Literacy Development in Years 7-9 As part of our literacy objective in our Strategic Improvement Plan, we intend all students to engage in literacy development. In a nutshell, we want our students to be more skilful, accurate, versatile and purposeful writers. We want them to read more widely, analyse more closely and listen more acutely. There is an ongoing whole school emphasis on closer reading, clearer writing. Students need to focus on audience, sentence construction, ideas generation and vocabulary. Examples of text types you should be able to identify when you read and compose when you write include - narrative, procedure, report, description, discussion, exposition, recount, poem, text

response, analysis and evaluation. We want

students to create more legible, coherent and accurate texts. In addition, to develop student vocabulary, we are asking for parental support to encourage wide reading using the Junior Library resources to assist in building student vocabulary. Dr Love has purchased many books recommended by the students themselves that can be borrowed from the Andrews Library.

Spelling Tests in Years 7-9

We have too many 'cusp kids' – at HSC mark 88 or 89. They don't quite get Band 6. Why didn't they get there?

Often, it is because their expression, sentence construction, spelling or handwriting or a



combination thereof, produced what I call an 'apprehension of flawed excellence' in the mind of the examiner – conscious or subconscious – that

led to a reduction in an assessed mark by the examiner on one or more questions, even if just by one mark.

Teachers can't be expected to have to move students from band 4 to 5 at the HSC in two years if expression is holding them back. We need to fix this problem in the Junior School. Many faculties have vocabulary lists aligning with topics taught. It is easier to learn to spell words you will be using. The Executive has agreed (7.3.23) to commence 10-word spelling tests for every class in Year 7-9 once a cycle, to increase *spelling accuracy in context*.

More sophisticated, confident and accurate writers will deliver more Band 6 outcomes at the HSC in more courses from the same base of ability, knowledge and understanding.

2022 Budget Summary

Balance brought forward was \$975,727. The

total income from DoE was \$12,408,411. Total income from school and community sources was \$4,246,032, including grants and contributions



(\$4,154,651), sale of goods and services (\$75,502) and investment income and other

revenue (\$15,879). Income from all sources was \$16,654,443. Within those totals, donations to the SHS Building Fund and to the P & C were \$ 677,760. Funds available \$16,799,880.

Total payments were \$16,767,771, predominantly salaries and wages for staff (\$13,442,333) and operating expenses (\$3,325,438). Fees for service rendered (\$986,338), mostly coaching payments, and other operating expenses were \$958,680. Key Learning Area expenditure was \$274,507. Property Maintenance costs were \$341,657. Furniture and equipment (\$263,725).

Overall, payments as a percentage of funds available was 99.8%, meaning we do not build up reserves beyond a slender carried forward operating balance (which has now become very small). The 2022 payments percentage was again higher than normal, due to properties projects being brought forward during the period, rising inflation and more expensive equipment and services inputs. At High the very strong reliability of our income flows from parents through donations and contributions has allowed this very high expenditure percentage to be maintained for 23 years. I am counting on that great support continuing in 2023!



Sentence Conscious Pedagogy: Using Appositives An appositive is second noun or phrase, placed beside a noun to explain it more fully. An appositive defines or describes a person, place or thing. eg The Head of the River, <u>a prestigious rowing regatta for GPS rowers in</u> Years 10 to 12 held at SIRC in March each year, is very competitive. Appositives are easy to construct and add variety and complexity to sentence composition. Appositives can help when writing topic and concluding sentences. They help add more variety, information and sophistication to your sentences. A knowledge of appositives can help your reading comprehension because appositives are rarely spoken.

Stimulus

Should there be restrictions on free speech? Consider these two contrasting views:

In favour of unrestricted free speech: Unrestricted free speech is morally and socially beneficial because it promotes individual autonomy, supports democracy and prevents oppression. It's also epistemically beneficial because even in the case of controversial, offensive or false views, it's better for them to be debated openly to allow for evaluation and critique, than for them to be suppressed and potentially pushed underground.

In favour of restrictions: Some kinds of speech are morally and socially harmful (eg hate speech) and/or epistemically harmful (e.g. misinformation). The harms of allowing such discourse outweigh any possible benefits, and restrictions on these forms of speech are justified for the good of individuals and society.

Critically evaluate these views and defend your own view on this topic.

Community Services Committee – Lak Saviya Foundation BBQ & Mufti Day

The Lak Saviya Foundation is a registered charity organisation in Australia that have undertaken a number of worthy projects in Sri Lanka in areas improving education, health and livelihoods of people living in poverty. SBHS has been in a long-standing relationship with the Lak Saviya Foundation since 2005, providing financial assistance for our sister school in Sri Lanka, Kahawa Rathnasara Maha Vidyalaya (KRMV) School, which was devastated in the 2004 tsunami.

On Friday 24 February, the Sydney Boys High Community Service Committee (CSC) ran the Lak Saviya BBQ and mufti day along with volunteers from the Year 10 cohort with all proceeds going to KRMV which is still in need of financial assistance. The money raised has been used to help fund programs to improve IT teaching, English Teaching, Internet, and Teaching Materials.

Throughout the day, many Year 10 volunteers played various roles to ensure the smooth running of the BBQ event, including set up, cooking, selling, collecting mufti donations and packing up. Overseeing all these roles was the BBQ Organiser, Ric Hou, working with the CSC Executive team to ensure nothing went wrong.



During periods 1 and 2, volunteers set up the BBQ and the selling areas, and the cooks began to barbeque the sausages. The BBQ was planned to run for both breaks, and with the addition of kebabs to the menu. However, to everyone's surprise, we managed to sell out after the first half of lunch! Overall, the event was a great success raising a profit of \$1,648. A big thank you to all 68 volunteers on the day. The next CSC event will be the Sir Roden and Lady Cutler Foundation BBQ on Friday 17 March from 5:00pm to 7:30pm where we hope to see you there!

What does High Spirit mean to me?



LOTE COLLECTION IN THE JUNIOR LIBRARY

In Term 4 last year, the Junior Library received extra funding to add new resources to our LOTE (Languages Other Than English) collection. Japanese was added to the school's languages last year, so we needed resources for those classes and students, but we also took the opportunity to add books in other language areas as well.



As someone who has been studying various languages for thirty years, I know that it is a lot easier to absorb a new language when you are still in school. The High student body also has a very high percentage of students who speak a language other than English at home, so they are in a very good position to learn new languages.



Obviously students have to learn vocabulary and grammar, but those studying Chinese and Japanese have the added burden of having to learn new writing systems. The earlier you start, the easier it is! We have multiple

resources for learning Chinese characters/kanji, hiragana and katakana, as well as new grammar and vocabulary books in all our language areas.



I've also got a number of books in various languages that present stories in simple language. We have Tintin and Asterix comics in various languages (Japanese, Chinese, French, German), graded readers in Chinese for those who can read 500, 1000, or 1500 characters, and picture books in Japanese hiragana.



Memorising lists of vocabulary is not always the most fun activity, but using the various bilingual visual dictionaries we have can be helpful in connecting the actual item with the foreign word. Picture books with simple stories also allow students to make vocabulary and grammar connections with pictures, giving them an edge in learning a new language. As students continue with their language studies, and do HSC courses, they can make use of some of the more advanced readers we have.







Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my Legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education and Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The Importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.
