Interpreting Year 9 Reports – Semester 1

By Friday, June 13, all Year 9 boys should have seen me to get their reports. Parents should be aware that students have fewer compulsory subjects in Year 9: English, mathematics, science, history, geography and PDHPE. They have added two electives to the core group of subjects having completed compulsory music, visual arts and technology. All of the stage 5 requirements for history and geography are completed in Year 9, so there is plenty of content and many skills to learn. This also means that students in history and geography may receive 'warning letters' for missing assigned tasks necessary for the completion of stage 5 compulsory subjects. The cut-off points standard for Year 9 is 24 (or 8 subjects at credit). Parents are cautioned that large fluctuations in points earned and rankings in the cohort can be caused by a few marks more or less at the cut-off scores for HDs, Ds or credits. An influx of 30 new students into the cohort has an immediate impact on rankings, enlarging the rank order swings. Also, all the Ds could be near to the top, just below the cut-off mark for a HD. Sometimes, boys deliberately underperformed last year in subjects they knew they did not have to continue. This would cause a recovery in their rank this year if they tried harder in the subjects they chose this year. Conversely, the additional challenge of stage 5 work or a mistaken elective choice, could impact on a student's ranking negatively, particularly if he were good at the practical subjects in Year 8. In Year 9 students are expected to be developing some autonomy. They should be responsible for managing their personal workload and thinking ahead about what commitments they have in the near future. Ask to look at their personal organiser - electronic or paper, to see how well they are managing their time. Their weeks should be planned in advance, not only to ensure that tasks and activities are not omitted, but also to fit in with family, social and leisure activities scheduled for that week. Parents are asked to discuss their son's learning behaviours profile and the teachers' next steps recommendations for areas for improvement. We need teachers and families to work together to build boundaries around our boys - both side lines and goal lines - to focus behaviour and inspire maximal personal achievement.

Student Leave Requests – Reminder

There is a Department of Education and school policy on Student Leave of Absence - Extended Leave Travel requests. This applies to leave that is five school days or more in duration. Parents are reminded that as a matter of policy leave may not be processed or approved unless four weeks' notice has been given. Also, cogent reasons for travelling during school term need to be supplied. No travel should be booked during the assessment or examination blocks affecting your son. The effect of this decision is that all leave requests that involve that last four weeks of term should have been lodged with me for approval by the end of week 6, each term. If you are planning to travel during the school term you need to download, complete and submit the form for my approval by the closing date. NB Week 7 is this week!

The following is information on all parent-teacher nights this year. Please note that for the day of all parent-teacher interviews, periods will be shortened, with the school day finishing early. **Boys from <u>all</u>** <u>years</u> will be dismissed from school at start of **lunchtime on each of the dates listed below.** The light rail will run to normal schedules and there will be minimal supervision in the Junior Quad of boys waiting for any services.

Booking interviews with your son's Teachers We use a web based electronic scheduling system for arranging interviews. This produces better results for all participants, especially more compact time schedules for both parents and teachers. The system works as follows:

N.B. The following dates are for <u>Year 7 parents</u> only. Parents of boys in <u>all other years</u> will receive their codes via email in term 2 in the lead up to each evening. Notification of these emails will be placed in High Notes next term.

By **6pm Wednesday 11 June**, **all parents of boys in** <u>Year 7</u> will be sent details of the scheduling system and a unique code to be entered via email. This scheduling email will be sent to the main family email address currently held by the school for **all Year 7 students**. If you have not received this email by the morning of **Thursday 12 June**, please check your junk mail or any alternative email addresses provided to the school by either parent.

N.B. The office regularly receives queries about undelivered parent-teacher emails when the email was in their junk mail. Please check there before contacting the school.

If your email address has changed from what had been previously advised, you should notify the school at <u>office@sbhs.nsw.edu.au</u>. Please indicate your son's name and roll call class (or date of birth) so that the information can be forwarded to you.

Following the instructions in the email, on the Edval website you will see your son's teachers listed and you will be able to select those with whom you require an interview (if you hover over a teacher's name, the subject involved will be shown). At the same time, you can indicate your availability between **2:00pm and 6:00pm**. You should provide this information by 9am on Wednesday 19 June.

The overall schedule will be generated by the school and your individual schedule should be available for you to **download and print from 6pm on Thursday 20 June**.

Interviews should not exceed five minutes' duration. If there is insufficient time, a further appointment may be arranged for a later date.

Recent Updates

Legal Debating at Sydney Boys is led by MIC Ms Stephens and encompasses a wide range of cocurricular activities such as Mock Mediation, Mock Trial and Model United Nations.

SBHS has a distinguished history of success in legal debating competitions, with the Mock Mediation Team reaching the semifinals in 2024 and students competing the prestigious Harvard Model United Nations - John Fang, winning Best Delegate in 2024.

Recently, the Mock Mediation Team, led by our Coach, Nikolai, achieved an exceptional score of 83 out of 100 in Round 1 of the Mock Mediation Competition. Furthermore, in Mock Trial, the Team secured a narrow yet impressive victory of 198 to 197 against The Kings School in Round 2.

Congratulations to both the Mock Mediation and Mock Trial Team for their outstanding efforts and successes as well as coaches Nikolai Shchekochikhin and Octavio Carabajal Zapata for their support and expertise.

In Model United Nations news, the Legal Debating program launched a new MUN Team in 2025. Last week, students from the Team had the opportunity to attend two events. Ryan Park 10T

UNSW MUN Excursion Model United Nations is an activity where students represent different countries in the United Nations and

represent different countries in the United Nations and work together to solve global issues.

On Tuesday 27 May, members of the Legal Debating Program attended a Model United Nation event held at UNSW. This excursion involved schools such as Sydney Technical High School, James Ruse Agricultural High School and Punchbowl Boys High School.

This event started off with an Opening Ceremony, where we were treated to the visit and words of former Prime Minister of Australia, Malcom Turnbull, who spoke about the importance of international organizations like the United Nations in promoting peace, especially during these challenging times of global conflict.



After the opening ceremony, schools were divided into rooms, where we met students from Sydney Technical High School, our Chair Minh Son Nguygen - Old Boy 2022 and other UNSW Mentors. In this room, the topic of unsustainable mining practices was discussed.

In the discussion of this topic, moderated and unmoderated caucuses were held, where there were debates about the importance of ethical and environmentally friendly mining practices and foreign financial aid to countries such as Bolivia and the Democratic Republic of Congo. Many key issues were raised in these caucuses, the delegate of India - Aarav Shah - raising concerns of the lack of transparency in recent partnerships between Bolivia and Russian mining companies and Bolivia. Vivaan Wadwha suggested the possibility of receiving foreign aid in exchange for a particular trade deal.

After lunch, under the guidance and support of our UNSW mentors, several draft resolutions were formulated and put to a vote. The first resolution was presented by the Delegate of France - Ryan Park, the Delegate of Congo - Akshobya Kumar, and the Delegate of Australia - Sajan Thiagalingam. This resolution emphasized the importance of increasing domestically owned mining operations and called for greater transparency in agreements with foreign nations, particularly those involving financial and technological assistance. This resolution was successfully adopted following the passage of a motion to suspend veto powers. Subsequently, SBHS delegates Jack Nguyen and Sami Rashid, representing the United Kingdom, proposed a resolution encouraging the European Union to take a leading role in coordinating financial aid. Unfortunately, this resolution did not pass.



Finally, the day ended with a closing ceremony where we were addressed by the Labor Member for Reid, Sally Sitou, and awards for the best delegate and diplomat were presented. Congratulations go to the award winners: Akshobya Kumar, Ryan Park, Jack Nguyen and Sami Rashid.

Commendations go to all participants who contributed to discussions marked by insight, diplomacy, and a high standard of professionalism. Furthermore, we thank UNSW for creating and organizing a very wellstructured and enriching experience that allowed students to develop key diplomatic and collaborative skills. Finally, we extend our sincere gratitude to our Legal Debating MIC, Ms Stephens, whose constant commitment and support is instrumental in making experiences like this both successful and meaningful.

On our excursion to UNSW DiscoverMUN, we met our Chair for the day, Minh Son Nguyen, who happened to be an SBHS Old Boy (2022). We decided to conduct a short interview with him about his experience at High and the benefits of Model United Nations.



Please Describe Yourself?

I am currently studying Law and Finance at UNSW and am passionate about global affairs (economics, business, politics, modern history) and sports (football, cricket). I started my schooling in Vietnam, learning to write in cursive, using fountain pens and being reprimanded if my handwriting smudged. By Year 12 everything could be done on computers. I barely had to touch a scrap of paper outside the exam hall, so I can relate to many generations.

How was Your Experience at SBHS?

I attended Sydney Boys High from 2017 to 2022 and was involved in a range of activities, from school bands to a rotating mix of sports including tennis, cross country, cricket, athletics, and table tennis, making many friends whose bonds have only grown stronger as we entered university and adulthood together.

How did you first get involved in MUN, and what kept you coming back?

Honestly, I happened upon it at university because I met people with similar interests and thought Model UN would be a great way to channel it. Turns out, not only is it fun, but you also access ludicrous opportunities to travel and meet high level people. I am

headed to New York for a MUN in July. I previously went to Canberra, and NSW Parliament in 2024.

What are some of the most valuable skills MUN has helped you develop?

MUN sharpened my research, public speaking, and strategic thinking. It teaches you how to understand the perspectives of others, build alliances, and lead with persuasive rhetoric. You roleplay countries, negotiate like diplomats, and build genuine relationships, even with highly accomplished professionals. These are skills you carry into every corner of life.

What advice would you give to someone attending their first MUN Conference?

Have fun! If you know a lot, this is the place to pour it all out among a crowd of intelligent yet welcoming, supportive people. The facilitators will teach you everything you need, in a zero-judgment environment. Speeches are not always eloquent, people pause and stumble at times, this is perfectly normal, and really, if you do not remember people's errors, they certainly will not remember yours.

How would you encourage Students at High to get involved in the Legal Debating program and MUN?

You do not have to love public speaking. I am an introvert who chose extroverted challenges, I used to fear public speaking until Year 10, I then had the opportunity to speak with confidence and I felt completely in command of the room. I understood why people like public speaking so much. You learn to argue, convince, manipulate (ethically), and win. These people skills matter, they are key to success in any career.

What advice would you give your younger self and Students currently at High?

TIME is your ally. Any interests you have, explore and cultivate them as your unique specialty. I never did Model UNs or debating in high school, despite a keen interest in history and a penchant for arguments. Ms Harcourt from the History Faculty might remember my commanding presentation skills, which wildly juxtaposed my demeanor in class - a quiet shadow. Do not follow what others do, chase the rainbow, excel in what YOU like, out do others in areas of your passion, make it your future. Follow what you have a comparative advantage in or take the time to share detailed and helpful responses.

Compulsory school attendance

Information for parents and carers

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age of 17 years. The Education Act 1990 requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the NSW Education Standards Authority for home schooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- gives students time to greet their friends before class
- reduces classroom disruption.

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child had to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- Being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance e.g. attending a funeral.



Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why.

Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An Application for Extended Leave may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.

My child won't go to school, what should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school. Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department may apply to the Children's Court for a Compulsory Schooling Order. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

• Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in partnership

The NSW Department of Education recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities.

Telephone interpreter service

Please contact the school if you would like more information. If you need interpreter assistance to contact the school, please call 131 450, tell them what language you need and ask the operator to phone the school. The operator will get an interpreter on the line to assist you with your conversation. You will not be charged for this service.

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
