From the Principal Update From the Secretary

At last week's webinar from the Secretary of Education, Murat Dizdar, reassured staff about the DoE commitment to slow down the rate of change. By removing mandated pressures, the policy aim is to give schools space and time to respond to their existing challenges. This term, HR is working with the NSWTF on a new award for teachers to go along with the awards for SAS and Non-SAS already finalised and published. There is time for everyone to respond to the Draft Plan before August 25. This will become the blueprint for our work for the next few years. The Department is working to address the teacher supply challenge. It has a goal to grow its market share in competition with the private sector. NAPLAN results for Years 7 and 9 should have arrived in all affected households. Our focus is on trajectories over time - for individual students, for cohorts and for the school.



Education Public Schools

There has been a lengthening of the runway for the Curriculum Reform rollout. The NESA timeline has been adjusted to align more closely with the Masters Review Recommendations. Protocols for Suspension and Expulsion of Students are being reviewed to re-calibrate the balance between the need for structured and orderly environments and individual student needs. How should the few apex students be managed within the procedures? The Inclusive Education Policy is still a priority and its implementation remains mandated. Non-school staff will be given a week in schools prior to employment, to experience (in Martin Graham's words) 'the rich tapestry of life in schools'. We all have to discuss and prepare for the ban on mobile phones in school which becomes mandatory as from October 9. The policy needs to be worded to 'best suit' our school's circumstances and be 'context informed'. Our staff have had several discussions about the policy and further work will be done during the term. We feel we have settled on a good compromise position for a GPS 6-day school.

Boggabilla Exchange

It was very pleasing to be able to host students



and staff from Boggabilla on their visit to Sydney for four days this week. We have had an exchange program with this Indigenous School in

Kamilaroi country since 2004. Just prior to and during COVID, the visits were postponed, so it is great that the visit was reinstated this year and we can accommodate everyone at the Outterside Centre.

Vouchers for Parents

Active Kids vouchers for \$50 can be used towards sport and recreational activities but will expire on January 31, 2024. This is true also for the Creative Kids Vouchers. With the program in jeopardy, eligible voucher holders are advised to use them on activities this year. Winter sports and co-curricular activities qualify for voucher use.



Sentence Conscious Pedagogy: Strategies for Constructing and Recognising Topic Sentences

Use one of the sentence types; include an appositive; or start with a subordinating conjunction. Give students a topic and ask them to write two or three topic sentences about it. Give students details in the form of notes and have them generate a topic sentence. Give them a group of 3-5 sentences and have them underline the topic sentence and cross out the sentence that has the weakest connection to the topic sentence. Present students with a series of sentences and ask them to identify the one that is the topic sentence and the ones that provide supporting details. Provide 10 to 15 details about a topic students already have some knowledge of. Have them write a topic sentence. Present a sentence that puts X in a positive light and another in a negative one. Students have to distinguish between facts that support different points of view about the same topic.

What is an interesting fact about you, or a hobby that you have?

A hobby I've had since childhood is playing video games each week. I think they're immensely engaging. Finding the balance is important and I've learnt firsthand that disregarding the world offline limits your life experience a lot more than you might realise.

FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND CARERS

WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (ie Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.

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All students have the right to a quality learning experience at school.

Students with disability must be able to take part in education without discrimination and on the same basis as other students. To ensure this, schools must make reasonable adjustments if needed for students with disability. Educators, students, parents, guardians, carers and others (eg health professionals) must work together to ensure that students with disability can take part in education.

The **Disability Discrimination Act 1992** and the **Disability Standards for Education 2005** describe schools' responsibilities.

WHAT IS A REASONABLE ADJUSTMENT?

An adjustment is an action to help a student with disability take part in education on the same basis as other students.

Adjustments can be made across the whole school (eg ramps into school buildings). They can be in the classroom (eg adapting teaching methods). They can also be for individual student need (eg providing personal care support).

The school assesses the needs of each student with disability. The school provides adjustments in consultation with the student and/or their parents, guardians and carers.

Schools must make reasonable adjustments if needed. The Disability Standards for Education 2005 define 'reasonable adjustment' as an adjustment that balances the interests of all parties affected.

WHO IS INCLUDED IN THE NCCD?

The definition of disability for the NCCD is based on the broad definition under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*. The following students are examples of those who may be included in the NCCD if they need monitoring and adjustments:

- students with learning difficulties (such as dyslexia)
- students with chronic health conditions (such as epilepsy or diabetes).

WHO COLLECTS INFORMATION FOR THE NCCD?

Schools identify which students will be counted in the NCCD. They base their decisions on the following:

- adjustments provided for the student (after consultation with the student and/or their parents, guardians and carers)
- the school team's observations and professional judgements
- any medical or other professional diagnoses
- other relevant information.

School principals must ensure that information for the NCCD is accurate.

WHAT INFORMATION IS COLLECTED?

A student is counted in the NCCD if they receive reasonable adjustments at school due to disability.

Each year, schools collect the following information about the student, including:

- their year of schooling
- the level of adjustment received
- the broad type of disability.

For students who have more than one disability, the school uses professional judgement to choose one category of disability. They choose the category that most affects the student's access to education and for which adjustments are being provided.

A high level summary of the NCCD data is available to all Australian state and territory governments to improve policies and programs for students with disability.

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
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
