Clean Up High Month

Our student leaders and SRC are concerned about the cleanliness of our site. Too many boys think it is the cleaner's job to pick up rubbish. In fact, cleaners are supposed to merely empty the rubbish bins provided for students to deposit rubbish. They also blow away fallen leaves. It is our collective responsibility as a school community to keep our environment clean and safe. The focus for November is 'cleaning up High'. In response to an SRC request for more bins to be located more strategically, Mr Prorellis has purchased 12 additional large bins. They will be located at the nominated traffic areas: leading onto Moore Park West; between the fig trees in the Junior Quad; in the area around the outdoor basketball courts; outside of the gym; the 100s veranda opposite the tennis court; the bubblers area; and near the entrance to the Junior Quad. Sydney High School Cadet Unit SHSCU Highlights - Staff Promotion

On Tuesday 29 October, SHSCU Administration Officer 2nd Lieutenant (AAC) Sunny Liu was promoted to Lieutenant (AAC) by Major (AAC) Wade Priestly, the Commanding Officer of 23 Battalion. This promotion recognised her successful completion of three ALDC Grade 1 Modules over the course of five months, involving formative assessments on youth development and military skills, a seven-day residential course, and a summative In-Unit Assessment. Sunny Liu's Grade 1 qualification allows Sunny to serve as the Officer-In-Charge of any non-overnight, non-field activities. That is, she has authorisation to plan, conduct, and supervise both urban and home-unit activities, such as routine Tuesday parade, Dining-Night, and ANZAC Day In services. AFX 2024 in Singleton

During AFX 2024 (Annual Field Exercise), I had an enriching experience at Singleton military barracks over 7 days. Cadets and Officers from across the Brigade gathered in an open field surrounded by dense forests, where we set up camp. We received 24-hour ration packs, with meal packs and snacks, which kept us well-fed. As a section commander, I led a team of eight, collaborating with cadets from Holsworthy and Hurlstone Units. Our training included practical navigation activities conducted by senior cadets, enhancing our teamwork skills. Night-time activities included a camouflage and concealment exercise. For those aged 16 and above, like myself, we participated in the Adventure Training Award (ATA) barrier test, which required passing a 21kg weighted pack march, a beep test, and a swim test. Despite challenging conditions, all

High boys successfully completed the pack march and exceeded the beep test target of level 8. We also engaged with Australian Military drone racers and visited the School of Infantry Museum, exploring the history of military weapons and vehicles. Overall, my AFX experience was invaluable for personal growth and leadership development.

Recruit Bivouac - Corporal's Perspective On Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 September, this year's newest recruits embarked on their first "Recruit Bivouac," guided by dedicated NCOs and staff. During the bivouac, recruits got to experience one of the true highlights of cadets - the chance to sleep under the stars, strengthen bonds with friends, and embrace the challenge of outdoor survival. This hands-on experience allowed them to put essential skills into practice, from setting up hoochies to applying what they'd learned in the classroom, such as observation by day and camo and concealment techniques. On the first day, the recruits were organized into six sections of eight to nine people, encouraged to get to know one another and build team cohesion. Although they started off shy and reserved, working closely together on practical tasks helped them become more comfortable as a team. By the end of the day, the sections had built solid connections, setting the stage for the next day's test of their camaraderie. The following day, NCOs presented the recruits with a challenging team activity: each group was given a broad directive to build a "large structure they could be proud of" within one hour. This activity tested each team's creativity, problemsolving skills, and teamwork. The complexity of the task required each member's contribution, making it impossible for any one person to handle alone. Although all groups initially struggled, it was rewarding to see them rally, picking themselves up after setbacks with the courage to complete their structures with resilience and determination.



In conclusion, the 2024 Recruit Bivouac proved to be a valuable experience, showing recruits a fundamental part of cadet life. It not only taught them valuable practical skills but also helped forge new friendships and reinforced the spirit of excellence that is central to cadets. CDTLCPL Ben Dang

Recruit Bivouac - Sergeant's Perspective

On Saturday 14 and Sunday 15 September, Bravo Company of Sydney High School Cadet Unit (SHSCU), made up of this year's new recruits, attended an overnight bivouac at Holsworthy Barracks to complete practical areas of their training. Cadets arrived at the Holsworthy Barracks Main Gate at 0700 hrs and were ferried by bus to Aero Paddock. They were then taught lessons on topics including first aid, observation, camouflage and concealment. Junior NCO's from Sydney Boys and Sydney Girls acted as Section Commanders and 2IC's, leading and teaching their sections of six to seven recruits. After sunset, a glow stick hunting activity was run for the recruits, incorporating all the things they had learnt during the day.

During this time, the weather dropped to 8°C with high winds, and so remaining activities were cancelled, and an early lights-out was arranged. The next day, recruits cycled through three activities, involving navigation and building structures using branches and rope. Cadets were then ferried back to the Main Gate before being dismissed at 1500 hrs. By attending this bivouac, recruits are now eligible for promotion to Cadet as well as attendance at the Annual Field Exercise. SHOOTING HOOPS REPORT

In the latest round vs. Newington College, Sydney High secured many great wins. From graded teams to the 14F's, High Basketball teams saw much success, and the hard work put in among all facets of High basketball has produced outstanding results.

To begin with, High came away with a dominant win in the 6th Grade matchup, more than doubling the opposing team's score, winning 41-19. This was only the beginning of our dominance though, as the 7th Grade team came away with the W, winning 39-26, with J.Moon scoring 12 of Sydney High's 39 points. Similarly, our 8th Grade side also put on a powerful performance, ending the game 29-18 with a strong all-around team effort. The 9th Grade side faced a strong opposition, and battled neck-andneck, with Eugene hitting a clutch three to tie the game for Sydney High, 25-25. Our tenth grade came out firing on all cylinders to grab a win 45-22. In the 11th Grade matchup, High put on an absolute clinic, blowing out Newington's side by a whopping 41 points with Ariz dropping 15 points in a 47-6 win to be remembered. The 12th Grade game saw a similar scorecard, with High blazing to the W in dominant fashion, winning 43-14, with Gabriel putting up 13 points.

The 16's also saw this success, with the C, D, E and F teams grabbing the win with score of 38-22,

37-30, and insane numbers of 67-25, and 70-25 respectively. There were also blowout wins in the 15 E's and F's, with the E team winning 37-17 with Raymond dropping 17 of the 37 points, and in the F's a 52-13 39-point margin, with William and Sam putting up 12 points each. In the 14F's, there was a game for the history books, with High winning in a 75-4, scoring almost 19 times the opponent's final score, and Louis Wang scoring over 20 points in the team effort.



Lastly, I would like to once again thank Mr. Hayman for continuous dedication to the basketball program. It isn't easy to manage 36 whole teams every week, catering to us as best as you can. Without your ongoing support to High's basketball, our successes wouldn't be as easy coming or consistent.
