Mrs Veronica Crothers, the Teacher-Librarian at High has retired after almost 50 years in the teaching profession.

Mrs Crothers commenced at High as the Teacher-Librarian in 2001. At that time there was only one library to serve both Juniors and Seniors. This overcrowded library had to be redesigned and with carefully planning by Mrs Crothers, the library gained much needed space. Three distinct areas were created, Computer, Quiet and Class areas. This new layout was an inviting space where students could study, use the computers for work, play chess or simply spend time reading. With the addition of some colourful armchairs and later some colourful walls plus the relaxation of some outdated rules, the library became a welcoming and comfortable place. Over the years she continually enhanced and modernised the library by implementing many new ideas.

Mrs Crothers was very passionate about improving literacy and introduced a reading program called Literacy Circles. She liaised with the English Department and encouraged Wide Reading classes. Students were encouraged to participate in the Premier's Reading Challenge and to be Student Librarians as part of the School Award Scheme. It was her hope that the students would increase their reading as a result of these initiatives.

Mrs Crothers embraced the evolving library technology, overseeing the transition to the Oliver Library system and the introduction of E books. There were also many changes in the Audio Visual field. The library moved from VCRs to DVDs then to ClickView, a web based collection of movies and documentaries. Mrs Crothers respected the knowledge and experience of her staff, encouraging and valuing their input regarding library matters. She imparted her own knowledge through excellent training and shared learning.

From a personal standpoint, I have very much enjoyed our twenty year association and we all wish Mrs Crothers a very happy and healthy retirement.

Mr Mark Gainford

Anthony Mark Gainford has officially retired as a teacher at High after 48 years of service, having started teaching at the school in 1975. He retired as the longest serving staff member in the school's 140-year history.

After attending North Sydney Boys High School, and going on to gain degrees in chemical engineering, science and teaching, Mr Gainford had an interest in pursuing his teaching career in a similar academically-selective high school. Although he was not a rower, a friend recommended that he try coaching at High, and this became an enduring passion during his time at the school.

Our own version of Mr Chips, Mr Gainford has been the soul of High Spirit and much loved by cohorts of boys. Teaching Mathematics at all levels, he was a great recruiter for Rowing and Rugby, both of which he served continuously since his appointment to the school. He was also involved for a time in Rifle Shooting and Cross-Country. He served as CO of Cadets, long-term editor of The Record, Prefects MIC, Chair of the Badges Committee, and was a long-serving executive member of the AAGPS Committee. His contribution has been extensive, long-lasting, and valuable.

Mr Gainford could fill volumes with his memories of the boys—their gifts, talents and struggles—as no doubt the boys could with his anecdotes and stories. In particular, he remembers the maths genius of many boys, including one who went on to study at Trinity College, Cambridge. Other highlights include watching the First IV win the Yaralla Cup in 1976, and the First XV beating Joeys in 1979, 1988 and the famous last win of 1993. He is proud of the fact that his junior teams beat every other GPS school at least once, of his twenty productive years of Cadets, and the great achievements of the prefects. Mark says his love for sport and the GPS is one of the main reasons he stayed at High for so long.

When asked what he'll miss, the main thing is the banter in the Maths staffroom and in his classrooms. As to what has changed from when he joined the staff at High in 1975, it would be the demographics of the school, from the larger numbers of Greek and Jewish students in his early years, as well as the shift in sporting participation. Sports like Basketball and Volleyball have grown in popularity while interest in some of the 'traditional' sports has shifted over time. When he was the Rugby Master many years ago, the school had twenty-one Rugby teams and only two Football teams! There have been many fantastic and long serving teachers that have defined the school experience of a large number of High boys, but few could claim to have made such an indelible mark on the fabric of Sydney High School as Mr Gainford. As his time at the school comes to an end, he will be fondly remembered by decades of High Old Boys.

Farewell Assembly



Year 12 Farewell and Graduation Assembly 2024



Good afternoon Year 12, staff and parents. Welcome to our Farewell and Graduation Assembly for the Class of 2024. I acknowledge the Gadigal people of the Eora Nation on whose country we meet and pay my respects to elders, past, present and emerging. They represent the aspirations and spiritual connections of the traditional custodians to this land and waterways. One hundred and sixty-five of you are completing your six-year journey at High. There have been highs (such as three GPS Premierships this Winter, the Louat Shield for debating, three national teams' titles in fencing and retaining the GPS Chess Trophy and winning the Terrey Shaw Shield); and lows – (the COVID years of 2020-21 which really impacted boys getting started well at High).

As I observe in my Principal's Message printed in the Year 12 Farewell Booklet, which you have received today, the student senior leaders tried hard to bring back the High culture. Also in that document, recognition of a selection of notable results by Year 12 students is included as a memento of the achievements of the Class of 2024. To that list we add our Year 12s for first Football –premiers: Daniel Lee, Praneil Manandhar (c.), Pradeepan Nadhan, Ashwin Rajeswaran and Alex Valanidas. For first grade Volleyball – co-premiers: Roy Chae, Karan Dahiya (c.), Arnav Gupta, Dev Punjabi and Jay Ta. For second grade Volleyball – premiers: Lachlan Lefevre, Xile Xie and Haoran Zhang. Toby Huey represented in our GPS and Terry Shaw Shield chess wins. Congratulations to our Year 12 debaters who won the Louat Shield – a major trophy sought after by GPS schools since 1920 – Vishruth Anand, Luka Miletic and Patrick Nguyen.

My thanks go to our Student Leaders in all areas of school life for their dedication in rebuilding our school culture – Prefects, SRC, Community Service, PAWS, Equality, Social Justice, Environment, Captains of Sports Teams and Co-curricular Leaders. Thank you to the school leaders who had input into the 'rally round' theme – dodgeball, push up challenge, bearpit podcast or the Student Handbook. I want to recognise and honour the nine scholar-sportsmen who competed in two seasons of GPS Saturday sport and earned 99.5 ATAR or higher in the Trial HSC. Leon. Brian. Ethan. Christopher, Oscar, Patrick, Samuel, James and Mohammad will be presented prizes at Presentation Night next year. Fourteen students competed in three sports. Ashwin Rajeswaran was a 'triple first'. 'Double firsts' this year were Daniel Bian, Joseph Britton, Brian Cho, Fynn Hopkins, Dean Johnsun, Christopher Lau, Michael Li, Luc Tran, Harry Xin and Jacob Yin. In the 'One-Two Club' were Brian Ahn, Roy Chae, Landon Jarvis, Garry Liu, David Kim, Nathan Nguyen, Harry Royal, Leon Shen, Jay Ta, Joshua Tang and Aiden Wong. I want to thank the 81 Year 12 boys who showed pride in their school and represented High in at least two GPS sports in their last year. Another 72 played one sport. So, 79% of the cohort showed their dedication to our scholar-sportsman ethos in their last year at school. A strong number of 26 boys played at least two GPS sports for six years despite the COVID shut down. I applaud our graduating Year group for their dedication to our ethos. The level of ongoing Year 12 commitment affirms that our students value our ethos of scholarship and participation in school sport. Thank you to all the MICs, coaches and parents who helped in our sporting programs.

In my Farewell Message in your Booklet, I addressed the vital characteristic of resilience. I want to expand a little on that theme today. To strengthen resilience one needs to develop a clear sense of self-identity and to be psychologically flexible. Act according to long-term values, not short-term impulses. Try to be comfortable with all your emotions, positive and negative. Our emotions often signal to us what we value. For example, feelings of guilt signal to us the need to make amends or to recalibrate our goals. Focus on making right choices, not on being happy. Research seems to show that if we make happiness an end goal we are prone to being less happy over time. Whatever you do, try to find the fun in life. Laughter is an antidote to stress and triggers secretions of endorphins, dopamine and serotonin. It is a natural high and keeps your psychology positive. Try to maintain your revision and study routines over the next couple of months. Good luck in the HSC. My best wishes go with you all in your future endeavours.

Principal's Address

On behalf of everyone in our High community - teachers, support staff. IT staff, groundsmen, cleaners, coaches, Old Boys and volunteer parents - I extend a warm welcome to all new students this morning. Welcome to the land of the Gadigal, to whose elders, past, present and emerging, I pay my respects and extend those respects to any Aboriginal people here today. We celebrate renewal each year by clapping in our Year 7 boys and we look forward to clapping you out as Year 12 young men in 2029, at our farewell assembly. We acknowledge and recognise your previous academic success, earning you a coveted place at High. You were offered enrolment after a rigorous ability test. We understand that each one of you is an academically gifted individual with a unique profile of natural abilities, skills and interests. Our task is to mould these abilities interests and skills into talented performances, in multiple areas of school life. To the new students joining us in Years 9, 10 & 11, I offer you a special welcome from the High family. You were selected because of your all-round achievements in secondary school so far.

We welcome all our new students and expect you will grow as people and add value to the High culture during the time you spend with us. You have a great opportunity to establish yourselves at our school by getting involved quickly in the co-curricular program. I urge all students not to waste time waiting and watching. You need to grasp every opportunity. Get organised and be prepared to work really hard. Set yourself incremental academic goals and strive to achieve them. Focus on your own academic growth. You will need perseverance and conscientiousness to succeed. Many people are ready to help you. We have a school-wide BYOD policy. Information and communication technology is integrated into the daily life of our school. Use your device and your researching privileges responsibly. Look after the security of your device. Our IT Centre is where you can go for help. Adhere strictly to our mobile phone policy. Distraction is our greatest enemy. Master the possibilities of the CANVAS platform. Don't forget that you must also write by hand every day in your own words. You need to have legible, fluent handwriting to reach your examination potential. You need to build your written vocabulary to be able to recall it under the stress of examinations. Wide reading helps build vocabulary rapidly. You have time to do that in the Junior School. You need to grow your capacity to deconstruct questions and answer them in your own words and not in the regurgitated expressions of others. Our focus on sentence conscious pedagogy is designed to help you do that.

Our teachers will be endeavouring to work closely with you to find out more about your preferred learning styles and individual needs. We will be trying to improve your learning. We will be fussy about focus in order to get more out of each lesson. We will need you to pay attention in class, take notes and participate positively in activities. We need you to discipline yourself to stay on task. Relate respectfully to everyone at all times. We will expect excellence from you, not just adequate work. Care about compliance – do all the work that is set for you at the required standard. Our shared values - respect, compassion, integrity, dedication - permeate our pedagogy. We are dedicated trustees of our reputation and success at High. Together, if we work hard and help each other, we can maintain and enhance our excellent outcomes. I expect that you will all adopt our all-rounder culture and take advantage of activities at High. We want you to work hard, train hard and play hard. We will also expect you to give some of your time and effort back into school and community service. I expect all students to involve themselves in co-curricular activities - the Student Awards Scheme identifies the main ones available. Check out Zenith or r drive. Sport is a very important part of life at High. Our traditional involvement in GPS and CHS competitions makes us unique.

Sport training is offered at High on at least two afternoons. Membership of our weights room is excellent value for money. My strong expectation is that you will play competition sports on Saturdays. Participating in GPS competition is an integral component of our ethos. We focus on team sports for educational reasons - group cooperation, team building, goal setting, collaboration, time management, grit development, managing loss, developing resilience and inspiring intrinsic motivation these are most necessary attributes in modern work contexts. We are trying to nurture future earning skills: problem solving and critical thinking, evaluating information and claims, working in teams, communicating ideas and being creative and innovative. You will have an assessment of these skills in various contexts included in your semester reports in Years 7-10. For each boy we want to build positive emotions about High, grow engagement with High programs, establish respectful relationships with everyone, find meaning in all we do and a feel a sense of accomplishment for your sustained effort. At school, in class, at sport, show your teachers, peers, all staff members and volunteers in activities, the respect they deserve. Ask them for help. Be responsible for your own learning. The pursuit of excellence is a lifelong discipline. Let's pursue our goals hard. A balanced life requires time for fun and reflection. Find time for those time-outs, too. I wish you all a happy and productive experience at High.

The Principal's Address

Special guest Professor (Emeritus) Geoffrey Kellerman (SHS-1942), Ms Angela Lyris OAM, Director of Educational Leadership, Department of Education, Mr Christopher Brown (OAM) Chairman of Sydney High School Foundation Ltd, Mr Andrew Hybler (Vice-President SBHS P & C), Professor Ron Trent (President SBHS School Council), Life Governor Mr Geoff Andrews (representing the SHSOBU), Mr. Geoff Denyer (Relieving Principal SGHS), Ms Virginia Flint representing Sir Roden & Lady Cutler Foundation, guest presenters Mr Nathan McDonnell, Mr Terry Meakin, Megan and Katherine Morgan, Richard Halliday, guests' partners and relatives, Old Boys, staff, parents and prize winners – thank you all for joining us this evening.

Our most significant achievement in technology last year was to stay independent and not migrate to DoE Et4L. We can continue to run Clipboard and another fifty or more applications and programs that could not be supported under the Et4L aegis. It will be more expensive for us, but well worth it, considering the additional IT services and applications we can maintain. We have invested the time and money to meet the security standards required by the DOE, including bifurcation of the Governors Centre network. Our success was due to the fantastic design and analysis work by James Rudd and David Isaacs, the calm and persistent negotiating skill of John Prorellis and the strong support of our Director, Angela Lyris. My heartfelt thanks go to them for their intensive efforts on behalf of our school community.

Due to the efforts of Jamie Kay, George Barris and David Isaacs, we transitioned to Sentral for our re-configured Student Awards Scheme. How the scheme works is, if you earn 30 points within a category (there are seven categories) then you are awarded a 'nomination' for that category. If you achieve four nominations, you will receive a Bronze Award. Eight nominations earn a Silver Award,13 nominations, a Gold Award and so on. It is possible to earn a maximum of two nominations in one category in any one year. This restriction preserves some breadth of participation in the Awards Scheme. The administration of the scheme is electronic, with a running tally of points being kept for every student. ID files are easy for teachers to make and send. The Scheme should be more user-friendly, more visible and more efficient in accounting for everything our students do.

Our first year of focussing on sentence conscious pedagogy was very expensive, in terms of additional teacher hours and additional classes. We really threw resources at trying to make a difference. Our discourse as a result is more attuned to literacy improvement.



We have developed materials and have strategies in place to complete program modifications for the Junior School by the end of 2024. We have delivered literacy workshops to identified students. We are also supporting students in Years 7 and 9 who require more intensive literacy development assistance. We have expanded Atomi availability for students with deficits in subject areas who want to improve. We are hoping for improved Year 9 NAPLAN results in March.

Our HSC results for 2023 were somewhat higher than for 2022, despite the drop in the League Tables. High boys earned 536 band 6/E4s which was our lowest number since 2009. The ATAR average for 2023 was 91.73 calculated for 207 candidates with a standard deviation of 8.91. [The 23-year corresponding numbers are 92.55 & 8.47]. The 167 students who enrolled in 2018 earned a mean ATAR of 91.74. The 44 later-enrolling students had an ATAR mean of 91.53. [The 18 - year numbers are 92.81 and 88.78]. In all, 37 students scored 99 or higher; 67 students earned ATARs between 95 and 98.95; but only 143 scored 90 or above - our smallest number since 2005. In terms of Band 5 & 6 percentages per course, 8 courses were at 100%, one at 95 to 99%, three at 90 to 94% and 17 below 90%. Our 2023 course means compared to 2022 - 13 increased and 18 decreased. When comparing High with its Statistically Similar School Group, 18 courses were positive and 12 negative. Our average school score was 86.22 v 73.17 for the state. Kaden Kuang (12E) & Ahasan Kabir (12E) have had their major works nominated for consideration in Shape 2023. Music Performance nominations for ENCORE 2023 include - Akira Ha (12S), Timothy Jian (12R), Yianni Scarlis (12F), Joshua Tang (11R) & Moshe Tao (12M). Benjamin Pirom's composition, Incognito, was selected for inclusion in the HSC Showcase ENCORE, a significant honour.

Our boys won three GPS Premierships in volleyball and rifle shooting. Three students represented at national level.

Four individuals and six teams competed successfully at national schools' level, while seven individuals competed at state level. Additional significant individual and team achievements for 2023 are outlined for you to peruse at the end of your program.

In conclusion, I want to make some layman's observations about the future of our planet. The class of 2023 will graduate from university and start their careers at a time of existential crisis in our climate. Around 2030, we will see the effects of global efforts to reduce emissions of greenhouse gases.

At that time, our progress towards 2050 emissions reduction targets will be assessed. At present, coal, oil and gas still make up more than 82% of the world's energy supply with renewables around 14% and nuclear 4%. There are at least three scenarios for climate change interventions. The 'stated policies' scenario – or what countries are doing now – may result in +2.4°c of warming by 2100. The 'announced pledges' scenario – or what countries are promising to do – if implemented might result in +1.7°c of warming by 2100. The 'what is needed' scenario – to achieve net zero emission by 2050 – would result in a +1.4°c warming by 2100. We are warned repeatedly that global temperature rises beyond 1.5°c may result in irreparable damage to our climate.



There are positive technologies to reverse the doomsday scenario. Solar photovoltaic (PV) may reduce global emissions by 7% by 2030. However, manufacturing outstrips installation by a factor of nearly 3. More could and must be done.

Wind energy and electric vehicle proliferation could reduce emissions by another 7% globally. Electric vehicles could be promoted or subsidised. There are storage solutions for CO2 and CH4. Hydrogen gas generation from wind and solar is available. Pumped hydro can help if powered by solar. Feeding cattle seaweed could reduce methane emissions significantly. Offshore wind farms, carbon sinks, on farm carbon sequestration and carbon credits are strategies to help. Will we build community consensus in time to roll out enough of any of these, to make a difference to your lives in 2030? If you want your grandchildren to be able to flourish, you need to be interested in climate policy and practice. Technology may yet provide the tools to save us, but we will need the political will to use them. We know the 'why'. Leaders of your generation will need to produce the 'how'. I wish you all good health and good fortune in these troubling times. It was a privilege to serve as your Principal.

Anzac Day Assembly

Distinguished guests Colonel Andrew White CSC – NSW Brigade Commander AAC, Lt-Colonel Andrew Bernie – CO UNSW Regiment–Commander Andrew Dale RFD RAN (Rtd), Commander Viv Littlewood (Rtd) Old Boy, Mr David Jeffrey, representing Bondi Junction-Waverley RSL Sub-Branch, Colonel Ahmad Mostafa, representing Paddington-Woollahra RSL Sub-Branch and Mr Ken Twyman, representing Maroubra RSL Sub-Branch, welcome to our Anzac Day assembly held on the traditional lands of the Gadigal people, to whom I pay my respects and to their Elders, past, present and emerging, as well as to any Aboriginal people present today.

We feel it is important to hold a school Anzac Day Assembly, even if it is still two weeks until the commemoration day, as we do not return to school until April 29th. Sadly, another year has passed in the Russia-Ukraine War, without a resolution in sight. The winter counterattack by Ukraine has failed to regain significant territory and the faltering US support in the form of aid has deprived Ukraine of essential artillery ammunition, leading indirectly to the loss of Avdiivka, where Russian artillery superiority was five to one. Some countries in the EU realise that Europe has to shoulder more of the burden in supporting Ukraine if NATO is to reach a negotiated peace.

In the Middle East on 7 October 2023, as part of the Hamas-led attack on Israel at the beginning of the Israel-Hamas war, Hamas and other Palestinian militant groups abducted 253 people from Israel to the Gaza Strip, including children, women, and elderly people. The subsequent IDF invasion of the Gaza Strip has had catastrophic consequences for civilians in a densely populated area. The scale of destruction of housing and infrastructure is now nearly equivalent to a nuclear strike. Civilians are paying the price for the underlying issue - mutual recognition. Neither side sees the other as having any legitimacy to govern. Hamas has been the de facto government in Gaza since taking over from the Palestine Authority in 2007. Hamas is committed to armed resistance against Israel and the creation of a Palestinian Islamic state. Israel now wants to eliminate Hamas as a military and political force. It is considered a 'terrorist organisation' by Israel and other states, including Australia. The recalcitrance of both sides in negotiating a decent length humanitarian ceasefire is costing tens of thousands of civilians their lives. Let us hope that a cease fire is negotiated soon and that the war does not widen to include more combatants, other than the Houthi rebels in South Yemen.

On this occasion of honouring our military personnel past and present, I like to draw the attention of the School to some of the current theatres in which our service personnel are engaged. Operation Resolute has 600 personnel involved in protecting our borders and maritime offshore interests. Operation Kudu has 90 personnel training the armed forces of Ukraine recruits in the UK. Operation Augury is the Australian Defence Force framework in support of efforts to counter terrorism and violent extremist organisations around the world (40 personnel). Mercifully, very few of our serving ADF people are in harm's way.

In the Gallipoli campaign it was rare not to be in a killing zone for any moment of the eight months it lasted. After the initial ANZAC attacks of April 25-26, in 1915, the Turks counter-attacked ferociously to drive the invaders out of their land. Their heroic efforts failed with horrendous losses. By May, the Allied perimeter was relatively secure. The ANZAC commander Lieutenant-General Birdwood (having learnt nothing from the Turkish assaults) tried to take the offensive. On the evening of 2 May, the New Zealand and Australian Division launched an attack on the dominating Baby 700 position, on the route to Chunuk Bair. By daybreak, it became apparent how exposed the Australian and New Zealand positions were. The soldiers drew heavy fire from the Turks and then withdrew. Of the 1,000 men of the 16th Infantry battalion only 309 remained to answer their names. Private Silas Ellis, signaller and artist, wrote about the 16th Battalion's roll call on 11 May: 'Few of us are left to answer our names, just a thin line of weary, ashen-faced men, behind us a mass of silent forms, once our comrades. They have been there for some days, we have not the time to bury them'. Private Ellis survived the war and published his war sketches. His powerful, eve-witness impressions of battle reveal the random horror of death by artillery, bomb or sniper fire before or after engagement with the enemy in combat.

On Anzac Day, we take time out to understand more about our military history and to honour those who died for our country in all wars. We pay our respects to those who died fighting for us and never returned to their families. Their families too, were forever changed by war. We think of them today. As a society, we protect and nurture our legatees and veterans who suffer from lasting physical and mental wounds. We honour our Old Boy servicemen who have served since the Boer War. Our Honour boards preserve their memory. Thank you to our marching band who will represent us at the Anzac March and also our cadets who will serve at memorials or in catafalque parties. Please play your part on our national day of remembrance by attending a service, watching the march, going to your local memorial to see who served and died in your suburb or just by reading or viewing material about the ANZAC tradition. Lest we forget'.

The Principal's Address

Good morning and welcome to our Student Awards Scheme Assembly held on Gadigal land. I pay my respects to elders past, present and emerging who are custodians of culture, and to any Aboriginal people here today. To all the Awards recipients, well done and thank you for your dedication and integrity in staying the course. Students who are strongly connected to our school tend to be fully involved in the Student Awards Scheme. US research shows that co-curricular engagement while at high school, if undertaken for two years or more, benefits individuals in multiple ways during tertiary study. Also, in a study of first vear college students, their scores on a test of optimism were better predictors of their first-year college assessment grades than were their SAT test scores from high school. Our most successful years academically, come when our boys are also the most engaged in school life, when they have the most hope and self-efficacy, so you can understand why I would prefer everybody to be in the Student Awards Scheme. If you qualified for an award in 2023, I really want you to stay involved in 2024 and earn another one.

When I first started this scheme, it had three levels, but because so many boys took up the challenge to get involved, other levels needed to be added. Over time, we have increased the levels to eight. Only Nathan McDonnell and Joseph Coates Awards are awarded on Presentation Night and have honour board entries for the recipients. Several boys have been so committed to school life that we have sought and received further recognition for them at state level. Today, students receive school trophies manufactured in-house using our laser cutter. I want to thank Ms Dam and Mr Comben for the time and effort spent in manufacturing and engraving these handsome trophies each year. Mr Kay and Mr Barris have worked hard alongside our student management system provider Sentral to revamp the Awards Scheme to fit inside the architecture of the Sentral program. I want to thank them for making the Awards Scheme more accessible and efficient in its operation.

How the revised scheme works is if you earn 30 points within a category (there are seven categories) then you are awarded a nomination for that category. If you achieve four nominations, you will receive a Bronze Award. Eight nominations earn a Silver Award, 13 nominations, a Gold Award; 18 gets you a Platinum

Award; 24 a School Plaque, 30 a School Trophy, 37 a Nathan McDonnell Award and 44 a Joseph Coates Award. It is possible to earn a maximum of two nominations in one category in any one year. This restriction preserves some breadth of participation in the Awards Scheme. The administration of the scheme is electronic, with a running tally of points being kept for every student. For any discrepancies discovered with a student's individual tally, the student must contact the teacher in charge of the program. The closing date for adjustments to be made to a student's tally is by Friday Week 9 of Term 4 in the corresponding calendar year. No retrospective points can be allocated once a calendar year concludes.

We depend upon coaches, MICs and program managers to submit text files of the names of boys who have satisfied requirements for the completion of an activity. Nonetheless, students need to check their files frequently to see if they have been awarded all the points they are entitled to. It is their individual responsibility to advocate for the points they deserve.

I want to thank Mr Kay and Mr Barris for managing the scheme and Ms Ashton for her ordering, sorting, and checking of hundreds of awards each year. It is a lengthy and complex operation, but I think it describes the co-curricular life of our students accurately. I believe life balance is important – academics and co-curricular involvement complement each other in character development. That is why we go to so much trouble to record and recognise both aspects of personal enlargement. Learn organisation and self-management by involving yourself in school life. It will help your study.

Last year for Years 9, 10 and 11, there were 5 bronze medallions, 40 silver, 50 gold and 46 platinum. Also, 55 School Plaques. We are making 196 Awards today. As well, 23 School Trophies, 19 McDonnell Awards and 9 Joseph Coates Awards will be presented at Presentation Night.

To the students receiving an award today, you have shown by your broad participation in school life that you understand our primary purpose here – to grow as people, to enlarge ourselves through our involvement with other people. We try to develop our physical, emotional, cultural and cognitive intelligences. Stay involved in the Scheme right until the end. Don't drop off in Year 11 or 12. Universities appreciate students who can demonstrate broad-based commitment over time to co-curricular endeavours as well as to academic success. It shows integrity. You do what you say you are going to do. It shows dedication – you stick at what you do over time to improve yourself. You grow your selfefficacy. Treat all others with dignity – that shows respect. Treat others as you would be treated – that demonstrates compassion.

Junior Awards



The Principal's Address

Good morning and welcome to our Awards Assembly for the Junior School. I enjoy these assemblies because I get to see so many boys, who embody the ethos of our school, being recognised. We value integrity and dedication. You have shown them. When the Student Awards Scheme is taken up seriously by our students, we also do better academically. High participation rates in the Student Awards Scheme help co-curricular and academic success.

We want all Year 7 and later-enrolling students to take up the challenge to participate in school life. There are five good reasons you should participate. First, you will develop your social skills more quickly in more contexts to build positive relationships with more people. Second, you will learn how to manage your time better because you will be busy. Third, you will be able to explore a wide range of interests. Fourth, you will learn the value of commitment to an activity over time. Finally, your self-esteem and self-confidence will be lifted by your involvement with others as you grow a stronger sense of connection with High.

The Student Awards scheme at High evolved from a threelevel scheme to a six-level system with an honour board entry for all school trophy winners. However, Nathan McDonnell (SHS 2008) earned so many extra Award Scheme points that we set up a 7th level for him. The McDonnell Award then became the honour board level. Shuming Wang (SHS-2013) earned a whole lot more points than the McDonnell Award required, so an 8th level was added, named after the first Principal of High, Joseph Coates. An extra board was added for this award in recognition of the wonderful involvement in school life demonstrated by the recipients. Beyond that level, recognition is sought for boys at a state level.

How the scheme works is if you earn 30 points within a category (there are seven categories) then you are awarded a nomination for that category. If you achieve four nominations, vou will receive a Bronze Award. Eight nominations earn a Silver Award and 13 nominations, a Gold Award. It is possible to earn a maximum of two nominations in one category in any one year. This restriction preserves some breadth of participation in the Awards Scheme. The administration of the scheme is electronic, with a running tally of points being kept for every student. For any discrepancies discovered with a student's individual tally, the student must contact the teacher in charge of the program. The closing date for adjustments to be made to a student's tally is by Friday Week 9 of Term 4 in the corresponding calendar year. No retrospective points can be allocated once a calendar year concludes.

Last year students in Years 7 and 8 earned 153 bronze medallions, 54 silver and 11 gold medallions – 217 awards in all – a great effort!

I want to thank each student receiving an award today. You showed by your broad participation in school life that you understand our driving purpose here – to enlarge ourselves as people, in our IQs, PQs EQs, CQs – as citizens, caring about other people and collaborating or cooperating with them. Above all, let's show respect for one another as individual people. Our goals are collegial as well as individual. We want you to be dedicated students and participants. We hope you will show compassion through school or community service. Get involved this year for the first time or stay committed to the Scheme if you are in it. Show integrity. If you do, you will leel a greater sense of belonging to the school; and you will also understand better what we mean when we say, that we have the High spirit.

























Foundation Day Assembly

The Principal's Address

Special guest Neil McGill, School Captain of 1973, Ms Catherine Bayelle, Relieving Deputy Principal Sydney Girls High School, Mr Christopher Brown OAM, Chair of Sydney High School Foundation Ltd, Mr Geoff Andrews, Life Governor representing the SHSOBU, Professor Ron Trent, President of the Sydney Boys High School Council, Mr John Pointing representing the High Club, Life Governor Mr Phil Lambert and Jill Lambert, Professor Minas Coroneo AO, Emeritus Professor Douglas Joshua AO, other Old Boy Order of Australia recipients, Class of 1973 attendees, Old Boys, former High Student Leaders, staff and students, welcome to our 140th Foundation Day Assembly held on Gadigal land. I pay my respects to Aboriginal elders, past, present and emerging. We are gathered here to re-connect with our traditions, our cultural values, honour those who helped build them, and endorse the candidature of the Prefect Interns who will renew them. We welcome back Old Boys who graduated 50 years ago and try to connect to their context in relation to ours. Much has changed but much more has endured.

In 1973, the signing of the Paris Peace Accords marked the ending of the US participation in the Vietnam War. The US Supreme court decided the Roe v Wade case, a decision recently overturned by the same court. The post-World War 11 boom ended. There was an oil crisis leading to recession. Recessionary fears are topical today. The federal voting age was lowered from 21 to 18. Today there is talk of reducing it to 17. The White Australia Policy was abandoned. The Sydney Opera House was opened and Papua New Guinea was granted self-government. Lois D-Arcy was appointed as the first independent civil marriage celebrant. Australia received its first F-111 aircraft, in service until 2010. AC/ DC performed its first major gig in Sydney. They are still going.

In The Record of 1973, the Headmaster, Greg Bradford, expounded on the theme of goodwill. It was foundational to school success in his view, because co-curricular success "relies completely on the goodwill of teachers, parents and Old Boys who contribute so much of their time, skill and financial resources to make it all possible." Today, we would agree with Mr Bradford's assessment of the culture of the school and the foundation stones of its co-curricular activities. We need the continued goodwill of teachers, Old Boys, parents and coaches, as well as strong financial support, to deliver the astonishing variety of co-curricular activities that our students enjoy today.

Also in The Record, like many School Captains before and since, Neil McGill wrote a rallying call to his fellow students about more participation in GPS sport among senior students. He exhorted his fellows to aim for perfection and strive for victory. 'Achieving the victory is not as important as the dedication shown in striving for it.'



This idea resonates well with us as 'dedication' is one of our school's agreed core values. Fuelling dedication is the 'will – to – win' because it 'is the basis for maximum effort'.

The first XI cricket team won four games and David Nosworthy gained selection in the GPS combined second XI. In the second XI Michael Litchfield took 6-17 against Shore. The 1973 rugby first XV made High history as the first High team to be GPS Champions. Geoff Stein and Ed Zemancheff were selected in the combined GPS team, along with Steven Treble, Stuart Kelly, Doug Pauling and Neil McGill. GPS defeated CAS 35-0. Geoff, Ed and Doug were selected in the NSW Schools 1st XV with Stuart, Steven and Neil in the second XV. Both Ed and Neil were selected subsequently in the Australian Schools Rugby team. In football, first grade won 2, drew 1 and lost 8, while second grade were co-premiers with 6 wins, 4 draws and one loss.

The first VIII rowed into 7th place at the Head of the River Basketball had a successful season losing only one GPS game and securing five selections in the Combined GPS team. In the second year of official GPS tennis, first grade won four and lost three matches. Tim Hirshanan and Michael Hersch were selected in the Combined GPS tennis team. Sydney High were CHS golf Champions. The tragic loss of admired Prefect Jack Manchester in his final months of school affected the 1973 cohort.

On Foundation Day we can take this time to examine our historical foundations from October 1883 and our enduring traditions. While much about the school has changed in fifty years, the essentials that define High are the same. We prepare our students for university. We need to constantly rally support for GPS sport in Years 11 and 12. We need to strive perpetually in a very tough sports competition. We always seem to find enough individual success to inspire us to attempt our 'tasks severe' each year. Our student leaders show us the way.

Today, we bear witness to a new cohort of student leaders as they take the Prefect's Pledge. These Prefect Interns have had to qualify against performance benchmarks. They had to show lived experience of leadership. They had to meet academic prerequisites. They had to represent their school in two GPS sports in their final two years of school. They had to reach at least platinum level in the Student Awards Scheme and score at least 100 points in Year 11. They have had to comply with standards in terms of school uniform, behaviour and punctuality. They have had an opportunity to compose an online personal statement of why they would like to lead. They have faced an electoral college consisting of their peers in Years 10 and 11, the outgoing Prefects and the staff. They have been elected by their school community. They have had leadership training and been assigned specific roles. These representatives are ready for the tasks ahead.

We celebrate our founding as a school to prepare young men for tertiary study and as an institution that enlarges character through opportunities to pursue excellence. It has influenced character development through its culture of camaraderie. The young men being inducted are worthy bearers of the High traditions of leadership by example, across areas of school life. I offer my congratulations to them and remind them to preserve the best examples from the past while adding their own initiatives to the enhance the leadership culture of the school.

Occasional Address



50-year anniversary of leaving High for the year of 1973

Dr Jaggar, distinguished old boys and supporters, staff, and boys, it is with the greatest of pleasure, and a twinge of nervousness, that I stand here today, supported by my year mates, full of memories of our time here, and challenged by the task of saying a few words that might resonate with your experience of High in 2023.

The not-so-youngsters from the year of '73 share, what I expect, is your enthusiasm for being associated with High. As the years since we left have passed, our delight in proclaiming that we attended High, has not diminished – indeed I think it has grown. We continue to treasure the memories of our special moments at High, and we encourage you to rejoice in the special moments you are creating now; you will be able to use them long into the future. Since leaving High, I have done little public speaking, a moderate amount of medical lecturing and tutoring, and a lot of listening to others who were attempting to share their knowledge. In my younger years, I was pleased if I could remember three key messages from a talk; these days, one new concept, still clear a few weeks later, equates to the talk having been a valuable allocation of time. With that reality in mind, although cognisant of the intellectual capacity in this hall, I will keep my comments brief and focussed.

My question for today is: How can we be most effective? Most effective in our personal endeavours; most effective as leaders. The answer could have many facets, but I will offer just a few.

Determination is an obvious requirement; most important when the odds are stacked against us. Whether behind in a sporting competition, challenged by a disrupted study program, affected by illness, or distracted by family stresses, determination to elevate our efforts and remain focussed on the immediate task, will allow the best chance of a successful outcome.

Determination is mainly relevant to our personal success; but what about leadership? Particularly relevant today during this ceremony to acknowledge and celebrate a new cohort of leaders for High, but important throughout life. But I think it is only partly innate; there is a major learned component. NAIDOC Week Assembly

The Relieving Principal's Address

Good morning students, staff and especially to our special guest Mr Dub Leffler. Today we're here to celebrate NAIDOC Week, which officially runs during the holidays from 7th to 14th July across Australia. The first Sunday of July every year launches eight days celebrating the traditions, stories and ongoing achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. This allows Australians to continue learning about mankind's oldest, continuous living culture through interactions with their local indigenous communities. One of the highlights of the celebrations is the NAIDOC Week Awards Ceremony, which showcases the achievements of First Nations people.

Indigenous Australians have been active in their civil rights movement for over a century, drawing attention to the treatment and status of their communities through protests and petitions to the government of the day. Unfortunately, during the early and mid-20th century their efforts were largely dismissed by the nation's leaders. After the Australian Hall protest called the "Day of Mourning" on January 26, 1938 – marking 150 years of white occupation, these protests became an annual event from 1940-1955 on the Sunday before Australia Day.

Over the coming decades, it became clear that the nation needed more than simply protests, but also a celebration of Aboriginal culture. It was decided to do so through National Aborigines Day, held in July each year. In 1974 it was decided that this event should extend over a week's celebrations, a tradition which has carried through to today. In 1991, to provide the distinction of the Torres Strait Islander people, the National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC) was formed. While the term "Aborigines" is no longer an appropriate term to use regarding our first nations people, it remains within the title due to its historical use for the event.

Australia's indigenous people have struggled for many years to be recognised and have their grievances about the shameful treatment of their people heard. In 2017 the Uluru Statement from The Heart was established with three objectives, establishing a first nations voice in parliament, truth-telling about the impacts of colonisation on our indigenous people including historical massacres, the stolen generations and Aboriginal deaths in custody: with the third objective being the creation of a national treaty. It was hoped that these three actions would be a significant step towards reducing the disadvantages our indigenous



Australians face, including lower education levels and life expectancy, as well as higher incarceration rates.

In last year's referendum, a constitutional voice to parliament was unfortunately defeated. Despite this, we must continue to stand up for our first nations people and address underlying racism and ensure that the truth is told.

This year's NAIDOC theme is "Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud and Proud" to honour the vitality of our First Nations culture, despite all they have faced for over 236 years. Fire is a symbol of First Nations people's connection to the land, to Country and to each other over many generations and we must ensure that this connection is maintained into the future.

Here at High, we celebrate the nation's indigenous culture through our Na Ngara art collection in the McDonald wing, displaying a variety of works by indigenous Australians. We also have maintained our 20-year cultural exchange with Boggabilla Central School and their Kamilaroi families, which allows our students to connect with students from this remote town on the Queensland border through various activities and gain better awareness of indigenous culture.

Gentlemen, your generation will be the key to creating the fair and just society our indigenous people have pursued for far too long. Through better understanding of and connections with our first nations communities, we can learn from them about the lands we share and how to live sustainably into the future. This NAIDOC week let's look towards a future where we rightly recognise and celebrate our indigenous communities. Keep the fire burning!

World Pride Assembly

The Principal's Address

Special guests Victoria Ho and Vesper Lawrence, Equality mentor, Ms Stephens, students. Way back on June 28, 1969, New York police raided a gathering place for LGBTQIA+ people, the Stonewall Inn, in Greenwich Village. During the raid employees were arrested and quite a few of the patrons were roughed up. Instead of the passive compliance expected, police were surprised by the resistance of the patrons and onlookers. Five days of 'riots' ensued, before order was restored. Veterans of the raid call the event a 'rebellion.' Previously, between 1955 and 1967, there were six major protest uprisings in three states. Police raids and harassment were commonplace during the 1960s. Internationally, the month of June now includes a celebration of gay pride, in recognition of the pioneering protesters of the 1960s.

We have progressed as a society in the fifty-five years since these events. Equality is defended in law and by most organisations. We have moved away from fear and shame and can courageously affirm our identities in our homes and workplaces and social gatherings and expect common courtesy and respect from our contemporaries.

Wear it Purple is a homegrown celebration of diversity from a youth perspective. I wrote about this day in last week's High Notes. High has been involved in this event since its inception in 2010, at Burwood Girls High. As a school, we have tried to organise an annual assembly of affirmation of our corporate commitment to respecting diversity in ourselves and others.

Akif Kazi (SHS 2019) at the Wear it Purple Assembly on August 30 claimed that High's celebration of Wear it Purple Day "brought with it a greater acceptance of diversity, and tolerance". He commended Nelson Tang (SHS 2015) for his initiative in organising a basketball game between SBHS and SGHS. This became a tradition and came to include police officers from Surry Hills Notwithstanding our strides forward together, it is apparent that work still needs to be done, given the discrimination still faced today by the queer community on some occasions and by some social groups. Our hope is that young people will live their lives in high school free from discrimination due to their sexual orientation or identity. We can all be simultaneously strong and kind. We can all live the values that we agreed upon – showing each other respect in our relationships and compassion in our words and deeds.

We are a very diverse society at High – culturally, linguistically, socially and socio-economically. We share a common desire to maximise our potential in the academic, physical and emotional domains. Wear it Purple Day provides us with an opportunity to display our understanding and acceptance of difference.

At High we are fortunate to have an Equality Committee. For well over a decade, its office bearers and members have been striving to promote and support the notion of difference with dignity in our school community. Our Equality Committee reminds us of our better selves, acting as our collective social conscience, so that all in our school may work and play in peace and harmony. It works to nurture a culture of respectful relationships among our students. I commend the work of the Equality Committee in building respect for each other's rights to live and work without stress, harassment, bullying or vilification. I wish the newly appointed Leaders of the Committee good fortune in their service and hope that we celebrate equality on August 30 as a peaceful, inclusive learning community.





Leadership Assembly

The Relieving Principal's Address

Good morning students, staff, parents, and especially the outgoing prefects. Leadership is something essential for any group or organisation to run effectively and comes in many forms. Whether it's a large company, a small organisation or school activity group, the type of leadership evidenced highly influences the culture, actions taken and ultimately, the outcomes of the group.

Leadership as a concept has evolved significantly over time. While once a leader was considered an authoritarian who directly instructed others what to do, often using coercion and rewards to motivate those they led, effective leadership today requires a lot more nuance than the traditional role of just being a manager and now includes more compassion for all those they lead. It's true that there are times leaders must provide firm directions to those they work with, such as any non-negotiables that are a requirement of the job or when managing a crisis, but the most effective leaders only use this when necessary. An authoritative leader will usually start to rub those around them the wrong way over time, losing their respect and often end up having no one willing to be led. As they say, a leader without followers is just an individual going on a walk, so leaders must show they can motivate those around them.

What makes a great leader today? The vast majority share many of the same traits. Firstly, it's important to have a vision and develop the means and have the tenacity to get there. By having an end point to work towards, a group will be more motivated to work hard together as they can see the impact of what they hope to achieve. Think about your cocurricular programs and what you've set out to achieve this year. Whether it's putting on a musical performance where everyone is in sync, looking to improve the environmental footprint of the school, or looking to become premiers in your sporting competition, having a vision of where you want to be keeps you motivated when the going gets tough, and it's the role of the leaders in the group to keep the group on track.

Secondly, leaders must be trusted by those around them. When a group knows that their leader will be there to support them and do the right thing by them, they will be more motivated to push through any challenges as they believe it must be the right thing to do. Leaders need to inspire others to do what's required, even if this involves high levels of challenge as they know their leader will do right by them.



Having strong organisational skills is key to this as it ensure no stone is left unturned and all bumps in the road can be removed to make the journey easier to navigate.

Steve Jobs is a classic example of a leader who had a vision that others were able to trust in, allowing him to achieve what was thought unrealistic in his time. He first believed in everyone having their own computer in their home, before having their whole music library in their hand, then having a computer in your pocket with the same level of technology as the Apollo moon landing. Without the trust and belief of his team and removing the obstacles they faced he would never have achieved this.

Leaders must also be effective communicators. This not only involves what they say to others but even more importantly, showing effective listening skills. Clear twoway communication allows the group to gain multiple perspectives and adapt as needed while empowering the team by having a say in what's taking place. It's true that leaders are often extroverts who are very vocal and energetic, but many also quietly go about achieving their vision while clearly articulating their ideas. You see this every week in everything from Community Service groups, to SRC and sport, including coaches of varying styles. The more certainty there is within a group from effective communication, the easier everyone's job is.

So as we celebrate today the many student leaders in our school, whether they're prefects, sports captains or someone who shares their knowledge and experience in an academic area to support their peers, remember that you'll all lead some activity or group at one stage or another in your lives. The question is, will you be willing to do what's needed in the situation. As Rosalynn Carter, the writer, activist and wife of US President Jimmy Carter once said, "A leader takes people where they want to go. A great leader takes people where they don't necessarily want to go, but ought to be". I'd like to think that through what you're all learning in your time here at High, that you'll have the commitment and courage to do what's right, embodying our school values to leave a positive imprint from the tasks you undertake. If you're able to leave with a group in better shape than when you began, and can pass your knowledge and experience on to the next group to continue improving in the future, even when you're no longer there to support them. then you can consider your job as a leader as well done.

Thank you to all the teachers who coordinate the various leadership programs in the school, in particular Ms Rigby for MIC Prefects and congratulations to all students in your current leadership roles and I look forward to seeing you all thrive in the future.

Debating, Fencing, Rifle Shooting and Volleyball Assembly

Special guest Mr David Carter, parents, staff and students. Today it gives me great pleasure to address our second assembly celebrating our winter sports, along with our two oratory programs in the school.

One of the best aspects of Sydney High is the wide range of activities on offer for our students. No matter your personal traits or interests, there's something you'll find that will bring you connections with others, new skills, fun moments and many lasting memories. Each of these activities develop different skillsets but each also involves ongoing commitment, problem solving, communication, teamwork, creativity, and the ability to stay calm under pressure – skills essential for your futures. The five programs being celebrated today certainly embody this, despite doing so in highly different contexts.

Debating requires the ability to argue a point clearly and articulately with limited preparation time, bringing in multiple examples to support the case. Importantly, the perspective they're taking may not even be one they personally believe. This allows debaters to not only effectively argue a point, but also consider other perspectives, a skill critical for both problem solving and empathising with others.

Similarly, public speaking encourages confidence by developing an individual's oratory skills to communicate more effectively on a topic. This may be an area they have a deep understanding of, or something they knew very little about. The ability to structure and express ideas with eloquence is an asset in both oral and written form. Rifle Shooting requires an ability to stay calm and relaxed under pressure, with the slightest unplanned movement having a significant impact on the result. Laying in the prone position, breathing slowly to minimise any small movements, all while awaiting the perfect moment to literally "pull the trigger" is a challenging skill to develop, especially while exposed to the elements and the pressure building with each shot.

Volleyball players require quick reflexes, strength and agility. The need to work collectively to cover court space while looking for the slightest gaps to exploit in the opposition half requires quick thinking and teamwork that comes with countless hours of practice.

Similarly, fencers need lightning reflexes, often with a split second to make slight adjustments based on the movements of their opponent. A high level of fitness and strength is required for the short bursts of energy, while also necessitating precision.

While each of these five programs require subtly different skillsets, one thing in common is that all of them have had significant success over a number of years. This could not occur without the dedication of the many staff, coaches and parent volunteers involved. I'd like to thank the MICs: – Debating, Mr Viv Paul; Public Speaking, Ms Julie Eggleton; Volleyball, Mr Michael Kay; Rifle Shooting, Mr Daniel Comben; and Fencing, Mr Dat Huynh. Without the countless hours that each of these teachers put into the programs, the programs' many successes could not take place.

On a final note, as each of your teams head into the final stretch of your respective seasons, remember the wise words of the American author Helen Keller – "Optimism is the faith that leads to achievement. Nothing can be done without hope and confidence." So have faith in yourselves and know that your preparation has given you the tools needed for your success. I wish each of you the best of luck and look forward to celebrating your future successes with you.

Foundation Report from Chair

The Sydney High School Foundation Limited ABN 62 078 650 439 (Foundation) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. The Foundation is governed by a board of directors which includes representatives of the Parents and Citizens Association and the Old Boys Union. The board collaborates with the Principal of the School to provide support, facilities and resources for the School and its students. The Foundation is the trustee of, or manager of a number of charitable building, scholarship, library, support, sports facilities and Advancement and Endowment funds. Each of these funds provide support to the School and its students.

The Foundation owns the Outterside Centre (OC) educational facility and rowing sheds. In the last three years, the Foundation has completed substantial renovation and improvement works at the OC facilities.

The Foundation manages access by the School to the McKay playing fields and the Fairland Pavilion, in Centennial Park. The Foundation is engaged in matters relating to the funding, design and construction of substantial improvements to the Pavilion. The Foundation holds the interest of the School community in the Governor's Centre project, operates the School tennis court complex, the High Store, and manages accounts for the hire of the Great Hall, School grounds and the Covered Outdoor Leisure Area.

Each of the directors and officers of the Foundation is a volunteer and works tirelessly and unselfishly to ensure the sustainability and good governance of the Foundation.

The Foundation seeks the support of the School community to upgrade and expand the facilities available to our boys. Donations to the Sydney High School Foundation Advancement Fund ABN 79 912 054 332 are tax-deductible.

P and C Report

The Parents & Citizens (P&C) Association at Sydney Boys High School is a vital part of our school community. We bring parents and citizens together to support the school and create a strong network for sharing ideas and concerns. We provide a forum for discussing important issues with the School Principal, ensuring that parents have a voice in our children's education. We also organise events and activities that foster connections among parents, helping everyone feel more involved and engaged with the school community.

P&C meetings

P&C General Meetings take place every second Monday of the month. Online meetings remain the preferred option for parents, with attendance reaching up to 200 when popular topics are discussed. We host a series of parent workshops at each meeting to provide parents with the information they need to support their sons. Dr Jaggar and our teaching staff are invited to present on topics that are beneficial for enhancing our sons' learning and development, and this year, we also invited two current students and a recent graduate. The topics covered so far this year include:

- Dr Jaggar's presentation on "HSC Results"
- Head Teacher English, Mr Caputo, on "Introduction and how to improve English in the HSC"
- Q&A session involving Year 10, Year 12 and former SBHS students on study habits and challenges
- Cyber Safety
- Careers Adviser, Mr Cotton, on the HSC, ATAR and University Scholarships
- Resilience in our teens, organised by SBHS and SGHS executives

Collaboration and engagement

To keep parents informed about school activities and processes, the P&C continues to improve our communication methods. This includes creating WhatsApp groups for each year group (phasing out the WeChat groups used by older years) and subcommittees, sending emails about General Meetings and the AGM, and posting announcements on SZapp in relevant areas of interest.



In July, we launched the P&C WhatsApp Community to consolidate numerous parent chat groups into a single, unified channel. This means parents can now easily find and join the groups that are most relevant to their needs, without the hassle of managing multiple chat groups. Everything is now conveniently accessible in one place. Additionally, the WhatsApp Community provides a streamlined way for the P&C to send out public announcements and important updates to all parents. This ensures that everyone stays informed about upcoming events, key information, and any other relevant news.

Each year, the Sydney Boys High School P&C partners with the Sydney Girls High School P&C to organise a Joint Forum in June. We alternate hosting the event and selecting a topic that is relevant to both schools. This year, we hosted the forum, with "Resilience in our teens" as the topic chosen by the deputy principals of both schools.

Donations

At the start of each year, Dr Jaggar requests funding from the P&C for various school programs and facilities. This year, the success of the school canteen has enabled the P&C to generously donate \$85,000 to support the following initiatives:

- 1. Contribution towards bus replacements to assist with vehicle purchases
- 2. Contribution towards new Science textbooks
- 3. Expansion of marked car spaces
- 4. Grant to Rifle Committee for rapidly increased consumables
- 5. Support for Literacy Workshops
- 6. Grant to Cricket committee for hosting Five Highs Tournament
- 7. Grant to Industrial Arts for equipment repairs and replacement

Earlier this year, the P&C funded the installation of a new LED school sign on Cleveland Street. The old sign was obscured by the new fencing around the school, so this upgrade improves visibility and enhances the school's overall image. The sign is used for car parking events to improve signage and communicate announcements and messages to visitors and the community.

In May, the P&C donated \$68,000 toward the laptop programme for teachers, which is estimated to cost \$68,000 annually over three years. The new laptops will enable teachers to share screens instantly via the VIVI system and access applications such as Clipboard and the Canvas learning management system. These upgrades will enable our classrooms to support digital learning and provide students with the tools they need to learn effectively.





Parent volunteers and events

Volunteers are essential to the P&C's success and show incredible dedication. They assist at car parking events, P&Chosted morning and afternoon teas, welcome evenings, in the canteen, and throughout sports and co-curricular activities, including scoring at sporting events, attending overnight camps, preparing meals for our boys, and organising endof-season dinners. The dedication and commitment of the canteen volunteers have allowed us to offer delicious and nutritious food to our students and staff, while also playing a vital role in raising funds to support our school's initiatives.

On 14th November, 2023, the P&C hosted a morning tea during the Orientation and Enrolment Day for parents and students entering Years 7, 9, and 11 in 2024. Parents volunteered their time from 8:30 AM to 1:00 PM to assist with the event. They served refreshments and answered questions from our new families about installing SZapp, joining the parent WhatsApp group, and volunteering at the Canteen.

We kicked off the year with the SBHS P&C Welcome Evening on 6th February for new parents, held at the Governors Centre. The event featured excellent catering provided by the Sailing parents and students. Parent volunteers and student helpers from Sailing coordinated the food service for the evening.



On 12th September, we hosted a Morning Tea during the school's Open Day. Parents volunteered their time, donated delicious food, and contributed generously to our cash donation fund. On the day of the event, they engaged with visitors, shared information about our school, and served food to around 600 guests. The active involvement of our parents and their enthusiasm ensured that the event ran smoothly and made it enjoyable for everyone.

The P&C returned shortly after, on September 24th, to host the Year 12 Graduation afternoon tea. The enthusiasm of the parents was evident from the very beginning. They created a balloon arch that was a big hit with both students and parents, and included beautiful flower arrangements to brighten up the occasion.

Car parking events generate funds for sports and co-curricular activities at High. Over the past year, the number of sports and cultural events held at nearby venues has increased, creating more opportunities for our subcommittees to fundraise. A notable example was on February 10, when the SBHS Football subcommittee parked over 350 cars and raised more than \$9,000 during the P!NK concert. The total revenue from parking events this year is \$30,238.

The Canteen

The High Canteen proudly continues the tradition of staff, students and families working together to support the school. As a P&C operated canteen, all operating profits are returned to the school to fund specific projects for the benefit of all students. This year, the allocated projects benefiting from the \$85,000 contribution include:

- \$20,000 contribution towards future bus replacements;
- \$10,000 contribution towards new Science textbooks;
- \$17,500 contribution towards the expansion of marked car spaces;
- \$5,000 grant to the Rifle Committee for rapidly increased consumables;
- \$5,000 contribution to support Literacy Workshops;
- \$2,500 grant to Cricket Committee for hosting Five Highs Tournament;
- \$5,000 grant to Industrial Arts for equipment repairs and replacement; and
- \$20,000 contribution to the Student Support Fund held by Sydney High School Foundation.

This is possible due to the generosity and commitment of our parent volunteers, Prefects, SRC students, and our experienced Canteen staff.

The volunteers and prefects work together so effectively due to the excellent management of the Canteen by our managers Karen Barry and Eirini Kallia, together with casual assistants Yili Zhang, Mook Loo and Kylie Manias. On behalf of the school community, we would like to thank the Canteen staff for the time and energy they give to the Canteen, often going above and beyond to provide a varied, healthy and affordable menu for the students.

Our Canteen remains unique as it is a P&C operated canteen. Speaking to parents from other schools, there are often no Canteen facilities provided at all – or where one is available, these tend to be commercially operated. As such, our Canteen often hosts visits from other schools who seek advice in setting up their own internally operated canteen, or how to increase their healthy food offerings.

This year saw the launch of our lucky draw scheme, as a small, tangible way to express our gratitude to our dedicated volunteers. Held at the end of each term, the draw offers five \$10 vouchers as a token of appreciation. The initiative has been well-received, with many regular volunteers receiving vouchers for their sons. Thank you to Grace Guan (Canteen Volunteer Co-ordinator) for all her efforts in establishing this scheme and organising the lucky draw each term, as well as for her dedicated volunteer roster.

Our Canteen proudly showcased themed Special Days throughout the year, celebrating the rich cultural diversity and vibrant spirit of our school community. During Easter, Vivian Chen (Canteen Vice President) treated our boys to an exquisite menu featuring delightful chick-shaped buns, popcorn chicken and beef baos. The Mid-Autumn Festival brought its own charm with delectable bunny-shaped panfried pork buns, along with mango and cookie cream mochi. Our volunteer community continued to delight the boys with scrumptious specials, including Grandpa Guan's beloved spring onion pancakes and Jeetu's delicious, aromatic curries. Community Outreach – White Ribbon Day

At the core of our wellbeing initiatives is the understanding that healthy, happy students are more likely to engage fully in their education. Year 7 Tie Tying Competition

In 2024, the Sydney Boys High School Community Services Committee (CSC) orchestrated another successful year of engaging community service for our boys. In the leadership of executives Henry Shan (Chairman), Louie Zhang (Secretary), Ric Hou (Treasurer), Arthur Qiu (Publicity Officer), Thomas Cao (Events Coordinator), and Maurice Wong (Outreach Coordinator), under the guidance of Mr Ormsby (Coordinator). CSC raised \$24,009.37 in donations across numerous fundraisers through over 400 student volunteers.

The CSC continued our long relationship with Boggabilla Central School and Lak Saviya Foundation through two innovative mufti and bake sales, raising \$1933.12 and a record \$3491.00 respectively for the disadvantaged. We also raised \$1884.75 for the Sydney Children's Hospital, supporting their mission of helping sick children via a barbecue. Our termly external morning collections sponsored Salvation Army, Jeans for Genes, and Legacy Sydney, targeted across Martin Place, QVB, and Wynyard. Through active participation of our members, these donations totalled to \$7,678.20. Our partnerships with Central Sydney Intensive English School (CSIES) and Bourke Street Primary School (BSPS) also continued this year with 45 students volunteering to support students from refugee backgrounds (CSEIS) and sporting events (BSPS).

These achievements reflect the High Spirit and commitment of members, and I would like to thank the many volunteers who made this memorable year possible.

Led by our dedicated teacher, Ms Stephens, the PAWS committee passionately advocates for animal rights, raising awareness of animal cruelty and taking meaningful action through petition signing and letter writing to MPs.

Equality Conference

This year we held our much-anticipated Equality Conference in Term One. Being a Library Monitor

Chess Tournament

The Annual Junior Library Chess Tournament was held at the start of Term 3 this year. The Senior Library





As the teacher-librarian of the Senior Library at Sydney Boys High School in 2024, my role continues to evolve beyond traditional library management, with a focus on cultivating a reading culture within an academically selective environment. This year, in particular, has underscored the importance of balancing academic rigour with activities that support intellectual curiosity and personal development, such as reading for pleasure.

In a school where academic pressure is ever-present, many students have shared that they face challenges finding time to read outside of their assigned studies. They often express that their leisure reading is restricted by the demands of study and extracurricular activities. This sentiment is not unusual; some families, understandably focused on academic results, see reading for pleasure as a secondary activity. However, throughout 2024, we have made significant strides in addressing these concerns, fostering a renewed appreciation for reading across the student body.

One of the recurring themes in discussions with students this year has been the difficulty they face in reconciling the demands of study with their desire to read for enjoyment. Many students have spoken about their packed schedules, where extracurricular activities, exam preparation, and academic goals take precedence. Despite this, there has been a noticeable shift in attitude towards reading in the library. Borrowing rates have reached record levels, and more students than ever before are discovering that reading can enrich their academic journey rather than detract from it.

A key example of this is Year 12 student Ryan Wang, whose reflections during 2024 have resonated with many of his peers. Ryan has often spoken about how his early engagement with reading helped him develop a strong foundation in English, which ultimately contributed to his academic achievements. This year, Ryan shared his belief that regular reading outside of the classroom helped him enhance his writing skills, vocabulary, and overall fluency. He stressed that reading widely, beyond the curriculum, was a critical part of his success in the Higher School Certificate Advanced English course.

Ryan also highlighted how, earlier in his schooling, his Year 8 English teacher's decision to allocate class time for free reading was pivotal in deepening his appreciation for literature. This encouragement, combined with the diverse selection of books available in the Junior Library, supported his development as both a student and a thinker. In 2024, Ryan has spoken frequently about the impact of literature on his writing skills, particularly how exposure to well-written texts such as Hartley's The Go-Between and Westover's Educated has shaped his understanding of narrative and communication.

His journey is just one of many examples we've observed this year, reinforcing the belief that reading for pleasure is not merely an extracurricular activity but a key contributor to broader academic and personal success. Throughout 2024, we have seen more and more students engaging with literature in meaningful ways, which is encouraging in an environment where academic demands are high.

As we look to 2025, our mission remains clear: to continue fostering a reading culture that complements our students' academic ambitions. This year's successes have shown that reading for pleasure is not only compatible with high academic achievement but enhances it. By maintaining open lines of communication with families, offering supportive library programs, and promoting the lifelong benefits of reading, we aim to ensure that our students develop a love for literature that goes beyond the classroom.

Year Eight Camp

Year 8 camp is one of those experiences you won't forget for a long time. Although this may not have been the first camp our cohort embarked on, it's still safe to say that it brought upon both anxiety and excitement across the grade. There were many activities done at camp, and here's a brief overview of them.

Canoeing is a sport many people have probably heard of but haven't gotten to experience for themselves. During camp, we were briefed on basic safety rules before being promptly sent off into the water. Teams played games, such as one where they attempted to get a ball into the canoe of the coach. The activity was overall chaotic, being especially memorable due to several instances of capsizes occurring.

Another water activity at camp was called the Survivor Challenge, where two opposing teams had to utilize planks of wood to bridge across tires placed above a pond. Making any contact with the water meant restarting, and even if you got to the end, you needed to beat the coach in rock paper scissors to be considered safe. The intended solution was creative, challenging the critical thinking skills of team members.

To finish off the first day was Commando Night, where groups of ten set out in darkness in search of scattered pieces of brick. Individuals were only armed with flashlights, though they had to be careful not to make too much noise, as the teachers had the duty of hunting down as many students as they could.

One of the most noteworthy activities at camp was the Giant Swing, and I reckon you could guess what the activity was like just from hearing the name. Harnesses, helmets, and goggles were equipped before each person's turn as a safety precaution, and everyone who wasn't going had the responsibility of pulling a rope. This rope was attached to the harness, and when everyone released it, the person having a turn would soar meters above the air with incredible momentum. The experience was undeniably nerve wracking for some, but it was also definitely exciting.

Rock Climbing was another activity at camp, and this one is pretty self-explanatory as well. Prior to the activity, the instructor informed us about the belay team, whose duty was to ensure the safety of the climber. Through a safety demonstration, he walked us through the processes and precautions to ensure that everyone was safe. The activity may have been tamer than the Giant Swing, but the atmosphere was certainly still lively. Gully Crossing was an activity that required teamwork and creative thinking, where two teams had to use limited materials to not only cross a gully but also fill up a tube with water. These materials included a zipline, a rope, a bucket, or a flying fox, which refers to a suspended pulley on a cable, and not an actual flying fox. Teams were also allowed 1 runner to travel between the sides of the gully on foot, although the intended solution didn't even require one.

During Pioneering, the instructor detailed a story involving a fictional disease to set the scene, and two teams had to construct a stretcher and catapult out of planks of wood. The stretchers were considerably easier to construct than the catapults, which took a bit longer to complete. In the end though, they could functionally shoot tennis balls quite far away.

To end off the second day of camp was Games Night, which involved random challenges, trivia, and other similar activities. The environment was extremely hectic and energetic, though we were provided chocolate milk and cookies to help us calm down before bedtime.

Power Fan was another memorable activity at camp, and it involved climbing up a tall tower and walking off without holding onto anything. Miraculously, you just gracefully glide down to the ground rather than rapidly plummeting downwards. Although seemingly intimidating, most students found the climb to the top scarier than the actual jump.

High Ropes was an obstacle course involving platforms, tight pathways, and of course, a zipline. For safety purposes, each individual had hooks attached to the obstacle course, so that even if you fall, you'd be completely safe and easily able to get back on the course. A demonstration was done using two trees as we were shown "Connected" and "Useless" hooks, before we got turns of the actual obstacle course itself.

Year 8 camp had a total of eight activities spread out across three days, excluding two more night activities that were just as memorable as the rest. Although it had its ups and downs, this is a camp I probably won't forget about for a while.

Ask anyone participating and they'll tell you that the competition this year was arguably the toughest it's ever been. Joevs had the Australian captain. SHORE had the second best speaker on the Australian team and Grammar's entire side was in the state squad. What's more, Kings, Newington, Riverview and Scots had just had uncharacteristically good ISDA seasons, and we were just four lads, who, somewhere deep in our hearts, had the belief that we could get the job done. It was really a leap into the unknown. but we knew we had to give it our all, and that the results would sort themselves out. The first three rounds were relatively straightforward, as we defeated Newington. Kings and Scots, maintaining our perfect record in the GPS against these schools throughout our six years at High. However, round four was a huge step-up, as we were facing the two-time champions of the GPS, Joeys, who boasted state squad members and the Australian captain. Against all odds, we pulled through, asserting ourselves at the top of the leaderboard. Then, the week after, on a dubious motion, we were back to square one, losing to Riverview and with SHORE and Grammar to come in the following weeks. It appeared we had let the GPS narrowly slip from our grasp. But, in classic High fashion, we put it behind us, taking the fight to them and winning. Having beaten both Australian team members, we needed to defeat Grammar to at least become co-premiers. Since 2018, no High team has beaten Grammar, let alone in their territory. We knew it was about mentality. Believing that you are better than the opposition even when their accolades far surpass yours. And so, with that belief, we strode into the Grammar Great Hall to the thunderous applause of over a hundred High boys. We were a community, and they were just a school. It made all the difference. We broke the six year long drought, winning the GPS Premiership, and in the process, defeating basically every state squad member in the competition.
For their efforts, Patrick Nguyen and Luka Miletic were awarded with selections in the GPS combined Third Grade and Second Grade teams, respectively. Andrew Pye was selected to represent the CHS combined Second Grade team, while Liam Nottage and I represented the CHS First Grade team.

I would personally like to thank Ms Rigby, previous MIC of debating for her service and Mr Paul for doing a fantastic job taking over from her this year. Here at High, we boast the largest public school debating program in the state and it's always great to be reminded of that by Mr Paul before every debate commences. Thank you to Ms Harcourt for running the PDC program tirelessly; with it being online, its arguably more difficult to coordinate than some of the other in-person competitions and so her support has been invaluable. Thank you to Abrar, for mentoring me in both life and in my debating endeavours over these last two years. Your undying passion for debating was a constant reminder of why I signed up to participate in debating as a young, wide-eyed year 7 in 2019. To my mum and dad, for being my biggest supporters throughout this journey, even when you didn't know what would come out of it. I don't think I'll ever be able to fully express my gratitude.

Lastly, to the boys in First Grade, Liam, Patrick and Luka, I truly believed that the only reason we won is because we were a proper team, inseparable and with full faith in each other to get the job done. Never would I have imagined that such high achieving individuals of your calibre would put your trust in me when it mattered most, and for that I am eternally grateful. I guess that just is the beauty of this community.

Our Mock Trial team performed strongly against over two hundred other schools by finishing in the final thirty two. All but one of the members of the SBHS Mock Trial team for 2024 were brand new to the activity and had to attend many training sessions, work outside of school, and stay after school simply to participate. Well done to their efforts and dedication! High praise is to be given to our Mock Mediation team, however, who managed to score 99/100, an unprecedented result in SBHS history. They progressed to the semi-finals, but narrowly missed out on a place in the final.

For the first time, we held a Legal Debating Day for Year 9 students who had been unable to join the team this year. Twenty four boys were given the challenge of going from never having participated in Mock Mediation, to being assessed on their skills by the end of the day. In addition, students participated in a number of Model United Nations events and competitions. We are hoping that the interest shown in this during 2024 will allow us to expand the program next year.

I want to commend the tireless efforts of our coaches, Octavio and Nikolai whose efforts have been both essential and phenomenal. Chess

Following off the successes of previous years, the 2024 Chess Season saw dominant victories across all the age groups. It was pleasing to see that participation within the program was flourishing, with over thirty players competing to lead the school's legacy and fifty more attending the weekly chess lessons, as every player diligently hones their craft. While High consistently attracts the top names within NSW, a special thanks must be attributed to Head Coach and International Master, Mr Vladmir Feldman, and our dedicated MIC Ms Rowena Barr who oversees and organises the Chess Program. It was only through their guidance and support that the immense talent of our players could be showcased to their full potential.

To commence the season, a rigorous trial selected six teams of High's most ferocious players to compete in the Inter-School Metropolitan Secondary Schools Competition: Our Senior A team (Toby Huey, John Nguyen, Jason Guo, Kevin Liu and Tanish Sarathy), Senior B team (James Law, Clinton Wang, Henry Duong, Brandon Lee), Intermediate A team (Ouan Nguyen, Nestor Chan, Vedantik Bhattacharyva, Kayden Santoso, Aaron Huang and Lucas Zhang), Intermediate B team (Anay Gautam, Jinda Zhu, Jamie Jin, Mark Sharp and Alexander Howe), Junior A team (William Tran, Yashneil Lucknauth, Daniel Dai, Jerry Shao and Tenzin Lama), and finally our Junior B team (Eric Zeng, Derek He, Surya Thatavarthy, Krishna Soundapparaju and Louis Wang). All six teams saw success, emerging as Division Winners and progressing to the knockout phases. There, our Senior A and Intermediate A team advanced further to the Inter-Region Final, overcoming last round scares against Scots and Grammar respectively, while unfortunately, the Junior A team fell in the second round at the hands of a strong Sydney Grammar side. Ultimately, the Senior A team were defeated in the NSW final by Knox, a team full of State-level players. Nevertheless, our Intermediate A team regained lost glory, prevailing over Knox to come first in the State.

Our school's praiseworthy performance continued into the annual GPS competition, held on the 31st of August. Our top nine players were chosen: Quan Nguyen, Toby Huey, Nestor Chan, Aaron Huang, Kayden Santoso, Lucas Zhang, Gautam Anay and William Tran. As captain, I am pleased to announce that the SBHS team successfully defended the GPS Championship, defeating a competitive Grammar side to retain the glory for the second year in a row. A special mention is also due to Tanish Sarathy who came as a reserve and support for the team. We hope to defend the Cup in the coming years. Following this on the 8th of September, High competed for the Terrey Shaw Shield at the Shore School. Of the 111 participating teams, our Senior Team (Quan Nguyen, Toby Huey and Nestor Chan) emerged victorious, leapfrogging Sydney Grammar and North Sydney Boys in the last round to edge out a half point lead. Not to be overlooked, our Junior Team (Anay Gautam, William Tran and Daniel Dai) fought valiantly, placing equal 13th in the Junior Division. A special mention to Quan and Nestor for bailing me out after consecutive losses which nearly cost the Premiership. Overall, a massive congratulations to the mentioned boys for their honorary performance when facing tough competition from the top teams in the state.

On the 21st and 22nd of September, SBHS pitched our six strongest players (Quan Nguyen, Toby Huey, Nestor Chan, Aaron Huang, Vedantik Bhattacharyya and Kayden Santoso) to compete in the qualifiers for the Australian School Teams Chess Championship. Victory would grant the honour of representing NSW. Sadly, we were bested by Knox by two points on the final day, finishing second, ahead of James Ruse, Baulkham Hills, Sydney Tech and Sydney Grammar. As a team of mostly young players, individual performances by Kayden, who won all his games and Quan, who won all but one was extremely reassuring that we will be able to replicate past success in this event, which we last won in 2019.

At its heart, the game of chess is a celebration of endurance and wit. Sitting still for hours, while exchanging blows over a chess board is draining at times. Yet, to say that I am proud to have worn the school crest for the program since 2019 would be an understatement. It has been an absolute honour to have captained such successful teams in 2023 and 2024. To Ms Barr and Mr Feldman, who together have facilitated the great success of the Chess Program at High, it has been a joy to work with you for the last six years. To the younger ones, remember that regardless of all the shattering defeats one inevitably experiences, at the end of the day we always reset the board and fight another day.

Once more, thank you everyone for an amazing year and I am sure that the Chess Program will experience greater success in the future.

This year sees the continuation of our highly successful theatresports program. We have had tremendous fun both on and off the stage in coaching sessions. Often boys who are keen to choose elective drama in years 9 and 10 have had a couple of years of invaluable theatresports experience in years 7 and 8 prior to starting the course. Theatresports is competitive improvisation designed to enhance student creativity in a structured and fun environment. Small teams challenge themselves to create engaging and unscripted performances on the spot, developing drama skills such as stagecraft, comedic timing and vocal confidence. Our classes develop the boys' imaginations as they step outside themselves to create new characters in collaborative ways. Our players meet every week after school coached by Cameron Ryan and Nathaniel Jensen from Impro Australia.

This year we have had some of our best results so far. We competed in Impro Australia's Theatresports School Challenge competition and came equal 1st in Heat 1. This competition draws players from across Sydney and regional NSW involving 190 different school teams across four divisions. She rewinds the hours like an old film, pausing to gather the moments that remind her of goodness, then sets them down tenderly on new paper. She runs back old hours like film, pauses, and collects the ones that remind her of goodness before she lays them down gently on new paper. A memoir should begin with unspoken regret. Bringing the past to life under new light. A memoir is nothing more than silent introspection, as we dissect the syntax of what governs a life.

She sits in her bedroom, driving keys into her fingers until the stars are her only witness. She thought it was simple to fall into the hands of some unequivocally fateful force: understanding it for what it is. And yet, something within her chest churned when her mother had once said, "Why don't you make some friends, Izzy? Won't you get tired of coding?"

A few summers back, I still found myself being dragged by her into the same old museum. Despite being double my grandmother's height now, the wooden verandahs were still a sight for sore eves. The Museum of Teaware, nested in the park at the centre of the city's CBD, was still somehow sheltered from the winds of economic growth that had seemingly swept over every other part of Hong Kong. Its aged wooden tiles resembling the very ground on which the towering blue-tinted skyscrapers were erected upon. As I droned on with recitations of each and every exhibit plaque, my grandmother's playful squeeze on my arm hinted at our fair share of visits; her chuckle, a fond reminder of the times when I'd dash ahead, beckoning her to watch the koi swimming in the big teapot out by the gardens. Whilst the traditional pieces of teaware still continued to captivate her, the orderly rows of tea bag boxes on the shelves promised so much more: practicality and modern convenience at the small cost of authenticity.

With the advancements of the 21st century, it's tempting to compete with others to become more efficient, to become quicker. In a society where skyscrapers rise and fall with the mere snap of our fingers, it's easy to see how our lives are constantly propelled forward by the norms of instant gratification and multitasking. My grandmother's world is one without such motivation. A world fulfilled by the simple joys of conversation and reminiscence. One existing under the cover of a teapot, where time is not of the essence but instead at the mercy of leisurely tea ceremonies.

And yet, in this new age where highways stretch like veins across a city, everything seems to have improved beyond measure. What could have been lost? Simpler times. Slower times. In these times of difference, where are the neighbours that gather at their local tea shop? Where are their children that are playing area 2 (shuttlecock) on the nearby streets? Replaced. Substituted with disingenuous pleasantries as people rush from one place to another. It is the loss of this leisurely pace that can sometimes be revealed by the art of steeping a simple cup of tea.

Returning to grandmother's house, two sets of teaware were already laid out in the living room, inviting me to hours of leisurely tea sipping. A trap well executed. Yet, I was not to be fooled. Tossing a tea bag I had bought earlier into the cup, I was met with a gaze as potent as the rising steam. How there's a certain magic in waiting, in allowing time to work its alchemy on the leaves, transforming hot water into golden elixir. Just as we must patiently wait for the catechins to saturate, so too must we slow down in life to savour its richness.

Pouring water into the teapot again, she would use the underside of the tea lid to gently scrape away the foam formed on the water's surface. Placing the lid back onto the teapot, the infusion from the cup would be poured onto the pot, regulating the temperature of the teaware.

The lessons we can learn from each experience are reflected in its resulting reddish hue, a product of the timing of every step in the infusion of fragrances and flavours. The teacup, a simple vessel of storage, becomes a repository of our knowledge and experience. One that can only be accessible during times of slowing down.

As the tea leaves unfurl, she carefully selected only three cups, their arrangement mirroring the Chinese character 品 (temperament). Pouring the tea in a circular motion, each cup brewed a slightly different shade.

Receiving the tea from her pair of wrinkled hands, the rising steam momentarily obscured my vision of the present, immersing me back into a world of slow-paced afternoons reminiscent of soothing childhood naps. But what does it boil down to? Perhaps in times of tranquillity, there is still a sense of urgency in the tea, waiting to be poured before it turns bitter. Today, it breathed an aroma that invited me to savour and relish the flavours of life.

IM²C 2024

The International Mathematical Modelling Challenge (IM²C) is a new team-based mathematical competition for Australian secondary students.

Operating in teams, comprising up to four students from the same school, participants must work collaboratively to solve a problem (set globally) by devising and applying an original mathematical model.

Constrained to a period of five consecutive days, teams unpack the given problem, hypothesise, test, and develop a working solution, before preparing and submitting a report on their solution to the Australian judging panel.

In 2024 there were four teams under the guidance of Mr A. Wang. They were all successful participants.

National Mathematics Summer School (NMSS)

NMSS is a two-week residential school held each January at the Australian National University for mathematically gifted and talented senior high school students.

Selection is on the basis of mathematical achievement and potential. Mathematics competitions are a valuable source of information for selection, but nominations from students and teachers and other criteria are also used.

SCHOLTEN, Eric (Y11 2023) and LI, Ethan (Y11 2023) were selected by NMSS to attend in 2024.

Ethan LI – It's been about a day since I arrived back from NMSS. The past two weeks has definitely been a change of pace for me especially with how much work they set each day.

Behind the gruesome 8 hours of mathematics study we had to do daily was the rewarding free time we spent socialising and making new friends. The close connections I made at the camp was unforgettable. Looking back now, it feels extremely out of place not seeing my NMSS friends when I wake up in the morning. During the camp, I've always wanted to come back with how the enormous amounts of work I had to do. But now that I am back, there's this longing that the huge amount of work was worth it just so you could spend time with those friends. Be it the daily lectures, tutorials or problem sets, each and every activity encouraged us to form new connections and friendships in order to tackle difficult problems. NMSS was a place filled with hardworking students and students interested in mathematics. It was a place where I made many close friends and it was a place where I realised that tackling problems with friends is not actually painful. The 2 weeks of my life I spent at NMSS is something that I'll definitely remember for many years to come.

I have kept every problem set safe within my folder as well as my neatly (very surprising) taken lecture notes. PS If you are interested, I could scan my notes and problem sets and send them over.

Eric Scholten – I remember very well the moment my maths teacher suggested that I attend the National Mathematics Summer School – of all the things I could be doing over the long break, why should I do maths?



I could have been travelling, seeing family and friends, or even just taking a well-deserved break from a difficult year of school. However, my mother and father were also highly enthusiastic about my attendance at NMSS, and so despite my efforts to convince them otherwise, it looked like I was going to spend two weeks of my summer holiday doing maths.

Fast forward a few months, and my mother and I were sitting on a train headed for Central Station. Despite my mother's bubbling enthusiasm, I still wasn't convinced that this was the optimal use of my summer holiday. I hadn't felt much better as we arrived at the coach terminal at Central; the mix of not knowing many of the people surrounding me and my mother insisting that she would stay until I left made for a reasonably awkward start. As the bus left, I found little comfort knowing that this would be my home for the next two weeks, but I simply tried to look out the window in an attempt to ignore those thoughts.

My first opportunity to get to know a few other people came when we stopped at McDonalds on the way to Canberra. To break the silence, I started thinking of unique properties with every number I came across. Yet, it still felt like an overly nerdy first interaction – even for a maths camp! However, it was slightly more comforting to realise that everyone was basically in the same discomforting boat (and bus) as me. There were still a few mildly discomforting hellos to be said throughout the coming day, but realising that most people around me were also friendly chaps meant that my worries were subdued.

I found myself getting to know more friendly people each day throughout the next few days, and before I knew it, I was loving the camp way more than I had expected. From discovering the patterns that multiples of gaussian integers form, to trying to decode clicks, to figuring out how I was going to kill my target in assassins, it seemed that there were so many puzzles and activities which excited my brain. Indeed, there rarely seemed to be a time when I didn't have anything to do. I loved getting to know more and more people, and often it was little interactions and coincidences which led to some really strong friendships. Even when I had figured out clicks and got killed in assassins, I was still playing games, planning acts for the concerts and getting to know even more people.

Time flew by, and it wasn't long before I realised that we were going to part ways shortly. One look at the cities on the list of departures, and it occurred to me that we were all going to go back to very different parts of Australia in a matter of days. Of course, that hadn't stopped me from enjoying the camp in the little time that was left. After all, we were still all together. There wasn't any reason to be sad now. Eventually, the last day of the camp did come. The morning tutorial and lectures were amazingly presented (as usual), and we had lunch. I practised for a concert act during free time, and then we had dinner. Afterwards, I was treated to one of the best concerts I had ever been to - a whirlwind of plentiful laughs, great music, and extraordinary talents. After the concert, I decided to stay up for one last opportunity to socialise and talk to the people who I felt so strongly connected with at this point. As the first group of people started leaving for their early morning bus, tears started to form in the eyes of many of my friends. After we exchanged goodbyes, a sorrow also began to form within me. This strange mix of tiredness and emptiness stayed with me until it was my turn to say goodbye. At this point, I had also started to form the same tears my friends did when they were leaving. I knew very well that I was determined to see my friends again as soon as I could, and yet, it still felt like I was leaving such a great community of people.

This was definitely not the awkward nerd camp I had imagined when I was boarding the bus at Central. In fact, one could say that this was perhaps the best experience I have had in my life. I am writing this a few days after my departure from Canberra, and many of us are still exchanging numerous messages with each other. I've never had an opportunity to meet such likeminded people in my life before, and for that I'm forever grateful to the program.

I also realised during my mostly self-guided exploration of the subject that maths is far more than just answering questions in a test. Indeed, I felt that my interest in maths waned over my time at high school, as maths started to mean less about interest and fun, and more about marks and expectations. But what I forgot was that maths is really interesting if you strip away the marks and expectations to get a high rank, and it's such a shame that most people don't get to experience maths this way. Hopefully there will be a point in time when this realisation is seen by more people, but for the time being, I'm so glad I had the opportunity to see maths for what it really can be.

History

Ancient History

A small, engaged cohort completed the Ancient History Year 12 course this year. Studying the remains of Pompeii and Herculaneum, Spartan Society and the Persian Empire under Xerxes I and the conflict between Sparta and Athens the class found the subject interesting and academically challenging. We hope the boys do well in the HSC.

Modern History - Year 11 and 12

The Modern History course starts in Year 11 with a student choice of subjects – this year they chose to study the Origins of the Arab Israeli conflict as well as case studies on the American Civil War and the Fall of the Romanovs and World War I.

The Year 12 course moves on with Russia and the Soviet Union 1917-1941 as the National Study, the Conflict in Indochina 1954 to 1979, the Civil Rights Movement in the USA 1945 to 1968 and the core study, Power and Authority in the Modern World.





Studies of Religion 1 & 2U

The Studies of Religion course is an interesting examination of the religious expression and influences in our current world. In the course the students studied Buddhism, Christianity and Islam across two years, exploring the concept of beliefs, significant individuals, ethical conduct and significant practices. Through all these complex areas, we examine how and why religion has remained important in the lives of adherents even in our sceptical modern world. Classes in Year 12 are "off timetable" and often include breakfast to motivate the students!

History Extension

We had a small but dedicated History Extension class this year. Examining the question "what is history" we researched and read the writings of historians from Ancient to Post-Modern. The Historical Investigations also covered a wide range of times and topics: Charles I, the Republican Party, the Sinhalese-Tamil conflict in Sri Lanka, the Interwar Naval Treaty System and other interesting topics.

Stage 4 History - Years 7 and 8

Year 7 History students start with a unit on Investigating the Ancient World before studying Ancient Greece and Ancient China.

Year 8 students learn about Japan under the Shogun, the Vikings and the Mongol Expansion.

Stage 5 History

Year 9 students study the mandatory Stage 5 syllabus in one year: starting with the Industrial Revolution, moving on to the Making of Australia and Australians in World War I and World War II. Elective History in Year 10 start with a study of Ancient Rome, then learn about Medicine through the Ages. This is followed by a study of the Fall of Rome and the Golden Age of Islam before moving on to a school developed study of Conflict through the Ages.

The 2023 HSC results were very pleasing with the highest number of Band 6's achieved in Biology since the new syllabus. Ryan Woo and Peter Zhou both achieved State Ranks in Chemistry.

In term 1 Year 10, on excursion to Luna Park, studied the physics of roller coasters. They spent the day analysing speed of rotation and forces whilst they rode the Wild Mouse, experienced the Hair Raiser, and recovered their breath on the Ferris Wheel. Term 2 saw Year 9 travel to Narrabeen to conduct a field study on the rock platform. Year 8 celebrated Science Week with a trip to the Australian Museum and Royal Botanical Gardens as part of their Plants and Ecology unit. Year 7 visited Taronga Zoo and enjoyed the new Sahara exhibit as well as learning about Australian native animals to support their Classification topic.

In 2024 we had 54 students sit the Australian Junior Science Olympiads. This year the Junior Olympiads were split into Years 7 & 8 and Years 9 & 10. Our Year 7 students performed spectacularly with 3 students achieving a High Distinction. These students were Isaac Hu, Jackson Lai and Futeng Zhou. In Year 8, 8 students achieved a High Distinction: Tony Liu, Andrea Capuano, Thomas Li, Issac Wong, Vanya Pimenov, Rhys Chen, Benjamin Tao and Jason Van. In Year 10, Ryan Allen also achieved a High Distinction.

Excursions

Stage 6 Geography

On a very rainy 12th of August, the Year 11 Preliminary Geography class, accompanied by the Year 10 Accelerants went on a highly educational excursion to assist us with our Geographical Investigation assignment on sustainable urban renewal developments. Under the instruction of the wellprepared Mr Jackson (who was dripped out in wet weather gear, unlike the majority of us, despite instructions), we explored three different urban renewal sites with varying levels of success – Lewisham West, Leichhardt and the Tramsheds in Rozelle. These areas ranged from moderately active with the Tramsheds to downright depressing with the Italian Forum in Leichhardt. While the areas were lacking in entertainment, the activities were anything but. Students from both classes carried out fieldwork tasks to prepare themselves for their group assignments, ranging from surveying the public, creating detailed sketches, petting cats, and watching Mr Jackson equip wet weather pants from his inventory on this very rainy day, all resulting in an incredibly enjoyable day for all.

Cities are the most remarkable construction of human ingenuity. The zeitgeist of contemporary society revolves around the ability for great minds to get together in tight-knit spaces of innovation, creativity and development. However, in spite of the fact that many of us spend our entire lives within the bounds of cities, we still find ourselves being unfamiliar with the urban environments we reside in.

Earlier this year, the Year 12 geography classes at SBHS had the opportunity to venture through some of Sydney's hidden gems as part of our Geography excursion. This adventure complemented our study on the urban dynamics of Sydney, which is a major component of the HSC Geography syllabus. Our excursion began at Lewisham West light rail stop.



Adjacent to this station, you will find the old Mungo Scott Flour Mill, which has since been transformed into a transitoriented residential development. At this location, the students conducted field sketches while learning about the unique history of the flour mill. The next location we visited was the Italian Forum in Leichhardt. The Italian Forum was the bustling cultural hub of Leichhardt in the early 2000s. Today, it lies dormant, lacking the business and vitality it once had. At this location, we created our own maps to record information on the vacancy status of shops as well as make predictions about the future of this location based on current trends. The following location we visited was the Tramsheds



Shopping Centre in Forest Lodge. The former Rozelle Tram Depot was repurposed into a shopping centre as part of a revitalisation of the Harold Park district. At this location, we conducted interviews with local residents to gather their opinions on the positive and negative aspects of living in the neighbourhood. The final locations we visited were Chinatown and Darling Square. Though in close proximity, the character of the two settings are particularly different. The former is a cultural hub with numerous culinary options, while the latter is a redevelopment of a formerly derelict district. At this location, we conducted a transect to record the changes in street characteristics along a linear cross-section and made comparisons between the differences of the two locations.

At High, most learning takes place within the confines of the classroom, yet there is a lot to learn about the world around us by venturing outside of the classroom and into reality. I would especially like to thank our teacher, Mr Jackson – not only for organising the excursion and buying us emperor puffs to savour – but for all that you have taught us over the past two years. Your lessons have been particularly engaging and informative, and moments like this excursion will be remembered by your students for many years to come. For the outgoing Year 12s and Year 11 Accelerants, I wish you all the best in whatever pathways you venture towards, and I'm

confident that what you have learnt over the past two years will be invaluable in your future pursuits. Thank you for all the lifelong friendships and memories we formed together as budding geographers.

The Principal's Address

Special guest Mr Scott Lam, members of the Music Committee, participants in our Performance Music Program, staff, tutor, parents and students, welcome to our annual Music Awards Assembly. At this morning's assembly, we recognise and honour the accomplishments of our performance music program performers. Many of our students play in our performance music program, mastering a wide variety of instruments even though they came to the school as pianists in many cases. They join a variety of ensembles to perfect and perform a varied collection of compositions in a range of styles. High has produced many good musicians, some of whom will perform for you today. The purpose of the assembly is to honour those current students who are upholding that fine tradition. I congratulate those boys being acknowledged today and urge them to continue their efforts in musical training and performance.

I want to acknowledge and thank our performance music staff – Sarah Kim, Suzanna Lim and Peter Aoun. Thank you also to Merinda Kavich who has been Administrative Assistant for Music since 2019. Our music staff organise soirees, concerts, music camps, recitals, overseas tours and supply performers for our assemblies and special occasions, such as the Anzac Day marching band. I extend our appreciation to you for your work on behalf of the boys, much of which occurs outside of school hours. Specialist tutors provide expert mentoring for our aspiring musicians. The Music Committee raises funds to purchase large instruments and sheet music to refresh our performance repertoire. Our boys are given many opportunities to perform.

Our music performance program is a very large co-curricular activity. Music and musicians are integral to the many assemblies, formal occasions and special events that define and build our school culture.

Musical performance is integrated vertically at High and access to ensembles is based on merit. Performing in an ensemble is an activity that builds teamwork, self-confidence and social cohesion. More importantly, being in an ensemble provides opportunities for students to perform for an audience, which is one important reason why people learn to play instruments. Musical performance publicises the talents of our students to the wider community.

A genre of music is termed 'bluegrass'. It is named after Poa pretensis (a common grass referred to as Kentucky bluegrass because of the ubiquity of it in Kentucky). The music originated in the 1940s in the Appalachian Mountains in Kentucky Tennessee. in the United States, where many Scottish immigrants settled. The founding band was Bill Monroe and the Bluegrass Boys. The name for the musical style was not in common use until the late 1950s. Bluegrass is a derivative of 'old-time' string music but is played mainly on acoustic instruments - violin, five-string banjo, guitar, mandolin and upright bass. In Monroe's words it is "blues and jazz and has a high lonesome sound". It emphasizes the off-beat. In Western music double four time, the first beat of the bar is the strongest (the downbeat), while the second and fourth are the 'off-beats'. Notes are anticipated, creating the higher energy characteristic of the bluegrass genre. The tunes often form a narrative on the everyday lives of people who are eking out a living in modest circumstances. Like most musical genres bluegrass has evolved over the decades as it was appropriated by mainstream musicians.

Our special guest today is Mr Scott Lam, would you please give a warm High welcome to him. Scott began learning the piano in high school at the age of 15 and has studied in Australia, Hong Kong and Germany. He currently teaches at the University of NSW, Academy of Music and Performing Arts (AMPA), and Sydney Conservatorium of Music High School. Mr Lam is also a senior examiner of the Con Brio Online Music Exams. Many of his students have gained great success in competitions and eisteddfods with over \$7000 in prize money won this year. He received the prestigious award; the Teaching Shield, for outstanding private teacher in 2017 for the category – Pianoforte grade 7 to licentiate from the Australian Music Examinations Board (NSW), and in 2020, Scott established his pedagogy course; Active Thinking Piano Method in which he shares his experiences with piano teachers around the world. Please welcome to the stage, our guest speaker, Mr Scott Lam.

Guest Speaker Address



Dear Dr Jaggar, staff, parents and students, thank you for having me in the ceremony today. I would like to take this opportunity to share with you my story of becoming a piano teacher.

I was born in a non-musical family. We had a keyboard at home and sometimes I had melodies floating in my head and I would play them on the keyboard by ear. I don't think I was particularly musically gifted as I don't have perfect pitch and I couldn't sing in tune as a child, and I remember one time I got pulled out from my primary school's choir.

However, when I heard some beautiful music in movies and animation films, I felt really moved and I felt there was a power in music. I realised I wanted to have proper music lessons.

My first piano lesson took place when I was 15. At the time I had many classmates who started playing the piano when they were 5 or 6. It was rather stressful to think of becoming a professional musician when I was such a late starter. However, when you have found something that you are passionate about and you are willing to make the effort to make it work, you will make it work.

At the end of high school, I knew that I was going to choose between architectural design or music. Crazy enough I chose music. When I say it was a crazy idea, it was because many people might find it either unrealistic to make a career out of a music degree or music is not serious enough to qualify as a profession. Sometimes I do hear questions like, but what do you do during the day? What is your main job?

I think the question in my mind was, do I know what I want? And am I doing something that can help me get there.

For me, I knew I wanted to become a composer, but sadly it is a profession that requires a lot of experience and skills while the income is not promised. Not many people might appreciate my music, so I could not rely on it for a living. So, at that point I chose to become a private piano teacher. In that way I was still dealing with music, exploring new repertoire, and learning different compositional techniques in different styles.

Strangely enough even though I was a late starter at the piano, I found myself understand how to teach better because I remembered how I learned different concepts and techniques from a beginner's level and I knew how to help my students advance.

There are so many resources and masterclasses we can find on the internet these days, I feel that as long as I put in the effort, I get better at my job every day. It is a very competitive and challenging profession which keeps me motivated and I feel my expertise can continue growing as time goes by. On the other hand, I didn't forget my dream to compose. By teaching the piano, I am acquiring the musical knowledge and achieving financial freedom to allow me to compose the music I like. I recently completed a Master's degree in Composition.

I have been teaching Piano for over 20 years. I have helped over 30 students passed their AMus and LMus piano exams and was awarded the most outstanding private piano teacher for grade 7 to Licentiate from AMEB NSW. My students have won competitions with scholarships worth more than thousands of dollars. I guided some of my students to complete their Bachelor's and Master's degree in piano performance and I also travelled with them to Europe for piano masterclasses. I love my job.

Finally, I want to give a piece of advice to all the students here today. I hope you can take the opportunities to explore and find out what you are passionate about, look after your health so that you have the energy to put in a lot of hard work and make some big achievements in the area you have chosen. Your teachers and I are looking forward to seeing you excel in your field and successful in the profession you choose in the future.

2024 Music Program

This year's music program has been jam-packed with an abundance of performances and excursions held throughout the year with ever growing numbers in student involvement.

The year opened with our Music Recruitment evening, held online via ZOOM at the start of February for new Sydney Boys High students and parents.

On the 4th of March, elective music students in years 10-12 attended the 2023 Encore Concert held at the Sydney Opera House. Benjamin Pirom's HSC Extension Composition, Incognito, was performed live, featuring old boys; Jordan Chung on keyboard and Michael Walder on electric bass, along with our drum tutor Steve Lamante and Dave Bell on alto saxophone.

Our first school incursion was a visit by the Hot Potato Band in term one for a fun and engaging workshop. Our stage bands and chamber choir participated in rehearsals, culminating in an exciting final performance with the Hot Potato Band. Students gained confidence and thoroughly enjoyed the day, whilst developing their ensemble skills.

Towards the end of term one, the NSW Police Band visited the school to work with our Marching Band in preparation for the ANZAC Day March. The director of the Police Band; John Saunders, trained our Drum Major; Michael Li to lead the band under the directorship of Stuart Vandergraff. Over a hundred Sydney Boys High students marched together on Anzac Day, including the cadets. They were among many community and high school bands marching through the city in commemoration of the war veterans, which was broadcast live on the ABC. Our trumpet soloist; James Carmichael, reverently played the Last Post at our school Anzac Day Assembly in the last week of term 1.

The Symphony Orchestra performed at the Sydney Eisteddfod competition in the Premium Orchestra category in June and placed second under the directorship of Ms Suzanna Lim in their first public performance for the year. They performed two contrasting works; Kraus' Symphony in C Minor and Mozart's Flute Concerto in D Major with soloist Christopher Lau dazzling the audience with his highly virtuosic cadenza. The Piano Trio, consisting of year 11 students; Ryan Kirkland, Isaac Wang and Jason Yu, also competed in the Chamber Group category performing Smetana's Piano Trio in G Minor. Their performance was featured on 2MBS Fine Music station on the Class Act segment on the 31st of August. In the second last week of term 2, we held our Annual Music Camp at Stanwell Tops and Music Camp Concert in the Great Hall, with over 300 students from our Music Performance Program in attendance. Students rehearsed intensively over the 4 days with their ensemble directors, culminating in a magnificent Camp Concert upon returning to school. The highlight of the evening was the camp item finale, in which all the students performed the showstopping hit Defying Gravity, from the musical Wicked. It was a bittersweet occasion as we farewelled our wonderful Year 12 students and thanked them for their commitment and dedication to the Music Program over the many years.

In the second week of term 3, we held our HSC Showcase Performance in lieu of Illuminate. HSC elective music students performed their pieces in preparation for their music practical trial exams held the following week. Their hard work over the years ensured successful performances on the day. Following the showcase that week, students had their composition rehearsals with their accompanists and ensemble players, and recorded their works on Thursday 1st of August for their HSC submission. On the Friday 2nd of August, we took our Year 10 and Preliminary HSC music elective students to the MLC School (Burwood) for their Australian Music Day Composition workshop. Highly acclaimed composers and performers presented on the day including Nick Russoniello, Alex Pozniak with Nomad String Quartet, and Elena Kats Chernin. The students were given feedback on their creative work by artists from the Australian classical music industry; gaining confidence, motivation and a great opportunity to develop their compositional skills.

The Annual Sydney Boys High School Open Day was held on the 12th of September featuring performances by the Junior String Quartet (Roger He, Tony Roberts, Aidan Li and Barry Zhang), Senior String Quartet (Kevin Dong, Jimmy Li, Lucas Wang and Ryan Chai), and the Jazz Ensemble (James Carmichael, Andrew Dong, Ahyen Haque, Mekaeel Khan, Noah Pillemer and Bach Nguyen) entertaining prospective students and their families visiting the school. They performed a wide variety of pieces ranging from classical and to jazz standards whilst battling the windy weather but still managing to dazzle the audiences passing through.

What was your first day as a Griffin Ambassadors like?

To be completely frank, I was nervous in the days leading up to my first day. Since it was going to be a space in which I knew no one at all, I was anxious about so many things: arriving on time, not trying to embarrass myself in front of others, my own acting or playwriting skills and just in general, fitting in. But I guess that's the beauty of Griffin Ambassadors: the program encourages you to 'fail freely'. You do not get punished or shamed for your mistakes and that is how I felt on my first day. It was utterly enjoyable and alongside the classes, I met so many other outstanding people of different backgrounds and interests. The threehour session was divided into playwriting and acting and helped me develop concepts both foreign and familiar. For example, in playwriting, I was able to explore different ways of ideation for plays by writing simple prompts. In acting, I practised performing a scene with just THREE lines. We also learnt about how to breathe consciously, which on the surface, doesn't sound like much, but can really help you to focus and stay in the present moment.

As a 2024 Griffin Ambassador, what do you hope to achieve?

Being the first ever person from Sydney Boys High School to be chosen for this program, I hope to bring more attention to, and appreciation for, the subject of drama at our school, through sharing my rewarding experiences as a Griffin Ambassador. Many may feel drama is a field which is completely alien to them due to their 'lack' of acting experience. Having come from the same perspective myself, I am learning that drama is a space where you can feel completely comfortable in your own skin, perhaps more than anywhere else. It's fair to say that engaging in drama is like being part of a whole community of people who accept you for who you are. That is what I intend to do as an Ambassador: shift perceptions and promote drama as a worthwhile subject for many of you. If you're not convinced yet, watch out for our performances this year!

Year 10 Photography and Digital Media

I was a little apprehensive when I started Photography and Digital Media but within a week any scepticism I had was replaced by the enjoyment of exploring creativity. This was sparked by creating our first autobiographical film, based around school. I was quickly utilising skills we had recently learned, such as scene shots, storyboarding and editing our first film. I was proud to have created something with my mates that wasn't as restricted as we would feel in other subjects. We worked on our camera work with guidance from Ms Stewart and Ms Reemst. They helped us create our vision with techniques such as exposure and the rule of thirds. As our first term concluded in PDM, I realised that these subjects were more than something to be taken at face value, I had rekindled a creative flame, dulled down through the years of monotony.



Then came the storm. Term 2 was exam season and we were also assigned a task to create an autobiographical film. Through this task I learned to further appreciate film as an art medium and increase my confidence in showing our work. Year 10 Visual Design

Visual design incorporates the creativity of art utilitarianism. Everything is designed to suit a purpose, often using very artistic methods. As such, the Visual Design course at Sydney High teaches students how to incorporate the elements of design to appeal to a demographic with both its functional purposes and aesthetics.

We focussed on the Bauhaus and the theories of principles of Art & Design. The Bauhaus was a German Art movement concerned with capturing simplicity and beauty in function and design. Artworks are made with simple shapes and colour palettes, thus placing the onus on design principles to create interest and emphasis within the design. We used this art style to give the School Principles Posters a much needed revamp. This was a challenging task, looking at fonts and colours to convey emotions, rather than the large blocks of text. Our next project was to print a design onto a tote bag using natural textures. We took inspiration from Bundanon, where we truly felt in the wild, because there were no blinds, or internet or private bathrooms. We researched traditional printing methods such as Australian Indigenous artists in the Na Ngara collection as well as Bagh printing and implemented them into our lino printing techniques. The task encompassed all parts of the design process, first researching natural textures and traditional printing methods. Specifically, we looked at Hanks "Stop, There's No Need to Shoot the Natives" on how to create gradients and grays in lino printing. Then carved the lino print and printed onto the tote bag. Finally, we created a website to advertise our designs, an exercise in the reality of visual design and the imperative need to appeal to a demographic with our art.

Year 9 Visual Arts

Year 9 elective Visual Art is always a very focussed class. We zoom our lens to twentieth century art practice from Modernism to Post – Modernism but primarily looking at the abstraction.

The students began the year working on sculptures which re-purposed found materials. They came up with a range of appealing and quirky objects. We also studied artists whose practices exemplified the transformation of found materials.

As we experimented with more materials, students slowly gained more confidence with abstraction. They created a series of collages which could stand alone as thoughtfully composed paintings or could be used as studies for a larger work.

Our most significant artwork was to create a ceramic sculpture based on marine life, its flora and fauna. To move beyond the realistic drawn copy of something into a streamlined, abstracted form which captured the visual essence of a marine plant or animal proved to be a great challenge! These were larger scale, and structural and technical aspects were confronted. The resulting forms do fit the brief. All of the practical work is underpinned with the study of Australian and international artists. The major written piece examined the work of Robert Klippel and Alexander Calder, along with other greats of twentieth century sculpture including Barbara Hepworth, Margel Hinder and Marea Gazzard.

Currently students are responding to the theme for the Judy Cassab prize "Everybody has a Story." This realistic drawing will be abstracted to form the basis of their abstract painting. The principles of art and design will be investigated again to create a luminous work.

Design and Technology

Year 7

Year 7 students constructed a number of smaller projects to familiarise themselves with working with different tools and materials, namely wood and plastics. The main project this year was the construction of a personalised sliding lid box. Students also design and make an acrylic key ring / bag tag and a door stop. These designs are all drawn up technically by hand or using Computer Aided Drawing programs. With the laser technology machine, students are able to experience designing their key tag design on CAD programs and have it made with the laser cutting technology.

One land management practice is Fire-Stick Farming (Cultural Burning). Cultural burning, or "fire-stick farming," uses controlled fires to help plants and animals grow, manage wildlife, and prevent big wildfires by burning small areas of land at certain times.

Year 8 students designed and constructed one main project over the year, which was a personalised Desk Caddy to support their smart phone and other personal items; constructed out of solid timber, plywood, dowel and acrylic materials. This involved designing the unit from a project brief, drawing up the plans in the Fusion 360 CAD program, and constructing it in the practical rooms, using many hand tools and machinery. Students were also introduced to a new Engineering Unit – 'The Spaghetti Bridge Challenge'. In teams, they research, design, build and test their bridge's structural integrity.

Year 9

Year 9 students constructed a Toolbox: a challenging project developing a lot of skills with both machinery and hand tools. This project was newly introduced to the Year 9 program. Students hone their design and technical skills on CAD programs to draw up the technical and working drawings for the table. Students also have the opportunity to design a tabletop pattern, which can be produced with the laser cutting machine.

















Graphics Technology

Year 9

The study of Graphics Technology develops an understanding of the significance of graphical communication as a universal language and the techniques and technologies used to convey technical and non-technical ideas and information. Graphics Technology develops in students the ability to read, interpret and produce graphical presentations that communicate information using a variety of techniques and media.

This year, the year 9 and 10 Architectural and Engineering Drawing classes developed advanced Computer-Aided Design (CAD) skills in the Engineering Drawing unit with the integration of 3D printing. Students were also given the opportunity to explore their architectural designs using Virtual Reality technology in the Architectural Drawing unit.

















Year 10

Lego Project Brief – Students learn advanced Computer Aided Design (CAD) modelling skills, manufacturing and engineering principles with 3D printing by measuring up a chosen Lego part and modelling it accurately in CAD software (Autodesk Fusion 360). The CAD models are then 3D printed to test its accuracy against real Lego components. Students learn about advanced concepts such as tolerance stack up and how to dimension technical drawings for manufacturing to professional industry standards.















Year 10 Design and Technology

Year 10 students design and construct either a bedside table or Gameboard cabinet, which involves the design of a draws and shelves for storage. Students research existing furniture designs to be inspired, to design a unit to suit their own bedroom space, and work with standard ergonomics in furniture design. Designs are produced with the Fusion program and they use Excel spreadsheets to itemise and cost their project. Students have the option of using the laser cutting machine to design parts or surface engraving of their table tops or draws.

Game Design and Programming (Year 10)

The course of Game Design and Programming involves Students learning the fundamentals of programming using the programming language of GameMaker Studio 2. They learn how to analyse a design brief to the develop small and large games. The skills they learn throughout the year are then put to practice with a final major project, working in groups of two. This course, whilst challenging for the boys, is not all 'fun and games'. Students have a greater understanding of problem solving, algorithms, time management, teamwork and the social and medical implications of gaming on society.

Year 10 Robotics and Software Development and Computing Competitions

Robotics and Software Development aims to build the problem solving and computational thinking capabilities of students. The Python programming language provides a relatively easy learning curve for students to work through sets of increasingly challenging problems. Students learnt to write, debug and assess the quality of the solutions they developed.

For the first time, students undertook practical classbased tests that included live programming questions. This complemented the existing half-yearly and yearly computerbased exams. The exam format is modelled on the new HSC Software Engineering online exam to develop the confidence and fluency of our students in preparation for this relatively unfamiliar mode of assessment.

In the mechatronics component of the course, students developed an autonomous delivery robot using the RoboMaster EP Core platform.

This project required effective teamwork, planning and extensive problem solving. Students had freedom in how they worked towards the overarching goal and it was wonderful to see the diverse range of approaches that teams took as they tackled this task.

Our involvement in computer competitions provides a goal for students to work towards as they develop their skills. In the Computational and Algorithmic Thinking Competition, Joshua Li was awarded a prize. In the Advanced Stream of the National Computer Science School Challenge, students from High formed twenty five percent of the students listed on the leaderboard for Years 9 and 10. As a school, we had more students on this list than all states other than Victoria. It was fantastic that nine of our students achieved a perfect score. In the Australian Informatics Olympiad, Hamzah Ahmed, Sidney Bi and Joshua Li achieved a gold award.



Software Engineering (New Syllabus in 2024)

Year 11 project work

The new Software Engineering syllabus represents a significant overhaul of its predecessor course. It promotes a stronger alignment with the knowledge and technical skills covered in the early stages of tertiary computing courses. For the first time, students are completing all of their exams on computers with multimodal questions and Python programming tasks.

In the preliminary course, students have been building practical skills in mechatronics, programming fundamentals and the core concepts of object-oriented design. In the mechatronics project, students were tasked with designing, wiring up, and programming autonomous 'sumobot' robots using Arduinos. The learning areas from the preliminary course serve as the foundation for the HSC focal areas of secure software architecture, programming for the web and software automation. Students will produce a capstone software engineering project that draws upon these skill sets. The project will enable students to build technical, communication, project management, documentation, collaboration and design skills which will be highly valued in the industry.

Andrew Chen, Andrew Pye and Archie Wijaya from the Year 11 class achieved excellent results in the UNSW ProgComp this year. In the main round of the competition, they placed third out of two hundred and ten teams. In the grand final which included teams from Victoria and Western Australia, the team from Sydney High placed fourth overall.



Software Design and Development (last year of old syllabus)

Year 12 Major Projects

This year, students built on the skills they learnt in the Preliminary course to develop a major software product. Groups started the investigation and analysis stage in term 4, 2023 to then continue with the design and development of their program to meet the client's requirements. The major project is the backbone of the HSC course, and it is through this project work that students have the theory content of the course reinforced in a realistic development environment. This being the most rewarding aspect of the course.







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Year 12 Design and Technology

Major Projects

Enhanced Rugby Tee

Harry Xin sought to address the limitations of existing rugby tees as he noticed their poor performance in windy weather and uneven terrain. Through extensive research, testing and development, he has created an improved rugby kicking tee that out-performs the existing tees on the market in terms of ball stability during windy conditions and uneven terrain. His Rugby Origami Tee has the added benefit of being able to be flat packed for ease of transport and storage, reducing the environmental impact of shipping and storage. Furthermore, the product is fully recyclable as it is constructed from polypropylene sheet material.

Mutigenerational Living in Riverwood

With the current shortage of housing supply in Sydney, Alex Huang sought to address the need for medium density housing that could also cater for the aging population and the rise in multigenerational living arrangements for families. He has designed a block of terrace style homes to address this need, producing scaled site plan and floor plan models to communicate his design solution.

The Principal's Address



Special guest, Karl Kruszelnicki (SHS-2005), rowers of Head of the River crews, parents, students, teachers, welcome to our 2024 rowing assembly. We gather traditionally on the day before the big event to honour and congratulate our crews as they prepare for their stern test at the Head of the River regatta tomorrow.

I would like to congratulate MIC, Coaching Coordinator and Maintenance Manager, George Barris (SHS-2001) on his terrific dedication, organisation and inclusive approach to rowing administration, which has resulted in participation in record numbers. More boys will be a lot fitter going into winter sports as a result of a summer in rowing.

Well done to George and Steve Comninos (SHS-2013) for coaching the First VIII. Gordan Su (SHS-2018) managed the Second VIII and Daniel Xu (SHS-2016) trained the First IV. For the rest of the IVs (2-4) thank you to Gilbert Win (SHS-2021), Jack Smiles (SHS-2022), Etai Zemack (SHS-2022) and Jack Bowditch. Thanks to The Year 10 VIIIs coaches: Terry Fong (SHS-2014), Robert Yuan (SHS-2016), Adrian Wong (SHS-2021) and Jack Ralph (SHS-2018). Our Junior crews' training was overseen again by coach Marguerite Pain. Thank you, Marguerite. She was assisted this season by Kevin Chen (SHS-2021). The Year 8 quads were trained by Nelson Cheng (SHS-2022). Some coaches doubled up with the Year 10 VIIIs and junior crews.

I want to thank the staff who assist George to run the program – Joanna Chan, Vivian Paul, Con Barris and Rosa Brown. Thank you again to the Rowing Committee, particularly the President Binh Johnsun, for her ebullience, energy and organisational acumen. Well done to Dan Johnsun as Secretary and the highly involved team – particularly, Treasurer Niti Singh and Mohit Singh, Amy Liu, and Herman Wong.

This year's Head of the River results will be determined, in no small measure, by what individual members of the crew did to maintain strength and fitness in the winter months last year. The quantum of improvement over a season is around 25-35 seconds per 2000 metres. The two targets we set in 2001, namely the first target of the High boat's time being less than the winner's time +7.5-9.9% (primary goal), and then our time + 5.1-7.50% (secondary goal) are realistic, because they have been achieved by High boys – 42 and 28 times respectively. The tertiary goal is winner +5% (the margin of excellence) – a rare feat achieved only 8 times since 1999. The first VIII should aim to beat the historical average High 2k time of 6.26.

Twenty years ago, our rowing program had depth. In 2004, the First IV rowed into the history books with a 6th place and a 3.58% margin from the winner's time. It was the best row by a First IV since I began keeping the records from 1999. The crew was Jeremy James, Yaegan Doran, Karl Kruszelnicki, stroke Sen Mitsui, coxed by Tom Mittelheuser. The boys were forced out of the eights program due to missing training to go on the Himalayan expedition over the long break. Their performance upstaged the first VIII crew of Bryan Wrench, Ben Mitchell, Dominic Grimm, Troy Polis, Joshua Scharfegger, Mischa Steen, stroke Liam Bennett and cox Jason Tan. That crew contained some very strong rowers and finished with the fifth best comparative time this century, with a 6.36% margin over the winner's time. Their 6.10.31 elapsed time was the third fastest ever rowed by a first eight during my time at High. It was a great year. Let us hope this year is rewarding for our contemporary crews.

The big problem rowers face is pain - both physical and psychological. Muscles burn when you hit the pain barrier. Falling behind starts a voice in your head that says - 'this is too hard'. Your mental and physical efforts degrade. You stop pulling hard. You go through the motions. You resign vourself to a disappointing race. Collectively, if this happens, the boat slows dramatically. You eat more wash from other competitors and chase boats. You end up with a time much slower than the PB of the boat. How can we push past the pain barrier so this sequence of negative events does not happen or is at least minimised or mitigated? Employ mental techniques to distract your body. Break down challenges into manageable steps. Visualise getting to the next milestone - the 1000, the 1500, the finish line. Use positive self-talk - 'I have felt this before. I know I can survive and push through this.' 'Just concentrate on the next stroke. Make it a good one'. 'I will be proud of this row'.



Listen to the cadence of the coxswain asking for the strokes. Control your breathing. Endure.

I want to congratulate all the boys who have been selected to compete for High. You will become a part of a long tradition and your history will be written in our record books, as it was in 2004. Make your deeds something to be proud of in terms of your own goal setting. Good luck and give it your all out on the course right to the end, no matter what your position. Make your effort count. You owe it to yourself. your season of training and to all your comrades who shared the journey endured the pain and aspired to the same goal.

Captain of Boats Address



To rowers, pain is a familiar place. Over the course of a 2000m race they'll be subject to six to eight minutes of torture: the burning of the legs with every stroke, the desperate feeling in their lungs as they gasp for more air, and the internal, mental battle between will and doubt that's held in every rower's mind.

The beauty of these six, painful minutes is that the results are decided well before the first stroke. They're decided in the six months of training leading up to our final row: in the mental preparation and earnest devotion to every session. In that burning hunger for competition: a fixation, not on the destination, but the chase – the everlasting pursuit of greatness.

'The pursuit' is what's driven us for the past six months. The constant hunt for faster speeds and competition has steadily brewed behind the walls of the Outterside centre, with the First VIII rowing the fastest first regatta time by a High crew in seven years, and promising results across the entire program.

It was obvious at the start of the season that we had potential, but potential without development becomes disappointment; and, for parts of the season, we were painfully disappointed. After underperforming so many times, doubt starts to creep in and you wonder if it'll all be for waste.

But then you find it — that feeling — the ringing of the boat as it glides across the glassy surface of the water. Eight rowers transcending the limitations of the individual and moving as one. It's the moment you finally click and realise that it'll all come into fruition; all that pain, the sacrifice, the fights, the frustration, it'll all be worth it come race day.

So, to my rowers, I know it'll all be over soon; but remember that we've got a job to do first. With this being High's centenary season, we stand at a crossroads of destiny: either we achieve greatness or remain 'just another Sydney High crew'. So when you're 500 metres into tomorrow's race, when your legs feel like a wildfire that you just can't put out, when you're losing air with every breath you take, and when the voice of doubt is whispering venomously into your ear, saying to you "row light, don't pull as hard, save energy for the rest of the race"; tell me, promise me, that your answer will be "No." I will now present the First VIII for 2024.

Bow – **Dean Johnsun.** Dean's technical provess in the scull and his improvements on the erg have resulted in his selection into the eight.

Two – Jin Shim. Despite being an athletic weapon, what sets Jin apart is his mentality with his vocal presence in the crew, mixed with a burning passion for competition.

Four – Jake Matthews. Jake has quickly grown to become one of our best rowers through his astounding fitness and dedication to the sport.

Five – **Jacob Yin.** Jacob has held the best 2k in the sheds for years, he's been our best sculler for two years standing and has put up times which rivals those in the combined GPS eight.

Six – **Harry Xin.** Six seat is universally known as the engine room of the eight, and Harry is no exception as he levers the boat towards the finish line with tremendous power and technical proficiency.

Seven – Luc Tran. Luc epitomises consistency with his dedication to the program leading to steady improvements in both his fitness and technique.

THE RECORD 2024

The 2023-2024 sailing season started off with high expectations with the main goal of First Grade being to qualify for finals at the NSW Secondary Schools Teams Racing Championships. Our First-Grade team this year was composed of myself and skippers Neil Ghosh and James Pullinger as well as our respective crews. Having sailed with this exact team combination in the 2022 Second Grade team, the main goal coming into the season was to consolidate our racing skills and improve team communication.

How does team sailing work? Team sailing is a three-onthree race with each sailor getting a finishing position between first and sixth. To win, the cumulative total of all the positions on your team must be less than or equal to ten. To improve positions, mark traps are performed, which is when a leading boat performs a manoeuvre to attempt to improve the positions of his teammates. The performance at the start of the season was poor, with First Grade only able to secure one or two wins a week. This could be attributed to our poor boat handling and boat speed as well as poor communication in our mark traps. However, as the season progressed, we saw great improvements with more successful mark traps being performed and the overall speed of each boat increasing. By the end of the season, we were able to win 50% of our races each week which was much needed motivation for our state's competition.

This year our State Championships were held at the Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron in Kirribilli. The competition was held over three days and was in the format of a Swiss League. A Swiss League works by having the winners of each race compete against the winners of another race, with this continuing for as many rounds as possible. At the end of Day One First Grade secured two wins and two losses with Second Grade securing no wins and four losses. Albeit the average performances, spirits maintained high with realistic hopes of both teams improving their position. Day Two served as a more exciting day for racing with both teams being able to compete in seven rounds of races throughout the day. The day started off with a win against Canberra Girls Grammar School for First Grade increasing our hopes of a final's appearance. Unfortunately, this was followed by three consecutive losses to St Aloysius, Scots, and Riverview. At this point morale was low but we all knew there were still more races throughout the day. First Grade won the next two races against PLC and Redlands and had one final race against Wenona. This race was a must win to be considered for final's contention due to how many teams were currently tied at five wins. Unfortunately, First Grade were unable to secure the win ending Day Two with a record of five wins and six losses. The wind conditions for Day Three were extremely light meaning that the remaining rounds of the Swiss league were cancelled. As a result, First Grade ended the competition with five wins tying our record with eight other teams and placing us seventeenth out of twenty-four teams. Second Grade ended the competition with one win and ten losses placing them at twenty-fourth. The results of the competition were heartbreak for both teams, but we knew we had put in so much effort and tried our absolute hardest which was something to be proud of.

On behalf of the First Grade Sailing Team, I would like to thank Dr Jaggar, MIC Mr Cotton, the sailing parent's committee, coaches Hugo Leeming and Samuel Ezra as well as Woollahra Sailing Club for their continual support of the sailing program throughout the season and their efforts in ensuring that it has been run smoothly. Finally, I'd like to thank the sailors. Without you, there would be no sailing program. Thank you for all your efforts throughout the season and making every session fun and something that I would look forward to every week. Regardless of the disappointing finish at States, I will always value the memories we made along the way over any result. It has been an honour to be your sailing captain this season and I wish the best of luck to all the sailors returning next season.

GPS Swimming Leadership Function 2024

On Thursday the 8th of February, the AAGPS hosted its annual swimming leadership dinner at St Joseph's college. The dinner was attended by the GPS convenor, Executive Officer, MIC's of each school as well as each schools swimming Captains and Vice-Captains. Dr Kitching (Swimming Convenor) set the stage with a warm welcome to all the captains and reflected on the rich history of GPS swimming which had entered its 22nd premiership season. This was followed by a speech from each swimming captain. Our 2024 Captain Brian Ahn gave a speech which highlighted the lessons and skills swimming had given him, including the importance of discipline that is created by a strict training routine including early mornings diving into a cold pool. Our Vice-Captain Jasun Xu then assisted with picking lane draws for the season.

GPS Carnival One Significant Achievements:

Jiazi Chen: Jiazi dominated the individual 16 years Championship events, triumphing in the 50 free (25.69), 50 back (29.65), and 50 fly (27.17), setting new school GPS records in these three events. Jiazi also led-off the 4x100 Medley Relay with a remarkable 1:05.48 backstroke leg, establishing another school GPS record. To cap off his exceptional performance, he anchored the boys' 16 years 4x50 relay with a 24.81 split.

Ryan Chai: In the 14 years category, Ryan won both the 50 free division (28.60) and 50 fly division (31.68). More importantly, Ryan smashed his relay swims, lifting his effort for his teammates. As the backstroke lead-off in the 14 years 4x50 Medley relay, Ryan clocked an impressive 32.71, over a second faster than his individual swim. Supported by teammates Maksim Kireev, Kester Jan, and Felix Tran, all achieving faster times than their individual swims, the team secured a remarkable 1st place finish. Well done boys, an exceptional demonstration of HIGH spirit.

David Kim: David claimed victory in the 17 years 50m backstroke championship event with a remarkable time of 29.47, setting a new school GPS record. Additionally, he played a pivotal role in the 17 years 4x50 medley relay victory, alongside Cassiel Yun, Jinu Shin, and Jason Yu.

GPS Carnival Two Significant Achievements:

Maksim Kireev: Maksim is our first official qualifier for CIS, coming 3rd in the 400IM with a new PB time of 5:34.95. Maksim had an awesome swim and built through his race perfectly, executing his race plan. This swim earned the team 13 points, and has helped position our Juniors into 4th place. Excellent work Maksim! Kester Jan: Alongside Maksim, Kester also contributed significantly to our junior point score, coming in 5th in the juniors 200m freestyle with a time of 2:17.58, adding 9 points. Kester also won the 14 years 50m breaststroke by over 2 seconds in a PB time of 34.61. Congratulations Kester!

Jiazi Chen: Jiazi re-set his 50m freestyle school GPS record that he broke last week, with a blistering time of 24.86. He also set a new PB time in the 100 free of 54.62, breaking another school GPS record. To finish the night, Jiazi anchored the 4x50m freestyle relay with a huge swim of 24.40, yet again swimming faster than his individual time! Well done Jiazi.

GPS Carnival Three Significant Achievements:

Congratulations to the following boys who qualified for CIS: Maksim Kireev in another event, coming 2nd in the 400 free with a PB time of 4:45.81. Ryan Chai qualified 1st in the 100 back with a time of 1:09.53. Jiazi Chen 2nd 100 back with a time of 1:02.99. Kester Jan won the 100 breast with a PB time and National Time of 1:14.47.

First Grade Foil Fencing

2024 was one of Sydney High Foil's greatest seasons in history.

In the New South Wales Schools' Fencing League (NSWSFL), SBHS achieved second place overall. The U14 team consisting of Xavier Xie, William Tran, Issac Wong, Ian Huang, Rayyan Junaid, and Keiran Tedjasaputra, dominated the competition to claim first place. The U16 came second in their competition, succumbing only to Sydney Grammar. Competing in this team were Junior Captain Tom Ye, Benjamin Dang, Lyndon Chow, George Mermelas, Pranav Gupta, and Jeremy Yan. In the Under 19s category, our team—Andrew Wang, Henry Lin, Tony Guo, Daniel Kim, Joshua Wang, and myself—defeated Barker College and Wenona School but fell short of third place by one victory, finishing fourth. Individually, I managed to place third in total victories, with eleven victories and four defeats. Close behind was Andrew Wang, placing eighth with eight victories and seven defeats.

This year, we also competed in many state competitions hosted by the NSW Fencing Association (NSWFA). In the Roberta Nutt competition, we celebrated victories with Xavier Xie taking out the gold in the U14s and Benjamin Dang also winning the U16s age category. Other honourable mentions for the U14s competition include William Tran who came fifteenth and Ian Huang coming in twentieth. For the U16s, Tom Ye came in sixth place, Lyndon Chow in seventh, Pranav Gupta in tenth, and four other SBHS fencers ranked in the top half of the competitors. In the U18s Roberta Nutt Shield Competition, I placed fifth, getting knocked out in the round of eight. Andrew placed tenth and Henry ended up in fifteenth position. In the AJ Rae Team Competition, the U18 A-team won silver, losing against the formidable Grammar A with a score of twenty-five to forty-three. In the U16 competition, the A-team achieved a bronze medal.

We also entered the NSWFA School State Championships where we achieved notable results. In the individual competition, Ben Dang secured an impressive bronze medal. Other strong performances included myself in fifth place, Henry Lin in tenth, and Lyndon Chow in fifteenth. The U18 team consisting of Ben, Joshua, and myself, claimed a silver medal, again falling short against Grammar A. Meanwhile, the U16 A-team achieved a silver medal in their competition. The Intermediate A-team travelled to Melbourne, competing in the intermediate nationals competition and earning a silver medal. The crowning moment of the season occurred at the Australian Senior Schools Fencing Championships, as the First Grade Foil Team made history by winning the gold in both the individual and team events. In individuals, I placed eighth and Ben dominated the competition, winning the gold medal by defeating a nationally ranked fencer. Inspired by our earlier success, in the teams event, the first-grade team managed to stage an extraordinary comeback overcoming an 8-point deficit against strong favourites Grammar A's, to clinch the team gold medal with a score of forty-five to forty-two. This marks our first victory in this event in a quarter of a century having last won in 1999.

I cannot be any prouder of how this season has turned out for Sydney Boys High Foil. We achieved many high placings at state competitions and gold in both the Senior Schools' National Individual and Team competitions. There is no better way to wrap up both this season and my six years of fencing at High. I look forward to watching the program grow stronger and achieve even greater success in the coming years.

All our successes and victories are not only a result of our hard work, but also the efforts of those who supported us. Many thanks to Dr Jaggar and Ms Jackson, for their support of the fencing program. Coaches Kevin Chen, Marcus Nguyen, Lachlan Blair, Daniel Low and Chris Bell have been an integral part of the squad, providing their experience and keeping team morale high. A big thank you to the supervising teachers and volunteering parents, who give up their time to provide support for our fencers with their ongoing encouragement and providing ample supplies of refreshments and snacks. Finally, MIC Mr Huynh deserves the greatest praise, for his resolute dedication to this program, sacrificing his time and effort, especially in the daunting face of fatherhood, to ensure everything runs smoothly.

First Grade Sabre

The 2024 sabre season has been one of, if not the most, successful in recent history. Sabre fencers displayed incredible depth and breadth, with fencers from all year groups frequently competing and performing with excellence. Both team and individual competitions were approached with equal determination, with High consistently winning gold, while supporting and encouraging each other consistently. While our results were incredible, the pinnacle of the season was the growth of every single member of the program. Confidence and comfort in competition, significant physical and tactical improvements, and a stronger sense of community emerged amongst the teams and, broadly, amongst all fencers.

Now, the results: In the U18 Roberta Nutt Mixed Sabre competition, High secured Gold and both Bronze medals. In the U16 Roberta Nutt Mixed Sabre competition, High claimed Gold, Silver, and both Bronze medals. In the U14 Roberta Nutt Mixed Sabre competition, High took Bronze. This marked the start of a pattern.

At the AJ Rae U18 Teams event, High won Gold and Silver. In the AJ Rae U16 Teams event, High secured Gold and Bronze. The pattern was becoming clearer.

In the NSWFA School Championships U18, High won Gold. In the U16 category, High won Gold, Silver, and both Bronze medals. In the U14 competition, High secured both Bronze medals.

These results bolstered our confidence as we moved into the first national competition of the season: the Australian Schools Intermediate Fencing Championships. Our junior fencers travelled to Melbourne to represent the school, performing at an incredible level against high-calibre opponents. Under pressure, we excelled, winning Silver and Bronze for the school. Returning with heavy medals and high spirits, inspiring and encouraging the senior fencers in the program.

These successes were a precursor to the Australian Senior Schools Championships, consisting of two competitions for sabre: the individual and team events. In the individual competition, our fencers coached, cheered, filmed, and supported each other in every way possible. High fencers closed in on the podium— we made it. High monopolised the podium, winning Gold, Silver, and equal Bronze in one of the most dominant performances in the history of schools fencing and Sydney Boys. In the team competition, we retained this excellence. The second-grade team achieved an upset victory against Cranbrook with a mammoth effort from anchor Mahesh Karki, who scored 23 of the team's 45 points. First grade and second grade competed for Gold, with an engaging match leading to a first-grade victory. High dominated the team podium, winning Gold and Silver.

Our final competition was the NSWFA U16 and U18 School Team Championships. By now, we hope you can guess the result: in the U18 category, High won Gold, Silver, and Bronze. In the U16s, High won Gold and Silver, an apt conclusion to our competitive season.

In summary, we won every competition in the U16 to U18 age groups, with a consistent podium finish in U14s. The season produced ten Golds, seven Silvers, and thirteen Bronze medals, making this one of the most successful sabre seasons in High fencing history.

Beyond the competition results, our fencing program was proud to host the inaugural Sydney Boys and Newington friendly. This event facilitates early competition for Year 7s, fostering both growth and a love for the sport, helping to solidify the High fencing program across all age groups. Additionally, two of our sabre fencers received sportsmanship awards over the course of the season, a testament to the environment we strive to foster throughout the program.

This is my first year in the sabre program and at Sydney Boys. From the very first competition, I was struck by the immediate inclusiveness – people greeted me, said they were happy to have me in the program without having met me before. They offered advice, cheered, and we celebrated victories together. I believe my initial experience encapsulates the essence of this program: an environment fostered over years of hard work by our MIC Mr Huynh, the coaches, and students who love fencing, exemplify sportsmanship, and work as a collective, never excluding anyone.

So many moving parts help this program operate, excel and can be attributed to its success. It is hard to give credit and properly express due gratitude without many effusive paragraphs. However, in summary, parents, thank you for your unwavering encouragement, belief in us all, catering excellence and photography. Coaches, Leo Kershaw Kostic and Isobel Roberts, thank you for your undeserved patience and desire for excellence. First Grade Épée

This 2024 fencing season was punctuated by teamwork and success.

The season started strong, competing in the NSW Fencing Association (NSWFA) AJ Rae Team Championships. The U18 Team B consisting of Jamison Lai, Ben Wu, Vihaan Rajit, and Lucas Wang were able to take a strong third, while the U18 Team A consisting of Tommy Xu, Xavier Perry, Hudson Cai, and Daniel Zhu were able to storm the competition, taking the first gold of the season. Following this, we competed in the NSWFA Roberta Nutt competition, with Tommy Xu winning bronze in the U18 category, Xavier Perry winning gold, Daniel Zhu winning silver, and Benjamin Wu winning bronze in the U16 category, and Akiese Bravo de Rosa wining bronze. With our cumulative efforts, we were able to win both the Roberta Nutt and the AJ Rae shields.

Following our success at NSWFA competitions, the squad pivoted their focus towards NSW Fencing League (NSWFL) competitions, beginning with the individual events. Tommy Xu comfortably won gold in the U19 category. Xavier Perry won gold, with Daniel Zhu and Vihaan Rajit winning equal bronze in the U16 category, with Daxton Sor and Luke McLoughlin also winning equal bronze in the U14 category. With this success, the teams were able to continue the momentum into the teams' events, with the U19 Team consisting of Xavier Perry, Tommy Xu, and Jamison Lai winning silver and the U16 Team A consisting of Hudson Cai, Daniel Zhu, Ben Wu, and Vihaan Rajit winning gold. Meanwhile, the U14 Team A consisting of William Huang, Alexander Howe, Daxton Sor, and Bill Han were able to confidently win gold, leading the U14 Team B consisting of Oscar Li, Luke McLoughlin, Akiese Bravo de Rosa, and Kay Minh Nguyen to bronze. With this success, we were able to take the overall NSWFL championship for another year in a row.

With our success at the state level, the squad was ready to take their skills to the national level, beginning with the juniors. This year, one intermediate and two senior teams competed in the Australian Schools Fencing Championships. This is the highlight of the season for all fencers, and hopes were high going into the competition. On the intermediate side, a team of Daniel Zhu, Alexander Howe, Luke McLoughlin, and William Huang were itching to compete, and was the first national competition for three of the four fencers on the team. Following a difficult individual event, the team was itching to compete together. In the teams event, the team faced stiff competition from Brisbane Grammar, but were able to win forty-five to forty-two, and take home gold. On the senior side, Team A consisted of Tommy Xu, Hudson Cai, Xavier Perry, and Jamison Lai, while Team B consisted of Daniel Zhu, Benjamin Wu, Vihaan Rajit, and Lucas Wang.
