff to ensure the canteen complies with all child protection requirements.

As part of our "Healthy School Canteen" accreditation, we continue to expand the number of menu items made fresh daily on the premises whilst decreasing the availability of processed foods. This is only possible through the generosity of our parent volunteers, who assist in food preparation (making upwards of 180 lunch orders/ day and food for over-the-counter sales), suggest new menu items and often donate the ingredients to make their favourite dishes. Thank you to all our volunteers whose commitment and support are invaluable and much appreciated. Also, we sincerely thank the outgoing prefects and our year 12 parent volunteers. We wish you well in your future endeavours. The volunteers and prefects work together so effectively due to the excellent management of the canteen by our managers Karen Barry and Eirini Kallia and casual assistants Kylie Manias and Yili Zhang. Yili joined us mid-year and has quickly become a valued team member. On behalf of the school community, we would like to thank the canteen staff for the time and energy they give to the canteen, often going above and beyond to provide a varied, healthy and affordable menu for the students.

As part of our environmental commitment, the Canteen has continued the transition to more eco-friendly and sustainable products. This year saw the introduction of recyclable and compostable sandwich packaging.

The Old Boys community was saddened in August to lose one of our much-loved former Principals, Mr Robert 'Bob' Outterside AO. Bob's time at Sydney High commenced in the classroom in 1958, and he served as an inspirational Mathematics teacher until 1960. It was during this time that he also earned his two test caps playing rugby for Australia, bringing his enthusiasm for the game to the School.

In 1977 Bob returned to Sydney High as Principal and he is fondly remembered as a highly respected educational leader

during his fifteen years in the role. In 1990 his services to education and the community led to him being appointed an Officer of the Order of Australia, a tribute to the impact he had on so many. To this day, Bob is regularly remembered for the influence he had on the lives of both students and staff, and there has been an outpouring of such recollections since his passing.

Bob was seen as a leader who placed an emphasis on the goodwill between staff and students, seeing these relationships as essential for a thriving school community. The School archive holds hundreds of pages from Bob's retirement showing him to be a highly-devoted and caring educator who tirelessly dedicated himself to the service of students. Many notes and articles refer to him always striving for excellence, while ensuring equal opportunity for those within the community. The outpouring of affection by both colleagues and students illustrate the esteem he was held in by all. Bob also left his mark as one of the drivers behind the creation of the Sydney High School Foundation during his time as Principal. This legacy will live on as the Foundation continues to strive for the best educational environment for the boys. Fittingly, the Abbotsford boatsheds were named in his honour, ensuring his name will be remembered by the School community in the years to come.

In July the School community was saddened to hear of the passing of legendary Sydney High School rugby coach and beloved history teacher, Anthony 'Tony' Hannon (known affectionately to his students as 'Tozza'). Hannon began teaching at High in 1974, and he taught at the School for over 30 years. Tony was universally loved and admired. Craig Wing ('97) famously saying that across his career in the NRL, State or Origin, Australia and international rugby, that Mr Hannon was the best coach he ever had. Tony stated, when asked about life, "that the secret of life is to find something you like doing and do it as long as you can. After twelve years of teaching I came to a school which combined all of the things I like about teaching: bright students, competitive sport (especially Rugby), and friendly staff. I have always wanted to be in the classroom, have never had to chase promotion, and I find that every day, even in the same school, is different.

Rest in Peace to both Mr Outterside and Mr Hannon, legends of Sydney High.

Congratulations to Kerry Rubie ('58) who was recently awarded an MBE for Services to Innovation, Leadership and Governance in Adult Social Care in this year's New Year's Honours List. Congratulations also go to Professor Peter Anastasius Gerangelos ('77), Professor of Constitutional Law at the University of Sydney, who was awarded an AM for significant service to tertiary legal education, particularly to constitutional law, and to professional organisations. Lachlan Spark ('97) reached the end of his epic challenge to run consecutive half marathons from Hobart to Cairns to raise awareness for mental health. Running every day since he began in early February, he unofficially cracked the world record for most back-to-back half marathons, 228. Congratulations, especially in support of R U OK Day, founded by Old Boy Gavin Larkin ('85).

This year's Back to High Day, on Saturday, July 30, was yet another glorious day for the young and the young at heart after a two year absence. High hosted The Kings School at our sacred home of sport, McKay Oval, where our Junior Rugby teams were victorious, displaying great attacking flair and tenacity, while our First XV played valiantly. The First XV fixture featured a minute's silence honouring the memory of teacher, year master and rugby coach Tony Hannon, mentor and friend to so many Old Boys, who had recently passed away. High Football Junior A teams had some very good wins and hard-fought draws against Kings. Both the First XI and Second XI played their games next to McKay and certainly enjoyed having the additional Old Boys crowd in attendance. Away from McKay there was plenty of activity in the School gym, where the First Grade Volleyball team were up against fellow undefeated Scots. While they started poorly, High overcame their opposition and ultimately won convincingly. The amazing twenty-year Sydney High Volleyball success story is unprecedented in GPS sport and the 2022 team is on track to secure another GPS First Grade Premiership. Off the field, we had a wide



range of Old Boys (from 1965 to the most recent leavers) providing boisterous support and showing their genuine commitment to remaining part of the High community. A big thank you to all those Old Boys and parents who supported High and to those who purchased a prestigious OBU cap on yet another very successful Back to High Day.

Sadly, we lost a number of Old Boys who passed away during the year. J Doug Donoghue AM (1953), former director and life member of Rowing Australia passed away at home in Edgecliff on 1 August 2022, aged 86. Doug commenced rowing at Sydney High School where he coxed fours and the eight before finishing his school rowing in the Second IV. He did not forget this grounding and gave back by later coaching junior crews and co-coaching the 1st VIII. He was immensely respected by SHS rowers of the 1950s and 1960s and was unendingly supportive of High Rowing, providing expert advice and attending regattas and fundraising over the years. He joined Sydney Rowing Club whilst still at school and served as Director and Vice-President, receiving the Order of Merit and remaining the Chair of the Sydney Rowing Club Foundation until a few months prior to his death. He was no stranger to assisting the sport with media, including doing the ABC radio call for the

Olympic rowing in 1976 and the TV commentaries for both the 1984 and 1988 Olympic rowing. He was also a regular at local regattas with his commentary heard at the NSW GPS regatta and national regattas for many years. His professional life was largely served with Ampol where he had a broad range of experience in senior corporate positions which proved helpful to the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC), to which he provided strategic advice as a member of its Executive Committee. In 2020, Doug was elected to life membership of Rowing Australia. He was also a director of the AOC Foundation and life member of the AOC.

Doug's contribution to rowing, the Olympic movement and High has been exceptional.

Dr John Bach OAM (40) maritime historian and author, passed away on 7 July 2021.

Lionel Hovey ('55) passed away suddenly on 20 August 2021 from a stroke.

Alan Powditch ('58) passed away on 23 August 2021. Alan lived a full life with a wide range of interests including more than twenty years playing bowls, membership of two Probus groups, an active interest in gardening (especially roses), family genealogy and local historical research. Former High Mathematics teacher Darren

McQuillan passed suddenly due to cardiac arrest on 16 May 2022. Darren taught in the mathematics faculty for several years before transferring to Sydney Girls. He was a staunch supporter of the Basketball Program while at High. Dr David Lewis ('45) passed away on 8 June 2022.

We send congratulations to Sydney High Old Boy, Mark Prater ('00) who coached the Australian men's rowing VIII to a bronze medal at the world championships in September.

Congratulations to all Old Boys who have achieved their goals in life during 2022 and trust our Class of 2022 achieved their hopes for life after High.

Taking place in the gym due to persistent rain, the event ran smoothly and successfully with much gratitude to the teachers who participated, including: Ms Roias, Mr Chapple, Mr Rich, Mr Ormsby, Mr Ohlback, Ms Harcourt, Ms Luu, Ms O'Driscoll, Mr Fuller, Mr Higgins, Mr Broockmann, Mr Paul, Mr Matto, Mr Huynh and Mr Taylor. The tremendously high turnout of spectators from all year groups packed the gym stands with loud cheering and enthusiasm from both watchers and participants, resulting in a large promotional opportunity for the school's wellbeing and mental health outreach programs.

On the topic of Youth Mental Health, to raise awareness on mental wellbeing and suicide prevention, throughout the month of June the Prefects undertook The Push up Challenge, promoting the event through Instagram stories as well as in the High Notes. At the end of the month, our community dubbed "The Humans of Sydney High" completed a total of 146,613 push-ups and raised \$2,015 for the Push for Better Foundation. This number is a testament to the hard work that all 109 participants put in, and we hope to see this tradition continue in future years. All money raised from The Push up Challenge was directed towards reducing the stigma surrounding mental health and encouraging students to seek help when they need it.

Throughout our operations over the four terms here as Wellbeing Prefects, we brought attention to LGBT+ activism through the reintroduction of the Prefects vs NSW Police Basketball Game on Wear it Purple Day, an Allyship Workshop organised with excellent help of Mr Ormsby, and a Pride awareness program in the form of Instagram stories and posts during the course of Pride Month.

Additionally, during national NAIDOC Week, the Prefect Instagram Page saw a post on the theme of 'Get Up! Stand Up! Show Up!' celebrating NAIDOC week and specifically the achievements and works of First Nation authors and creators. In addition to this, we helped bring about a designated First Nation authors section in the Senior and Junior Library, encouraging students to learn about their experiences through literature.

Being our first year in a while without a COVID lockdown, it was great to be able to bring back old favourites and create new initiatives which we hope will continue for years to come.

Furthermore, the Public Relations role played a supporting role in strengthening High Spirit, with the return of Sport Highlights celebrating the sporting successes of High students. Alongside posts of the Prefects' support at GPS Swimming, Head of the River and posters for High vs Grammar, High vs Scots, our goal was to reignite the High Spirit which may have been lost through months of lockdown and lack of GPS sport.

Wellbeing Report

Term One, we welcomed our new students from Years 7 – 11 with various Transition Programs; some specifically to help students navigate around the school, and others that involved our school learning platform and time management skills. The Year 12 Prefect organised a Wellbeing Day so students would understand the importance of resilience to bounce back even in adversity. Our students continued to enjoy social board games each week, and it was extended to the senior school on Mondays this year and the junior school on Wednesdays.

This year we continued our study skills program with Elevate Study Skills and introduced the Study Samurai. Dr Prue Salter presented vital information about summaries, organisation and exam techniques to our parents and students in Term 3. The aim is to improve students' confidence and reduce exam stress. In Term Three, we also had the Consent Lab run a two-hour workshop for our Year 12 students. Students were engaged and very well received the presentation, with 48% of students rating their understanding of consent as "good" before our presentation (4 or 5 out of 5) versus 93% after. That's an incredible progression of understanding. From the student survey results, 91% of students walked away with a practical takeaway. This is important to us as we want to ensure the content of Consent Education is relevant and realistic.

In Values Education, we introduced two new modules in Year 7 and Year 9 in Terms 2 and 3, respectively. Year 7 completed their Respectful Relationships module by reading the book "Brave" by Svetlana Chmakova in class. The aim is to help students understand some difficult experiences students can find in friendships. Understanding what is and isn't acceptable behaviour is important for everyone to know – both so that students can identify and challenge it in others and check their own behaviours when they are with other people. Year 9 students read through a book, "Welcome to Consent", by Stynes and Kang. This module practically goes through different aspects of relationships and consent.

In Term 3, Year 7 and 8 students also watched a performance by Action Education on Backflips against bullying. This performance engages students with a critical message of resilience, harassment and cyber-bullying with parkour and acrobatics.

I thank Ms Miri Jassy for relieving the HT Student Wellbeing position in Term 2 and Ms Jessica Millar and Mr Sid Gurjar as Year 7 and Year 10 Year Advisers, respectively, in Term One. The Student Wellbeing Team consists of dedicated and caring staff who strive to support our students. They include:



Environment Team

This year has been a great year for the SBHS Environment Team. We also must thank the year 12s who over the years served as volunteers: Jo Kawahashi, Raghav Malhotra, Michael Alam, Mithilesh Lekhi, Daniel Low, Justin Bu and Vincent Li, among others. Ethan O'Young's worthy contributions must be commended for his consistent and supportive operations management. Ethan has worked tirelessly to ensure an inclusive, supportive and dynamic atmosphere. Ethan has shown High Spirit throughout his selfless and positive attitude when organising our activities.

James Walker's contributions to our team have been exemplary. James designed and organised our current recycling bins in 2019 in his first year as a Year 9 student at SBHS. He has liaised with teachers and students to keep the team running efficiently. When teachers and students felt daunted about the barriers to effective recycling at SBHS, James helped us with his problem-solving and practical skills. We celebrate James Walker's superb work for the environment and aspire to meet his levels of dedication.



Nationally, there is a positive outlook for the environment in 2022. Sustainability is increasingly prioritised at federal and state government levels. In August our parliament passed the Climate Change Bill which commits to 43% reduced greenhouse emissions by 2030 and achieving net zero greenhouse emissions by 2050. Across NSW, recently introduced laws aim to ban plastic bags in addition and single use food packaging.

Our volunteers bring bins from specific locations around the school to our central recycling hub. We sort waste into a few categories: paper, metal, glass, and plastic. We have continued to raise funds by recycling bottles using the Return and Earn scheme. A new initiative this year is our bottle-lids recycling using a Terracycle-brand box. In addition, we are trialling a soft plastics collection by salvaging these from general waste. Another initiative is the continuation of our coffee cups recycling program.

Our goal is to ensure that the waste that we generate on site does not negatively impact the environment around us or the community in our area. We believe that a cleaner school becomes a more effective learning environment.

Throughout 2022 I enjoyed supporting other passionate individuals to achieve their environmental goals and raise awareness about sustainability. With members ranging from Year 8 to Year 12, it is rewarding to see individuals grow in their responsibilities. Our aim is to benefit the planet through our individually small but collectively impactful actions. I would like to welcome Jason Sung 11T as our incoming Environment Prefect. He has worked hard to motivate and organise others to persist with our recycling efforts.

The Sydney Boys High School Media Team consists of a dynamic group of students from Years 9-12. The Andrews Junior Library

Careers

All students at Sydney Boys High School have the opportunity of achieving their chosen pathway through the school's individually focussed Careers Education program. Our students are tertiary focussed with all proceeding to some sort of tertiary education or VET course.

Guest Speakers

This year we were able to secure the most comprehensive guest speaker series yet, presenting to Year 11/12 students. Students were given the opportunity to ask questions and gain valuable up-to-date information regarding post-school options. Guest presenters included representatives from the University of NSW (UNSW), University of Sydney, Australian National University (ANU), University of Technology, Sydney (UTS), Co -op Scholarships, EdUSA, Business Cadetships Australia, UAC and more. There was also a series of webinars from industry specialists giving up to date information in the changing world of work.

Year 12 Careers Interviews

All Year 12 students were strongly encouraged to attend interviews with the Careers Adviser to discuss postschool options including university courses, scholarships, cadetships, UAC preferences, wellbeing, time management and study routines. Despite the challenges of this year, the vast majority of students availed themselves to this opportunity.

Career Exploration

The Year 10 cohort completed a choice of software systems that helps young people explore the current work climate and make effective career decisions. Year 10 students were able to gain invaluable insights and reports including a personal profile, specific job suggestions as well as an accompanying occupational information action plan and resume/curriculum vitae. They were all also individually interviewed before selecting their year 11 subjects. UTS start-ups came and delivered workshops on taking ideas to business models.

An unprecedented number of students were able to take part in work experience. These students completed placements in the fields of Health, Information Technology, Law, Engineering, Pharmacy and Business amongst others.

I look forward to serving the students with even more opportunity.

Activity Group Four Report

Many endeavoured to stand on their boards for the whole period, humorously plummeting into the water at times.

In what seemed a short period of time, paddleboarding was concluded. Emerging from the water soaking wet and shivering, Activity Group Four was directed by Jess inland. This time, the group had to confront the challenging task of raft building. A meagre assortment of barrels, ropes and wood planks lay sprawled in front of each raft building team. In just half an hour, each team haphazardly assembled a slapdash boat in the hope of sailing to the other side of the nearby creek. Soon, the teams cautiously dragged their boats to the shore. At Jess' signal, each team thrusted their vessel onto the murky water. Of the four teams, one boat successfully remained intact while the other three were dismantled by the sheer force of the water current. A flurry of fat barrels and loose rope bobbed hilariously on the water.

After the cessation of raft building, Activity Group Four returned to their cabin dormitories, teeth chattering and limbs shuddering. The night sky soon enveloped the camp after dinner. 'Night Games' was upon us. Buzzing with excitement, all Activity Groups bounded to the camp's immense sporting field. A captivating series of fun, physical activities such as 'Tips' and 'Finger Fencing' unfolded, with a myriad of running and laughter late into the night.

The following morning brought an entirely new set of stirring activities for Activity Group Four: bushwalking and kayaking with Activity Group Three. Led by instructor, Matt and Ms Loh, the groups trudged through the rugged bushland on the outskirts of the Narrabeen camp. We travelled around the historical and ancestral heartland of millennia of the Indigenous Australian Gaimaragal Group. It was certainly riveting to learn how adolescent Gaimaragal boys would engage in traditional customs upon the very same peaks we were hiking on. Matt briskly informed the groups of the incentive of lighting campfires at our destination, stirring ambition in the students to collect sticks. The groups finally stopped after trekking several kilometres to light the campfires. In doing so, we excitedly cooked stashes of raw, glutinous damper dough. This unique treat drizzled with honey was incredibly delectable for numerous students.

Activity Group Four embarked on another lively aquatic adventure: kayaking, also with Group Three, after completing their vigorous hike. Frolicking with their paddles and tight life jackets to the clammy, wind-beaten shore, fifty shivering boys departed from the safety of solid ground for the peril of the volatile water. Successfully navigating our way around the cove of the shore proved emphatically difficult. The wind's immense force accelerated the speed of the water currents, deviating the course of our boats from our desired destinations. All the students were thus, forced to muster as much impetus as possible to steady the movement of their kayaks. After voyaging along the expansive inlet of Narrabeen, we returned to the familiarity of the shore in the form of exhilarating kayak races. Despite the obvious difficulty of travelling in kayaks, this immense challenge conjured up incredible perseverance in the boys, who showed determination to power their way through the forceful currents.

When we completed kayaking, night descended upon Narrabeen Camp at the same rate as yesterday, soon after dinner. Another rendition of the "Night Games" commenced! Instead of the camp's immense sporting field, this edition occurred in its sublime gymnasium facility. The dynamic



nature of the games, especially basketball court Pacman, subjected the students to immense running and adrenaline rushes. It was certainly an enjoyable way to cap off yet another invigorating and inspiring day.

With bleary eyes, and resonant groans, Activity Group Four emerged outside on the final day of camp at Narrabeen. Following a hasty breakfast, we followed instructor Jess to the battleground of our penultimate activity, 'Archery Tag.' An exciting amalgamation of dodgeball and archery, this game involved two teams shooting at each other with arrows on a basketball court, until only one person remained. The upbeat Activity Group participated with salient gusto, determined to be the winning team. Archery tag ended abruptly, to numerous glum moans from the boys. Our final activity, 'Chariots', was to take place in the open air.

Unfortunately, the relentless lashing of the rain rendered 'Chariots' unable to be done. Despite this minor barrier, instructor Matt substituted this activity for a series of indoor problem-solving games. Huddling together in the warmth of 'Lecture Room 1', Activity Group Four confronted a set of problems proposed by Matt. Involving intense collaboration and guidance between each other, we were challenged to sort each other in ascending order of birth without talking and drawing a hula hoop to the ground with our fingertips, which was surprisingly frustrating!

And so, our joyous adventure at the Sydney Academy of Sport and Recreation culminated on a splendid day. I would like to thank the team of Narrabeen Camp for masterfully carrying out the activities for our utmost enjoyment and, for providing us with delicious food and favourable accommodation. I would also like to express my gratitude to Ms Loh for accompanying Activity Group Four to their activities and taking part in them while ensuring our safety. And thank you to my cabin mates of Cabin 7B, who were sensible and sane enough to assure me that I would receive an actual good night's sleep! This was a wonderful camp.



Debating at High is a unique experience that culminates in a plethora of fond memories. This year was particularly exciting because it was our first year of in person debating, as previous years were online due to COVID-19.

As it always does, the year started with the Eastside and FED competition for the respective A's and B's teams. 


Philosophy Group



Stones

The sewing machine was too loud. It was an old Singer, its avocado-green paint peeling off to reveal a rusty brown beneath. I can remember my dad's grin when he came home with it, carrying it the entire two-kilometre walk home from the Op Shop, because the bus driver didn't let him on.

"Má con kiếm tiền được. Mốt tiền lên về Việt Nam."

"Your mum can find money now, and we can save up to return home."

Soon the firm rumble of the machine became the background music of our lives. A gentle hum, though it occasionally sewed over the wrong stitch and would gasp, a momentary violent cough that shook our house. My mother was always behind it, crouched over. From one angle it looked like the head of the Singer was consuming her, engulfing her entire body.

One summer she spent an entire week sewing a suit for her brother. He recently found his way to Australia, with only a scar on his left knee and a permanent fear of the ocean. He knocked on the door, and I almost called the police.

"Con không có thấy ra mặt của Tỉa?"

"You can't recognise me?"

"No, please go away."

Somehow my mother recognised him, underneath his dark skin, sun-bleached hair, and willowy waist. It was his eyes that haunted me, sunken deep into his skull, the pupil a deep black that absorbed all light, leaving none to reflect off.

He took up a makeshift room on the veranda, some old towels across the railing to create some semblance of walls. But my window was facing directly into the porch, and so for that summer, I had to keep the curtains drawn. In the daytime he would go around town, speaking in his broken English looking for work. My father tried to help him, but there were plenty of Vietnamese refugees to exploit who could actually speak English. And so, at night, as I tried to fall asleep to the rumble of the sewing machine, I would hear heavily accented English phrases, echoing in my dreams. I tried teaching him some English. Just a few words every day. I tried to copy the way my ESL teacher taught me, with wide teeth that over-exaggerated each sound.

"Do you have work for me sir?"

"Đu du hà bù quốc for me?"

Maybe a bit better than yesterday. He had a frustrating way of speaking English with Vietnamese words and accents, a xin chào instead of a hello, or a Chị instead of Ma'am. The only phrase he could say definitively was "One beer please."

Vietnamese is like stones. Small pebbles. They encapsulate words in one short refrain. Monosyllabic. You cast them off in the lake. Momentary ripples. Then cast off another. English, then, is more like the river rapids that rush into the lake, unstoppable, a flow that conjoins sentence to sentence, word to word, meanings upon meanings. My uncle could only try to cast his stones, but they did little.

It took a while, but eventually I could hold a conversation with him. Water erodes even the largest boulders eventually. Our conversations would go from the weather, to work, to horoscopes and the latest news. One time I landed on Vietnam.

"So you are Vietnamese? How is Vietnam?"

A brief pause. The dust swirled in the air around us, and only the rhythm of the sewing machine could be heard. And then, the shattering of stones.

"Việt Nam, ơi mẹ ơi. Việt Nam. Bác ước đi về mà không được. Vợ tao chết. Con đứa chết. Hết thế giới chết. Mưa máu xuốn tới biển. Việt Nam, ơi mẹ ơi. Việt..."

[Vietnam, oh Vietnam. I want to go home, but I cannot. My wife is dead. My children are dead. The whole world is dead. The skies rain blood, flowing down into the sea. Vietnam, oh Vietnam...]

It was too fast. I couldn't understand him.

"Hey, what happened to English?"

He gazed at me for a moment, his black eyes lightless. I could almost see the pain, the heartache, the yearning to reclaim



a home that was once 'home', now flattened by agonies heavy as boulders, by war. The stones that surrounded him, a massive pile that threatened to collapse, blocking the single light bulb on the porch.

I wanted to respond. I wanted to voice my empathy. To say that I understand and offer my heart in compassion, an eye to an eye, a man to a man. I wanted to fling the stones into the lake, pelting it in an endless barrage that could truly convey sorrow and resonate with my uncle.

But I couldn't. The stones I once held were washed away years ago.

He left soon after. The veranda was cleaned up, to my mother's delight. I can imagine him now, walking around

with his little stream of English, making himself heard in this vast nation. But I doubt he'll ever cast away his stones, at least, not permanently.

I look over to the sewing machine that woke me up, stones, piles of stones surround my mother, just as they did for my uncle. I can see them now. I pick one up and try to skim it across the water. But it falls, and she interrupts.

"Con nói gì vậy. Đi ngũ đi, má thương."

"What are you saying? Go to sleep. I love you."

The house was quiet, the only noise was the clinking of chopsticks.


The youngest child had only said these two words all day. The parent's eyes lingered on him for a moment before focusing back on their bowls.

Everyone was left aghast.



Alas after his great heist, the Bandit was never seen again, perhaps he'd done enough villainy and retired back to his den.


So now in the Colombian jungle, lies a town no longer filled with risk, where lies the legacy of a great fiend called the Bandit Basilisk.

This year our team, "the Mathicals", consisting of Mohammad Haider, Eric Scholten, Daniel Nguyen and Adrian Tien, competed in the IMMC for the first time. Our task was to model the boarding time for an aeroplane using multiple variables such as time taken to sit down or to load luggage and the overall traffic flow on the plane. This brought a major challenge to the competition as we had to consider over five variables while managing the different layouts we were provided. We analysed previous simulations and data on the topic, to create our own model, which we felt considered a vast number of conditions but still was simple enough to implement easily.

This competition was quite challenging, taking us three days to just decide an approach and nearly four to finalise our solution along with several hours of report writing. However, we found this competition to be quite rewarding, and in the end, we were all proud of our efforts. We were happy to hear our work was also appreciated by the judges coming fourth and achieving an honourable mention. We would also like to thank Mr Wang and Mr Parker for organising and facilitating the competition.

The International Mathematical Modelling Competition (IMMC) is a five-day competition and schools from around the globe compete and with the preliminary round occurring nationally. Xiaozong Jin, Mohammad Medlej, Eric Hong and I were chosen to represent Sydney Boys, Year 11, as team "Radiant". This competition differed from the exams we did at school because instead of many questions, it was one extremely complex and intricate question about the optimal method for boarding an aeroplane.

However, on day 2 of the competition we had a team 'lightbulb' moment and from there started to construct a solution. The Historical Investigations also covered a wide range of times and topics: The influence of Augustus on Livy's History of early Rome; Constantine's Christianity, Robespierre's impact on France, the Use of Censorship in Society (from Ancient to Modern) and the use of the Atomic Bombs in World War II.









Academic

Year 9 – Escape Room

Studying Australia in the Vietnam War Era and the context of the Cold War, Ms Luu and her practicum student set up Escape Rooms for Year 9 History. A mammoth undertaking, they had four classrooms running at once where students were required to crack the code to move on to the next challenge and Escape the room. Thanks to Industrial Arts – Daniel Comben for making the morse code telegraph and bomb boxes and Laurence Chapple for creating the cypher boxes.

Year 9 – Making of the Modern World – World War I

For the Study of World War I, students were given a battle to study and produce a video. Andrew Pye, Xavier Perry Akith Perera submitted their video on the Battle of Verdun:

Real Time News was commissioned to produce excellent material on the Battle of Verdun for summative purposes. We researched the Battle of Verdun for a week before live





coverage. However, we had other important stories to attend to in a tight schedule and it took us a fortnight to complete the script. We at last began live coverage at Verdun, but realised that coverage was too long, so we had to rewrite the scrip to fit the airtime of 6 minutes. Despite the challenges of having come too soon and having a rushed schedule, we managed to produce our (excellent) report. After live coverage, including interruptions to the broadcast, we had to rush to Australia where we then had an informative discussion with Professor Smart. We used After Effects to add in the news overlays, Zoom to green screen ourselves and Premiere Pro to edit our news report in real time. Overall, making our report was fun, and led us to using some tools in ways we had never thought of before. (For example, who knew a stapler looked so much like a microphone?)

Science Report 2022.

The Science Staff in 2022 consisted of Dr Carman, Mr Coan, Ms Damianos, Ms Karagiannis, Mr Kay, Ms Manolios, Ms Mackenzie, Mr Matto, Ms Pepe, Mr Olsen, Dr O'Driscoll, Mr The, Ms Milne, Mr Tarata and Ms Ibbott.

The 2021 HSC results were very pleasing, considering Year 12 spent their entire last term in lockdown. Ryan Lee is to be congratulated on achieving First-In-State in Chemistry. Also in Chemistry; Eric Ho, Auguste McNally and Richard Ba all achieved State Ranks. Hanyang Zheng did very well achieving a third place State Rank for Physics. Julian Waring is also to be congratulated for achieving the first State Rank in Biology since the introduction of the new course in 2018.

Excursions were back up and running this year. Year 8 were the first to head off to the Australian Museum and the Royal Botanical Gardens in Term 2. This coincided with their study of the "Plants and Ecosystems" and "Humans as Functioning Organisms" topics. Year 9 were supposed to visit Long Reef to undertake a rock platform study, but several weeks of bad weather saw this excursion postponed and then cancelled. Fingers crossed we get to run it next year. Year 7 made it to Taronga Zoo late in Term 3 to complement their study of the "Classification and Cells" topic. This year saw new programs being written for Year 7 and 9 science classes to support a new text book and included the new literacy and numeracy progressions. Staff have been busy evaluating these programs and have begun to write the programs for Year 8 and 10 to be introduced in 2023. 2023 is also seeing a bigger focus on Literacy in Science with the introduction of explicit teaching of science writing using the SOLO taxonomy.

A major highlight this year was taking delivery of our new science lab. In addition to our compulsory junior science, we run approximately 30 senior science classes in Biology, Chemistry and Physics. This new, state of the art, lab has meant we can reduce the number of science lessons taking place in classrooms. Students have a "dry" area in the middle to sit and complete theory lessons and "wet" areas around the sides to conduct their experiments. Included in the lab is a ducted fume cupboard for use by senior Chemistry students, a height adjustable lab bench with sink as well as being completely integrated with the school's WIFI and VIVI network which is connected to the teacher's whiteboard.



Adit's Report

Representing the state of NSW at the Geography Big Week Out was both a personal achievement and an opportunity for further progression to the international stage. For five days and four nights, I travelled to Darwin in the school holidays, with little information aside from the fact that I would be completing geography-related tasks and fieldwork for the duration of my stay.

The GBWO was an eye-opening and unique trip filled with many fun and interesting experiences along the way. The other fifteen like-minded individuals were a pleasure to interact and conduct fieldwork with, and I formed several, strong friendships during my time in the Top End. In addition, the staff were immensely helpful when answering questions and provided valuable insight into geographical processes at the two studied sites, Darwin and Litchfield National Park. These were interesting places that were appropriately covered by the fieldwork, and while the accommodation wasn't the best, the beach volleyball court at Batchelor was certainly an enjoyable experience! One notable observation was the emphasis placed on Indigenous issues and land rights in the Northern Territory, a result of its high Indigenous population and disproportionately poor outcomes for this group.

I thank Mr Jackson for organising the Australian Geography Competition at our school, as well as for the important skills I have learnt as the accelerated Geography course approaches its conclusion.

ASX Sharemarket Game

As per usual our Commerce, Business and Economics students again competed in the ASX Sharemarket Game. Students received a hypothetical \$50,000 to trade. The boys experienced real live trades and the ups and downs of the ASX. They learned the skill of timing, graphing, P/E ratios, company announcements, dividend timing, speculative behaviours and the impact of business cycles. Oscar Li of Year 9 was announced as the National Winner after three months of trading turning his \$50000 to \$59,032.26 and earning himself a cool \$1000 as prize money. Congratulations Oscar.

Oscar's Report

"To achieve first in the ASX share market competition I implemented two strategies. The first was dollar-cost averaging. This is where instead of selling on the way down, you buy. Doing this helped me drag my average cost per share lower and lower which helped maximize returns with low risk. To fund this strategy, I would keep at least 35% of my portfolio in cash so I could buy on the dips. Sometimes I had well over the majority of my portfolio in cash and this was due to me believing the market was too volatile or bearish.

The second strategy I applied was to try to predict the market. I did this by keeping up with international affairs, looking at other markets and also doing technical analysis using several indicators.

Year 12 Geography Urban Dynamics Excursion – Barangaroo, Millers Point, The Rocks, Circular Quay

On a rainy last day of Term 2, Year 12 Geography set out to explore the urban dynamics at Barangaroo, a recentlydeveloped economic and recreational space on the edge of the CBD. Arriving at 8:30 am in Napoleon Plaza, we were swiftly briefed on the day's itinerary and spent some time formulating geographical questions to aid our investigation.

The first task of the day was to split off into several groups of three, and walk through Barangaroo South and Central Barangaroo, looking particularly at the urban renewal and sustainability that had occurred in the area. General observations of evidence of environmental, social and economic sustainability were noted, and an Environmental Impact Study was conducted at Central Barangaroo, focusing on strategies to control issues concerning water, noise, overshadowing and loss of views, wind and heritage conservation.

Surveys of the general public were also conducted, to gather information on peoples' opinions on Barangaroo. Lastly, quantitative data was gathered by each group by choosing After a 30-minute recess break at the entrance to The Cutaway, we completed a field sketch of Barangaroo South and Central Barangaroo. Our view looked over the harbour, and we noted down human elements such as the International Towers as well as natural landforms. Next, we moved to Millers Point where the focus shifted to the changing social structures in the area.

Firstly, the issue of public housing was identified with arguments for development coming from the Department of Housing, and arguments against development from Millers Point Public Housing Tenants. An observational survey of the results of urban dynamics was conducted at five different locations, beginning at Munn Reserve, before moving to Kent St, Nita McCrae Park, Argyle Place, and finishing at The Garrison Church. At each location, the social structure, spatial patterns of advantage and disadvantage, wealth, poverty and ethnicity were noted. It was found that social structure, ethnicity and poverty level remained very similar at each location. However, spatial patterns of advantage and disadvantage - including types of employment, housing, education and healthcare – as well as the level of wealth was quite different between some areas. While certain locations exhibited businesses and cafes, others were close

to schools. The types of housing and cars also conveyed a degree of wealth disparity. After the survey, the second activity had reached its end and we split off for a one-hour lunch break at Circular Quay. Some students enjoyed the multicultural array of food on offer at Gateway Sydney, while others settled for a simpler choice of fast food.

Our last activity came at The Rocks along George Street. Students once again formed groups of 3 and constructed a transect between Surgeons Court and Gloucester Walk, describing features of the culture of place at each location, including architecture, streetscape, heritage architecture, noise, colour, street life, energy, vitality and lifestyles. On a rainy weekday, it was unsurprising that energy, vitality and street life turned out to be quite dull and most noise came from cars and construction. However, the street was very colourful, commonly exhibiting cream, black, green, vellow, red and brown. Architecture also varied, with a mix of Edwardian, Federation, Modern, Victorian and Colonial buildings being spotted. Lastly, the lifestyle at different places along George Street differed based on the activities on offer and ranged from youthful and shopping-led lifestyles to hospitality and art, to pubs and smaller cafes.

Finally, the excursion ended underneath Sydney Harbour Bridge at around 2:30 pm, and a group photo was taken. Overall, Year 12 Geography had an enjoyable day exploring the urban dynamics of Barangaroo, the culture of the surrounding area, and the fun activities that these places had to offer.

Not only did these three High boys possess the courage to perform individually in front of a large audience, but they also outperformed the other competitors in this prestigious competition. Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

PDHPE

The PDHPE faculty consisted of Mr Kurt Rich, Mr David Smith, Ms Hannah Jackson, Mr Steve Marcos and Mr Ben Hayman.

With Mr Geoff Stein taking a well-deserved year of leave, Mr Kurt Rich filled in as Head Teacher for the faculty. Coming off two years of lockdowns and time away from school the PDHPE faculty took ownership and worked together to help boys improve their physical fitness, movement competency and health literacy.

The PDHPE faculty had three key areas of focus for 2022:

1. All submissions all marking will be done on CANVAS (including skills testing) – allowing for transparent and readily available feedback. The staff used faculty time to better understand, evaluate (make changes if required) and streamline the marking of assessment tasks. This process also allows for the data from the Rubrics to be used for programming evaluation.

2. Pre and Post Skill Assessments – previous years saw the use of a 'practice skills test' the lesson before the assessment. This lesson was moved to the start of each practical unit to provide feedback to the student and teacher on what were the key skill(s) that need to be addressed.

3. Increase physical activity during practical lessons – a challenge set to each teacher to make their lessons as engaging as possible, aiming for more attempts, higher intensity efforts and age/skill level appropriate activities.

In 2022 the PDHPE faculty had twelve boys complete the HSC course, twenty in the Preliminary and thirty in the Year 10 Elective. The faculty, with the support of Dr Kim Jaggar (Principal) and Mr George Barris (Senior Deputy – Relieving) produced the Year 7 resistance band program which rolled out at the end of Term 3. The PDHPE faculty, although small, is well represented across the school and are heavily engaged in the many aspects that make Sydney Boys High such a great school. It has been an honour to lead and be part of

the PDHPE faculty this year. I would like to personally thank Dr Jaggar and the school for giving me this opportunity.

In closing I would like to present Mr Geoff Stein's "Actions Speak Louder Than Words'

Over the Festival week was a diverse range of work on display and performed - from monologues to music, from drawings to films. Each work highlighted the vision, creativity and









Year 11 Visual Arts Report



In 2022 we have quite a large group of creative and inspired students with diverse skills who have selected Visual Arts.

Our first project was Mapping You – an exploration of identity. This is supported with an in-depth investigation into Australia artists and their exploration of identity.

The students moved on to creating a painting which focussed on their urban environment which is also linked to identity. Each student collated photos which highlighted the ordinary or the everyday. A process of cropping the photos and trying different colour ways in Photoshop enabled the students to create a painting which became a further exploration of the theme identity. The familiar or ordinary became transformed into something extraordinary in the resulting paintings.

Technically students had to face the challenge of acrylic paints with some oil overglazes to create a vibrant surface. Students used a range of acrylic mediums as well as oil sticks on the final layers.

Other projects included examining site specific artworks and creating a totem in ceramics. Students responded well to the clay medium. Andrew created an impressive totem.

From there students began a personal mini body of work in a chosen medium. Mark organised his friends to role play his ideas in some photo shoots. The resulting photos are evocative. Other students such as Eric, Jonathan and





Andrew are further exploring painting and have great skills in this area. Another student is looking at how to create an artwork with light. Grand ideas, we just need to practice. The journey can take many twists and turns and the success of the resulting artworks is a result of examining and giving time to those small tasks.

All in all it has been a productive and fun year.

Year 10 Visual Arts


We started the year by learning about the different representations of the human form over the years. We then continued exploring the human form and learnt how to replicate the complex features of the body onto paper and clay sculptures that "Embody" the emotions we feel in the hustle and bustle of our everyday lives. This course provided students with a valuable opportunity to see how our understanding of the human body has developed over the years, from as early as the Renaissance until today.

Next, we delved into the miniature world of macro photography, where students learnt different macro features of the camera. They then engaged in an intriguing task of recreating miniature scenes in everyday life and photographing them. Quite a few successful images from this series were entered into the Woollahra Youth Photographic and Video Competition where David Kim received a Highly Commended.

Following this students studied Shaun Tan and his signature surrealist urban-style art. Students then took photographs of their chosen urbanscape. Finally, they photoshopped these photos to offer a new perspective of viewing scenes we see in our everyday lives that we overlook and achieve a newfound appreciation of our surroundings. With restrictions loosened this year, SBHS was able to host Illuminate Festival 2022, where we celebrated the collective efforts of our talented artists. Illuminate gave students the time to admire the creative minds







of the students, who articulated their thoughts and feelings

through art. Many were a reflection of the adversities faced



































Year 10 Photography and Digital Media Advanced



The mark of an exceptional filmmaker is their ability to effectively utilise the resources at hand to create a compelling film. Whether it be to entertain or to inform, film often reflects the values and culture of the time. Throughout 2022, the year 10 Photographic and Digital Media elective has embodied this with the application of a miscellany of digital mediums and the study of the artists who developed and perfected them.

The year commenced with the introduction of rotoscoping - a hybrid of animation and tracing, overlaying it to Pharrell Williams' song Happy. With a substantial amount of time on our hands, we worked on the allotted frames, with the goal being to recreate the original music video as seamlessly as possible while expressing and implementing our individual elements to enhance the track. It was a task that required intense concentration, first to visualise and then generate each layer for what ultimately ended up as a few seconds of animation. Adobe Photoshop was enjoyable to experiment with due to its user friendly interface, which assisted us in achieving what we envisioned the final outcome to be.

When rotoscoping, we centred our ideas around the surrealist movement, studying famous artworks and artists to inspire our designs. One such notable surrealist artist being Salvador Dali, renowned for his exceptionally popular piece, The Persistence of Memory. We also drew upon the techniques present in Dali's collaboration with Walt Disney in the short film Destino to understand the complex yet refined nature of surrealism and its pivotal role in society. To further our understanding of the art, we created short films in groups that enabled us to showcase surrealism through storytelling. Scouting for a decent location in Centennial park proved to be crucial as we spent an entire day filming on the parklands, using the scenery to our advantage.

We later moved on to adapting more specific film techniques into our works, such as replicating the use of pan shots in







Edgar Wright's Shaun of the Dead to quickly segue from one shot to another. Though it was a much simpler task than the others, it still required sufficient planning to allow for a smooth transition into a shot and then another into an adjacent shot.

Our final major piece was to fully reimagine a 1980's music video, whilst employing all that we had learnt over the course of the year. Everyone showed the epitome of their filming abilities in this task, paying homage to the respective artist/s in our interpretations of the track. Much like the earlier film, time management and planning were essential. Devising a script and storyboarding helped to dictate the flow of the narrative juxtaposed with the music.

As a whole, the elective was extremely well laid out and I wish to thank both Ms Stewart and Ms May for their combined efforts. The skills we learnt here are extremely valuable and not many are fortunate enough to have such an opportunity. So thank you once more for giving us the opportunity to be budding filmmakers!























Stage 5 Visual Design

Our 2022 Visual Design course consisted of a range of different activities and assignments which allowed us to develop and exhibit our creative abilities. What differentiates design from art is the practicality, function and how the design's purpose suits the target demographic.

The first task we began was creating a diary cover based on the theme of "People and Places" with the target demographic being the new Year 7 and 8 intakes of 2023. We started by building confidence in our abilities to use Adobe Illustrator using a range of tutorials which helped us build our fundamentals as we mastered layering, sizing, line construction, RGB and CMYK colouring, and many other digital techniques. The efforts we put into learning how to use the software built the foundation for us to be able to execute and present our ideas with clarity and precision.

We continued to expand our creativity by learning the principles of design such as shape, colour and value so that we could plan our ideas to be interesting and composed with thought. We did this through our research on previously successful designers and artists, inspiring ideas and allowing ourselves to gain a better understanding of how to use space and lighting to create a cover that 'pops'. Finally, after mastering the basics and hand drawing drafts in our ideating phase, we applied our newfound knowledge and creativity to digitally produce our own diary covers.

However, our learning wasn't just limited to learning new software, in semester two we began our new module on creating treehouses for an ecotourism environment. This introduced a challenge as we had to ideate ways to keep a balance in aesthetics and function while also satisfying the eco-friendly demands of the criteria. This encouraged us to explore creative ways to construct tree houses that have minimal harm to the tree while maintaining their visual appeal. After doing our own research on ways existing tree houses balance sustainability, function and aesthetics, we were able to get straight to the practical work. Like our diary covers, in order to end big, we had to start with the fundamentals, so we followed guides on how to make rope ladders and a variety of knots so that we could create our small scaled prototypes. After refining our designs in pairs, we were able to select our own branches on which we would build our prototypes and we presented our ideas in an engaging pitch. We were eventually able to apply the abilities we learnt from our research and practice as we constructed our treehouse prototypes.






















Year 9 Visual Arts

Year 9 Visual Arts is always fun and engaging. Students who elect this subject show a variety of skills in making and understanding the visual arts. We explore the 20th century as a focus. We look at the political and artistic landscape and how they are intertwined in 20th century art.

Our first tasks are to do with experimental materials. We made sculptures whilst listening to music and looked at found materials to re-purpose them into quirky and fun assemblages.

Our major challenge was an abstract painting. First, we put together a still life of our favourite objects. We then went through a process to abstract out representational drawings. Sometimes the object has traces of its origin but at other times it becomes a form or a shape and a vehicle for paint experimentation. We delved into colour theory and how different artists have explored this in the 20th century. The Principles of Art and Design were central to creating an interesting composition and resolved painting. Students reported that they liked gaining a better understanding of colour and mixing, as well as understanding the uses of the many acrylic mediums.

Our next major piece was a response to Picasso's Guernica, using mixed media. Students chose a topical issue to explore using symbols and motifs to communicate. This was supported by a study into some of the issues faced in our country and as well as globally. These may include Indigenous rights, climate change and global challenges.

Students got a sense of the many ways an artwork can be made. Using mixed media is a challenge because all the parts have to be integrated. We are currently experimenting with stencilling and collage to create imagery.

Year 9 class of 2022 still had its Covid challenges. In the early part of the year students were frequently away and the memory of lockdowns was still with us. Planning to progress enough in case the work had to be taken home to complete was a constant thought. However, as the year closes it is great to report it was a successful and productive time.





















Stage 5 Photography and Digital Media

Filmmaking this year has been a blast. Term 1 began with a general overview on what camera angles and shots are, and which ones to recognise. We could all immediately notice the forms being used in our favourite movies, recognising techniques from dollys to dutch tilts. Next off the block was our "Another Day At School" film. It was a daunting task at first, being thrown in the deep end, but with the brilliant guidance of our teacher, Ms Stewart, it turned out great. We all got to get hands on. We worked in small groups, going outside during the period to film different everyday actions. Some did basketball, and some even tried to create suspenseful horrors, either way they all turned out fun and enjoyable.

Once we wrapped up the editing and submission of the "Another Day At School" assignment, we moved onto the "Autobiographical Film," with our new found experience over the April holidays. Each of us did our best in self-recording, editing and directing our own pieces, until they culminated into our own unique short 3-5-minute-long films, some of which even being shown in the 2022 Illuminate festival. In term 2, we focused on Alfred Hitchcock's 1960 film, Psycho, watching and analyzing the movie in class, whilst being guided toward the deeper concepts, hidden within each scene. We then completed our first major written assignment, our scene analysis of a key scene, being highly educational for all vr9 Film students. Now, we are achieving the final steps of our chroma key task, utilising the green screen inside the Year12 studio space to record creative and action-packed projects. The editing of this was definitely challenging, but very rewarding in terms of our After Effects prowess. I highly recommend PDM as an elective subject, providing interesting skill sets. I always looked forward to having film, and the more practical elements of this subject suit my learning style. Have fun, and what will you make?






















Year 10 Photography and Digital Media



Term 2 entailed the introduction of pencil drawing. Students learned how to integrate the use of proportions, tonal modelling and expression into their pieces. We watched countless tutorials, each time developing and expanding our knowledge of these techniques. All these applications would ultimately prepare students to create a self-portrait, utilizing all the techniques learned in class.

Term 3 involved students exploring the art of digital portraiture, creating a self-portrait using Photoshop. Students enjoyed exploring the use of personal expression to provide a sense of identity in their artworks. In addition to this, students began traversing animal ink work and Lino printing.

SBHS hosts an annual art exhibition called illuminate. Students are given the opportunity to exhibit their work in all creative art subjects throughout this spectacular event. This year, many Year 7 students were able to showcase their digital portrait and self-portrait drawings at this exhibition.

Industrial Arts Faculty Report

Year 7

Year 7 students constructed a number of smaller projects to familiarise themselves with working with different tools and materials, namely wood & plastics. The main project this year was the construction of a notepad holder. Students also design and make an acrylic key ring / bag tag and a door stop. These designs are all drawn up technically by hand or Computer Aided drawing programs. With the laser technology machine, students are able to experience designing their key tag design on CAD programs and have it made with the laser cutting technology.

Students also completed a series of Technical Drawings by hand and completed a digital unit on the Grok programming platform.



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Year 8

Year 8 students designed and constructed one main project over the year, which was a Self-Watering Windowsill Planterbox; constructed out of solid timber, plywood, dowel and acrylic materials. 





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
Grok Programming Platform and CAD Drawing

For the Year 8 DT Drawing program, students were required to produce working drawings of their designs using CAD programs, AutoCAD, SketchUp and Inventor. Students also completed a series of Technical Drawings by hand and a digital unit on the Grok programming platform.









Year 9

Year 9 students constructed a serving tray or carry tote: a challenging project developing a lot of skills with both machinery and hand tools. This project was newly introduced to the Year 9 program. Students hone their design and technical skills on CAD programs to draw up the technical and working drawings for the table. Students also have the opportunity to design a tabletop pattern, which can be produced with the laser cutting machine.






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



Graphics Technology

























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

























Design Technology

Year 10 students design and construct bedside tables, which involves the design of a draws and shelves for storage. Students research existing furniture designs to be inspired, to design a unit to suit their own bedroom space, and work with standard ergonomics in furniture design. Designs are produced with the AutoCAD program and they use Excel spreadsheets to itemise and cost their project. Students have the option of using the laser cutting machine to design parts or surface engraving of their table tops or draws.














Robotics and Software Development (Year 10) and Computing Competitions

Students in Robotics and Software Development begin the year by developing their foundation level programming and algorithmic thinking skills by solving small but increasingly challenging problems using Python. The National Computer Science School (NCSS) Challenge provided students with the first test of their abilities. Entering the Intermediate stream of this competition early in the year required determination and resilience from students. Over ninety five percent of students attained a High Distinction or a Perfect Score.





This year we were invited to compete in the inaugural Robomaster Drone Competition. The goal of the competition was to program a small drone to reliably fly through a series of obstacles in the fastest time possible. With a short preparation time between receiving our drone and the competition, our Year 10 Robotics team consisting of Dylan Fernandez, Joseph Corral and James Nguyen were determined to maximise their progress in the practice time available. This team was also joined by Hamzah Ahmed and Zuhayr Haq from Year 8 along with Sumit Kamath from Year 11. The Robotics team secured third place in the competition. The lessons learnt during the development of the solution will be of great value in guiding future teams.

Once students had mastered their core programming skills, they were introduced to the Robomaster EP Core robotic platform. Students were tasked with working in pairs to develop an autonomous delivery robot. The goal was to ensure the robot could reliably maintain alignment with road markings whilst avoiding collisions and tracking its whereabouts in the road network. The robot also needed to be able to accurately turn into nominated warehouse locations to collect and deliver crates. Through this exercise, students developed their problem-solving skills and learnt about Proportional- Integral-Derivative controllers along with shortest path algorithms.

The Advanced stream of the NCSS Challenge is exceptionally difficult and covers content not typically seen at high school level.

The five-week competition requires students to master new and challenging concepts that are released weekly and apply them to solve questions. The competition had close to twenty thousand competitors across the difficulty streams. Almost three thousand attempting to tackle the advanced stream. Of the top sixty places published nationally in the Year 9 to 10 division, twenty-nine students were from Sydney Boys High School. Notable performances came from Daniel Su, Ryan Zhou, Tian Yang from Year 10 along with Saxon Dean from Year 11 who achieved perfect scores.





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Game Design and Programming (Year 10)

The course of Game Design & Programming involves Students learning the fundamentals of programming using the programming language of GameMaker Studio 2. They learn how to analyse a design brief to the develop small & large games. The skills they learn throughout the year are then put to practice with a final major project, working in groups of two. This course, whilst challenging for the boys, is not all 'fun & games'. Students have a greater understanding of problem solving, algorithms, time management, teamwork and the social and medical implications of gaming on society.











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








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






























Software Design and Development - Year 11 Major Projects


Software is integral to most aspects of our lives and this subject provides student with the opportunity to develop solutions for real world users. This year, students built a series of projects that steadily developed their front and back-end skills.

The first project had Dr. Pinnington-Wilson as the client. The current workflow for venue booking school facilities such as the Great Hall is time intensive and requires a great deal of manual follow up. Students built proof of concept web based venue booking system that allowed prospective hirers to view information about the facilities and engage with an automated quote and booking request process. Subsequent projects explored the use of APIs and the generation of data visualisations. The technologies used were primarily Python, Flask, Bootstrap and Plotly. Students were required to make use of multiple data sources to generate insights into a particular problem space.

















Year 10 and 11 Accelerated Design and Technology

Design and Technology

Design and Technology at High is an immersive and unique experience for students where theoretical knowledge and practical applications can be applied to solve authentic problems. Students at High have the opportunity to create and work on their ideas by using a mix of traditional technologies (woodwork, technical drawing, architectural and engineering studies) along with new and innovative technologies such as laser cutting, 3D printing and Virtual Reality (VR). A dedicated Makerspace also allows students to test, experiment and explore their ideas to create prototypes and nurture their curiosity. Here they are given the freedom to unleash their creativity to develop viable solutions to a user's needs through the Design Thinking process.

To supplement in-classroom learning, students are also provided with opportunities to connect with alumni and industry experts to draw inspiration and support. For example, each year the senior cohort of students go on an excursion to the Shape Exhibition at the Powerhouse Museum which highlights the best projects from the previous year's HSC. More recently, students had the opportunity to visit Vert Design Studio, a real practising Industrial Design business located locally in Redfern. The excursion gave students



insight into the day-to-day tasks of a designer such as client correspondence, design reviews, creating prototypes, testing/experimentation, and design documentation. The experience enabled students to draw parallels between the theory of Design Thinking being taught in class and the application of this in practice with real projects and clients of well-known brands.













Software Design and Development - Year 12 Major Projects

This year, students built on the skills they learnt in the Preliminary course to develop a major software product. Groups started the investigation and analysis stage in term 4, 2021 to then continue with the design and development of their program to meet the client's requirements. The major project is the backbone of the HSC course, and it is through this project work that students have the theory content of the course reinforced in a realistic development environment. This being the most rewarding aspect of the course.



Basketball MIC Report

The 2021-22 GPS Basketball season was a success. Sydney High basketball teaches student athletes to commit to the ideals of dedication, hard work, resilience, intelligence and camaraderie. There is a unique communal atmosphere surrounding basketball at Sydney High, not only from the current students but also the Old Boys who have attended and played for SBHS in the past together with their parents, guardians and families who have volunteered their services to the program. Everyone, past and present, feels they are a part of the positive culture where these ideals are being achieved. This season there were three hundred and fifty two participants in the SBHS Basketball program according to the HT Sport, with approximately half of the entire school trialling, hoping to participate in the Basketball program as their first option.

Basketball at High hasn't always been competitive across all groups. Over the last twenty years there has been significant improvement each year in the Basketball Program. With the support of the Basketball Committee, large donations of resources, time and money have been returned to the school in a variety of ways. The purchase of the state of the art Dr Dish Shooting device was funded entirely by donations. A single substantial donation enabled the recent installation of hand crafted nets made from rock climbing rope on both the indoor and outdoor courts. The photo display cabinets worth ten thousand dollars were installed for free in the seating area of the gymnasium. The gymnasium walls covered with illustrious banners demonstrate the consistent success in one way or another in nearly every year of the program from 2002, all purchased with donations from the Basketball Committee. The outdoor courts have remote controlled battery powered electric scoreboards also purchased with Basketball Committee funds.

Prior to 2008 there were only four backboards and rings on the two outdoor courts on the Flat. In early 2008, the Basketball Committee approached Dr Jaggar with a proposal for installing 8 new backboards and rings along the sides of the existing courts. Dr Jaggar agreed and with funding split between the School and the Committee the eight new backboards were procured. A Basketball Committee working bee installed the steel uprights and mounted the new backboards over a single winter weekend. The twelve backboards are now in almost continuous use with students playing rigorously and honing their skills at every opportunity. Most recently, new ceiling hung retractable international FIBA level backboards (finished in Sydney High Blue), rings and nets together with game clock and shot clocks on each backboard were installed in the gymnasium replacing the original wall hung backboards installed when the gymnasium was built in 1994. This opportunity arose in November 2018 when UTS, our joint venture partners in the gymnasium, approached the School with a quote for \$60,000 (excl GST) to replace the existing backboards which were showing concerning signs of metal fatigue in the support struts and did not contain safety glass in the backboards. The Basketball Committee considered the quote and realised that this was a 'once in a generation' opportunity to significantly upgrade the backboards. With the support of Dr Jaggar and UTS and with the wide-ranging basketball contacts of Mr Hayman, the Committee obtained a very competitive quote from Swish Technics, a company headed by Tim Hudson a long-time Sydney Kings player, for top of the range USA manufactured backboards together with their installation. UTS agreed to proceed with the quote and to contribute \$30K, with SBHS to pay the balance. The Committee met and decided to proceed with and pay for the additional game clock and shot clocks which were not in either the original or the accepted quotes for the backboards.

As part of the project, structural engineers were consulted and advised that the gymnasium roof beams would need to be reinforced to support the ceiling hung backboard superstructures. Electrical work was also required to run new wiring along the roof to power the electric motors which retract each of the backboard superstructures when not in use.

The Backboard structures arrived in Australia in late July 2018. In early August, installation commenced and seventeen continuous days later the backboards were ready for play. The installation program required the 'closure' of at least one half of the gymnasium for the entire duration of the work, which in turn required the cooperation of the PDHPE Department, the sports of volleyball and rowing and the UTS Facilities unit who use the gymnasium for their extracurricular sports in the evening and the weekend. Everyone involved was very flexible and understanding and are to be thanked for their cooperation and patience.

The overall project cost was slightly more than \$82K (excl GST), including the game clock and shot clocks which cost approximately \$9K. As agreed, UTS contributed \$30K +GST. The Basketball Committee contributed a \$20K deposit from accumulated funds and undertook to repay the School's Building Fund an additional \$23,195, being the balance of the invoice on completion, in annual instalments of not less than \$2,500. Donations to the Sydney Boys High School Building Fund were solicited and received. On 30 October 2021 the Basketball Committee handed over a cheque for \$3,861.10 representing the outstanding balance of the 'loan' from the Building Fund and the final act of a project that started in November 2018. The Basketball Committee parents have contributed to this gift to current and future students, with one item sold at a time from the canteen, over many years. No parking monies were used.

Despite the increasing size and complexity of the program over the last twenty years, from two teams in an age group, to ten teams in the opens and a very high level of coaching education over the years, Sydney Boys High has performed very well again this year with a winning percentage according to the coaches, of fifty two percent across all thirty-four teams.

Like the success of the Basketball program, the new backboards are a huge achievement and demonstrate what can be accomplished when the three interested parties collaborated effectively to drive a project to completion. Thanks again go to Bruce Gordon who put in an enormous effort to manage the project, with support from the Basketball Committee, Mr Hayman and Dr Jaggar, on behalf of the school and UTS.

The AAGPS Basketball competition is arguably the strongest high school competition in the world, with all schools participation numbers in Basketball at all AAGPS Schools at an all-time high. The results of the Firsts this season, considering the talent of the team, wasn't what they were hoping. Of course COVID illness' didn't help. Losing to Grammar

for the first time in 20 years to end the season was a low point. Nevertheless, this season both First and Second Grade were able to live up to the High Basketball traditions which revolve around players who will never quit, team mates who will apply themselves relentlessly, playing as a team and for each other in front of the huge audiences, who have once again turned up after the COVID restrictions eased.

Thank you to our Principal, Dr Jaggar for his ongoing support and attendance at all games. Thank you to Head Teacher Sport, Mr Marcos for his organisation of fixtures and liaison with the GPS. Thank you and well done to Marquis Navarre and Sam Higgins, Head Coaches of Firsts and Seconds for their efforts and their ongoing pursuit of improvement of our Basketball program. A big thank you to all our fifty-eight personnel on the pay roll including the Basketball coaches and referees. Thank you to all the teachers involved for their supervision and care, without whom the students cannot operate safely. Without listing each family individually, I want to thank the parents for their ongoing support. Those families who helped with Parking and Canteen duties, you were particularly amazing.

Lastly, thank-you to the students for all your positive liaisons, supportive conversations, and respectful mentions in various ways throughout the season. I really enjoy watching your smiling faces each weekend as you compete with gusto for your school.

Rowing Assembly 2022

The Principal's Address

Rowers of Head of the River crews, parents, students, teachers, welcome to our 2022 Rowing Assembly. We congregate again on the Friday before the Head of the River to honour and congratulate our crews as they prepare to lay their bodies on the line and push themselves to exhaustion in pursuit of a PB at the Head of the River regatta. As if COVID restrictions were not enough to derail our training program, floods in the Sydney basin have taken out the traditional venue at the Sydney International Rowing Centre. Luckily, our boys had a good antediluvian hit out at Grafton at the CHS championships. Despite all the interruptions our crews have worked hard to prepare themselves for this biggest regatta of the year.

Competitive sport is a lot about stress management - the environment, the crowd, the anticipation, the nervous wait to compete. Hungarian ex-patriot academic Hans Selye (1907-1982) first focussed the medical world's attention on the biological effects of stress. Stress is ' the non-specific response of the body to any demand'. Selye's Syndrome recognises three phases in our reaction to stress - the alarm reaction; the stage of resistance and the stage of exhaustion. At first we take stock and prepare for the effects of stress. We can then cope with stress for a certain, individually determined amount of time, but thereafter, the exhaustion response takes over. Stress before the start of the Head of the River event can have a debilitating effect on performance by the 1500 mark of the course. I hope our crews manage their personal stress levels well on Saturday.





I would like again to acknowledge and congratulate George Barris (SHS-2001) for his high standard work as MIC of Rowing and Coaching Coordinator. The program this year received a boost when the second pontoon was finally installed, doubling crew access time on some training days and supporting a broader sculling participation. Thank you to Old Boy John Croll who returned to High to help George Barris coach the first VIII. Thank you to Tim Trent (SHS-2018) in his second year a Second VIII coach. Daniel Xu (SHS-2016) has guided the fours for the program. Thank you to Steve Comninos (SHS-2013), Alvis Leung (SHS-2017) and Antoine Nguyen (SHS-2021) for their work with the Year 10 VIIIs.

Our Year 9 quads were coached by Gordon Su (SHS-2018), Lenny Han (SHS-2018) and Ryan Zhang (SHS-2018). Year 8 coaches were headed up by long-serving Marguerite Pain, with Jordan Whittaker (SHS-2020), James Appleton (SHS-2019) and Jack Ralph (SHS-2018). Marguerite is also coordinating our Year 7 introduction to rowing this year, with the help of Gilbert Win (SHS-2021), Kevin Chen (SHS-2021), Adrian Wong (SHS-2021) and Robert Yuan (SHS-2016).Thanks go to you all. I want to thank the staff who assist George to run the program – Mark Gainford, Joanna Chan and Vivian Paul. Thank you to our trailer drivers Terry Fong and Vivian Paul.

Thank you again to the Rowing Committee, particularly the President by Les Chang, for his tremendous amount of work on behalf of rowing and the Outterside Centre refurbishment this year. Our thanks go also to Secretary (Emma Britton), Parking coordinator (Fred Shao), Camp Coordinator (Carmen Lam) and communications coordinator (Binh Johnsun). Thirty years ago the 1992 First VIII crew was labelled the 'Golden Eight' because it was the first crew in thirty-four years to win the Riverview Gold Cup. Coached by Stuart Derwin, the lightweight crew trained hard, with an emphasis on many kilometres of sculling. After finishing a disappointing sixth in the Head of the River, the stroke, Darren Coleman, wrote 'nobody knows the pain of a rower except another rower.' He concluded that 'rowing plays a major role in developing the lives of those it affects'. Shared goals, shared striving , shared success and disappointment – rowing is the ultimate communal sport. It builds character, resilience, dedication, commitment, self-sacrifice. Head of the River rowers will join the society of sufferers who found out how hard they could push themselves to extend their personal limits in a sporting contest.

This year is like no other for rowing. The AAGPS has had to move out of SIRC and onto the Parramatta River course at Iron Cove. It is a very difficult area for spectators and so we are not sending many to the regatta. Importantly, the course has to be shortened due to issues around the two sets of pylons since the bridge duplication a few years ago. Consequently, crews have to alter their routines and race strategies. The skill of coxswains will be critical to navigating a straight course to the finish.

I want to congratulate all the boys who have been selected to compete for High. They have chosen to do what Angela Duckworth describes as their 'hard thing'. They test their grit every week and learn how to be grittier. The purpose of team sports at school is to build character in participants. The dispositions acquired through sports can be held for life. It is all about the process. Outcomes are limited or assisted by natural attributes. Anyone and everyone can possess great resolve. 'Always bear in mind that your own resolution to succeed is more important than any other' as Abraham Lincoln observed. Success is achieved through





courage, realistic goal setting and ferocious focus. The primary goal is to be on the list of 42 High crews, who have, since 1999, rowed under the winner's time between +7.5% and 9.99%. Even better, aspire to be among the 28 crews between plus 5% and 7.5%. The ultimate goal would be to be alongside the four crews who have rowed the winner's time + less than 5%. Whatever the outcome, enjoy the experience and remember its uniqueness. It is your day! Good luck to you all!

The Captain of Boats Address

A beautiful silence as the crews get in line.

Ignatius, Kings, Sydney Grammar, Shore, St Joseph's, Scots, Newington, Sydney High, Attention – BANG. Lever, wind, send, through. You're on. Seventeen hundred to go.

You save nothing.

Every part of you is screaming. Lactic in the veins. The mind begins to fade. You're faced with the beat of the drum. You hear a wave of voices, your voices, united in song. We embody the high spirit.

Good morning, Dr Jaggar, distinguished guests, teachers, and students.

Standing before you today is a truly surreal feeling. Not only is our last row as a crew tomorrow, but an end to six years of a sport I'd constantly fall in and out and back in love with. A sport which has nurtured the growth of some of the finest young men I have and will ever meet. I'm going to miss it, all of it. The rowdy bus rides to the sheds, ice baths, camps, CHS wins, and the very many things that made it all worthwhile.



Now addressing the elephant in the room, COVID. In 2021 with COVID still looming over many aspects of life, we were optimistic about the season to come. Not because of any guaranteed camps, or the lack of cancelled sessions. We stayed optimistic because when the time came, we would make a choice. A choice to keep moving forward, and never quit. 
Carnival 1 – SHORE SCHOOL

attacking football and employs that philosophy fearlessly, backing his players to keep positive in their work. "I'd rather go down swinging than hope to stay on my feet", he said. He has risen through the ranks of world football by backing himself and his philosophy.

In many sports at High I have witnessed players not backing their ability, being too defensive or lacking in confidence. Confidence only grows after multiple attempts and several failures. Growth as a player and as a competitor is often a function of increasing self-confidence. You will not develop such confidence without pushing your boundaries in competition and attempting the right plays even if they do not come off at first. Nevertheless, it is critical that your teammates acknowledge and support you without judging your mistakes or poor attempts. Teams are in it together and rise or fall as one. So in team games, developing a cooperative, collaborative and nurturing culture is really important for individual players to grow and for teams to increase their collective skill.

I congratulate our GPS representative players on their selection and wish that all our boys who have made GPS teams grow as competitors and people during the season, whatever the outcomes of their contests may be'.

The 2022 Athletics Season has been the first full season of Athletics in the past three years, and the Sydney Boys athletics squad has maximised the opportunity. GPS invitationals have continued despite unfavourable weather conditions. Although the athletics season has conflicted with Year 12 Trials and Year 11 Yearly exams, the senior squad has remained committed, attending training and invitationals without fault.

As a cross country runner, I understand that from an outside perspective, it seems comical that a two-hour training session often involves only two minutes of running. But as Mr Rich has told the squad many times - it's about intensity and focus. The warm up, rest, cool down, and stretches are all integral to the effectiveness of the training session, but only if athletes approach the running portion of the training with the necessary intensity.

I was fortunate to attend the third annual GPS Athletics Dinner with MICs and Captains of other GPS schools at The Kings School. Guest-speaker Richard Tombs, a former Waratahs and



Wallabies player, spoke about the importance of resilience and managing setbacks in his professional career. His early rugby career was not particularly successful, with sixteen consecutive losses playing for both the Reds and Waratahs. But through his perseverance and dedication, he made the Wallabies, winning the 1991 World Cup. His story shows just how vital resilience and self-confidence are to an athlete.

A distinction I noticed between the Sydney Boys athletics program and other schools is that we are the only school to select the athletics team at the end of the season rather than the start. This approach speaks to High's focus on training and improvement. The athletics season is only five weeks, but during this time, athletes see explosive growth as they transition from their winter sports. The selections being held at the final invitational ensure all boys are given the best opportunity to make the team.

GPS Cross Country

The 2022 Cross Country Season has been the first full season of Cross Country in the past three years, and the Sydney Boys Cross Country squad maximised the opportunity. GPS competitions did not falter in the face of heavy rains and less than ideal weather - the course conditions this year have been the worst I've witnessed in my six years at Cross Country. Mud pits, slippery hills, and large puddles (or rather small lakes) were a feature of most courses, particularly at the start of the season. But the boys remained committed, taking the challenges in stride. After this season, the squad should be ready to take any challenge the GPS or CHS may throw at it.

The Juniors squad placed a respectable fourth in the GPS, despite their inexperience. Even with the harsh conditions, their turnout at training and races was at an all-time high. Many of the boys voluntarily stayed back on Saturdays to cheer on the Opens runners, a display of true high spirit. The large numbers and unwavering dedication of the newest members of the squad make me hopeful for the future of High Cross Country.

The Intermediates squad performed the best out of any age group, ending the season with a podium in third place. This result was even more impressive because some critical point scorers ran up in Opens. The squad consistently improved throughout the season, with both Tanish Sarathy and Kiran Nayager achieving single-digit positions by the end. compete for the first half of the season, but upon his return, the squad was consistently placing second in competitions. Max Russel, Ren-Shyan Balnave, Laundrie Zhou, and James Wachsmann were integral to the First Grade team and will be an excellent leading cohort for next year's Cross-Country season. Max Russel was selected for the GPS Opens Team, consisting of the eight best GPS Cross Country Runners. He was vital in the GPS securing a decisive victory over the CAS at the Saint Ignatius Invitational. He was also awarded AAGPS Cross Country Season Champion 2022 for the athlete with the most consistent performances over the eight competition rounds.

The annual Trinity relay was cancelled for the third year in a row - this time due to bad weather. Ms Dam had organised a record four old boy teams to compete - hopefully, they'll be even keener to compete next year.

The Cross-Country Squad was also very successful in the CHS pathway, taking three age champion slots at Zone and two at regionals. Nine boys qualified for the NSW All Schools Cross Country Championships at Sydney Motorsport Park. Due to the poor conditions, officials changed the course to follow the concrete motor track rather than the muddy perimeter. Max Russel took the competition's location to heart, coming third - only four-tenths of a second off first over six kilometres, earning him a spot at the Australian Cross Country Championships.



The Opens squad had a solid season, placing fifth overall. Unfortunately, vice-captain Kane Shields was unable to

In the Combined High Schools (CHS) competition, after winning the Eastern Suburbs Zone and Sydney East Region races, Max placed second in the 17 years boys NSW State CHS Championships and third in the concurrently run NSW State All-Schools Championships at Eastern Creek Raceway, with only 1.5 seconds separating the first three boys.

Max also represented Randwick Botany Harriers Athletic Club in the Athletics New South Wales (ANSW) Cross Country season, winning silver in the ANSW State Cross Country Championships U18 event over 6km at Willandra, near Nowra on 18 June. In another nailbiter race, Max went down by less than one second to the winner.

At Mount Panorama motor racing circuit, Bathurst in a test event for the forthcoming World Cross Country Championships to be held in February 2023, Max won gold in the ANSW Short-

Course Cross Country Championships U18 event on 7 August, over a challenging, wet, muddy, and hilly course of 4.5km.

These performances earned him selection to represent NSW in the Australian Cross Country Championships co-hosted by School Sport Australia and Athletics Australia at Oakbank Racecourse in the Adelaide Hills, South Australia on 27 August.

Alas, the Australian Championships seemed a race too far in a gruelling season, Max achieving eighteenth place in a field of 119 and third place of the NSW competitors on a 6km course. It was described by most as the hardest course they have encountered all season, again the product of the extremely wet weather that South Australia has also endured.

Kane Shields

Kane Shields was selected to represent Australia at the Under 20 Oceania Track and Field Championships over the 1500m discipline in May, earlier this year. Selection was based upon both the national championships and performance throughout the season. This took Kane away from the regular GPS Cross Country training program to concentrate on his specialty distance, with the blessing of the Cross-Country community.

Kane had a strong season in the 1500m, running a school record time of 3:48.52 in February. The team travelled to Mackay, Queensland for the competition. Kane placed fourth in a tactical race, and while he was disappointed with the result, he was grateful for the opportunity to compete at an international level. The Cross-Country community is extremely proud of Kane's achievements over the last few years.

A big thank you goes to our three old boy coaches: Thomas Schanzer, Eric Holmstrom, and Rhys Shariff - whose detailed training schedules and individualised feedback for the runners were instrumental to our success this season. We



are thankful to our MIC Ms Dam and Mr Prorellis, whose work behind the scenes often goes unnoticed. Their management of the program ensured that training and races always ran smoothly. Senior Sabre Fencing

This year saw a return to a full competition programme following two COVID-interrupted seasons. Despite the challenges of the past few years, our fencers, coaches and the camaraderie have been stronger and more resilient than ever.

Rifle Shooting

First Grade

Forty shots. Three Ranges. By the time of GPS, it is likely that seven and a half hours equivalent worth of effort has been undertaken for every shot a First Grade shooter takes. The challenge of GPS was defined as much by the mental pressures of these efforts as it was by the real weight of the rifle and each shot.

This year, the GPS Championships were exacerbated by target failures, rain, mist and kilometre-long round trips on foot through bog and mud. The Fullbore team however prevailed through these conditions just like they had the dozen times before.

In 2022, High were Champions in a clean sweep win of all First Grade matches. On GPS Day One, the Rawson Cup and National Rifle Association Shield were contested. In the Rawson Cup, we attained a score of 541-38/560 with Jackie Wu achieving 70-6 without dropping a point. For the NRA Shield, our team scored 383-25/400 despite the erstwhile fog and rain. Shooters are kept in the dark about their scores and most will know nothing about their performance until the end of the competition to ensure that their minds are focused only on the next shot. On GPS Day Two, we attained a score of 607/640 for the Buchanan Shield at 300m. This segment of the competition is split into a normal stage of eight counting shots and then a snap stage. In snap, shooters must hit a plate-sized target that opens and closes at five-second intervals from 300 metres away. The setting sun, blinding from the front of the range, provided us with the extreme conditions we excel in and allowed us a definitive lead at the end of the snap stages.

Martin Lee was King of the Range with a score of 196-16/200 closely followed by Jackie Wu who came second with 196-14/200 and Cameron Young who was third with 195-12/200. A fantastic result was achieved by Daniel Huang who was ranked ninth in GPS Combined despite being only in Year 10.

We achieved a record-smashing seven of twelve spots on the GPS Combined Rifle Team. Congratulations to Daniel Huang, Eddie Zhang, Leonardo Weng, Emmett Kim Narushima, Cameron Young, Jackie Wu and Martin Lee for making the Combined Team.

Special mentions to Mohammad Medlej, who endured minutes of uncertainty as the target failed and to Isaac Cheer's astounding wind coaching which lifted both the scores and spirits of the team. Finally, a shout out to Tristan Dean's persistence through time and elevation issues to bring the team's efforts home.

In the end, Sydney High were Second Grade Premiers with an incredible result of 512-23/560, forty points above the nearest competitor.

Fullbore Report

The record-breakers. The emblazoned. The champions.

At the very start of our season, I told our team: "We are here for two things. All Schools and GPS."

I was foolish. I couldn't have been more wrong. Time and time again, through three camps, through twenty-four weeks, through mud and through pain it was proven to me that no trophy or distant winning picture can drive a team.

Unlike other GPS sports, we are only given one competition and one chance. Second Grade shooters will train across





twenty-four weeks to take fourteen counting shots – Forty shots for First Graders. One flinch, one mistimed breath and twenty-four weeks of effort goes puff. Almost half the squad consisted of new Fullbore shooters whilst another half were year-twelves. Our efforts were bogged by the heavy rainfall early in the season and burdened by the pressure to prove ourselves after the 2021 Championships were cancelled.

Our first major competition was the ANZAC Day Open Prize Meet (OPM) on our home range at Malabar. It was a crucial learning experience for our newer members to familiarise themselves with the pressure and culture of competitions. There were already many outstanding scores this early in the season with Jackie Wu achieving 149-11/150, dropping only a single point and winning B-Grade. Emmett Kim-Narushima came a close second in the C-Grade match with a score of 142-10/150.

On the Queen's Birthday Long Weekend of every year, the Rifle Shooting Team goes on a four-day camp to Wingham for an Open Prize Meeting. Shooters compete against members of the public in their grade across the ranges of 400m, 500 yards and 600 yards. Jackie Wu and Cameron Young placed first and second respectively in the Target Rifle B-Grade discipline with aggregate scores of 294-30/300 and





293-17/300. The annual trip was marked by the three-night camp in near-zero temperatures, countless hours before the campfires and the memorable moments of trivia night. It was as much about training and team building as it was about marshmallow roasting, tent setting, campfire chilling and memory making which truly defined the Wingham experience.

GPS Camp

In the last week of the term two holidays, the Fullbore team embarked on an eight-day camp at our home range in Malabar. This meant eight days of ten hours on the range and often even more electronic training and rifle-cleaning by night as the team was ground ruthlessly against the whetstone to sharpen every edge before GPS. The camp was overrun with incessant rain, blinding sun, knee-high puddles on the range and a team being constantly driven out to face these elements. On the second night, the squad was split into four teams in a cooking competition that proved to the world that Sydney High Rifle Club needs help baking apple pies.

All Schools

The Fiona Reynolds Memorial All Schools Match took place on the Friday of GPS camp. Sydney High jostled against Newington, Scots, Shore and Armidale over four matches at 300m in teams of five.

Sydney High Blue attained first place with a score of 476.34/500 closely followed by Shore Eagles on 460/500. Sydney High Brown and White placed fourth and fifth respectively with Sydney High Gold closely behind.

Congratulations to Eddie Zhang, Cameron Young, Emmett Kim Narushima, Jackie Wu and Martin Lee of Sydney High Blue. Jackie Wu was King of the Range with a score of 98.11/100. Although only five could make up Sydney High Blue, the title of All Schools Champions is earnt and shared by the entire Fullbore team.






