A huge thank you to **Ruchi Sehgal**, who is stepping down from the Canteen Committee. We are grateful for Ruchi's assistance as Co-Treasurer this past one year and six months, assisting with ensuring the canteen suppliers are paid, amongst other things.

Our newest Canteen Committee member, **Crystal Yeung**, joins as Co-Treasurer and has been busy with handover activities as she prepares to take on various treasury related tasks from Ruchi.



To show our appreciation, the Canteen Committee have launched lucky draw scheme, that will take place once each term, to recognise the wonderful efforts of our Canteen Volunteers. The lucky draw rules are as stated below:

- Any volunteer who has helped at the Canteen for 3 hours or more will be automatically entered into the draw, with one entry for each day assisted.

Standard 3.2.2A of the Australia New Zealand Food Standards Code introduces three mandatory food safety management tools for food businesses. School canteens across NSW have until 8 December 2024 to comply. The Canteen Committee have assessed the rules and find the Canteen is able to demonstrate compliance in most areas, with the exception the food handler training, due to our large, diverse number of volunteers.

The NSW Food Authority has developed a free online Food Handler Basics training course that can help businesses meet their food handler training obligations which can be accessed via: https://www.foodauthority.nsw.gov.au/

training/food-handler-basics-training.

In the coming weeks, the Canteen Committee will be requesting that all volunteers complete either the NSW Food Authority training or one of the in-house courses (under development), to be made available in other languages where possible.



We encourage students to place their lunch orders between 8:30am and 9:00am in person at the Canteen or anytime online via the Flexischools app or at flexischools.com.au.

By ordering lunch, you avoid missing out on your favourite foods (especially on days where there are special items on offer), decrease waiting times at recess and lunch as well as help reduce food wastage.

Please remember to pick up your orders. Any uncollected items will be sold, and unfortunately, refunds will not be provided unless there is a valid reason.

National Chinese Eisteddfod 2024

With each passing year comes the annual event of the National Chinese Eisteddfod, a highly competitive poem recital challenge that brings together a collage of many different schools with varying backgrounds and year groups. These groups go head-to-head in this rewarding competition. SBHS students across years 7 to 11 have voluntarily participated in this year's Eisteddfod and worked tirelessly to achieve maximum results. Each year group consisted of an ardent team of talented students who gave highly expressive and wellexecuted performances on stage with great synergy. Like previous years, this year's selection of poems highly embodies Chinese traditions and consists of a motley of striking narratives. The Eisteddfod also allowed for individual competitors, who performed and rehearsed weekly, with the opportunity to choose their own poem from a diverse range available. Students were given the opportunity to perform both individually and with their year groups.



Weekly rehearsals held at recess, lunch, and sometimes even during our class time were masterfully guided by Ms. Zhang, who worked hard to ensure that we could perform to the best of our abilities. Throughout a term of intensive practice, we developed our memory, tempo, and expressions of our respective poems, alongside possibly gaining a greater insight and appreciation into the values of Chinese culture. Over time, our performances sounded more assertive, lively, and articulate until we were confident enough to face the arrival of the big day.

On Saturday 27 July, both teams and individuals met in the main building of UTS to finally display the exemplary outcomes of our diligence. Every year, we have had outstanding levels of success, and this year was no different. All 31 competitors arrived early, compared to their allotted performance time slots, to do a few more practice runs before going onto the stage.

The day started off strong with the performance of the 13-16 individual non-native age group. Macallister Giles came 3rd, an impressive achievement on top of the high level of courage displayed by performing individually! Other individual performances throughout the day included Furqan Rahman competing in the 8-12 individual non-native age group, as well as the 10-

12 individual competition consisting of Harold Jiang, Will Meng, Brishen Xue, and Joey Zhou. I would also like to congratulate Will Meng for a fantastic placement of 3rd! From the 13-15 individual age group, Jonathan Zhou, Diming Wu, Yuhai Wang, Yuze Li, Leo Di, William Wang, and Leo Yuan all put tremendous effort into their performances as well, with Leo Yuan coming 4th, Yuhai Wang coming 3rd, and Yuze Li getting an astounding 1st place in their respective subsections! This year, we also entered three teams from years 7, 9, and 10 for the group competition. From 11:55am to 12:55pm, the year 7s, consisting of Marcus Chen, Andy Gao, Harold Jiang, Robert Lei, Evan Ma, Will Meng, Brishen Xue, Valentin Zhang, and Joey Zhou, gave a breathtaking performance in front of esteemed judges and came out with 3rd place, a highly commendable outcome! The day ended with the 13-15 team age group at 4:35pm to 5:45pm, where both the year 9 and year 10 teams performed masterfully on stage. AFF Australian Schools Senior Schools Fencing Championships - EPEE

Following the winter holiday break, eight fencers from the senior epee squad were headed to Canberra for the AFF Australian Schools Fencing Championship. After months of hard training, the squad was itching to prove themselves at the highest level of schools fencing. This was first senior national level competition for the B team, and the second national level competition for the A team. The B team consisted of Daniel Zhu (9R), Benjamin Wu (10F), Vihaan Rajit (10E), and Lucas Wang (10R). The A team consisted of Tommy Xu (11E), Hudson Cai (10M), Xavier Perry (11M), and Jamison Lai (11E). In total thirty-one competitors, from three different states competed at the event.

In the individual event, only Tommy, Daniel, and Ben were able to proceed past the Table of 8. Furthermore, Daniel and Ben were not able to overcome the stiff competition and were knocked out one bout from winning a medal. With the squad cheering him on, Tommy fought hard to make the finals bout. Unfortunately, Tommy was unsuccessful in his charge to the finals, falling short to the eventual gold medallist.

Following this, the squad was ready to redeem themselves in the team's event. In the first round (Round of 8), the A team had a bye, while the B team faced Newington College. Going into the final leg of the bout, the team was three points down, and it was up to B team captain Daniel to pull through and confirm the B team's place on the podium. In a heroic charge, Daniel defeated his opponent 8-1 in less than two minutes.

Unfortunately for the young squad, the B team had their charge to the top cut short by St Andrews Cathedral School.

I fought hard against the top fencer at Sydney Grammar in the semifinals but unfortunately lost 15-12 and finished overall in 8th place. Ben Dang performed exceptionally well, and with incredible skill and determination triumphed over the same opponent in the finals clinching the gold medal with a score of 15-14.

Final Individual Results:

Benjamin Dang (10R) – Individual Gold 1/32. Dean Johnsun (12F) – 8/32.



For the Teams Foil Event in the afternoon, a total of 6 teams participated. Our team performed early, beating Newington 45-36 but we had a tough draw pitted against strong favourites to win, Sydney Grammar A in the semi-finals. With numerous Junior National Squad members consistently within their ranks, they are tough opponents every year. With 2 rounds to go, we found

ourselves 8 points down with a score of 26-34, a deficit that would seem almost impossible to overcome. It was a moment that tested our resolve, but rather than succumbing to the pressure, we fought back with unyielding determination. We staged a remarkable comeback winning 45-41, leading to a historic first-ever win against Grammar A. After securing our spot in the finals we went on to defeat Sydney Grammar B convincingly with a score of 45-27. Tears of joy were shed as we celebrated this hard-earned victory.



Last year, we achieved Silver in the Teams Event. This year, we achieved gold. This will be the most precious memory that Andrew, Henry and I will take with us, as we head towards graduating from High in a few months.

The MVP for this championship was undoubtedly Ben Dang. This is the first time in High Fencing history that we won gold in both the Individuals and Teams events at the AFF National Senior Schools Championship for Foil. Also, we believe our gold in the Teams event this year ended Sydney Grammar's thirteen consecutive gold medals. The team's tenacity and unity in that pivotal semi-finals were truly awe-inspiring demonstrating the heart and soul of fencing at High.

10 tips to successfully completing online consent for school vaccinations:

- 1. Make sure you are using the link provided to you by the school, <u>engage.health.nsw.gov.au</u>
- 2. It is recommended that you use a laptop or desktop computer with a Chrome browser.
- 3. Follow the prompts to log in, using your Service NSW account. If you do not have a Service NSW account, you will need to create one to provide online consent.
- 4. The first time you log in, you will be prompted to fill in <u>your</u> <u>personal details</u> before you can complete consent for your child.
- 5. Enter your name as it appears on your Medicare statement rather than how it appears on the card. Please enter any middle names in full, as initials may not be accepted.
- 6. Use **dashes** to separate the **DD-MM-YYYY** in yours and your child's date of birth.
- 7. Ensure you select the vaccines you want your child to receive. To receive both you must consent to both. Information about each vaccine is in the Parent Information Sheet.
- 8. Consent can be edited up to 24 hours prior to your child's school clinic. If you wish to change or withdraw consent after this time, please contact your child's school to advise them.
- 9. The consent site can get busy as it is used statewide. If its not working right away please come back and try again later.
