### Tell Them From Me

NSW secondary students tell about their engagement with school

#### Tell Them from Me Survey


The results are in on our latest TTFM survey which DoE requires schools to participate in to obtain state-wide data on the wellbeing and perspectives of our students. Respondents N= 834. Some positives from the survey -'Students feel accepted and valued by their peers and by others at the school.' School mean 83% (State 66%). 'Students that do not get into trouble at school for disruptive or inappropriate behaviour' (96%) State (87%).' 'Students understand there are clear rules and expectations for classroom behaviour' School 68%, State 56%. School staff emphasise academic skills and hold high expectations for all students to succeed'. School 81%, State 71%. 'Students feel that they have someone at consistently provides school who encouragement and can be turned to for advice'. School 69%, State 60%. We realise that even in these areas of positive perceptions by students there are things we could do to lift our performance. On the negative side, even though 90% of students agree that if they are being bullied or see someone else being bullied, they know where they can go to get help, we still have 22% of respondents (State 21%) who are subject to moderate to severe physical, social or verbal bullying or are bullied over the internet. (Our issues are predominantly with social media and often occur outside of school hours). We need to do more to encourage students to report bullying to someone so that we can respond with restorative processes to address the relationship between the students involved as bullies or victims. Also, on two measures



relating to learning dispositions, we would have hoped to have had more positive perceptions. 'Students set challenging goals for themselves in their schoolwork and aim to do their best' (School 68%, State 62%). Our Strategic Improvement Plan is addressing goal setting by students as an area for improvement over the next three years. On perseverance, described as 'the extent to which students can pursue their goals to completion, even when faced with obstacles' (High 44% v State 36%) - we need to do more to equip students with the skills to persist in the face of setbacks because the goal they set is valuable and worth their renewed effort.

#### Pockets for Participation

Looking back over the blazers on the corridor walls, one can see all different shapes and sizes of 'pocket awards'. Mr Kay and I have been discussing the issue of awarding pockets and thinking about what the purpose of 'pockets' is. Essentially Year 12 students get to wear a blazer around that is adorned with their achievements. Only the excellent participants have been acknowledged. We now want to open up the area on the school blazer now exclusively taken by a large music pocket to other co-curricular areas. Consequently, Mr Kay has commissioned designs for pockets for four areas – music, chess, debating



and or public speaking and sport. They are designed so that three can fit on the same pocket as one music pocket. From 2024, if you have participated in any of the four activities continuously for five years, and to the attendance requirements of the activity, as well as being involved in the activity in Semester 2 of Year 11, you can apply for and purchase from the school, a smaller size pocket to sew on your blazer. For sport, you will have to have competed in two GPS competition sports for each of the five previous vears and be enrolled currently in summer and sport at the time of the award, to earn a sports pocket in Year 11. As a pre-condition, you will have to commit to two sports in Year 12 as well. It does not matter the level of the team you are in, what matters is that you are wearing the symbol of your grit and perseverance on your blazer. In consideration for tradition and current student expectations, eligible students will still be able to purchase a Music Pocket of original size from the High Store in 2023 and 2024. Thereafter, the expectation will be that smaller pockets are both the policy and the new normal.

#### Sentence Conscious Pedagogy: I do, we do, you do...

First the teacher supplies the paragraph and breaks it down into the component parts. Next, the class writes the paragraph using the SPB and the topic sentence, concluding statement and notes in the middle. Finally, the students compose their own paragraph using the SPB. E.g. Anything irrelevant and not to the point is judged to be 'beside the mark'. (TS) Archery phrase - now a sport - village defence of country - citizens practised - trained bowmen - competed to score hits - cloth or leather attached to a tree - misses and hits the tree 'beside the mark' - imprint on language. (notes). Anything that was irrelevant and therefore did not count like those misses in archery – became known as 'beside the mark'. (CS) Write the paragraph in full, with at least three sentences as well as the TS and CS.

The Outdoor Education Group (OEG) takes our duty of care towards our participants very seriously. In line with our duty of care and our privacy and security policy, we are now collecting medical information using Operoo, an online medical information collection system.

The Operoo system provides caregivers the opportunity to update medical information promptly and accurately while giving The Outdoor Education Group instant access to the emergency information provided by you. This information will only be accessible by staff working directly with your child.

As a caregiver, you will shortly receive an email from the Operoo system inviting you to enter the details for your child in an electronic medical form. If you have used the Operoo system before you will still need to update the medical information once again and share the profile information with us. You don't need to do anything until you receive the email requesting this information.

Profiles of students with some medical conditions will require a recent Medical Advisory Plan (MAP) form signed by a doctor. Please complete a profile as soon as possible if your child has epilepsy, diabetes, severe asthma or anaphylaxis to determine if you need to complete a Medical Advisory Plan (MAP) form.

Year 10 History Excursion Sydney Jewish Museum

On 14 August, the two classes from Year 10 elective history visited the Sydney Jewish Museum. The excursion began with a compelling talk from Dr Richard Haber, recounting his harrowing experience as a child survivor of the Holocaust. He transported us to life inside the Krakow Ghettos, telling numerous stories of narrow escape and in his words, strokes of "luck" that saved his life countless times. We are all grateful for this opportunity to have such an intimate experience with Dr Haber and were enlightened by his vivid recollections. This was followed by a presentation on Genocide, where we learnt about its specific stages, focusing on the phases of persecution, symbolisation and dehumanisation. We discovered examples of these steps in not only the Holocaust, but from the Genocides of Rwanda, Cambodia, and many more. The presentation helped to deepen our understanding of these terms, their role in the execution of genocidal activity.

The excursion finished with a tour of the Holocaust segment of the museum, which was both highly engaging and confronting. We encountered heroic acts of Jewish resistance yet were also confronted with visuals of horrid living conditions, and tragic narratives filled with mistreatment and agony. Perhaps the most daunting experience was the exhibition constructed to commemorate the countless Jewish lives lost of young Jewish children. The room featured a huge wall full of names and pictures of children who were brutally murdered through the genocide, and a sculpture of many shoes found that were worn by them in the death camps. Overall, the experience was very intriguing and evocative, and allowed us to only begin to understand the atrocities of genocide and the Holocaust.

#### **CAREERS LEARNING at SBHS**

This year's guest speaker series recently focussed on resume building and interview skills. Thank you to the Old Boys Union and Harrison Francis.

#### Work Experience

The UNSW Civil and Environmental Engineering Work Experience program was an excellent experience and very valuable in helping me decide my future career. We began the first day at UNSW Water Research Laboratory at Manly. It was very interesting to see the many models and wave flumes they used for their research, including a massive model of the Townsville dam. On the second day, we visited the construction site of the new Sydney Fish Markets. The building would have the basement underwater, with water touching it. However, while the basement was being constructed, a temporary cofferdam (pictured) was erected to allow the structural pillars to be placed and the concrete to set. We visited the site after the works to level the seafloor for construction were completed.



We then visited the new wing of the children's hospital at Randwick and Laing O'Rourke, a construction and engineering company. The third day was spent at the civil engineering building in UNSW, where we had a series of lectures about future transportation and got to try out some driving simulators in the TRACS Lab. On the fourth day, we went to Stanwell Tops to see the Seacliff Bridge (pictured), with an interesting lecture about the geology of the area, and why the bridge was built. We then were bussed back to UNSW to go to the school of mining engineering, where we got to try out some VR simulations and a very interesting AR 3D map table.

### **Compulsory school attendance**

#### Information for parents and carers

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

## What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

# The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

# What if my child had to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- Being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral.



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

#### Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

#### My child won't go to school, what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

# What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

### • Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

# What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

#### Working in partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

#### **Telephone interpreter service**

Please contact the school if you would like more information. If you need interpreter assistance to contact the school, please call 131 450, tell them what language you need and ask the operator to phone the school. The operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with your conversation. You will not be charged for this service.


