Interpreting Year 10 Reports - Semester 1

Boys in Year 10 have had their reports handed out after consultation with the Principal. Year 10 is an important time to try out electives to help identify



possible Stage 6 courses that students might be interested in studying. Equally it can confirm which courses students do not enjoy and will not pursue in Stage 6. Above all, Electives should be taken for enjoyment of the subject content and activities. Parents should be aware that there are changes to the way the rank order is calculated in Year 10. HD's (6 points) and credits (3 points) etc...are no longer added together to form the scores on which the rank order is based. We use individual marks supplied by teachers. We calculate ATAR equivalent scores for those marks based on12.3 units (six subjects). PE is included in the

calculations as 30% of two units (a subject) because it has only four periods and is assessed as a practical subject in Year 10. PASS elective scores are calculated in the usual way. Boys good at PE and taking PASS may be advantaged in the ranking. Rank order variations can be large between Years 9 and 10 for these and other reasons. For example, boys take on additional electives which do not have to include history or geography. More than 60 boys are attempting Stage 6 courses as accelerating students and they are assessed on Stage 6 criteria which are more rigorous than those in Stage 5. Sometimes, they spend more time than they should on their accelerated course and get their time management out of balance. Some of their other subjects might have weaker results as a consequence. This can lead to a large rank fluctuation and a reduced ATAR estimate. Some Stage 5 electives, like commerce, robotics and filmmaking, are infused with Stage 6 concepts and content. The Online Elective can only be calculated as the average of the rest of the students' scores because it is a mastery-based elective. That calculation may lower a student's rank or advantage him because he would have done worse in any other elective. Science is delivered in a series of modules - chemistry, biology and physics. Some boys are much more engaged with one science module rather than another. Regrettably, some boys switch off in subjects they are not planning to pursue in Year 11. These subjects can be electives that they just picked for enjoyment because they had already decided on their Year 11 courses or ones that they chose but with which they have not become engaged. Please bear in mind the possible impacts on ranking in the cohort of these changed contexts when discussing the report with your son. Quiz him about his three electives and how he is engaging with them and whether he is enjoying them and if he is thinking about his Stage 6 course selections. Look closely at his learning behaviours profile to see how his engagement is perceived by his teachers.

Sentence Conscious Pedagogy: Before we write, take notes and plan.

Having students reduce multiple sentences to key words, phrase and abbreviations helps students distinguish between essential and non-essential information; boosts comprehension of the information to be written about; enables the retention and absorption of information; promotes analytical thinking; teaches efficient notetaking; and assists students to outline paragraphs and compositions ahead of drafting them. Use a pen or pencil to underline key words. Use abbreviations and symbols: = indicates a definition or explanation; + is and; -> Cause and effect; / new idea...etc. You can work out your own code to assist your note making.

In addition, we like to acknowledge students with outstanding learning behaviours across all their subjects. We recognise students who have achieved the following percentage of Consistently learning behaviours as a total:

- 85% Consistently for Years 9 and 10
- 90% Consistently for Years 11 and 12

These students must also not have any 'Sometimes' or 'Rarely' for their learning behaviours in any course. These benchmarks indicate student application in areas evidence supports as essential for academic growth, while also understanding that students should be developing these skills more over time, with engagement increasing when choosing more elective courses. Award Scheme points are also added for these students in recognition of their effort.



2023 Push-Up Challenge

Over the first 23 days of June, students, teachers, and prefects of Sydney High took on the challenge of doing 3,144 push-ups while also fundraising to show their support for people's mental health. As a community of 271 students in 31 different teams who took on this challenge, we collectively pushed a total of 410,000 push-ups and raised a staggering \$7400 for Lifeline Crisis Support.

The challenge of doing 3,144 push-ups is representative of the number of Australians that tragically took their lives in 2021. It's a very alarming figure which is becoming a growing concern not just for the country, but in our local community as well. The stigma surrounding men's mental health is something that hinders a lot of people from seeking support, causing deeper-rooted issues where people don't feel comfortable sharing their thoughts and feelings with those closest to them. We want to make Sydney High a more supportive environment for students in need who can seek help without facing any prejudice or backlash from the people around them and this movement is definitely a step in the right direction.

The challenge is definitely not an easy one to take on — the push-ups average to be about 137 every single day and everyone who took on this challenge, no matter how far they got through with the target or if they used other forms of exercise, should be very proud of themselves and those alongside them. A big congratulations goes to all participants who took on this challenge this month of June. We hope all our efforts to raise both money and awareness in this movement will prove vital in getting rid of the stigma surrounding men's mental health not just in our school, but in the wider community.

Legal Debating Semester One

Legal Debating comprises of Mock Mediation for Year 9, Mock Trial for Years 10 and 11, plus the opportunity to participate in a number of other events throughout the year, such as Model United Nations.

The Legal Debating team have gone from strength to strength this year and I'm incredibly proud of them.

At the beginning of June, ten boys participated in the first Harvard Model United Nations event to be held in Australia. This prestigious and popular event has been running in the US for about sixty years and requires a lot of preparation, knowledge of current affairs and debating skills. With the majority of schools taking part being private schools, with access to greater resources to enable them to make the most of the opportunity, our boys felt somewhat disadvantaged and overwhelmed at the start. However, they did an outstanding job of rising to the challenge and providing the other students with some serious competition.





Eric Scholten has reached the semi final of the Evatt Competition, where students debate mock Security Council resolutions from the position of an assigned

country, and Fardin Shadman is participating in SUSMUM (Sydney University School Model United Nations) in a couple of weeks.

The boys have gone above and beyond to find events to participate in, fit in the extensive preparation around their already busy schedules and do their best to excel. They are a credit to themselves and our school.

Jude Oh has provided a report on the Mock Mediation team's progress so far and an insight into why he enjoys Legal Debating:

"Over the past semester, seven Year 9 boys have taken part in several rounds of Mock Mediation. The competition, organised by the Law Society of NSW, allows students to compete against other schools on the basis of their ability to mediate a situation. This is important because mediation is quickly becoming a preferred way of conflict resolution instead of litigation.

The SBHS team is coached by Nikolai, a former SBHS student and a first-year law student. His prior experience and dedicated coaching has helped the team compete against private schools, who have experienced lawyers as their coaches. This has been reflected in our scores too, with round scores as high as 95 out of 100, which likely allows us to move to the next round. Our next round takes place on 27 June where students will need to

resolve a scenario on the allocation of resources for a student representative council.

I enjoy mock mediation because it gives us an opportunity to practice speaking and role-playing. It also acts as a natural precursor to Mock Trial. The scenarios also inspire us to use cross-transferable skills like analytical, logical and evaluative thinking — all of which will help us in our time at High and beyond."

Patrick Nguyen has reflected on the Mock Trial team's year to date:

"The Mock Trial boys have experienced pleasing results over the last semester, given the less than optimistic outlook at the beginning of the season. Under the guidance of old boy Nikolai, who very diligently motivated a team that didn't have much experience with Mock Trial, the boys were ready to defend and prosecute.

Even in cases where the defendant seemed unequivocally guilty, the boys, as barristers, solicitors, and as witnesses, were able to prevail. An early first win raised our hopes for the rest of the season. With early morning sessions, the Mock Trial team prepared for cases, with barristers preparing material to convince the magistrate, and witnesses remembering many lines of testimony.

A narrow loss in the second round, with our own Old Boy, Symeon Ziegler, now volunteering as a Mock Trial magistrate for the Law Society, was a bittersweet moment. However, it gave us a wake-up call for future rounds. Our latest round was however fraught with uncertainty. With the trial scheduled only shortly after Year 11 exams, and scheduled on the same day that our two barristers had a HSC task, preparation began only a mere day before the trial. Fuelled by the impending misery of exam results, we were determined, even in the limited time before the trial, to not face two losses.

Our opponent, St Aloysius, is one of the best schools in the debating circuit. With less preparation than usual, only a performance rivalling the best could see us through. Capitalising on the holes in the opposition's case, we found ourselves at a surprising leg-up. With the momentum that seemingly appeared out of nowhere, the High bar table was able to successfully acquit the defendant and win the trial with the highest winning margin yet. We have now made it through to the knockout rounds, ranking 36th out of approximately 200 schools, where one loss will see us out of the competition for 2023. Given our strong performance so far, we are hopeful that we will be the first High team to make it to the quarter finals for many years."






