Captain's Farewell Address

[This is an edited version of the speech given by the School Captain at the Year 12 farewell luncheon.]

r Jaggar, Mr Dowdell, Mr Stein, Mr Day, Mr Kesting, special guests, parents, friends, and students. I am filled with an amazing sense of emotion and pride standing in front of all these people who have been my life for the past six years, and who are Sydney Boys High School. I have endeavoured to bring the close knit family of High together today, by inviting people from every aspect of the school, and more importantly, by inviting those people who have helped me, and the class of 2001, directly.

The education I have received at High has been much more than a purely academic one. My High School journey has been amazing, yet you will hear similar stories from anyone who has taken advantage of what High has to offer. From year seven, I was involved in rowing, rugby, athletics, music and cadets, as well as studying mandarin, and the mainstream subjects. These different activities all rise high on their own merit.

I will attempt to outline my past experiences, to give you some idea of the examples of what a typical Sydney High journey is like. My journey is only an example, there are many more aspects of the school which I have not explored, only because I can not account for them appropriately.

My rowing career saw me introduced to a new subculture within High – State of the art facilities, equipment and coaching, were all a part. I learnt what hard training was all about, and how to deal with your friends when you are all being pushed to the limit. Sleeping together, eating together, rowing together, training together, travelling together. The camaraderie gained is second to none. I would like to thank Mr Con Barris as a representative of the rowing community for the opportunities I was given

in this sport, and also thank you to George, Tim, Vaughan, Ollie, Ben, Johno, Jamie and Dorian in the First VIII 2001.

It was at the Outterside center that I first understood the role of the Foundation, which is to establish and maintain facilities, in particular the Outterside Centre. It was here that I first met people like Mr Terry Meakin (and John Kaldor). My journey then led me to the amazing old boy coaching network, unlike any other in the GPS. It is amazing how much more respect is held for someone who you know has been through the same things you are going through, and has done it all before. By rowing I learnt many life lessons and met many future contacts and friends.

My rugby journey again proved how a network of teachers, old boys and specialist coaches makes High rugby what it is. I would like to thank Mr Tony Hannon as a representative of the rugby community for all the support and high spirit that rugby gave me throughout the years.

My involvement with the music program was a great cultural experience, and I was fortunate enough to go on the 1999 music tour to Italy and Austria, which was an amazing experience. I learnt that there is a whole new world outside of Australia, and I strongly encourage everyone to explore that world.

It was through Sydney High School Cadet Unit which I gained a great deal of independence and self-reliance, and this was made possible through the efforts of people like Luke Bannister and Richard Young, who ran the unit successfully after Mr Gainford's term in office. I held a great rapport with the old boys who ran the unit, and looked up to them as people who I would aspire to be like. Thank you also to Kelvin Leung and Sam McMahon who led the unit proudly through 2000 and 2001.

My academic career was steered at an early age, from year seven, by the great team of teachers at high. As the years progressed, I understood how much heart these teachers put into their work, and how much they cared for us. On behalf of the teaching staff, I would like to thank Mr Russell-Gibson for rescuing my science career very early on in the piece.

The amazing thing about all these different parts of my journey is the friends I have made along the way, irrespective of years and socio-economic background. Sydney Boys High School is not a selective school for years 7-12, it is a family that accepts people for what they have to offer, regardless of age, race, beliefs, appearance, behavior, and

life situation. I believe that everyone at High is here because they can give something special, something that no one else can give.

One of the things that upsets me the most is not reaching your potential, whether this be a fault of your own, or some other factor. I am eternally grateful that these 1080 boys in front of me have been offered the opportunity to reach their potential, in whatever way, shape or form they yearn for. This is an opportunity that few people are offered, and Sydney High functions because we are amongst people who realise the value of these opportunities, because they have seen and experienced it first hand.

It is very difficult for me to preach to the unconverted, because what I am talking about has to be experienced to be understood.

There is an extra quality to Sydney High fellows that is rarely found elsewhere. That is the ability to juggle. I am not talking about balls, but commitments. In a school which prides itself on academic achievement, scholarship is of the utmost importance. Yet it is those people who can juggle their studies with their extracurricular activities who actually shine and stand out from the crowd, as people who are real achievers, and maximising their potential.

Potential is a very tricky thing to measure. Potential is intangible, and very environmental. I think it is so important to recognise the opportunities which all of us have been given, because there are many people out there who have their potential dramatically reduced due to situations or circumstances. The class of 2001 tried to make it known that we recognise this, and are not only grateful for the opportunities that we are offered, but also do not take it for granted. We recognise that there are people out there, world wide, who are less fortunate than us. The charity work which year twelve was involved in yesterday is our way of showing this, and by raising just over \$4500 for the Children's Cancer Institute Australia, I think we showed that we are grateful for those opportunities.

Our six year journey leaves us indebted to those people in our life who have opened these opportunities to us, and facilitated our exploration of these opportunities. Just as the school would not exist without us, the students, it would also not exist without the teachers and staff who ultimately make this place run, and are mentors to all the students. We all have our individual examples of how teachers have helped us, and educated us, but we all share the same view that teaching is more than just a job, it is a community service which sounds

far beyond the call of duty. Many teachers will tell you throughout your school life that they are not in it for the money, and as an obnoxious year sevenm I found that hard to believe. But as you grow and learn under the careful guidance of the teachers you realise how much more there is to it, and how being a teacher is a lifestyle choice. We, the class of 2001, are indebted to all our teachers, past and present.

Being the children that some of us still are, there is one factor that has been too often taken for granted, yet it is one of the quintessential aspects of our existence, after air, warmth, water, and food. That is our parents. It is great to see so many parents here today to support us through our final two months of our school life, and I can not tell you how grateful we have been for your undivided support throughout the years. And not only on a personal, individual basis, but also as a group. The parent army on the sideline of any sport, or in any audience, or in any welcoming or farewell party, is an incredible aspect of the High family. And I think that the parents have almost as many school friends as their sons, and I know that these past six years for all our parents have been a huge stage in their lives also. To our parents, I say thank you for all those countless hours stuck in traffic, or under an umbrella in the pouring rain, or giving us the moral inspiration we need to put in one more hour's study. We are eternally grateful.

As Captain of the School I feel it my duty to thank the Vice Captain, Dorian Beaver, Senior Prefect, Andrew Light, and our group of dedicated prefects, who now also have a prefects room. The year 2001 has been an amazing year, and has seen many transformations to the prefects body and the processes surrounding it. You have all been a credit to your school, and I thank you very much for all the support you have given me throughout the year. There is a name synonymous with prefects at Sydney High, and that is Mr Gainford. You have been a mentor to me and many other prefects, and we are indebted to you. I thank you for all you help throughout the year, and all my years at high.

Now I come to the Class of 2001, who I think deserve great credit for observing a 'formal' farewell assembly, breaking the traditional culture of a muck up assembly. I know how much this assembly means to your parents, and to the special guests, because it gives a sense of closure, completion, and an ending of this chapter of the journey, which only an assembly of this calibre can do. I am preaching

to the converted when I say that these friends that we have now will be our best friends for life, and I am echoing a sentiment that has been repeated to me countless times, but now I choose to believe it, that these are the best years of our life. We have had an experience like no other, and we have been through it together. I urge all of you to stay involved in the school, and the old boys union, as this is how most connections are maintained. What I am going to say next is something that I strongly believe in, and I really think should be adhered to. And that is "don't be a stranger".

Don't be too upset, this is not the end, only a rock climbing wall which has taken six years to learn how to climb. And you would be silly not to climb that wall, after working so hard for so long, even though what you are leaving behind is so familiar and comfortable. This familiarity and comfort leads to security, and as such most of us feel safe at this school, which is a feeling very hard to progress from. But the transition has to be made, and now is the time to do so. I thank you for the encouragement you have given me throughout the year, and for being such a great group of boys. A big thank you also goes to Mr Kesting, who has led us through it all since the beginning. This man has been an amazing inspiration to us all, and has been so proactive in keeping the fire in our hearts, and ears. The class of 2001 salutes you, Mr Kesting.

Principal's Address

[This is an edited version of the Principal's address at the Speech Night for 2001.]

r Tzannes, distinguished guests, School Family Representatives, Class of 2001, students and parents, thank you for attending this celebration of our students' achievements. Earlier this week we honoured the memory of our great Old Boy, Sir Roden Cutler, whose state funeral will be held on Thursday. His life's example of high achievement, integrity, dignity and good humour should inspire us all.

The achievements of students at High in 2001 were as usual, many and varied. In order to present a sense of what our students accomplished I shall give some examples from each area of endeavour. A fuller description will appear in the school's Annual Report.

The New HSC

Congratulations to David David who topped the state in Hebrew; and to Evan Oh, Daniel Ossher, Sigmund Stern, Tony Vuong and Xiao Liang Wu who received the Premier's Award for All Round Excellence for Band 6 attainments in 10 or more units. Evan Oh scored a UAI of 100.

In terms of pursuit of excellence at the highest level our results were somewhat disappointing, with only 12.43% of boys over 99 UAI. Yet in overall terms the percentage of UAIs above 90 was 69.49, which was better than last year and 1998, despite the inclusion of two units of English in the calculation. At 12, the number of UAIs at 75 or less was the lowest for decades.

Debating and public speaking

The Year 11 debating team (David Carter, Tim Davis Frank, Alex Gruszka and Alexander McCauley) won the state Karl Cramp Competition and were also undefeated in the GPS seconds premiership – an important double victory.

Henry Chapple-Cox (Year 12) won the Leslie Andrews Memorial Scholarship for Speech and Drama.

Hamish Nairn (Year 10) was selected in the Metropolitan East debating team.

Music

Peter Hayward was selected in the SBS Youth Orchestra to perform in Spain. Raj Kumar, Hamish Nairn and David Quach were selected to attend the State Music Camp.

Ashley Townshend's music project was selected for Encore performance.

In our much admired Performance Music Program, 227 individual students played in fifteen different ensembles. Participation rates increased by 16% in 2001.

Visual Arts

Costa Avgoustinos (film), Alex Reznick (computer images) and Simon Manetti (graphics design) had their HSC major works selected for exhibition in Art Express.

Tom Petty's Architecture Building Design project for a sustainable school won the Interbath Conservation Award and a cash prize.

GPS Sport

- The highlight of the year was the achievement of the Rifle Shooting team coached by Mr John Fittler. Jonathan Moore, Wilson Chong, Justin Hill, Josh Cuneo, James Davies, Andrew Jacques, Greg Shar and captain David Jacques won the GPS Champions title (awarded for only the ninth time since 1906 to a team winning all the trophies contested). They won the Rawson Cup, the NRA Shield and the Buchanan Shield. The team also won the All-Schools Competition. Jonathan Moore, Justin Hill and Greg Shar were selected in the combined GPS team.
- It was a strong year for Soccer at High with the First X1 finishing runners up and the Second XI, coached by Old Boy Nick Apoifis, winning

the premiership. Four of the First XI were picked to represent the GPS. In first grade Matthew Mulroney & Daniel Pinkus and in second grade Tom Cusbert and David Kaldor.

- The First XI Cricket team finished third in the GPS Premiership, but showed better form than that.
- Jack Manning-Bancroft and Robert Dooley were selected in the U17 GPS cricket team.
 Both had stand out seasons with the ball.
- I am most pleased to report a win at long last in the sport of rowing. The FirstYear 10 VIII, coached by Guy Morgan, won the Riverview Gold Cup. We could not sustain our form until the Head of the River but we have moved closer to the pace.
- The first XV had six good wins during the season. Unfortunately only one of these was in the GPS competition.
- Reece Hamer was selected in GPS Firsts Rugby, with Rob Lyons and Andrew Light in GPS Seconds and Lenny Pereira (reserve) – a strong representation of players, given our lack of depth in Rugby.
- Matthew Turner, Michael Terry-Whitall, Tom Miller and Ellis Louie were selected in the GPS representative swimming team for the Independent Schools Carnival at Homebush
- Ben Lonsdale (Year 11) won the U17 shot put at the GPS Athletics Carnival. Scott Morrow (Year 12) ran a gallant third in the open 800m and second in 1500m. Suren Wickramasinghe finished second in the 100m and 200m championship. Lachlan Mitchell (3rd U16 400m) and Roger Burrell (3rd U13 shot put) performed well.

CHS Sport

Tom Miller and Ellis Louie were chosen in the CHS swimming team for the All Schools carnival. They both competed in the Australian Age Championships in Melbourne.

Gabriel Knowles was selected in the Metropolitan East Soccer team to play at the CHS carnival. Michael Hayes (Year 9) was chosen to represent Sydney East Region and the CHS in Tennis.

General

Michael Hayes, Tom Lung (Year 9), Bosco Cheung and Ruo Li (Year 10) won the prestigious Strathfield Junior Tennis Tournament.

James Trezise, Scott Berglund, Tom Crocker and Alex McCauley gained third place in the NSW Interschools Skiing championship Teams Slalom. The senior A team won a bronze medal at the State School Fencing Championships.

Academic Competitions

All boys are entered for junior competitions. Seniors are entered on request. Our boys earned one medal, 79 prizes and 550 High Distinctions in eight major competitions.

Mathematics Olympiad – Charles Qin of Year 10 was selected in the Asian Pacific Mathematics Olympiad team. Ivan Guo and George Zhong earned High Distinctions.

Community Service

More than \$13 000 was raised directly by SBHS students for distribution among ten charities. Apart from mufti days which benefited The Spastic Centre and the Children's Medical Research Foundation, more than 200 boys from Years 7-12 were involved in charity work.

School Achievements

The great work of the Student Welfare team and Living Skills teachers enabled us to push through with the major initiative of a Living Skills program 7-10 for 2002. Integrating Peer Support and Peer Mediation training into the program in Stage 5 means that every boy will be exposed to leadership skills and training and not just the fortunate minority.

I want to acknowledge the leadership shown by Jenni May in pulling this all together in the last few months of 2001.

The production of the promotional CD by Rob Francis and Randall Magro was a major step forward in external and internal marketing of our image and culture. Out in the community we want to show people what we stand for and make our expectations of incoming students known. We need to sell to ourselves the idea of culture change at High. We need to show leadership in boys education, gifted interventions, negotiated learning and cooperative endeavour, as well as in sport, music and debating.

Engagement with school life may often precede engagement with academic life. I hope that the expansion of the Student Award Scheme, will energise and motivate boys to get involved and get acknowledged. We want more engagement from more of us to effect our culture change,

In closing, at this time each year I indulge myself in a short homily in favour of the departing HSC class. Given that our fortunes are often determined by chance or coincidence and that our lives may take unexpected turns, have we the strength of character to cope with them? I trust that the sum of experiences at High have helped you to develop the mental, physical, moral and social skills to cope with life's vagaries, trials and tribulations. Consider Emily Dickinson's words on the matter.

Fate slew him, but he did not drop; She felled – he did not fall – Impaled him on her fiercest stakes – He neutralised them all.

She stung him, sapped his firm advance, But, when her worst was done, And he, unmoved, regarded her, Acknowledged him a man.

Have the courage of your convictions and face life with the resolve to succeed. Congratulations to you all.

SYNOPSIS OF SPECIAL PRIZES

- The Oswald Chapman Memorial Prize: Awarded to the best all-rounder in Year 12. He is selected on the basis of character, scholarship (should be in the first ten in the year), sport and participation in School activities.
- The John Waterhouse Prize: Awarded since 1916 to the Prefect who has done most in the interests of the School, particularly in the way of keeping the "esprit de corps" and maintaining a high moral tone.
- The K J Andrews Award: Awarded to a student who contributes willingly and generously across many facets which go to make up the school. Key attributes include leadership, involvement, attitude and sense of pride in the School
- The Caltex All Rounder Award: Presented to a Student judged by the School staff as the best all-rounder. The student is selected on the basis of character, sport, scholarship and other activities.
- The Old Boys' Prize: Awarded since 1902 to the boy who was "not necessarily first in sport, not necessarily first in scholarship, but certainly first in the hearts of his fellows." The criteria were originally used by the Hon. J Inglis, Minister for Education in 1887, when he visited Sydney High and presented a book.
- The Michael Goodwin Memorial Prize: Given in acknowledgement of courage shown in the face of adversity.
- The Headmaster's Prize for Outstanding Achievement in Arts: Awarded since 1993 for a significant contribution to the Arts, not necessarily within the School.
- James Brunton Gibb Prize for Public Speaking: Awarded to a Year 12 boy who excels in the art of public speaking.
- The 1977 Year 12 Prize for Excellence: Awarded to a student who has excelled in an area (or areas) outside School Activities (or awarded for excellence in a field not included in the School curriculum and may be for academic or sporting excellence or whatever. It is provided from funds given for this purpose by the 1977 Year 12).
- The JW Gibbes Senior School Prize: Awarded to a Year 12 boy for proficiency in Latin, qualities of leadership and devotion to duty in relation to GPS sport.

- The John Francis Bush Memorial Prize: Awarded to a Year 11 boy for popularity, general character and general proficiency in School and sport.
- The Peter H Cappe Memorial Prize: Given to honour a Year 12 student who has distinguished himself throughout his School career by outstanding achievement and contribution to the School.
- 1958 Merit Award: Awarded to a Year 12 student in just recognition of his sound character and overall performance in studies, sport and other activities. (It was the intention of the Class of 1958 that the recipient should have figured prominently in the consideration for a number of other awards without receiving any of them).
- The Phil Ainsworth Memorial Award: Awarded to a Year 12 boy who, during his six years, has shown particular commitment to the ideals of the School Motto, With Truth and Courage, as evidenced by his proficiency in academic (especially English) cultural and sporting activities.
- The Robert Outterside Prize: Awarded to a Year 12 boy who has distinguished himself in Mathematics and Rugby.
- The Lodge Sydney High Prize: Awarded to a Year 11 boy for moral character, personality, participation in School activities and due attention to and proficiency in academic studies.
- "Doc" Bentivoglio Memorial Prize: Awarded to a member of the Junior School for outstanding performance and sportsmanship in Rugby and Rowing.
- The J W Gibbes Junior School Prize: Awarded to a Year 10 boy for proficiency in the Humanities - Classics, English and History - soundness of character and interest in GPS sport.
- The J M & W G Forsythe Memorial Prize: Given to a Year 10 boy who is deemed to be outstanding throughout his course and particularly in the year of the Award, in respect of scholarship, sport and School example.
- The Ross Miller Prize: Awarded to a Year 10 boy judged to be the best all-rounder. This Award is given in memory of an Old Boy and teacher in the School.

- The Brian Allsop Memorial Prize: Awarded annually since 1989 to an outstanding Junior School sportsman who displays the attributes of sportsmanship, courage and modesty with the proviso that no pupil can be given this honour on more than one occasion.
- The S & P Tzannes Prize: Awarded to a Year 7 student of sound character, proficient in academic studies, sport and cultural activities. The recipient should also display a willingness to subordinate his own interests to those of the School and his fellow students.
- The Arch Ferguson Prize: Awarded to sons of Old Boys in Years 8-12 for academic achievements and services to the School.
- The GPS Prize: Awarded to the student who best exemplifies the qualities of fellowship, commitment and service to GPS sport, in terms of either coaching, managing and/or refereeing.

- The Headmaster's Award for Visual Arts
 Achievement: Awarded to students whose art
 work has been exhibited in Art Express.
- The Carol Hardy Memorial Award: Awarded to a senior student for his contribution to music and other aspects of school life.
- The Class of 1991 Prize: Given to a member of Year 12 who has attended High for six consecutive years and who has contributed consistently in a number of fields to the character and spirit of the school.
- The Senior Prize for Creativity: Awarded to a student who, through his studies in the Visual Arts, consistently challenged the conventions and boundaries within his artmaking.

School Notes

- Another Oscar! Australian actor and High Old Boy Russell Crowe received the Academy Award for best male actor for his performance in *Gladiator*. Russell attended the school during 1976 (Year 7) and 1977 (Year 8). He played Rugby and Cricket, and was a member of the Cadet Unit. In 1978 the family returned to New Zealand, where Russell finished High School.
- All at Sea As has been his habit for many years, the Principal sailed to Hobart in the Annual Sydney to Hobart Race as a crew member aboard Access Computing, crossing the finish line in seventeenth place.
- Big Bore At the beginning of Term II it was announced that the bore recently sunk in the North Eastern corner of the courtyard had produced a good flow at eight metres, and that this flow had now been reticulated to the gardens and lawn of the courtyard, and around the tennis courts. Some with long memories are wondering what effect this will have upon the cracks in the main building, and indeed the level of the lakes in Centennial Park.

Anzac Address

r Jaggar, Distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen. Anzac day originated on April 25th 1915 in the trenches of Gallipoli. It was forged in the heat of battle by this country's brave men. However I cannot talk today about Australia. My family is not Australian. As the war raged on in Gallipoli, my great-grandfather, General Hermann Pokorny, was commanding Hungarian forces on the Eastern front. And while the Australian guns roared against the Germans' in the Somme, another one of my great-grandfathers, Angelo Pasqualon, was fighting for Italy's Alpini forces against Austria in the mountains. But I am not here to talk about great battles and heroic acts of war. I am here to talk about war's unseen horrors. The impact of war on families. The impact of war on innocent civilians. The impact of war on the people who live through it.

World war two effectively destroyed my family. Not the war itself, but its aftermath we hear so little about. As Australian guns stopped firing and all our soldiers were sent home, Europe was left in ruins. A war had been fought for six years and all the countries were laid waste.

A common misconception of Italians during World War Two is that they were all fascists. The cold truth is that the minority were fascist. It was a dictatorship. My great-grandfather lost his job and was denied a job anywhere by the fascists, simply because he refused to accept their ideology. He had no job to get in Italy, and so he moved to Africa, away from his family, just so he could work and send money back home to care for his children. His children, however, were in an equally bad position in Italy. My Nonno was a forced labourer for the Germans. Taken out of school at the age of thirteen, he lost his entire education. All he now knew was how to work in a factory making German soldiers' clothes. What future lay ahead for him in the post-war world? Can any of us here today truly imagine what it would have been like to leave school at such an early age? Very few of us would be in this hall today.

As the American people danced in Times Square at the surrender of the Japanese, thousands of men in Europe were made displaced and stateless. The governments had changed and people were being denied citizenship to their own countries. My Grandfather was one of these displaced men. Originally he worked for the United States after the

war, helping these displaced men get repatriated to their homelands, giving soldiers from Poland and Hungary and many other eastern European countries food and shelter. Trying to get them back to their families in their countries of origin. But as the Government changed in Hungary in 1948 he too was made displaced. Denied by his fatherland. Can anyone here imagine this? Can we imagine not being allowed to see our own families? Not being allowed to go to our homes? Could anyone here imagine if Australia did this to us? He had fought for his country and was decorated for it. Now he was not even allowed to see his family.

He was not able to see his own mother again until his death in Australia in 1959. After a long battle my Great-Grandmother was finally permitted by the communists to see her son one last time before he passed away. At the same time, however, she was specifically instructed by the communists that if she did not return to Hungary upon the expiration of her visa, her family members still living there would lose their jobs or be sent to jail.

This is the type of family separation I am talking about. This is not mentioned in history books, but is still a major part of history. We can now, more than fifty years later, acknowledge these acts and as the future leaders of society we must strive and do everything in our power to prevent war, and attempt to live happily as fellow human beings in a free world, without the segregation of our fellow men and women. Anzac Day

et me paint you a picture. Gallipoli, the mateship between all; every soldier but a strand in a greater thread, the conditions: hellish, as the artillery shots reinforce that no, this is no training exercise, no game, no child's play. You're in the battlefield. You're down in the trenches. Everyone's a mate to you and you a mate to everyone. Silence is now the most comforting, the most precious, the most rare thing in your life, but in the midst of the cries, the shots, the enveloping chaos of sound, where is this comfort? What are your thoughts now? Does your mind attach itself to the notion of defending your country, serving it in an hour of peril? Or to the wish that this might all be over, allowing you to escape in this very instant? The reality is you will never stop serving. Even if you survive this day and the days following,

you will return to your country and you will, in spite of your weariness, in spite of the images seared into your memory, rebuild it, healing it with each simple everyday act, coaching it once more in the habits of peace – for this too is a form of service.

Now, I am an Asian-Australian. As the ravages of the First World War threatened to tear apart the very fabric of stability and order that had ruled Europe for much of the nineteenth century, my ancestors were confronted with the grinding challenge of life in a rural village in South East China. But the reality of my twin heritage does not mean that I feel any less the import and the significance of the sacrifices made by an entire generation of ANZACS in the battlefields of that horrific conflict, because the appeal for freedom is universal - the freedom for which they fought, and which we as grateful citizens enjoy. That freedom knows not boundaries or race, and any blood shed in its defence is a loss sustained not by any one nation alone, but by all humankind. We are all the poorer for this loss, and yet nourished by the ideals in whose name it occurred.

But this gathering today is more than an opportunity for remembrance, for gratitude, for rejoicing in our present fortune. For in hearing the echoes of Gallipoli, we contemplate ourselves what it means to be Australian and whether that meaning has been fulfilled. So much of what we are was forged by what they did, those unforgotten forever young - our egalitarianism, our solidarity, our notion of a single unique national identity. With this in mind, let us say that the most profound, the most sincere way of honouring those ANZACS is to hold sacred those values and to fulfill their promise. The faces and names of these men and women may not fade from the national memory, but it is our historic responsibility to ensure that their works and their deeds may never fade from the national legacy, and that is a never-ending task.

They were nation-builders. We matured as a country under their watch, we realised our potential, and we united as one. We pray that never again shall a generation of young Australians be called upon to give themselves for a future that they had only begun to contemplate. But should this eventuate, ladies and gentlemen, will we be so ready? I ask this not as a call to arms, but so that we might appreciate the value of what the ANZACS did and in so appreciating, live our lives mindful of the many ways in which we might serve our community.

n Friday 9th November the school held its Remembrance Day assembly on the recently finished grounds of Moore Park West. The School Captain for 2002, Mark Nam, introduced the assembly while Robbie Girdler, John Holloway and Justin Garber gave readings.

David Carter addressed the school body, followed by Hamish Nairn who read The Ode to the school. The Last Post and Reveille were played by Joshua Morrin.

David Carters' very emotional and honest address follows:

"I wish I could describe war to you, to help you envisage the horror and brutality a soldier lives and breathes. Constant gunfire, illness, sleeplessness, vermin - we've all read about them in textbooks, taken notes on the appalling conditions of war. All the books in the world could not describe or contain the true abhorrence of war. Even soldiers who served rarely speak about the horrors they witnessed and lived.

Beyond what is required to write an essay, the politics of war, the raw numbers killed and wounded, I know nothing of war. I cannot describe to you its misery, none of us can understand it.

Let us pray that it remains that way. And let us pray another generation never has to make that ultimate sacrifice. The legacy of remembered soldiers is the peace and freedom we enjoy today. A celebration of those who answered the call of duty to their nation to preserve their way of life.

And so Remembrance Day is a day to be thankful for the tranquillity of our nation. But tragic recent events remind us that there is always the possibility of war.

The soldiers who fought for Australia in conflicts – the World Wars, Korea, Vietnam, the Gulf and more recently in East Timor and in the War on Terrorism – served, and are serving, to defend our nation and the concepts of freedom and justice with a dignity of purpose.

Australian soldiers answered the call, as have millions of men worldwide, and irrespective of their side, we mourn the loss for humanity.

They answered the call to protect their children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren, their nation. To protect the freedoms they valued with a supreme price, the freedoms we take for granted. History has judged the right and wrong of war, but each soldier is simply doing his duty for his nation, which is why we feel the loss of every man with an equal weight of sorrow. Remembrance Day is a day to remember all those lost to war.

So how can we pay homage to these noble souls? What actions can do their memory justice?

By remembering their sacrifices made by being grateful for the freedom and peace we have, for it was upon this sacrifice the foundations for a peaceful planet were built, and we must value this peace with the highest price, by all means, and by eternal vigilance. If we have learned anything it is that war is a tragic waste felt by all humanity, and that we must avoid conflict, avoid the bitter losses. We owe the fallen our best efforts to ensure their sacrifice need never be repeated and need not be in vain.

We must remember that others around the world are not so fortunate as to enjoy our freedoms, and that they deserve our compassion and understanding. We must also remind ourselves of the need to preserve this peace. Those we remember saw the need, and answered the call. But if the call to duty should come, at that desperate hour, perhaps then we will truly realise how valuable our freedom is, and how grateful a future generation will be to cherish it."

Duke of Edinburgh Adventure 2001

uring Sunday 30th September to Wednesday 3rd October 2001, a hike was completed with the participation of Duke of Edinburgh students from Sydney Boys' and Girls. This was to qualify for a Gold Award and also as a Practice Journey to some.

Organisation mainly started and continued at Sydney Girls with continual discussions and modifications on the track routes and campsites.

The final route plan came down to this:

Day One with 6km from Waterfall Railway Station to Uloola Falls Campsite via the Uloola Track

Day Two of 17km from Uloola Falls Campsite to Audley via Uloola Track

And following the Winifred Falls Trail – Anice Falls Trail – Maianbar Road – Maianbar – Bonny Vale Campsite

Day Three heads across 20km from the Bonny Vale Campsite through Bundeena to the start of the Coastal Track and heading towards the North Era Campsite via Garie Beach

Day Four sees the final 8km leg of the hike from the North Era Campsite to Otford Railway Station via the end of the Coastal Track.

The Uloola Track is 11km

The path travels from Waterfall Station to Audley, through heathlands and woodlands.

The Coastal Track is 26km

This walk hugs the Royal National Park's coastline, taking you along the cliffs, beaches and escarpments from Bundeena to Otford. This offers variable terrain and magnificent views.

Preparation came with meticulous application in figuring out the amount of rations and gear needed for the four day hike. These main items were taken in my 75L Backpack:

Toiletries, gas stove (220g), pocket knife, fork, spoon, torch, sun protection lotion, insect repellent, diary and pen, sleeping bag, hoochie, plastic bags, mobile phone, plastic money, and a camera.

Clothing includes 1 pair of shorts, threequarter pants, long pants, 2 singlets, 2 tees, 3 pairs of socks and underclothing.

Rations include 2 bags of dried fruit, 4 cups of peaches in syrup, 3 cups of instant noodles, 1 packet of rice crackers, 4 tins of corn kernels, 8 breakfast bars, 4.5L of water with an emergency ration of 1 chocolate bar, 2 breakfast bars.

I held the first aid kit for the whole team with some others having smaller personal kits as well.

All this weighed in at 20kg when ready to go.

Members include two boys from Sydney Boys', William Clarke and Perlon Leung, four girls from Sydney Girls, Aimee Leong, Tamara Sweller, Sze Lok Ho and Mimi Zhou and one girl from MLC Burwood, Therese Ng.

Part of the group gathered at Sydney Central Station on that eventful morning and later meeting the rest of the team at Hurstville Railway Station to depart on a train to Waterfall, where we started our four day hike around the Royal National Park, crossing the Uloola Track and also the Coastal Track as part of the itinerary and a final destination of Otford Station to end the journey.

Day One: This involved a 7km hike from Waterfall Station to Uloola Falls, our first designated campsite. Beginning our journey at 1100 we arrived at the Uloola Campsite by 1330 after facing the glary sun for two and a half hours on a dry dirt track.

The campsite was surrounded by budding bushes, trees and a creek running to a waterfall crag just 50 metres off. Tents were erected in a close space to ensure safety and because the area was the flattest part of the entire campsite.

Day Two: This started off with disaster at the start, the group having wandered up the wrong track towards the Karloo Pools Track instead of following the Uloola track to its end. Our arrival at Karloo Pools made us realise that we needed to head 2 hrs back the way we came to get back on track.

By 1230 the team arrived in Audley, a small tourist destination as a rugged commercial park setting for picnics and casual rowing. But with just five hours at hand to be on schedule to the Bonny Vale Campsite, this made it a very rough leg of the trip involving bush-bashing and taking frequent stops to assess the team progress and direction at every intersecting track. The sun began to set just as we arrived at the Bonny Vale Campsite. We quickly set up tents in a diamond pattern to protect each other from the winds and to provide quick communication between the team. Will and I had one tent each whilst the five girls shared two tents.

The wind proved to be a difficult force to overcome as high tide provided the strong gusts, which managed to collapse one of the girls' tents. This issue was overcome by having advice from fire rescue officers assisting us with the repositioning of the guy ropes. They were a godsend with their blasting spotlight and truck when we most needed assistance. Bonny Vale is a campsite just by the beach and surrounding it are mangroves and the small tourist town of Bundeena. At the campsite there are abandoned huts, or 'haunted houses' as some of the team called it and were vandalised beyond repair. This was the first place where there were hot showers and proper amenities, so not surprisingly we all took advantage of the situation.

Day 3: The night before saw us in the middle of a thunderstorm with constant flashes of lightning. Duly, we survived the night unscathed bar some wet items from rain seeping into the tents, and with none of the tents collapsing.

This is the day where we began the Coastal Walk from Bundeena to North Era Campsite, a full twenty and a half kilometres of it. As usual our trekking began at 0700-0730 and we paced ourselves to be within reach of the campsite by 1500-1600, which we achieved. It was a long track through the suburb of Bundeena – even the thick overgrowth of the bush seemed less exhausting than the endless sight of houses and asphalt roads paved so uniformly. At 0800 the team arrived at the start of the Coastal Walk and from here we made sure that route selection was not a problem by checking each intersection as we passed it.

By 1000 we had travelled 8 km in two hours. The weather became overcast with a light drizzle, but we relaxed with a small break after a sand walk. We had experienced mainly flat terrain throughout the walk that morning, with dense foliage turning into densely scattered and prickly plants with fauna such as lizards and a brown snake to top it off.

Wattamolla came in sight as we passed a rock waterfall, with man made improvements, in the form of a damming wall below to allow people to swim in the new pool created. After stopping at Wattamolla, we again hit the track. This time we experienced a slowing in pace, down to about 3 km/h as we started to tire, also as a result of the similar, albeit more demanding terrain, consisting of more hills, and paths in the form of trenches, which were too skinny for our packs in places. At about 1500 we experienced our first medical problem of the trip when Mimi landed awkwardly when stepping off a rock, whilst descending a large hill in sight of Garie beach. We tended to the ankle with a bandage, and with a little help to carry her and her pack we kept going to Garie.

On arriving at Garie we all headed into the water for some refreshment of our sore feet, and discovered that Sze Lok had been stung by a bee which was causing her some pain. By this point in the time the group would have looked more comfortable in a doctor's surgery but after a short break we again headed off for the final kilometre. The path from Garie to North Era wasn't particularly long but it was very dangerous as it had the group walking around cliffs, on the rocky outcrop near the ocean, which at times is underwater. This was not only dangerous as a large wave could have carried us out to sea but also the cliff sides where giving way, so the ground we were on and the ground we were above could have given way.

After the hard day's walk we were glad to arrive at North Era, somewhat a toilet for the many rabbits and wallabies that inhabit the site. We found a suitable campsite and set up tents. The group was glad to go to sleep knowing that we only had one more day of walking to go, and even then only 8 km. This was only achieved after Herman had somehow managed to fall neck deep in mud, and while swimming in the ocean to wash it off, be attacked by two crazy seabirds.

Day 4: Day 4 saw the group head off at just before 8 am, anticipating the easiest day of hiking with only 8 km. But we were very very wrong. After the thunderstorms, which occurred again during the night, and the resultant rain, the paths we were walking on were extremely muddy, and after about a 2 km coastal walk we found ourselves in terrain we hadn't yet experienced. Basically we were in a jungle for the remainder of the walk. As there wasn't one clear path we managed to get lost many times, but always managed to find a decent path leading towards our destination. The group wasn't in the best of spirits, mainly due to the fact that there was a group of year 9 and 10s behind us from Turramurra high school, singing songs that basically did not need to be sung, such as old classics like "Old MacDonald had a Farm". After an attack by a colony of leeches which we managed to defeat (by running away) we finally made it to Otford station at about 1200, only to be advised that there were no more trains for an hour and a half. This was made better, however, by the fact that the ticket machine was out of order and we all got free rides home.

This was the end of a tiring but enjoyable experience. For some it will be their last walk, but for others their first of many more. Everyone agreed that the expedition had been successful and many new friendships and memories created.

Library Report


wo thousand and one will be remembered as a watershed in the library for several reasons, not the least being the retirement of Pamela Noller who had been the librarian in Sydney Boys High for two periods spanning thirty-nine years. Pamela was appreciated for her lively personality, her intelligent selection of wonderful resources, her caring interest in the boys, her encouragement of the student-librarian system and her close management of the archives. Pamela is missed. We all hope she continues her association with Sydney Boys High archives. Pamela's associations and memories are invaluable. Pamela was replaced by Veronica Crothers, formerly librarian at Bonnyrigg High and a former English/History teacher.

The second reason that 2001 is a watershed is that the library is now entirely funded from donations to the Library Fund. As a result the librarian has a great deal more money to spend on the computer equipment to bring the library up to date and more money to spend on resources and furniture generally. Quite a bit of spending is needed to convert an out of date 60's library into the "state of the art"

resource centre necessary for students of High's calibre. This brings us to the third change in the library in 2001.

In 2001Dr Kim Jaggar made enlarging the library his next capital works priority. Sydney Boys High is presently paying off the canteen refurbishment. The acute need for a much bigger library became obvious as library usage improved and loans doubled. The library was now opening at 8am and library staff were maintaining an open-library policy. This, coupled with the burial of library fines, the issuing of Library cards to all students, improved leisure activities (chess and magazines), increased year 11 use of the library in spare periods and the inclusion of library lessons under the Welfare umbrella accounts for the doubling of library loans experienced in the latter stages of 2001. The majority of Sydney High boys have shown little indication that they suffer too greatly from the "boys and books" syndrome. However no chances must be taken in this regard. The encouragement of self sufficient study habits, its corollary - a love of learning and the building of life-long reading habits - all point to the need for a much improved library building.

NRMA Excursion

he opportunity arose, late in 2001, for year twelve physics students of the Class of 2002 to see something extraordinary. niSummit, hosted by the University of Melbourne, is an annual assembly of one hundred Year 11 students from around Australia during the October school holidays. During UniSummit 2001, participants discussed and debated social issues, which culminated in presentations at the Victorian Parliament House.

The participants were mainly school prefects, SRC members and debaters from prestigious schools nationwide. Sydney schools represented included Sydney Boys' High, Sydney Girls' High, Fort Street High, The Scots' College, PLC, MLC and SCEGGS.

Participants lived on campus for four days, immersing themselves in university life. There were three lectures. The first, Politics in the Great Southern Land, outlined Australia's political system in a textbook manner. However, the second lecture, Having a role in Australian Politics without being a Politician, was poignantly inspirational in exploring humanitarian issues. The last lecture, Marketing Big Macs and Marketing Pollies: What's the Difference? was brilliantly presented, funny and insightful whilst drawing many interesting parallels between hamburgers and politicians.

Apart from the politics, there were also recreational activities. The Great Southern Trivia Night turned out to be a more enjoyable experience than the name suggested, while the 60's/70's Retro Groove Disco was highly disturbing yet highly amusing. There was a variety of touristy Melbourne City activities, including excursions to the MCG, the Melbourne Zoo, Art Gallery of Victoria and the Lygon Street Café Precinct (Melbourne's equivalent of Newtown).

First Eleven

he first eleven for season 2000-2001 had a brilliant season, winning five out of the seven GPS games, and finishing second in the annual five highs tournament, played this year in Melbourne, in the process winning back the Ces Rubie Memorial Trophy. This team showed tremendous talent and spirit, finding that little bit extra to get us over the line when necessary.

This season's First XI was an honour to captain. The wonderful cameraderie of the team was been displayed by the ability of all the boys to bond together and perform well while enjoying themselves. The final competiton result of the team finishing third was an outstanding achievement, the best in seven years, since the school won the premiership in 1993-94. After the third round we headed down to Melbourne for the annual Five Highs Tournament. We finished second in this, our best result in many years. We had victories over Adelaide High and Melbourne High, winning back the Ces Rubie Memorial Trophy. Our two losses were very narrow, and were both easily winnable.

The second half of the season was nothing short of spectacular. We had a win over a Melbourne touring team, Haylebury, in which Dean Comino took 7/25. Come GPS again, many of the team had been training in the holidays and were rearing to go. We were looking at a clean sweep this half and coming home strongly in hope of a premiership.

I would like to thank for all their contributions this season, especially the two coaches Mr Kourtesis and Mr Carroll.




Newington College was our sixth opponent of the season but sadly we lost. But again, we gained more knowledge of the game and our team members.

She organised good doctors for operations, she organised for all High boys who were treated at the South Sydney Sports Clinic, to be bulk billed. Her diagnoses and prognoses were never wrong. Cheryl Dunne was on duty all day on game days. Her calming instincts helped many an injured player through his pain. All the help and hard work paid off. We had a grand season of great fun.

In the pre-season the team won every game using a powerful running style where the ball was moved forward and wide quickly and backed up by fit players running the correct support lines. This attacking mode, when working well and backed by predatory defence, can be explosive as seen in the pre-season total of 147 points for (nearly all through tries) v 33 points against. Game one was against Waverley College. It was one of those rare games where we were able to find rhythm early and became irresistible. The mood stayed on for the midweek game at McKay against a big Hurlestone Ag, and in Armidale against a game crazed TAS. We had to fight from behind to beat Cranbrook very late in a tough, fast, and open game of commitment from both sides. We finished the pre-season with a 47-7 blast against Oakhill who were as tough as ever. The big problem after the Oakhill match was that we had no more games until the GPS competition, a whole month away.

The training went on, for a month without a game, until, at last, we found ourselves up against Iggies who had travelled to New Zealand in that month returning bonded and toughened. Our first game was at McKay in conditions which would have suited the filming of Twister II. We played an amazing game of defence, mostly without the ball, against the rain and the wind, to burble into halftime very confident that, with the score 0-0, with the wind at our backs, that we would roll Iggies in the next thirty-five minutes. However, all that tackling in the first half had cost us precious energy. Not only that, but Iggies selfishly refused to give us any ball in that second half. As well, against the wind, their five-eight did nifty little dump-kicks into the space behind our defensive line, turning us around, pursuing and smashing anybody unfortunate enough to pick up or drop on to the rolling football. It was smart coaching and fine execution. They were able to score two tries to take out the game, though not without some fine moments from us on both attack and defence. It was a well-deserved victory to Iggies on the day.

Fatefully our next game, also at McKay, was against a Joeys side packed with speed and power. On the day they had one of those flawless, rhythmic, surging, performances which sides dream about. Despite our never-say-die defence the overall speed of their players meant that they only had to make one half-break and back it up with one more pair of hands to score a try. Our half breaks had to be backed up by at least 7 good passes before we could threaten. This difference was obvious when our fastest man, and he does have genuine pace, outside centre Andrew Light, intercepted a Joeys pass on our 22m line. He was clean away with no Joeys defender in front of him and he was chased down and tackled by the Joeys tight-head prop! In the end 3-78 was the score.

The game against Scots, again at McKay, was always going to be tough as they were expected to be playing Joeys for the title this year. Their headhunted coach, Peter Koen is a true professional. He was coaching a side of speed, size, and power. Peter, in fact, gave his best player, a fast, monstrous centre, a rest, I suspect, to make the game against us a bit fairer - he does show a true love of the game. As it turned out, although Scots won by 12 points (15- and had been the stronger side in the first half. High came out determined to win the second half. The Scots kick-off was out on the full and from the resulting centrefield scrum we scored a spectacular 50m try as Reece Hamer reversed his field and sprinted left around the scrum. He handled twice as did the scorer, Vaughan Ramsey, as the movement exploded to the Scots line. We later scored another dazzling try. What may have kept us from an upset win was our unforced errors - turnovers which were a bit higher than our average in that game.

The game against Grammar was not pretty, but it was tough. We had one player (wrongly) red-carded, one yellow-carded, one almost knocked out, and Reece Hamer was lost early in the game with a bad ankle injury. But High was not going to be denied this game. It was the highlight game of the season. One of the bravest High wins of recent years. In the last quarter, with Grammar, also gutsy, with all the ball, smashing to within inches of our line, over and over, the High defence did not break. Finally, their swift left-winger was given the ball and he beautifully cut back against the defence, wrong footing High and was flying free only 5m from the posts with nobody in front of him. It was only when he fell over and lost the ball that we realized that he had been tackled by Simon Manetti's face! There wasn't much left of his face, but he had saved the game. In hospital, with operations, in time he

recovered, but it was not without much anxiety by his mother, coaches, and team mates. We won that bruising encounter 18-10.

Shore, anywhere, are tough opposition, but at Northbridge, they are particularly dogged. This was a game that we should have won. Taking the place of Reece Hamer was 2ndXV halfback, Tom Crocker. He was sensational. In the centres, George Barris had an outstanding game in attack and defence. We took the lead with a set play from the lineout with Jake Matthews going over untouched. Shore hit back with two 30m tries through strong straight running which briefly mixed up our defensive assignments. When they scored a good early try in the second half they cemented their hold on the game. Jake scored another try late in the game after a powerful pick and drive attack went thirty-five metres to the line. Shore won 15-26. We felt that in such a close contest, as this game was, that tiny events made all the difference; a referee's decision. a dropped ball, a slight error on defence. It was that excitingly close. The packs were very even, and I thought that our backs ran straight, and into space, a bit more often than the Shore backs, on the day.

It is always good fun to travel to Kings where the dressing rooms are large and the warm up pitch is well up a hill, up a country lane, away from the crowd. This was a frustrating game, but ultimately good fun. Reece was back and Tom Crocker was playing right wing in battered Simon Manetti's place. Also the gifted Nathan Safe had won back his spot at fullback after a couple of games where he had come on from the bench. Kings were big and well coached, as usual. They won 5-29, in the end, but the game was alive for us during most of it. The Kings tries were well scored but they were lucky to keep us out on just as many occasions, Finally, our try, from a delicate perfectly weighted grubber kick from David Harris, so well chased and scored by left wing, Kieran Lewis, was worth waiting for. It was typical of the vision and flair of our fine specialist five-eight, David Harris.

And, so, it was homeward bound, to the McKay Pleasure Grounds for our last game. And what a game it was with eight tries in the game, four grand tries to each team. At halftime it was 10 points each and at fulltime it was 22-24 Newington's way. This was a high quality game. Newington scored first, using a perfectly executed reverse play in a lineout exactly like our own trick move which catapults a backrower around the front of the lineout. Not long afterward Reece Hamer, noticing that the Newington halfback was marking someone else in defence, ingested the ball from the back of the

We had a few laughs at the senior rugby dinner at Abbotsford. We felt awed by the beauty of that part of the Parramatta river at sunset, roasted each other, ate a fine meal, soaked up speeches and mutual thankyous, before we enjoyed the news that Reece Hamer had been selected for the GPS First XV, and that Robert Lyons and Andrew Light were selected for the GPS Second XV, and that Lenny Pereira was part of the Third XV squad. There were disappointments, of course, George Barris being so strong at inside centre for example, but, on the whole, the selections at least gave us someone to watch in each of the GPS games.

And now, let's not forget Mr Fanning who, without fail, after every game, dumped a crate of ice cold drinks into the after-game cool-down circle. There was so much Gatorade, we were awash in it, that we think Mr Fanning had to make at least two ram-raids a week to acquire the goods. He was the ultimate after-loss grievance counsellor: instant gratification beats self pity, everytime.

ydney Boys' High School Cross Country in the year 2001 had over sixty-five dedicated runners. This was more than any of the other GPS teams. But numbers were not our only strength. We excelled in both the GPS and CHS cross country competitions.

In the CHS, Sydney High had forty two boys make it to regional level, twenty four of whom made up the six Sydney Boys' High School teams. One thing that I have noticed in my time with Sydney High Cross Country is that the other GPS teams can be quite intimidating. They always have a dozen or so boys warming up before the race, all in formation, all running in the middle of the area where everyone is gathering. So this year we had our own intimidating warm up. Because we had more numbers than any other GPS team and because we were hosting the final, on the day, we put on quite an impressive show. We warmed up before each race, running up and down in the view of everyone with over twenty boys!

Sydney High also fielded a team in the City to Surf fun run, but because of injuries, some of the team were unable to finish.

I want to make one last mention. A GPS cross country run is structured as follows: the under 14s is run first, followed by the under 16s and then followed by the 18 and aboves. When Sydney Grammar hosted the run on 25 August, Yinan Zhang ran all three age divisions, one after the other. This is an example of the dedication and commitment that Sydney High Cross Country is renowned for. Which leads me to thank Mr Prorellis and Mr Kesting for their hard work and encouragement throughout the season. The high morale of our cross country team owes a great deal to teachers such as these who applaud and encourage us.

raditionally, the U16s GPS Cross Country team is one of the smaller age divisions, being the hazy transition team between the U14s and the Opens. However, 2001 saw a dramatic increase in the size of the team as an influx of Year 10 students swelled the numbers. The U16s GPS Cross Country team for 2001 had six members, which was a record for the age division. Increased participation promised that, at last, Cross Country had a chance at being treated as a serious GPS Winter Sport.

The U16s age division meets every Saturday at various locations around Sydney to attend school cross country carnivals. The length of the course is between six and seven kilometres.

The first event of the season was the Normanhurst Boys' High Cross Country Carnival. An arduous, hilly 7 km course that combined all terrain types (grass, dirt, pavement), the Normanhurst run was traditionally a meet to be avoided. To the surprise and delight of all, five members turned up to face this daunting start to the season.

This anomaly in the participation rate continued for the rest of the season. The short but hilly Scots run near Moriah College was followed by the Trinity College relay at Ewen Park. The full team arrived to pit themselves against the Shore Cross Country course, widely regarded as the most challenging run due to the presence of a small mountain at the finish. The Sydney High run was cancelled because of rain, but runs at Joeys, Kings, Newington and Grammar followed.

This was a special year for Cross Country at High because it was our turn to host the championship run. The 2001 Cross Country Championships at Centennial Park were held on a flawless, blue-skyed day and was a pleasant end to the season. There was a lively carnival atmosphere, since rugby and soccer matches were held at the same venue resulting in a cohort of enthusiastic High supporters in the area. The efforts of Mr Kesting and Mr Prorellis as co-coaches must not go without mention. We were fortunate to have such dedicated and professional mentors. Representing the school in cross-country was a challenging task, but not without a high degree of fun and personal reward under their direction.

Sydney High was well represented at every meet. At last, a contingent of robust athletes in the brown and blue could be found at the starting line of every Cross Country carnival. The commitment of the athletes, the coaches and the families towards creating a spirited atmosphere every Saturday is what makes Cross Country a truly rewarding sport to undertake.

First Grade Rifle Shooting GPS Champions

t is said that a champion team will always beat a team of champions. Well, as of 5 pm on Wednesday 25th July, the GPS officially declared that Sydney High FirstGrade Rifle Shooting 2001 is a champion team.

Having won the All-Schools match in May, narrowly defeating the Armidale School, and with Kings achieving GPS championship status in 2000, we expected the shooting standard to be high and the competition to be fierce.

The first match contested was the Rawson Cup, over 500 and 600 metres. By the conclusion of this cup, we had fired 112 shots, of which 103 hit the bull's eye. This resulted in a team score of 551 out of 560, smashing the previous GPS record by 7 points, and securing first place.

Tuesday afternoon saw the NRA shield match, held over 600 metres. Since this is the match we won on

two previous occasions (in the 116-year history of the match), it is considered our favourite. Hence, it was only natural that we secured it for a third year.

At the conclusion of Tuesday's shooting, Sydney High had a more than comfortable lead, with Armidale and Shore closely contesting second place. However, Wednesday afternoon's match, the Buchanan Shield, is always the most gruelling contest, and this year proved to be no exception. Battling unusual wind conditions, variable light, and drizzling rain, we appeared to be struggling. In fact, at one stage we were coming last, with Armidale in the lead. With morale dampened, conditions unfavourable, and scores unimpressive, the team proved its champion status. Coming from well behind, we staged a spectacular finale, obliterating all opposition and winning the shield by a huge 12-point margin over Shore, in second place.


