### Students Obtaining Unfair Advantage

I am writing to parents to urge them to exhort their sons, particularly in Year 12 around examination time, to refrain from practices which are contrary to school values - namely giving ID cards to others and asking them to scan in for them or obtaining Doctors' Certificates for minor ailments in order to stay home and study. Neither integrity, nor respect for fairness, is being demonstrated by such actions. We all should play on an even field and share the experience together. Come to school punctually, go to lessons, study in the library if there is a short day and stay in our routines. No one should deliberately try to obtain an advantage in study time above his peers who come to school every day, attend all their lessons and engage in multiple sport and co-curricular activities. Such unethical behaviour should be discouraged strongly and I ask parents to support the school to curtail it.



## Sentence Conscious Pedagogy: Single Paragraph Blueprint (SPB)

Model the process of creating a paragraph outline, comprising a topic sentence, a concluding statement and notes for 3-4 possible sentences expanding on the idea in the topic sentence. Having students create an outline before they write: enables students to visualise the beginning, middle and end of the paragraph or composition; helps students distinguish between essential and nonessential material; guides students to place their ideas in logical order; prevents repetition; and improves students' ability to stick with a topic. Practise writing topic sentences and concluding statements (give one, compose the other). Teacher supplies details. Class puts notes into four categories. Students decide on what to eliminate. Generate a topic sentence, compose 3-4 supporting sentences and then a concluding one. Dr K A Jaggar Principal

### Meet the Teacher - Mr Beare



Describe a little bit about yourself and your role at this school.

My role is that of a casual, which means I am filling in where I am needed. For now, it's Mr Wang but next week it could be someone else. But more importantly my role is that of an educator.

## Describe a little bit about your background in education and how you came to be a maths teacher at this school.

I then decided to pick up English as well after doing a lot of maths. After finishing these degrees, I realised I wasn't actually qualified to teach, I am currently doing my masters in education and am finishing uni at the end of this year.

## Is there anything you find unique about teaching at SBHS?

The main thing is that the boys are really faster (mentally) than at any other schools. They pick up concepts quickly which allows me to get to the fun stuff, complex proofs and whatnot. The downside is that the boys are quite self sufficient and in some situations don't always require assistance.

### What is an interesting fact about you, or a hobby that you have?

A hobby I have, as some boys may know from playing with me, is that I play volleyball around 4-5 times per week.

An interesting fact about me is that during uni when I was working part time, I worked with a team in the USA. To lineup team meetings, I decided to become functionally nocturnal for around half a year, working through the night and sleeping through the day.

Dear Parents and Caregivers,

The Outdoor Education Group (OEG) takes our duty of care towards our participants very seriously. In line with our duty of care and our privacy and security policy, we are now collecting medical information using Operoo, an online medical information collection system.

The Operoo system provides caregivers the opportunity to update medical information promptly and accurately while giving The Outdoor Education Group instant access to the emergency information provided by you. This information will only be accessible by staff working directly with your child.

As a caregiver, you will shortly receive an email from the Operoo system inviting you to enter the details for your child in an electronic medical form. If you have used the Operoo system before you will still need to update the medical information once again and share the profile information with us. You don't need to do anything until you receive the email requesting this information.

Profiles of students with some medical conditions will require a recent Medical Advisory Plan (MAP) form signed by a doctor. Please complete a profile as soon as possible if your child has epilepsy, diabetes, severe asthma or anaphylaxis to determine if you need to complete a Medical Advisory Plan (MAP) form.

### **OzHarvest Food Drive**

Did you know eliminating global food waste would save 4.4 million tonnes of C02 a year, the equivalent of taking one in four cars off the road? (Source: YouSustain) Also, did you know the demand for food relief is higher than ever? The charities OzHarvest supports reported a 61% increase in demand in the last 6 months. 32% of these charities cannot meet the current demand and reported that 30% of the people they support are seeking food relief for the first time (Source: OzHarvest, 2022). With such realities, the Community Services Committee (CSC) ran a food drive in June to celebrate World Environment Day and to support Oz Harvest. Students were encouraged to go home and find non-perishable foods and donate them to OzHarvest.

There were 73 individual donors with about 400 items of food donated that were delivered to the OzHarvest in Waterloo. All food will go towards a food rescue charity which will further be distributed to disadvantaged and underprivileged communities in need.

The food drive proved to be a good opportunity for the Junior members of the CSC to get involved in some volunteering opportunities. Each recess, a group of junior CSC members set up a stall where anyone was able to donate food. Thank you to the 22 junior volunteers that helped during this event. ### FACT SHEET FOR PARENTS, GUARDIANS AND CARERS

### WHAT IS THE NCCD?

The Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability (NCCD) takes place every year.

The NCCD is a collection that counts:

- the number of school students receiving an adjustment or 'help' due to disability
- the level of adjustment they are receiving to access education on the same basis as other students.

Students are counted in the NCCD if they receive ongoing adjustments at school due to disability. This 'help' allows them to access education on the same basis as a child without disability. The NCCD uses the definition of disability in the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*.

Schools provide this information to education authorities.

Go to **What is a reasonable adjustment?** below to learn about adjustments.

## WHY IS THIS DATA BEING COLLECTED?

All schools in Australia must collect information about students with disability.

The NCCD:

- ensures that the information collected is transparent, consistent and reliable
- provides better information that improves understanding of students with disability
- allows parents, guardians, carers, teachers, principals, education authorities and government to better support students with disability.

### Student with disability loading

Funding from the Australian Government for students with disability is based on the NCCD through the student with disability loading.

Students with disability who are counted in the top three levels of the NCCD (extensive, substantial and supplementary) attract the loading. Funding is based on a per-student amount at each of the three levels of additional support. The amount of the loading reflects the level of support students with disability need to participate fully in school, with higher funding for those who need higher levels of support.

Australian Government recurrent school funding is provided as a lump sum to school authorities including state and territory governments, which can then distribute the funding to their member schools according to their own needs-based arrangements.

The Government expects schools and school systems to consider their funding from all sources (ie Australian Government, state and territory and private) and prioritise their spending to meet the educational needs of all of their students, including students with disability.

## WHAT ARE THE BENEFITS OF THE NCCD FOR STUDENTS?

The information collected by the NCCD helps teachers, principals, education authorities and governments to better support students with disability at school.

The NCCD encourages schools to review their learning and support systems and processes. This helps schools to continually improve education outcomes for all students.

All students have the right to a quality learning experience at school.

Students with disability must be able to take part in education without discrimination and on the same basis as other students. To ensure this, schools must make reasonable adjustments if needed for students with disability. Educators, students, parents, guardians, carers and others (eg health professionals) must work together to ensure that students with disability can take part in education.

The Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005 describe schools' responsibilities.

### WHAT IS A REASONABLE ADJUSTMENT?

An adjustment is an action to help a student with disability take part in education on the same basis as other students.

Adjustments can be made across the whole school (eg ramps into school buildings). They can be in the classroom (eg adapting teaching methods). They can also be for individual student need (eg providing personal care support).

The school assesses the needs of each student with disability. The school provides adjustments in consultation with the student and/or their parents, guardians and carers.

Schools must make reasonable adjustments if needed. The Disability Standards for Education 2005 define 'reasonable adjustment' as an adjustment that balances the interests of all parties affected.

## WHO IS INCLUDED IN THE NCCD?

The definition of disability for the NCCD is based on the broad definition under the *Disability Discrimination Act 1992*. The following students are examples of those who may be included in the NCCD if they need monitoring and adjustments:

- students with learning difficulties (such as dyslexia)
- students with chronic health conditions (such as epilepsy or diabetes).

## WHO COLLECTS INFORMATION FOR THE NCCD?

Schools identify which students will be counted in the NCCD. They base their decisions on the following:

- adjustments provided for the student (after consultation with the student and/or their parents, guardians and carers)
- the school team's observations and professional judgements
- any medical or other professional diagnoses
- other relevant information.

School principals must ensure that information for the NCCD is accurate.

## WHAT INFORMATION IS COLLECTED?

A student is counted in the NCCD if they receive reasonable adjustments at school due to disability.

Each year, schools collect the following information about the student, including:

- their year of schooling
- the level of adjustment received
- the broad type of disability.

For students who have more than one disability, the school uses professional judgement to choose one category of disability. They choose the category that most affects the student's access to education and for which adjustments are being provided.

A high level summary of the NCCD data is available to all Australian state and territory governments to improve policies and programs for students with disability.

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### **HOW IS THIS DATA USED?**

The NCCD data informs funding and work by schools and sectors. It ensures that support for students with disability becomes routine in the day-to-day practice of schools. The NCCD also supports students in the following ways.

- The NCCD helps schools better understand their legislative obligations and the Disability Standards for Education 2005.
- Schools focus on the individual adjustments that support students with disability. This encourages them to reflect on students' needs and to better support students.
- The NCCD facilitates a collaborative and coordinated approach to supporting students with disability. It also encourages improvements in school documentation.
- The NCCD improves communication about students' needs between schools, parents, guardians, carers and the community.

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) annually publishes high-level, nonidentifying NCCD data.

## WHEN DOES THE NCCD TAKE PLACE?

The NCCD takes place in August each year.

### IS THE NCCD COMPULSORY?

Yes. All schools must collect and submit information each year for the NCCD. This is detailed in the *Australian Education Regulation 2013*. For more information, ask your school principal or the relevant education authority.

### HOW IS STUDENTS' PRIVACY PROTECTED?

Protecting the privacy and confidentiality of all students is an essential part of the NCCD.

Data is collected within each school. Personal details, such as student names or student identifiers, are not provided to federal education authorities. Learn more about privacy in the **Public information notice**.

### **FURTHER INFORMATION**

Contact your school if you have questions about the NCCD. You can also visit the NCCD Portal.

There is also a free **e-learning resource** about the *Disability Discrimination Act* **1992** and Disability Standards for Education 2005.
